Bush vows to stop Noriega

President Bush, who plans to make a brief appearance in Miami this week before taking a three-week vacation, hinted during a news conference Tuesday that he might use whatever force necessary to apprehend Panamanian strongman Manuel Noriega.

Bush said he would not rule out the possibility of bringing Noriega to the U.S. on a federal drug indictment even if it meant using the military to do so.

Alaska files suit vs. Exxon

ANCHORAGE, Alaska — Dissatisfied with Exxon's cleanup of America's worst oil spill, the state of Alaska filed a lawsuit accusing the oil company of sacrificing one of "the last true wilderness areas" to save money.

In the suit filed Tuesday against Exxon and six other major oil companies, Alaska seeks damages and a court order preventing Exxon from abandoning the cleanup of the coastline despoiled by 11 million gallons of crude that leaked from the tanker Exxon Valdez.

Quayle gets good, bad news

WASHINGTON — More than half of Americans polled feel Dan Quayle has done a good job as vice president, but an equal percentage do not feel he is qualified to step in as president should something happen to President Bush, a poll showed Wednesday.

In a Washington Post-ABC News Poll telephone survey of 1,022 Americans conducted Aug. 4-5, 52 percent gave Quayle a positive rating when asked how they would rate the job he is doing as vice president. Thirty-three percent gave him a negative rating and 15 percent said they did not know or had no opinion.

Production rate up 0.2 pct.

WASHINGTON — The Federal Reserve reported Wednesday that industrial production climbed 0.2 percent during July, reversing a two-month slide and providing more evidence the economy may avoid a recession.

At the same time, the central bank said capacity utilization at the nation's factories, mines and utilities was stable at 83.6 percent during the month.

The uptick in industrial production was spurred by a 0.5 percent gain in the manufacture of non-durable goods.

Schools probe reaction

Feds' report not surprising, says parents group

SANFORD — Parents who formed the group which filed a complaint with the Justice Department regarding the Seminole district schools are not surprised with the results of the investigation.

"This is what we expected, based on what we were told when we met with the investigators," Bill Royster, the new president of the Sanford

Local School Advisory Committee (LSAC), said Wednesday morning.

The immediate past president of the group, Gail Stewart, had predicted prior to the arrival in Sanford of the federal investigators that the school district would be forced to make changes that would benefit the curriculum at Seminole High School.

The Justice Department said Monday they had approved the district's revised attendance zone boundaries for the school year that begins Tuesday, but said that they had continuing concerns that would be addressed later.

Supt. Robert Hughes said yesterday he had been confident all along that the federal investigators would approve the district plan and that the district would continue to provide any information that the Justice Department requested.

Royster, a Sanford businessman, said the

parent group, which operated outside the LSAC, also would continue to work with Justice Department investigators as they continued their probe into alleged inequities in district schools.

Royster would not say what he believed the Justice Department would be addressing with their new line of questioning. "Anything I would say would be pure speculation," he said.

He said the investigators had covered a wide range of topics during their visit and he did not know what avenues they would pursue. He added that the group had tried to stay away from making the questions only ones of racial inequities, noting that Sanford schools have inequities in other areas unrelated to racial questions.

Justice Department legal technician Luverna Young, who led the investigation in Seminole County and visited here last month, would also

Local residents will have good view of eclipse

Moon gazers from Maine to Mount Dora will witness their first total lunar eclipse in seven years tonight — a colorful, natural spectacle conveniently set in a prime-time slot.

The eclipse can be seen plainly in the night from anywhere in Central Florida, said Jack Horkheimer, executive director of Miami's Space Transit Planetarium.

South Floridians last experienced a total lunar eclipse in December 1982, which was also visible throughout much of North America. The next will not take place until Dec. 9, 1992.

A lunar eclipse occurs when the moon, which normally glows with reflected sunlight, passes into Earth's shadow and is dimmed. Unlike a solar eclipse, a lunar eclipse can be viewed with the naked eye.

"It's not as spectacular but it lasts longer," said J.C. Mortiz, education coordinator for Buehler Planetarium in Davie, Fla. "You don't have to worry about people going blind."

Craig Orsino, SCC spokesperson, said the college planetarium was completed last year, but equipment is still being installed.

"Eventually we hope to have the public come in to the planetarium for things like this, but we're still setting it up," Orsino said. "Right now we have to concentrate on the curriculum."

The moon is not totally darkened by an eclipse, but usually looks coppery-red or brown. That

Skies will be clear for tonight's show

A few cirrus clouds may be in the sky, but if they drift over the moon, observers should be able to see the moon through them, a forecaster said.

Eastern striker caravan passes through county

ORLANDO — About 120 Eastern Airline employees marched through Seminole County along U.S. 17-92 yesterday as part of a 3,000-mile picket from Miami to Washington, D.C.

Gary Kosak, Airline Pilots Association (APA) spokesperson, said a group of pilots, flight attendants and machinists left from Eastern's headquarters in Miami on foot Saturday morning for what he called the world's largest picket line. Groups of employees will change over along the route, he said.

Employees, families and others met at Carpenters Union Hall, 333 Pine Ridge Rd., Orlando, at 8 a.m. yesterday for a rally before beginning yesterday's leg of the march. The walk ended at 7 p.m. on U.S. 17-92 about two miles north of Dog Track Road.

Don Richmond, Orlando APA spokesperson, said the group of 120 employees decided to quit the march south of Sanford because traffic had congested behind them. The group then drove to DeLand, where a

Church membership declines nationally, on the rise locally

WASHINGTON — Membership in national mainline Protestant denominations continues to slide while the Roman Catholic Church and some theologically conservative groups are gaining members, a new study showed. Locally, many churches seem to show an increase.

The study, released Tuesday in

the new edition of the "Yearbook of American and Canadian Churches 1989," published by the National Council of Churches, showed membership figures for 1987, the most recent year for which reliable statistics are available.

Overall, reports from 219 U.S. religious bodies showed that 143,830,806 Americans — 58.6 percent — belonged to one of those

denominations in 1987. The 32 Protestant and Orthodox members of the National Council of Churches — the so-called mainstream denominations — had a combined membership of 42,047,344.

Local church leaders say their flocks are growing. All Souls Catholic Church in Sanford is growing at the rate of 10 percent per

Economics teacher chooses classrooms over courtrooms

OVIEDO — For Alan Musante, teaching led to practicing law, which led back to teaching, which led to Junior Achievement. An applied economics instructor at Oviedo High School, Musante decided teaching economics was more fun than practicing law.

Musante, a lifelong resident of central Florida, graduated from Winter Park High School before earning a degree in economics from Eckerd College in St. Petersburg. He taught for several years before earning his law

degree from the University of Florida.

After practicing law for several years in Orlando, Musante decided he didn't need "the ulcers and the tension" of the legal profession.

He also decided that teaching was just a lot more fun.

"I guess it was not a good economic move," Musante joked, "but it was one I enjoyed."

This summer, Musante was one of 24 U.S. economics instructors who spent four days at a special program at the Junior Achievement national headquarters in Colorado Springs.

Richman defeats Kennedy in runoff
Democratic contest decided by high white voter turnout

MIAMI — Lawyer Gerald Richman emerged from a close race Tuesday to win the Democratic nomination in the race to succeed the late Rep. Claude Pepper, D-Fla., an election that could send the first Cuban-American to Congress.

Richman, following his victory speech said his priorities, if elected, would be crime, education, gun control and supporting pro-choice issues.

Richman won by a margin of victory in Richman's bid for the 18th Congressional District seat. In predominantly white areas, there was a 27 percent turnout, with 67 percent of the votes for Richman.

Kennedy took the lead briefly at 3,143 to 2,742 with 30.4 percent of the votes counted, but Richman regained the lead and never trailed again.

Bomb scare probably a hoax

SANFORD — Sheriff's deputies today said the bomb scare at a local hotel was probably a hoax. Seminole County Sheriff's Lt. Marty LaBrusciano said today his best guess is that the incident was a hoax. LaBrusciano Monday disarmed a suspicious device attached to a toilet at the Day's Inn, State Road 46, west of Sanford. Although the complete device was not recovered, LaBrusciano said it probably wasn't an active

bomb. The supposed bomb was attached to a toilet, which was blown up by LaBrusciano in an attempt to dislodge the device. A painter working in the room reported finding the bomb. LaBrusciano said a witness has reported receiving telephone threats to the inn on his personal answering machine, which has a telephone number similar to the Day's Inn number. The witness has no association with the inn. LaBrusciano said that lead is being investigated as a possible link to the device he destroyed at the inn.

GOP men's club needs local approval

SANFORD — It may take local approval to form a Republican men's club in Seminole County. Until now, organizers of the Greater Seminole Federated Men's Club believed they needed only approval from the National Federation of Republican Men's Clubs. But this is not the case, they found this week. "Since our federation is not sanctioned by the Republican National Committee (RNC), they are supposed to be sanctioned by

the county," said Jack Turner, president of the Winter Haven-based National Federation of Republican Men's Clubs. A group of 10 Seminole County men were authorized by Turner in July to form the Greater Seminole Federated Republican Men's Club under the National Federation. The Seminole club, under president Brad Lang, former Seminole County Financial Director, includes a Sanford city commissioner, a Winter Springs city commissioner, and two other former clerk's officials.

Turner said until the National Federation is sanctioned by the RNC at the next national convention in 1992, the local clubs must follow state rules requiring both local and state party approval to use the name "Republican." Both Turner and Lang had said last month the local and state approval was not needed, but RNC deputy chief counsel Michael Hess said such approval was required in Florida. Jim Orque, chairman of the Seminole County Republican Executive Committee, said

Tuesday Lang has not contacted him. He said when Lang does contact him, he would review their club's charter. Lang did not return calls Tuesday. There may soon be a second county Republican Men's Club. Pat Herring, president of the Suburban Republican Women's Club, said her club may begin to seek men to form a men's club, but no formal steps have been taken. Herring said the Women's Club, though sanctioned by the RNC, require state and local party approval.

Local officials baffled over fugitive's release on bond

ALTAMONTE SPRINGS — "We're surprised and disappointed to say the least," Altamonte Springs City Manager Phil Penland said of the release Monday of an accused con-man fugitive who was being held on California forgery and theft charges in the Seminole County jail. The man is tentatively identified by Altamonte Springs police as Todd Valentine, 27, but also used several other names including Todd Beckham, according to police spokesman Jeff Hawkins. Valentine is also under investigation by Altamonte Springs police for alleged illegal activities in that city.

Penland said he and other city officials are baffled by the \$10,000 bond set by Judge Fred Hitt for Valentine Monday. Valentine bonded out of jail and Penland said he is afraid he will flee from prosecution here. "The guy was a fugitive," Penland said. "I can't comprehend why you let a person who has already run once out on bail. He may show up for a hearing. I have no way of knowing. I still don't know why a fugitive from another state would be allowed bail." "The only charge he had was a California charge," Hitt said today. "California requested a \$10,000 bond and the state didn't object. To my knowledge there are no local charges

Tampa says thanks but no thanks to KKK Grand Dragon

TAMPA — The Ku Klux Klan has written a letter to Tampa's mayor offering to help rid the city of its problems, but city officials declined the offer. "There is no welcome mat out for the KKK. I don't think they'll find a very tolerable community here for their philosophy," said John Dunn, spokesman for Mayor Sandy Freedman. According to a Wednesday report, John B. Baumgardner, an Orlando resident who refers to himself as the KKK's Grand Dragon of the Realm of Florida, made the offer in a one-page letter to Freedman May 30. "We have established a base in Tampa and are about to become active," Baumgardner wrote on official Klan stationery. "There are many problems in Tampa. We would like to be a part of the solution. Do not hesitate to call on us if we can be of service in any way."

