

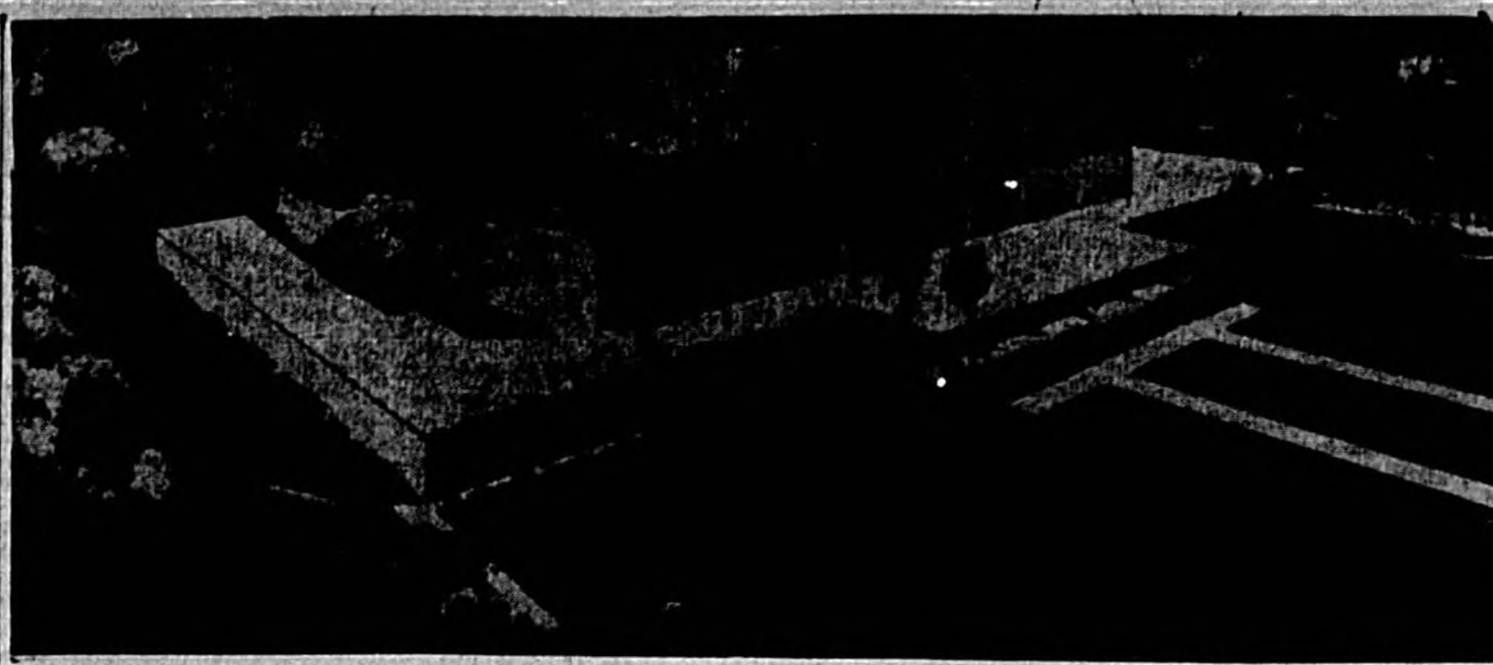
### UAW Plans New Contract Move

DETROIT (UPI)—The United Auto Workers tried Wednesday to get the American Motors as a lever to get new contract concessions from the industry's Big Three companies which already have handed the union package offers they priced at nearly \$700 million.

This was seen as the reason behind a decision by UAW President Walter P. Reuther to ignore new

contract negotiations at General Motors, Ford and Chrysler and concentrate instead on AMC.

The Big Three—with contracts expiring in eight days—presented their first economic offers to the union Tuesday. Industry statisticians pegged the total cost at \$685 million, but the UAW called the proposals "totally inadequate" and all but rejected them outright.

### Spade Cooley Gets Life In Jail

BAKERSFIELD, Calif. (UPI)—Former western music star Donnell (Spade) Cooley, who used to be Roy Rogers' stand-in and arranger, was sentenced to life in prison Tuesday for the fatal beating of his wife.

Superior Judge William L. Bradshaw set the penalty following Cooley's withdrawal of an innocent by reason of insanity plea. Spade also waived the jury hearing on penalty.

Under California law, the 50-year-old Cooley will be eligible for parole in late summer of 1968.

He was convicted Saturday of first-degree murder in the death April 3 of his wife Ella May, 37. The prosecution had charged he beat, stamped and burned her with cigarettes on the night she died at their Willow Springs ranch home.

David Martin swam the freestyle in the relay and the 200 yard breast-stroke. Mike Thompson, fourth member of the team, did the side-stroke and also entered the 50 yard free-style.

