Mayor: More work to solve Sanford police puzzle

SANFORD - There's much more to accomplish before Sanford solves its police puzzle, says Mayor Larry Dale a day after a special Law Enforcement Options Committee chose its recommendations for the city.

Dale said it will take a series of work sessions by the City Commission and a public hearing before the SPD issue is completed. He expects the commission's decision won't be

rendered until January.

"We've still got to face the dragon," Dale said Wednesday. "We appreciate the work the committee put into its assignment. There was a lot of frustration and uncertainty. It wasn't easy for the committee members to criticize and risk being criticized themselves."

The 18-member committee needed to pick one of three options to correct the deficiencies in the city's law enforcement agency - which was found to be dysfunctional in a study conducted this summer. Each city commissioner named three to committee which met eight times.

Option "A" was for the SPD to right itself top to bottom. "B" called for acquiring needed services from the Seminole County Sheriff's Office. "C" was to get rid of the SPD and contract the sheriff's office for all services.

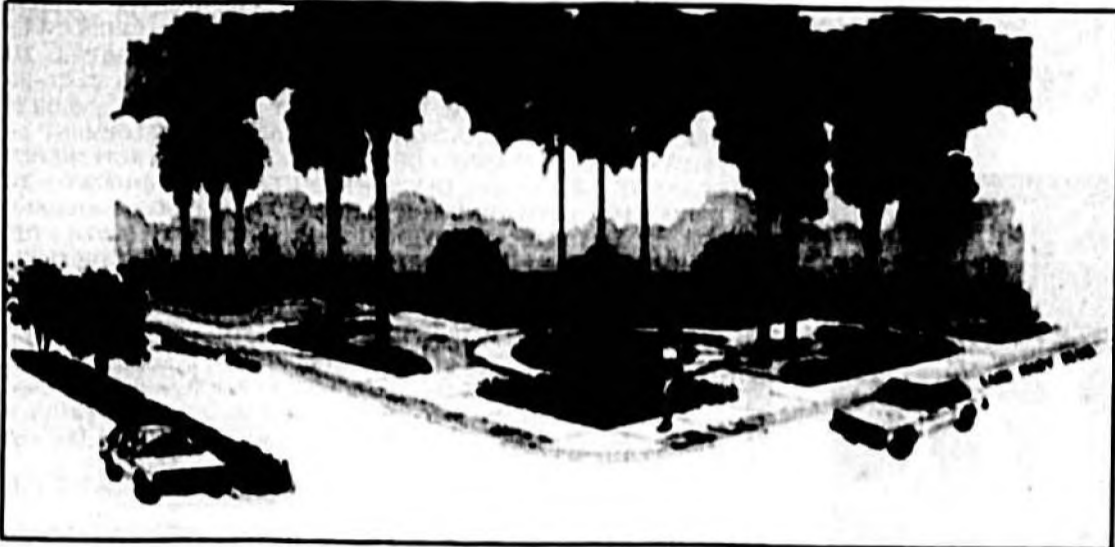
The options committee seemed from the get-go to abhor Option "C" and favor Option "A". After interviewing Sheriff Don Emlinger, some on the committee said they saw many advantages of Option "B". Emlinger told the group he was dumbfounded the SPD frequently ignored calling for help as if this meant it was admitting it wasn't able to do the job.

On Tuesday the committee voted unanimously for Option "A", and recommended that Chief Joe Dillard be given full reign of the SPD and make the decisions to which services the agency needed from the sheriff's office.

Dale, however, said he had "an uncomfortable feeling" about the interpretation of the committee's recommendations. "There's a lot more to what happened at Tuesday's meeting than an all the way with Option A," he said. "If you look harder, you'll realize there's a lot of

Another chain restaurant to join cluster near mall

SANFORD - A crab house will be the latest eatery to join the growing number of major chain establishments near the Seminole Towne Center.

Landry's Seafood Restaurants Inc., based in Houston, Texas, will build a Joe's Crab Shack near the Gateway Plaza.

Also part of the seafood chain are The Crab House and Willie G's restaurants.

There has been a lot of interest from the restaurant industry to construct in that area, according to Russ Gibson, city and land development coordinator.

"This location meets the criteria for construction because of its high visibility and the high traffic corridor," Gibson

said. Major benefits for commercial development in that area include the mall, the existing infrastructure and the proposed GreeneWay extension which will be just south of the movie theater complex at Seminole Towne Center, he said.