Knights of the Ku Klux Klan had established a small group in Tampa earlier this year and is planning a recruiting rally in September. He refused to say when or where the event is scheduled or how many members the Klan has in Tampa. Similar recruitment efforts in rural Hillsborough County failed miserably, said Hillsborough Sheriff's Sgt. Oscar Alfonso. The white-supremacist group has held rallies and marches this year in Brooksville, Arcadia and Tarpon Springs. Hooded, white-robed Klan members marched in Lakeland and Bradenton last year. Baumgardner, 38, acknowledged that recruitment in the Tampa area has been tough, but vowed the city would have its share of new members. "We could come in and organize a large group quite quickly, but we want to be selective about who carries our card," Baumgardner said. Baumgardner, who was convicted in Orlando in July of lighting a 16-foot cross too close to a building, said the Klan wants to dispel its violent image and become more involved in government. Baumgardner said the Klan activity is strongest in outlying areas, such as Polk County.

Powell excellent leadership choice

President Bush's choice of Army Gen. Colin L. Powell as chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff is an unorthodox move. But it is also the correct one.

At age 62, Gen. Powell would become the youngest officer and the first black ever to hold the nation's top military post. He already is one of the youngest four-star generals in American peace-time history and would leapfrog over dozens of more-senior officers to become JCS chief.

Thus Gen. Powell's elevation is understandably rumping the plumage of more than a few top-echelon officers throughout the services. The resentment is magnified by the fact that Gen. Powell is not cut from the traditional service mold. But this attribute is a plus, not a drawback.

Instead of devoting his career to commanding divisions and scaling the Army's parochial ladder, Gen. Powell has concentrated on the formulation of broad policies related to national security and foreign policy. During the last eight years he has served as the military assistant for former Defense Secretary Caspar Weinberger and on the staff of the National Security Council, ultimately becoming Ronald Reagan's last NSC adviser. He is noted for his diplomatic acumen and wide knowledge of international politics.

Like the retiring chairman, Adm. William Crowe, Gen. Powell's outlook transcends the inter-service rivalries that have hampered the Joint Chiefs of Staff in the past. And he already has established personal relationships with President Bush and other members of his national security team — Secretary of State James Baker, Defense Secretary Dick Cheney, NSC adviser Brent Scowcroft.

Grumblers will accuse Mr. Bush of selecting Gen. Powell solely to curry political favor with black voters. But this charge demeans the distinguished record that Gen. Powell would bring to the JCS post. Regardless of race or party politics, he is the best soldier for the job.

Who's not helpful?

There's a chorus of clucking in the Bush administration and in Congress about how Israel's seizure of Sheikh Abdul Karim Obaid was, as former Defense Secretary Caspar Weinberger put it, "not helpful."

The most outspoken of the critics, Sen. Robert Dole, asked for a "little more responsibility on the part of Israel," and a number of others complained that, in light of the fact that Hezbollah, the so-called Party of God, was holding U.S. hostages, as well as others, the United States should at least have been consulted before Obaid was seized.

Those complaints suggest that if the United States had the same options as Israel, it would leave terrorists undisturbed even if, like Obaid, they are known to have been involved in seizing American hostages.

In fact, the United States has seized terrorists, including one who was forced out of the sky as he was traveling in an Egyptian plane across the Mediterranean, and one would hope that, where the opportunity to retaliate occurs without the likelihood of the loss of innocent life, this country would do so again.

In most cases, there's not much the United States can do.

The fact that it hasn't been possible to free any of the eight American hostages still held by Lebanese terrorists testifies to that helplessness. But that hardly means the United States shouldn't look for appropriate responses, either against the terrorists themselves or against nations that — like Iran, Libya and Syria — have sponsored terrorist actions. Least of all should it mean that Washington ought to show, either by word or deed, that it disapproves of such acts by its allies.

The more terrorists can act with impunity, the more hostages will be seized. The more their kidnaping and murder drives a wedge between Western allies, the more successful these butchers will be.

Was Reagan so wrong about Iran?

That whooping sound you hear is the air going out of the last tire of the Democrats' Iran/contra chariot.

Bear in mind that the Iran/contra controversy had two major aspects. One was the much-criticized sale of American weapons to allegedly friendly or at least relatively "moderate" forces in Iran in return for their help in obtaining the release of U.S. hostages in Lebanon. The other was the use of part of the proceeds of that sale to buy arms for the Nicaraguan contras at a time when the Boland Amendment barred the use of U.S. funds for that purpose.

The Democrats' secret hope, of course, was to impeach and oust President Reagan for being involved in these two operations. Mr. Reagan, however, sharply distinguished between them. He took full responsibility for the arms sales, but denied knowing anything whatever about the use of the proceeds to buy weapons for the contras.

The long congressional investigation of the whole affair, stretching over the entire first half of 1987, failed to produce one iota of evidence that Mr. Reagan, contrary to his assertion, did know about the diversion of funds. The investigators had to settle for the prosecution of Lt. Col. Oliver North and three lesser lights; and not even the expenditure of \$15 million enabled

special prosecutor Lawrence Walsh to put North behind bars.

But at least it was pretty well agreed all around that in bargaining with the Iranians for our hostages — "swapping arms for hostages," as the expression went — Ronald Reagan had made a perfectly dreadful mistake. Mr. Reagan himself eventually conceded that perhaps his judgment had been clouded.

The sacred commandment that Mr. Reagan violated was simple enough: The United States must never, ever "negotiate with terrorists." Never, never, never. That is all ye know on earth, and all ye need to know.

Now, even at the time, thoughtful people knew better than this. Any group of human beings —

whether it's the Politburo, or the Grand Council of the John Birch Society, or the government of Iran — will display a spectrum of attitudes on any subject, ranging from relatively moderate to relatively extreme.

Moreover, the sacred rule about never negotiating with terrorists has been violated repeatedly, and successfully, by both Germany and France, and probably other countries as well. All have obtained the release of hostages, apparently in return for cash payments.

There were indeed relative moderates in Iran in the mid-1980s. One of the most important was Hashemi Rahnjani (who has since become president of Iran, following the death of the Ayatollah Khomeini); and it is believed to have been him and certain military figures close to him with whom President Reagan's emissaries were negotiating, and to whom the arms sales were made.

And now, despite formalistic denials, it is perfectly plain that the United States too is preparing to negotiate with both Iran and those holding our hostages — perhaps directly, or perhaps through Israel. A general exchange of hostages is in the wind.

Which raises afresh the question: Just how wrong was the Oppor after all? Maybe he was just ahead of his time.

In trivial pursuit of presidency

BEAVER ISLAND, Mich. — A year ago this week, George Bush accepted the Republican nomination at the New Orleans Superdome and launched a campaign that made him President.

His speech that night opened with the declaration, "I mean to run hard, to fight hard, to stand on the issues and I mean to win." It ended with his leading the crowd in the Pledge of Allegiance.

In their newly published book, "Whose Broad Stripes and Bright Stars: The Trivial Pursuit of the Presidency 1988," political columnists Jack W. Germond and Jules Witcover argue that Bush may have fought hard, but he won only by running away from the issues. It was, they assert, one more example of the tendency for campaigns to be "decided on the basis of technique rather than issues."

That is a popular thesis but a puzzling one. The "technique" they refer to was hardly new. It involved researching the record of the opposition candidate, Massachusetts Gov. Michael S. Dukakis, testing the reactions of small groups of voters to some of his vulnerabilities, and then publicizing those weaknesses through speeches and ads.

In the spring of 1988, when Bush campaign manager Lee Atwater told research director Jim Pinkerton to list Dukakis' weak points on a 3-by-5 card, he got back seven topics: taxes, defense, drug penalties, the death sentence, pollution in Boston Harbor, the Massachusetts prison-furlough program and the veto of a bill requiring the Pledge of Allegiance in public schools. The potency of those issues was proved by the reaction of Democratic-leaning voters in a Paramus, N.J., focus group just before last Memorial Day. The next week, Bush began slugging Dukakis with those issues as a means of reducing and ultimately reversing his likely opponent's early lead.

That is essentially the story that Germond and Witcover tell, fleshed out as always with the anecdotes and interviews that have made their books on the last three campaigns the linear descendants of the late Theodore H. White's narratives of the presidential battles of the 1960s.

What is striking is the disillusionment with which these veteran political reporters view the very contest they described. It's as if the more they see of competitive politics these days, the less they like it. My old friends and contemporaries Germond and Witcover are obviously too young to be victims of nostalgia or to romanticize bygone days. How then to explain their disillusionment?

My hunch is that they are frustrated — and rightly so — with the kind of candidates the Democrats have been serving up for their dramas. In his first three "Making of the President" books, Teddy White got to write

about the campaigns of John F. Kennedy, Lyndon B. Johnson and Hubert H. Humphrey. Germond and Witcover have had to struggle with the tales of Jimmy Carter, Walter F. Mondale and Michael Dukakis. Talk about cruel and unusual punishment!

The vulnerabilities Pinkerton found in Dukakis' record were real and so were the concerns they evoked in voters who knew little about either candidate. They need not have been decisive, however, had Dukakis not been so tardy in defending himself and so reluctant to exploit the openings Bush's own record provided.

The evidence of the statement can be found in one of the best chapters in the Germond-Witcover book, the account of the Democratic National Convention in Atlanta. That gathering, they rightly argue, was not the triumph the Democrats thought at the time, but rather "a wasted opportunity."

They quote Bush's advertising man, Roger Ailes, as telling them in a post-election interview that when the convention began with devastating ridicule of Bush by keynote Ann Richards of Texas and Sen. Edward M. Kennedy (D-Mass.), he thought, "We got trouble here."

Listening to Kennedy's "Where was George?" routine about the scandals of the Reagan administration, and Richards' populist jab at the politician "born with a silver foot in his mouth," Ailes said, "I honestly sat there and thought: Oh, well...that's the theme of one ad...There's the theme or another ad...I thought they must have had ads, I would have...to get people laughing at him."

But the Democrats didn't have such ads, then or later, because, unlike the Republicans, they did not have the discipline or the organization to see what must be done to win the general election. And their candidate, unlike Kennedy, Johnson or Humphrey, lacked the improvisational genius or wit to create such a campaign as he careened around the country.

Germond and Witcover deserve, just once, to have that kind of Democrat to liven up the plot of their book. But they are young guys, so there's no rush.

Ammonia fertilizer ignites controversy

WASHINGTON — Daisy and GamGee Thorshov bear the physical reminders of the cloud of deadly gas that enveloped their home 12 years ago.

Daisy, 15, is partially blind. GamGee, 13, has deep scars on his chest and legs. And the children have no parents. Jon and Lloyda Thorshov were killed by the anhydrous ammonia gas that billowed from a derailed freight train near their home in Pensacola, Fla., in 1977.

Twelve years later, despite hundreds of deaths and injuries from accidental spills, the government still classifies anhydrous ammonia under the euphemism "non-flammable gas."

The Thorshov's tragedy, and many like it, have become an issue in, of all places, the farm belt. Anhydrous ammonia is a deadly gas when it spills on highways and railroads, but it is an effective fertilizer when spread on grain crops.

Last year, a team of experts in the Transportation Department recommended that anhydrous ammonia be reclassified as a "poisonous gas" when it is hauled. Recently, under pressure from farm states, the department backed down. Lawmakers from the farm belt personally leaned on Transportation Secretary Samuel Skinner to lay off.

As often happens in Washington, safety took a back seat to money and politics.

Farmers and fertilizer makers said that a "poison" label would raise their insurance and freight costs. And lurking in the background was the Alar scare. Farmers won't soon forget how the apple market suffered when the pesticide Alar was linked to cancer. The last thing they want is a skull and crossbones on the ammonia they use to fertilize corn and wheat.

But environmentalists and rescue workers are furious. As far as they're concerned, ammonia is a poisonous gas and should be labeled as such. Freight haulers say the "poison" label would alert them to take extra precautions. Firefighters say the right label would save precious time on the scene of a spill.

Evidence of ammonia's lethal side surfaced in 1983 in a study at the Lawrence Livermore National Laboratory. Ironically, the tests were sponsored by the Fertilizer Institute, along with the U.S. Coast Guard. A Fertilizer Institute spokesman told us that the tests were done to learn what happens in "various instances of release," but that no conclusions were drawn as a result.

