Senate Asked To Reconsider Vote On Canal

(Continued From Page One)

President and asked his Democratic colleagues if "that was the kind of picture" they wanted to have presented to the American people. He warned the Senate abandonment of the canal and Passamaquoddy tidal power would result in criticism of the Administration.

In a long defense of the Florida project, Fletcher said the "picture" would be held up to the country as a criticism against the President.

Waving his left hand vigorously as he talked, the veteran Florida senator said his former attempt to revive the canal was defeated only because a number of senators were absent from the chamber.

"My position is that the President proceeded properly in starting the canal," he declared. "Both projects were authorized by the act of 1932."

He said the canal has been studied by engineers for many years, and has been pronounced "economically sound."

Fletcher produced a mass of letters and reports in support of the Florida waterway.

"This project should be considered on its merit," he declared. "In the interest of the development of trade and commerce for the entire country, his work ought to go on."

As Fletcher concluded his address, Senator Vandenberg attacked both projects.

"The 'inconceivable' that Congress should authorize them in the face of the 'difficulties' in raising \$600,000,000 in taxes. Of the deficiency bill amendment offered by Senator Robinson, majority leader, he gave the description: 'Plausible, pious, pregnant and persuasive.' Then he went into a bitter attack on provisions of the amendment.

"They couldn't get a board to approve the canal with any finality until they appointed a presidential board," he declared. "They appointed the board and they got exactly the report they expected. x x Frankly, I don't have much confidence in a presidential board."

The Michigan senator asserted "We are back boondoggling on Quoddy Bay and pipe dreaming on the phantom Florida canal."

He said the "Quoddy" had been turned down by the Public Works Administration and the Federal Power Commission and that the Commerce Department had indicated disapproval of the canal.

"There never was any justification for these projects and there isn't any now."

Fletcher warned that unless Congress acts work on the two projects will stop about July 1, throwing 5000 or 6000 relief workers out of employment on the canal alone.

If carried forward, he said, the canal would provide jobs for 20,000 for five or six years.

He said the board to be created under the amendment could easily report by July 20, as proposed, because studies had been made of the projects for many years.

Dern had stated that, should the Vandenberg asserted Secretary proposed engineering boards report unfavorably upon the projects, "they wouldn't know what they were talking about."

"I think he (Dern) should be called to account for this invasion of the independence of the board of engineers in whom we have so much reliance and confidence," he said.

Vandenberg said the purpose behind the amendment was to persuade Congress to "share the responsibility with President Roosevelt."

"He started all these projects but when he gets into hot water he wants us to share the bath," he said. "There won't be any blood on my hands if I can help it."

Senator Copeland (D. N. Y.), stepped into the argument to say he believed expenditures of \$10,000,000 more on the canal and \$9,000,000 additional on "Quoddy" would be a "sad waste," but that he did not regard a vote for the Robinson amendment as binding support to future appropriations.

