

Byron Nelson Beats Heafner In Golf Meet

Texan Shoots Great 67 to Win Play-Off And \$2,500 Prize

CHICAGO, July 28, (AP)—The Texan O'Banion money scramble, better known as the \$10,000 Golf Open, came to an end Monday with a fantastic performance by Byron Nelson, the winner.

Nelson successfully defended his title by crushing Clayton Heafner, the man-mountain pro of Louisville, Ky., with a sub-par 67-10 strokes below his Sunday round which sent him against Heafner in the 18-hole play-off.

Nelson, the Texan who works out of Toledo, Ohio, posted a 33-34 to his opponent's 34-37 to maintain his record of never losing a play-off for a major golf championship. Heafner, recent winner of the Mahoning Valley Open at Girard, Ohio, had never before won an extra hole.

A \$2,500 check went to Nelson, swelling his season's official earnings to \$9,601 which surpassed those of Sam Snead and left the Toledo pro second to Ben Hogan in the money chase. The figures, announced by Fred Corps, PGA tournament manager, listed Hogan at \$11,993 and Snead at \$8,078.

It was the 39th successive tournament that Nelson finished in the money, compared with Hogan's all-time record of 58 straight cash finishes.

Public Is Asked To Restrict Phone Use

The congestion of long distance and local telephone calls is becoming an annoyance that the Southern Bell Telephone Company is asking the telephone using public to make only necessary calls, to be brief and to avoid using long distance lines during the hours when calling is heaviest.

Manager E. V. Turner said in explaining that the public can best help by making only necessary long distance calls by making these calls before 1:00 A.M. between 9:00 and 2:00 P.M. 5:00 and 7:00 P.M. and after 9:00 P.M. by making only necessary local calls being as brief as possible and being considerate in the use of the service if there are others on the line.

In normal times as would be the case, this situation is handled by the telephone company and its employees, but in the emergency of the materials and supplies necessary for telephone construction and the manufacture of war weapons, the lack of these essential materials makes it necessary to ask the public to cooperate in relieving the load on the long distance and local service. Mr. Turner said, "The object of this request" continued Mr. Turner, "is to save vital materials needed in the war effort and to avoid a congestion which might interfere with the urgent calls of the army, navy and other branches of military and government service."

Mr. Turner emphasized that from the standpoint of telephone calls, the south is one of the most congested areas in the country. Long distance calls have increased about 58 percent during the past two years and the number of local calls per telephone is the highest in the entire Bell System.

In Sanford, originating long distance calls have increased about 60 percent during this same period.

Australia Reports Birth Rate Increase

SOMEWHERE IN AUSTRALIA July 28, (AP)—In the wake of a wartime marriage boom in 1940, Australia's birth rate turned upward last year.

S. R. Carver, acting statistician, reported that the commonwealth's birth rate increased from 18.02 to 19.22 per thousand. There were 126,347 births in 1940 and 134,525 in 1941.

Marriages last year totaled 75,145, compared with the record number of 77,489 in 1940, when a top marriage rate of 11.11 per thousand of population was reached.

For the first time in 20 years, Australia's death rate exceeded 10 per thousand. The death rate in 1941 was 10.17, against 9.75 in 1940.

Australia's population had increased from 7,008,889 in 1940 to 7,137,221 at the end of 1941.

RAF Blasts Hamburg Again In Heavy Raid

Large Fires Occur At Great Nazi Port; 32 Big Bombers Are Reported Missing

LONDON, July 29, (AP)—Hamburg was pounded by a heavy bomber raid last night for the second time in three nights. Thirty-two RAF bombers were missing, large scale fires were seen in the great seaport city by bomber crews in low level attacks beneath cloud ceilings.

RAF planes in great numbers dropped "block-buster" bombs on the submarine building port. Air Marshal Sir Arthur Harris, chief of the bomber command, broadcast a grim warning to Germany that "we are going to scourge the Third Reich from end to end."

In comparison with what it was in 1940, Harris said, "We are bombing Germany city by city, and ever more terribly in order to make it impossible for you to go on with the war."

