

Choppers, Jets Smash 245 Supply Sampans

RAMON (AP) — American helicopter gunships and fighter-bombers have smashed 245 sampans carrying supplies and 400 men in the Viet Cong base area near the Cambodian border, U.S. military officials said today.

The attack, which took place over a 24-hour period, was the largest of its kind since the start of the Vietnam War, U.S. military officials said today.

The Viet Cong base area, located in the delta region of South Vietnam, is a major supply route for the enemy. It is estimated that 200,000 tons of supplies are moved through the area each month.

The attack was carried out by a task force of 12 helicopters and 12 fighter-bombers. The helicopters dropped napalm and incendiary bombs on the sampans, while the fighter-bombers strafed the area with machine gun fire.

The Viet Cong suffered heavy losses, including 400 men killed and 400 captured. The sampans were destroyed or damaged beyond repair.

The attack was a major blow to the Viet Cong's supply line. It is estimated that the Viet Cong will have to spend several weeks to replace the supplies that were destroyed.

The U.S. military officials said that the attack was a "demonstration of the power of the air force." They said that the air force will continue to attack the Viet Cong's supply lines in the future.

Milk Prices Hiked 4-10 Cents in Some Stores

Local retail food outlets today reported that milk prices to the consumer have increased. A & P said that milk prices have increased 10 cents a gallon, while Food Fair and Handy Food Stores say prices were hiked four cents a gallon. On the other hand, two of the largest retailers—Winn-Dixie and Publix—reported their milk prices have not gone up, as yet.

All said that they did not yet know of any further increase as a result of the new Federal Milk Marketing order.

Area retail dairies report that farmers are not pleased by the Federal initiative to raise the price of raw milk they will have to pass the increase on to the consumers, but they have not heard any definite plans as yet.

A spokesman for Borden's Dairy, which raised prices for home delivery in February, said it did not anticipate another rise, but everything depends on the government.

The new prices will range from four cents more per gallon, two cents a half gallon, and one cent a quart.

Increases are due to the U.S. Department of Agriculture raising the minimum price farmers can charge from \$1 to \$1.28 per hundredweight (48 quarts) of raw milk, according to Stanley F. Wisniewski, acting director of the Federal Milk Marketing Administration's Fort Lauderdale office.

'Stacked' Delegation Blasted

MIAMI (AP) — The head of the Florida Republican party is forming his own unpledged slate of high-powered republicans to lead the GOP national convention today in opposition to the state slate he claims has been stacked by Gov. Claude Kirk's aides.

State party chairman Will Murfin's action follows his withdrawal from the delegation Monday on the grounds that half of the original delegation has been dropped and Kirk's chief aide, Tom Ferguson, had replaced them with delegates pledged to support the governor "all this way" in a push for the presidency or vice presidency.

Murfin already has received commitments from his unpledged slate from House Republican Leader Don Reed of Boca Raton, Senate Republican whip Tom Slade of Jacksonville, Sen. Rich Johnson of Cocoa Beach, and U. S. Rep. J. Herbert Burke of Hollywood, according to state party publicist Dick Smith.

Smith said Senate Republican leader Bill Young of Pinellas County may also come over to Murfin's slate.

Smith, speaking on behalf of Murfin, made it clear that the party chieftain had not made a final decision to file the slate yet and would consider dropping his idea if Kirk fired Ferguson.

The GOP chairman said Kirk is surrounded by "a group of power-playing opportunists interested in their own ambitions." They think he has a chance to be President and a good chance to be Vice President, he said.

"Completely disregarding the Republican Party of Florida," Murfin said, "these ecologists picture themselves in Washington."