The man who was hired to do the testing remembers it differently. Dr. Ronald Koopman told our associate Scott Sleek that he concluded ammonia was a poisonous gas, and that the Fertilizer Institute was not at all pleased with his verdict.

The federal government's own records attribute 25 deaths and 602 injuries to ammonia accidents in the last two decades. Used properly, ammonia is safe, even as a fertilizer. But when mishandled, spilled or improperly mixed with other chemicals, it can kill.

Transportation Department officials told us they proposed the "poison" label last year as an idea to be debated. Now they're leaning toward calling ammonia an "inhalation hazard." That sounds pretty tame to Lloyd and Phyllis Hutchens, the grandparents of the Thorshov children. They are raising Daisy and GamGee. They see the children's scars, and they hear the chronic coughing. Most of all, they remember watching their daughter Lloyda slowly die in the hospital because her lungs were destroyed. "The only antidote for it is water," said Lloyd Hutchens. "You can't pour water in your lungs."

year with about 10 to 20 adult converts, according to Fr. Thomas Burns.

The Rev. Freddie Smith, pastor of Sanford's Central Baptist Church, said he has noticed about a 15 to 20 percent increase in his congregation. However, he suggested the increase may be due to the recent relocation into a brand new church building off State Road 46.

The Rev. Jackie Nix of Lakeview Baptist Church in Lake Mary said his church is experiencing "a slow growth" but "not like it ought to be."

Pastor W. Dean Witten of Sealand United Methodist Church in Longwood said any decline has not affected his church. "We are experiencing a rapid increase at Sealand. We are growing at 150 members per year," he said.

In Canada, according to the yearbook, the 87 churches reporting membership figures showed their membership at 16,974,288 in 1987.

At the same time, the yearbook also reported that in nine denominations that regularly report current giving and membership statistics, per capita annual giving by full communicant or confirmed

members increased by 6.2 percent on the average in 1987 to \$342.67, compared with \$320.70 in 1986.

These nine denominations, mostly mainline churches, also reported, on the average, a 0.1 percent decrease in membership.

According to the yearbook, the largest church in the United States continues to be the Roman Catholic Church, with 53,486,862 adherents, up from 52,893,317 members in 1986.

The largest Protestant denomination remains the Southern Baptist Convention, with 14,722,617 members, up just slightly from the 14,613,618 members reported in 1986.

The United Methodist Church, which has suffered some of the most severe membership losses in the last two decades, reported 9,124,575 members in 1987 — its most recent figures — down from 9,192,172.

A predominantly black denomination, the National Baptist Convention USA, was listed in third place among Protestant denominations, with 5,500,000 members but those figures are from 1986, the last time the church provided figures.

A new church — the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America — formed by a merger

of three Lutheran bodies is now in fourth place among Protestant bodies, with 5,288,230 members.

Smith said this morning he wasn't familiar with the study or its accuracy. He said the survey was "kind of a surprise" because it was the opposite of what he has heard about the Roman Catholic Church.

"I heard the Catholic Church was in decline. I don't know what they're doing to cause the increase because I've always heard they're decreasing (in membership)," Smith said.

Burns of All Souls gave two reasons for Catholic's increase. "The success of Catholicism today is based on rich worship experiences and its concern for the betterment of the world and social justice," he said.

Burns also said Catholicism is a "strong and outspoken teacher of morals and ethics in the world today." It also addresses relevant issues to society today including questions of nuclear arms, the role of women in society and the poor and hungry.

"I think the Catholic Church is attracting very intelligent, thoughtful members of American society," Burns said.

Smith said the possible increase in Roman Catholicism might have something to do with young people who have sought various avenues to express their religious beliefs, returning to the "tried and true experiences of their parents and grandparents."

Churches reporting significant increases in 1987 included the Christian and Missionary Alli-

ance, up 2.33 percent to 244,286 members; the Church of God (Anderson, Ind.), up 5.2 percent to 198,552 members; the Church of the Nazarene, up 2.42 percent to 543,782; the Free Methodist Church of North America, up 2.15 percent to 73,225 members; the Interna-

tional Church of the Foursquare Gospel, up 3.28 percent to 192,327 and Jehovah's Witnesses, up 2.77 percent to 773,219.

Among the churches reporting membership losses in 1987 were the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ), down 1.81 percent, to

1,086,668; the Episcopal Church, down 1.69 percent to 2,482,300; the Presbyterian Church (USA), down 1.31 percent to 2,967,781; the United Church of Christ, down 0.81 percent to 1,882,588 and the United Methodist Church, down 0.74 percent to 9,124,575.

march to Daytona Beach began this morning, he said. From there, he said, the group will drive to St. Augustine for a trek to Jacksonville and Tallahassee.

About 145 Central Florida airline pilots are members of the Orlando APA, Richmond said.

The airline employees will then continue the march along the eastern seaboard as far north as Boston, returning south through New York City for the Labor Day parade, then to Washington, D.C., for a Sept. 6 culmination at the White House.

"This may be a little dramatic for some of our conservative Republican pilots," Kosak said from Miami today. "But we feel we have no recourse since we have had six months of silence from Bush."

Eastern employees are protesting corporate takeover of the airline after Eastern president Frank Lorenzo filed bankruptcy in federal court in March. Kosak said APA blames Lorenzo for "devouring" the airline, saying he stripped Eastern of \$1 billion in cash and assets over three years.

"Lorenzo sought out to devour one airline for the good of another," Kosak said. "We are standing on the edge of something that is as bad as Watergate as far as scandal goes."

"It is an anti-trust problem. It is an ethical-moral problem and it is an economical problem

affecting many areas of the country," he said.

Kosak, an Eastern pilot for 21 years, said the employees are not asking for more money. "We're just a bunch of people expressing a love for our company, saying we don't want our company devoured in a corporate takeover."

Brothers nearly executed, claim they were framed

TAMPA — Two half-brothers who came within 16 hours of execution filed a lawsuit charging that three deputies and three prosecutors conspired to frame them for the murder of a young woman.

In a federal civil rights lawsuit filed Tuesday, Ernest Lee Miller and William Riley Jent said the defendants planted evidence, forced witnesses to give false testimony against them and hid evidence that could have proved them innocent. The pair spent almost eight years on death row.

Joining them in the lawsuit was T.B. Bradshaw, the father of the murder victim, Linda Gale Bradshaw. Her charred corpse was found on the bank of the Withlacoochee River on July 14, 1979.

Bradshaw alleged that law officers, as part of a plot to frame Miller and Jent, repeatedly refused to admit the identity of the victim. He said that prevented him from pursuing legal remedies against the man he believes is the real killer, Bobby Dodd, his daughter's boyfriend.

Dodd dropped out of sight after Bradshaw's murder. He resurfaced in Georgia where a second girlfriend was murdered. He denied committing either murder, and is now in prison serving a 20-year drug sentence.

The suit asks for unspecified damages to repay Miller, Jent and Bradshaw for harm done them and to punish the lawmen for the frame-up.

Pasco County deputies Jack Armstrong, David Fitzgerald and Gregory Devlin were named as defendants, along with Pinellas-Pasco State Attorney James T. Russell and two assistants, Charles Copas and Robert Cole.

Miller and Jent received stays of execution 16 hours before they were to die in the electric chair in 1983. A federal judge granted them new trials almost two years ago, and they were freed after entering negotiated guilty pleas to second-degree murder.

After entering the pleas, they walked out of the courtroom and immediately renounced them as false, saying they pleaded guilty only out of fear that in another trial they would be framed again and sentenced to die.

Miller and Jent, both in their 20s at the time of the killing, were arrested two weeks after Bradshaw's beaten and burned body was found.

Until 1986, the victim was identified officially only as "Tammy." Relatives believed the victim was Bradshaw, but investigators refused to confirm it until conclusive fingerprint evidence was uncovered.

not speculate on what the questions would address.

"We are still formulating the questions," she noted on Wednesday morning. She could offer no timetable for when the Justice Department would be in touch with the district.

The group was anticipating that they would receive a copy of the department's report as soon as it was available. The report could arrive as soon as Friday.

"The only problem we had with the reasoning issue was that Lakeview Middle School was approved on a technicality," Royster said. "But it was not an unexpected thing. They explained it to us while they were here."

Royster said that while Lakeview Middle School (100 Lakeview Drive, Sanford) re-

mains nearly 400 students under capacity (in contrast to schools in other areas of the county, including Greenwood Lakes Middle School in Lake Mary, have many more than they should) it could not be considered as part of a complaint about reasoning. The problem lies in the fact that Lakeview's student population was not changed by reasoning.

"Since they were not considered," Royster said, "they could not be a part of the complaint. The reasoning was passed on technicalities."

Royster said the group maintains hope that the continued Justice Department investigation will find another way to deal with the inequities at Lakeview Middle School.

"Overall I'm not dissatisfied with the results," Royster said. "It is as much as we could have expected."

The class was sponsored by Junior Achievement, which also sponsors his applied economics class during the school year. "Since economics became a required class a few years ago," Musante explained, "Junior Achievement transferred some of its resources away from the after-school programs and into the high schools."

This summer's Junior Achievement group concluded American educators and students need to change their attitude about the world. They

decided that Americans, in general, know enough about other countries to be able to deal with them on an intelligent basis. "We are not in the drivers seat all alone any more," Musante explained. "There must be a greater global understanding."

Allene Scarce, the vice president of operations at the Central Florida chapter of Junior Achievement, said Musante was chosen to attend the national program because of the outstanding work he has done with his students during the three years he has been in the applied economics program.

Junior Achievement sponsors Musante's class. The class employs a volunteer business consultant who comes in once a week to help the students form a company, sell stock in this enterprise, create a product, market it and invest their profits (assuming there are profits).

"Of course if they lose money, there's a lesson in that too," he said.

The students use real money to run their companies, earned either by the sale of stock if cash is needed up front to buy materials or by the sale of the product.

According to Musante, the students get very excited about their enterprises and, as a result, learn lasting lessons in economics. The class is more than reciting rote lessons from the text.

happens because the Moon's surface is faintly illuminated by sunlight scattered from the Earth's atmosphere. The exact color of the eclipsed moon depends on cloud and dust conditions in the Earth's atmosphere. The full moon will be totally covered by the Earth's shadow from 10:20 p.m. EDT until 11:56 p.m. EDT Wednesday, according to astronomers at Sky & Telescope magazine. The process — which looks like an unseen giant is taking progressively larger "bites" out of the moon — will start about 9:21 p.m. EDT and conclude about 12:56 p.m. EDT.

People living in Eastern and

Central time zones are in the best positions to witness the eclipse. Farther to the west, the moon will be already eclipsed when it rises.

"No telescopes or binoculars are required," said Gary Bowner, director of South Florida Science Museum's Aldrin Planetarium in West Palm Beach, Fla. "Although you will find them handy in observing the earlier and later portions of the eclipse when the effect is more subtle."

Richard Feinberg, a technical editor for Sky & Telescope of Cambridge, Mass., said eclipses of the moon occur more frequently and over much larger areas than solar eclipses.

"It's more a stately pageant than an exciting scientific

event," he said.

But Feinberg touted the lunar eclipse, which should be more colorful and easier to watch than an eclipse of the Sun, as an excellent opportunity to get children interested in astronomy.

"I think kids should be allowed to stay up and watch the first half. That occurs from 8 p.m. to about 11 p.m., depending on where you live, so it's prime time," Feinberg said.

The eclipse will be dark, long-lasting and "perfectly timed for a summer evening," said Arnold Pearlstein, planetarium director at Booker T. Washington Jr. High School in Miami. "A perfect evening for the entire family."

Bush in Miami for fund-raiser

President talks about drugs before departing for Florida

WASHINGTON — President Bush looked forward today to a three-week vacation at his seaside summer home in Kennebunkport, Maine, but first he planned to make a campaign swing to Florida.

Bush was scheduled to attend a fund-raising luncheon in Miami on behalf of Ileana Ros-Lehtinen, the Republican nominee for the congressional seat made vacant when Rep. Claude Pepper, D-Fla., died in May.

Republicans hope the presidential visit will steal some of the political thunder from Democrats, who Tuesday chose lawyer Gerald Richman as their candidate for the Aug. 29 general election.

