Death Takes Carter Glass Of Virginia

88-Year Old Senate Member Was Father Of One Time Secretary Of Treasury

WASHINGTON, May 28, (AP)—Senator Carter Glass of Virginia, long time member of congress, died this morning. He was 88 years of age and was known as the "Father of the Federal Reserve System." He was also a former member of the cabinet.

Since June, 1942 Glass has been unable to appear in the Senate. Virginia Republicans sought unsuccessfully last year to have the seat declared vacant and a special election called to name a successor. The Virginia courts threw out the suit, and the Supreme Court declined to review the case. However, Glass continued to make himself felt in Congress, because of his statements.

He had been elected to the House of Representatives nine times before he resigned in 1918 to be President Wilson's Secretary of the Treasury. He left the cabinet two years later to accept appointment as a Senator. He was re-elected five times, most recently to serve until 1942.

He declared President Roosevelt's invitation again to be Treasury Secretary in 1933. It was generally known that his reason was failure of the president-elect to give what Glass could regard as satisfactory assurance of a "sound-money" policy. The Virginia was bitterly displeased later when President Roosevelt abandoned the gold standard, and he also broke with the Administration over NIRA crop reduction federal spending and the 1937 Supreme Court reorganization plan.

Nevertheless, Mr. Roosevelt, who fondly called Glass "an unrequited friend," re-named his personal friend.

Glass received much of the credit for creation of the Federal Reserve System, because he helped draft the Federal Reserve law when he was chairman of the House Banking and Currency Committee in 1913.

Glass' first wife, Aetredia, died in 1917. Three years later he married Mrs. Beattie of Asheville, Va. A widow many years his junior, Glass' son, Powell in Lynchburg, newspaper executive, died last July.

RICHMOND, May 28, (AP)—The governor of Virginia, William Tuck this afternoon disclosed that he will make an appointment to fill the vacancy in the United States Senate caused by the death of Carter Glass. However, the governor has declined to discuss possible choices for the post. Governor Tuck made his announcement from Oklahoma City, where he is at ending the conference of governors.

Under Virginia law, the Governor's appointee will serve only until the general election in November. At that time, a successor to Glass will be elected to fill the unexpired Senate term, which runs until 1949. The death of Senator Glass also means that Virginia Democrats will hold a state convention to nominate a candidate for the Senate.

Rites Held For Mrs. Rebecca J. Franklin

Funeral services were held Monday afternoon at the Osteen Methodist Church for Mrs. Rebecca J. Franklin, resident for the past three and a half years in that community, who died at her home at 1:30 o'clock Saturday. The Rev. E. Gilman officiated.

The remains were sent by the Erickson Funeral Home to Newark, Ohio for interment and were accompanied by the husband, Benjamin B. Franklin of Osteen and two daughters, Mrs. L. F. Giles of Huntington, W. Va. and Mrs. John W. D. Moore of Sanford, which is located at the new bowling alley on Magnolia Avenue, at Precinct 1 at the Old A.C.L. Depot, 65 persons had said. The colored vote was exceptionally light.

One thing we like about Senator Pepper is that for the moment we have forgotten what it was.

Nation's Feet Getting Bigger and Healthier—headline. These transportation strikes may have their advantages after all, or was it gasoline rationing?

The Senate is all set to enact a teen-age draft bill. If you do not think the government should draft teen-agers in time of peace, you should let your representative know in Congress.

Senator Pepper denies that he is going to resign from the Senate and become an attorney for the CIO. However, he didn't deny that he might continue to represent the CIO in the Senate.

The results of the voting in Czechoslovakia doesn't prove much except that if you were in Czechoslovakia and under the thumb of Joe Stalin, you'd probably be a communist too if you wanted to live.

We wish more people could read the story by Victor Kravchenko on "The Chosen Freedom" appearing currently in the Tampa Tribune. In it he explains why in Russia you agree with Joe Stalin or you get out, if they don't get you first.

Senator Pepper expresses the doubt that the people of Florida are really opposed to his stand in the labor controversy. He hasn't heard yet that the people of Florida voted two years ago to outlaw the closed shop in this state.

