Urine Tests For Drugs Flunk Here

Making high school students take urine tests to see if they use drugs may be okay for a New Jersey school district, but school officials here vehemently oppose the idea, with one dismissing it as a "gang search."

The school board of East Rutherford, N.J., adopted a pollcy Wednesday to test students once a year, according to wire service reports. Although the board has not decided what to do if the tests are positive, the superintendent says the options are barring the students from class, discussing the problem with their parents, referring the students to social agencies or turning their names over to

police. If barred from class, the students would not be allowed to return to school until there was proof they no longer had drugs in their system, the superin-tendent said. School officials would have to get the parents to sign consent forms in order to

test the students. "No way. I think it's an invasion of privacy," said Jean Bryant, vice chairman of the Seminole County School Board. "To me that's a police action and I don't think that's the

school board's job.' Her colleagues on the board

"I think they are in for legal problems," said Nancy Warren. board chairman. "I can't imagine requiring every student to do this. I don't agree with requiring everyone to submit to a test. No way do I believe in that."

School officials should intervene, she said, when a student shows evidence of having a drug problem, but "not to have them arrested but should find them help."

Board member will Kroll said the test was not feasible.

"If the kids know they're going to be tested at the beginning of the year, they'll clean up their act two or three weeks ahead of time," Kroll said.

It would be better, Kroll said, to call a student's parent, informing them of his or her drug-related behavior, and then ask to subject the student to a urine test.

Board member Joe Williams could not be reached for comment.

The test would do little to stop the flow of drugs into the schools, according to Jim Dawson, head of health and physical education for Seminole County schools.

"What are you going to do to them (the students)? Throw them out of school? Is that going to help find out who is supplying the drugs? No. I don't think I'd want my child subjected to that," he said. "I have a problem with testing the whole student body. That's like gang searching."

Dawson called the testing plan "too agressive" and said Seminole County schools' approach to drug prevention is more of an educational approach. Dawson said students are required to take a onesemester "life management" "lass, which teaches skills that can prevent drug abuse, like how to have a good self-concept and how to make decisions and communicate with others. They were arrested by Winter Park police for "trespass after warning."

Polk Moves To Ease Jail Crowding

Persons charged with misdemeanors who don't represent a threat to the community may soon bypass incarecration while awaiting trial if the state accepts a plan by Seminole relieve overcrowding in the county jail.

Polk said he devised the plan not to jail those charged with misdemeanors, except those under the influence of alcohol or a drug who would be held until they sobered up or those accused of violent or drug related crimes, after receiving the results of a March routine inspection by state jail officials.

Polk said there is always a small overcrowding problem in most jails and the Seminole County jail built to house 236 is averaging about 263 immales at a time. Polic's plan will also reduce the number of federal prisoners accepted by the jail.

Overcrowding has been cited following all inspections of the Seminole County jail, Polk said. It's a problem he hopes will be solved when planned Jail expansion and improvements that will double jail space are

completed in 1987. But he's now seeking a temporary solution that will satisfy the state and will supplement other programs, such a pretrial release and the weekend-in-jail programs that relieve overcrowding. Some prisoners are sentenced to serve time only on the explain his support for aid for weekends, thus freeing space for the Contras.

"I will discuss the problem with the sheriff and the judges. Some misdemeanor offenders deserve fail," he said. These might include perpetrators of domestic violence and those charged with driving under the influence, he said.

As an alternative, Wolfinger suggested a weekly Jail sweep by a committee that would evaluate individual cases to consider who might be released and whether or not they would be a threat to

the community. Seminole County Commissioner Barbara Christensen said the state has left Polk with no alternative, but to release those who pose the least threat to the

community. "It's the only alternative we have at the present time if the state says we have to remove some people," Mrs. Christensen said. "What else can we do, but release th people who are the least offensive?

"We have plans to expand. When you've reduced the number of federal prisoners and still have a problem you do the next best thing and release those least offensive. The sheriff is doing the best he can. He doesn't have much to work with and I agree with what he's doing."

Jetliner Carrying Americans Hijacked

BEIRUT, Lebanon (UPI) — Shiite Moslem gunmen hijacked a Trans World Airlines jet today with about 150 people aboard - mostly Americans - and forced it to Beirut where they refueled, released 19 women and children and took off again for Algeria.

Freed passengers were flown to Cyprus. They told security officials there were two hijackers aboard the TWA Boeing 727 Jetliner. One woman said a passenger on the hijacked plane had been shot in the neck and wounded.