On the eve of his summer break, Bush held a White House news conference Tuesday where

he promised the national anti-drug strategy his administration is to produce next month will be comprehensive.

Bush said the plan, which sources say will cost about \$7 billion, approximately \$1 billion above current federal anti-drug spending, will require shifting dollars from other programs, but will not require an increase in taxes.

Speaking before he met with his Cabinet-level Domestic Policy Council to go over the draft plan by federal anti-drug director William Bennett, Bush called the blueprint "balanced, decisive, effective and achievable."

At the news conference, Bush also kept alive an earlier threat that U.S. force might be used to remove a suspected drug dealer, Gen. Manuel Noriega, from power in Panama.

The administration has said it might apprehend the military

strongman to stand trial on drug-related charges brought against him in February 1988.

Bush said, "We have an indictment out against General Noriega for drug trafficking. I'm told that it's a good indictment — that it's an in-depth indictment."

"I'm not saying what I would do or wouldn't do, but there was a case where a man ... was apprehended and brought to justice and I have an obligation to try to bring people to justice."

Bush was to fly from Miami to Maine for 30 days of rest and relaxation, which to the energetic, 65-year-old president means a near-daily marathon of jogging, swimming, tennis, golf, fishing and boating.

"This is the way I like to relax. It clears the mind," Bush said during an early morning run on his most recent visit to Kennebunkport, during the long Fourth of July weekend.

Kennebunkport is the president's personal hideaway, one he treasures as a place to think, reflect and relax with staff,

friends and family.

On this trip to the small fishing and tourist town, Bush, whose wife, Barbara, preceded him to Maine, will host visits by Danish Prime Minister and Mrs. Poul Schuller on Aug. 25 and Canadian Prime Minister Brian Mulroney Aug. 30-31.

Top DEA agent arrested with 62 lbs. of cocaine

BOSTON — The arrest of a high-ranking federal agent involved in breaking the notorious "French Connection" heroin ring shows top investigators are as vulnerable to drugs as any other Americans, his former supervisor said.

Edward K. O'Brien, 44, the former head of the federal Drug Enforcement Administration's Springfield office, was arrested Monday at Logan International Airport in possession of suitcases filled with 62 pounds of cocaine worth an estimated \$560,000, officials said.

O'Brien had picked up the cocaine from an individual in Miami unaware that he was an undercover agent and was paid \$14,000 to deliver the drugs to another undercover agent in Boston, authorities said. He was expecting to be paid another \$14,000 when he delivered the cocaine, the authorities said.

"The law enforcement community is a family; we celebrate together and we grieve together and, above all, we try to protect each other from harm," John J.

Coleman, head of the Boston DEA office, said Tuesday of O'Brien's arrest.

"In the final analysis, our family is just as fragile as so many other American families touched and damaged by drugs," Coleman said.

At the time of his arrest, O'Brien, an 18-year veteran of the DEA, was assigned to agency headquarters in Arlington, Va., as a supervising agent.

The agent had received commendations from the French and U.S. governments for his anti-drug activities as head of the DEA in Nice, France, in the early 1970s, Coleman said. While in Nice, the agent was involved in the probe of the "French Connection" ring, Coleman said.

O'Brien is the highest-ranking DEA agent ever arrested in New England on such charges, although there have been several other higher-ranking DEA officials charged elsewhere in the United States, Coleman said.

O'Brien was charged with possession with intent to distribute, officials said.

Columbia tries to protect its judges

BOGOTA, Colombia — The Colombian government is mapping out a protection plan for more than 50 judges and their families who have received death threats from organized crime, Justice Minister Monica de Grieff said.

"The plan will include armored cars, more bodyguards and fortified villas," de Grieff said in a news conference Tuesday.

The announcement came, in part, in response to the resignation Monday of Judge

Alvaro Medina. Medina stepped down after receiving a telephone call on his private number Sunday, the caller promising to kill his only daughter unless the judge leaves the country.

"Whoever threatened me must have a tremendous intelligence apparatus because very few persons knew about the existence of my daughter — I am a single father — and even fewer know my phone number. I have been working under threats for more than a year now, but I cannot risk the life of my daughter," Medina said.

Housing starts up in July

WASHINGTON — Housing starts were up a stronger-than-expected 0.8 percent in July as a surge in new construction of single-family homes offset an anticipated decline in multi-family starts, the Commerce Department reported today.

Overall housing starts reached a seasonally adjusted annual rate of 1.43 million during the month compared with 1.42 million in June but were still 3.2 percent below the July 1988 level.

Single-family housing construction rose by an annual rate of 82,000 starts during the month, reflecting the impact of declining interest rates, which have dropped by more than a percentage point since late March.

Meanwhile, multi-family housing starts fell by 84,000 starts to an annual rate of 330,000.

Economists had expected the decline because multi-family starts had surged in June because of a statistical anomaly, driving overall housing starts up 8.5 percent, the biggest monthly increase since an 8.6 percent uptick in February 1988.

As a result, they generally had predicted relatively flat overall housing starts for the month, and the overall increase is a sign that the housing market is rebounding from its spring sluggishness.

"The pace of activity is definitely picking up in response to the lower mortgage rates," said Dick Peach, an economist with the Mortgage Bankers Association.

New 'emission control' gasoline unveiled

WASHINGTON — Atlantic Richfield Co. said Tuesday it will introduce a new kind of gasoline in Southern California this fall that is expected to reduce harmful emissions from older leaded-gasoline vehicles by 20 percent.

ARCO officials said the "emission control" gasoline will significantly reduce air pollution in Southern California — the nation's smoggiest urban area — and marks the first step toward the development of a new generation of cleaner-burning gasoline blends.

The low-pollution gasoline, dubbed "EC-1" by ARCO, is particularly important from an environmental standpoint because it will be used by older cars, which are the dirtiest on the road.

ARCO officials said that while only 15 percent of Southern California's 8 million cars and trucks run on leaded fuel, they account for 50 percent of the air pollution emitted by the region's vehicle fleet.

The new gasoline will be sold at ARCO stations from Santa Barbara to San Diego starting Sept. 1 and will be available only to pre-1975 cars and pre-1980 trucks that now run on leaded gasoline and have no catalytic converters, a pollution-control device typically found on newer cars.

ARCO officials said they will sell the new gasoline to dealers at the same price as its leaded gasoline, which no longer will be offered at ARCO's 700 Southern California outlets.

The company said it has no plans to market the "environmentally formulated" blend nationwide because ARCO only has service stations on the West Coast and there is only one refinery now capable of making the new gasoline.

Dairy production makes rare decline

WASHINGTON — Milk cows in the major dairy states produced 10.3 billion pounds of milk during July, 2 percent less than the previous July and one of the first declines in production in months, the government said Tuesday.

Output per cow during July at 22.88 pounds was nine pounds less than recorded in July 1988, the Agriculture Department said, and the number of dairy cows in the 21 states, a total of 8.5 million head, was 104,000 less under the July 1988 figure.

There were 4,000 fewer cows on farms in July, compared to June.

The department also revised its estimate of milk production in June and said it totaled 10.4 billion pounds, 1 percent less than the preceding June.

An Agriculture Department economist attributed the downturn in production to poorer quality feed and said production was likely to rebound soon.

Boeing kickback scheme admitted

SEATTLE — Lawyers for the president of a New York company said their client will admit in federal court that his firm sold falsely certified aircraft parts and paid kickbacks to a Boeing Co. employee and others.

The guilty plea expected today from Bruce J. Rice, 42, president of Rice Aircraft Corp., results from an investigation, conducted by a federal task force involving several agencies, into criminal practices in the aircraft parts supply business.

Since the parts — mostly rivets and other fasteners — were widely distributed to manufacturers of commercial airliners and the airlines themselves, the case has raised questions about aircraft reliability and safety, federal officials said. The parts also found their way into military aircraft, investigators have said.

Rice was scheduled to enter his guilty plea in U.S. District Court in Seattle. A separate guilty plea was expected to be entered by his lawyers on charges against the company. The pleas are subject to approval by a federal judge.

The federal force, called NORDECON, short for Northwest Defense Contracting, was formed after a Florida company was caught selling falsely certified parts.

Unemployment claims at record low

WASHINGTON — A record low 31.5 percent of jobless workers received unemployment insurance last year, with black and Hispanic workers even less likely to receive benefits, a report said Tuesday.

The analysis issued by the non-partisan Center on Budget and Policy Priorities said the 1988 coverage rate equaled the record low set in 1987 and marked the fifth straight year a record low was either tied or set.

Coverage rates varied widely among the states, ranging from 72 percent in Rhode Island to 17.3 percent in Florida, according to the report, which was based on Labor Department statistics.

Among minorities, the report found that only 31 percent of unemployed black

workers and 14 percent of jobless Hispanics received unemployment insurance.

Marion Nichols, a center consultant and former Agriculture Department official co-author of the report, said the decline in coverage stemmed in part from cutbacks in state and federal unemployment programs during the 1980s.

She said another factor may have been the increase in the number of workers in the service sector, who are less likely to know about or to qualify for unemployment than manufacturing workers.

According to the report, an average of 4.6 million jobless workers received no unemployment benefits in each month of last year, compared with an average of 2.7 million workers during the 1970s.

From 1984 to 1988, the report said, an average of only about one in three jobless

workers has received benefits. Since such statistics began being kept in 1965, the coverage rate only had fallen below 40 percent once before — when it was 39.3 percent in 1966 — and has been as high as 78.5 percent in 1975.

"The consistently low level of coverage over the last five years is unparalleled in the history of the unemployment insurance program," said Isaac Shapiro, the center's senior research analyst and the report's other author.

Fewer than one in four unemployed workers received benefits in 16 states — Florida, Oklahoma, Virginia, New Hampshire, Texas, Georgia, Indiana, Louisiana, Arizona, South Dakota, Kentucky, New Mexico, Mississippi, Alabama, West Virginia and Colorado, the report said.

Bodies of Leland, others recovered

ADDIS ABABA, Ethiopia — The remains of Rep. Mickey Leland, D-Texas, and 15 others aboard his crashed relief agency plane were gathered off a western Ethiopian mountainside Tuesday and flown to Addis Ababa for identification.

The 44-year-old chairman of the House Select Committee on Hunger, eight other Americans and seven Ethiopians died Aug. 7 when their plane — en route to a Sudanese refugee camp in Fugido — crashed into the peak 34 miles east of the town of Gambela.

Marine Lt. Col. David Titus, spokesman for nearly four dozen U.S. and Ethiopian military, medical and rescue personnel given the grim task of removing the remains from the steep mountainside, said the work in the dense brush where the burned and shattered wreckage was found was difficult. He said it could take five to seven days for forensic experts to identify the remains.

"It's been difficult throughout. You're talking a very steep slope, dense foliage — a very arduous situation," said Titus.

The bodies were taken by helicopter to a base camp at Gambela and then flown to a temporary field hospital at Addis Ababa's Bole Airport, head-

quarters of a six-day international search for Leland and his party. A 12-member U.S. forensic team was due to arrive about midnight to help identify the remains and prepare them for return to the United States.

"The identification process is going to be painstaking," Titus said. "Initial indications are it could take five to seven days."

Pentagon officials said that at Ethiopia's request, all the identification work would be performed in Ethiopia. The agency said the remains of Leland and the other Americans traveling with him would be returned to the United States directly from Addis Ababa.

Aviation experts from the National Transportation Safety Board, and officials from the Boeing Co., whose Canadian subsidiary de Havilland built the twin-engine DHC-6 Twin Otter turboprop, and Pratt & Whitney, which built the engines, are to join Ethiopian investigators Wednesday at the site some 270 miles west of Addis Ababa. The Canadian Air Safety Board also will participate in the investigation.

President Bush again took note Tuesday of the death of Leland and the Sunday night light plane crash death of freshman Rep. Larkin Smith, R-Miss.

Bush establishes education panel

WASHINGTON — President Bush, who already has proposed an education summit meeting of the nation's governors next month, established an advisory committee on education Tuesday.

