RASTIC REALTY TAX BILL BEFORE FLORIDA SOLONS

Senator Cee's Measure Would Require Paying By April 1, Or Making Lands Liable To Sale Immediately

TALLAHASSEE, Apr. 18.—The bill introduced by Senator Cee of Escambia, and now pending before the Legislature, to provide for valuation and foreclosure of liens for taxes upon real estate, would require the payment of taxes upon real estate before the first day of April of each year. Unless the taxes were so paid, the collector would be authorized to make out a statement of real estate on which they had been paid and deliver it to the state's attorney who would be required to file with all reasonable dispatch his bill in equity in the circuit court against owners of the property.

Secretary Pearman Obtains Time For Recheck Of Census

Secretary of Agriculture Mayo has agreed to hold up the publication of the census figures for Sanford until a recheck has been made according to R. W. Pearman, Jr., secretary of the Sanford Chamber of Commerce, who returned from Tallahassee today.

Mr. Pearman went to the capital to confer with Secretary Mayo on the instructions of the Chamber of Commerce, which at a recent meeting went on record as holding the figures submitted for Sanford were incorrect. It was the opinion of the members that Sanford has a population of 10,000 and that a correct count would show at least 3,000 more than the population given by the state census takers.

STAYS OPERATION

TALLAHASSEE, Apr. 18.—Governor Martin has granted a reprieve and stay of operation of a sentence for 30 days to Mallory Williams, of Jackson county, who was convicted December 31, last, or reckless driving of an automobile on the public highways of that county. The county judge sentenced him to pay a fine of \$50 and costs and to serve sixty days in county jail.

LEGISLATURE IS CONSIDERING NEW CITRUS MEASURE

Measure Would Require Certificates For All Shipments Between Aug. 31 and Nov. 26 Of Any Year Shown

TALLAHASSEE, Apr. 18.—Eighty per cent of fruit growing and shipping interests of the state have agreed on the citrus fruit bill which was up for consideration before the joint committee of the Senate and House. The measure, said Senator Etheridge, will give the greatest relief possible to the state's fruit growers, in that it will probably cure most of the marketing ills from which this, the state's biggest money producing crop, has heretofore suffered.

Under provisions of the bill it would be unlawful for any person to sell or offer for sale, transport, receive, or deliver for transportation or market any citrus fruit between August 31 and November 26 of any year, except such fruit as may be accompanied by a certificate showing that the fruit meets all requirements of law.

Provisions of the bill also make it unlawful during the remaining period from November 26 to August 31, when no inspections are made by citrus fruit inspectors, to sell, offer for sale or transport fruit which under the pure food laws is immature or unfit for consumption. Neither would it be

legal for any one to receive such fruit for sale or shipment. Nothing in the act applies to sales of fruit on trees, nor to common carriers or their agents when transported is accompanied by proper certificate, but penalties would be prescribed for carriers handling fruit not so certificated. A tax levy of one and one-half cents for each two cubic feet, or each 8 pounds of fruit shipped from August 31 to November 26, is provided vesting power with the governor to exact a smaller fee if in his judgment such action is deemed advisable.

First Picture Sent Over Telephone

It is the first picture to be handled commercially by the American Telephone & Telegraph Company, which is the first organization in the world to wire photographs on a commercial basis.

REORGANIZATION OF COMPTROLLER OFFICE PLANNED

Creation of New Position Is Called For in Recommendations Made By State Budget Commission at Capital

TALLAHASSEE, Apr. 18.—Complete reorganization of the State Live Stock Sanitary Board is proposed in the bill introduced in the house by Representative Davis of Leon county. Instead of having five members on the board as at present, one from each congressional district and one from the state at large, it would be composed of only three members appointed by the governor with the consent of the senate. The first would serve for three years, the second for two and the third for one year, each to receive \$500 a year and necessary traveling expenses.

Provision is made in the measure for creation of the office of state veterinarian, appointed by the governor, for a term of four years. To be eligible for appointment to this position a veterinarian would be required to have lived in the state for not less than five years. The salary is fixed at \$1,000 a year as at present.