The hijackers demanded the release of Arab prisoners from Israeli jails and threatened to blow

Christian Voice of Lebanon radio said a man claiming to be an "intermediary" for the hijackers called with a "secret demand: If by 6 p.m. (11 a.m. EDT) the Moslem fundementalist prisoners are not brought from Kuwait to Lebanon, we will return to Beirut and blow up the

There were no reports of the hijackers carrying out their demand by press time. There are 17 Moslem fundamentalist prisoners

in Kuwaiti jails serving long sentences for a December 1983 series of bomb attacks on U.S. and French targets.

Seminole County's tax base the taxable value of all property in the county - grew by #495,569,509, 11.6 percent, over the past year, most of that from new construction.

County Property Appraiser Bill Suber said preliminary figures show the county has a total taxable property value of \$4.8 billion, up from last year's \$4.3

The increase could bring a reduction in property tax rates.

Newly constructed property over the past year is valued at \$355.3 million with the balance of the increase - \$140 million from higher appraisals of some existing properties. Suber said. He said the reappraisals were not done in one specific area, but in various spots throughout the

We usually look at sales data on existing properties and try to

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determine if areas have fallen out of an equitable range," Suber said, explaining that part of his job is not only to keep the values at market level, but also to be sure that all properties are

assessed fairly. Stressing that the figures are only preliminary to help the county, the school board and the cities to begin their budgeting work for the 1985-86 flacal year. Suber said official values will be released on July 1

The \$4.8 billion tax base figures will be used by the county and the school board as they work on their budgets. The total is from properties both in the unincorporated areas and within the cities.

TWA-Texas Air Merger Faces Potential Obstacles

NEW YORK (UPI) - The \$793.5 million merger of Trans World Airlines and Texas Air Corp. faces several potential roadblocks, including a possible counterbid by corporate raider Carl leahn and a plan by TWA workers to pursue an employee buyout.

Texas Air Corp. announced Thursday it had agreed to buy TWA for \$23 a share and the boards of directors of both companies unanimously approved the definitive merger agreement.

The \$793.5 million marriage of TWA and Texas Air, parent of Continental Airlines and New York Air, would give the combined company a fleet of more than 300 aircraft, which would outstrip the fleets of United Airlines. American Airlines, Eastern or Delta, analysts said.

But the merger faces several hurdles before becoming official. Approval must be obtained from TWA shareholders and the Transportation Department.

Industry observers also predict some airlines would ask government regulators to reject the merger on grounds that it gives Texas Air international routes without

Cheese Linked To 28 Deaths

LOS ANGELES (UPI) - Bacteria found in a mild. crumbly Mexican-style cheese has been linked to 28 deaths, mostly of pregnant women and infants, prompting health officials to recall the product and close the factory that makes it.

Two cheeses, queso fresco and cotija, manufactured under the brand name Jalisco, are distributed in all Western states, but it is not known if illnesses linked to the product have apread beyond Southern California.

At least 71 cases of the illness have been reported in Los Angeles County, 21 of them fatal, said Dr. Shirley Fannin. deputy director of the county Health Department. Officials in neighboring Orange County reported another 16 cases.

Samples were sent to the federal Centers for Disease Control in Atlanta, where researchers discovered the cheese contained the bacterium listeria monocytogenes, health officials said.

The bacteria cause an infection with flu-like symptoms. Stephanie Thomas, a spokeswoman for the state

Department of Food and Agriculture, said officials ordered the plant closed and the cheese impounded until it could determine the cause and extent of the problem.

She also said the state was ordering all stores to take the product off their shelves. Officials at several supermarket chains took the action voluntarily.

'Hair Trigger Society'

Study: Nuclear Weapons Are Everywhere

WASHINGTON (UPI) - A haunting overview of the global nuclear forces says nuclear weapons and related facilities are "in everybody's backyard," forcing people around the world to live in a "hair trigger society."

The private study, conducted over 10 years and packed into an inch-thich book, provides chilling statistics that etch a nuclear network around the planet by the five major powers: the United States, the Soviet Union, China Britain and

Topping the list of U.S. sites with the most nuclear warheads is South Carolina, with a missile submarine base situated in Charleston. New York, with neutron warheads secreted at Seneca, ranked second. North Dakota came in third because of its bomber and missile bases.

The study, "Nuclear Battlefields, Global Links in the Arms Race," was conducted by William Arkin and Richard Fieldhouse, who are defense analysts with the Institute for Policy Studies in

"There is a pervasive lack of understanding -even within the military - of the pervasiveness of the arms race," the book says. "Officials have kept quiet for one reason. It's going on in everyone's backyard.

