

### Attempt To Smear Pepper Is Charged

WASHINGTON, Aug. 15.—(AP)—Chairman May of the House military committee said Thursday there was an apparent attempt on the part of "some members of the press" to "smear" Senator Pepper of Florida.

He made this assertion in a statement on a report issued Wednesday by a military subcommittee investigating a delay in the construction of Bign field, Fla.

May said that in the report there was "no direct statement justifying an implication that Senator Pepper did anything improper about the matter."

### Inefficiency Cited In Camp Buildings

WASHINGTON, Aug. 15.—(AP)—The War Department has charged inefficiency in the construction of several hundred million dollars in the camp construction program was laid before the Senate Thursday and the department immediately replied that mistakes were due to lack of funds for advance planning.

The accusation was made in a report of the special Senate defense investigating committee which has been inquiring into the preparedness effort since last Spring.

### 75 Persons Shot For Croat Revolt

ZAGREB, Aug. 15.—(AP)—Seventy-five persons were shot to death in Croatia Thursday, 70 of them because of a mutiny in a concentration camp at Travnik in Bosnia.

Two Communists were executed at Sarajevo for distributing communist leaflets and three others in Esser for spreading Communist propaganda.

### Beaverbrook Seeks Supplies In States

WASHINGTON, Aug. 15.—(AP)—The British minister of supply, Lord Beaverbrook, who flew here after attending the momentous Roosevelt-Churchill high seas conference, said Thursday the purpose of his visit is to obtain tanks, planes and food in quantities as large as the United States can supply.

He declined to reveal details of the conference, simply stating the eight-point peace aims drafted by President Roosevelt and Prime Minister Churchill were "magnificent."

"I trust the people of this country will be deeply moved," he said.

### Harry Askew Heads Growers Committee

LAKELAND, Aug. 15.—(AP)—Harry L. Askew, Lakeland, was unanimously elected chairman and J. M. Douglas, Wierdale, vice chairman, as the growers' administrative committee was organized here Thursday for the 1941-42 citrus season.

Askew succeeds A. V. Saurman, Clearwater, as chairman of the committee which works with a shippers' advisory committee in handling the federal grade and size regulatory program for Florida citrus.

Saurman, twice chairman who declined to run again, was elected secretary. Frank Seymour of Lakeland was re-elected manager at the same salary, \$400 a month. Herman Steele, Lakeland, was renamed auditor.

### Japan's Vice Premier Is Seriously Wounded

TOKYO, Aug. 15.—(AP)—Baron Kichiro Hiraiwa, vice premier and senior statesman who is considered a moderating and steady influence in the Japanese cabinet, was gravely wounded Thursday by a mysterious gunman who gained entrance to his home by posing as an admiring autograph-seeker.

Although the baron's condition was reported serious last night, with a blood transfusion probable, the emperor sent him a basket of fruit—a strong indication that hope is held for his recovery.

Had the gift been imperial wine, the traditional implication would have been that death was expected.

### Pensacola Walkout Is Termed Strike

PENSACOLA, Aug. 15.—(AP)—The naval air station's public relations office Thursday said failure of 1000 men to report for work on two naval defense projects here "is in effect a strike against the government."

The carpenters, electricians and common laborers who stayed off the job Wednesday and Thursday denied, however, that they were striking. A spokesman for the building and construction trades council, as A. P. L. affiliate, said the men were "just taking a brief holiday and had 'gone fishing.' Skilled workmen asked for a 25-cent an hour wage increase.

### Doubling Of Social Security Tax Seen

WASHINGTON, Aug. 15.—(AP)—Elimination of all decorative trimmings from new automobiles and use of substitutes for scarce materials in all non-functional parts was decided upon at a conference Thursday of representatives of the motor industry and defense officials.

No definite action will be taken, however, until the office of Production Management issues an order, officials said. The order is expected to be drafted soon.

The critical materials to be conserved include aluminum, chrome, nickel, zinc, copper and rubber. The automobile makers said some of these would have to be used in transmissions, gears, brakes and other essential operating parts.

