High school football player admits murder

SANFORD - Maurice Williams, a 17-year-old safety on the Winter Springs High School football team, stepped into the wild side late Saturday night and his life will not be the same again.

Instead of defending against Lake Brantley in the big game tonight at Winter Springs, Williams is being held at the Juvenile Assessment Center in Sanford on murder charges.

Never in trouble, never a problem, Williams has admitted that he shot a man to death Saturday. He was arrested at the high school Thursday.

"This is a pretty good kid," Sanford Police Investigator Ron Daugherty said Thursday. "His record was clean - totally clean - until he had to go show off to the crowd on Saturday night."

Williams is in custody, having confessed that he killed Paul Kafka at the corner of Sterling Avenue and McKay Boulevard in the Washington Oaks area. Daugherty said that Kafka, 23, and two acquaintances may have driven to the area

to look for drugs - but this is denied by a cousin of the shooting victim.

"This person (Williams) put a gun through the window and shot Paul - and then ran off. It may have been an attempt at carjacking and robbery. He told Paul, 'Give me what you've got,'" said the relative who lives in Sanford but asked to remain anonymous. "He shot Paul when he didn't comply."

Williams told police that the gun went off when Kafka tried to push on the gas peddle.

Assistant Principal W. Gene Grace said today that the teachers and students at Winter Springs High School are baffled at what has happened to one of the most popular students at the school. "Maurice has been an ideal citizen," Grace said. "He's a very talented football player and a star on our track team."

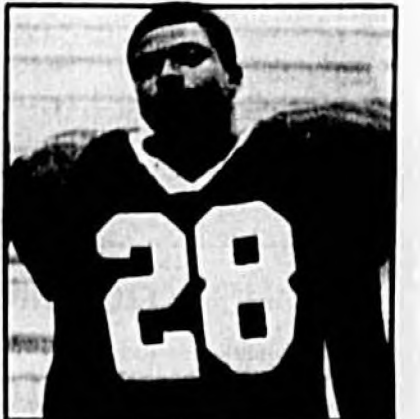
Grace said that he and Williams talked on Monday about last Friday night's varsity football game. "Maurice knocked down three passes. If he held on, he would have three interceptions. I kidded him that when opportunity knocks, you have to take advantage of it."

District to adopt budget for water protection, management

PALATKA--The St. Johns River Water Management District's Governing Board on Wednesday will decide whether to increase its property tax levy at the final public meeting on its budget for the 1998-99 fiscal year.

The budget that district staff members will present includes a property tax levy of

\$62,658,122. Last year's property tax levy was \$59,428,963. The millage rate of 0.482 mills is the same rate that has been in place since 1994.

At the board's direction, district staff members have reworked the budget to allow for the 0.482 millage to be maintained, while also ensuring that adequate funds will be available from property taxes and other sources to support

land acquisition and management initiatives, and projects such as: the Orange Creek Basin in Alachua County; Northern Coastal Basin in Flagler, St. Johns and Volusia counties; Lake Apopka in Orange and Lake counties; and the Indian River Lagoon in Volusia, Brevard and Indian River counties.

Since the July budget meet-

ing, staff members have reallocated funds, modified existing project budgets, received notification of additional federal funds to be received and identified additional dollars to be carried over from the current fiscal year to the new fiscal year that begins October 1.

Under a 0.482 millage rate--48.2 cents for every \$1,000 of assessed property value--the owner of a \$75,000 house who

claims the standard \$25,000 homestead exemption would pay \$24.10 per year in property tax for water management. Under the 0.5 millage rate, the same homeowner would pay \$25.

The final budget hearing will be held at the district's headquarters in Palatka, Wednesday's hearing will begin at 5:00 p.m. The public is invited to attend.

The district is responsible for protecting wetlands, waterways and underground drinking water supplies, and regulating water use in all or part of the following counties: Alachua, Baker, Bradford, Brevard, Clay, Duval, Flagler, Indian River, Lake, Marion, Nassau, Oklawaha, Orange, Osceola, Polk, Putnam, St. Johns, Seminole and Volusia.

Bridge, light rail topics at MPO meeting

ORLANDO - Members of the Orlando-Volusia Metropolitan Planning Organization Alliance were updated at a recent meeting on the St. Johns River bridge project and Central Florida's light rail transit system.

The alliance is a cooperative partnership between METROPLAN Orlando and the Volusia County MPO and deals with items of common interest to Volusia and Seminole counties. The St. Johns River Bridge topic got under way with a discussion on the financing of the project.