Phil Barney who is apparently able to get more chewing gum than he needs for his own use, though it is not always of the bubble variety, complains that if most were not so scarce, he'd have a plank steak if he could find the plank. We wish we could accommodate you, Phil, but wouldn't a little ferasseed squirrel do just as well?

Henry Wallace, who once wrote a book called "America Must Choose," says that President Truman is going to run for re-election in 1948 and that he will support him. But of course, if President Truman should change his mind about running, that would leave the gate wide open for Henry, and then it would be only natural for him to expect the support of Truman and Truman's friends.

About twice as many students will try to enter college next fall as can be admitted, according to Reconversion Director Snyder. Buildings to accommodate them all can be built in the course of a few years, but it takes teachers to teach students. And not everyone can teach. Colleges and universities throughout the nation will be needing about twice as many teachers as they have at present. Public schools as a consequence will suffer unless provision is made to pay them more.

The type of misinformation the public gets constantly these days from their government is illustrated by a recent statement from the Commerce Department which said in effect that the nation is wealthy as a result of the war, and then lists the 25 billion dollars in currency, the 75 billion in demand deposits, the 100 billion in government bonds to prove it. Money, as everyone knows who has passed the first grade in economics, is not wealth, but merely a measure of wealth. And certainly government bonds are not wealth either, but on the contrary, debt. If a nation could become wealthy merely by issuing bonds, every nation would be wealthy. As a matter of fact, the wealth of a nation lies in its natural resources, and the wealth which is made of them, the goods and services produced.

Walking To Health

Despite President Truman's worries—and surely he has plenty—he is in excellent health at 62. After a year at his man-killing job he is said to be in better physical condition than when he took office. There is a reason. He takes excellent care of himself. Four times a week he drives to some unannounced spot away from the White House shortly after 6 A. M. and takes a long walk. Except for a secret service man, he is unaccompanied so there can be no discussion of the many problems on the nation's docket.

He swims regularly in the White House pool. He rises daily at about 6:30, eats a light breakfast that does not include coffee or tea, neither of which he drinks. If he is kept up late at official functions he rises only a half hour later the next day.

Walking is one of the most beneficial of all exercises, and one which Americans less and less adopt. If a man with as heavy a schedule as that of the President of the United States, can manage to squeeze in time for walking, certainly the rest of this country's citizens, whatever their responsibilities, can also do it. American business men, so many of whom run into physical bankruptcy in the 50's, could well adopt Mr. Truman's walking program, however they feel about some other things he does.

Cats And A Hospital

There are 1,300,000 stutterers in the United States. The affliction often interferes with normal human relations, keeping a job and the like. One of the few places offering treatment is New York City's National Hospital for Speech Disorders, where, it is said, more stutterers congregate than anywhere else in the world.

Treatment here is based on teaching, relaxation, since stuttering is a manifestation, usually, of long-accumulated tensions. An allied difficulty is co-ordination. Stutterers find it hard to stand on one foot. Many persons who never stuttered in their lives would be helped by cultivating relaxed attitudes toward every-day programs and emergencies. The cat knows all about it. Watch her stretched full length on the hearth before a fire. She has mastered co-ordination, too. She can balance on a high board fence, a thin branch on a high tree. So far as is known no cat has ever stuttered.

The New York hospital and the cat both have lessons not only for the stutterers of the world, but for the rest of us forced to live in the atomic age's taut tempo.

Latin Today

Latin is not yet dead. Oscar Lange, the former Chicago professor who is Poland's representative on the United Nations' Security Council, uses it in letters to his friends. This continues the old Polish tradition by which all educated persons learned Latin along with their native tongue, using it in the Diet or legislative assembly.

Latin has been suggested as an international language for learned magazines. The specialist who wants to keep up with his subject under present circumstances needs to know English, French, German, Italian, Spanish, and probably several other languages. Till recently he could get along without knowing Russian, but not since Russian science began to blossom forth. If magazines for these specialists were written in Latin, they would have a much easier time.

Of course there are other candidates for the honor of being an international language. There is Esperanto, whose vocabulary might need developing to include the necessary scientific terms. There is also English. If language and race jealousies do not stand in the way, English will probably be the solution.

