What a little water can do

Lake Mary residents tired of biting the dust

LAKE MARY — There are dusty days in the city of Lake Mary, and some of the residents are tired of biting the dust.

Rudy Sloan, a long-time resident on Terry Lane, wants the city to get a tanker to wet down the dusty roads. There are 11.5 miles of unpaved streets in Lake Mary. "I'm not against dirt streets. I'm against dust," Sloan said.

Sloan says that since the

completion of March, the health of the residents, especially the elderly and the young, has been affected. Many have breathing problems that are becoming very serious. It's time for the city to help the land.

Lake Mary City Manager John Litton told Sloan that a tanker was budgeted. "What he didn't tell me," Sloan said, "is that the city has money to lease a 2 or 3 inch tanker if it's in the city's commissary's budget."

Residential rates won't rise till '99

LAKE MARY — The city will not increase the rate of charges for residential water service, as it had planned to do on June 1.

City Manager John Litton reported to the mayor and city commissioners that the rate increase could be delayed to June 1, 1999, due to a 7 percent surplus in the revenue stream and \$115,500 saved on waterline work on Rinehart Road.

"The projected costs for the waterline project were higher than actual," said Jackie Sowa, the city's finance director.

"I think we owe it to our citi-

zens," Litton said about delaying the rate increase.

Commissioner George Duvey was concerned that the city would be sending the wrong message to consumers. "We are encouraging the use of extra water," he said. He questioned the environmental implications addressed by the St. Johns River Water Management District last year when the agency requested the rate increase because of the city's high water usage.

Commissioner Gary Brender said that the adjustment in the rates, which became effective on June 1, 1997, addressed the concerns of the water management district.

"I see no reason for us to keep the surplus," said Brender.

"I think from a financial standpoint the rate is fine," said Litton.

The base service charge for a residential meter is \$4.20 per month. Zero through 3,000

Sanford eyes additional cemetery land

SANFORD — The city cemetery reportedly has room for only 200 burials, which are predicted to be gone within 2 years. Efforts are now under way to develop property immediately south of the cemetery which would provide another 1,840 spaces.

In February, the city's Cemetery Advisory

Committee met to discuss the present shortage. Howard Jeffries with the city's parks and landscape division said the committee felt that the city has an obligation to the citizens to continue to provide cemetery space and expand as needed.

The committee subsequently recommended that land known as the Crawford property, purchased in 1991 for future expansion, be considered for develop-

ment.

Jeffries has determined that the estimated cost of converting the property to usable space would be \$24,470.

City Manager Bill Simmons has determined that the sale of the additional 1,840 burial plots would generate approximately \$1 million.

At the present time, all proceeds from

Rinehart on schedule, under budget

LAKE MARY — David Gierach, of Conklin, Porter and Holmes, a Sanford engineering firm, told Lake Mary city commissioners Thursday night that the Rinehart Road Widening Project is on time and currently \$1,289,991 under budget.

"Everything has continued to progress quite well," said Gierach. "We continue to look for...cost savings."

Gierach presented a change order to the commission for their approval. While the order included several increases in the contract price, 2 items totaling \$87,437.28 accounted for the decrease. A revision in

a retention pond, storm sewer pipe and retaining wall is saving money on the project.

The biggest issue, said Gierach, is the paving of the section of the road from Lake Mary Boulevard to the Manderley subdivision, which is scheduled to begin the first week of June and be completed by June 15.

When the paving is completed, a lane shift will occur, so work can begin on the west side of the road.

The contractor for the Rinehart project, Martin R. Eby Construction, was also the low bidder on the Interstate-4/County Road 46A interchange, north of Lake Mary. Work on

Summer school: Earn college credits at SCC

SANFORD - Beginning in June, Central Florida high school students will be able to earn college credits by participating in the Governor's Summer Program at Seminole Community College (SCC).

