## Kidnapped Girl Returns Home After Escape

### Police On West Coast Hunting Abductor; Girl Is Unharmed After Long Ordeal

LODI, Calif., Jan. 22 (AP)—A 17-year-old high school student is safe at home today while police search the West Coast for her kidnapper. The girl, Althea Dean Devine, disappeared Monday night when she went to a photograph studio. Police officials said she escaped from a cabin in a tourist camp near Sacramento yesterday afternoon while her abductor was absent presumably trying to arrange for the collection of \$10,000 ransom.

The entire West Coast is being searched for a man police say used the names Everett Westcott Stiles and William Giles while posing as an agent for an eastern publishing house. Police said Miss Devine told them that the man bound and gagged her after leaving the photo studio and drove to the camp with her.

The owner of the motel where Miss Devine said she was held overnight by a kidnapper was interviewed. He said that there were several unexplained circumstances about the girl's story which puzzled him. Joe Shively, the motel's court owner, said "I don't think a kid would be tied up in one of my shacks here would have said something about it or tried to tell me about being kidnapped."

The girl herself told her story today. She said that she did not know the man who armed her latest version of the 26-hour ordeal. She said she was in a room in which she was kept by California highway patrolmen in Sacramento as saying that she struggled fiercely with the abductor.

## Cold Weather Freezes Eastern Half Of Country

CHICAGO, Jan. 22 (AP)—The cold wave that moved out of the Midwest Tuesday left the eastern half of the nation and the Southeast as far as the Gulf of Mexico. In some eastern cities, temperatures dropped well below freezing, a drop of 40 degrees in some cities compared with Monday's springlike weather.

In Atlanta, the thermometer dropped to 21 degrees and it was 18 at Nashville, Tenn. Even in Jacksonville, the mercury was only a few degrees above the freezing mark.

In the East, Pittsburgh and Cleveland were the coldest spots with readings of two above zero. Cincinnati and Harrisburg, Pa., had 8 above, Philadelphia 10 and New York and Washington 14 above. It was below zero in North and South Boston was a crisp 17 degrees in contrast to 45 on Tuesday.

In the Midwest where the cold wave started, the mercury dropped as low as 24 below in parts of Minnesota today. The Federal Weather Bureau is predicting more moderate temperatures for tomorrow in the north central region.

## Capone Is Improved, Not Out Of Danger

MIAMI BEACH, Jan. 22 (AP)—The gang lord of prohibition days, Al Capone was said to be much improved in his battle with death today. His physician added, however, that Capone was definitely not out of danger. The one-time gangster suffered a stroke early yesterday yesterday at his palm-fringed estate and death was expected momentarily, but last night he regained consciousness and started to improve. This startling change in the condition of the 48-year-old Capone came after hope had practically been abandoned and he was given the last rites of the Roman Catholic Church.

Capone's wife and son, Albert, were at his bedside early today and throughout the night automobiles moved in and out of the gates in the high walls which surrounded the 25-room villa.

## Revision Of Price Support Is Requested

### Secretary Anderson Suggests Federal Action To Change Promise To Farms

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22 (AP)—Agriculture Secretary Clinton Anderson today recommended a revision of the government's promise to support farm prices. The cabinet officer suggested that this be done to avoid a possible outlay of more than two billion dollars and what he termed "waste in production."

Anderson proposed the federal action in a statement to the House Agriculture Committee. He emphasized, however, that changes should be made only with the mutual consent of farmers and the government.

The agriculture secretary pointed out that the government's price support commitment encourages production for a wartime pattern of demand and supply to the end of 1940.

Anderson offered no specific proposals to the committee, but he declared it is vital that the Agriculture Department, the Congress and farmers work together to prevent waste in production, effort, money and soil.

The cabinet officer estimated that it will cost 100 million dollars next year for export subsidies on cotton alone.

Anderson declared "I am not suggesting for a moment that we back down from the part of the government's commitment to farmers."

And to this he added: "That would be unthinkable. We should be better to pay the bill which ever the cost, but that should be a part of the cost of the war."

## Ruling Made By Treasury On Pay Suits

### Department States Wages Paid Under Portal Claims Are Tax Deductible

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22 (AP)—The Treasury Department ruled today that employers who have to pay back wages claims under portal pay suits may charge the payments off against taxes for the years involved.

Corporate taxes were much higher through 1945 because the Excess Profits Tax was then in effect. The ruling means that the rule will be much higher than would be the case if the deductions were taken from current taxes.