Martial To Marital

"The shootin' war is over, but, believe me, there's plenty of action on the home front. We've changed over from martial to marital." So spoke a returned GI, whose foreign-born war bride, unable to adjust to life in these United States, had just sued him for divorce.

The divorce rate is rising in all parts of the country. The complex problems of housing shortage, unsympathetic in-laws, children who are strangers, civilian jobs and all the rest make post war life for thousands of veterans anything but peaceful.

Such are the fruits of war. Upheavals continue, personal, national, international. Patience, restraint, compromise and an effort to understand the view from the other side of the fence—such are the ingredients for peaceful relations in the home and in the world.

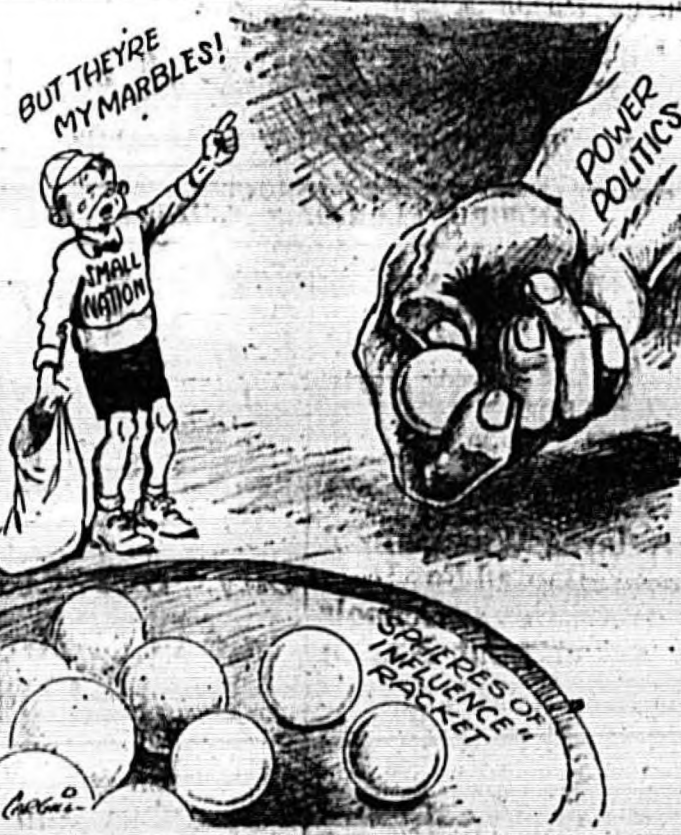

TOO LATE TO CLASSIFY

While candidates confronted with a second primary are gnashing their teeth and tearing their hair in an effort to arouse an apathetic electorate and get them to the polls on May 28th, my good friend Jack Murray, political and feature writer for the Tampa Morning Tribune, by-passed the coming run-off completely and began talking about the next gubernatorial melee.

Visiting in Tallahassee last week, he claims he found more interest in the subject of who is going to run for Governor than in what may happen to the several candidates in the present run-off.

According to Jack, the two chaps being most talked about as probable candidates for Governor at this time are Fuller Warren and Dan McCarry. Well, Fuller has been running for about six years and it is a foregone conclusion that he will have his name on the ballot in the next gubernatorial go-round. Just how successful he will be in gathering votes is a matter of conjecture.

A lot depends upon who his opponents may be. In any event he will probably find that it is going to take more than a slap and a Senator Clatsen accent to get by in the coming event for most folks are beginning to take their politics a little more seriously and they are going to demand a bit more action and a bit less talk from those they select to handle their affairs.

Young Dan McCarry made an enviable record in the legislature and as a speaker of the House. He has a strong following and could be developed into a strong candidate. He has plenty of time to make up his mind and fix his fences and it will be well to keep an eye on him in the future.

Three cabinet members are being frequently mentioned as possible gubernatorial candidates, Tom Watson, Attorney General, Colin English, State Superintendent of Public Instruction and Edwin Larson, State Treasurer. They are all good men and all have a host of friends and supporters.

Of the three, Tom Watson seems the most likely to enter the race and the strongest from the standpoint of acting votes, and after all votes are what it takes to win an election. Tom gets more publicity the year round and with less effort than most other candidates would be able to develop in an active campaign.