"The global infrastructure will determine the course of the next war; it will, in fact, contribute to the outbreak of the next war," the book says. 'We live in a 'hair trigger' society. Permanent readiness for war is embodied in the nuclear infrastructure."

The Pentagon took a dim view of the publication. Spokesman Michael Burch expressed concern about not all of the material having come from "open sources" and disputed the accuracy of the book's nuclear tally.

Burch said he could not correct the alleged inaccuracies because U.S. policy is never to confirm or deny the presence of nuclear weapons at any location.

"It's a cheap shot on the part of the Pentagon." Arkin said. "We didn't do anything illegal to obtain the information."

Much of the data, he said, was obtained through between 500 to 700 requests under the Freedom of Information Act, interviews with defense officials, technical literature and open publications.

The book makes these major points:

-The five nuclear powers have put nuclearrelated facilities in 65 countries and territories. The United States tops the list with 40, the Soviets have 11, Britain 12 and France nine. China does not have nuclear facilities outside its

-There are more than 50,000 nuclear warheads worldwide.

There are 2,058 different locations worldwide that are part of the nuclear infrastructure: 677 in the United States, 309 in the Soviet Union, 135 in Britain, 102 in France and 59 in China.

The five nuclear powers have deployed 11,800 nuclear weapons outside their territories or at sea and 12 countries permit other nations to put nuclear weapons on their soil in peacetime.

-Eight countries, seven of them European NATO allies, have U.S. nuclear weapons: West Germany, with 3,396 and at the front line of confrontation with the Soviet bloc, ranks first with the most. The others are Britain with 1.268: Italy 549, Turkey 489, Greece 164, Holland 81 and Belgium 25. South Korea has 151.

Of the 50 states, only Delaware and West Virginia have no nuclear infrastructure facilities. California has the biggest number with 79, Alaska is next with 42 and Maryland ranks third

Landlord Offers Yuppie Discounts To Alter Image

MIAMI BEACH (UPI) - An partment complex owner, calling the abundance of senior citizens "a cancer in Miami Beach," is offering 15 perceit 'yuppie discounts" that have angered some older tenants and may violate county laws.

"We're being discriminated against." said 73-year-old Minna Wallach, a 12-year tenant at Robert Blum's Carriage House. "It's a war of attrition. We'll die anyhow. He doesn't

have to rub it in. Janet Launcelott, director of the Dade County Fair Housing and Employment Board, said Thursday the discount is illegal because "Dade County law forbids any kind of discrimination or different treatment on

the basis of age. Blum, who has three apartment buildings totaling 856 units, says he consulted his attorneys before offering the discounts last month and his ready to defend his discounts

in court. He called the predominance of elderly residents "a cancer in Miami Beach" and said he wants to change the city's image as a "dying community of old people."

Blum said his yupple discount was no different than the senior citizens' discounts offered on county buses and by drug stores, movie theaters and restaurants.

in addition to offering 15 percent "yupple discounts" to tenants under age 50. Blum introduced maid and butler service and hired a staff of attractive young women.

He also moved the men's and ladies' card rooms from the lobby floor to a single room upstairs, installed swings and a sandbox outside and is providing live music and a barbecue by the pool on weekends.

Discounted studio apartments start at \$500 a month and one-bedroom units start at \$800. So far, Blum says he has rented 28 apartments to young urban professionals.

Agca Again Says He's Christ; Discusses Other Important Cases

ROME (UPI) - The Turkish terrorist who shot the pope repeated his claims to be Jesus Christ and surprised a court by discussing two of Italy's most notorious criminal

Mehmet Ali Agea, serving a life sentence for shooting and wounding Pope John Paul II in St. Peter's Square on May 13, 1981, is being tried on a new charge of amuggling a pintol into Italy.

Agea, 27, staged his latest outburst on the witness stand after Judge Severino Santiapichi Thursday said he felt a duty to ask Ages if he has information about a Vatican messenger's daughter, Emanuela Orlandi, who disappeared in Rome June 22, 1983.

Agea told the court Thursday the illegal Masonic P-2 lodge - headed by fugitive financier Licio Gelli kidnapped the girl.

Gelli, former grand master of the secretive P-2, escaped from a Swiss jail on Aug. 10, 1983, and is still at large. He is wanted for political and military espionage, conspiracy, corruption, extortion, perjury and fraud in a major bank

"Emanuela is alive with certainty," Agea said, staring fixedly at Judge Severino Santiapichi and the jury.

"She was kidnapped by the powerful Masonic P-2 organization of Licio Gelli because this organization knows with certainty that I was, I am, Jesus Christ," Agea said. "They wanted to exchange me."