The bridge connects Seminole and Volusia counties by way of I-4 and is in need of repair, with an estimated 70,000 vehicles traveling on it each day.

Sudden burst of rain diverts traffic

SANFORD - City crews barricaded several roads Thursday when a sudden burst of rain caused up to two inches of standing water and minor flooding in several parts of town.

Any time there is a large amount of rain in such a short period, there is bound to be slow draining water in the first few hours, said Charles Hargrove, support services coordinator for the Sanford Department of Public Works.

"We got a lot of rain in a short time,"

Hargrove said. "A lot of the flooding is because of the fast rain. That's nothing out of the ordinary for Florida."

Hargrove said his office received about a dozen calls from residents, however no major incidents were reported. Sanford Police officers helped direct traffic from roads that had been temporarily closed off, he said.

The storm maintenance crew was sent out to make sure that water basins are clear. They also check the drainage grates to make sure leaves or other objects are not blocking the path of the water, Hargrove said.

The basins catch the water allowing it to go to the storm lines. Crews always check the grates after a heavy rain, he said.

The roads most affected were: First Street and Park Avenue, Second Street and Sanford Avenue, the 400 block of West 12th Street, 900 block of West 11th Street, Country Club Road and Lake Mary Boulevard, 20th and Oak Avenue, Hidden Lake Drive and Lake Mary Boulevard.

The city currently has several projects under way to improve drainage. The Second Street Project, which is scheduled for

Jogger raped

ALTAMONTE SPRINGS - A female jogger on Wednesday at about 9:20 p.m. was attacked and sexually assaulted on Jamestown Boulevard in Altamonte Springs, police said.

As the woman ran by, the attacker emerged from a bush around the bridge near the entrance to Merrill Park and dragged her into the woods. During the assault, he punched the victim in the face and choked her, police said.

The suspect, who was last seen running west along Jamestown Boulevard toward Interstate 4, is described as a dark-skinned male either black or Hispanic with dark short curly hair. He is between 18-25 years old, about 6 feet tall and weighing about 200 pounds. He was wearing dark pants and a light shirt with a dark horizontal stripe on both upper sleeves.

A sketch as been released of the suspect and police are following leads.

Tonight: Lake Howell at Seminole, 7:30 p.m.

SANFORD - This is going to be a big one. Seminole is entering its first home and intraconference game after a huge win last week against Pine Ridge, 48-7. The 'Noles are now 2-0 and getting stronger every week.

Lake Howell (1-1) is also coming to the Sanford high school after a big win, taking down Oviedo 24-10. Though the Silver Hawks were picked by some to be a pre-season favorite, they will definitely have their hands full tonight.

Both teams are pretty evenly matched. Both rely heavily on an experienced and/or talented back field to move the ball but both also have talented quarterbacks who can throw the ball when needed. Lake Howell and Seminole have young receivers, however, so count on this one to go fast as a running game burns the clock.

If Seminole can stop Silver Hawk running back Christian DeJesus, it will be able to pretty much shut down Lake Howell's offense. Lake Howell, on the other hand will have to contain the tandem of Deon Howard, Clarence Lattimer and Mario Frederick.

In all, this should be a slugfest.

Tonight: Pine Ridge at Lake Mary, 7:30 p.m.

LAKE MARY - The Rams were brought back to Earth last week, losing to Lyman just a week after recording their first win in nearly two years.

Pine Ridge was rocked last week by Seminole, 48-7 and also struggled last season.

The Rams got two straight strong performances from tailback Lawrence Rudolph, but the offense is still struggling. It hasn't clicked and benefited from special teams play in the first week. The defense has been strong, but may have to completely shut down the opposing offense to get a win. The game is a non-conference game, but could still give Lake Mary a 2-1 start.

Tonight: Oviedo at Winter Park, 7:30 p.m.

WINTER PARK - It's early, but this is a must-win for Oviedo, the only team in Seminole County without a win.

The Lions lost their second straight last week, 24-10 to arch-rival Lake Howell. The Lions moved the ball all night but weren't able to score when they got close. Three times in the second half, the Lions advanced inside the Lake Howell 30 but came away empty.

Turnovers have also crushed Oviedo this season.

Kenny Starling is still at the helm for the Lions at quarterback and Kevin Quintero has handled much of the rushing load.

On defense, the Lions might be as strong as any unit in the county.

Tonight: Lake Brantley at Winter Springs, 7:30 p.m.