But maybe we should get back to earth and take a last minute look at the second primary that will be held on Tuesday, May 28th. In the few counties where local contests are of especial interest to voters a good turnout can be expected at the polls but otherwise all indications point to a light vote. It is doubtful if any of the candidates will poll as many votes as they expect.

In the face for Justice of the Supreme Court, all reports I have been able to gather seem to indicate that Judge Paul D. Barnes is developing increasing strength and will probably surprise a lot of folks including Raleigh Petteway when the votes are counted.

Paul beat Petteway to a pulp in Dade County where they both reside and campaign workers are making the most of this in their state-wide effort. While Supreme Court races are usually glib, a punch-line attached to Judge Barnes is a honey, for in six words it presents one of the strongest selling points in favor of the candidate: "It is the slogan 'As impartial as a traffic light'."

In the race for Railroad Commissioner, Fred W. Brown, who made such an amazing race in the first go-round, continues to show increasing strength. He has a tough opponent in King but it seems to be a neck and neck affair.

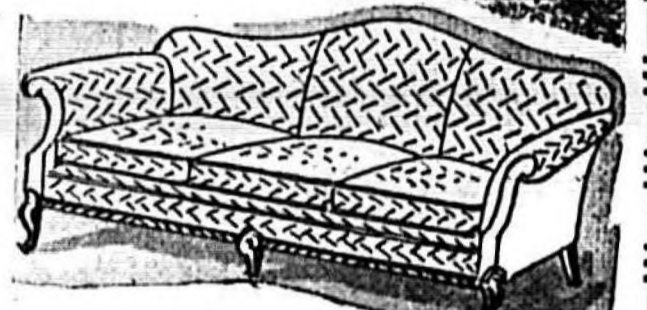

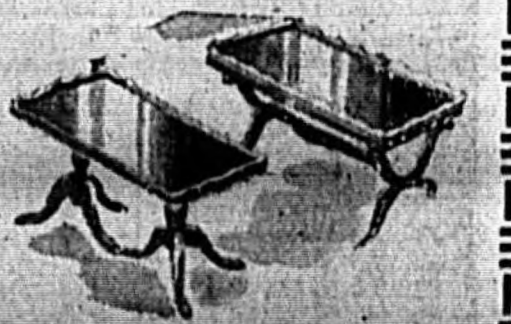

STRIKE OF COAL MINERS IS SETTLED

Senate Will Vote On Labor Draft By 6 P. M.

Poll Indicates Body Will Not Accept Draft Provisions of Truman Measure

WASHINGTON—The House has passed the Senate version of the Case Strike Control Bill. The measure will now go to the White House.

WASHINGTON, May 29, (AP)—The Senate today agreed to vote by 6:00 P. M., E.D.T., on whether to retain a provision to draft strikers in President Truman's emergency labor legislation. The agreement to set a vote deadline was asked by majority leader Allen Barkley. The Kentucky Democrat also won an agreement to debate on the measure as a whole to 30 minutes for each Senator.

These actions were taken amid indications by an Associated Press poll that the Senate would not accept the labor draft provision. At the same time, there was new evidence that the President intended to stand by his guns to secure his emergency labor legislation. Senator Allen Ellender said after a call at the White House that the Chief Executive was determined to obtain passage of the bill. The Louisiana Democrat said that he had called upon Mr. Truman to assure his own support of the measure. Ellender declared that he felt that the President should have power to protect the country from internal enemies, and from what he termed uncontrollable labor leaders.

In the House, the Rules Committee has recommended that the House give an immediate opportunity to accept or reject without change the Senate version of the Case Labor Bill. If such a procedure is approved by two-thirds of the House, members then will have to accept the Senate amendment in a district-by-district vote. The main amendments voted by the Senate prohibit employer contributions to union-administered welfare funds, incorporate provisions of the House Amending bill, and extend the cooling-off period before a strike from 30 to 60 days.