Issuing an executive order, Bush established the President's Education Policy Advisory Committee to advise him "with respect to the objectives and conduct of the overall education policy of the United

States."

Bush, who on the campaign trail said he wanted to be the "education president," said the panel will conduct a continuing review of U.S. education policy. It will go out of business on Dec. 31, 1990.

The president, who will appoint members of the panel at a later date, said the committee will draw information from the heads of government agencies. It will include members of Congress.

Soviet shuttle still mothballed

STAR CITY, U.S.S.R. — Two veteran cosmonauts will blast off in September to reactivate the mothballed Soviet Mir space station, but officials said the Russian space shuttle will not make a manned flight until 1992 at the earliest.

Alexei Leonov, deputy head of the Star City cosmonaut training center, said at a news conference Tuesday that a variety of options was being debated for the Buran space shuttle, including the possibility of launching it to Mir unmanned at some point and returning it to Earth with a crew from the space station.

The Soviet shuttle has been a target of domestic criticism in recent weeks because of its high cost and uncertain role, and Leonov said the first manned flight of Buran was not scheduled until 1992.

The New York Times Tuesday quoted Maj. Gen. Vladimir Gudilin, head of the Soviet space shuttle program, as saying Soviet officials planned only one shuttle flight a year after that through the year 2000, a major cutback over plans that originally called for 10 flights per year.

The United States, meanwhile, just completed its 30th shuttle mission since 1981 with the shuttle Columbia's landing in California Sunday after a secret military mission. Six shuttle flights are planned for 1989 and nine in 1990. The United States hopes eventually to launch up to 14 missions a year.

Leonov said while "there will be no shuttle flights this year and next year," plans were under study to move up the next launch of Buran, which took off on its first and only mission in November 1988.

Fighting in Beirut continues

BEIRUT, Lebanon — Christian troops and Syrian and Moslem forces ignored a United Nations call for a cease-fire and continued their deadly artillery duels today as the death toll for the past week of fighting reached more than 120.

The renewed battles came after Christian leader Gen. Michel Aoun rejected the U.N. Security Council's appeal and vowed instead to force the estimated 35,000 Syrian troops out of Lebanon.

Police said clashes between Christian soldiers and Moslem militiamen raged before dawn across Beirut's 3-mile-long demarcation line and along a mountainous frontline 7 miles southeast of the capital.

Syrian artillery, set up in the Druze Shouf mountains, pounded the Christian coastline and the headquarters of Aoun, the head of a Christian military cabinet and commander of the Lebanese army, in the suburban Babda district.

The Moslem half of Beirut and a string of Druze villages were shelled by Christian gunners in retaliation, police said.

Police said at least five people were wounded in the exchange, raising the casualty toll in 24 hours of fighting to six dead and 40 wounded.

More than 120 people have been killed, including 16 Christian soldiers and 16 Druze militiamen, and 500 others wounded in the past seven days of fighting, police said.

Radical to head parliament in Iran

MANAMA, Bahrain — The Iranian Parliament elected an anti-Western radical as its new speaker today following the resignation from that post of newly elected president Ali Akbar Hashemi Rafsanjani, Tehran Radio said.

The state-run radio, monitored in Bahrain, said Mehdi Karubi was chosen by an overwhelming majority of the house to succeed Rafsanjani, who had been speaker since 1980.

Persian Gulf-based diplomats said Karubi's election had been widely predicted but it remained unclear what influence his rise would have on the fate of the Western hostages held in Lebanon.

The radio said Karubi won less than two-thirds of the 241 votes cast. He received 147 votes in favor.

The diplomats said Karubi's victory means that the Iranian parliament is now in the hands of Moslem radicals who will have veto power over the more moderate Rafsanjani's nominees for Cabinet and government posts.

Ortega promises to free prisoners

MANAGUA, Nicaragua — President Daniel Ortega freed a small group of Contra rebel collaborators and vowed to free at least 1,200 other prisoners to comply with promises he made to opposition parties.

In a nationally broadcast speech from Panatama, a town about 85 miles north of the capital, Ortega said Tuesday he was ready to "forgive" the Contras and urged rebels still at large to lay down their arms in accord with a plan signed by the five Central American presidents last week.

"All their rights will be guaranteed," Ortega said. "The government of Nicaragua is complying with its commitments."

Ortega said he was ready to free at least 1,200 farmers and peasants jailed for "direct or indirect involvement with the counterrevolution" to comply with an agreement he signed Aug. 4 with opposition political parties.

Duarte returns money

SAN SALVADOR, El Salvador — Former president Jose Napoleon Duarte has returned \$113,200 to the treasury of El Salvador that the Finance Ministry claims was money intended to aid victims of a 1986 earthquake, a Christian Democratic Party leader said Tuesday.

"Indeed, the former president deposited that (\$113,200) sum in the nation's treasury, through his attorney Pablo Mauricio Alvergue," said Eduardo Colindres, a high-ranking party member of the Christian Democratic Party, in which Duarte was a member.

The government-run daily newspaper "El Diario de Hoy," confirmed Monday Duarte's repayment of 568,000 colones, equivalent to \$113,200.

On July 7, the Finance Ministry filed a legal demand against Duarte, claiming he embezzled the money.

Polish Communist rule threatened

WARSAW, Poland — The Polish Communist Party, faced with the most serious challenge to its monopoly rule since the end of World War II has called for a meeting of all political forces, including Solidarity, in hopes of resolving the governmental crisis.

President Wojciech Jaruzelski said in a statement issued by his office Tuesday that the talks are necessary now that Prime Minister Czeslaw Kiszczak failed to form a government.

The statement ended a day of crisis and confusion that saw the minority Democratic Party split from its Communist Party coalition partner and announce its support for Solidarity leader Lech Walesa's efforts to form a Solidarity-led government.

"President Jaruzelski expresses his concern over the deepening instability in the polit-

ical and economic situation in Poland," the statement said. "The president intends to address the representatives of

the main political and society forces in the country and asks for their participation in a meeting whose aim would be finding rational solutions," the statement said.

Kiszczak, confirmed by Parliament on Aug. 2, has said he could not form a government because of opposition to his leadership by Solidarity. He proposed that he resign and that the job should go to Peasant Party Chairman Roman Malinowski, a longtime ally of the Communist Party.

"I trust the president will try to reach agreement soon with all political forces that count and which will together help create something new for Poland," Walesa said.

Walesa said he would become prime minister only "if the people wanted it."

He also said the Communist Party cannot be included in a new coalition. "We shall not allow the old method of ruling to come back," he said.

In the capital, Solidarity Sen. Jaroslaw Kaczynski continued consultations with the Peasant and Democratic parties, the two smaller parties in the current Communist-led government coalition.

The new political developments could lead to the establishment of the first government not led by Communists in Eastern Europe since World War II.

The Peasant and Democratic parties were minor partners in the outgoing Communist-led government. Walesa began wooing the parties to break from the Communists after Kiszczak was named prime minister.

In Gdansk, Walesa said Kiszczak's statement about a possible resignation "opens new possibilities for resolving the current government crisis."

Walesa pledged to respect Jaruzelski prerogatives if a "government of national responsibility is formed by Solidarity with the Democrats and Peasants Party."

Those prerogatives allow Jaruzelski to dissolve parliament and impose martial law in extreme situations. "It is the only chance to change a dangerous course of events in the country," he said.

Iran denies role in hostage crisis

MANAMA, Bahrain — An Iranian newspaper, apparently stung by President Bush's decision not to free Iranian assets held in U.S. banks, said the Western hostage crisis had nothing to do with Iran and was a purely Lebanese issue.

The daily Islamic International, in an article carried by Iran's official Islamic Republic News Agency, said U.S. speculation that Tehran may use its influence to secure the release of Western hostages in Lebanon was "strange and hypocritical."

"For Mr. Bush to be pinning hopes on Iran's assistance without respecting Tehran's conditions is wishful thinking," the pro-government Kayhan International said.

The newspaper's strong statements come amid signs that Iranian President-elect

Akbar Hashemi Rafsanjani, considered a pragmatist in light of his earlier offer to help gain freedom for Western hostages in Lebanon, is facing opposition from hard-liners within the Iranian leadership opposed to any contacts with the West.

The Tehran Times, a newspaper linked to Rafsanjani, suggested earlier this month that if the United States freed billions of dollars of Iranian assets in U.S. banks, Iran would try to use its influence in Lebanon to secure freedom for American hostages.

But Bush rejected the proposal as a ransom demand. The Iranian assets were frozen 10 years ago in the wake of the takeover of the U.S. Embassy in Tehran.

Kayhan International said Iran also opposed the idea of "ransom-for-hostages" but said the release of Iranian assets would be regarded "only as a goodwill gesture."

Sheik Obaid may get an attorney

JERUSALEM — Israel ordered Sheik Abdul Karim Obaid, the Hezbollah cleric abducted in July from southern Lebanon, held under administrative detention, allowing him access to an attorney, officials said.

It was not clear whether Obaid had talked with an attorney but Israeli investigators have interrogated the radical Moslem clergyman about Hezbollah's activities in Lebanon, operations against Israeli targets and the fate of Israeli and Western hostages, according to Israeli officials and media reports.

Israel routinely holds Palestinians from the occupied Gaza Strip and West Bank without charge or trial under the policy of administrative detention. But the practice has been condemned worldwide, including by Israel's strongest ally, the United States.

Israel Radio reported Tuesday that Obaid was initially held under a 15-day order of detention that Rabin extended to six months. The detention order was issued "a short time" before the government amended its administrative detention policy Friday, giving authorities the right to detain people without trial for as long as one year.

"With all the commotion after being beat, it took Craig a few

minutes to bring it to my attention," said District 14 manager Woody Woodard. "When he told me, Ralph (Cochran, Woodard's assistant) and I went to look at the official scorebook. But the man who had it had already left for the evening."

At 10 a.m. on Monday, Woodard and Cochran met with the official scorer and, after confirming that the pitcher had re-entered the game illegally, filed a protest. A call to Williamsport, Penn. (home of Little League Baseball and final arbiter in tournament protests) upheld the

Sloan resigns post of Tide athletic director

TUSCALOOSA, Ala. — Alabama Athletic Director Steve Sloan, embroiled in a dispute with the school president over the future of Crimson Tide athletics, announced his sudden resignation Tuesday. School president Roger Sayers, named to the post earlier this summer after serving as interim president for almost a year, said he and Sloan reached a joint decision on the resignation after reviewing the athletic program. He said Sloan will continue working on special projects for the school for the next six months at the same salary. "No single event or action has precipitated this decision," Sayers said. "We simply have a difference of opinion about the management of the program. As any chief executive officer, I want to have in place the administrative team of my choosing." Sayers said Sloan's resignation was no reflection on the football program or Coach Bill Curry, who was hired with Sloan in

1987. He also said neither Curry nor any other Crimson Tide coach would be allowed to serve in the dual role of athletic director. Sayers said last year that the final three years of Curry's five-year contract would be honored. Speaking Tuesday before a group of Vanderbilt boosters in Nashville, Tenn., Sloan said his resignation was the result of "a difference in management styles." "We just didn't agree on which direction the athletic program was going to take," Sloan said. "We both agreed that he wasn't going anywhere and we both agreed that I was. The only question was when." Sloan was a member of the Crimson Tide's national championship team in 1964 and formerly was football coach at Vanderbilt, Texas Tech, Mississippi and Duke before becoming Alabama's athletic director in 1987. Sloan, however, was criticized by some Alabama fans for his handling of several issues.

ordered the game replayed from the time of the infraction — the bottom of the seventh inning.

"The rules said that the game could have been forfeited to us," explained Woodard. "They did that to Taiwan about eight years ago when they used an illegal player. But Williamsport didn't want to forfeit the game."

So District 14 and Chicago went back to the field at 2 p.m. Monday.

Kenny Jackson led off for District 14 with a line drive single. After Ron Shamblin walked, Luis Guevera ripped a shot between the Chicago third baseman's legs down the left field line, scoring Jackson and sending Shamblin to third while he took second.

