## Danger Seen In Cold Wave To Florida

62 Deaths Reported As Nation Shivers In Icy Grip Of Sub-Zero Readings

CHICAGO, Dec. 20. (AP)—The thermometer hovered at sub-zero readings at many points in the midwest today as the entire eastern half of the nation shivers in the grip of a pre-winter cold wave. That same half of the nation was blanketed for the part under a heavy fall of snow.

Southerners are shivering in the coldest weather of winter so far with sub-freezing temperatures extending into Florida. Cron City reported 29 degrees this morning. Tallahassee had a low of 25, Jacksonville 31, Daytona Beach 39 and Miami 56.

The forecast calls for freezing temperatures further south tonight, possibly into the Lake Okechobee region, inland from West Palm Beach.

Farms and groves in Florida stand to suffer the greatest disaster in its history if the record-breaking current cold wave in the north moves down the Florida peninsula with any intensity, it is believed.

Not only is the annual \$12,000,000 vegetable crop just now at the vulnerable stage but there are \$60,000,000 worth of lime and avocado trees which are being nursed back to health after being battered by the September hurricane.

For all these crops, the present trend of the weather is crucial. Elsewhere the cold and snow combined to continue a snarl of transportation in the north, with many schools and a curtailment of production in many industries throughout the affected area.

The pre-winter weather has accumulated in one way or another for at least 22 deaths.

Federal forecasts in Chicago predicted a temporary break in the prolonged cold wave. But they follow up with a warning of a new cold front moving down from central Canada.

The heaviest blanket of snow in the eastern states, Upper New York continues to dig its way out of a mantle of white five feet deep in some areas. New York City has its heaviest snowfall in more than 10 years—12 inches. The fall measures 20 inches in Hartford, Conn., and 10 inches in Boston.

The temperatures in most areas have been right in line with the rest of the weather. Bowling Green, Ky., however, in the below zero weather to claim the dubious distinction of being the coldest spot in the Southern States.

Residents of Grand Forks, N.D., could say that was bad at last. They shivered in 15 degrees below zero temperature—84 yesterday.

## Hirohito Kept Hands Off As War Approached

Diary Shows Emperor As Only One With Power To Stop Army

TOKYO, Dec. 20. (AP)—Emperor Hirohito was pictured today as the only one in Japan who could have controlled Japan's war-bent militarists and the Emperor, Konoye killed himself by taking poison last Sunday. He committed suicide rather than face trial as a "sincere wish for peace."

In his memoirs, Konoye looked back on the long but futile peace negotiations between Japan and the United States. He said that Emperor Hirohito's "hands-off" policy with regard to the Japanese Army and Navy, as well as the diplomatic corps, was "never deeply."

Nevertheless, Konoye asserted that Hirohito, at all times, maintained what Konoye said was a "sincere wish for peace."

Konoye, however, made no attempt to fix blame in his factual account of the two cabinets he headed prior to the war. However, he did condemn Japan's system of government which allowed the Army to have a free reign.

NUERNBERG, Dec. 20. (AP)—Records of the Nazi Elite Guard (SS) disclosed today that surgeons attempted to save four prisoners of war, but the concentration camp doctors refused to observe the bullet wounds.

The records were introduced by the American prosecution at the Nuernberg war crimes trial. They showed that the surgeons carefully recorded the symptoms as the victims slowly died. The SS records disclosed that the bullet wounds caused death for three out of five prisoner victims.

These and other charges were leveled against the notorious black-shirted Elite Guards. The American prosecution is continuing to support its charge that the SS and five other organizations were convicted as criminal groups.

Only 20 of the 22 top Nazis on trial at Nuernberg were in the prisoners' box at today's trial session—the last before the court adjourns for two weeks over the Christmas-New Year holiday.

Former Nazi Security Police Chief Ernst Kaltenbrunner has suffered a recurrence of a cranial hemorrhage and could not attend the trial session. Army doctors said his condition was improved somewhat, but they say he may die from his ailment.

The 23rd defendant—Adolf Hitler's former deputy, Martin Bormann—is being tried in absentia. He still is listed officially by the Allies as "missing."

## Edda Mussolini Is Sentenced To Prison

ROME, Dec. 20. (AP)—The so-called "glamor girl" of the Fascist regime in Italy, Edda Mussolini, is not feeling so glamorous now. According to a Moscow dispatch to a Home newspaper, the daughter of former Premier Benito Mussolini and the widow of Fascist Foreign Minister Count Galeazzo Ciano has been sentenced to two years' imprisonment. The sentence is understood to have been passed by an Italian Provincial Commission.