The boys also participated in the 200 yard free-style relay. This was the first time in swimming competition for the Casselberry Scouts, who placed fifth in the senior division and received a yellow ribbon.

### FAA Boss Denies He's Quitting

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Federal Aviation Administrator Najeib E. Halaby today found himself exposed to the Washington illness known as "resignation rumors."

It is a disease that is never fatal but can be embarrassing to public officials, particularly those who have no intention of resigning. And Halaby has no such intentions, despite widespread rumors — including one published report in a trade magazine—that he wants to quit.

### Berlin Is Termed Gravest Threat

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Undersecretary of State Chester Bowles said Tuesday the United States has never been "more directly and dangerously challenged" since the end of World War II than it is now in Berlin.

But Bowles warned against letting the Berlin crisis obscure long range U. S. policy goals around the world. He said that could result in success in Berlin but failure elsewhere.

Bowles said in a speech, prepared for the National Press Club there is now "a direct, total confrontation between the two greatest nuclear powers" in the heart of Europe.

"This is a challenge to which only one response is possible — we must adhere to our treaty rights, we must honor our commitments," Bowles said.

"Our word has been pledged to the free people of West Berlin. Unless we stand by that pledge, our word will not again be trusted by threatened peoples anywhere."

Bowles, who returned last week from a 20-day trip through Africa, the Middle East and South Asia, said the people there view Berlin in a different light than Americans.

## U.S. Reinforces Garrison

BERLIN (UPI) — The U. S. Army has reinforced its Berlin garrison with an artillery battery — the first such American unit stationed here since the early days of the occupation — a spokesman said today.

The Army spokesman said the battery of 150 men and six 105mm howitzers arrived from West Germany Sunday as part of the reinforcements ordered into the beleaguered city by President Kennedy.

The battery traveled through East Germany to West Berlin unimpeded over the Helmsdorf-Berlin highway through East German territory with the convoy of the 1st Battle Group of the 18th Infantry Regiment, 1st Infantry Division.



## Soviets Told Blockade Would Mean Aggression

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The United States has told Russia that an attempt to blockade Berlin would be an "aggressive act," and the Russians would be responsible for the consequences.

In one of its toughest statements in recent years, the United States Thursday accused Russia of slander, deception, attempted intimidation, cynicism and irresponsibility.

The White House said charges contained in a recent Soviet note were false. The Russians had charged that West German spies and saboteurs were being flown into West Berlin.

The White House said the United States would send Moscow a formal reply in a matter of days, but issued a statement promptly because "we wanted to make our position known."

The statement said the Soviet charges cannot "be taken seriously. What must be taken seriously by the whole world, however, is the scarcely veiled threat of aggression against the Allied air routes to and from West Berlin."

"The United States must serve solemn warning to the Soviet government," it said, "that any interference by the Soviet regime or its East German partner with free access to West Berlin would be an aggressive act for the consequences of which the Soviet government would bear full responsibility."

## Jaycees Hear Boat Marina Plans

Some of the plans for a marina to be built on the Sanford pier were outlined Thursday at the Jaycees weekly luncheon.

A diagram of a clubhouse and boat service facilities on the pier and floating storage docks was explained by Jack Trim, who will lease the pier from the city.

Plans call for the old bandshell building to be knocked down and a clubhouse built on the site.

The clubhouse will have food and bar facilities, with take-out box lunches available for boaters.

In addition a wing will contain restrooms, shower rooms, and laundry for family cruisers.

Near the docks, a stand will provide supplies for boats and fishing and sports equipment.

The docks will be equipped with electrical power outlets where boaters can hook up for electricity and phones, television and all the comforts of home.

Landscape of the pier and marina will make it look as much like a tropical island as possible.

"A program of water sports events is planned," Trim said, "which will bring in boaters and water sports enthusiasts from all over the state, and we hope other states as well."

