

# Military Cleared In Crash

WASHINGTON (UPI)—A House investigator said today the military apparently had no way to prevent the crash last November of a non-scheduled airliner which took the lives of 74 Army recruits.

Rep. James E. Van Zandt, a member of a special House armed services subcommittee, made the comment as the investigation of the Richmond, Va., crash moved into its second day. Assistant Air Force Secretary Joseph S. Imirie was called as the first witness.

The Pennsylvania Democrat said that from the evidence so far uncovered about last fall's accident "there appears to be nothing to hang the military with."

He said the military, in using the Imperial Airlines plane, was going along with the technical advice of the Civil Aeronautics Board (CAB) and Federal Aviation Agency (FAA), the two government agencies charged

with making sure all commercial transports are reliable.

The subcommittee plans later this week to question both Najeeb E. Halaby, head of the FAA, and Alan S. Boyd, head of the CAB.

Subcommittee chairman Porter Hardy charged Monday that the military traffic management service could "suspend an airline because of failure to serve meals but couldn't do a blessed thing because of a safety failure."

The Virginia Democrat made the charge after Maj. Gen. I. S. Morris, head of the Unified Transportation Service, testified that any question of operating safety was referred to the regulatory agencies.

Earlier, Rep. Francis E. Walter, (D-Pa.) accused the CAB of being more interested in keeping the non-scheduled airlines alive than in the welfare of the public.

He said the Imperial Airlines crash dramatized the "financial unfitness, unsafe operations, and law violations in the supplemental airline field."

Walter gave the subcommittee the names of the four non-scheduled airlines which the Military Air Transport Service has declared unfit to carry military personnel.

They were: Airline Transport Carriers, Inc., Associated Air Transport, Inc., President Airlines, Inc., and Standard Airways, Inc. He also said that 20 of the 32 non-scheduled airlines were reported to be either bankrupt or in bad financial condition.

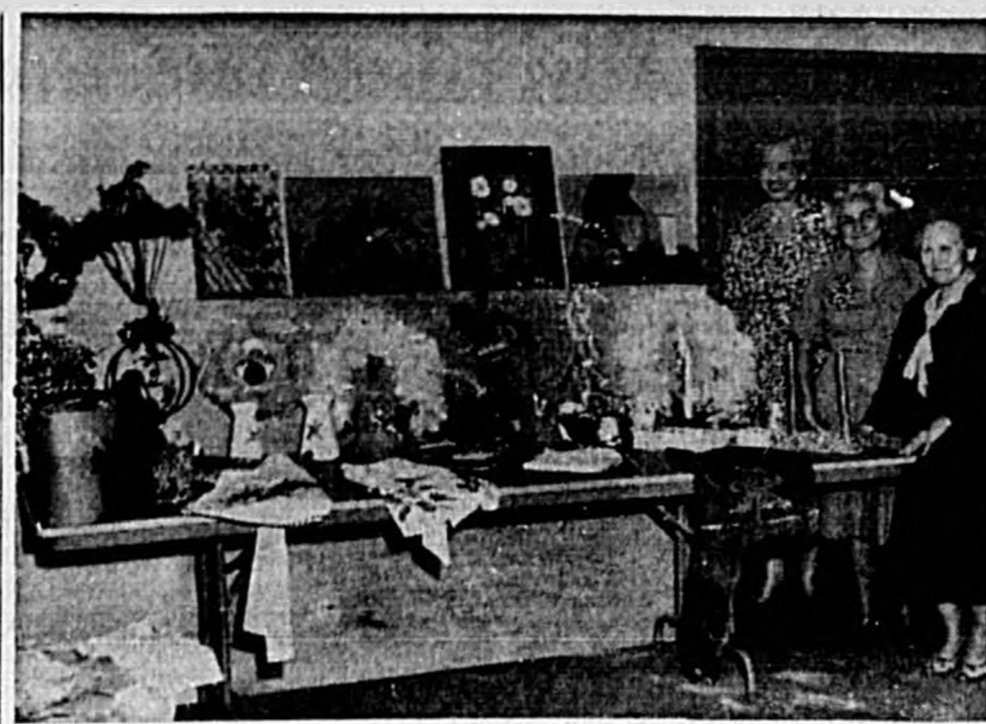

## Wait, See Policy Asked On Bonds

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Sen. Everett S. Saltonstall, (R-Mass.), said today his stand on support of the United Nations will be shaped by the extent to which other member nations bear their share of its cost in coming months.

Saltonstall, who is seeking the GOP policy chairmanship, withheld a final decision on whether to vote for President Kennedy's request for authority to buy up to \$100 million of the \$200 million UN bond issue.

The New Englander was not as blunt as (Sen.) George D. Aiken, (R-Vt.), who called the bond issue "purely a holdup intended to make the United States pick up the tab" for other countries.

Saltonstall, who is the ranking Republican on the Senate Armed Services Committee as well as GOP conference chairman, said in an interview he wants to "see the United Nations succeed if it is possible to do so." But he added:

"It can only succeed if all nations do as we do—carry their share of the load. I shall look at it in that spirit. A lot will depend on what happens in the next five months."

Saltonstall conceded what many other members have indicated—that the administration faces a donnybrook debate on the whole issue of future UN support when Congress reconvenes Wednesday. The real floor debate may be withheld until after the President delivers his State of the Union Message Thursday.

## Holland Mourns Death Of 87

HARMELEN, Holland (UPI)—Flags flew at half-staff throughout Holland today in tribute to the 87 victims of the country's worst rail disaster in history.

All Holland was in mourning as grief-stricken relatives went about the sad task of identifying the remaining 18 bodies and making arrangements for the burial of 69 other victims.