That is our object. We shall pursue it relentlessly. "City by city, Hamburg, Berlin, Cologne, Essen, Bremen, Wilhelmshaven, Dusseldorf, Hamburg—and the list grows longer and longer."

Let the Nazis dig down to disaster with them if you will. That is for you to decide."

Harris said he was speaking frankly to the Germans "about whether we bomb single military targets or whole cities."

"Obviously we prefer to hit factories, shipyards and railways," he said, "it damages their war effort."

These plants are close to work, and therefore we hit your houses and your lives. We regret the necessity for this."

"True, your defenses inflict losses on our bombers. Your leaders try to comfort you by telling you our losses are heavy, but we will not be able to go on bombing much longer."

"I tell you our losses are less than five percent of the bombers which we send over Germany."

His broadcast followed a German broadcast minimizing the damage and casualties in the RAF's raid on Hamburg Sunday night, which pilots said was as comparable in effectiveness to the 1,000-plane raids on Cologne, Essen and Bremen.

Florida Flyer In England Praises British Airmen

WITH THE RAF FIGHTER COMMAND IN BRITAIN, (AP)—The first of the United States Air Force fighter pilots to fly over France with the RAF had high praise yesterday for the British flyers.

"I have been flying with the RAF for some time, and I have seen that they can lead the United States Air Force in the European theater of operations."

Opposing Patrols Cautiously Spar In Egyptian Fight

RAF And Presumably U.S. Bombers Hit Axis Supply Lines

(By Associated Press) On the Egyptian front, British and Axis patrols sparred cautiously today while the RAF and presumably American heavy bombers attacked the vital Axis supply lines of the Mediterranean.

The Axis Air Force of Marshal Erwin Rommel, stalled now for four weeks in the Qattara-Mediterranean corridor west of El Alamein, appeared yesterday to be hesitating, according to British sources.

There was evidence that Rommel had abandoned hopes of an immediate revitalized drive on the Nile Delta and would be satisfied for the present to hold what he has gained in the long narrow strip of land between the Nile and the Mediterranean.

The latest outbreak of desert fighting came Monday and the battle continued into Tuesday with the Allied attackers failing to reach their positions after heavy fighting.

The British communications were cut, and a second 1,000 British bombers were taken in battle, with two Axis divisions south of El Alamein and said that 42 vehicles were destroyed.

Army Takes Over Strike-Bound Bus Line In Alabama

HUNTSVILLE, Ala., July 29, (AP)—The Army today took over the operation of a strike-bound bus line to the Huntsville Chemical Warfare Arsenal and the Redstone Ordnance Plant here as a result of A.P.I. drivers and mechanics crippled public transportation to three north Alabama war industries.

Five buses were operated by the Army solely for workers in the ten war plants. The strike was called Monday at midnight after the Crescent Motor Line, Inc., and Crescent Stages, Inc., failed to meet the drivers and mechanics wage increase demands.

Government Sets Workers Policy Of 48 Hours Week

Vacations To Restore Laborers' Health Are Said Necessary

WASHINGTON, July 29, (AP)—The government yesterday established a policy that, generally speaking, the nation's millions of war production workers should not work more than eight hours a day and forty-eight hours a week, and that all workers should have vacations to restore their energy.

The office of war information said the move was designed to protect health, promote work efficiency and to stop "labor piracy" by plants, which siphon workers away from other jobs by offering them opportunities of putting in long overtime at high pay.

OWI emphasized that the war production act's provision requiring time and a half pay for all work after forty hours a week is not to be used as a device for forcing workers to work longer hours.

The policy standards subscribed to jointly by the war and navy departments, maritime commission, public health service, war manpower commission, war production board, commerce and labor departments were outlined by the OWI as follows:

1. For wartime production the eight hour day and the forty-eight hour week approximate the best working schedule for sustained efficiency in most industrial operations.

2. One scheduled day of rest for the individual in approximately every seven days should be a universal and invariable rule.