From June 22 to Aug. 6 up to 20 students ages 15 and 18 will have opportunity to participate in the six-week Governor's Summer Program at SCC. The Florida Department of Education awarded Seminole Community College the grant for the purpose of bringing academically motivated high school students into a college environment. To qualify, students must be at least an incoming sophomore with a minimum G.P.A. of 3.0; receive a signed recommendation from a teacher or prin-

cipal; and have received an academic award or recognition for achievement. There are 10 scholarships available.

Each year program participants produce a documentary video exploring an aspect of Central Florida's rich history and culture. The selected topic of this year's project will explore the history of theater in Seminole County, with an emphasis on the Governor's Summer Theatre Institute. Under the guidance of Seminole Community College instructors, students will learn directing techniques, script composition and supervision, on-camera interviewing, and post-production planning and editing through hands-on experiences. This interdisciplinary course combines philosophy, journalism, historiography, desktop publishing, and video production.

At the end of six-weeks, students will have earned three "delayed" college credits in HUM 2030: Selected Studies in Humanities. (The credits won't actually appear on the student's transcript until he or she graduates from high school.) Past productions have received recognition locally and at the state and national levels winning such honors as the Walt Disney World Community Service Award; Community College Association of Instructional Television (first place, national competition); A.C.E. Cable Award nomination for excellence in cable broadcasting; and Ft. Lauderdale Film Festival (second place, student division).

gallons is charged at a rate of 75 cents per 1,000 gallons. The delay in the rate increase will benefit consumers who use more than 20,000 gallons of water per month, who can expect an increase in the rate per 1,000 gallons, to \$2.15, in January.

Rick Diaz, public works supervisor, said as long as the new rate is in place on Jan. 1, the city will be in compliance with the water management district.

Diaz told the commissioners that he had been investigating purchasing personalized conservation kits for city residents interested in domestic water conservation. He said the kits cost about \$1 and there was \$300 in this year's budget for the purchase of the kits that would include a home water audit book, dye tablets for toilet leak detection and a flow gauge bag.

this situation." Greene said this morning that the commission has directed Public Works Director Rick Diaz to meet with Seminole County officials in order to get a couple of tankers. The water will be taken from retention ponds in Lake Mary. "We'll get some from the pond in front of City Hall," Greene said. There is a shortage of reclaimed water in the city.

Diaz said that because the streets are sand, water probably will go right through. "It is not going to do much. But it may provide some relief."

Most of the folks who live on the unpaved streets want them to stay that way for a variety of reasons. The dirt roads cut down on through traffic and are much quieter than paved streets. "They give you an old Florida feeling," says Seminole County Commission Chairman

and former Lake Mary Mayor Randy Morris, who used to live on one of the unpaved streets.

"There's a problem when it gets as dry as it is now," Morris said. "You don't dare open your windows. There's dust everywhere. In the trees. In your face. Everywhere."

Sloan is urging all those who live on Lake Mary's dirt streets to raise the issue before this year's election. The mayor's position and two commissioners' seats are up for election. "Ask the candidates for a promise that they will help us dirt street hostages by getting some water cars," Sloan said.

Jack Elton, a 22-year resident of 1st street, said the dust coming into his home has been unbearable even though he has a high badge out front. "We'll take a hose and try to water down the road but it doesn't help a whole lot," Elton

said. "It's absurd to try to wash a car. A couple hours later the car is as dirty as it had been. That's life in Dirt Land."

the sale of burial plots go to the Cemetery Fund, with the specific purpose of acquiring additional cemetery land. All maintenance of cemetery lands is presently financed from the city's General Fund. The present balance in the Cemetery Fund is \$394,880.

Stimmons is proposing that maintenance of the property should be an 6 percent bond, with the cost funded from the Cemetery Fund. He added however that such revenues would not be sufficient to fully cover maintenance operations, but projected additions to the fund from the sale of the

remaining 200 spaces as well as the 1,840 new spaces, would clearly become sufficient within the next few years for perpetual maintenance.

In addition to asking about the cemetery expansion, in order to help reduce city expenses, the Cemetery Advisory Committee has also asked consideration of discontinuing providing free veterans spaces, since the spaces are now provided by the National Veterans Cemetery.