The dispatch says that Edda was charged with conducting herself in a Fascist manner, and with aiding the Italian foreign policy which led to the alliance with Germany. In addition, Mussolini's daughter was accused of maintaining friendly relations with German political leaders, and of selling abroad the diary of her late husband.

## Youth Dies Of Injuries In Auto Accident

Truck And Auto Collide At Corner Of Palmetto Avenue And Fourth Street

William W. Henderson, Jr., a Lakeland youth of about 18, was killed Tuesday afternoon in a head-on collision between a GMC Tanker Trail Truck driven by Wesley Teft, negro, which was on the east side of the road, and a Plymouth Coupe driven north on Palmetto Avenue by L. E. Stokes.

The youth, who had come from Lakeland for a holiday visit, with his father, W. W. Henderson, freight agent at the St. Johns Dock for Tanker Trail Trucks, was rushed to Fernald-Laughton Memorial Hospital where he died soon after his head injury and loss of blood.

Ensey Toll, driver of the large yellow and orange colored truck said that he tried to stop when he saw the light colored coupe, but was unable to do so in time. Both vehicle careened over the curb adjoining the city owned vacant lot on the corner, but remained upright. The grille work and right front wheel of the truck was damaged, and the left front wheel and fender of the Plymouth was smashed.

Mr. Stokes was taken to his home from the hospital and his injuries were pronounced as minor.

Police Chief Roy G. Williams took photographs of the trucks, and State Highway Patrolman L. C. Bender took over direction of traffic at the intersection, following the wreck, which attracted a large number of people and caused traffic congestion. There are no painted stop signs at the intersection.

## G.M. Declines To Open Books In Wage Study

Fact-Finding Board Hears Company Plea That Profits Should Not Be Considered



WASHINGTON, Dec. 20. (AP)—The General Motors Corporation has declared flatly that it will refuse to participate in hearings before President Truman's fact-finding board if prices and profits are to be considered.

These figures, the lawyer argued, are entirely irrelevant to the fact-finding process, inasmuch as the company is not pleading inability to pay.

Before the company attorney appeared before the board, union Vice President Walter Reuther reviewed once again his organization's position in the General Motors wage dispute. Reuther charged that the company had resorted to what he termed "jungle law" in dealing with the union wage demands, and had refused to consider the economic arithmetic of the dispute.

The union official attacked the company's assertion that it could not grant pay increases unless it were allowed higher prices on its cars. Reuther said that the union could not be a party to any such deal. But he added that if the fact-finding board decided that the union would back down and reduce its demands.

## Presidential Order Extends Life of FEPC

WASHINGTON, Dec. 20. (AP)—A Presidential order today extended the life of the Fair Employment Practices Committee until June 30, 1946. This directive removed existing doubts as to the committee's authority. Members will continue to investigate and report on job discriminations in private industry engaged in military or reconversion production. The committee received \$25,000 for its continuance under the War Agencies Appropriation Act. A bill is pending in both the Senate and the House to make the Fair Employment Practices Committee permanent.

**79th Congress Ends Historical session In Capitol Today**

WASHINGTON, Dec. 20 (AP)—The 79th Congress will end its session today unless there is a last-minute hitch in its plans, and it will not return to work until Jan. 14.

The session, which has taken part in the transition from war to peace, and from President Roosevelt to President Truman, has had a large voice in world affairs.

Opposition to many of President Truman's key legislative proposals has marked the course of the 79th session since last April. However, the tasks left undone are balanced perhaps by the list of momentous decisions to which it has given its approval.

Before the lawmakers got to their hats and coats, they are leaving the decks of odds and ends of legislation.

The Senate is considering legislation to establish a stockpile of strategic and critical materials before turning its attention to a number of minor bills. The special atomic energy committee is holding a session, and will near the industrial side of the story. The inquiry by the War Mobilization Subcommittee into the German industrial disarmament program is here completed.

The Pearl Harbor investigation now proposes to hold its inquiry on Feb. 15. The committee agreed to the extension resolution, at a previous session late yesterday. Meanwhile, the Navy's war plans division at the time of the Japanese sneak attack.

Selective Service officials are putting the damper on speculation about the possibility that soon only 18-year-olds will be inducted. An anonymous source said that, temporarily at least, single men from 18 and 22 years must fill Army and Navy replacement needs.

