

Precincts Given

A. A freeholders:

A. A freeholder is any person who has an immediate beneficial ownership interest, legal or equitable, in the title to a fee simple estate in land. In other words, a person who has a deed to real estate in his own name in the County of Seminole, regardless of what kind of real estate it is, homestead or non-exempt, improved it unimproved, just so the owner has a present ownership interest iterein, he is a freeholder.

Q. If a man and wife own their home together, are they both freeholders?

A. Year If a man and the county of Seminole County o

A. Yes. If a man and his wife are joint owners of a home or other property they are classified as freeholders. If the home is in the name of the husband, while the wife owns no property, she is

The new law provides manda-tory deferment for men not yet inducted, and directs that those of the specified age who request it shall be released from service "as soon as practicable and when not in conflict with the interests of national defense.

The mandatory deferment plies to men who on July 1, 1941, or on July 1 of any subsequent year have reached their 28th birthday without being inducted into service.
President Roosevelt returned

Sunday from his epochal high seas meeting with Prime Min-later Churchill and immediately conferred for two and a half hours with Secretary Hull-chiefly on the explosive Japanese sit-

The discussion was reported to have gone far beyond Japan's ac-tion in holding 100 American citizens as virtual hostages. The entire Far Eastern picture, it was understood, was canvassed thoroughly in the light of Roose-velt's statement that his talks velt's statement that his talks with Churchill brought complete Anglo-American accord regarding developments on every continent. Tokyo's refusal to allow strand-