The expansion proposal is in the form of a request from the committee to have the cost of converting the Crowded prop-

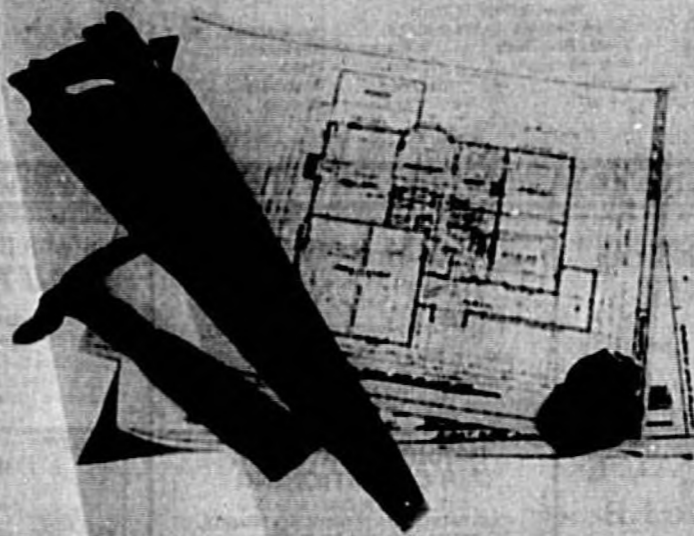
erty included in the preparation of the fiscal year 1998/99 city budget, presently being prepared. The money would be included in the General Fund budget.