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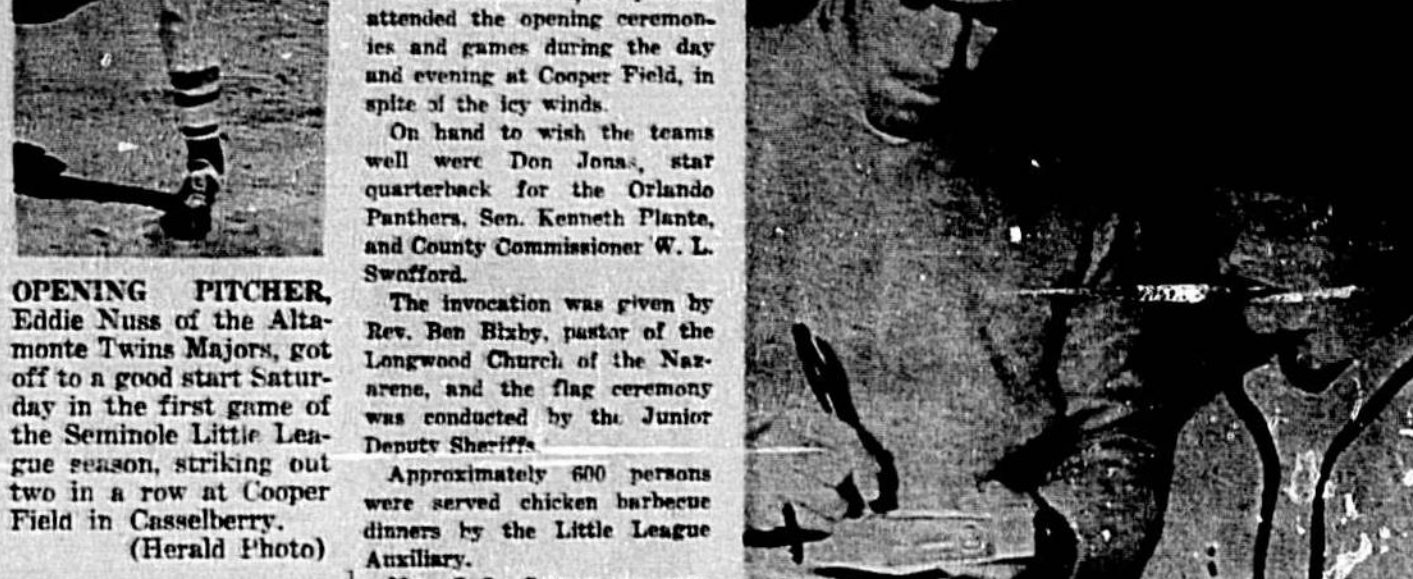

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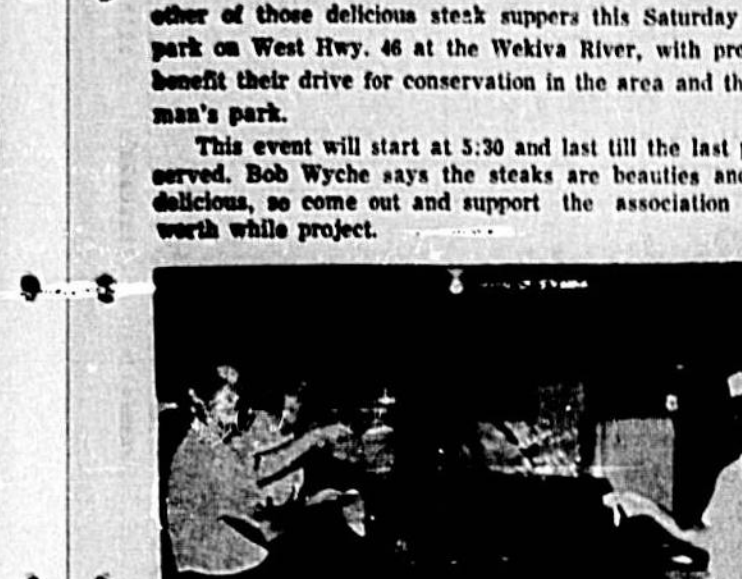

Houston had its eighth game winning streak snapped when Philadelphia broke a 2-2 tie with eight runs in the last three innings for an 8-2 victory.

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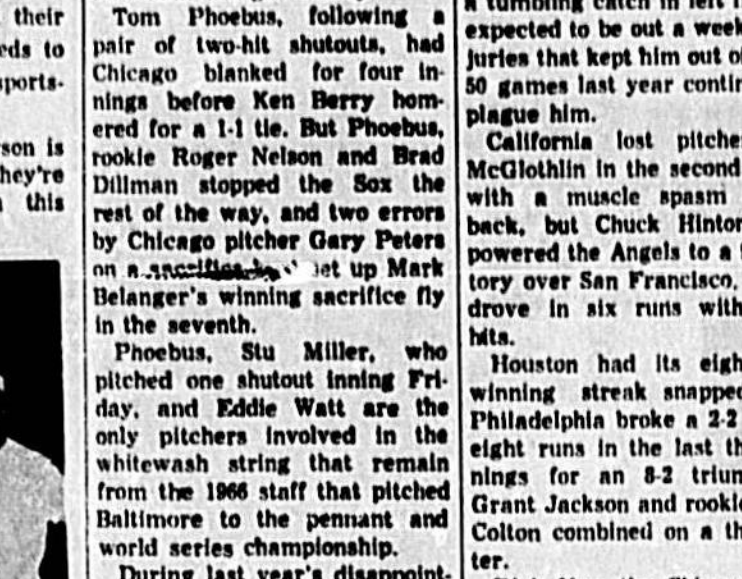