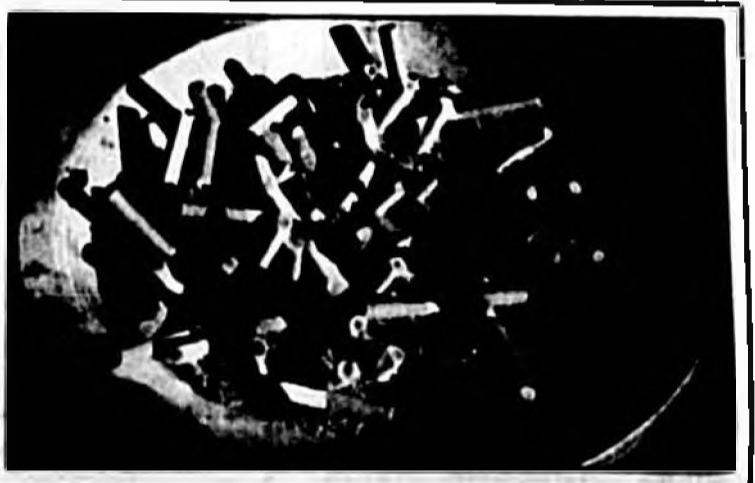
"With any commercial development there are positive

Police warn: Be smart don't speed

SANFORD - Speeders, beware! Lead feet will start to lighten around the city of Sanford now that the Sanford Police Department has purchased a S.M.A.R.T. (Speed Monitoring Awareness Radar Trailer).

"I think it's [the trailer] great," said Sgt. Darrell Brewer of the Sanford Police Department. Brewer said that the device came to the department

last week, and now it is already on the city streets registering unlawful speeds.

The trailer is nothing new. Many cities and counties including Lake Mary have their own trailer. This piece of equipment shows approaching drivers what the posted speed limit is on the particular street it is stationed on and shows in lighted numbers the actual speed of the driver. According to Brewer, when the display is red instead of white then the driver is at an unlawful speed.

S.M.A.R.T. trailer can be used for more than showing miles per hour. The department will also be able to utilize the trailer to take surveys such as the number of vehicles and number of speeders at a particular time of day. This will help the department to determine if the speed limit on a particular street should be raised or lowered and if some other type of traffic control device needs to be in place (i.e. a 4-way stop, a traffic light, etc.). Also, the trailer is equipped

with certified radar. This feature will enable police officers to write traffic citations to speeding violators.

"Hopefully, after being strategically placed, it will get their [drivers] attention and slow their speed downs," said Sanford Police Chief Joe Dillard. "I'm excited about it."

The trailer is now located at West Third Street and the area of Cedar Avenue. Dillard said that the device will be used "quite frequently".

For firefighters, practice makes perfect

ALTAMONTE SPRINGS - Even in its abandoned state, the old Teague Middle School will serve the community until the end.

Slated for demolition later this month, the old building circa 1973 is the training site for the Altamonte Springs Fire Department this week. The fire department is always on the lookout for buildings scheduled for demolition because its the most practical means of on-the-job training, according to John Rogers, captain and public information officer for the fire department.

"This is good training because we have the chance to experience a live fire," Rogers said. "For our people and especially the newer people who may not have experienced a live fire yet, this is a good way to train and evaluate skills under controlled conditions."

Firefighters started their 6-day training session with forcible entry techniques and search and rescue drills. About 15 firefighters, split into two groups, one in the morning and the other in the afternoon, could be seen prying open locks and knocking down walls with axes and sledgehammers. Five fire trucks were at the school during the drills, in-

cluding some from the Seminole County Fire Department, which also joined in on some of the sessions, Rogers said.

For some of the exercises, firefighters were required to enter a darkened smoke-filled room and save the "victims."

Not to worry, though, Rogers said because the victims were really mannequins.

Save the Everglades with plate

The Everglades Foundation and the South Florida Water Management District are collaborating on an "Everglades River of Grass" specialty license plate.

Fees generated from sales of the license plates would be deposited into the Everglades Trust Fund established by passage of Amendment 6 last November and would be used for Everglades conservation and restoration, not for salaries or administration.

In addition to providing revenue, the tags would enhance public visibility of the Everglades.