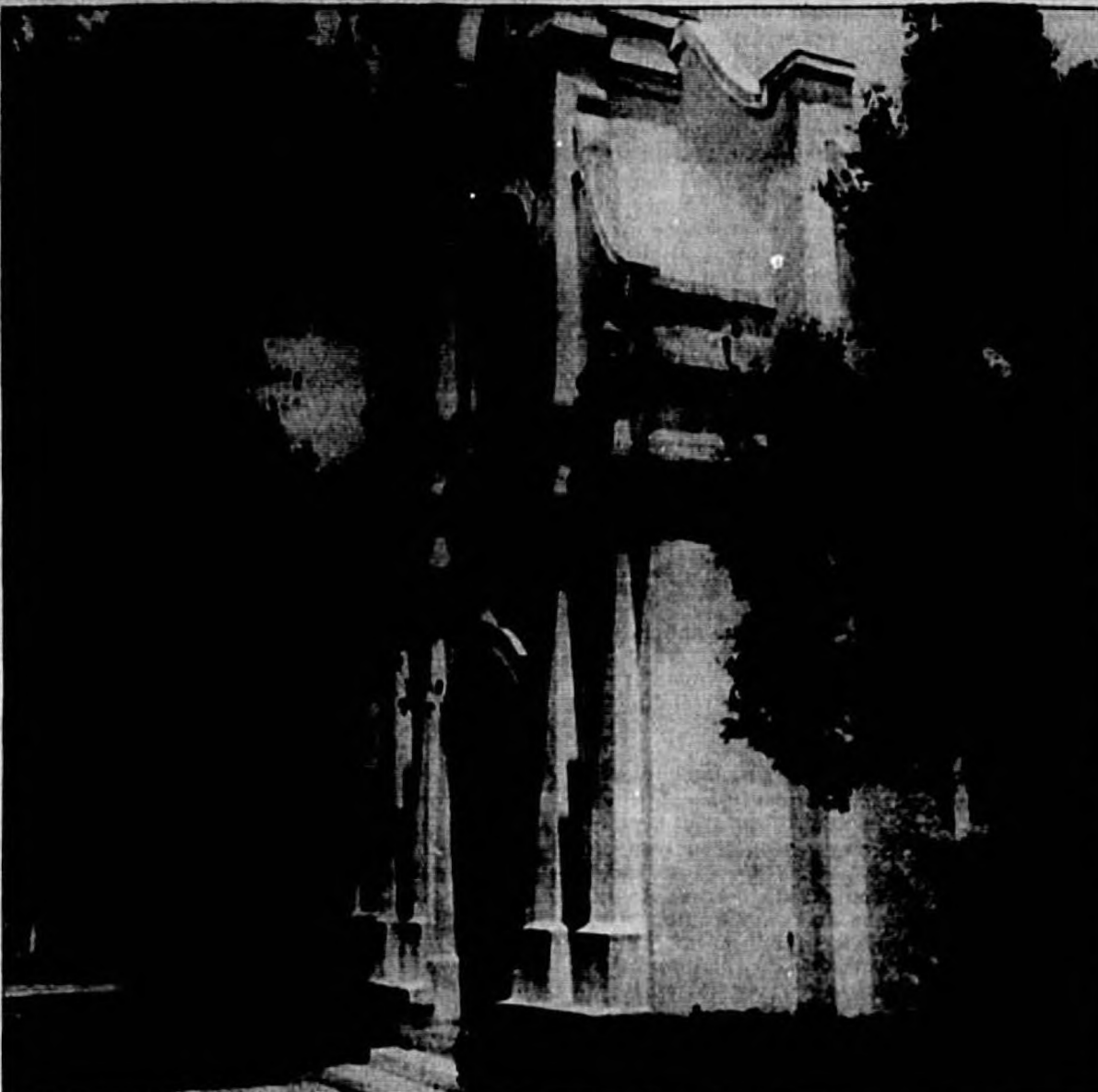

You can conceive of Webster saying that to be educated is to know all the words in the book (Webster's Dictionary). Certainly, defining "education" is revealed through various synonyms—as schooling, training, learning, study, information, instruction, teaching, knowledge, development, and wisdom. Webster does give the notable clue under "educate" — "providing schooling for" and "to develop mentally or morally especially by instruction."

Speaking at a meeting of educators at Harvard University in 1987, Cornell University's President Frank Rhodes said that educational reforms call for Universities to give attention to "values" and to the student's "moral well being." A

student in the audience immediately responded by asking: "Whose values are to be taught? And who is to teach us?" Unfortunately, the questions were not answered, and they remain nebulous to many educators today. Indeed, all values in educational reform are relative outside of Divine wisdom.

"If thou seekest her as silver, and searchest for her as for hidden treasures; Then shalt thou understand the fear of the Lord, and find the knowledge of God. For the Lord giveth wisdom; out of his mouth cometh knowledge and understanding" (Proverbs 2:4-6).

Ah, those pesky blind mosquitoes!

Ah, those blind mosquitoes! If you have ever been on a picnic around Sanford during the 4th of July or been outside during a County Commission meeting at night during certain times of the year, you've experienced these pesky pests! The Cooperative Extension Service is the educational part of IFAS—the Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences. The other part of IFAS is research. We have been lucky to have a research station in our backyard—on Celery Avenue in Sanford to be exact, helping to improve the lives of the people in Central Florida and literally throughout the world. One of the many focuses at this research facility has been to try and conquer the blind mosquito. Here's the latest strategy that is being conducted to try and conquer this small insect that has potential to drive residents inside and send tourists packing!

Although the insects are often called blind mosquitoes, they may see too well for their own good. Their weakness for

bright light plays into the hands of Arshad Ali, Entomologist for the Cooperative Extension Service, University of Florida/IFAS.

Ali is installing four street lights on each of two 91-foot Navy surplus barges on Lake Monroe, which borders Sanford. In about two months, he will place the barges between an uninhabited area of the lake where the insects breed and the city.

He hopes the insects will stop off as they fly toward town to party. On each barge, spotlights will lure them toward a panel draped with more than 30 yards of cloth treated with

insecticide. When they dive for the lights, they should smack head-long into the cloth and meet their end, Ali said.

People around the world would welcome relief from swarms of blind mosquitoes, which are known as midges in some areas. Ali's work took him to Italy, where planes landing at Marco Polo Airport in Venice were skidding on heaps of blind mosquitoes that had accumulated on runways.