Officials said 55 other persons were injured Monday when an 11-coach express from Leeuwarden-to-Rotterdam roared past a red danger sign hidden in the mist and slammed into the side of a 6-coach Rotterdam-to-Amsterdam express at an 80-mile-an-hour clip.

Both engineers were killed and it is possible the exact reasons for the crash never will be known. A government investigation will open Friday.

Officials trying to piece together the cause of the disaster said the express train from Leeuwarden was seven minutes behind schedule when it approached a short span of single tracks over the Rotterdam-Amsterdam train was to run.

## LA Golf Meet: Just No Contest

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—The crowds came to watch Arnold Palmer, Gary Player and national amateur champion Nicklaus.

But they stayed to cheer brash young Phil Rodgers, a 23-year-old pro who has been on the tour exactly six months.

It was Rodgers who methodically mowed down the big names in the \$45,000 Los Angeles Open golf tournament—slaughtered them, in fact, to such an extent it was no contest.

The young Rodgers, just out of the Marines, headed for his home town of San Diego today with the \$7,500 first prize check in his pocket—and all the world much brighter. On his way to conquering the field the stocky, 187-pound, 5-8 Rodgers clipped four strokes off the tournament record by posting a 72-hole score of 268.

NEW YORK (UPI)—This is a story about the birds and the bees. But it's all right for the kids to read on.

These birds and bees did not get along at all. Not with

each other and not even with people, including TV star John Daly.

As a result things were huzzing for a while Monday at the TV studios of Station WPIX where the birds, the bees and the people had assembled for a science education program on "animal communications."

The communications were going along in fine fashion until a black hen named Pandora opened a box of trouble by kicking over a glass-paneled beehive.

Two thousand honey bees zoomed out—live and unharmed—for a TV spectacular of their own.

Pandora clucked with alarm, a pigeon on the show cooed in fright and a bat tried to ignore it all.

The people acted much the same. While technicians fled in alarm, a runner was dispatched to the headquarters office of United Press International three floors away in the Daily News Building here, asking "Does anyone know anything about bees?"

Wayne Russell, a UPI tele-

type operator and former beekeeper, volunteered his assistance, while Stan Weinberg, a high school teacher who was on camera, gamely stuck to the script in the show-must-go-on tradition, his eyes rolling about following the flight of nearby bees.

Russell, insisting the bees were gentle in nature, went to work gathering them up and putting them in a box. He was stung twice. Some studio employees gathered up their courage and used a vacuum cleaner to corral the rest of the bees except for a few stragglers that were bug-bombed.

Daly, who was scheduled to appear on another show at the station, escaped harm along with technicians and cameramen who decided that a hasty retreat was the better part of valor.

Two other casualties besides Russell were reported. Studio announcer Joe Bolton was stung on the left index finger. And Pandora, the unclucking hen, was hurt in pride for laying an egg on her TV debut.

## Unemployment Edges Above Four Million

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The government was expected to report today that unemployment edged above four million in December.

Labor Secretary Arthur J. Goldberg planned to announce last month's job figures at a news conference this afternoon.

Administration officials said they hoped any increase in joblessness would not exceed 100,000—the normal rise for December.

A key economic indicator—the seasonally adjusted rate of unemployment—would fall if the jobless rise was smaller than usual. The rate stood at 6.1 per cent in November after a significant drop of .5

from the October reading.

The shortage of jobs has been a persistent problem during President Kennedy's first year in office. He entered the White House with unemployment estimated at 5,385,000 in mid-January. The peak was hit a postwar high — 5.7 million — before gradually declining to 3.9 million in October.

But the unemployment rate stuck close to 7 per cent of the labor force and dimmed Kennedy's hopes for a decline to 4 per cent by the end of 1962.

There were 64.4 million Americans at work when Kennedy took the oath of office a year ago. That number climbed to an all-time peak of 63.7 million in mid-summer but dipped to 61,349,000 in November.

Virtually no change was expected in the over-all total in December although the number of higher-paid, non-farm workers usually climbs by 400,000 because of pre-Christmas activity.

## Search Atlantic For AF Tanker

NEW YORK (UPI)—An air-sea search spanned the Atlantic today from the Virginia coast to the Azores for an Air Force K150 tanker missing since Monday with nine men aboard.

Sixteen planes and five ships continued the search through the night, hoping to spot a flare from any survivors.

## He Went Fishing Last April

### 'Dead' Floridian In Hospital

NEW YORK (UPI) — A Florida shrimp fisherman presumed drowned since last April rested in a Brooklyn hospital today but did not explain why he let his wife and four children believe he was dead.

The Missing Persons Bureau identified the fisherman as John Petrakis, 56, of Fort Myers, last seen April 10 when he slipped off his boat into the waters of the Gulf.

Petrakis' wife, Joan, and the couple's four daughters, thought Petrakis had drowned. What they didn't know was

he had been picked up by a passing pleasure boat and taken ashore shortly after his dunking.

Once on land Petrakis headed North instead of returning home. He remained "dead" as far as his family was concerned until Dec. 24 when he entered Long Island College Hospital for treatment of an ulcer.

Hospital authorities had no reason to believe Petrakis was a missing person, but contacted the Missing Persons Bureau as a routine measure when the fisherman listed an out-of-state address (961 San Carlos Dr., Fort Myers).

The Bureau learned of Petrakis' unexplained disappearance after contacting Florida authorities.

Mrs. Petrakis now is living in St. Augustine with her parents while her husband remains at the hospital here in "satisfactory" condition from his ulcer.