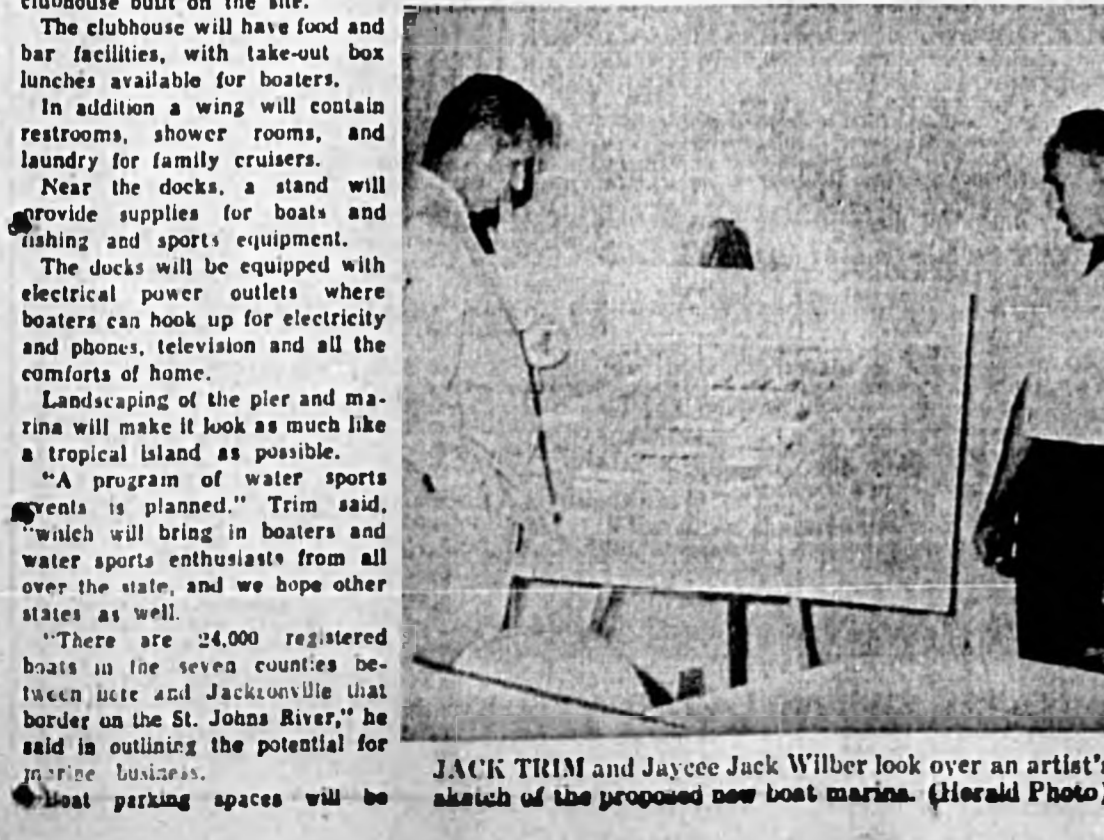
"There are 24,000 registered boats in the seven counties between here and Jacksonville that border on the St. Johns River," he said in outlining the potential for marine business.

"Best parking spaces will be available for boat owners, with additional services for craft of all sizes."

Boating inside the marina area, enclosed by the pier and breakwater will be carefully supervised and safety precautions enforced.

The present boat launching ramp at the foot of Palmtoe Ave. will remain a free ramp, although improvements are planned to make it easier to get boats into the water.

Trim was introduced to the group by program chairman Jack Wilber. In other business, the Jaycees were reminded of the Fishing Rodeo to be held at Fort Mellon Park, Wednesday, beginning at 2 p. m. for all children between the ages of 1 and 14.

## Baby Mixup At Seminole Hospital

(Ed. Note: The Herald has no intention of using the names of the persons involved in this story for the obvious it might place on the youngsters and parents.)

There was a baby mixup at Seminole Memorial Hospital Thursday with a Sanford mother given the wrong baby. The mistake was discovered three hours after the mistake.

Here's the way Harry Weir, hospital administrator told the story after the Herald found out about the incident:

"It's the first time anything like this has happened in my 13 years in hospitals and the head nurse can't remember anything like this happening in 30 years of hospital work."

Weir explained that at noon Thursday a Sanford postnatal patient was released at the hospital. Through an error by one of the nurses, she was given the wrong baby.

Weir said that in most circumstances the identification bracelet on a baby's wrist is checked for identification. Apparently this was not done or, as Weir said, there are a lot of occasions when a name is misspelled.

The woman went home with the wrong baby and discovered it about 3:30 when she noted the bracelet.

Weir said the incident proves the success of the hospital's practice of not removing the identification bracelets from new born babies as many hospitals do.

"It was an unfortunate mistake, but I'm gratified that our system is as fool proof as it is," he added.

## Nova Assures Sanford Canal In 5 Years - Krider

Choice of Cape Canaveral as the nation's moon-port was called the greatest news for Seminole County in years by Chamber of Commerce Manager John Krider today who said this project assures construction of the Sanford-Canaveral Canal in the immediate future.

Krider added that "we can look forward to seeing this canal a reality within the next five years" and that the county will be the center of all waterways traffic from the west.

The chamber manager also said it would give the county's economy an incalculable shot in the arm as a great portion of the billion of dollars that will be spent will find its way into the economy of our area.