The only good thing about blind mosquitoes is they don't bite. Their rap sheet includes:

- Driving residents inside and sending tourists packing.
 - Causing allergic reactions and breathing difficulties.
 - Clogging air conditioners and car radiators.
 - Creating a fishy smell after they die.
 - Attracting spiders that deface property with the webs they spin to trap the insects.
- The pests are most prevalent in tropical and subtropical climates, where they are a problem much of the year, but they also can be a menace as

far north as Minnesota and Canada in the summer.

The barge may be Ali's best shot—after 19 years of research—in his battle against blind mosquitoes in lakes. "They are extremely difficult to control in large bodies of water", Ali said. "Everything else we've tried on places like Lake Monroe hasn't worked very well or has been very expensive."

Applying compounds that kill larvae on the top of lakes and ponds, a common treatment for mosquitoes, is cumbersome and relatively expensive against blind mosquitoes. That's because, unlike the mosquito, the blind mosquito's eggs and larvae remain submerged.

Killing the pests with sprays broadcast into the air requires large amounts of insecticide, poses risks to the environment and is expensive. Although fish and some other insects devour them, blind mosquitoes generally reproduce faster than predators can keep up with them.

"Fortunately, they rarely stray more than a few city blocks from water", Ali said. "Since they're concentrated in such areas, we're optimistic about using bright lights to entrap them on lakes. Still, there's no magic wand that will work in all settings."

Parents can teach life skills to kids

Dear Parents,

It's that time again—time to get all the last minute preparations lined up for when the kids are out of school. Sure, you have day care, swimming lessons and camp experiences scheduled, but we need to talk about something closer to home—what you should expect from each of your children in sharing the daily work of the family. No child is too young to learn to help. Mom and dad need to work with toddlers to teach them to pick up their toys. Your preschoolers can help feed the pets, make up their beds and pick up after themselves. Of course, you don't expect perfection from them—just an honest effort to accomplish the task. By the time your child is in elementary school, they should be expected to perform tasks to help the whole family. It might be clearing the dishes off the ta-

ble after dinner, taking out the garbage, helping to empty the dishwasher—each child's worklist will be different, but all are working toward helping out in the family.

The question often comes up about whether to pay a child for their contributions to the family. Again, each family finds their own answers, but many have found an allowance of around \$5.00 multiplied by a child's age is about right. Then, if the kids do not do their daily work, a small fine

can be imposed. Don't make the daily fine so high that the child could actually come out "in the hole" at the end of the week. We're teaching responsibility here—not discouragement. Also, for larger jobs that kids can handle as they get older—sweeping the pool, cleaning the driveway, cutting the grass, etc., you may want to provide special incentives such as additional money or establishing a point system toward a specific reward.

Summer is a great time to increase your kids' practice on developing healthy life-skills. One of our biggest mistakes as parents is doing things for our kids that they need to learn to do for themselves. After all, we can do it faster, better and with less hassle and aggravation than trying to get them to do it. While all of that is true, how will our kids get good at doing things they never have to

do? Make up your mind that this summer every school-age child in your family will have a chance to practice some of these chores: wash a load of clothes, sew on a button or mend a seam, prepare a simple meal, check the air pressure on their bike tires, or a car, and fill the tires if necessary.

If we do our job of parenting well, one of our primary goals will be to work ourselves out of the job. We will do this by teaching our kids the life skills they will need to be productive adults.

Vet inspires kids to say Pledge of Allegiance

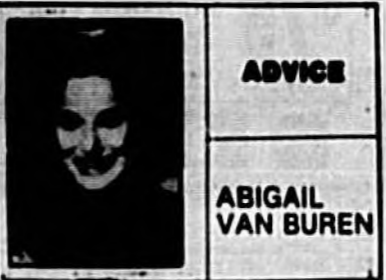
DEAR ABBY: I am 13 years old and would like to ask a favor. May I say thank you through your column to an inspirational speaker?