City Manager W. E. Knowles reported that starting at 7 a.m. the area will be roped off and no parking will be allowed while the street is being resurfaced.

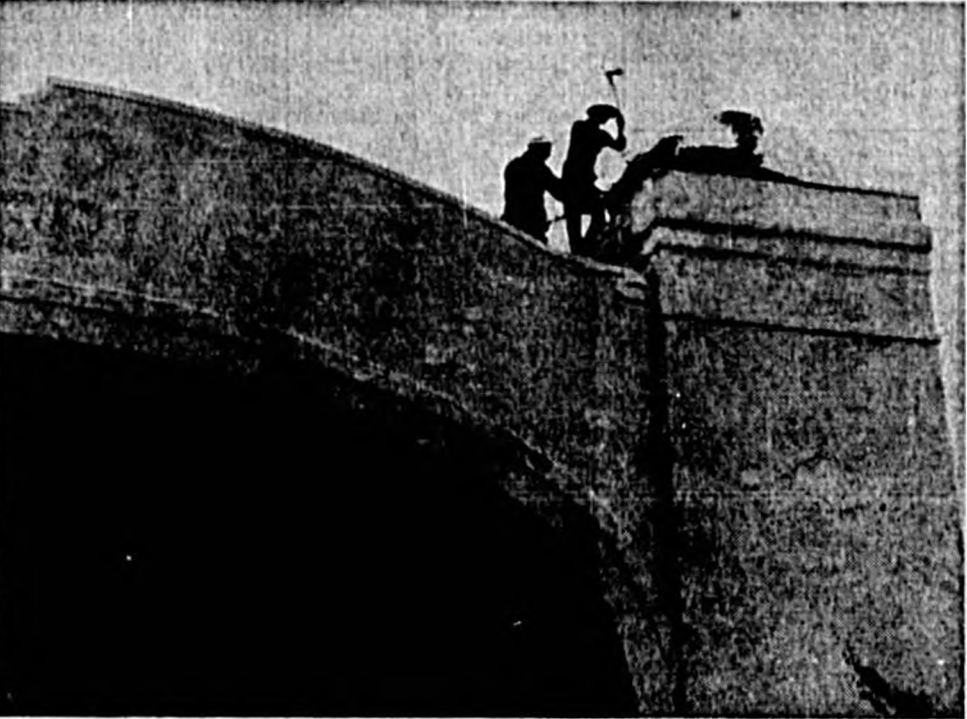
Knowles hopes the project will be completed by noon.

## Congress Opens 87th Session

WASHINGTON (UPI) The 87th Congress reconvened on snow-covered Capitol Hill today to confront President Kennedy with his sternest legislative task yet—getting his program enacted in a politically charged election year.

On the harmonious note of renewed friendship, the gavels fell at noon in the Senate and House to open the new session. But hot political warfare was ahead.

With a new and untested Democratic leadership in the House, Kennedy has given top priority to proposals more controversial than any which squeaked to passage in last year's "honeymoon" session.

For the moment, however, legislative issues were put aside. Senators and representatives mingled on the floor to exchange pleasantries and to discuss the overnight snow storm which left the city white and icy in 17-degree cold.

There were four new faces, and one conspicuous and sad omission in the House. Missing from the speaker's chair was Sam Rayburn, whose death from cancer came after Congress recessed last year. It was first time in two decades that Mr. Sam hadn't gavelled a Democratic-controlled House to order.

A Senate newcomer was Sen. Maurice J. Murphy, (R-N.H.), who was appointed to succeed the late GOP policy leader, Sen. Styles Bridges. On the House side were three new Democrats, Henry B. Gonzalez of Texas, Lucien N. Nedzi of Michigan, and Joe D. Waggoner of Louisiana.

Before the session began, the Republicans completed one item of business by electing Sen. Bourke B. Hickenlooper, (R-Iowa), as chairman of the Senate GOP policy committee. He succeeds Bridges.

Senate Democrats also met beforehand to hear Sen. Mike Mansfield tell them that Ken-

# 'Spitting Machine' Wins Academy Award

NEW YORK (UPI)—The famed New York Academy of Sciences investigated today how it happened to award an honorary fellowship to a Swiss ex-convict whose major "contribution" to medicine seems to be the invention of a "spitting machine."

A spokesman for the academy said officials were baffled on how it singled out Frederic Wichtermann, an accused quack who was notified of his honor by the U. S. ambassador at Bern, Robert McKinney.

"We don't know yet whether it was a clerical error or just what happened," the spokesman said. "But we are investigating."

"We just don't know who nominated Wichtermann and we won't know until we get the committee together again," he said. "It is even possible that he used someone else's name to nominate himself."

After the embassy relayed the award, Swiss newspapers reported that Wichter-

mann's current institute was built around a "spitting" machine he calls the "Detector D.B." Wichtermann orders patients to spit at the machine, officials said, claiming it can diagnose diseases from the saliva. Officials said the machine almost always prescribes the most expensive medicine available.

Wichtermann was sentenced to a year in jail in 1958 for fraud by a court that described him as a psychopath.

The Swiss federal health office and court records said that Wichtermann had been practicing as a quack in the town of Hirsau since his release from jail in 1959. The office said Wichter-

## Pensacola Hit By Sleet, Low Of 19 Degrees

The Weather Bureau predicted light snow for Central Florida tonight as snow and sleet pelted Pensacola early today and the temperatures plunged to 19 degrees as a mass of arctic air bore down on Florida.

The Bureau issued a mid-morning forecast for low temperatures tonight of 15 to 20 from the Suwannee and north portion of the Gainesville districts.