WINTER SPRINGS - Tonight marks the Bears' first chance to host a county opponent at home. Unfortunately, they have to take on what might be the county's hottest team.

Lake Brantley won its biggest game in years last week, knocking off eighth-ranked Deland on the road. The Patriots didn't play extremely well; they just made the plays when they needed to.

Regan Russell has adapted to the triple-option offense and he has a stable of running backs to carry the load.

The Lake Brantley defense has been just as tough, keeping Lake Brantley in the game last week until the offense stopped making mistakes.

Winter Springs came crashing back to reality last week in a 9-0 loss to Berkeley. The Bears routed Bayside 54-0 in their first-ever varsity game and Johnnie Blake ran wild for five touchdowns. Brandon Blake is a top-notch quarterback that people are already comparing to former Seminole standout Jeff Blake, his brother.

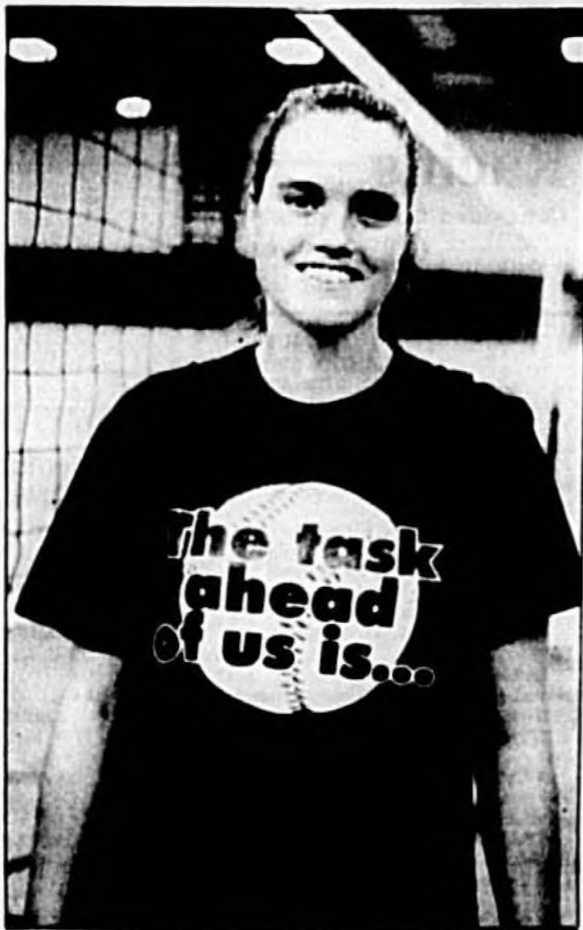

Last night, Lake Mary's girls' volleyball team put a harsh end to Oviedo's undefeated season, beating the Lions in straight sets, 15-8, 15-1.

"We came out comfortable and didn't panic if they made points," Lake Mary coach Cindy Henry said. "We felt like we were in control the entire evening and played really well."

In fact, Lake Mary was in such control that Henry stated she couldn't ever remembering not having to call a time out against an Oviedo team, which has been the power of the district and SAC for years and the Rams' main nemesis.

Each player stepped up in last night's game, led by setter Jackie Van Looven, strong hitter Lindsay Manz and powerhouse Kelly Harbour. Good serving coupled with good passing shots made the much anticipated match up with the Lions go even smoother than expected.

"We had a complete team effort tonight, even though that sounds like a cliché," Henry said. "When we made errors, we fixed them. We dug hits and passed well. The stats were so spread out tonight that they really aren't worth mentioning. Some nights you feel like 'who stood up?' Tonight it was who didn't."

Oviedo must have been having an off night. The Lions are a very good team that is very well

coached and is always strong. Or maybe Lake Mary is just that good.

That will be put to the test Tuesday, when Lake Mary travels to Winter Springs to take on the other undefeated Seminole Athletic Conference team. That game starts at 7 p.m.

LONGWOOD - It has been said that there is no such thing as a coincidence, and in the case of Renew 2000 at Nativity Catholic Church, the original core group was made up of twelve individuals. Immunity. Rather brings to mind the disciples, doesn't it? Just as the disciples were joyfully facing what looked like rather insurmountable obstacles at the time, the core Renew group at Nativity is looking forward to the year 2000 with faith and hope rather than the dread which seems to permeate our secular society.

