EDITORIAL COMMENT

At Long Last

At long last, it appears that action is to be taken to control dogs running loose in Seminole County. The County Commission and Justice of the Peace Elmer Ashley last Monday requested of the legislative delegation that a bill be put through the Legislature allowing the County to set up a dog pound, with a full-time employee.

JP Ashley summed the matter for the delegation thusly: "Many ownerless dogs... some vicious... gun loose through the county, especially in the southern part. These animals are not only a nuisance but a health menace."

The Judge reported it is necessary for him to hose down his yard almost daily because of the packs of dogs ranging in his neighborhood.

There are reports, too, of dog owners from surrounding counties, especially to the south, dumping their unwanted pooches in Seminole County. Usually, these are female canines about to bear litters.

These unwanted dogs are dropped in this county because the owners' own counties have strict laws regulating control of the animals. To abandon these animals in their own backyards could bring the law down on them. So, Seminole County... without controls at the moment... inherits these animals.

The Commission members informed the legislative delegation the County Attorney has been instructed to draft a bill using the strong Orange County dog law as a pattern.

'This Atomic World' Presented At Lyman

Dr. Fagan Thompson, manager for the U. S. Atomic Energy Commission's traveling exhibit, "This Atomic World," presented a fascinating demonstration and lecture on the constructive uses of atomic energy to the entire student body at Lyman High School Tuesday morning.

The exhibit is on tour from the Oak Ridge Institute of Nuclear Studies, Oak Ridge, Tenn.

Thompson, who speaks a language his teenage audience can "dig," kept his youthful listeners so interested that his talk might well be called "Fun with Fusion."

At least one student, Sherry Lovell, found the demonstration to be a "hair raising experience" as she was subjected to 350,000 volts of static electricity produced by a model Van deGraaff generator, device used in smashing the atom.

Thompson showed a working model of a nuclear power plant pointing out that the cheapest one to be built, to date, cost \$30 million.

Nuclear power plants are in use in the Navy's 28 atomic submarines. The fire power of one of these subs equipped with nuclear warheads exceeds all that used by both sides during World War II, including the two atomic bombs.

The nuclear powered Aircraft Carrier Enterprise, the world's largest and fastest man of war, is capable of do-

Lake Mary Blvd. Top Seminole Road Project

Lake Mary Boulevard was given No. 1 priority in a \$54,000 county road improvement program approved today by the County Commission.

County Engineer William Bush and Road Supt. J. C. Lavender presented recommendations to the Commission, which approved all but one.

Two miles of Lake Mary Boulevard will be improved, mostly resurfacing, some rebuilding and some leveling, at an estimated cost of \$15,000.

At the suggestion of Commissioner James Avery, the Commission directed Bush to obtain additional right-of-way along the road for future development.

Bush also was directed to request the Lake Mary Chamber of Commerce to sponsor a name-changing contest for Old Lake Mary Road to eliminate confusion with other streets, roads, boulevards and highways named "Lake Mary."

Lavender and Bush recommended rebuilding of seven miles of the Longwood-Markham Road north to Highway 46 at an estimated cost of \$13,000 per mile. The Commission directed the road be prepared two miles a year for future improvements.

These resurfacing projects were approved:

- Two and one-half miles of Old Monroe Road will be rebuilt to a 12-foot width at a cost of \$6,000.
- Grading of these roads was approved:
- Pinewy, two miles; Sipes, one-half mile; Kentucky, one mile; and Snow Hill, one mile.
- Snow Hill Road was damaged extensively by the December freeze.

At press time Commissioners were commencing study of Bush's and Lavender's recommendations for a \$145,000 primary and secondary road improvement program for presentation to the State Road Department on March 7 at Deland.

Arguments Heard In Slander Suit

Arguments on a defense motion to dismiss the City of Sanford as a party in a \$100,000 slander suit were heard this morning by Circuit Judge Vassar B. Carlton.

The court, stating his decision probably will be appealed however he rules, directed attorneys to file briefs supporting their arguments.

The case is that of M. L. Saxon, doing business as the Saxon Termite Control, Holly Hill, against City Manager Warren E. Knoeles and the City of Sanford over remarks allegedly made by Knoeles. Saxon seeks damages of \$250,000 from the City and \$150,000 from Knoeles.

City Attorney William Hutchison argued that the plaintiff failed to meet requirements of the City charter, which provides the City shall be notified within 30 days prior to the filing of a complaint. Defense Attorneys Maurice Wagner and Harold Johnson argued that the petition, itself, met the requirements stipulated in the complaint.

