

Braves Again Fall Before Attack Of Brooklyn Dodgers

BROOKLYN, June 1. (AP)—With Curt Davis and Whitlow Wyatt leading the pitching effort, the Brooklyn Dodgers crushed the Boston Braves today by taking both ends of a doubleheader, 10-2 and 3-1, before 22,104 approving customers.

The double victory also stretched the Braves' first-place margin to six games over the St. Louis Cardinals, whose twin bill with the Chicago Cubs was cut in half by the weather after they had won the opener.

Davis went all the way in the first game at Ebbets Field, scattering nine hits for his seventh victory against one defeat. Wyatt pitched only six innings in the night cap as he shoulded Whitlow Wyatt and registered his fourth win with one defeat.

Home runs by Pete Reiser and Dixie Walker moved the Dodgers' 11th attack on four pitchers in the first game. Reiser connected in the third after Arky Vaughan had singled, trailing starter Al Jarvis.

The bases were loaded in the fourth when Walker singled and Reiser followed with a home run. The inning ended with a double play and before Walker could get in and return to the infield. Walker had completed the circuit behind the trio of runners.

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Great RAF Bombers Batter Essen Again; Larger Raids Likely

American Airmen Say Attacks Are Proving To Be Second Front Against foe

(By Associated Press) RAF bombers have battered the industrial city of Essen for the second time in 24 hours. American airmen believe the raids are proving to be second front. The Germans claimed 22 British planes downed.

An RAF commentator today declared the air raids over Germany "will get bigger" and asserted a total of 30,000 planes "possibly" to be used in raids is "not a fantastic figure".

He said the objectives of raids on Cologne and the Ruhr have been "substantially secured". "We will repeat the dose, and the dose will get bigger," he added.

Again yesterday the RAF sprang back to the assault, going over the Channel in great force in one of the biggest daylight aerial offensives of the war.

During the morning there were large-scale sweeps over the Tirrill and Harlede areas of northern France. One German plane was shot down and several damaged.

German troops and gun posts were attacked by morning raiders. Bombers blasted railroads in Northern France and then in the afternoon Paa de Calais, Dieppe and other shipping centers were attacked.

In all, the RAF lost nine fighters, and knocked down three enemy fighters.

British Armies Take Offensive In North Africa

(By Associated Press) British desert armies took the offensive in North Africa today as the Nazi push apparently weakened.

Front reports said the hard pressed Axis units were fighting desperately in a swirling sandstorm whipping the Knightsbridge area, making no effort to pull out behind other German and Italian forces which had withdrawn through gaps in the British lines after taking a severe mauling.

Both the British and Axis desert fighters were said to be throwing all their available strength into the crucial battle, with infantry clashes added to the mechanized struggle.

Rommel's armored units maintained their advance from the west and the imperial forces battered with equal force from the east as the armies saw-sawed back and forth around the crossing of the desert trail.

No fighting was reported west of the breaches which the Axis had punched in the main imperial line between El Gatala and the coast. Sir Hachim, 40 miles southwest of Tobruk, Gen. Sir Claude Auchinleck, British commander of the Middle East, announced earlier that the Axis offensive had been broken up after the crushing of a landing attempt on the coast and the rolling back of the drive at Tobruk.

According to the report, the bicyclist was going north on French Avenue when a large white sedan was driving east on Third Street. The car ran over the bicyclist and his sufferer suffered bruising and lacerations and was taken to the hospital.

Huge Naval Measure Expected

WASHINGTON, June 3 (AP)—The House today is expected to pass a bill authorizing the construction of 100 new naval vessels, including 50 destroyers and 50 submarines, over a five-year period.

Seminole County Women Take Part In FSA Program

Seminole County farm women participating in the Farm Security Administration (FSA) program in the county have begun their annual canning season, according to Miss Sara E. Powell, FSA county home management supervisor.

The canning goal for 1942 is 100 quarts for each member of the family participating in the FSA program in this county. This is an increase of 25 quarts over last year's all-time record of 75 quarts, and is evidence of Seminole County farm women's response to the Nation's appeal for more food, canned fruits and vegetables.

Ready lining pantry shelves of these families include string beans, tomatoes, peas, squash, and strawberries.

"FSA housewives are helping in the country's wartime food need by putting up large supplies of food," said Miss Powell. "War-time restrictions on sugar and canned equipment are bringing home to farm women the necessity of changing their food preservation programs this year."

Participating in the FSA program, Miss Powell said, are also learning to economize on the sugar women canning. "Canning blueberries and huckleberries is already well under way in Lake County," she said. "Homemakers have been very successful in substituting honey or syrup for half the sugar needed to can the berries," Miss Powell said. "Farm women canning in the FSA program are also conserving sugar by canning berries unsweetened and by using three parts of sugar to four of berries, instead of the usual equal parts," she pointed out.

The Appropriations Committee expressed the view it would "not again be confronted with the disregard of the direct mandate of Congress by this agency." It complained the board re-allocated its funds for an annual cost of \$4,000 after Congress repeatedly refused to provide funds for that purpose.

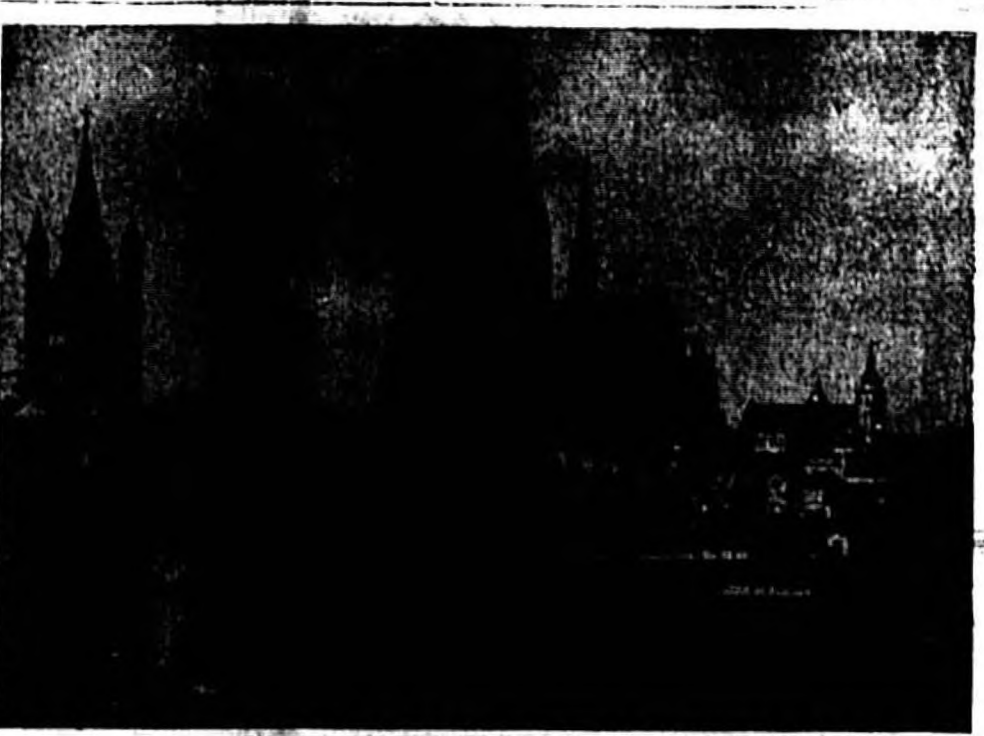

1250 Planes In Record Attack Wreck Cologne