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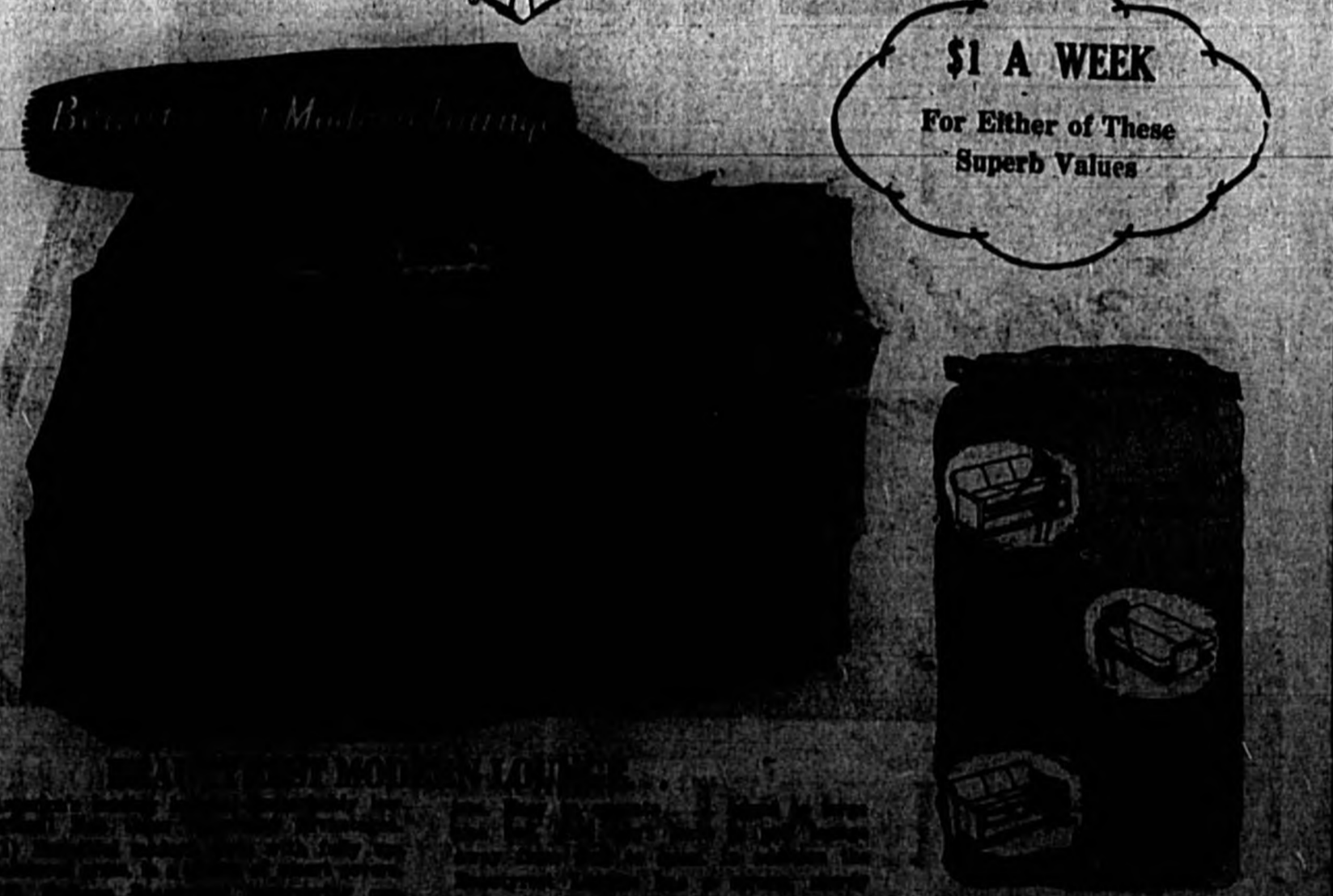

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# Reds Make Orderly Retreat For Stand On Dnieper River

## Situation Is Called "Cheerful" By Lon- don Authority, But Reports Are Vague

## Japanese Attack On Siberia Seen

## Shanghai Sources De- clare That Assault May Be Made Soon

NEWCASTLE-ON-TYNE, ENGLAND, Aug. 16.—(AP)—Capt. H. D. E. Margeson, war secretary, cautioned the British today against expecting an early victory no matter what losses the Germans have suffered on the Russian front.