Below freezing temperatures tonight ET A N N tures were forecast for most of Central Florida tonight and the future outlook was for hard freeze in Northern Florida and freezing temperatures again Friday morning, possibly as far south as the Everglades.

Citrus growers were warned of possible snow in some sections of the citrus belt tonight. The Weather Bureau forecast freezing temperatures, occasional rain and some snow in the Northern sections of the belt, extending down into portions of Central Florida.

Light snow flurries were reported at Pensacola and Milton, with heavy sleet at Cantonment north of Pensacola, and freezing rain and sleet elsewhere in the Florida Panhandle.

The 19 degree reading was the lowest temperature recorded in Pensacola since February, 1951, when the all-time record of 13 degrees was registered.

The leading edge of the cold air mass moved into the Northwestern section of the state Tuesday night and the temperature dropped steadily to the low of 19. At 1 p. m. the temperature at Pensacola was 35.

All bridges in the Pensacola area reported iced over, but the roads were generally clear. A hazardous driving warning was broadcast for all of Northwestern Florida.

Accompanying the freezing temperatures and snow in Pensacola Tuesday night were winds with gusts up to 48 miles per hour.

The Weather Bureau said the cold air mass will continue its southward movement throughout today and will reach Southern Florida tonight and early Thursday morning.

Skies were cloudy over most of the state this morning and heavy shower activity was reported in the Gulf with a few waterspouts observed at Key West.

Escambia County Sheriff William Davis urged Pensacola residents to stay off the highway if possible and to use extreme caution if forced to drive.

Small agricultural damage was expected in the Panhandle area, since most crops have been harvested.

## Kin Of The Great Jay Gould Wounds Hubby In 'Quarrel'

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Detectives tried to sort out conflicting stories today about how financier Jay Gould's great-granddaughter shot her fourth husband in the stomach, seriously wounding him.

They had to figure out why socially prominent Silvia Gould Porter shot her husband, Robert, and whether she did it in the kitchen after letting the dog out or whether she crept up on him as he sat drinking ginger beer in the aquarium room.

Mrs. Porter, 45, said she shot her 47-year-old husband because "I got tired of his beating me." She told police that a couple of hours before the shooting Tuesday morning, he hit her and kicked her out of bed in their three-story home.

But Porter, vice president of an export firm, said he only "got a little angry" when his wife fell over a table and damaged it. So, he said, he went down to the first floor to sleep on the couch.

He said he awoke later, got a bottle of ginger beer and sat down in his overstuffed chair in the aquarium room. He said his wife approached him with a 38-caliber police special in her hand, announced "You are not going to bother me any more," and shot him.

Porter said he was surprised. He said he managed to pick up a telephone and tell the operator he had been shot.

He was in fair condition. Doctors said the bullet passed through his body.

Mrs. Porter, who inherited part of Gould's fortune, was charged with assault with a dangerous weapon. Looking haggard and dressed in black from head to toe, she posted \$10,000 bond pending preliminary hearing Friday.

She said that after the alleged beating, she took the loaded pistol and went to sleep on the third floor with Luci, 14, a daughter by a previous marriage.

This crusade was born out of bitterness and pain. Both will be redoubled when the doctor's bill arrives.

Well, it was at a New Year's Eve party in the United States. A lovely lady, with a strong aroma of champagne running interference for her, suddenly walked up to this correspondent and said "Let's dance."

The music was a sedate two-step variation of "Tea For Two" and her suggestion seemed both harmless and hospitable.

How was one to know that behind her smiling mask there lurked a swivel-bipped Mata Hari coldly plotting to cripple the male population of the United States, a wily Delilah determined to trim the hair of every Samson in the joint?

We had circled the floor only once to "Tea For Two" when the music stopped. When it resumed, it sounded as though all the department store shelves had collapsed in the pots and pans department. Sweet melody fled from our midst, violins succumbed to the drums. All the dancers seemed to have been overtaken simultaneously by epileptic seizures.

"Hey, hey, it's the twist," shouted Mata Hari. "Get with it."

Before you can get with it you have to ascertain what it is you are supposed to get with, so this correspondent took two discreet steps backward to observe and learn from Mata Hari. It was a fearsome sight. Her eyes were half closed and her feet seemed rooted to the floor. Her arms were aloft, hands waving. There was a slight movement of the knees but this was entirely subordinate to the violent agitation of the hips. She was moving them in a fast, flat arc that seemed to impose an intolerable work load on tendons and ligaments.

"Get with it," she commanded, and your correspondent, like the Light Brigade, went gallantly into the valley of death.

There was a sharp stab of pain in the right knee. Then the lower spinal column flashed an urgent SOS to the brain to cease and desist. Your correspondent slunk to the sidelines.

### Old, New Problems Facing 87th Congress

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The 87th Congress began its 1962 session today faced with an election-year list of new and old problems, most of them tough.

Anxious for a shorter than usual session so they can return home to campaign, House and Senate members hope to dispose of their legislative business by mid-summer.

The major issues:

Trade — Protectionists are predicting that the President will get little, if any, of the broad authority he wants to cut American tariff duties in exchange for similar concessions from Western Europe. Outlook uncertain.

Medical Care — Democratic leaders fear they may be unable to enact even a skeletonized version of Kennedy's plan to provide hospitalization and nursing home care for the elderly under Social Security. Prospects doubtful.

Education — Federal aid to colleges for classroom construction and students scholarships is likely. Aid for public elementary and high schools seems dead. But Congress will subsidize education.