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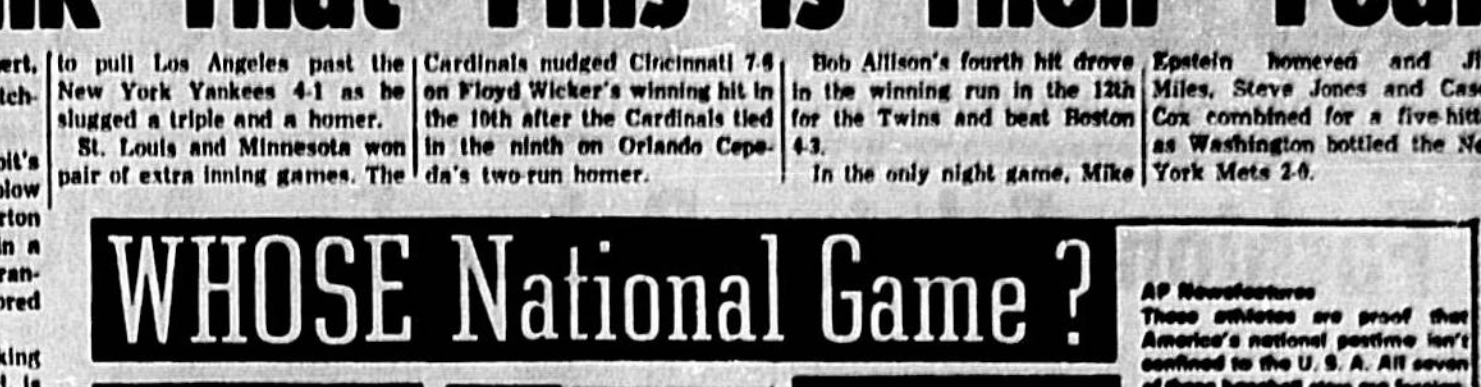

Everyday someone's ice machine breaks down," Pat reported. Persons faced with inoperable ice-makers are the company's best customers. Bags and blocks of ice also are delivered to restaurants, grocery stores, bars, clubs, hospitals and convalescent homes.

"During the time of the State Fair my husband and I worked 20 hours a day, and my sister came to help with the children and housework," the lady ice-man said.

December, she reports, takes just about as much ice as July because of the holidays. Last summer Pat averaged 150-ton miles per day delivering the frozen ton. She packs as well as unpacks the truck. "I enjoy it, so it isn't tiring," Pat said.

Mismanagement Cause Of Bad Debts-Report

The most prevalent reason for consumers having bad debts placed with collection service firms is mismanagement of their income, Brad Foley, Collection Bureau of Sanford, said today.

This was reported in a survey of collection service offices affiliated with the Associated Credit Bureaus of America, Inc. Foley said. ACBoA is a national trade association of credit bureaus and collection services with which Collection Bureau of Sanford is affiliated.

"People appear to have sufficient incomes but consumers who have bad debts placed with collection offices quite often have mismanaged their ability to pay," Foley explained. "They over-obligate themselves in comparison to their income and lack a financial plan when they decide to purchase on credit."

"The net result is when they have a little illness or miss a paycheck, they have nothing to offset it," Foley said.

ACBoA Collection Service Division members have an obligation to help consumers who have accounts placed for collection rehabilitate their credit record.

"We perform a service to the consumer when we work with him in recommending a debt and clearing his credit record," Foley said. "A good credit record is vital today, and by working with these people we help them on the road to an improved credit record."

Collection Bureau of Sanford reported a 20 per cent increase in business volume in 1967 with \$85,000 in collections. Nationally, ACBoA reported a 9.6 per cent increase and \$187 million in collections.