In order to request the legislature to establish an Everglades River of Grass license plate, the foundation must submit the signatures of 10,000 persons with vehicles registered in Florida who state their intent to purchase such a tag.

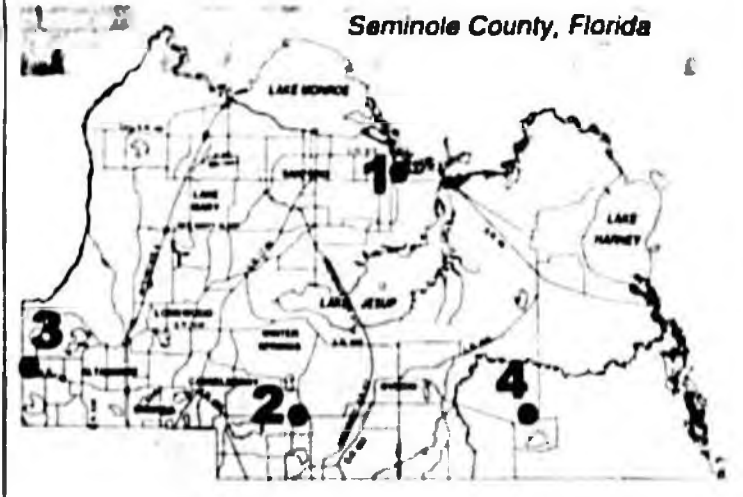
Notice is hereby given that the Seminole County Board of County Commissioners (BCC) will conduct a public hearing on November 25, 1997, beginning at the times given below, or as soon thereafter as possible, in the County Services Building, 1101 East First Street, Sanford, Florida, Room 1028 (Board Chambers). The purpose of this hearing is to consider recommendations of the Seminole County Local Planning Agency/Planning & Zoning Commission and Florida Department of Community Affairs, receive public input and input from any local government or other agency on the following described Large Scale Land Use Amendments to the Seminole County Comprehensive Plan, and rezonings. The Board may also consider amendments to any number of the Plan Elements listed in the ordinance below. If these land use amendments are approved by the Board, an ordinance will be enacted with the following title:

AN ORDINANCE FURTHER AMENDING ORDINANCE NUMBER 91-13, AS PREVIOUSLY AMENDED, KNOWN AS THE SEMINOLE COUNTY COMPREHENSIVE PLAN, AMENDING THE TEXT OF THE IMPLEMENTATION, FUTURE LAND USE, CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS, CONSERVATION, DESIGN, DRAINAGE, HOUSING, INTERGOVERNMENTAL COORDINATION, LIBRARY SERVICES, PORTS, AVIATION AND RELATED FACILITIES, POTABLE WATER, PUBLIC SAFETY, RECREATION AND OPEN SPACE, SANITARY SEWER, SOLID WASTE, TRAFFIC CIRCULATION, MASS TRANSIT AND ECONOMIC ELEMENTS OF THE SEMINOLE COUNTY COMPREHENSIVE PLAN, AND THE DEFINITIONS AND INTRODUCTION SECTIONS OF THE SEMINOLE COUNTY COMPREHENSIVE PLAN, AMENDING THE FUTURE LAND USE MAP OF THE SEMINOLE COUNTY COMPREHENSIVE PLAN BY VIRTUE OF LARGE SCALE DEVELOPMENT AMENDMENTS (LEGAL DESCRIPTIONS ARE SET FORTH AS APPENDICES TO THIS ORDINANCE), CHANGING THE FUTURE LAND USE DESIGNATION ASSIGNED TO CERTAIN PROPERTY FROM (1) SUBURBAN ESTATES TO PLANNED DEVELOPMENT, (2) FROM LOW DENSITY RESIDENTIAL, MEDIUM DENSITY RESIDENTIAL AND OFFICE TO PLANNED DEVELOPMENT, (3) FROM OFFICE TO PLANNED DEVELOPMENT, AND (4) FROM HIGHER INTENSITY PLANNED DEVELOPMENT-TARGET INDUSTRY TO INDUSTRIAL, PROVIDING FOR LEGISLATIVE FINDINGS, PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY, PROVIDING FOR EXCLUSION FROM THE SEMINOLE COUNTY CODE, AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

Seminole H.O.P.E. willing to help

SANFORD - It doesn't matter what city you're in or what neighborhood you are a part of. Seminole H.O.P.E. is willing to help anyone. Seminole H.O.P.E. — an acronym meaning Healthy Options Promoting Empowerment — is an organization ready to assist communities with such problems as gang violence, drugs, etc. But the philosophy is "we help you to help yourself."