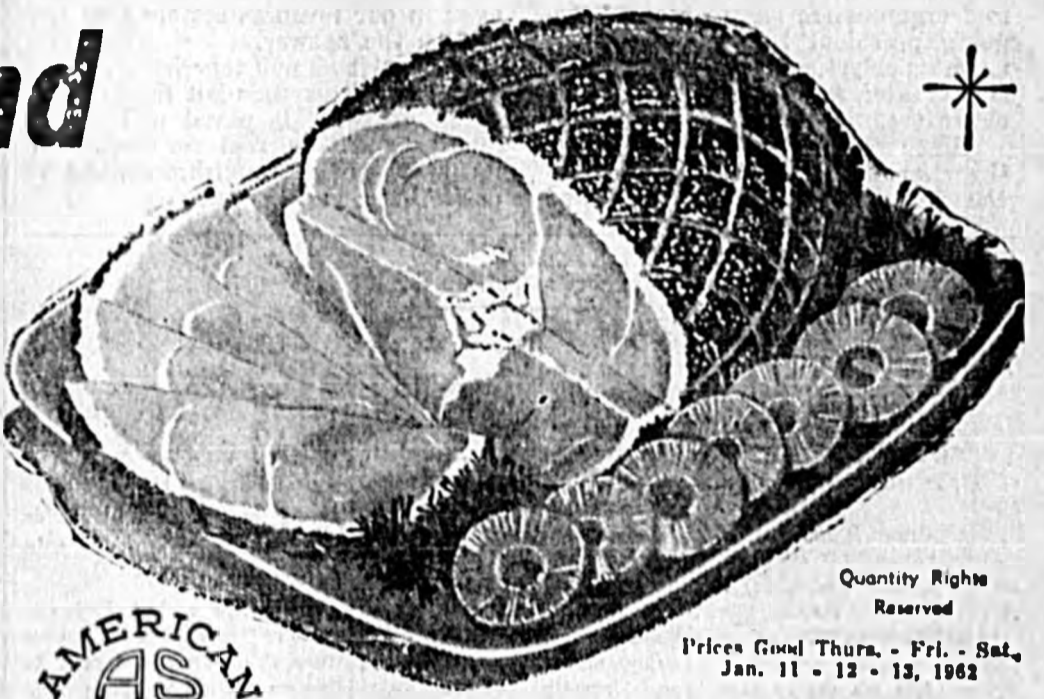

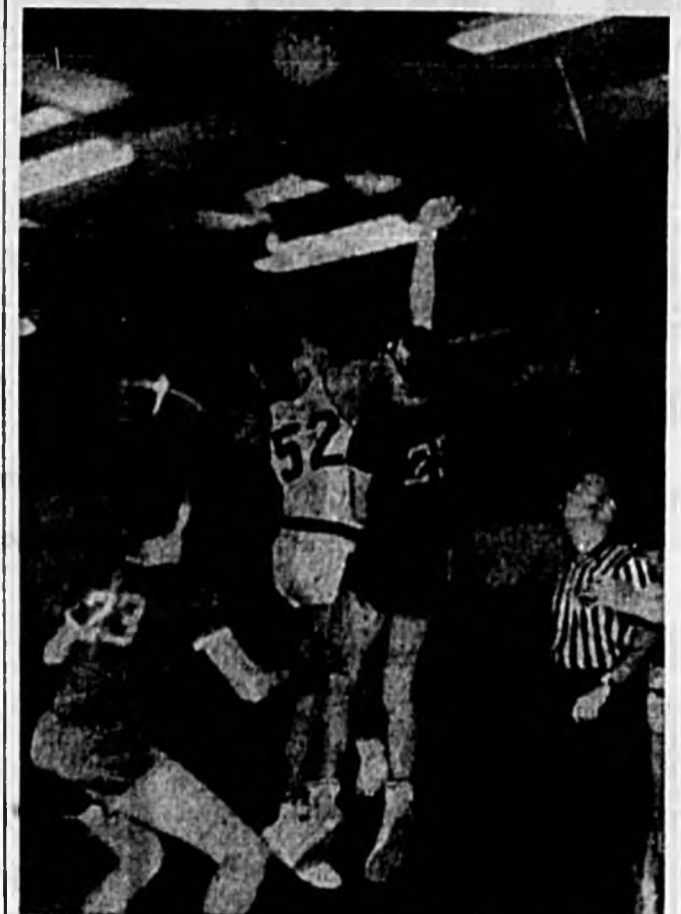

## Roundup Continues In Cage 'Fix' Scandal Involving 10

RALEIGH, N. C. (UPI)—Agents for the North Carolina State Bureau of Investigation today continued their roundup of 10 men accused of offering bribes to Atlantic Coast Conference players to "fix" basketball games.

The agents fanned out over the nation Tuesday to arrest implicated gamblers after the Wake County grand jury returned 10 indictments numbering more than 80 bribery counts. Two men were arrested in St. Louis and another pair in Pittsburgh, District Solicitor Lester V. Chalmers said.

Among the games cited in the indictments were the 1959 Dixie Classic between North Carolina State and Dayton and an ACC tournament game between N.C. State and South Carolina the same year.

It was the first time since the current investigations were launched last March 17 that tournament basketball was fingered.

Indicted were Pete J. Martino, Biloxi, Miss.; Dave Louis Goldberg and Steve Lekomotrose, both of St. Louis; Morris (Mac) Hayleson and Frank Cardone, of Pittsburgh; and Joe Israel, Paul Walker, Joseph Hacken, Aaron Wagman and Joe Green, all of New York.

There were no former or present college basketball players named in the indictments, Chalmers said.