"There are no signs of the war drawing to a quick and pleasant conclusion," Margeson asserted. "We cannot look forward to an early return to our peaceful way of life."

The Red Army, fighting a bitter rear-guard action in the Ukraine, was described today as making a comparatively orderly withdrawal for a stand on the east bank of the Dnieper River, major tactical decisions to the German attack on the invasion of Russia having begun its eighth week.

An authoritative source in London, regarding the development, asserted the situation "on the whole would appear quite cheerful."

Both London and Washington interpreted the Roosevelt-Churchill proposal for a long term aid program to the Soviets as indicating confidence that the Red Army, however battered, was far from beaten.

Both the Russian and German communiques on the course of fighting were in the vaguest terms.

Moscow reported "fierce fighting on all fronts during the night."

Adolf Hitler's headquarters declared operations "continue successfully according to plan on the entire eastern front."

Word from high Japanese, German and neutral quarters in Shanghai was that Japan is getting ready for the possibility of assisting the Russians in Siberia in the next two or three weeks if at all this year.

Berlin and the German Baltic part of Slatkin were heavily bombed by Russian aircraft tonight, according to a Moscow radio report being in New York.

"Many incendiary and high explosive bombs of heavy calibre" were dropped, the broadcast said, adding that a "great number of fires" were observed in both cities.

## Long War Seen Necessary For Checking Nazis

## Gayda Says War May Continue 10 Years; Declaration Is Hit

BERLIN, Aug. 16.—(AP)—Propaganda Minister Paul Joseph Goebbels, adding his voice to the outpouring of the Nazi press of Roosevelt-Churchill program, described it today as "an outrage against common sense."

Goebbels added, "Seldom has history seen such a stilted, unimaginative document as the two big guns of world plutocracy framed." He reiterated the German answer that if Britain and the United States want Germany to give up her arms, they will have to come and get them.

ROME, Aug. 16.—(AP)—Virginia Gayda, authoritative Fascist editorial writer, calling the current conflict a "world war," said today it would continue "10 years or longer" if the United States and Britain really maintained their proposal to destroy Nazi power.

## Collision Occurs At Thirteenth And Oak Shortly After Noon

Mrs. H. J. Lehman, prominent Sanford clubwoman and wife of the manager of the Sanford Farmers Market, was injured today in an automobile collision at Thirteenth Street and Oak Avenue, Chief of Police Roy Williams said. The accident occurred shortly after 12:00 o'clock noon.

Mrs. Lehman received a cut on her head and was taken to the Fernald-Laughton Memorial Hospital in an ambulance. She was placed under observation there and it could not be learned immediately in what condition she was in. It was not believed, however, that she was seriously hurt.

Bob Cole, driver of the other automobile, was knocked unconscious but quickly recovered, Chief Williams said.

Mrs. Lehman was driving west on Thirteenth Street and Mr. Cole was moving west on Oak Avenue, according to the police report. The two cars collided at the intersection of the street, and ran into the corner of the home occupied by Mr. and Mrs. A. C. Moore, 112 Oak Avenue.

The car driven by Mrs. Lehman was knocked a short distance down the street by the force of the collision. She received the cut from an interior light in the car.

The case is still pending and no arrests have been made, Chief Williams said.

The funeral will be held at 2 o'clock Sunday at the home of Mrs. Oliver, 112 Oak Avenue.