"This is something so large it is of tremendous economic significance to all Florida," Gov. Farris Bryant told his news conference Thursday at the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) announced in Washington that U. S. manned moon shots would be launched from the Cape.

Bryant said expansion of the 17,000-acre missile test center by 80,000 acres, at an initial cost of \$60 million, would bring big economic increases in the area of Cape Canaveral.

Bryant said the move should also boost chances of NASA picking MacDill Air Force Base at Tampa for its new headquarters, and for a long talked-of cross-Florida barge canal.

The governor pointed to the difficulties of bringing the giant Saturn moon rocket booster by barge from Alabama around the Florida Keys to the Cape. He said choice of the Cape as permanent launching site for the moonshots should have "a considerable impact on the need for a large canal."

It could also lead, Bryant said, to a need "for development in the Canaveral area of production facilities to alleviate the necessity of these long hauls."

MacDill Air Base is one of several spots under consideration as a site for NASA's new headquarters. A group of NASA officials toured the area this week.

Bryant's backing of MacDill, however, drew criticism Thursday from State Rep. George B. Stallings Jr. of Duval County.

Stallings said in Jacksonville he felt Bryant should support the Green Cove Springs Naval base near Jacksonville as the site of the headquarters.

"I believe the governor owes us the consideration of placing it here," Stallings said.

Charles W. Campbell, president of the Jacksonville Area Chamber of Commerce, also criticized Fred O. Dickinson, head of Bryant's Council of 100, for backing MacDill as a NASA site.

Bryant, meanwhile, praised Florida's congressional delegation for being "really on the ball" in efforts to have the moonport located at the Cape instead of the other areas under consideration.

## Chicago Acts To Halt Relievers' Subsidy To Owners

CHICAGO (UPI) — City and Cook County authorities acted today to penalize and withhold rents from slum landlords of nearly a fifth of the county's 104,000 families on relief.

County Public Aid Director Raymond M. Hilliard said the program had full official backing and was directed at "money-mad slum landlords" who extract "exorbitant rents for unsafe, vermin-infested, filthy, overcrowded fire traps."

The program was launched on two fronts.

In Superior Court, the city stepped up its attack on building violations with a suit against operators of an apartment building charged with illegally converted to house a double load of tenants, many of them on relief.

The Public Aid Department told relief roll tenants of substandard buildings their rent allotment would be withheld from September relief checks.

Hilliard said landlords would feel the pinch within 30 days. They will face these alternatives: Bring the buildings up to minimum standards; silently suffer the rent loss; or sue for eviction under risk of disclosing true owners' names in court.

Landlords' identities frequently have been hidden by trusts, complicating the task of forcing conformity with building standards. The apartment named in Thursday's Superior Court suit is held in trust by a downtown bank.

Short of an eviction suit, there is little way to learn the basic owners' names, officials said. Hilliard said slum apartment rentals are as high as \$105 a month.

The men William E. Clanton and John Dietz was taken to the Navy base hospital and treated for cuts and bruises and released shortly after the mishap.

Clanton was charged by Highway Patrol Trooper Jim Foster for driving while intoxicated.

Foster said Clanton ran into the back of the Dietz car knocking that vehicle into the path of a car operated by Rose Marie Gottfried of Sanford.

Damage to all three cars amounted to \$2,800.

As the 11 A-1J's made their first pass over the Air Station, a look of anxiety could be seen on all of the dependents' faces. Then when the planes landed, Cdr. A. W. Smith in the lead plane, held the group until they could all taxi to their assigned parking area together.

The formation fly-over, the taxiing and parking of the aircraft was all done with precision.

All jet engines were on and the drag chutes extended until the planes were parked, then at a given signal all 22 engines were shut down simultaneously and a quiet prevailed over the field until "Anchors Aweigh" was heard over the loud speaker system.

Immediately the ground crews took over unloading the planes while the U. S. Customs Inspectors cleared the crews and baggage.

As the Customs Inspectors finished with each plane the crews were released to greet their loved ones, and count their children, five of which their fathers had never seen.