The indictments said Wagman, Green, Lekomotrose, Hacken and Goldberg offered \$1,000 to Don Gallagher, a former N. C. State star, to shave points in the 1959 Dixie Classic game with Dayton. Dayton topped the Wolfpack, 36-32.

A University of South Carolina player, Mike Cailaban, was listed as having been approached and offered \$1,000 to shave points in the March 5, 1959, game against N.C. State in the ACC tournament. North Carolina State won, 75-72.

The latest break in the bribe probe started last week when Paul Walker, a 30-year-old New York trucking company official, was arrested in New York. After being returned to North Carolina, Walker was placed in Wake County jail in lieu of a \$25,000 bond.

## 2 Schools Seek NCAAC Relief

CHICAGO (UPI)—Athletic directors from Arizona and Indiana will appear before the National Collegiate Athletic Association's council today to seek relief from penalties imposed upon them earlier for violation of rules on recruiting of athletes.

The council Tuesday lifted probation penalties, each involving loss of the right of entry into national championship tournaments, of both Loyola University of New Orleans and the University of North Carolina.

But no action was taken on the probation, without a ban on tournament activities, imposed on Arizona at the same time that Loyola and North Carolina were sidelined, or on the previous written appeal from Indiana, clipped almost two years ago with a four-year probation which also ruled the Hoosiers out of national championship competition as well as television appearances.

The rules committee of the American Football Coaches Association reported it would make six recommendations to the NCAA football rules committee, the group which actually determines the rules of the game.

## Liston Removing Bout Obstacle

HARRISBURG, Pa. (UPI)—Sonny Liston will remove the last big obstacle to his \$10 million title fight with champion Floyd Patterson by announcing early next week the name of a new manager, it was learned here authoritatively today.

This manager, not yet identified publicly, will receive the all important approval of Cus D'Amato, Patterson's pilot. D'Amato has persistently refused to negotiate until Liston "removed certain obstacles."

George Katz, reputable Philadelphia business and boxing man, has been the big Philadelphia challenge manager since last spring, when Sonny apparently severed any underworld connections. But D'Amato never negotiated with Katz.

Moreover, there has been some friction between Liston and Katz. Liston apparently feels that Katz never gave

him enough personal attention. Because of Katz's reluctance to travel, he was not with Sonny when he was rehabilitating himself at Denver, Colo., after two Philadelphia arrests for disorderly conduct.

Due to that friction, Liston recently made attorney Morton Witkin of Philadelphia his representative in any possible fight negotiations and in some other business matters.

Katz has the title of "manager" but he has not been receiving a manager's 33½ per cent of Liston's earnings. He has been getting an agent's 10 per cent.

Tuesday night at Philadelphia, Katz said, "I don't know what new arrangements Sonny is making, but I'll remain his manager — or at least co-manager — and I'll tell him what to do. He can afford to take on someone to acquire him around and handle his public relations, since

he's getting 90 per cent of his purses. But I'll still tell him what to do."

However, an authoritative Harrisburg source said today the new manager and Sonny would buy Katz out.

At Pittsburgh Tuesday night, Paul Sullivan, chairman of the National Boxing Association's World Championship Committee, said, "I hope Patterson and Liston come to terms soon because they'll be running out of time."

## Foss Gets Vote Of Confidence

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (UPI)—The owners of the American Football League gave Commissioner Joe Foss a vote of confidence early this morning in the form of a new five-year contract with a \$5,000-a-year increase in salary.

The contract, retroactive to Jan. 2, will boost his annual salary to an estimated \$55,000.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Kennedy's membership application has been withdrawn from a Washington club that is so exclusive it once supposedly demanded to know the admittance qualifications of President Woodrow Wilson.

The action on Kennedy's application was taken 24 hours after the Cosmos Club, a private organization of the intellectual and social elite in Washington, had rejected a bid for a Negro-Deputy Assistant Secretary of State Carl T. Rowan.

Kennedy's name had been co-proposed by J. Kenneth Galbraith, U. S. ambassador to India, who is now home on leave. When Galbraith learned that Rowan's application had been rejected by the club's membership board, he announced his intention to resign.

A few hours later it was disclosed that Kennedy's name had been taken off the lists. It was not known whether this was because it was automatically cancelled by Galbraith's resignation, or because the ambassador acted to withdraw it.

White House Press Secretary Pierre Salinger said he had not had an opportunity to discuss the matter with the President.

Edward R. Murrow, director of the U. S. Information Agency, also withdrew his application for membership in the club.

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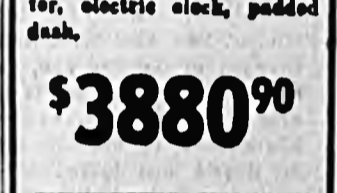

Sinatra and the willow Miss Prowse met in 1959 during the filming of "Can Can" in which the singer costarred with Shirley MacLaine. Juliet had a supporting role.

Shortly after the picture was completed Sinatra and the dancer became steady dates. Last year the 44-year-old singer and Miss Prowse, 25, broke up. When the romance cooled Sinatra dated Marilyn Monroe and actress Dorothy Provine.

It was only in the past month that Sinatra and Juliet made up their differences. After announcing they were engaged the singer said he would let his fiancée name the wedding day.

The marriage will be his third. His first wife was Nancy Barbato, whom he married in 1939 when he was a \$15-a-week singing waiter. They have three children, Nancy (who married Tommy Sands last year), Christina and Frank Jr.

In 1951, eight days after his divorce from Nancy, the singer married glamor girl Ave Gardner. It was a stormy union which ended in a 1957 divorce.

Miss Prowse was among the dancers on the set of "Can Can" who drew criticism from Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev during his September, 1959, visit here. While engaged in the can can, the chorus threw their skirts up over their derrieres, causing Khrushchev to observe that in Russia one looked at a girl's face instead of the back of her lap.