Mengele Evidence 'No Plot'

SAO PAULO, Brazil (UPI) - Police are dismissing charges that evidence pointing to fugitive Josef Mengele's 18-year stay in Brazil and his drowning in 1979 is part of an international plot to halt the search for the Nazi.

Federal police chief Romeu Tuma said Thursday police teams visited rural hideaways where the man lived between 1961 and 1979 and questioned laborers who knew him.

'Given that many of our new witnesses are virtually illiterate peasants. It is extremely unlikely they are participants in an elaborate international conspiracy" as some have charged, Tuma said.

Medical experts said Thursday teeth in the skeleton showed at least one similarity to those described in dental records of Mengele, but they hoped for more conclusive

Burford: My Style Was Wrong WASHINGTON (UPI) - Former EPA chief Anne. Burford, who resigned her Job amid scandal, says she erred "stylistically" because she did not meet the expectation of being "an emotive person

I think I made a mistake," she told the seminar, postered by an association of federal agency executives.



Betraying **Shipmates**

The safety of the U.S. surface fleet depends on the ability to detect Soviet submarines lurking beneath the waves. Every day, carrier-based anti-submarine planes and helicopters drop sonar devices into the ocean, listening. Every day Navy technicians lean over screens, analyzing electronic dots that, in wartime, could mean the difference between survival or destruction of a carrier battlegroup. Soviet submarines know the Navy is hunting them. The subs and ships play war games with each other, war games that are so secret that last year, when a Soviet submarine mistakenly surfaced into the hull of a U.S. vessel, the Soviet captain almost let his submarine sink rather than ask for U.S.

But the secreey of the Navy's antisubmarine warfare has been compromised.

A formery Navy man, his son serving on the carrier Nimitz, and his brother, a former anti-submarine warfare trainer, have been arrested on suspicion of trading secrets to the Soviet Union.

What would make a Navy man sell secrets that would threaten his fellow servicemen and betray his country? What would induce him to get his son to stash secret documents near his bunk? To have his brother photograph secret documents?

The alleged spy ring was a family affair. It spanned two generations and more than a decade. And it was uncovered by the alleged ringleader's divorced wife. She apparently did not know, when she told the FBI about her former husband's activities, that her son was also involved.

This is a family tragedy and a national tragedy. The amount of information the spies transmitted remains unknown. But it could well jeopardize the Navy's anti-submarine warfare program.

Photographs of the men show people indistinguishable from other retired and active-duty Navy men. There is nothing in their eyes to explain why they would put their shipments on vessels between the cross hairs of a Soviet aub's periscope.

Esplonage is romanticized by thrillers. But in the end spying comes down to threatening your own country, your own fellow workers and neighbors. Only by making that personal betrayal clear can the magnitude of this crime be judged and espionage be curbed.

No Protectionism

representative that President Reagan place higher tariffs on 32 specialty imports from the European Economic Community should not be approved.

In the hope of forcing the Common Market to grant better treatment to U.S. exports of citrus products, the United States wants to raise the tariffs of such items as Perrier water. Danish hams, Italian pasta and Gummi Bears, a German jujube.

But the United States has been involved in trade negotiations with the Common Market for almost eight years and little has changed. Raising the prices of bottled water and hams isn't likely to help.

Resentment over trade imbalances is understandable, but protectionism in any form is simply not acceptable.

The United States should not risk a new trade war. The first victims would be many small importers in the United States who handle specialty items like Perrier and Italian pasta. These importers will bear the brunt of any protracted trade war.

A representative of the American Association of Exporters and Importers said the tariff proposal would "damage more Americans than Frenchmen." The association is upset that the U.S. trade office has't consulted anyone to determine the kind of fallout that could result from higher tariffs.

The idea of tiny Gummi Bears getting caught in the teeth of a trade war is laughable, but the implications for future U.S. trade practices are not funny, if the president should approve the tariff.

Pritikin Ahead Of His Time On

on diet and exercise have rivated books on sex as best-sellers. There is a growing public interest in diet and exercise as pathways to health. One of the most creative and effective tratiblazers involved in the rising enthusiasm for sound nutrition was Nathan Pritikin, who died

I first learned about Pritikin's views when I served as chairman of the Senate Select Committee on Nutrition and Human Needs in the 1970s. During a visit to his California center, I discovered that he was proceeding on the same general conclusions that my Senate committee investigators had reached. After months of research, public hearings and lengthy interrogation of experts, the committee concluded that the American diet contained too much fat, sugar and salt and not enough vegetables, fruits and whole-grain cereals. We discovered that six of the 10 leading killer diseases in the United States, including heart disease, stroke, hypertension and diabetes, were diet related. Pritikin, acting independently, had arrived at

Nearly 30 years ago, as a 40-year-old engineer. Pritikin found his life threatened by clogged arteries that had brought on severe angina chest pains and virtually immobilized him.