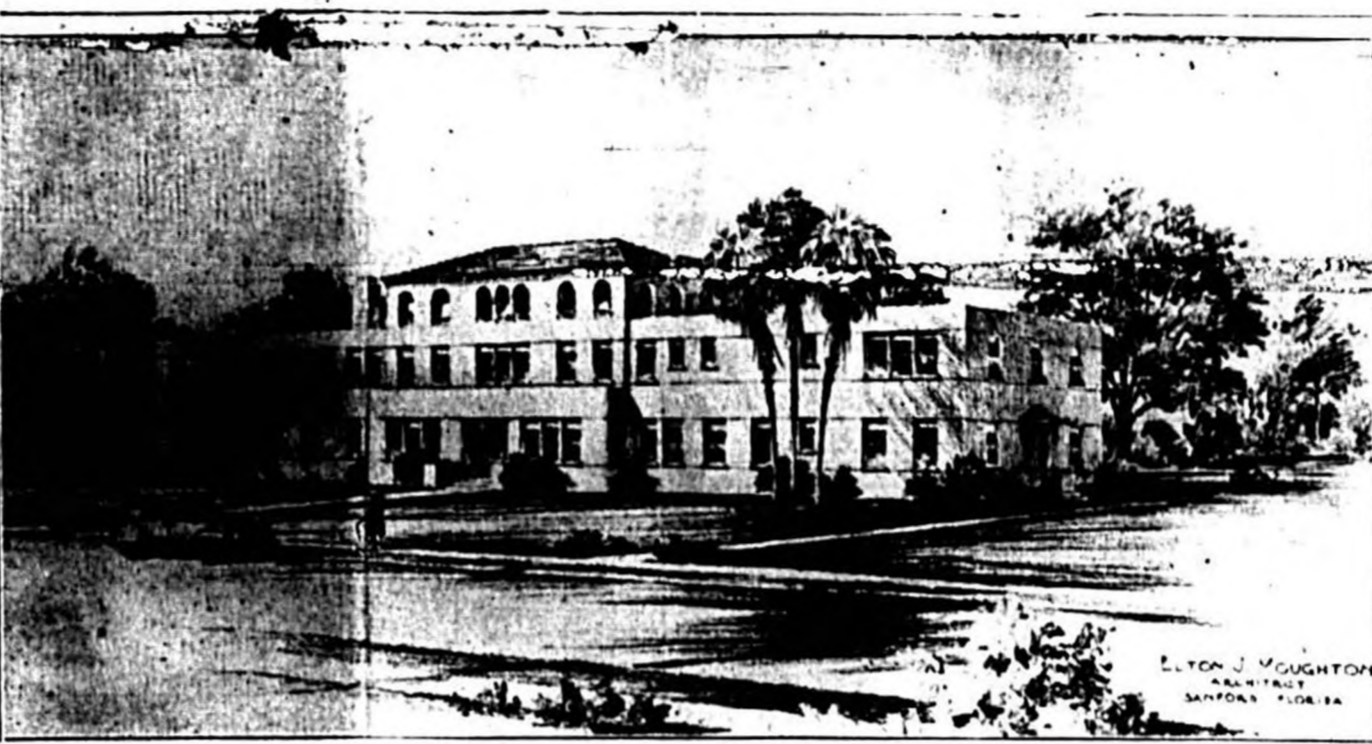

## Housholder Urges Vote Of Approval On Hospital Act

## Practically No Hope Of Federal Aid Is Held By Senator

Ernest F. Housholder, County attorney and State senator, today called on the people of Seminole County to go to the polls Tuesday and vote "for approval" of the special act relative to the proposed hospital, since without approval of the law "we will have very little hope of getting a modern hospital for Seminole County."

In a statement regarding the election, Senator Housholder declared:

"The special election on Tuesday, usually referred to as the 'hospital election,' is of vital importance to the people of Seminole County, if we want a hospital for the county."

"The election approves the bill provided the people go to polls on Tuesday and vote 'for approval.' This is what is commonly known as a referendum election provided by law for the people to say whether they want the special law or not."

"There is practically no hope for any federal aid now for a hospital. The first law allowing Seminole County to have a hospital was passed in 1937 and ever since that date we have been trying to get some federal aid in some form or another. Our first failure came when the people failed to vote for the proposition in September, 1938. The FWA refused to go any further because of the failure of this election."

"The people did approve the hospital at an election on November, 1938, and authorized a two-mill tax levy and issuance of \$70,000 in bonds as the share of the County. These bonds have been validated and are ready for sale."

"Federal aid has failed and if we want a hospital we are going to have to build it. We passed this law in the Legislature because we felt that the people of Seminole County wanted a hospital, and that they wanted to be prepared to issue sufficient bonds, if the people approved, at the proper time."

"Under this law the amount of any bond issue would first have to be decided upon by the Board of County Commissioners and then submitted to the freeholders in an election, at which time more than 50 percent of all freeholders registered must vote."