### Several Train Wrecks Reported

Several wrecks and derailments hit the nation's railroads Tuesday killing at least two persons and injuring several more.

Aurelia, Iowa, had the worst of the accidents, in which one person died and two were injured seriously. At Agnew, Ill., a train crewman was killed when a fast freight plowed into a local freight.

Other accidents were reported at Bellwood, Ill., Delaware, Ohio, and Sylva, N. C. Trainmen theorized a broken rail or ice on a wheel flange may have caused a speeding Illinois Central passenger train to plunge off the tracks into a farm field near Aurelia, Iowa. Expressman John Nelson of Sioux City, Iowa, was killed. Two other crewmen were seriously hurt and eight other persons, including five passengers, were less seriously injured.

At Agnew, Ill., a Chicago and Northwestern Railway 2-car fast freight slammed into a local freight train halted at a grain elevator, killing Merle F. Flynn, Clinton, Iowa, the conductor of the local. His chest was pierced by a metal splinter as he sat in the caboose.

At Sylva in North Carolina's mountains, railroad employes speculated that icy tracks may have been responsible for derailment of 18 cars of a Southern Railway freight train. There were no injuries.

At Delaware, Ohio, two wheels fell off the third car from the end of a 60-car Chesapeake and Ohio freight train. There was no derailment but the car dropped to the rails, tearing up the ties. There were no injuries.

In Bellwood, Ill., trainmen blamed a frozen switch for the derailment of an Indiana Harbor Beltline locomotive, which jumped the track and crushed several cars of a freight train standing on a parallel track. There were no injuries.

# Flu Outbreak Feared; May Close Schools

## County Without Health Director

Seminole County, without the services of a full-time health director, was faced today with a serious flu or virus outbreak which had caused concern to doctors and school officials.

Sanitarian Val Robbins told the Herald that part-time health director W. N. Sisk was in town Tuesday and won't be back until Friday afternoon.

"If it gets any worse," Robbins said, "Dr. Sisk may be forced to conduct an investigation." Robbins also said that he checked with local doctors and they are "concerned with the problem."

The county has been without a full-time health director since the county commissioner fired Dr. Clyde D. Brothers more than two months ago.

Dr. Sisk had been utilized for part-time services. He is currently with the Orange County Medical Staff.

Supt. of Schools R. T. Milwee said today that although the flu outbreak has not reached epidemic proportions, "it is serious."

The flu virus which has hit Seminole County, causing heavy absenteeism at school and work is identified by US Health Dept. as Type B virus.

The disease here has all the earmarks of the Type B virus, local doctors report. It is characterized by dizziness, fainting, vomiting, diarrhea, ear ache, headache, sore and aching muscles, sore throats and fever.

"If you get the flu, stay home. Do not go back to school or work until all symptoms have been gone for at least two days," emphasized a local physician.

Doctors say that it is likely to affect all the organs of the body—ears, throat, muscles, respiration, lungs, nerves, kidneys and intestines.

Complete bed rest is advised by local doctors, with the use of aspirin to relieve the aching, and forcing of fluids, water and particularly citrus fruit juices.

Severity and duration of the disease doctors say is related to the general physical condition, stress and strain, and the care taken of the sick person.

Doctors advise that if earache, sore throat, pain in the chest or other pain localized in the organs is present, a physician should be consulted.

One local physician warned that high, dry heat in homes contributes to the discomfort of the patient, and advises the use of vaporizers, wet towels or other steam producing equipment to add moisture to the dry, heated air which tends to irritate the throat, nose, eyes, chest and respiratory tract.

## Kennedy Asks Income Tax And Tariff Cuts

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Kennedy asked Congress today for an array of new economic tools, including discretionary power to cut tariffs and reduce personal income taxes, to strengthen the free world against the Communist offensive.

In his State of the Union Message to the newly convened lawmakers, Kennedy said a cold war armistice "seems very far away."

He noted particularly the critical problems posed by Berlin, Laos and Viet Nam.

He cited with obvious pride, however, U.S. military progress during his first year in the White House and said his new defense budget provides for more missiles, ten and substantial increases in Air Force fighter units.

This country, he said, has "rejected any all-or-nothing posture which would leave no choice but inglorious retreat or unlimited retaliation."

Kennedy's wide-ranging economic, defense and foreign policy proposals were keyed to the theory that prosperity must be maintained at home to counter successfully the constant threat of military, political and economic aggression by the Communists.

The President sought an extensive domestic legislative package, some parts of which were sure to provoke controversy in this election year.

To slow any future recession, he asked for standby authority, subject to congressional veto, to cut personal income tax rates within a specified range. While he did not go into details, it was learned he wanted power to cut the basic tax rate from 20 to 15 per cent.

The President renewed his request for health insurance for the aged financed through the Social Security system—a plan opposed by the American Medical Association and many conservative members of Congress.

He also requested federal financing of mass immunization against disease and a new concept of public welfare to shift federal emphasis from direct relief to rehabilitation.

Kennedy renewed in strong terms his request for federal aid to education for public school construction, teacher salaries, loans for new college buildings, federally financed college scholarships and a new nationwide attack on adult illiteracy.

He seemed assured of getting a college aid program but the public school plan apparently was dead, killed by last year's controversy over extending it to parochial or private schools.

Top item on Kennedy's foreign agenda was trade. He proposed a new five-year plan to replace the expiring Reciprocity Trade Act. It would gradually eliminate certain tariffs in return for similar concessions by the European Common Market.