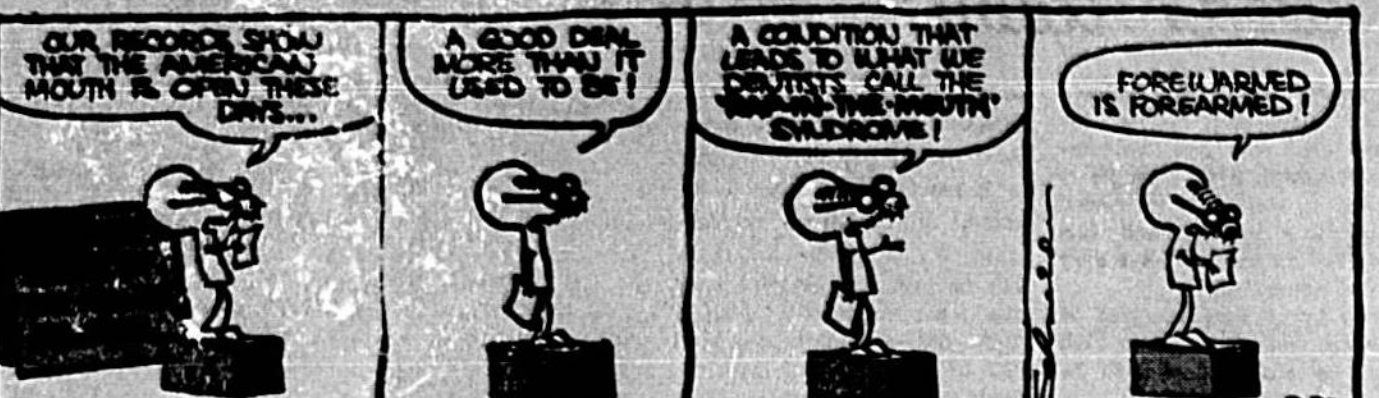

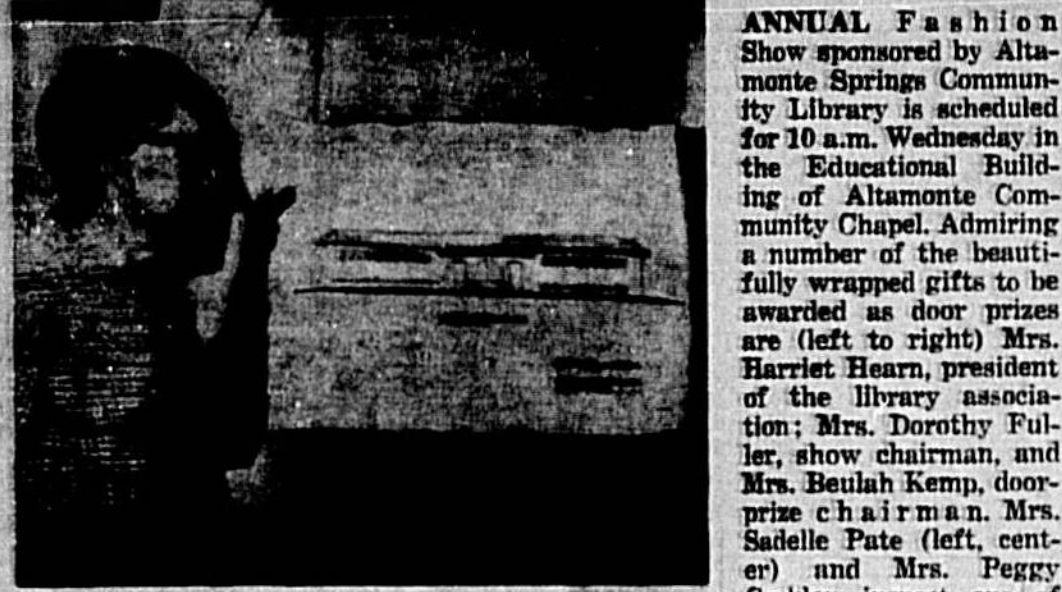

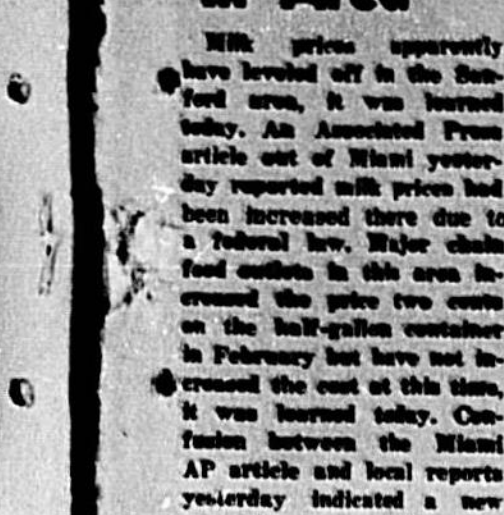

He was commissioned a lieutenant in January, 1966. He served with the U.S. Army for two years, 1953-55, and was stationed at an Army Missile Base in Naperville, Ill.

He was a member of the Florida State Firemen's Association and of Sanford Missionary Alliance Church, was a former member of the Sanford-Seminole Jaycees.