Attack On Cuba Is War, Red Says

MOSCOW (UPI)—The Soviet Union warned the United States today that any attack on Cuba would start World War III.

Defense Minister Marshal Rodion Malinovsky made the threat in a strongly worded speech marking the 45th anniversary of the Soviet armed forces.

"We want to admonish the aggressive circles," he said, "that an attack on the Cuban republic would mark the beginning of a third world war."

He said that in the event of any such attack, the Soviet Union would be in the forefront of those to help Cuba.

"It is impossible to intimidate us," he said. "We have the power to turn up the aggressors in the first hour of attack."

U. S. Demands Incident Report

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The United States has demanded a speedy explanation from Cuban Premier Fidel Castro of the attack by MIG fighters on an unarmed American shrimp boat in the Florida Straits.

A strong note demanding an early reply was sent to Havana Thursday afternoon as President Kennedy promised swift action to prevent any repetition of the attack.

A Cuban radio broadcast monitored in Miami Thursday night charged the United States had "invented" the MIG attack to cover up supplies against Cuban shipping by anti-Castro exiles in this country.

The President told his news conference Thursday that the Defense Department had been ordered to make any necessary revisions in standing orders to insure action against any attacking craft.

The mercury plunged to three below zero at Crossville Tenn., in the Cumberland Mountains and to seven below at Bluefield, Va.

In Atlanta, temperatures dropped to nine degrees. Firemen were hampered by the bitter cold in battling a \$500,000 fire that destroyed a Shrine temple near the downtown area.

New Terminal For Merry

Merry Shipping Company of Augusta, Ga., which has the support of the Seminole Chamber of Commerce for a port terminal on Lake Monroe, is opening a new terminal on the Trout River in Jacksonville harbor, it has been learned here.

Application of the firm now is in the hands of the Interstate Commerce Commission for consideration as a common carrier on the St. Johns River.

A friendly brief to the cause was filed by the local Chamber and pointed out the need for a common carrier

on the St. Johns.

The following is republished from the February issue of the Jacksonville Seafarer magazine:

Merry Brothers Brick and Tile Company of Augusta, Ga., will transport loads of bricks via Merry Shipping Company barges to their new terminal located on the Trout River in Jacksonville harbor. The barge route will follow the Savannah River and the Intracoastal Waterway to the Trout River facility.

Serving the building industry since 1899, Merry Brothers Brick and Tile Company

produces 190 million bricks annually at its three Augusta plants.

Merry Brothers first went into the Savannah barge operation to lower brick transportation costs. So effective was this operation that the firm decided to expand its distribution network to serve Northeast Florida, utilizing Jacksonville's fine water transportation advantages.

The new terminal, leased from Tri-State Terminal and now nearly completed at the Trout River site, will serve as the distribution center for

Merry Brothers' bricks. A rail siding connects to the Atlantic Coast Line Railway, and trucks will be used in Jacksonville and North Florida deliveries.

On a five-acre tract, the terminal includes a barge-loading wharf, office building and storage yard.

Reynolds, Smith and Hills, Jacksonville architect and engineering firm, planned the \$150,000 project.

(Ed.'s note: This engineering firm also is consultant for the proposed Sanford port terminal and for the proposed St. Johns-Indian River canal.)

Study the bidding, then look at the East hand only. Your partner opens the four of diamonds against South's three no-trump contract. If South would be generous enough to play dummy's jack you would have no problem, but South plays the six.

Should you go up with the king or should you play the eight?

The first step in your reasoning should be to count a few points. Dummy has eight. You have 11. Probably South has 17 since he rebid to three no-trump. That leaves exactly four points for your partner. Some of those points will be in diamonds since he probably has led from something. If he has the queen of diamonds and another queen,



of diamonds? If he also holds the ten, you can play the king and return the eight after the king holds. Then if your partner ducks you will get in with one of your aces and give him two diamond tricks. You note that the eight spot play will be equally effective in this case.

Suppose he holds ace-nine of diamonds. If you play the king declarer will have two diamond stoppers. Suppose you play the eight? Declarer will win with the queen or ten. You will gain the lead with an ace and lay down the king of diamonds to drop North's jack. Then a third diamond lead will make your partner's king and nine both good so the eight spot is your correct play.



Other dignitaries attending the dinner included Charles Hall of the DeLand C of G and Arthur Hartung, president of the Orange City Chamber.