"I thought we had the game won right there," said Woodard. "We had runners at second and third, none out and our three best bunters (Joe DiFrancesco, Sewell and Carlos Abreu) coming up. I was just going to squeeze the tying and winning runs home."

While Chicago made a pitching change,

Woodard informed DiFrancesco and Shamblin of the plan. After DiFrancesco picked up his first strike, Shamblin would be coming home on a suicide squeeze play.

Anyone who's ever wondered why the play is called that would have understood after they saw what happened next. With an 0-1 count, DiFrancesco squared to bunt as Shamblin charged. Inexplicably, DiFrancesco offered at the pitch, which was low and outside, then pulled back. After that, Shamblin was an easy out.

"As soon as I saw Joe pull his hands back, I knew we were in trouble," said Woodard. "But we still had Guevera at third (he advanced on the play at the plate) and one out. I figured we could still get him home and tie the game."

After DiFrancesco fouled the next pitch off, Woodard decided to gamble on DiFrancesco's bunting ability and called for another suicide squeeze. But the bunt attempt went foul for strike three and DiFrancesco was out.

Dame Fortune wasn't through toying with District 14 yet. Sewell came up and flared

what looked like a game-tying hit down the right field line. But for some reason, the Chicago right fielder was standing near the foul line, in perfect position to make the catch and end the game.

"When I saw that ball, I thought we had pulled it out anyway," said Woodard. "But that right fielder was standing 10 feet off the right field foul line and made the catch."

Woodard said that losing the game twice in the span of about 16 hours was a personal horror for him and all the players.

"We got beat the night before, then we got new life," said Woodard. "We came back on Monday and looked like we were going to blow the place apart. Then it gets away from us again. I thought we had the game won. We may be the only team to ever lose three games in a double-elimination tournament."

Despite the frustrating way the summer ended for his club, Woodard was quick to point out that the team played almost perfect baseball to get to the World Series, beating several teams that probably more talented.

The study designated athletes as those who played on varsity teams in their sophomore (1980) and senior (1982) years. Blacks, Hispanics and women were the only minorities examined.

"... the data show that high school sports have been oversold as a vehicle for upward mobility," the report said in its summary. "We unearthed only meager evidence that sports help minority youth to climb the ladder of success in college or the work force during the four years following high school."

The report asserts the perception of sports as a training ground for life was illusory for minorities. The expectation that sports translate into a good job was deemed "highly unrealistic" by researchers.

"... it was mainly whites, not Hispanics or Afro-Americans, for whom athletic participation proved to be related to upward mobility after high school. With some exceptions, high school sport served as a reinforcer of white privilege, giving advantage to those who were already advantaged."

In a "disheartening" finding, the study says varsity sports actually hurt urban black females in the work place. Only 5 percent of such women held "high-status" jobs compared with 59 percent of the nonathletes.

The study found "no evidence" sports was a detriment to good grades. The report claimed minority athletes achieved higher test scores than nonathletes. They also were said to receive higher grades though the report did specify what courses the students took.

The study warned athletes about the "false promises" of professional sports. It also urged teachers and parents to expect as much from students in the classroom as on the field and that "pass to play" standards be put in place.

"Spread the word the 'dumb jock' image is false," the report said. "The message should be athletes perform as well or better than nonathletes."

The report was funded by Miller Lite and its research conducted by Don Sabo of D'Youville College and Merrill Melnick and Beth Vanfosson, both of the State University of New York at Brockport.

Among those on the advisory panel attending Tuesday's news conference was Anita DeFrantz, an International Olympic Committee representative and a former Olympic rower; and Richard Lapchick, director of The Center for Study of Sport in Society.

The Women's Sports Foundation was established in 1974 and is a non-profit organization advocating equal opportunity for women in sports.

She's 'made friends' with food

SANFORD — It took our Cook of the Week a long time to become interested in cooking. When she decided to try, the key for her was learning to relax with it. "I quit being hide-bound by the book," she said. "It never tasted like Granny's anyway."

Mary Elizabeth Derr was born and raised in Evergreen, Ala., halfway between Mobile and Montgomery. Her mother still lives there, and is noted in town for her cooking. "Most people in Evergreen would know Miss Myrtle Robinson's chicken pie or divinity," she said.

Derr never could recreate the light, airy consistency of her mother's divinity. Hers always came out the color of caramel and strong enough to pull like taffy, she said.

Derr was a tomboy growing up and could not be dragged into the kitchen. By the time she got married she had picked up a few basic skills from her mother and grandmother, but most of her trial-and-error training was still ahead of her. Remembering her mother's seemingly effortless way of "just making a meal happen," even on short notice, helped.

"Mother gave me both the gumption and the motivation to try to learn to cook," Derr said. If things did not always turn out as planned, so what? "If you make a mistake, unless you burn it to a crisp, it's not so bad you can't eat it," she said.

Most of the time, anyway, Derr does recall batches of homemade biscuits her children played pitch with, and hamburger steaks made with chili meat that were too tough to eat (they even looked tough, she said). The steaks were the only food her husband, Bill, asked her never to make again.

Derr's in-laws from her first marriage probably made the same plea about her baked chicken. She was newly married and her mother and father-in-law were coming for dinner. She had decided to fix a hen, but not liking the looks of hens at the store, she bought a fryer instead. "I checked it (the chicken) after three hours and it was tough, so I cooked it five more hours. That's eight hours for 2- to 2½-pound fowl. I've been doing bad things to chicken for a long time."

Her first experiences with cutting up whole chickens were no more successful. "After I was finished you couldn't recognize anything but the legs," she said. One day she seized an opportunity and paid a lady working next door 18 cents (all she had with her at the time) to teach her the proper way to take a chicken apart.

"Chicken and I have made friends over the years," she said. She now makes one of her favorite dishes with chicken, a little bouillon and water, a cup or so of white wine, a touch of soy sauce and any variety of vegetables she has in the house, including leftovers. She cooks it all together in a large pan or crockpot and serves it over rice. Her kids used to call this dish "stoup" (pronounced "stooop"), because it is thinner than stew but thicker than soup. Now everyone just calls it "stuff."

Derr has made friends with most types of cooking today. She likes a relaxed, social atmosphere when she cooks, and for formal meals she tries to

Mexico-microwave combo muy bueno

Foods with a Mexican flavor still rate high with many Americans. Corn products, dried beans and fresh vegetables are good sources of protein, vitamins and minerals and are inexpensive food products, another good reason for using them in the weekly meal planning.

Add a little flair to your meals. All of the ingredients can be purchased at the local supermarkets.

Salads are most welcome during the hot August days. These flour tortillas dry in the microwave to form attractive holders for the chicken and vegetable salad. Be sure to allow extra time for the chicken to marinate.

FAJITA SALAD

- 10 ounces skinned and boned chicken breast
- 1 fresh lime
- 1 clove garlic, minced
- ¼ teaspoon each of salt, cumin, chili powder and oregano leaves
- 4 flour tortillas (8-inch size)
- 1 green pepper, thinly sliced
- 1 small onion, thinly sliced
- 4 cups shredded lettuce
- 1 medium tomato, chopped
- Picante sauce
- ½ cup sour cream

Cut chicken into thin strips, and place in 1-quart casserole dish. Combine juice from lime, garlic, salt, cumin, chili powder and oregano in small dish. Pour over chicken strips, mixing to coat evenly. Let stand 30-60 minutes to marinate.

Gently press each tortilla into a 10-ounce glass custard cup, allowing edges to extend above dish. Microwave on 100 percent power, 4 minutes or until edges are dry and slightly brown. Carefully lift out of dish. Set aside to cool.

Add green pepper and onions to chicken. Microwave on 100 percent power, uncovered, 7-8 minutes or until chicken is tender, stirring twice. Place 1 cup shredded lettuce in each taco dish. Spoon chicken mixture onto lettuce, dividing evenly. Top each with some tomato, a little picante sauce, and sour cream.

Use garden-fresh tomatoes and peppers in this cheesy Mexican dip.

CHILI CON QUESO

- ½ cup chopped onion
- 1 tablespoon butter or margarine
- 2 medium tomatoes, peeled and chopped
- 1-2 hot chili peppers, seeded and chopped
- 5-7 dashes hot pepper sauce
- 1 teaspoon garlic salt
- 1 pound process cheese, cubed (Velveeta)

Combine onion and butter in 1-quart casserole dish. Microwave 1½-2 minutes or until butter melts and onion softens. Stir in tomatoes, peppers, hot sauce, garlic and cheese cubes. Microwave, uncovered, 6-7 minutes or until cheese melts. Serve with tortilla chips or fresh vegetable dippers.

Chili, cheese and meat are layered in a baking dish for this

casserole. Choose the chili that suits your individual taste. Some like it very hot!

CHILIES RELLENOS

- 1 pound lean ground beef
- 1 medium onion, chopped
- ½ teaspoon salt
- ¼ teaspoon pepper
- 1-2 cans (4 ounces) chopped green chilies, drained
- ½ cups shredded sharp Cheddar cheese
- 4 eggs
- 1½ cups milk
- ½-¾ teaspoon hot pepper sauce
- ½ cup all-purpose flour
- ½ teaspoon salt
- Paprika

Crumble ground beef into 1-quart casserole dish; add onion. Microwave on 100 percent power, uncovered, 5-6 minutes or until meat is no longer pink. Stir to break meat into pieces; drain. Mix in salt and pepper.

Arrange half of the chilies in a 10-by-6-inch baking dish. Layer evenly with cheese. Top with meat mixture and remaining chilies. Beat eggs lightly; add milk and pepper sauce. Mix in flour and salt; pour over chili-meat layers. Sprinkle with paprika. Cover with plastic wrap. Microwave on 100 percent power for 7 minutes. Remove plastic wrap, then microwave on 50 percent power 5-6 minutes or until set in center. Let stand 5 minutes. Cut into squares to serve. Makes about 6 servings.

Another casserole that can be prepared ahead of time is this one using chicken and chilies.

CHICKEN ENCHILADA

- 2½ cups cooked chicken, diced
- 1½ cups chicken broth
- 1 can cream of mushroom soup
- 1 can cream of chicken soup
- 1 can (4 ounces) chilies, chopped and drained
- 1 jar (4 ounces) pimientos, chopped and drained
- 1 tablespoon dry sherry
- 8 ounces (6 cups) Doritos, slightly crushed
- 1 pound grated Cheddar cheese

Mix all ingredients except chips and cheese. Cover the bottom of a 13-by-9-inch baking dish with 1 cup of cheese. Layer ½ of the chicken mixture, then ½ of cheese. Repeat, ending with chips topped with cheese. Refrigerate at least one hour or overnight. Microwave at 85 percent power for 20-25 minutes or until heated through. Serves 6-8.

"Fixing for two gets monotonous and that's why Bill and I switch off," she said.