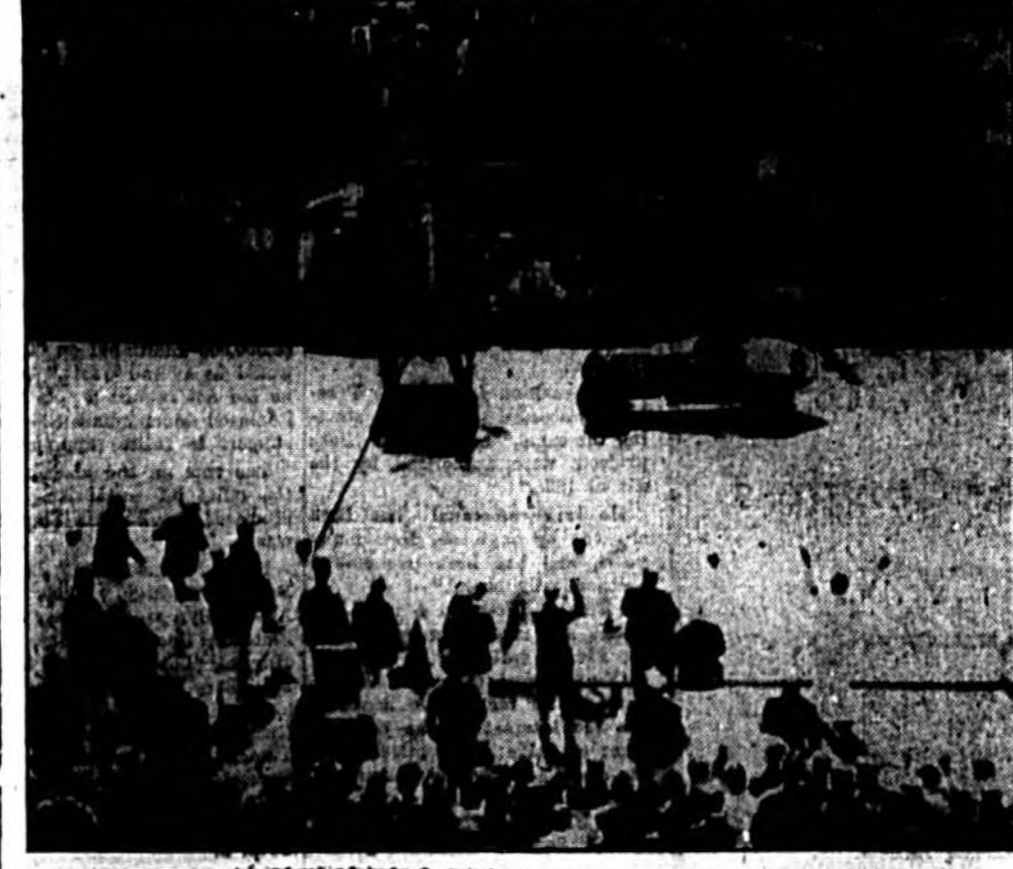

Conventions That Made History

Teddy Roosevelt's Bolt Makes Woodrow Wilson Easy Victory

When the Democrats of Missouri got together to nominate a President, they usually usually elected the first in a series of dramatic and dramatic national conventions of the past.

By ALEXANDER E. GEORGE

WASHINGTON, May 30.—(AP)—The ghosts of great convention figures of other years, led by the silver-tongued William Jennings Bryan, will march in many a Missouri town as the nation watches the making of new political history at Cleveland and Philadelphia.

Democratic conventions of both major parties have become almost commonplace, but probably the No. 1 of all was a one-man performance. Bryan's capture of the Democratic nomination in 1896.

When the convention opened, young Bryan was given little or no consideration as a possible nominee. Representative Richard P. Bland of Missouri, farmer-leader of the silver forces, was rated the favorite candidate, and Horace Boies of Iowa was figured a second choice.

But on the fateful afternoon of July 9 "the boy orator of the Platte" marched to the platform and stamped the delegates with a torrent of eloquent attack upon the gold standard, the Republican protective tariff and Wall street.

Twenty thousand listeners sat spellbound as that classic, final period fell from his lips: "You shall not pass down up the brow of labor this crown of thorns; you shall not crucify mankind upon a cross of gold."

"There was an instant hush," said a press description of the scene. "Then a storm burst whose fury seemed to sweep everything before it. Boldly, black-bearded delegates wept."

The balloting began the next day, and on the fifth ballot Bryan received an overwhelming vote. At 36 the Great Commoner had become "the people's leader of the plain people." By force of his eloquence alone he had won a presidential nomination.

Under the guidance of sagacious Mark Hanna, plaid William McKinley of Ohio won the 1896 Republican presidential nomination, and became Bryan's opponent.

Silver Republicans bolted the Republican convention and some of them supported Bryan's candidacy. Gold Democrats threatened to put a third ticket in the race, many of them abstained from voting in the election and some supported McKinley.

The voters of today may notice a familiar time in the charges and counter charges of 40 years ago. Senator "Pitchfork Ben" Tillman of South Carolina lambasted the industrial east and "money power," conservative Democratic newspapers in New York called Tillman "a communist and an anarchist." New York labor leaders, like Bryan, said it was "a case of the rich against the poor."

It was the "bicycle age" in America, and a national organization of whoelmen asked the Democrats to put a goal, rank, plank or platform program. Competing with the presidential race for popular attention in the big cities was the battle between the Baltimore tri-

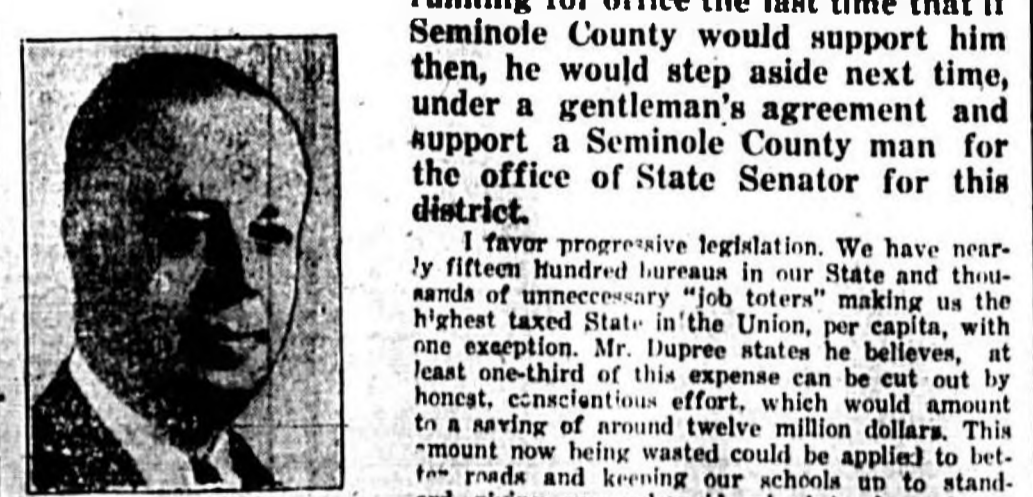

Bonus Checks Are Expected In Two Weeks

First May Arrive In Sanford June 16, Postmaster Holly Has Been Advised

Veterans residing in Seminole County may begin receiving their bonuses two weeks from today, according to advice sent Postmaster R. J. Holly by the Postoffice Department in Washington. First bonds and checks will be mailed out from Atlanta on June 15, and these first payments should reach here the following day. However, they will not all come the first day, the postmaster warns.