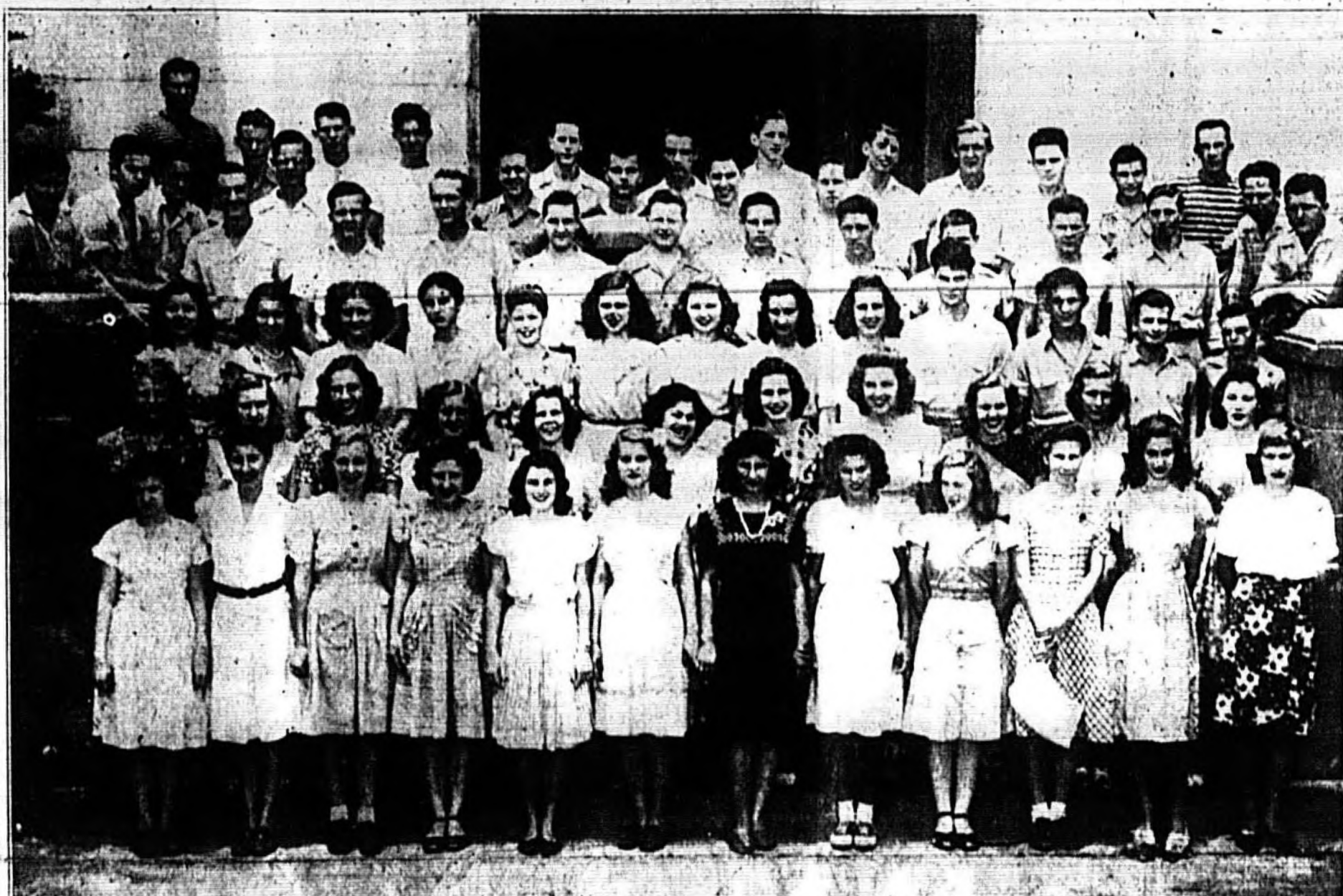
Senator Says Strike Won't Hurt Shipping

WASHINGTON, May 29, (AP)—Senator George Radcliffe said after leaving the White House today that the threatened Maritime strike will not prevent operation of the nation's merchant shipping. Newman asked the Maryland Democrat who would run the vessels if the strike started on June 15 as scheduled. Radcliffe replied, "The ships are going to run—you can bet on that." When he was asked if this meant government operation, he started that someone would sail the vessels. He did not amplify.