Michael Mobley, program director for Seminole H.O.P.E., said the main goal of his program is "community empowerment". He said that the goal is to be "a middle person between all services available — and they are numerous in Seminole County — and the people who need those services."

Seminole H.O.P.E. started as S.C.A.N. (Seminole Chemical Awareness Network), and the program ran for about 15 years. But S.C.A.N. did not do anything on a continuous basis and did not work on a community level. In the summer of 1995, S.C.A.N. decided to change its name and "move to a different level". In October 1995, Seminole H.O.P.E. began.

The Grove Counseling Center Inc. provides the major funding

for Seminole H.O.P.E. But the organization is a branch of the Central Florida Prevention Coalition, which was formed through a partnership with The Grove Counseling Center and the Center for Drug Free Living. The other branch of the C.F.P.C. is Orlando Fights Back. Everything that H.O.P.E. does is either on an independent basis or on a collaborative one.

Most of these prevention programs function on federal monies from the Center of Substance Abuse Prevention in Washington D.C. With that money, Seminole H.O.P.E. is able to support its staff which is comprised of Mobley, two outreach people and a part-time clerk.

H.O.P.E. gets plenty of volunteer support from the various cities within the county. It also receives support from the Seminole County Sheriff's Office. In fact, Sheriff Don Eastinger is chairman of the advisory board for H.O.P.E. Also helping out H.O.P.E. are community organizations and agencies such as Midway Citizens Against Drugs, Seminole County Improvement Association and Oviedo Citizens In Action just to name a few.

Seminole H.O.P.E. has monthly meetings where the

community can come by with problems. However, Mobley said, this is not an opportunity for people to come out, express their concerns and formulate what should be done about their problems. Mobley said that it does not matter what city a person lives in. People can call declaring anonymity and descriptively state what the situation is. There has to be several calls before H.O.P.E. goes into motion, and participants do not do everything. H.O.P.E. tells citizens how to do things and that its

volunteers will help, but they try to teach the communities self-reliance and self-efficiency in dealing with communal problems. There are several activities that H.O.P.E. helps Seminole cities out in: job fairs, youth activities, festivals, drug marches, etc. H.O.P.E. tries to have an activity every month. Only between Thanksgiving and the beginning of the new year is there a break for the agency.

"We let the residents do their thing," said Mobley. "People are noticing what we are doing."

Option "B" - getting help from the sheriff involved, too.

Dale said that Longwood Police Chief Greg Manning's oral briefing to the commission is a very integral part of the process and time table. Manning was chosen chairman of the committee by its members. He was appointed to the committee by the mayor.

It did not please Dale that a package of SPD objectives prepared by Sgt. Darrel Presley and signed in late October by Chief Dillard were given to options committee member Bill Clayton and not to Manning, who headed the group.

Clayton apologized for delivering the package on Tuesday, saying he had mislaid it. Copies were made immediately and distributed during the meeting. Dale said it was inappropriate that SPD chose someone "more sympathetic" to its cause to deliver the document to the others.

The committee members also received on Tuesday a Standards of Conduct booklet issued by the SPD with an effective date of Nov. 15. Manning strongly suggested the department draw up a mission statement and state its rules and values. The 13-page booklet was intended to define the organizational philosophy and values of the SPD, to delineate the Canons of Law Enforcement Ethics and establish basic guidelines of employee conduct.

Conduct toward superiors became a hot topic recently after a member of the SPD was disrespectful to the city's mayor. Dale told the

officer he didn't like his attitude and the officer told Dale he didn't like his. Dale apologized for what happened, the officer did not.

Options Committee member Timothy Hudson, for one, said there had to be changes in the attitude and respect paid to city commissioners and other superiors. He said Tuesday that unless these changes were made, he feared that Chief Joe Dillard was being "set up" to fall.

Dale said Wednesday that he believes the city commissioners should have input in the Standards of Conduct booklet as they hold authority over the police and fire departments of the city - until a decision is made by the citizens of Sanford if they favored having the two agencies report to the city manager. This would take a referendum to change the city charter.