The very word "Catholic" means universal, and this is the beautiful message which Renew 2000 carries to each and every one of us not only at Nativity, and not only within the Catholic Church, but to all those who believe in the healing power of our risen Lord. We can once again return to the very roots which fed our faith and openly share the joy and faith with one another which has sustained us as a people for 2,000 years.

When asked to participate once again, Paakoski enthusiastically threw herself into the project.

When asked how to explain, "What's in it for me?" about Renew, Seymour simply smiles and says, "Come and see." There is a sense of peace and tranquility and genuine Christian love in him that seems to transcend the secular values with which we are surrounded. It's something that certainly seems to warrant further investigation.

Renew 2000 celebrates the coming of the new millennium and prepares us to face the challenges of the 21st Century. Christians are told to "be not afraid," and Renew provides a vehicle for them to experience the richness and the beautiful heritage present in our Catholic faith.

After many years the New Salem Primitive Baptist Church was rebuilt on Twelfth Street and Cedar Avenue. The original warriors of the foundation have been laid to rest. These ministers have pastored the church and led the yearly success of the congregation throughout the years.

Treatment for Addison's disease

DEAR DR. GOTT: My daughter has Addison's disease. Is there any help for this condition?

DEAR READER: Addison's disease is complete or partial failure of the adrenal glands, which manufacture several hormones necessary for health. The affliction usually has a gradual onset; it causes weakness, weight loss, digestive disturbances, restlessness, depression, and a peculiar skin discoloration called "bronzing."

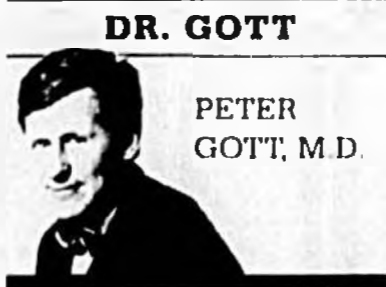
Treatment is almost always successful and involves the administration of adrenal hormones in pill form. In addition, patients with Addison's disease must maintain a nutritious diet that is high in protein and carbohydrates. Salt intake may have to be monitored, because Addisonian patients lose excessive quantities of this mineral. Finally, the stress of infection, surgery or injury will increase the need for additional hormone replacement. Consequently, Addison's disease must be closely supervised medically.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I have an inguinal hernia. If I have corrective surgery, will I still be able to jog and lift weights? I'm 21.

DEAR READER: Inguinal hernia is one of man's most common ailments. During fetal development, the testicles form in the abdominal cavity. Subsequently, they drop down into the scrotum through a channel in the lower abdomen, called the inguinal canal. Although this opening usually closes at or around birth, males are left with a permanent weakness in this area. Sometimes the channels actually remain open, more often, they tend to stretch and open as we age.

When the inguinal rings (the tissue that closes the canals) stretch, portions of bowel can slip into the inguinal canals, and often into the scrotum itself. This produces a lump in the groin, called an inguinal hernia, that tends to become more prominent during lifting and straining, because the increased abdominal pressure forces bowel downward into the canals.

Surgery, to sew shut the inguinal rings, cures the problem. However, doctors may recommend that patients avoid straining after surgery so that the rings will not reopen. Although jogging and other everyday activities are usually not prohibited, you should ask the surgeon, before the operation, whether he will permit you to continue weight training. This will depend

WIN AT BRIDGE

First, to the barber

To end the week, two coups. To give you a hint toward the first, P.G. Wodehouse pointed out that there is only one cure for gray hair — which is what?

After a competitive auction, you have been pushed into five spades. West leads the heart five, which is surely a singleton. Where would you go from there?

West's two no trump overall — the Unusual No trump — showed at least 5-3 in the minors. As regular readers know, I don't like the bid because far more often than not, the opponents, who usually hold the majors, win the auction. Then, the overall helps the declarer to place all the cards — as it did here. Still, if only East, with a big fit in both minors, had had the courage

— despite the prevailing vulnerability — to sacrifice in six diamonds. West's bid would have worked well. Six diamonds doubled costs only 200 (unless South finds a low heart lead and North returns a club).

If South had won the first trick and led a trump, West would have grabbed the trick with his ace and switched to the diamond jack. East would have overtaken with the ace and, if in mid-season form, returned a heart for West to ruff one down.

Foreseeing this, South won the first trick in the dummy and asked for the club king. When East played low, South discarded his singleton diamond. Now the contract was safe.

This play, discarding a loser on a loser to keep a specific opponent off P.G. Wodehouse wrote, "There is only one cure for gray hair. It was invented by a Frenchman. It is called the guillotine."