I thought I was immune since I followed what everyone considered the 'good American diet." Pritikin recalled. "Eggs every morning. lobster Newburg every Friday, a pint of ice cream every night, cheese every day. At that time, in 1955, physicians weren't aware of the relationship between nutrition and disease. I was instructed to cut out all activity and take medications. And I only got worse. It took me two years of research to convince myself my diet was at fault."

This was the beginning of a brilliant, controversial and often ridiculed effort by Pritikin that created Longevity Centers in Santa Barbara, Santa Monica, Miami and Downingtown. Pa. Thousands of participants have gone through these centers to find improved health with the Pritikin diet and exercise agenda. Several best-selling books have

extended the Pritikin message others.

Several years ago. Washington restaurateur Duke Zeibert telephoned me to ask what I thought about the Pritikin program. He told me that he was suffering from angina and diabetes and was vastly overweight. I am not a doctor, so I told Duke that he should check with his physician, but that I was personally sold on the Pritikin concept. He signed up for the 26-day program in Santa Monica and during that period he not only lost weight, he lost his angina and his diabetes. Today he is in good health, running a successful restaurant and hiking several miles a day. "Pritikin saved my life," he says. I have witnessed similar experiences with many of the Pritikin participants.

The last time I saw Pritikin was in July 1984. when he invited me to be his guest for a few days at the Downingtown center. He was in high spirits as he reviewed the results of careful studies by the National Institutes of Health and the noted Framingham study confirming the soundness of his low-fat, low-cholesterol, low-

sugar and low-salt diet.

Telephone **Battle** Heats Up

WASHINGTON (NEA) - The great long-distance phone war is heating up, and some of American Telephone and Telegraph's competitors say that Ma Bell isn't playing

The battle centers on a littlenoticed provision of the antitrust agreement that split up AT&T: By September 1986, Bell Operating Companies - known as BOCs must give local telephone customers 'equal access' to such non-AT&T long-distance services as MCI and

Today, when customers dial a long-distance number, they're automatically connected through AT&T - or, more specifically. through a company called AT&T Communications.

A customer can use private long-distance carriers - but in most cases, the customer must dial a dozen or more numbers to reach the private carrier's computer and to identify his account number. To make a long-distance call through AT&T, the customer needs to disl only the area code and number, sometimes preceded by "1:

However, the antitrust settlement will change this. By September 1986, most customers must be to connect to their chosen longdistance carrier simply by dialing

The plan calls for one-third of communities to be converted by September 1985, and 75 percent including all major urban areas by September 1986. The BOCs must contact all local users 90 days before the effective date of equalaccess in that community, explaining the plan and the other longdistance services available. AT&T will then ask whether the customer wants to stay with Ma Bell or go with one of the competitors.

The system seemed to be working smoothly - but now one of AT&T's biggest competitors says that Ma Bell is cheating.

MCI Communications Corp. has complained to the Justice Department that AT&T is "actively interfering" with the equal-access subscription process. Specifically, MCI charges that AT&T is erroneously assigning to AT&T Communications tens of thousands of customers who have signed up for other long-distance services

The Justice Department has agreed to investigate the claims.



SCIENCE WORLD Cosmic Mystery

CAPE CANAVERAL (UPI) - A small X-ray observatory to be launched from the shuttle Discovery Thursday will peer into the core of the Milky Way to study a mysterious source of radiation that could be a star-eating black hole.

The observatory, an inexpensive satellite called Spartan 1, will be picked up by the shuttle's robot arm two days later for return to Earth at the conclusion of the seven-day shuttle flight June 24.

The existence of black holes. collapsed stars so massive their gravity would prevent even light from escaping, has never been verified but theory suggests the strange objects could exist. Although black holes cannot be

seen" by definition, they may be indirectly detected by X-rays produced as matter is drawn inward. accelerated into a disk and heated to extremely high temperatures...

It is the X-ray "signature" produced by super-heated matter spiraling into the "accretion disk" around the presumed Milky Way black hole that Spartan will be looking for.

Spartan 1 is the first satellite in a series designed to be launched from the shuttle and brought back to Earth after spending several days on its own taking automatic measurements and photographs.