Commissioner Velma Williams, recently named a liaison to the SPD, sat with the options committee at each of its eight meetings and voted on Tuesday.

The other three members of the city commission - Brady Lessard, Whitey Eckstein and Kerry Lyons - made infrequent appearances at the meetings.

Mayor Dale was present at the majority of the meetings including the final one on Tuesday. He left for another appointment shortly before the committee decided on its recommendations. "I didn't expect this so quickly," he said.

Appraised at \$895,000, the city can buy the property for \$750,000 if it can close the sale by Dec. 10. The property is adjacent to The Forest subdivision and had been a proposed site for a Walgreens drug store.

The city plans to develop the site as a park and entrance feature for the city which could also serve as a trailhead for the Cross Seminole Trail that will parallel Rinehart Road. The park could also be used as a future park and ride site for a LYNN stop. There would be approximately 40 parking spaces, a restroom, two shelters, and picnic tables.

The development of the property would also include the building of a right turn lane, from Lake Mary Boulevard onto Rinehart, a needed safety buffer. Litton told commissioners in his recommendation.

Money for the park's development would come from various sources, according to Litton, such as the Florida Recreation Development Assistance Program. Several developments that impact Rinehart Road will contribute funds in the amount of approximately

\$400,000 for transportation improvements to Rinehart as well. "It's not going to cost the city anything," Litton said.

The property is currently owned by Commerce Point Partnership.

The purchase must be approved by the city commission

and must be opened to public discussion in two hearings prior to the closing date. The first reading will be tonight at Lake Mary City Hall. The regular commission meeting is scheduled to begin at 7 p.m. Lake Mary City Hall is located at 100 N. Country Club Rd.

Using guidelines from the National Fire Protection Association, Rogers said prior to the drill firefighters lifted the carpeting, checked for asbestos and also checked the stability of the roof. Fires were kept under control in a concrete block during the exercise.

"This was a safe and controlled drill," he said, adding that firefighters also opened holes in the roof for proper ventilation.

Rogers said the old school is holding up fantastically.

"This would stand up to a nuclear blast," he said. "We've torn the heck out of it and it's still standing strong."

Rogers called the training exercise essential.

"This allows us to better hone our skills so we are prepared to handle emergencies to better serve the public," he said.

The demolition area has been flagged and fenced off because the construction crew still needs to get in and salvage items such as wiring, Rogers said.

Students in grades six through eight, who last attended classes at the round building in October 1996, are now housed in a state of the art two-story brick facility. When the old Teague on Sand Lake Road is demolished, construction will begin at the site for the Lake Brantley High School expansion. The \$36 million, two-year project includes major renovations and several new structures for Lake Brantley.

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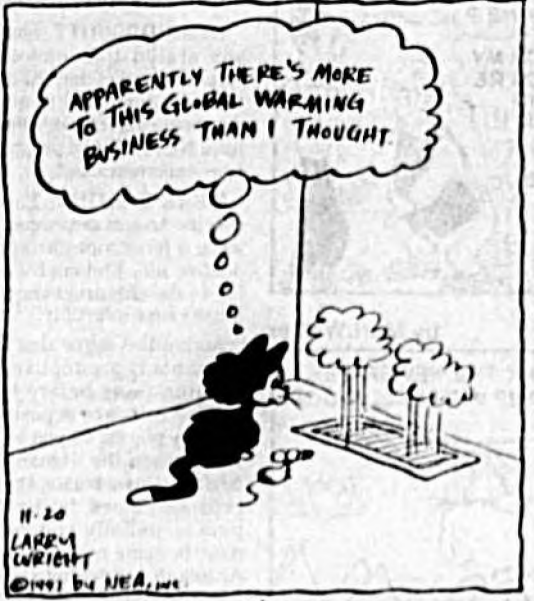