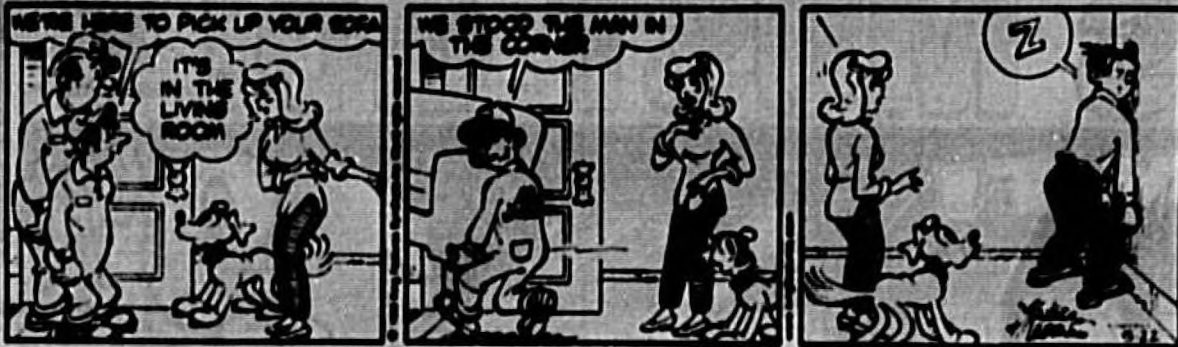

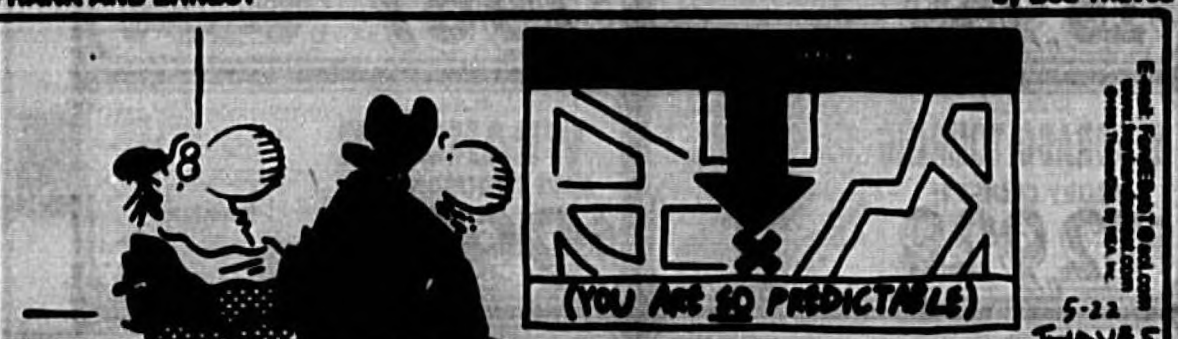

Are home urine tests accurate?

DEAR DR. GOTT: My doctor cannot discover why I have repeated urinary tract infections. Whenever I experience burning and frequency, I call him and he insists on a urine culture before prescribing antibiotics. Would I be better off testing my urine at home?

The important consideration is that men and women over 50 should have such testing done annually — or more frequently, at a doctor's discretion.

DEAR READER: Most home test kits for urinary infection, which involve passing a chemically treated strip through the urine stream, are reasonably accurate. The strip reacts to nitrites that are produced by bacteria. About 10 percent of such bacteria do not react to the strip; therefore, there is a built-in false negative. This means that a person may have an infection that isn't identified by the home-test kit, leading to an unacceptable delay in getting treatment. On the other hand, if the strip is positive, the person still has to obtain antibiotics. Under these circumstances, the patient may be inclined to take left-over, outdated medicine. If medicine is taken for too short a time, a more serious infection could develop. Therefore, many specialists discourage the use of home-testing.