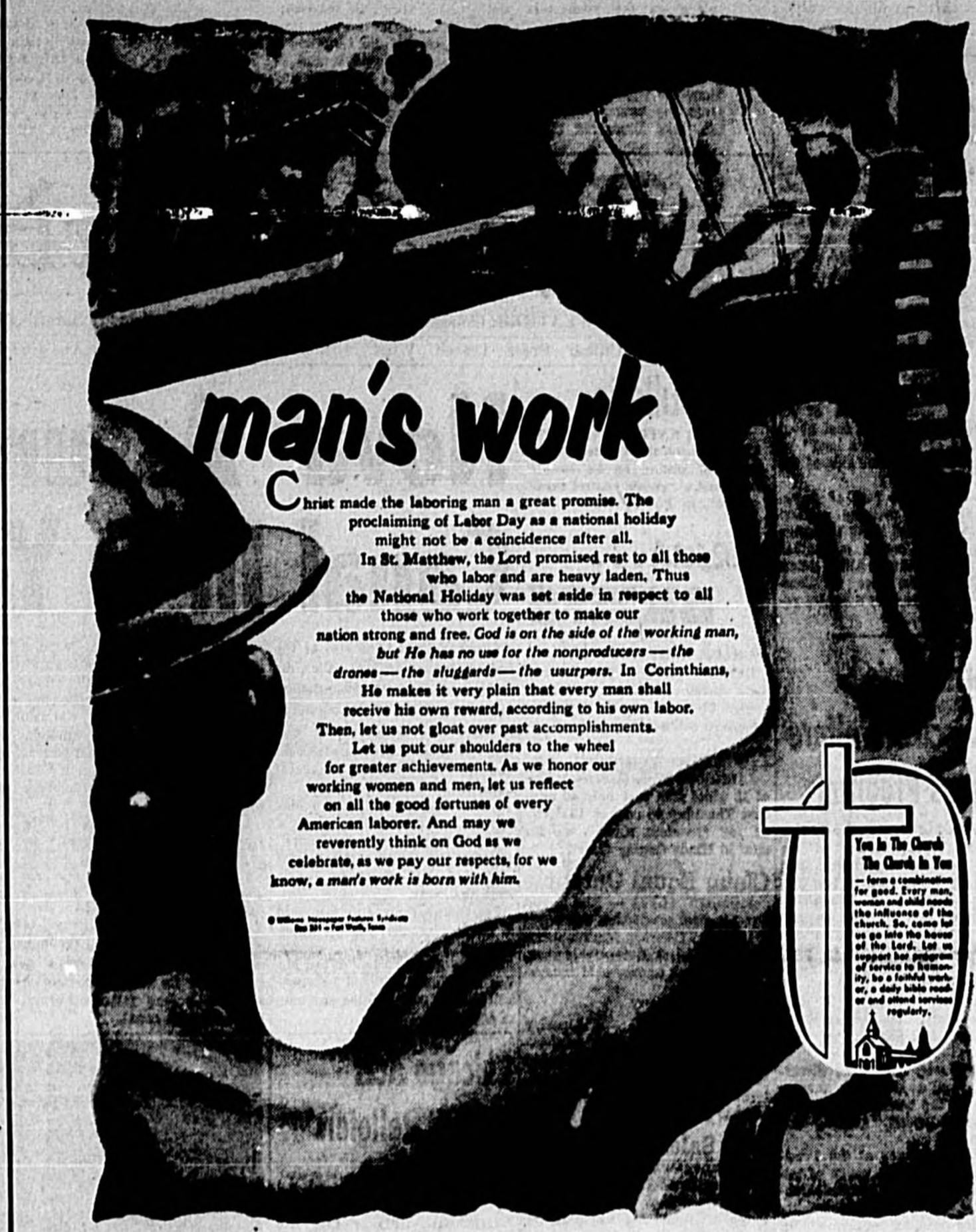

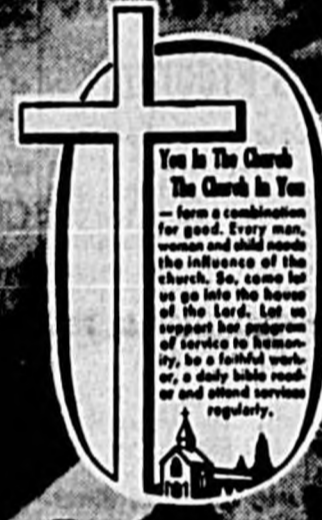

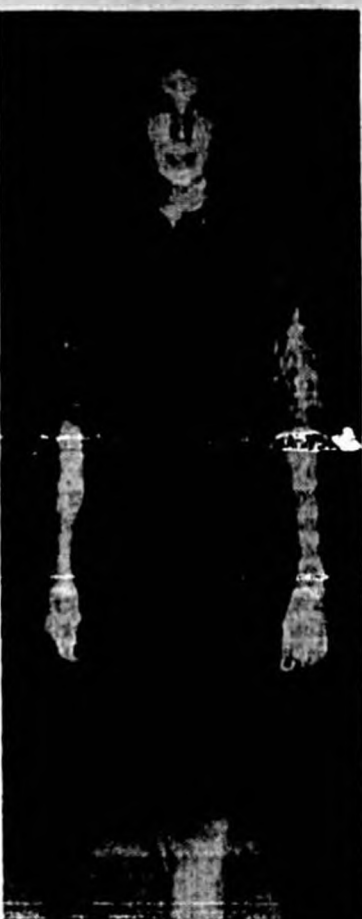

## Living Costs Reach New High

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Living costs crept up to another new high in July, government sources said today.