"I believe that a great majority of the people of this county want a modern hospital and if they do, then every freeholder who wants a hospital should go and vote 'for approval' on Tuesday, for without the approval of this law, in my opinion we will have very little hope of getting a modern hospital for Seminole County."

## Service Station Men Puzzled As To Procedure Of Rationing Gas

Service station managers expressed puzzlement today at the latest order to curtail consumption of gasoline by cutting the rationing by 10 per cent and wondering how they would pass the rationing to their customers.

Managers of a number of stations on Park Avenue, in the downtown section, were interviewed this morning by a Herald reporter and made the following statements:

Henry Carroll, Standard Oil station, across from the County House—"I don't know just how the cut will be hard in the winter with tourists coming down. A man on a trip will be afraid that he can't get gas along the road. Early closing has not slowed the sale of gasoline though it has helped this station by cutting electric bills and working hours."

F. C. Rinehart, Atlantic station, Park Avenue and Third Street—"They picked the worst month for us to measure the gas rationing. It will be hard business to ration customers as it would involve looking up sales (Continued on Page Three)

## Photostat Unit Installed At Court House

Machinist will save time and increase record accuracy. Saving time and increasing the accuracy in recording instruments, a new photostatic machine is being installed in the Court House, O. P. Herndon, County clerk, announced today. Malthy Webster, factory representative, has been at work for the past week installing the new machine. Standing about eight feet high, the big machine and its equipment occupies the entire room of the new basement addition. Beside the photostatic machine itself, there is a dark room, developing compartment and drying machine.

An instrument to be recorded is placed on a platform extending from the machine and a picture is made of it. When developed, this picture is identical with the original except that the black and white portions are reversed.

Work that formerly took a day or two is now completed in about an hour, Mr. Herndon said.

All records that were to be filed once had to be copied by typewriter, but now an extra copy is made of the original instrument in little time. The machine is unflaggingly accurate since it eliminates the human element, forgeries, erasures and alterations can be detected when the photostatic copy has been developed.

All types of instruments, including mortgages, deeds and court records, can be copied and filed with the new machine. Plots as large as 36 inches by 48 inches can also be copied.

The machine, which will modernize the recording of instruments for the benefit of the public will be paid for with money earned by the clerk's office, Mr. Herndon said.

Simple to operate, the machine is similar to about 75 others that have been installed all over Florida. Leeburg has just added a new one at its Court House, Mr. Webster said. The records which it makes never fade and can be kept indefinitely.

## Aviation Gas Output Will Be Increased

## Refining Capacity Of High Octane Fuel Will Be Doubled, Industry Proposes

## Need Of Planes Cited By Ickes

## Adequate Supply Is Called Determining Factor In Conflict

WASHINGTON, Aug. 16.—(AP)—Petroleum Coordinator Ickes announced today the oil industry is drafting plans to double its refining capacity for 100-octane aviation gasoline, thereby to prevent a shortage for the fighting planes of Russia and Britain and the expanding American air forces.

"The availability of adequate supplies of oil and gasoline will determine the conflict now raging abroad," Ickes asserted.

A sweeping gasoline rationing system for the east, which means a cut of about 20 percent in the fuel available for autos used for pleasure or non-essential purposes, was set up yesterday by the Office of Price Administration and Civilian Supply, effective immediately.

The action, unprecedented in peacetime, did not involve the issuance of ration cards to individual automobile operators, but slashed by 10 percent the supplies delivered to service stations.

However, it was estimated the cut would be about 20 percent on non-essential motor cars because the P. O. A. announced the supplies for fire department vehicles, ambulances, commercial and agriculture activities and other essential services would not be reduced at all.

The announcement said "it is expected that more severe curtailment will be necessary in the future."

Operators of filling stations were invested with responsibility to distribute the gasoline equitably among some 10,000,000 customers. Officials would not say what plans had been made for enforcing the order, but expected that oil companies would comply with it.

The 7:00 P.M. curfew on gasoline sales in the east will continue at least for the time, it was indicated.

States affected by the action would include Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont, Massachusetts, Connecticut, Rhode Island, New York, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Delaware, Maryland, Virginia, West Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, the District of Columbia, and a portion of Florida.