The heart of the Milky Way lies

some 30,000 light years from Earth in the direction of the nummer constellation Sagittarius.

The center lies hidden by the thick clouds of dust and interstellar debris that make up the galaxy's spiral arms.

But radiation in the infrared and radio portions of the spectrum along with short wavelength gainma rays. and X-rays can penetrate the murky dustlanes

For the past 20 years, astronomers have known a massive object thousands of times heavier than the sun is lurking at the core of the Milky Way. Current research indicates it is a giant black hole. slowly cating stars, dust and gas.

A team of scientists from the University of California at Berkeley reported in the June 6 issue of the British science journal Nature that an enormous amount of material is concentrated in the Milky Way's center, indicating the existence of a black hole there.

It is now clear the distribution of mass in the galactic center is most unusual," said Nobel-prize winner Charles Townes, head of the research team. "With this strong new evidence, the case for a black hole.

Solid Gold Highway

WASHINGTON (NEA) -Westway is No. 1 in the nation," says an official of the Army Corps of Engineers here. "No other project is comparable to it. There is no competition."

He's referring to the country's most ambitious, extravagant and outrageous proposed public works project - a new highway in New York City that would traverse only 4.2 miles of Manhattan's West Side.

The most reliable estimates place Westway's projected price at \$4 billion to \$6 billion, while inflation, cost overruns and other unpredictable factors could readily boost that figure to \$10 billion.

That's almost \$2.4 billion per mile or more than \$450,000 per foot for a 12 lane interstate highway in a senseless location - from the Battery, at the southern tip of Manhattan, to 42nd Street.

The explanation for Westway's outlandish cost lies in the fact that it's actually a private real estate development masquerading as a publicly financed highway - with up to 90 percent of the funding coming from the federal treasury.

Instead of building a thoroughly adequate eight-lane highway along an existing right-of-way (at a relatively modest cost of \$60 million to \$100 million) Westway's promoters want to pave over the Hudson River

instead. Extending Manhattan about 1.000 feet into the river would provide 227 new acres of land suitable for development. Although 94 of those acres are to be park and another 36 acres would be consumed by highway interchanges and ramps, the remaining 97 acres would be set aside for residential. commercial and industrial development.

That land would be parceled out to politically well-connected real estate developers anxious to construct luxury apartment towers, office building and assorted other structures

For about half of its length, Westway would be confined to a tunnel dug through the middle of

the newly created landfill. Although scores of local politicians in New York as well as more than 50 members of Congress publicly oppose the project, pressure from land developers and construction unions presumably is

responsible for the Westway endorsements from prominent public officials.

U.S. Nuclear Locations Disclosed

WASHINGTON - In the 40 years since the first atomic bomb exploded in the New Mexico desert. the world has rushed headlong down the path of nuclear proliferation. So far, the possession of nuclear weapons by five major powers has acted as a successful

But the possibility is growing that the nuclear arsenal is getting out of control. Familiarity seems to have bred contempt for the consequences of a nuclear exchange: officials in Washington - and presumably in the other nuclear-power capitals are thinking what was once called the unthinkable.

Consider the testimony of a top Strategic Air Command general at a closed session of the Senate Armed Services Committee. According to the transcript, classified "secret," he made the obligatory bow to "the complex interaction of many elements" that add up to deterrence,

but then said ominously: "However, should deterrence fail between strategic nuclear powers. all but one of these factors become

irrelevant, and we must then look to the ultimate measure of meril: raw military power.

The general then proceeded, through 41 pages of testimony, to plead the case for deploying hundreds and even thousands more nuclear warheads in this country and abroad.

We doubt that even the experts of the Strategic Air Command, let alone President Reagan and his advisers, have a clear idea of just how extensive the world's nuclear arsenal has become. A fresh picture is presented in a new book. Nuclear Battlefields: Global Links in the Arms Race, by William Arkin and Richard Fieldhouse,

The book is sure to create an uproar in Congress and the Pentagon, and will probably touch off anti-nuclear demonstrations and an FBI investigation. But the furor should not obscure the serious purpose of the book: to give the public enough facts for an informed debute.

With a minimum of rhetoric and a maximum of mind numbing facts and figures, the book sets out to list every nuclear warhead and every

and deployment of nuclear weapons. Though the amount of classified information on Soviet nukes is impressive, the authors can be faulted for inadequate treatment of other Soviet areas. such as civil defense. Nor is there any mention of Israel's nuclear arsenal.