Tariffs in other areas would be reduced by as much as 50 per cent.

"The Communist economic offensive is underway," he said in urging his liberalized trade program. "The opportunity is ours—and the time is now."

As for the military outlook, Kennedy said the United States would have to remain strong "so long as fanaticism and fear brood over the affairs of men."

He said his defense blueprint called for 300 additional Polaris and Minuteman missiles, two new Army divisions replacing National Guard units now on duty, plus "substantial other in-

creases" to boost Air Force fighter units, procurement of equipment and the continental defense and warning systems.

The Chief Executive's outlook on chances of war varied by geographic areas.

On Berlin, he said "we are prepared to talk, when appropriate, and to fight, if necessary."

Kennedy felt that while workable independence had not been achieved in Laos, efforts in that direction thus far had prevented Communist occupation.

As for continued Communist pressures in Viet Nam, he said, "it is a war of attempted subjugation and it will be resisted."

## Weather Raises Absentee Rates

Seminole County Schools may be forced to close in the next few days unless excessive absenteeism due to cold weather and sickness stops, Supt. of Schools R. T. Milwee said today.

Milwee said that the county is losing thousands and thousands of dollars per week because of the excessive absenteeism and that "if the situation worsens we will consult health officials about the possibility of closing the schools."

Milwee said that absenteeism in the schools has been more than 12 percent in the past 10 days.

Normally it runs about five percent, he added.

The county school system gets money from the state based on the average daily attendance and for every 180 pupils absent loses almost \$200 per day.

A poll of schools around the county by the Herald finds the flu virus has hit the county and hit it hard.

School principals report absenteeism is running from 10 to 40 percent of enrollment, with as many as 10 to 15 children a day in some schools having to be sent home, with attacks of vomiting, headache, fainting, dizziness and other symptoms.

Seminole High School has been hard hit, with more than 200 students out every day this week, as well as several teachers. Sanford Junior High also has had as high as 20 percent of the enrollment out, according to Principal Hugh Carlton.

At Pinecrest School, Mrs. Margaret Reynolds, principal, reports that five full classrooms or 145 children are absent today, and she is busy taking more home. Besides the flu virus, children in Pinecrest have also been hit with chickenpox and measles.

At Southside School, there are 100 children out today. Enrollment there is 600, and absenteeism has increased steadily all week, Mrs. Velma Mitchell, principal says.

At the Westside Grammar School, Principal Freeman S. Ggett says absenteeism jumped from 89 yesterday to 115 today, and more going home from school, as upset stomachs, headaches and dizziness assail pupils.

At Lake Mary, Lake Monroe, Wilson, Hopper Academy, Crooms and Altamonte Springs Elementary the outbreak has been mild so far, with about five to 10 percent of the children out, which is not too high above the average daily attendance.

But the Jackson Heights Negro school in Oviedo today reported 160 pupils absent out of an enrollment of 400, or about 40 percent of the entire school out. This was a jump of 71 over yesterday's 95 out.

Longwood School principal John Angel also reported that his absenteeism is on the increase with the sick pupils up to about 15 percent and a steady stream of sick youngsters coming into the office to be taken home.

Oviedo school's score is also increasing daily with 92 yesterday and 115 today, putting them at about 20 percent absent.

School principals said that adjustments have had to be made on classwork and homework to try to ease the burden on make-up work. Seminole High has this week been taking the SCAT, Scholastic-College Aptitude Tests.

## Fear 3000 Buried In Peru Landslide

HUARAZ, Peru (UPI)—A gigantic avalanche cascaded down the rain-soaked slopes of towering Mt. Huascaran late Wednesday, devastating half a dozen mountainside villages and possibly burying more than 3,000 persons.

Police and army officials who reached the scene said they feared all those caught in the slide had perished.

Col. Humberto Ampuero, chief of emergency services, said the villages were buried under a mountain of mud, ice and rocks, interlaced with uprooted trees. The mass was 40 feet high and half a mile wide.

"It's like a scene from Dante's Inferno," Ampuero said.

Darkness and heavy rain made rescue efforts impossible during the night, but relief planes stood by in Lima. The army was sending in an engineer battalion.

The villages had a total population of about 3,100 persons, almost all of whom are

believed to have been buried. Dr. Leoncio Guzman, a physician who practices here but lived in Ranrahirca, was on his way home from the hospital when he saw a great mass of earth and ice hurtling down the mountain.

He raced his car at full speed in a desperate effort to beat the avalanche to his family, but he didn't make it.

"I was barely a mile away, but I was too late," he said. "Everyone was dead..."

## Weather Ruins Vegetable Crop

Death-dealing, crop-devastating cold stretched from the Arctic Circle to Mexico today. It led beaches along the Gulf Coast and brought below-freezing temperatures to 44 states.

The cold wave, one of the most severe in 60 years, dropped thermometers below zero as far south as Louisiana.

The death toll from the week-long weather onslaught reached at least 114.

The Southland's spring vegetable crop was all but ruined.

Farmers feared for citrus groves in Texas' Rio Grande Valley, where the temperature failed to climb above freezing for more than 24 hours.

Schools remained closed in 11 states.

## Kennedy Facing Casiro Decision

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Kennedy must decide soon whether the United States should try for sanctions against Fidel Castro's Communist regime at the Jan. 22 American foreign ministers' conference.

Kennedy and Secretary of State Dean Rusk have held the first of a projected series of conferences on the subject.

But just 12 days from the opening of the conference at Punta del Este, Uruguay, it appears that the United States has not decided whether it should risk its prestige in backing an unpopular call for sanctions, or accept a lesser measure that would draw wider support.