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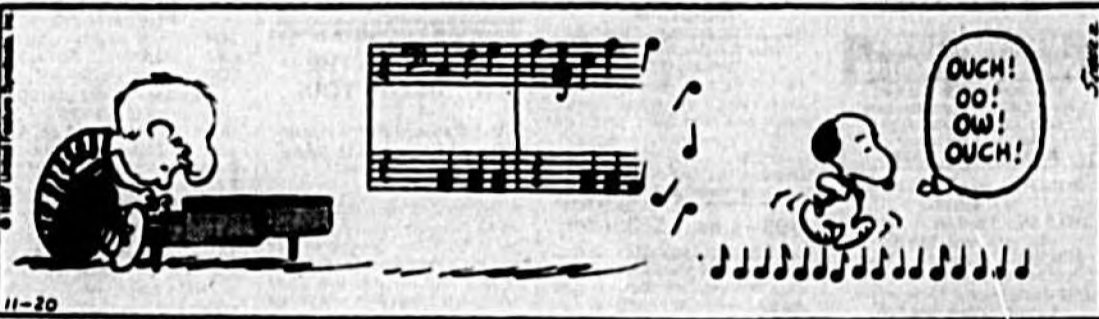

What causes endometriosis?



PETER GOTT, M.D.

DEAR DR. GOTT: Some time ago, you stated that endometriosis is caused by collections of uterine tissue that are deposited in out-of-the-way places during fetal development. But I have NEVER been pregnant! How did I get endometriosis?

DEAR READER: These nests of uterine tissue developed when YOU were a fetus, not during your reproductive life. Endometriosis has nothing to do with pregnancy, except that it can cause infertility.

Authorities agree that at the time a woman's reproductive organs are forming (long before birth), some uterine cells are deposited in out-of-the-way places, as you so aptly put it. Later, when the woman matures and begins to menstruate, these islands of cells also bleed, leading to periodic pain — usually abdominal — that may, in some cases, be quite severe. Although gynecologists often try to suppress these cells using birth-control pills, surgery may be necessary to remove the offending tissue — and restore fertility.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I am a healthy, active 27-year-old female. After a recent, routine exam, my doctor ordered a cardiac ultrasound because he heard a murmur. Should I be concerned?

DEAR READER: Murmurs are extra sounds, heard with the stethoscope, between heartbeats. Normal heart sounds are: lub-dup, lub-dup. A murmur sounds like this: lub-shhh-dup, lub-shhh-dup. Murmurs arise from eddy currents of blood passing through a cardiac valve that either opens incompletely or closes improperly.

In an otherwise healthy woman your age, the most common cause of a murmur is mitral valve prolapse. The mitral valve fails to close completely. This abnormality, which can affect as many as 20 percent of healthy young women, is not a serious disorder, although it may be associated with episodes of unexpectedly rapid pulse. The disorder is diagnosed by an ultrasound test of the heart, showing the floppy valve.

Your doctor is following appropriate medical protocol. An ultrasound will reveal whether you have MVP and if so, how much. If you have a significant degree of prolapse, he will advise you to take antibiotics at times when bacteria enter your bloodstream — for example, during dental cleaning and certain types of surgery. This preventive strategy will block bacteria from colonizing your mitral valve and causing a serious infection.

Therefore, you should have the test and follow your doctor's recommendations.

DEAR DR. GOTT: For several years, I have had a painful lump just above the nail on one finger. Although

my family doctor called it a ganglion, my dermatologist diagnosed a mucous cyst. She has repeatedly removed clear, jelly-like material from the cyst, but it keeps coming back. Both doctors seem reluctant to prescribe more aggressive therapy.

WIN AT BRIDGE

First one thing, then another

The second magazine from Britain is International Bridge Monthly. It started in 1974 as a publication for all, but a few years later, under new management, it was re-aligned toward tournament players. Then, two years ago, a lower-level Teaching Supplement was included. However, this has been dropped from the issues sent outside the British Isles unless extra money is paid. (The editor feels that Acol bidding theory doesn't interest overseas players.)

This deal occurred during a match between Scotland and Wales.

Strong 4-4-1 hands are difficult to bid. Here, John Matheson (South) tried to solve the problem by opening two no-trump. It looked bad when

partner transferred to spades. However, there was an advantage in the play. (Note that North used a Texas four-heart transfer, a ubiquitous agreement in North America, but one that was almost unknown in Britain. In recent years, though, many British experts have adopted American methods.)

After winning with the club ace, Matheson cashed two top hearts, discarding dummy's second club. A club ruff in the dummy was followed by a trump to the king. East ducking because he couldn't anticipate South's singleton. Declarer cashed his third top heart, ruffed the heart nine in the dummy, took the two diamond winners ending in hand, and ruffed a second club in the dummy for his 10th trick. Matheson collected the spade king, three hearts, two diamonds, the club ace and three ruffs in the dummy.