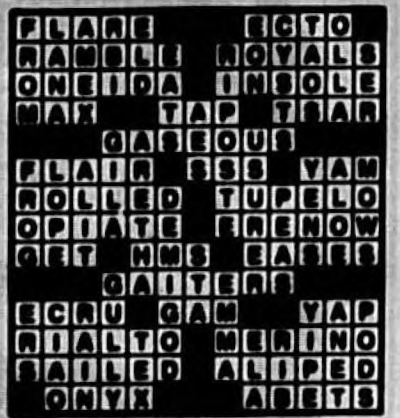
There is a reason you have repeated infections, and that reason has yet to be discovered. I believe that you would be better served by seeing a urologist. Perhaps you have silent kidney stones that provide a focus of infection. Maybe there is a correctable anatomical reason, which enables bacteria to enter your bladder readily. Or possibly your infection is never really eradicated and simply causes repeated attacks of burning and frequency. A visit to a urologist is the logical next step. Follow his advice.

DEAR DR. GOTT: If, as most authorities recommend, men and women over the age of 50 should periodically check their stools for blood, why not do this at home?

DEAR READER: Why not indeed? Such home testing kits are easy to use and quite reliable. A chemically treated pad is placed in the toilet bowl with the stool and if the pad changes color, blood is present. This type of analysis is not widely used, but it certainly holds an edge over the more cumbersome and inconvenient traditional stool testing that consists of collecting a fecal smear in a special envelope, returning it to the doctor and having him (or a lab) perform the test for blood. In practice, both types of analysis are equally accurate. I suppose that it doesn't matter which test is used.

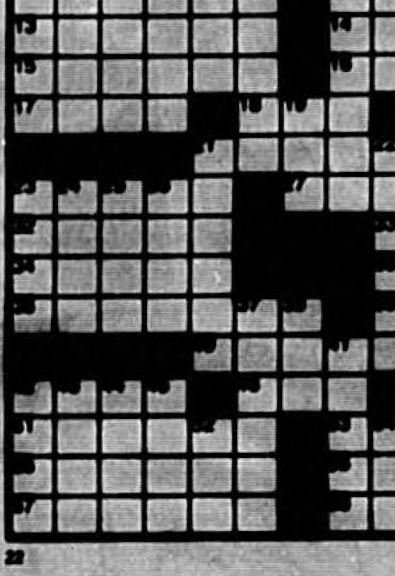

Move eastward many kilometers

As our European tour is nearing an end, we reach Vienna. The capital city of Austria is close to the top of my "must visit" list. Before World War II, Austria had the bridge team to beat, winning the European Championship in 1922, '23 and '24, plus an unofficial world championship in '37. One of the best players was Edward Fricshauer, who immigrated to the United States in 1938 after his homeland was annexed by the Nazis. In Hollywood, Calif., he became a leading criminal lawyer and real estate broker. Fricshauer's particular penchant was declarer-play. What would be your line of play in this six-heart contract? West leads the club three. The bidding isn't on record.

Perhaps, opposite a forcing raise, Fricshauer bid an optimistic Blackwood. Or maybe South showed a good hand with a strong heart suit, and North overbid.

It looks as though you have no chance at all. Even if West has the spade ace, when you lead your singleton toward dummy, West can duck, leaving you with two minor-suit losers. However, Fricshauer found a faint chance. After winning the first trick with dummy's club ace, he called for the spade two!

Thinking declarer might have the singleton spade jack, East went in with his ace. Now Fricshauer had two spade winners in the dummy for his pair of minor-suit losers. The hardest part of a good deceptive play is thinking of it in the first place. It is difficult to put yourself in the position of the opponent you are hoping to mislead.

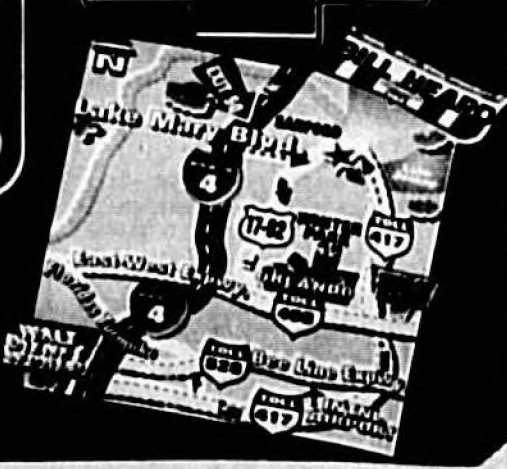