The greatest shock for most Americans will be the discovery that there are nuclear warheads practically in their backyard. Only 22 states and the District of Columbia have no nuclear warheads within their borders. The greatest contiguous warhead-free zone is a roughly Y-shaped. 15-state cordon sanitaire stretching from the Atlantic Ocean (Delaware and Maryland) to the Mississippi River. north to the Canadian border (Minnesota) and south to the Gulf of Mexico (Alabama and Mississippi).

The authors have prepared a chart that ranks the states by the number of warheads and also by nuclear facilities. Surprisingly, the two states with the most nuclear weapons are on the eastern seaboard, not the Great Plains has 230 nuclear warheads.

No White-Collar Prison For Abortion Clinic Bombers

PENSACOLA (UPI) - Although a federal judge recommended two convicted abortion clinic bombers serve 10-year terms at a white-collar camp, prison officials ordered them sent to a more secure prison in Tallahassee.

Matthew Goldsby and James Simmons, convicted of bombing three clinics last Christmas, must surrender by noon Monday to begin serving six concurrent 10-year terms at the Federal Correctional Institution in

On May 30, U.S. District Judge Roger Vinson recommended that Goldsby and Simmons be sent to a minimum security camp at Eglin Air Force Base, but the federal Bureau of Prisons this week decided to send them to the level two prison at Tallahassee, marshals said Thursday.

U.S. Marshal "Mac" McClendon Thursday described Tallahassee's prison as having guards, high fences with razor edges and double strands. He said many of the 750 ininates were convicted of drug-related crimes.

McClendon said a level one camp like Eglin has "very minimal security" and is reserved for white-collar criminals. He said the camp has about 600 inmates.

Graham Faces Veto Decision

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) - Gov. Bob Graham has until midnight to decide whether to risk a legal battle with House leaders over a \$232 million construction bill for Florida public schools, colleges and universities.

But Graham said Thursday that he would decide today whether to veto the Public Education Capital Outlay (PECO) bill in whole or in part. If Graham misses the deadline the bill becomes law without his signature.

House leaders have warned they might take Graham to court should he attempt to veto individual projects contained in the PECO bill. They argue the state's constitution gives governors line-item veto power over the main appropriations bill only - and that Graham must accept or reject the separate PECO bill in its entirety.

But Graham insisted earlier this week that the PECO bill relates to appropriations - even if the word "appropriations" appears nowhere in its title.

Clemency For 'Mercy Killer'?

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) - Gov. Bob Graham has agreed to seek an expedited elemency hearing for a 75-year-old manwho says he killed his terminally ill wife "as an act of love.

But the governor said Thursday he would make no decision on whether to grant Roswell Gilbert of Fort Lauderdale a chance for a reduction of his mandatory 25-year sentence until the Parole and Probation Commission has a chance to consider his case.

Gilbert was convicted of first-degree murder on May 9 after he admitted he killed his wife, Emily, 73, with two gun shots to the head on March 4.

Gilbert testified at his 4-day trial that killing his wife was "an act of love ... to end her suffering" from Alzheimer's disease. He said he killed her at their home after she had burst into a meeting he was attending and begged him to

Alien Marriage Scam Was Just 1 Of Many

BELLE GLADE, Fla. (UPI) - arrange marriages. Immigration authorities are investigating at least 22 other wedding scam rings similar to the one that produced fraudulant marriages for up to 300 illegal aliens in Belle Glade, agents said.

Thursday's arrest of 14 people, including a pastor, was just the beginning of an Immigration and Naturalization Service crackdown on Florida's marriage-for-money racket, said INS special agent Richard Smith.

Belle Glade is not unique in this problem," Smith said. Marriage fraud is rampant throughout the state of Florida. especially in south Florida."

INS agents swept through the poor farming community of Belle Glade Thursday, arresting four U.S. citizens and 10 aliens who allegedly paid up to \$10,000 for illegal marriages.

Federal agents said the fradulent marriages made the aliens permanent U.S. residents, letting them bring in countless relatives and apply for millions of dollars in unemployment compensation, food stamps and housing aid.

This could result in the savings of millions of dollars to citizens," Belle Glade Police Chief Mike Miller said.

An 18-month probe dubbed "Operation Matrimony" uncovered the scheme in which as many as 300 fradulent weddings were conducted in Belle Glade. Smith said the ring is one of 23 suspected marriage fraud rings under INS investigation.

weeks of the class are devoted to discussing drugs and how to say "no," Dawson said. The course is a requirement for graduation.



Taking dive

The underwater world is one of incredible beauty and mystery. And just about anyone can learn the secrets that lie just under the surface.