3. A thirty-minute meal period is desirable.

4. Vacations are conducive to sustained production.

British Blast German Steel Center At Saar

Lose Nine Planes; Goebbels Warns Allies Against Second Front Try

British warplanes attacked Germany last night for the seventh time in 10 nights, heavily pounding the big steel manufacturing center of Saarbrücken in the Saar valley coal fields. Nine RAF planes were missing.

German night raiders countered with widely separated attacks on the British Isles, dropping a few bombs on greater London for the first time since June 3, and striking at Birmingham and East Angles. Seven German raiders were shot down.

RAF fighters were seen attacking the German coast, and a few bombers were seen in the night sky over the English coast.

Between July 11 and 28, it was revealed, 23 separate fighter attacks were carried out, in which 16 locomotives, 3 destroyed, 11 freight trains damaged and halted, 20 river barges damaged and numerous freight yards, stations, bridges and canal docks riddled with gunfire. In one raid 11 Spitfires located nine stationary locomotives and knocked over one of them out of action. Heavy damage was caused by the fighter raids, sometimes by traffic on main lines for 24 hours, and bullet holes in locomotive boilers usually cause explosions that require the removal of new boilers on engines. One RAF squadron alone has damaged or destroyed 50 locomotives in six weeks.

Death Of Convict Is Reported In Investigation

TALLAHASSEE, July 30. (AP)—State investigation of the self-maiming of 13 white convicts revealed yesterday for the first time publicly that another prisoner died two years ago after being beaten by a guard in the same camp.

State Atty. Gen. Burton reported the prisoner who died was John McLaughlin, but did not disclose the name of the guard.

McLaughlin died at the State prison hospital March 25, 1940, after being transferred there from State Road Department camp No. 33, then located in Highlands County, suffering from pneumonia, the physician's report said, and an autopsy disclosed that he had two broken ribs, a fractured vertebra and internal injuries.

State Atty. Gen. Burton informed Gov. Spessard L. Holland yesterday that he would present the McLaughlin death case to a special Highlands County grand jury called for Aug. 8.

Burton turned up the death of McLaughlin in investigating why 13 convicts cut their heel-strings at camp 33 during the past two months in protest of what they charged was brutal treatment by camp officials.

He said he would prosecute J. R. Anaba, camp foreman named in affidavits by the prisoners, for beating a convict named Lawrence Weaver during last March. Weaver was one of the convicts who mutilated themselves and tried to be transferred to the State prison hospital for treatment. They were not permanently injured.

The Scouts are continuing to bring in loads, and the drive is said to be satisfactory.

Goebbels Warns Allies Against Second Front Try

Battle-Trained Nazi Troops March To "Invasion Coast"

BERLIN, July 30. (AP)—The German high command today issued a statement warning the Allies against a second front try. The statement said that the German high command was "heartily welcoming" the British and French to the invasion of France, but that it was "not prepared to discuss the possibility of a second front try."

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French dispatches called the statement in Paris "important and timely," and said that it was "a clear indication of the German high command's attitude towards the Allies."

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Drug stores, food stores and department stores reported retail sales gains of 29, 19 and 15 percent, respectively, over the same month of 1941.

Motor vehicle dealers reported their sales off 78 percent and furniture stores were down 38 percent compared with June 1941. Independent retailers reported from Tampa registered dollar sales up 9 percent for June 1942 over the same month a year ago, while retailers in Jacksonville and Miami recorded respective sales gains of 23 and 7 percent.

11 Are Killed In Airplane Crash

MINNEAPOLIS, July 30. (AP)—Eleven Northwest Airlines employees were killed when a U. S. Army cargo transport plane crashed on the Wald-Chamberlain Field during a take off. A fire which broke out on the plane killed the crew and several passengers. The crash occurred at about 2:30 p. m. and the plane was on its second take off attempt.

Farms In County Have Average Of 76 Acres Of Land

Farms in Seminole County have an average of 76 acres of land, according to a report by the U. S. Bureau of the Census. The report shows that the average size of a farm in the county has increased since 1930.

In 1930 the 58,000 farms in the state averaged 85 acres each, while in 1940, the number of farms had increased to 68,000, and the average size of a farm had increased to 123.9 acres.

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Cripps Tells British Parliament, "We Have Intentions" Of Opening Front