They made the disclosure in advance of release later today of the Labor Department's monthly consumer price index.

The index was expected to be up slightly from June, when it reached a record high for the first time in six months. The index usually rises in July, when fresh food prices advance to a pre-harvest high.

The index measures changes in the prices of some 300 goods and services bought by urban middle-income families. Hence the June index reading of 127.5 meant that prices were 27.5 per cent higher than in 1947-49, the reference period taken as 100 on the index.

## UPI Compiles Special Report On Federal Gambling Crackdown

(EDITOR'S NOTE—UPI reporters Susan Wagner and Edward Cowan in Washington and Kirk Vogeley in Pittsburgh have compiled a special report on the government's drive against the broad-based crime-gambling. Here is their report.)

The streets of New Kensington, Pa., were clogged with the evening rush hour, and a couple of canvas-covered trucks creeping down a business street were not helping things.

Just as the wrath of following drivers reached the boiling point, the curb and disgorged a cargo that left drivers gasping.

Thirty-five men poured out of the trucks clutching axes and raged for two grimy doorways starting at the street. Their thudding footsteps echoed outside as they swarmed up the stairs.

They chipped their way through doors and windows and burst through, wrecking a couple of thriving businesses.

Thirty-four of them were Internal Revenue agents and the thirty-fifth was a deputy U. S. marshal, and when they came back down the stairs three hours later they had 21 persons in tow.

They put a sharp kink in the activities of sporting persons from nearby Pittsburgh, and as far away as West Virginia and Ohio.

They had knocked over one "combination horse room and gambling casino" and a numbers headquarters.

The raid occurred Thursday night, and it echoed a similar raid two days earlier in Newport, Ky., one of the nation's horsebetting centers, where federal agents battered their way into a bar with a sledgehammer, arrested six