Payment is to be made in order of receipt of applications, and some veterans delayed filing their applications. Many others gave their usual mailing addresses in their applications, and if these were an office or a store where the veteran is employed they were returned and new applications showing residence addresses were filed. The postmaster's instructions are that the registered bonds and checks must be delivered to the veteran in person and to no other.

"The carrier should go out of his way with a view to effecting delivery, if at all possible, by securing someone in the neighborhood whom he knows can identify the addressee. Of course, where the addressee is known to the carrier, no other identification is necessary."

There are only two paying post-offices in Florida, at Jacksonville and Tampa, and veterans desiring to cash their bonds will make application with the postmaster in the town where they live and these applications will be sent to Tampa, and that office will mail out treasury checks in payment of the bonds.

Bonds will be taken to the post-office and in the presence of the designated official the veterans will sign a request upon the bond's back asking for the cash.

An interim receipt will then be issued and the cancelled bond sent to Tampa for payment.

A treasury check will then be received in the ordinary mail. In certifying the bonds, the owner must sign his request for payment exactly as the name appears on the face of the bond and must write his address on each bond in the space provided, the instructions say.

WASHINGTON, June 2.—(AP)—Congress has sent to President Roosevelt a bill to raise the salary of J. Edgar Hoover, chief of the Bureau of Investigation, from \$4,000 to \$10,000 a year. Final congressional approval was given by the Senate.

Senate Orders Republicans In Canal Survey Senate To Vote By 35-32 Vote Against Taxes

WASHINGTON, June 2.—In a last minute rush Monday evening to pass the huge relief and deficiency bill, the Administration forces in the Senate by a narrow margin of 35 to 32 turned back a Republican move to reconsider the vote on an amendment to authorize a new survey of the Florida Ship Canal.

The motion to reconsider, by Senator Hastings (R. Del.), was killed without debate on a motion by Democratic Leader Robinson of Arkansas to lay it on the table. The amendment, which would provide for continuing work if the survey is favorable, was added to the bill by the Senate Saturday on a similar vote, 35 to 30.

By this action, the Robinson (D. Ark.) resolution, with all references to Passamaquoddy stricken, became part of the amended deficiency bill. The canal amendment authorizes a special board of engineers to study the project, and allotment of additional funds if the board's report is favorable.

Leaders said they hoped to complete Senate action on the deficiency measure today and send it back to the House for action on the canal proposal and other amendments.

The House was expected to ask appointment of a conference committee to adjust differences between the two branches. The canal's backers expected trouble in the conference.

If the conference committee left the amendment in the bill, the House still would have the right to reject its conferees' recommendation. In any event, definite action was not expected for several days.

The canal amendment would authorize a \$10,000,000 allocation to the canal, provided the proposed board found it to be economically sound.

Senators Duncan U. Fletcher and Scott M. Loftin of Jacksonville voted for Passamaquoddy as well as the canal. Senators Hale and White, Maine Republicans, voted for Passamaquoddy but against the canal.

Decide At Caucus To Oppose Any Bill Of Democrat Majority To Boost Revenue

WASHINGTON, June 2.—(AP)—Determination to vote against the passage of any tax bill was expressed today by Senate Republicans attending a party conference on revenue legislation. Senators attending the meeting said their strategy probably would be to support the finance committee on its compromise plan in preference to the House bill or any other proposal, and then vote against it ultimately. Earlier the finance committee in a majority report estimated its compromise measure would produce \$329,000,000 permanent and temporary revenue in one year.

Riding down Republican attempts to shift the Administration of relief back to the states, the Senate last night passed by a 62 to 14 vote a more than \$2,428,000,000 relief and deficiency bill.

The measure, as it went back to the House for action on Senate changes, carried added items that made it one of the biggest supply measures in post-time history. Passage cleared the way for debate tomorrow on the tax bill, the last big barrier to the government.

As the Senate sat until long after dusk, amendments were added to the relief bill so rapidly that clerks could not compute the exact total, but figured it roughly at something in excess of \$1,425,000,000 for continuing the work relief program.

A long day of heated debate was climaxed by a brief skirmish over an effort led by Senator Vandenberg (R. Mich.) to return relief to the states, with the government contributing 75 per cent of the cost. It went down under a chorus of Democratic noes, 64 to 14.

Mrs. Zioncheck Visits Hospital And Sees Doctor

WASHINGTON, June 2.—(AP)—Mrs. Marion A. Zioncheck, 23-year-old bride, who left her husband of a month, last Saturday, called at Gallinger hospital today to discuss the condition of the Washington state representative lodged there by police for mental observation. While Zioncheck was being held in a ward his wife talked with Dr. Joseph Gilbert, District of Columbia alienist. She was not allowed to see her husband.

"Mrs. Zioncheck expressed the desire to be notified in case her husband needs her or when she will be permitted to see him," Dr. Gilbert said. He said he told Mrs. Zioncheck her husband spent a comfortable night.

McCORMICK DIES