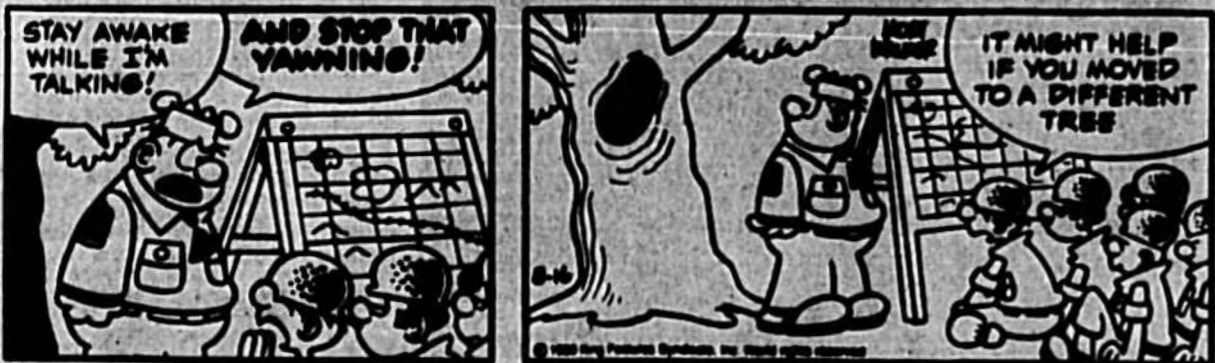

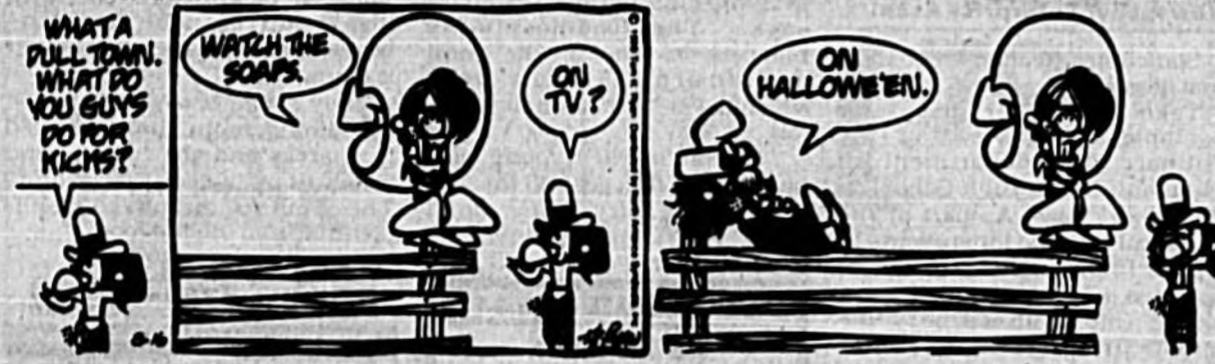

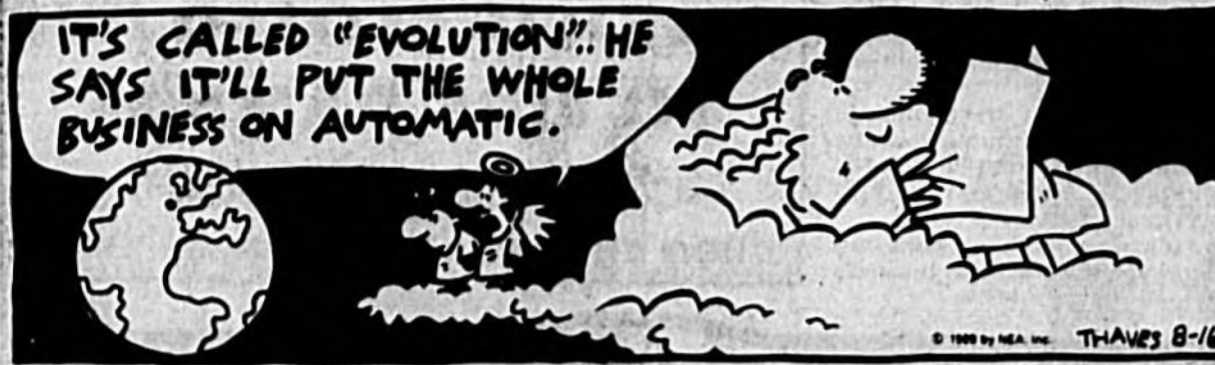

Podiatrists may help painful bone spurs

DEAR DR. GOTT: Please address the problem of bone spurs in seniors. Orthopedic surgeons do not recommend operation. Sponges in my shoes don't stop the pain. What are the chances of a 70-year-old getting back on the golf course?

is called "benign hereditary tremor," a fine-to-coarse shaking of the hands, head and voice that is inherited. It is worsened by stress, fatigue, certain drugs (such as caffeine) and the normal aging process.

DEAR READER: Little outcroppings of bone can occur in people of any age; however, they are more common in elderly patients and tend to affect the feet. Bone spurs can be particularly painful because they feel like stones in the shoe, pressing against ligaments, muscles and other sensitive structures. Orthotic devices—pads and such—when worn in shoes will often relieve some of the discomfort. Also, injections of cortisone, to relieve inflammation in the soft tissues around bone spurs, will usually reduce pain. As a final resort, surgery may be necessary to remove the offending irritant.

I don't know why your orthopedic surgeons refuse to operate. If you are active and enjoy golf, I would suggest surgery as a possibility. Ask your doctors to refer you to foot specialists at a teaching hospital for another opinion.

Although I'm going to take flak from my colleagues by suggesting this, you might want to be examined by a podiatrist. I've found that podiatrists are often successful in treating bone spurs on which M.D.s have stubbed their toes.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I'm a 42-year-old male with trembles and tremors. I do drink a lot of coffee, but I've had hand shakes from youth, long before my first cup of coffee. Can you suggest a cure?

DEAR READER: Tremulousness that begins before adulthood is usually called "physiologic tremor." It is usually a harmless embarrassment and nobody knows the cause. In its more severe form, it

WIN AT BRIDGE

With only 11 high-card points and shortness in spades, South passed originally — a conservative decision. But after partner opened and supported hearts, South quickly bid game. Expert play and some good guessing were required to bring the contract home. Declarer won dummy's spade ace, played a heart to his queen and another back to dummy's king. When West showed out of trumps, good luck was needed. First, where was the diamond jack? Declarer led the 10 from dummy. When East played low, declarer rose with the king and played a diamond back to the eight-spot. That forced the ace. East returned a spade, ruffed by declarer. Now a diamond to dummy's queen brought the good news that diamonds were splitting. But South still had to

find the club king with East. A low club was led from dummy, and East rose with the king and played still another spade. South ruffed, but still had to tread carefully. If he played his high trump, East would later ruff in and cash a spade. So declarer cashed his fourth diamond, throwing a club from dummy. East was helpless. If he ruffed and led a club, South would win the queen and pick up his trump. If he ruffed and led a spade, declarer would ruff in dummy, come to his hand with the club queen and pick up the last trump as before. Correct trump management saved the day. Declarer could not afford to draw trumps until he had set up his minor-suit winners. Even though one defender had a trump stack, it was to no avail when South kept a small trump in dummy.

Japanese leader will meet Bush

TOKYO — New Japanese Prime Minister Toshiki Kaifu will meet President Bush in Washington Sept. 1 to consolidate cooperative relations between Japan and the United States, the Asahi Shimbun newspaper reported Wednesday.

The national daily said Kaifu, who took office Aug. 9, plans to tell Bush that Japan's foreign policy based on close bilateral ties will remain unchanged despite the recent changes of government in Tokyo.

Quoting unnamed government sources, the daily said the date of the summit — Sept. 1 — has been arranged through diplomatic channels between the two countries.

White House officials were not immediately available for comment.

Kaifu's meeting with Bush will follow a visit to Washington by Canadian Prime Minister Brian Mulroney Aug. 30-31, the paper said.

Kaifu will pledge to Bush that he will continue policies laid down by former Prime Minister Noboru Takeshita to expand Japan's aid to developing nations and to promote Japan's economic restructuring in order to give foreign imports greater access to the Japanese market, the paper said.

Japan and the United States are scheduled to hold sub-cabinet-level talks in Tokyo early next month to discuss trade issues, including the restructuring of Japan's complicated distribution system.

Public support in Japan for Kaifu's government received a favorable rating in a poll released Wednesday in the Tokyo Shimbun newspaper.

The paper said 46.5 percent of those polled gave the new administration a favorable rating, while 43.1 percent said they did not support the government. It was the third lowest rating on record for a new administration.

The paper said the report was based on a survey of 3,000 eligible voters picked at random across Japan on Aug. 11 and 12, a few days after Kaifu formed his Cabinet Aug. 9.

Kaifu's ruling conservative Liberal Democratic Party lost a majority in the upper house of the parliament, or Diet, for the first time since its founding in 1955 in an election held July 23. The party still controls the more powerful lower house.

Kaifu succeeded Souseike Uno, who took office in June after Takeshita resigned to take responsibility for Japan's worst postwar bribery scandal, which implicated Takeshita and most other LDP leaders.

Kaifu will stress in his meeting with Bush that the LDP will continue to be in power and therefore Japan's basic foreign policy stance will remain unchanged, the daily said.

New Japanese Foreign Minister Taro Nakayama, meanwhile, met with U.S. Ambassador to Japan Michael Armacost Tuesday and assured the envoy that the political turmoil in Japan has no bearing on the durability of the Japan-U.S. alliance, government officials said.

Nakayama is expected to accompany Kaifu on his trip to Washington, government sources said. "The government led by the Liberal Democratic Party has indeed been replaced repeatedly but our ties of alliance with the United States are completely different from our relations with other countries," Nakayama was quoted as telling Armacost.

Nakayama added the present security framework under the U.S.-Japan Security Treaty will continue to serve as a foundation of bilateral ties, the officials said.

Chinese students charged tuition

BEIJING — China, in another apparent move to snuff out political activism on campus, will require students entering college this year to pay partial tuition except in technical fields where tuition remains free, an official newspaper reported today.

The decision by the State Education Commission is the latest in a series of steps to exert more control over students and discourage political activity, especially among students in social sciences, who were at the center of the democracy movement this spring.

The English-language China Daily quoted commission officials as saying many of this year's freshmen nationwide would be required to pay partial tuition costs and said it was part of the government's effort to increase revenues for deficit-ridden colleges.

The fees will range from 50 yuan (\$14) to 150 yuan (\$40) per semester. But in a nation where the average wage is around 120 yuan (\$32) a month, the payments would make students think much harder about skipping classes to attend political activities.

The China Daily, in fact, noted "the apathy most college students feel about their studies" and attributed it to "the fact that the public is paying the bills."

The report did not say how many of the 600,000 freshmen entering more than 1,000 higher education institutes across China this fall the new policy would apply to, but said it would not affect upper classes.

However, the newspaper added, "college applicants will be encouraged to specialize in such fields as education, agriculture, forestry, metallurgy, mining and geology, subjects that will continue to be offered at full public expense."

The categories, apparently discouraging the social sciences, reflect the priorities of conservative leaders ascendant since the army brutally suppressed the student-led democracy movement in June and the government launched a sweeping crackdown on dissent.

Education, agriculture and technical fields are seen as vital to the country's economic modernization, and graduates in those fields will also be valuable in China's rural areas and remote interior.

The State Education Commission last weekend announced a plan to require most Chinese college graduates to work at manual labor for at least a year before being allowed to enter graduate school.

Reports in the state-run press on the work program suggested it would apply especially to social sciences students.