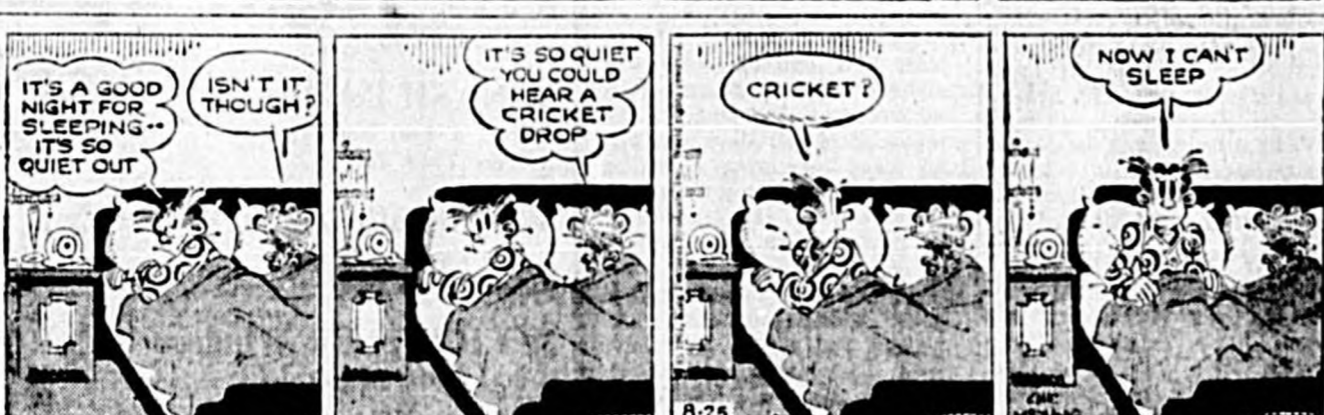

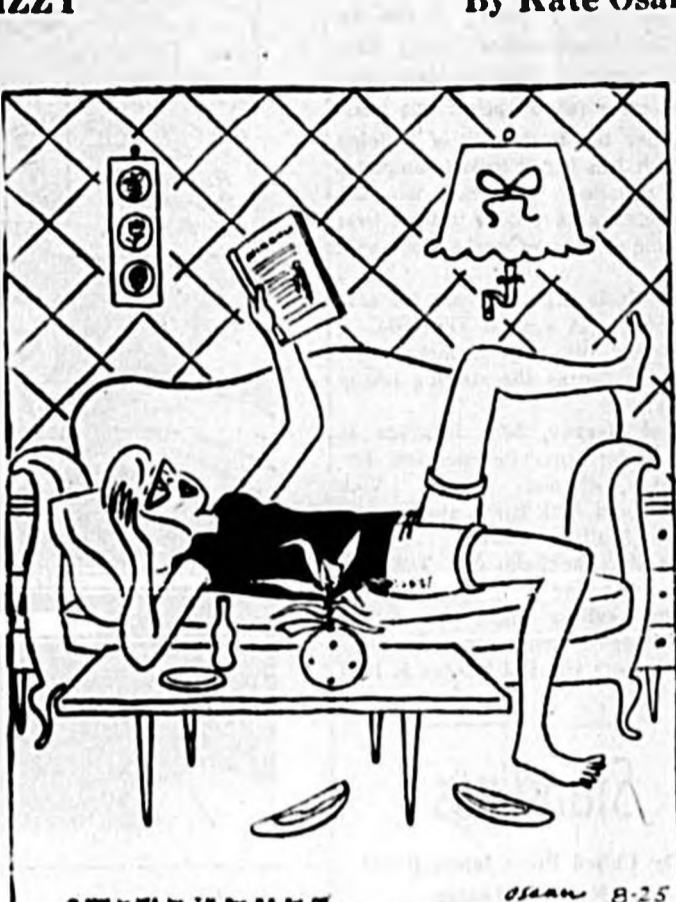

# Cinci Bench Proves Too Much

The San Francisco Giants know today how it feels to be hit by a bench — the Cincinnati Reds' bench.

It's been the Reds' secret weapon all season and manager Fred Hutchinson used it Thursday night when another loss to the Giants might have given Cincinnati a severe case of pennant jitters. He inserted shortstop Leo Cardenas and first baseman Dick Gernert into the lineup and bingo-bango went the Giants' six-game winning streak.

Cardenas, a 22-year old Cuban shortstop, delivered two doubles and a single to drive in three runs and Gernert, a hunking cast-off of several clubs, connected for two singles and drove in a key run in an 8-3 victory that restored the Reds' National League lead to 2 1/2 games.

The loss didn't exactly wipe out the Giants' hopes of a "miracle pennant" but it did jolt them. In games of the 1950s, the Giants are still a game and a half behind the second-place Los Angeles Dodgers whose 10-1 loss to the St. Louis Cardinals extended their longest losing streak since 1944 to 10 games.

The Detroit Tigers — who deserve a medal for tenacity even if they don't win a pennant — picked up a game on the first-place New York Yankees in the American League when they beat the Cleveland Indians, 6-0, and the Philadelphia Phillies downed the Chicago Cubs, 7-4, in the other NL games. The Minnesota Twins topped the Chicago White Sox, 3-0, the Boston Red Sox shaded the Washington Senators, 5-4, and the Kansas Orioles, 5-3, in the other AL games.

Cardenas hit safely in the first and fourth innings to start Cincinnati rallies and came through with a three-run double in the seventh. Gernert also contributed a run-scoring single to the Reds' three-run fourth inning. The win went to Jim O'Toole, who has won seven of his last nine decisions and has a 15-9 record.

Alex Grammas doubles in five runs with two doubles and Bill White drove in three with two

doubles and a homer to lead the Cardinals' 16-hit attack. Joe Koppe drove in four runs with two doubles as the Angels beat the Yankees for the sixth time in nine games at Los Angeles.

Frank Lary pitched a four-hitter and won his 19th game for the Tigers who raked Jim Perry and two successors for 16 hits, including four by Bill Bruton and

three each by Norm Cash and Dick McAuliffe.

Spahn yielded 10 hits but left 10 runners stranded in winning his 15th game of the season.

Don Demeter's three-run homer climaxed a six-run second-inning rally that paved the way for the Phillies' third straight win.

Jim Kaat pitched a five-hitter for his first big league shutout and also tripled to give the Twins

their second consecutive shutout over the White Sox.

Jackie Jensen's 10th-inning homer was the decisive blow for the Red Sox, who had tied the score at 4-4 with a two-run shot by Jensen in the sixth.

A two-run eighth inning homer by Deron Johnson gave Kansas City's Bill Kunkel his third win and sent Baltimore's Dick Hall to his fifth loss.

### City Expected To Adopt '61-62 Budget Tonight With Same Millage

The City Commission tonight is expected to approve its 1961-62 operating and utility budgets with the tax millage to remain the same at 18.

The overall budget has been set at \$1,072,849 and \$424,681 for the utility appropriations. City operations are expected to be \$798,199 and \$274,650 for debt services.

The total contingency fund will now be \$30,442.

The major items in the budget will be the hiring of two additional firemen at a cost of \$8,545; two percent increase for all city employees; and at \$2,616 the hiring of a clerk for the finance office.