The action was taken, the announcement said, as an emergency measure to bring consumption of gasoline in this area into line with transport facilities. These facilities have been reduced by transfer of petroleum-carrying ships from the coastwise service to the British.

The action was proclaimed by Leon Henderson, head of the Office of Price Administration and Civilian Supply, at the request of Secretary of Interior Ickes, who is a defense petroleum coordinator.

Robert Lee Robinson, negro about 23 years old, was drowned last night when he apparently jumped into Lake Monroe at the approach of a police car, Chief Roy Williams said today. The negro had been up before the Municipal Court a short time ago, and probably became frightened when he saw the squad car, Chief Williams explained.

The drowning took place along Lake Shore Boulevard at the foot of Cypress Avenue. Police saw the negro running toward the lake, and when they arrived saw a hat floating on the water.

Hospital Election

Seminole County freeholders will go to the polls next Tuesday in an all important election when they will again be given an opportunity to express their desire for a new hospital.

That Seminole County needs a new hospital is recognized by practically everyone. Again and again the inadequacy of the present hospital has been demonstrated.

The staff of the present hospital has done a remarkable job in caring for the needs of the people of this county insofar as their facilities permitted.

But that is not to say we do not need a new hospital or that the present staff and our local doctors could not do a much better job if they had a hospital large enough to accommodate all the patients in Seminole County who should be hospitalized.

There is not a single person in Seminole County who should not be interested in this project. We realize that it is sometimes difficult to show a man or woman the importance of a hospital who has never been sick in his life.

But when that time comes, when a person is about to be placed under the influence of ether and have some portion of his anatomy removed, we venture to say that then he will be convinced that nothing is too good for him.

Think about this, you freeholders, and when Tuesday comes go down to the polls and vote for a bigger and better hospital just as you would if you were the one who has to be operated upon tomorrow.

Knox On Hitler

Colonel Frank Knox, Secretary of the Navy, offers good advice in a signed article in the current Colliers magazine in an article, "Hands Off Navy Planes" in which he states that the naval air arm belongs where it will do the most good—in the Navy.

"Naval and military intelligence," Colonel Knox writes, "estimates that if Hitler wins in Europe and Great Britain his shipbuilding capacity will be at least four times our own. In addition, all Europe will become Hitler's aircraft factory. It would then be in his power to build a sea-air navy bigger than our own—bigger than anything we have planned. But we have the jump on Hitler—in ships and ship-based planes in the 'know-how' of training, and most particularly, in the high morale and intelligence of our personnel. The American people should demand that we keep the jump on Hitler—and jump on him first where there is any doubt about it."

In arguing for naval control of naval planes, Colonel Knox reveals that an American naval observer was aboard the American-built Catalina flying boat which spotted the Bismarck and brought her to her doom. He answers two questions which he says seem to be asked most frequently on the subject. First, should the Navy give up its aviation arm in favor of a unified air force? Second, have the lessons of war in Europe taught that the plane is mightier than the battleship?

"The first of these questions," he states, "is generally answered by citing the brilliant feats of the R. A. F. and the crushing devastation wrought by the Luftwaffe in mass attacks over Britain. Actually, Germany has not yet a navy with which to use a naval air arm comparable to our own. Our observers have expressed the belief that England's early failure to develop an independent, powerful sea-air arm has been primarily responsible for nearly every reverse suffered by Britain so far in the war at sea."