The mystery of the underwater world with its serenity and beauty lure many beneath the surface of area springs, lakes. and oceans. And 22-year-old Casselberry scuba instructor Cam Scarborough says water-wealthy Florida is the best place in the world for a diver to be

Almost anyone is a potential diver. anyone with strong lungs and at least a spark of interest, said Kevin Gonzales, 28. co-owner of a Longwood scuba shop.

"The worst reason to learn to dive is to learn for someone else. You've got to want it yourself, but if you're doing it because your boyfriend or girlfriend wants you to. don't bother." Gonzales said.

As a potential diver you don't have to be a great swimmer, he said. You just have to be able to make your way up from the bottom of a swimming pool. But you do have to have "a reasonable balance between physicial ability and mental judgment," Gonzales said.

Although Gonzales says plunging into the deep is safer than a drive to the beach, divers must be aware of potential hazards and they have to know their equipment.

Before going on your sea hunt for tropical fish, sea shells, lobsters, or just for a look around under the waves you have to learn the tricks of the trade how and to hundle the gear, Scarborough said.

'Anyone can learn to dive as long as they realize their own limitations, Gonzales said. "I mean you can be a good car driver, but that doesn't mean you're ready for the Indy 500. You can dive, but you won't necessarily turn out to be Jacques Cousteau.

Lessons are available through scuba shops and prices for a basic course, Scarborough said, vary from \$100 to \$200. and most include the use of tank, regulator, bouyancy compensator and wetsuit. In most cases, however, you'll have to shell out another \$100 to \$200 for a mask, fins. snorkel, weight belt, gloves, log book and dive manual you will use while taking the course. Those will be yours to keep.

The basic course includes classroom training, swimming pool acsaions, and a couple of open-water dives. Scarborough

After completing the course and passing a test for certification as a diver, meaning you can then legally purchase air to fill your tanks, you may want to buy your own set of gear — air tank, regulator, bouyancy compensator and wetsuit. That will represent an investment of from \$700 to \$1,200, Gonzales said. If that's a little too rich for your blood you can rent the equipment for \$30 to \$50 a day.

If the cost doesn't scare you away then nothing cise should. It's unlikely you'll drown or end up an hors d'oeuvre in a Jaws sequel, Gonzales said. The greatest danger to a diver revolves around that which we can't naturally do under water - breathe.

"The most important rule of diving Gonzales said, "is always breathe continuously, Don't hold your breath. People want to hold their breath and we have to condition them against this.

"If you hold your breath and ascend it's possible for your lungs, under the presoure, to over expand and rupture.

"Not like a balloon bursting. The lungs will just tear slightly and escape some air into the bloodstream or into the lining

The Girl

Wilson Broke Out Of The Rut

familiar with "the girt." steoms and dramas as the camera itself.

In comedy "the girl" is often a plot device, a reason for stirring up trouble, laughs, passions. In drama she is frequently the victim of murder, rape or other atrocttes

The girl is never a star and rarely a recognizable face. She is involved in the action to advance the story without becoming too much an integral part of the plot. She should not be memorable.

There is an enormous talent pool of youthful actresses from which the girl is east. Some actresses make a career of playing her. The money is good but the future is bleak

If she is too beautiful, too turnsy the stars don't want her around.

Her acting ability is never seriously taxed. She gets passed around from show to show without creating much of tenuous vocation, but good enough for women with limited skills and a desire to marry a rich producer.

Rita Wilson, dark hatred. blue-eyed and with a vague resemblance to Jane Fonda. was the girl for several years, making her debut in an episode of "Happy Days" in which she played a beauty school grad who changed her hair color and style in every accine.

Thereafter Wilson ran the major movie role.

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around the lung, causing injury." Gonzales said.

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

only a fraction of one percent of the divers, out of hundreds of thousands of dives, dying as a result of carelesanesa or ignorance, he said. Most of those who die or are seriously injured panic and hold their breath while trying to get to the surface too quickly. This forces air into their blood and cuts off oxygen flow to the brain or other vital organs.

Once you get the basics down

He enjoys cave diving, spear fishing, lobster hunts and collecting fish for his aquartum. Cave diving, he said, has carned an unjustified bad name. because of divers who throw caution to the wind and end up in trouble, trouble that can cost them their lives.

But in those cases, Gonzales said, the diver most likely entered the cave without an adequate air supply, didn't use. a continuous guideline from the entrance or equipped himself with only one light instead of the recommended

Those rare incidents lead to sensational headlines - "Killer Cave" - and scare off many potential cave divers, he said.

Instead of turning into disasters most dives lead to good times, new friends and new adventures, Gonzales said.