Slashed from the budget was a lie detector for the police department; enclosing of fire station No. 2 on French Ave.; no new fire car for Chief Mack Cleveland Sr.; eliminating parking lot by city hall.

In other business tonight, the commission will consider a new zoning ordinance;

Engineers Leffler and Bush will present a comprehensive plan for a proposed sewage treatment plant at a cost of some \$400,000;

Final signing of lease agreement with Jack Trim on the proposed boat marina and consideration of a request by the county for the use of a city building for storage and distribution of food to welfare cases.

Arthur Rhodes, civil defense head for North Orlando has called a public meeting for 7:30 p. m. in front of the Village Hall in North Orlando, today. There is also a meeting of the Civic Assn. at the same time and place.

There was a special meeting of representatives of the State Hotel Commission, the city and the Palm Hotel last week in which the state and city spelled out the conditions for the Palm Hotel to remain in business. Needed improvements are expected to run between \$6,000 and \$20,000.

Don't be surprised if the county establishes a septic tank inspection fee of \$5.

State Rep. Mack Cleveland Jr. today said he was slightly "cool" to any talk of a special session of the Legislature for this year to study constitutional revision.

Cleveland, who is also a member of the constitutional revision committee, said he was not overly optimistic that very much could be accomplished this year.

Gov. Farris Bryant announced last week he was giving "private, active study" to calling a special session to take up the matter again.

Bryant said he conceived the proposed session as one voted wholly to constitutional revision, but he did not shut out financial considerations, especially if the Legislature could "pick up \$5 to \$10 million in needed funds."

NEW YORK (UPI)—Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev has said Russia was "ready at any moment" to meet with Western leaders to negotiate a Berlin settlement.

Khrushchev made the statement in an interview with columnist Drew Pearson released Sunday night.

The solution of the German question "permits no delay," the Russian leader said, and the Russian government is ready to guarantee a "free city" status for West Berlin.

Irish, Swedish and Indian troops, supported by armored cars, seized strategic points throughout the province and held them for about six hours.

At 11 a. m., a UN spokesman said security restrictions were being lifted after a conference between Thonbe and O'Brien.

The spokesman said about 40 of 512 air force and gendarmie officers whose arrest had been ordered by UN officials were rounded up and flown to Kamina airbase in preparation for return to their home countries.

Seminole County is being considered for the site to manufacture solid fuel for the project Nova, John Krider, Chamber of Commerce manager and a director of the Florida Waterways Committee told the Rotary Club at noon today.

Krider told club members that it will require a minimum of 20,000 acres and the employment of some 8,000 persons.

He also added that eight companies are bidding for the project and the Seminole County site has been inspected.

Indications are that payroll of the plant would be some \$60 million a year.

Krider also said that this would bring the Sanford-Canaveral canal closer to reality. Reason for this according to NASA officials, would mean permitting barge transportation of the fuel from the plant to the cape project area.

Land transportation was ruled out because highway underpasses are too low to permit passage of the vehicles that it would require to carry the cargo.

### Threats Grow In Brazil Crisis

BRASILIA (UPI)—An aircraft carrier and two other warships loaded with troops were reported sailing today toward Porto Alegre, stronghold of leftist Vice President Joao Goulart, amid mounting indications that the Brazilian armed forces were determined to bar Goulart from succeeding to the presidency.

### East Germans Demand 'Talk' Rights On Berlin

BERLIN (UPI)—The East German Communist regime, which is not recognized by the West, today demanded the right to participate in any big power talks on Germany and Berlin.

The Communist demand for recognition coincided with unofficial reports that the United States, Britain and West Germany have agreed to inform the Soviet Union they are willing to negotiate the Berlin crisis.

The East German regime said in the official Communist party newspaper, Neues Deutschland, that the closing of the East-West Berlin border had made negotiations necessary to give divided Germany a peace treaty.

"It is clear that negotiations on the German problem without the German Democratic Republic (East Germany) are unthinkable," Neues Deutschland said.

A report that the United States and Britain had decided to seek negotiations with Russia came from the West German newspaper Die Welt. The usually well-informed diplomatic source in Bonn, said Chancellor Konrad Adenauer fully approves the decision.

There was no confirmation of the report from U. S. or British officials.

### Four Escape Crash Of Plane

ORLANDO (UPI)—Four men crashed in a Cessna 172 airplane near here Saturday, but no one was hurt.

Pilot Malcolm McCallum, 30, of Carol City, said "we were over Lake Bay north of Orlando when the oil pressure failed. The motor died and I tried to set her down in a pasture."

Others on board the flight were Bill Golding, 37, and H. B. Griffin, 45, both of Miami, and Richard Lundell, 47, of Opa-Locks. They were en route from Miami to Orlando to attend a two-day Civil Air Patrol meeting.