SARASOTA, Apr. 18.—The annual meeting of the passenger traffic department of the Atlantic Coast Line will be held in this city on Wednesday, May 13, according to the plans for meeting announced by Jack Kirkland of the Tampa office. These plans are to be examined by the home office at Washington, N. C.

Traffic problems will be the chief subject for discussion under the program now outlined. The delegates will gather at Tampa on the day preceding the meeting and will arrive here late that afternoon. The local chamber of commerce will be their host at a banquet.

Wednesday the department will hold its business meeting and the discussion of the traffic problems. The meeting will adjourn late that day.

Y. M. C. A. DRIVE CLOSING
ORLANDO, Apr. 18.—The Orange County drive for a \$9,500 subscription to the Y. M. C. A. building closed its first day of operation Tuesday with a total collection of \$2,250, according to an announcement by H. H. Dickson, general chairman, who made the distribution of reports of the division yesterday.

Mrs. J. N. Whitner, of the Sanford Daughters of the American Revolution, has received a communication from the national headquarters in Washington asking that the local society assist in raising interest among the young men of the community in the Citizens' Training Military Camps this summer.

The letter to the Sanford D. A. R. chapter, in part, says: "Congress recently appropriated sufficient funds to enable more than 35,000 young men between the ages of 17 and 24 to be assembled in these camps this summer. The purpose, as you know, is to bring together representatives of all types from all sections of the country on a common basis of equality to stimulate and promote citizenship, patriotism and Americanism."

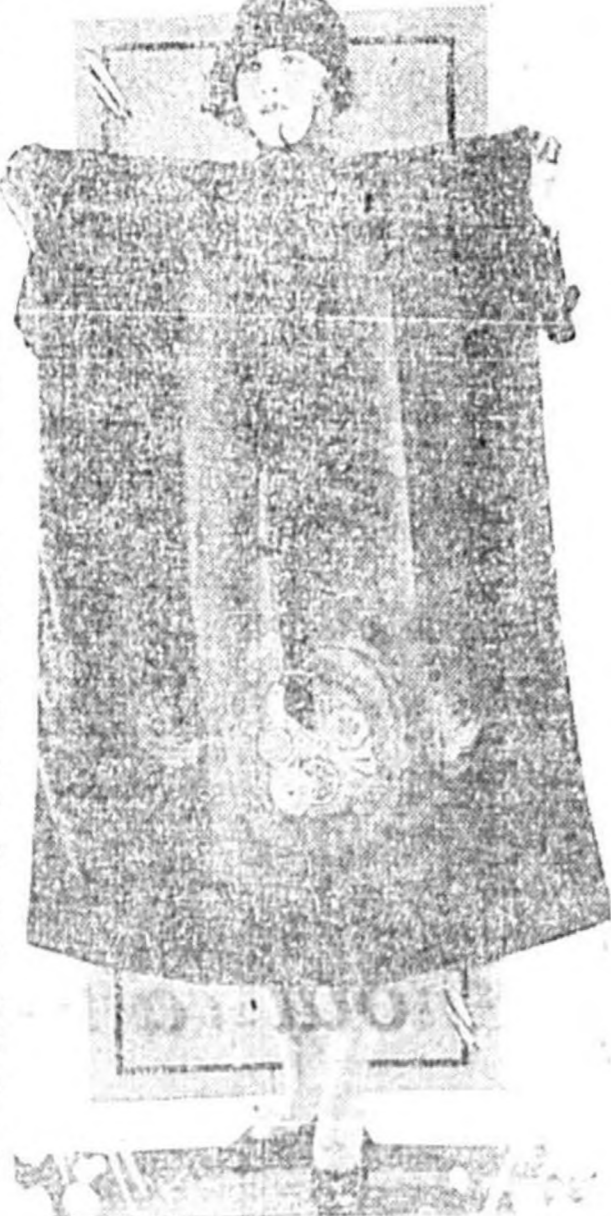
