 of peace they have had a great  
 deal of leisure time.  
 The man who served himself  
 with a quantity of alcohol will  
 have a much lower percentage of  
 vitality than the man who has  
 abstained from alcohol.

### The Simple Life

A war commentator observes that Americans in Africa, who at home have been used to living luxuriously, now discover new satisfactions in "rugged but life that provides only the barest essentials of living." Likewise in Guadalcanal and New Guinea, the men in their rare periods of relaxation are made happy by such trivial things as a good meal, a carton of cigarettes or a letter from home, and do not seem to miss the elaborate equipment and meals they have been accustomed to. Perhaps, he suggests, this is an omen of American requirements and ideal as hereafter. We may be happier with a new experience of the simple life than we have been with so much variety and luxury. From the rate at which this nation is now pouring its wealth into war's ravenous maw, it looks as if we'll have a good chance to try that kind of happiness. The British people seem to have acquired such blessedness already. But can Americans really be content without the flashpots and highballs and fine clothes and comfortable homes?

### A Cure For War Worries

What do you do about your war worries when the newspapers and radio carry nothing but bad news? Perhaps you don't worry, which may be a token of completely sane philosophy—or of dangerous indifference. Perhaps you are like the grim little man I met recently in a downtown office. "I used to kid myself," he admitted tensely. "The government wants us to lead our normal lives—that's what I believed. I don't believe it any more. Not with sugar and gasoline and fuel oil rationing." He was pretty much worked up and plunged into a discussion of war strategy. He was still going strong when the office girl interrupted: "The doctor will see you now, Mr. Smith." The grim little man was suffering from indigestion—nervous indigestion, as he called it. He was about to pop on the verge of a complete breakdown. I can't presume to say that war nerves was the diagnosis, but surely his jitter was a contributing factor. In contrast, let me tell you about Aunt Kate. She's an elderly widow who lives at the foot of our street. I rode home with her on the bus yesterday. "Of course, I catch myself worrying," she told me. "Who can help it, sometimes? But I've learned to get it out of my system in a hurry. I buy a War Bond, or perhaps just a War Stamp, if it's at the end of the month, besides my ten percent pledge. And I drop my housework and put in an afternoon at the Red Cross sewing room, or sit down and write new, cheerful letters to my nephews in the service. But it mustn't be my regular Red Cross work or letters—it has to be something extra." Aunt Kate, incidentally, is in excellent health. She hasn't a sign of nervous indigestion. She isn't going to pop. She has, I believe, found the answer to the entire problem of war worries.—Dale Clark in Your Life.

### WASHINGTON DAYBOOK

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22 (WV)—It may not seem important now, but any man who remembers the junk-heaps of war material that piled up after the last war will realize how important it will be some day that the Department of Agriculture has proved that jeep may become the all-purpose farm vehicle of tomorrow. Before we get into this war, several Congressmen announced that some day they would introduce bills to sell surplus jeeps to the farmers at cost-plus-nothing. The idea was brushed off with a few snickers as a political gesture. However, it started some people thinking. As a result, ranching officials of the Department of Agriculture, in co-operation with one of the major automobile manufacturers which produces jeeps, have just completed field tests near Auburn, Ala., and Toledo, O. It looks as if the Army's military car may become (with possible slight modifications) the farmer's miracle car of peace-time.

### Degeneration Said To Be Continuing In Axis Countries

By HERBERT HOOVER

The first deduction from this survey of the Home Front situation is that the degeneration upon European Axis home fronts will be continuous from now on. It will be disastrous unless they can break through the aggressive ring with which the United Nations have surrounded them.

(a) Against Russia. The fanatical resistance of the Russians and their superb tactics in turning the cities into fortresses indicate that another great attack will so further increase the huge Axis losses as to finally weaken their whole military structure.

(b) Against Britain. Here they have in cross the water against the enormously increasing British American air and naval strength, and American supported land defenses. This seems futile to attempt.

(c) Against Northwest Africa. Here again they have to cross the water. It seems unlikely that they can hold the bridge head in Tunisia and Tripoli that they already possess.

through the Caucasus and Persia. In this the South-East movement alone, in conjunction with successful Japanese invasion of India, can the European Axis secure sufficient relief for the home front to assure long continuation of the war. With the full British-American occupation of North Africa and the Mediterranean route under possible protection, it would seem that such a movement could be stopped.

The degeneration upon the European Axis home fronts has another bearing upon military strategy. Their armies of six to seven million men behind their control of the whole European seaboard lines and with their interior lines are exceedingly powerful. They greatly exceed any land force that the United Nations could bring to bear in 1943.

The European sea coast has been enormously fortified. For the British and Americans to attack their central positions on land, during 1943, will be a bloody business. On the other hand, if the Axis for some time yet be held within Europe and constantly compelled to guard this enormous coast line, the decay on their home fronts from internal degeneration, from shortages of supplies by blockade, and from aggressive attack from the air will weaken them enormously and make their defeat less costly in life.

One conclusion seems certain. The European Axis military strength will be less in 1944 than in 1943. Ours will be greater. The European Axis home fronts will degenerate in 1943 and 1944 while the United Nations home fronts grow in strength.