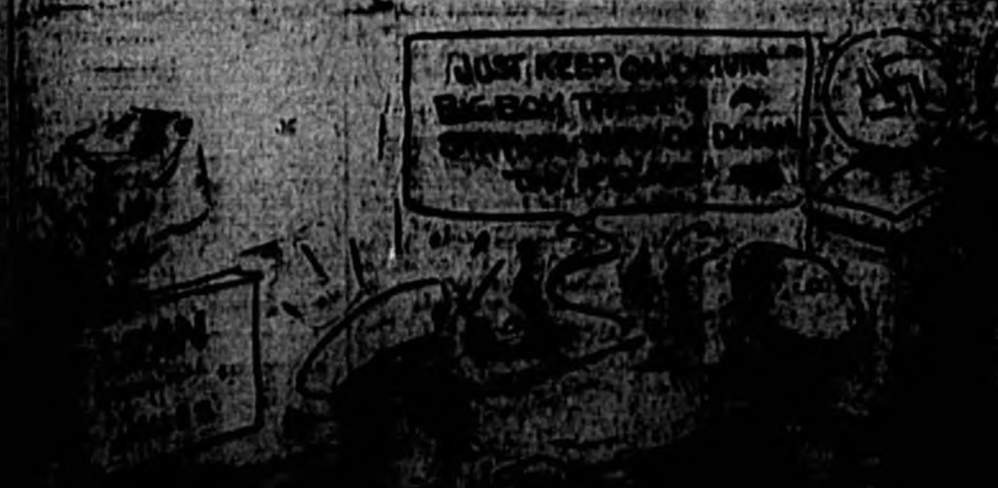

Washington Observers wonder at Long Attorney General's Vacancy

By JACK STINNETT WASHINGTON, Aug. 16. (AP)—Only twice in the 71 years of the Department of Justice have there been such long periods as the present when the United States has had no attorney general.
The reasons for President Grant's 56-day delay in filling the office and for President McKinley's waiting nearly six months to appoint a successor to Joseph McKenna are pretty much obscured in political history.
The reason for President Roosevelt's long delay in naming a successor to Attorney General Robert H. Jackson, whom he elevated to the United States Supreme Court, are almost as obscure—but not because there hasn't been plenty of speculation.
Official Washington and the politicians have been wondering out loud, and 20,000 employees of the Justice Department have been parked on those proverbial pins and needles for weeks. Some are asking whether the appointment will stand the test of history. Others want to know how the new appointment will affect Department of Justice policies. The result: D. J. business has been almost at a standstill ever since Attorney General Jackson was appointed associate justice of the Supreme Court on June 12.
Trying to sift fact from rumor is a little like panning for gold where there isn't any—but there are a few nuggets worth considering.
For example, it is a foregone conclusion in most speculative circles that Francis Biddle, the deep-browed, mustachioed, tweedy lawyer general will get the post and that Charles Fahy, his assistant, will be named solicitor general. If Jackson was appointed (and the prospect is excellent) it is not certain that it is impossible to conceive that his successor had not already been selected, why the delay?
Only two reasons have been advanced. One is that the President is waiting to get along with administration will get along with Biddle. This is almost too silly to merit consideration. Biddle and the President were classmates at Groton and Harvard. And although Biddle wandered to the Bull Moose camp for Roosevelt in 1912, he was well known in line with the New Deal in 1936 to be chairman of the campaign speakers' committee. Although he is a little hard to tag in his political philosophy, as New Deal solicitor general he has handled cases before Supreme Court.
The second reason is that the President has wanted to swing the job to someone else. There is, of course, a possibility that the story goes that Murphy's 18 months on the Supreme Court have convinced him he wants no part of the quiet judicial life. He wants to be back in the thick of things. Both Murphy and Murphy's friends are believed to have been urging the President to return him to the post he once held. Then there is Thurman Arnold, whom trust-busting has made him something more of a salient figure than the solicitor general.
And Federal Security Administrator Paul V. McNutt, whose friends have been urging him to make a play for the post and undoubtedly speaking to the President in his behalf. It is known, however, that McNutt doesn't want the job. Although politically ambitious, McNutt is said to feel that the attorney general's duties are too heavy for him to handle frequently, but when he does; it must be in his capacity as prosecutor of the laws of the land—and prosecutors make enemies.
There the matter rests, with the President apparently waiting for two things: (1) To find a job for Associate Justice Murphy which he will like better than being on the Supreme Court or than again being attorney general, and (2) waiting for the pressure groups to get used to the idea that their men, for one reason or another, are not being considered.

Anniversary Passes Without Bombings

LONDON, Aug. 16. (AP)—The anniversary bombing of London, the attack on Graydon airfield by dive bombers Aug. 15, 1940, passed without the blast of a single bomb or the drift of a single Nazi plane over the capital.
In fact, at midnight, the only incident reported throughout the British Isles was the dropping of bombs in East Angles by a lone German plane which caused neither damage nor casualties.