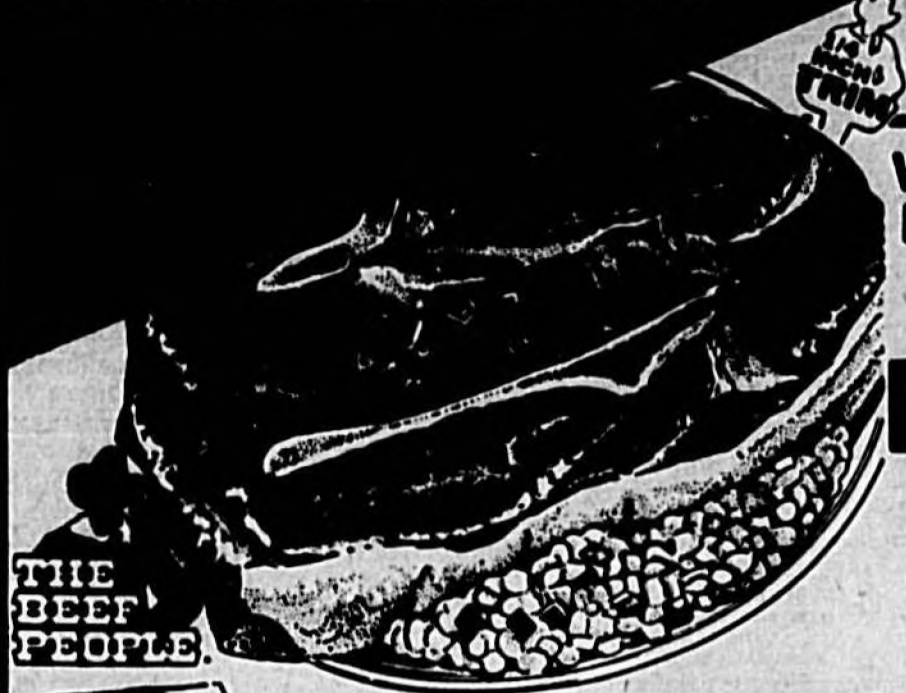

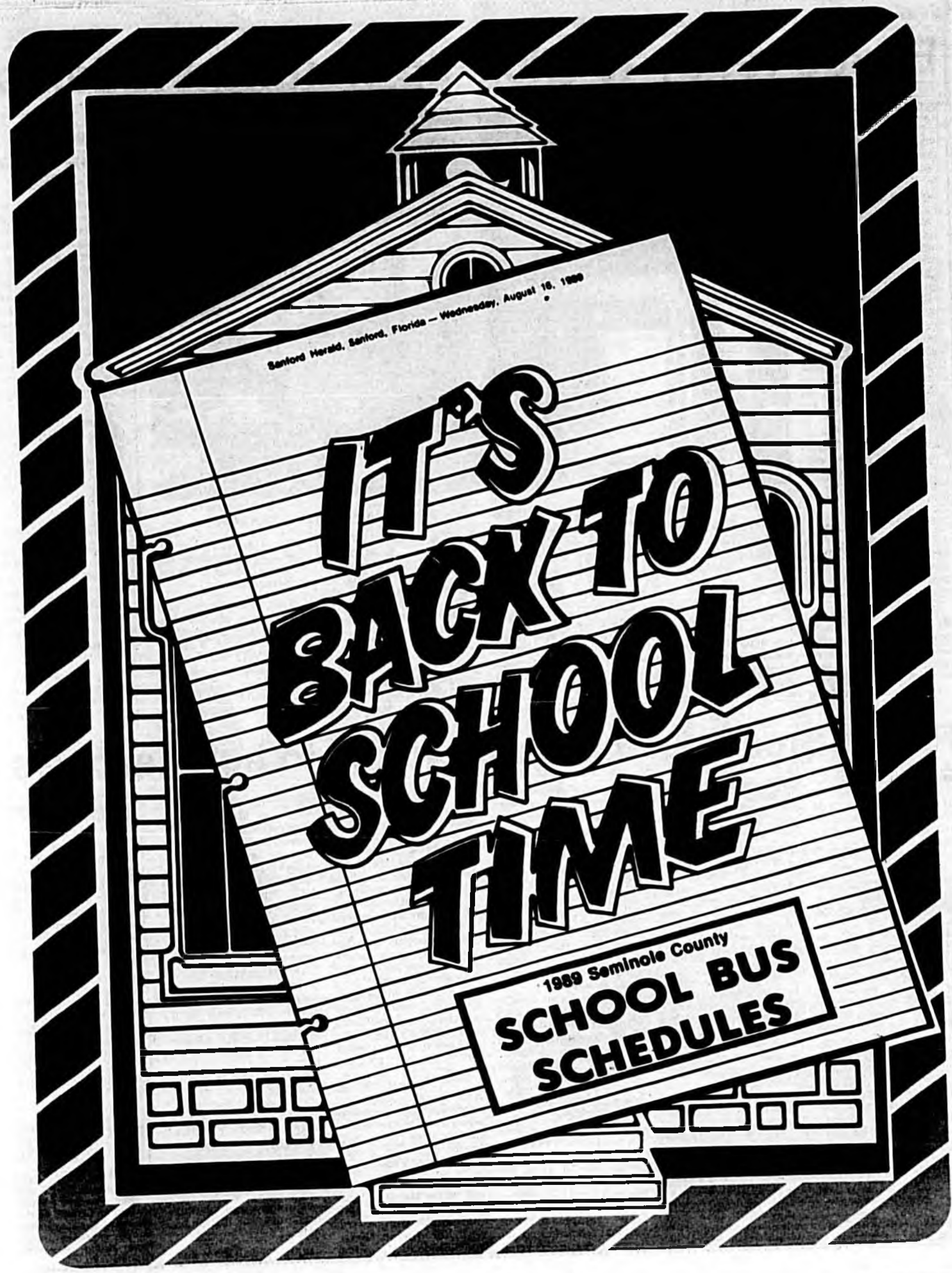

Buses ready to pick up waiting students

SANFORD — The Seminole County school district is growing rapidly, adding students at a rate of more than 2,000 per year.

More than 24,000 of the district's approximately 45,000 students ride a district bus to school and home again in the afternoon. It is the district's responsibility to transport all students who live more than two miles from the school.

Occasionally, exceptions are made to transport students who live less than two miles from their zoned school, if the path they must walk is deemed to be hazardous.

"Safety is our main concern," Benny Arnold, the district's director of transportation, said in mid-August, just before classes resumed for the 1989-90 year.

The transportation department employs about 240 drivers and maintains a fleet of nearly 300 buses.

In the tentative budget for the upcoming school year, \$1,031,828 has been appropriated to replace 40 vehicles which were over a decade old. The process of getting

new buses in a long one that can not be achieved overnight.

"We've been doing this a little at a time," said Arnold.

Maintenance of the vehicles is a priority for the department, according to Arnold. Twenty four full time mechanics make sure the buses are in top working order.

Regular maintenance to the vehicles keeps even the older vehicles running smoothly.

Several buses are specially equipped to transport handicapped children.

The transportation department was required to redo the bus routes this year due to the rezoning of the district's schools.

"I'd imagine we'll be doing that a lot in the future," said Arnold at the public hearing regarding the transportation department's 1989-90 policies which was held in May.

In addition to regular bus routes, the district provides transportation to teenage mothers from throughout the county

who are enrolled in special programs at the Crooms School of Choice in Sanford.

The young ladies and their babies are taken to Crooms and returned to their homes (or, if that is not possible, to the stop nearest their homes) every day.

They are also transported to doctors ap-

Their dispatchers or route managers will try to answer any questions you might have.

Routes will not be changed during the school year. A public hearing will be held in April or May for changes requested for the 1990-91 school year.

pointments or other appointments approved by the Crooms principal.

While the district does not provide special vehicles for these young ladies, their babies must be strapped into state approved baby seats.

Public Broadcasting Corp. wants to help teachers

Providing teachers with resources that exceed the boundaries of the classroom is a major goal for the Corporation for Public Broadcasting, which encourages the use of television as a supplement to textbook learning.

The CPB's Education office works with elementary and secondary school teachers, providing tools to help them use public television creatively.

In an effort to improve science and math education, CPB offers two guides that coordinate the content of instructional television series with textbook lessons for elementary and junior-high school science students.

"Instructional Television for Elementary Science" and "Instructional Television for Junior High Science" provide page-number references for specific

lessons in the textbooks, matching them to the content of such shows as "Up Close and Natural" and "Community of Living Things."

"Presenting the lesson and then watching a program on TV helps students have a far better understanding of the subject matter," said Carol Dohles, a sixth-grade teacher in Raleigh, N.C.

The popular series "Square One TV" and its detective sequence "Mathnet" — a takeoff on the old police show "Dragnet" — disproves the theory that learning math is boring and dull and a drag.

Produced by the Children's Television Workshop and supported by CPB, the show offers an accompanying teacher's guide to help instructors build lesson plans using segments of the series.

"If a teacher shows one episode of 'Mathnet' a day, the class can work

along with the detectives as they gather information and zero in on a solution," said the show's content director, Joel Schneider.

Teachers also can learn about public television's classroom applications through "Learning Link," a CPB-funded, interconnected electronic communications system that provides information on programming and related activities.

"Teachers can actually exchange ideas with connected colleagues throughout their state or region on how to better integrate a particular program into the lesson plan," said Meg Villarreal, CPB's coordinator of special projects.

"Bibliographies and course outlines customized to take advantage of local resources are also available through local 'Learning Link' outlets," she said.

For example, a list of national resources on adolescent issues covered

on the show "DeGrass Junior High" was compiled and individual "Learning Link" sites could tailor the information, adding their own local experts whom teachers could contact.

An innovative two-page advertisement in several teacher publications brings parents into the picture to make education a cooperative effort between home and school. The ad lists upcoming series and specials, and students can bring a copy of the list home so the family can enjoy the program together.

"The 'Parents through Teachers' campaign extends the classroom experience to the home, making parents and teachers partners in education," said Villarreal.

"We've put together ads for the May and June issues of Learning and Instructor magazines with the theme 'Keep Your Students Learning

All Summer with Public TV," said Mary Maguire, CPB's director of external communications. "We're already looking at doing a back-to-school edition."

CPB offers the booklet, "TV Tips for Parents," with suggestions on how they can help their children get the most out of educational programming.

New reading program given high marks

Johnny still can't read. But an innovative new program suggests schools aren't really to blame: students just need to "learn how to learn." Graduates of the program are returning to the classroom and wowing their teachers at a time when America's schools are stumbling.

Statistics show that more than 1 million teenagers drop out of high school each year, even though research indicates that virtually all of them are smart enough to graduate.

Of the 2.4 million who do get their diplomas each June, as many as 25 percent of them still cannot read or write at even the eighth-grade level.

A program called Active Learning Inc., based in California's Marin County, seeks to remedy that.

It says students are failing because even with years in school they just don't know the best ways to take tests, write essays, take notes or communicate with teachers.

But what's holding

Johnny and Jenny back the most is making the mistake of believing that schools teach, Active Learning educators say.

"No one walks into a library and says, 'Now make me smart,'" said Landon Carter, a founding director of Active Learning. "You've got to dig it out. The library is just a resource."

"Unfortunately, people walk into school and sit there passively and say, 'Do it to me.' The system tends to encourage it. But there are specific ways to learn from a lecture. Specific ways to learn from a textbook."

"Students need to hold themselves responsible for getting educated and using themselves as resources. With responsibility comes freedom. If you do the job right, life will be a heck of a lot better because you'll get your work done quicker and easier. Teens respond to that."

"They enjoy the time they spend with us because they learn school is not a function of intelligence. It's a function of method — whatever the subject. It has nothing to do with

being smart or not smart."

Active Learning brings groups of high school and college students together at working residential camps on campuses and trains them in the skills that enable them to succeed in school.

It's kind of a management course for teenagers.

"The key is to work smart — not hard," said Carter, a Harvard MBA and former instructor at Stanford University's Business School. "You work the hardest when you're trying to succeed and using the wrong methods."

Students learn how to set goals by creating "Master Plans" for each of their subjects. They practice such skills as memorization techniques, speaking in class, writing compositions and reports and thinking methods in problem-solving subjects like math and science.

Active Learning graduates — and their parents — say the program works.

"My teachers could tell the difference right

away," said Shannon Cheeno, 18, of San Jose, Calif., who now plans to attend college. "My grades went from D's and F's to B's. I was really struggling and had just dropped out of summer school. All I wanted to do was get out of school."

Despite an IQ of 145, Aaron Omer, 17, needed to learn how to organize.

Daniel Borbely's school sent a letter to his parents complimenting the remarkable change in their 18-year-old after taking the course and his making the honor roll.

Family stress held back Corine Kidd, 14, in school until she gained a mastery of school skills.

A 46-year-old woman even used the course to prepare for law school.

"Every student can use Active Learning because it's basically the job skills on how to succeed in school," Carter said. "Even good students need to be more efficient to take the pressure and stress off themselves."

"Things like time management and master planning that they used to teach teachers, we're teaching kids. We've put together all the methods

and technical skills you need in school."

Active Learning, based in Corte Madera, Calif., begins with a six-day residential course on one of nine college campuses in California, including University of Southern California and the University of San Francisco, from July to September. Follow-up counseling sessions are held the rest of the year.

The program, founded by Carter and co-director Peter Lenn in 1986, expands to Chicago and New York next years.

Carter said the group has received enthusiastic support from the schools.

"People in the educational field all think we're doing a good thing," Carter said. "We hire teachers from schools to work for us during the summer, they see us as making a real academic contribution."

"Schools have an enormous amount of content to teach. If we can make better students who are responsible for their own education and empowered through techniques and skills to be successful, then we've contributed to the process."