The ruling was announced by a federal judge in a decision handed down in the case of the American Telephone and Telegraph Co. v. United States.

Miss Devine viewed Shelton in the glare of automobile headlights on a lonely county road outside Lodi. She studied his features, and said: "This is not the man."

The young student's mother, Mrs. John Edward Devine, also denied that Shelton was the man who had sent for her daughter the night she disappeared.

Shelton later talked with newspapermen but had little to say. He had "surrendered" and accompanied police to Lodi on learning that the girl had selected his picture from a police file. Afterward, Shelton returned to San Francisco.

Miss Devine disappeared from Lodi Monday night and turned up in Sacramento 24 hours later saying she had been kidnapped but had managed to break loose from bonds. The kidnapper was said to have placed around her hands and feet Sinto ties, which have been of help in attempting to find a man fitting the description the girl gave of the alleged abductor.

Citrus Market Report Reveals Downward Trend

Conditions Result Of Heavy Volume, Low Prices, Poor Fruit

LAKELAND, Jan. 23.—(Special)—The few bright spots in the citrus market picture are largely overshadowed by unfavorable conditions resulting from heavy volume, low prices and, in some instances, poor quality fruit, according to latest reports from the Florida Citrus Commission's dealer service men.

Any helpful effects derived Christmas time apparently were exhausted, some of the reports indicate in reviewing the market situation for the week ending Jan. 17.

Not only is Florida citrus receiving tough competition from California, Texas and Arizona grapefruit, but fresh apples and canned tomatoes and pineapple juice are in heavy supply, the citrus commission representatives pointed out.

Good results from canned fruit promotions were reported by several of the dealers.

Edison terminals in Philadelphia are contributing its part to the citrus deal, recent troubles at the following report from a commission representative indicates.

The most important development in the market during the latter part of the past week was the complete shutdown of the Philadelphia terminal and whole sale market. At the time of last week's report it appeared that all difference between the terminal's owner and jobbers had been settled at least temporarily, but it closed almost again this week causing almost complete paralysis of fresh fruit and produce movement into this area through the Philadelphia terminal. All wholesalers contacted reported that they were thoroughly disgusted with the recent developments and indicated that they would go their way from New York and Baltimore in the case might be. An increase in cost will be reflected in the retail prices due to these changes, they said.

It appears that the flood of post-holiday shipments hit this area with full force earlier this past week, as an abundance of fruit is in evidence, most of it at low prices. All of the trade expressed opinions that citrus was cheap for anybody's good.

While most reports said that Florida oranges were improving in quality and were moving in better condition, there still were several complaints along these lines. Tangencies seemed to be holding up a little better, but there were complaints of excessive decay in many shipments, the report said, while grapefruit received its usual compliments from the trade for fine quality.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23.—(AP)—The nation today lost one of its top Marine Corps leaders when Lieut. Gen. Roy Geiger died in Bethesda Naval Hospital.

His death came only eight days before he was due to retire from active service. Geiger entered the hospital last Thursday. Physicians said he suffered from inflammation of the veins and pulmonary complications.

Sixty-one-year-old Geiger commanded the Tenth Army at Okinawa and later the Fleet Marine Force in the Pacific.

He entered the Marines as an enlisted man and rose in financial rank during 40 years of service in both wars.

Geiger was active in the invasion of Guadalcanal. He was a pioneer of Marine aviation and was known as a tough, hard-driving commander willing to take on any job he gave his men.

First Official Check For \$50 Honored; Drawn Against Sum Annal Turned Over

ATLANTA, Jan. 23.—(AP)—Lieut. Governor M. E. Thompson said today that he has been recognized as acting governor of Georgia where it really counts. He announced today that the Fulton National Bank of Atlanta had cashed without question the first executive check drawn since he took office. It was a \$50 check for postage, drawn against a \$97,000 balance turned over to Thompson by Ellis Arnall, when he retired as governor.

Herman Talmadge, Thompson's rival, told newsmen yesterday that he expected to get that \$97,000 fund in time to meet his payroll on Feb. 1. To which Thompson, pointing to the fact that his check had been honored, replied today: "I think this answers Talmadge."

Meanwhile, Ellis Arnall is in Montgomery today, having audience with the new Alabama governor, James Folsom Arnall's itinerary will bring him to St. Petersburg tomorrow where he is scheduled to make two lectures. He spoke in Mobile, Ala. last night and pointed out that Herman Talmadge has already felt the growing opposition of the Georgia General Assembly.