The White House has received from Congress a bill to liberalize the GI Bill of Rights enacted in 1944. The bill eases restrictions on loans and lifts the substance to veterans continuing their education at government expense, so it eases the requirement that unemployment and tuition payments must be deducted from any future veteran bonus.

The State Department has issued two policy statements on the Far East. It has expressed "increasing concern" over recent events in the Netherlands East Indies. Also, the department has declared that the United States has asked Britain to put off any end-of-hostilities agreement in Siam until British-American discussions of the region are concluded. The request has been made several times.

Good Publicity For Sanford

From Lewis Shipp, Herald sports editor and now secretary for Governor Caldwell, comes a clipping from the Cleveland Plain Dealer containing a story by Harry W. Smith, travel editor, on the tourist attractions and accommodations in Central Florida under a Sanford date-line.

Although this story gives considerable space to the better known resorts in Florida, it has several paragraphs about Sanford which provide us with the kind of advertising which money cannot buy. And it contains a suggestion which it might be well for us to consider as we face the prospect of the post-war without the benefits of wartime prosperity.

"Too little has been said about Kissimmee and Sanford as tourist magnets," says this the Cleveland writer. "Both will be discovered this season in the progress of stop-over from resort areas that will be filled. The former has done the better job of heralding its attractions, which include a trailer camp and four hotels."

"Sanford is an anomaly, with a 150 room hotel on Lake Monroe besides downtown hotels and in a lake and citrus region that to see is to like; yet the city never has made a major effort to attract visitors. The hotel is well appointed with a non-variable rate that is about half of that charged by comparable hostleries in the more popular recreation centers—fitted to incomes of \$6,000 and up. There is plenty of room for those of less earning power in urban rooms and hotels. Sanford has a population of around 12,000.

"None of the places visited in the motor swing above recorded are exciting—one dog track, no night club and few saloons. They are for rest and the rebuilding that sun, warmth and relaxation effect."

There is a great field for Sanford in appealing to those elderly residents in the north who have earned their vacations by war effort and who have reached that stage in life where they do not like the traffic jams and excitement of large cities but prefer the peace and quiet of the smaller resorts.

Homes Needed

It is clear that the most important operation now required in this country is building new homes. For five years there has been almost no building and little for the five years before that.

Even the production and assemblage of materials for private use and construction have to be restored from the ground up. All this time our population has been growing, and houses and machinery and materials of a hundred kinds have been wearing out. A great wave of new construction too, but obviously the homes are most important right is needed.

Factories and business houses have been wearing out, now. The governors of some states are urging their people to build nothing but dwellings until the most pressing demands are met.

Russell has given it an extremely pretty circus decoy, with water color elephants and all the mood and color of a circus midway... there's a balcony, complete theatrical lighting and all sorts of legitimate stage effects possible in no other Broadway show saloon.

The show itself is what has been known in the trade for years... That means that Nicky had as a "Nicky Blair production," John Murray Anderson design the entertainment... and John has fashioned a whopper... Nicky now employs more tall and terrific show gals—Anderson gave them the title of "bruisers"—and a larger chorus than any other Broadway club.

Bureau of Entomology (U.S. Department of Agriculture) Washington, D.C. and State Chemist of Florida Dept. of Agriculture, Tallahassee, Florida, contacted on Dec. 18, 1945, issued the following statements:

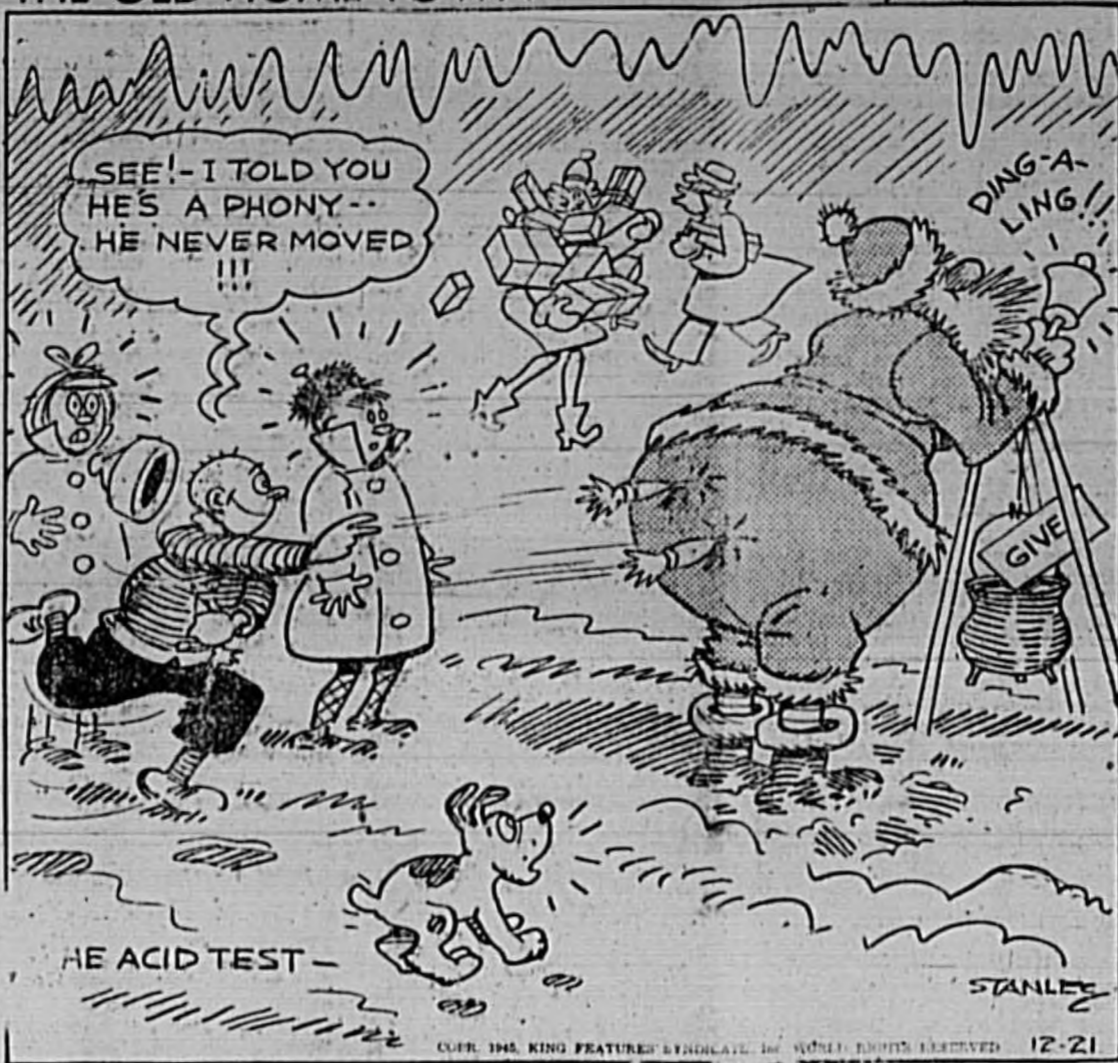
An important point that was also discussed at the league meeting in Leesburg last Sunday was the possibility of getting league teams accredited by the Veterans Administration and the State Department of Public Instruction as training agencies. This would enable the club to see that the ball player got a decent salary and still not force the club to exceed the salary limit of a class "D" loop. This would be of great assistance to class "D"

leagues which have a terribly low salary limit placed upon them. However, a limit is a necessity.

Back in the days before the war, a player's salary in class "D" baseball would hardly pay his room and board. Possibly you would be surprised to know that back in 1937, most of the Sanford players were getting from \$60 to \$85 per month. But the fact must not be overlooked that the boys played for the professional experience, rather than the money.

Times are different now. Many of the boys have come home from the war. They've been able to make more money in the services than in class "D" baseball. They cannot imagine having to live on \$75 a month and in these times how in the world can that be expected? So, class "D" baseball raised the salary limit from \$1200 to \$1800. The State loop is going to plan on \$1500. That means that

15 ball players will play for an average of \$100 per month while a manager would then be limited to \$300. Do you think it can be done? Your guess is as good as mine.

If the Sanford club could be accredited as a training agency under the GI Bill of Rights and players themselves could qualify for training, the club could get by with paying players a possible \$75 per month salary and if married the government would pay them \$75. This would enable the class "D" players to receive an income from which they could successfully compete with the present high cost of living.

Whether it can or cannot be done is another thing. But it's going to be tried. In Ocala, it's the number one item on the program. Deland has already placed its application with the Veterans Administration and President Combs has talked the matter over with VA representatives. Although hesitant at first, they now feel that it can be accomplished. As we have said, we don't know whether it can be done. But one thing is sure, something

has got to be done to speed up the administrative end of this training business, not only for the training school or agency, but for the benefit of the veteran himself. It takes entirely too much time.

But under any circumstances, be sure to be present tonight!

and then replied, "I dunno, they always seem to have the ball."

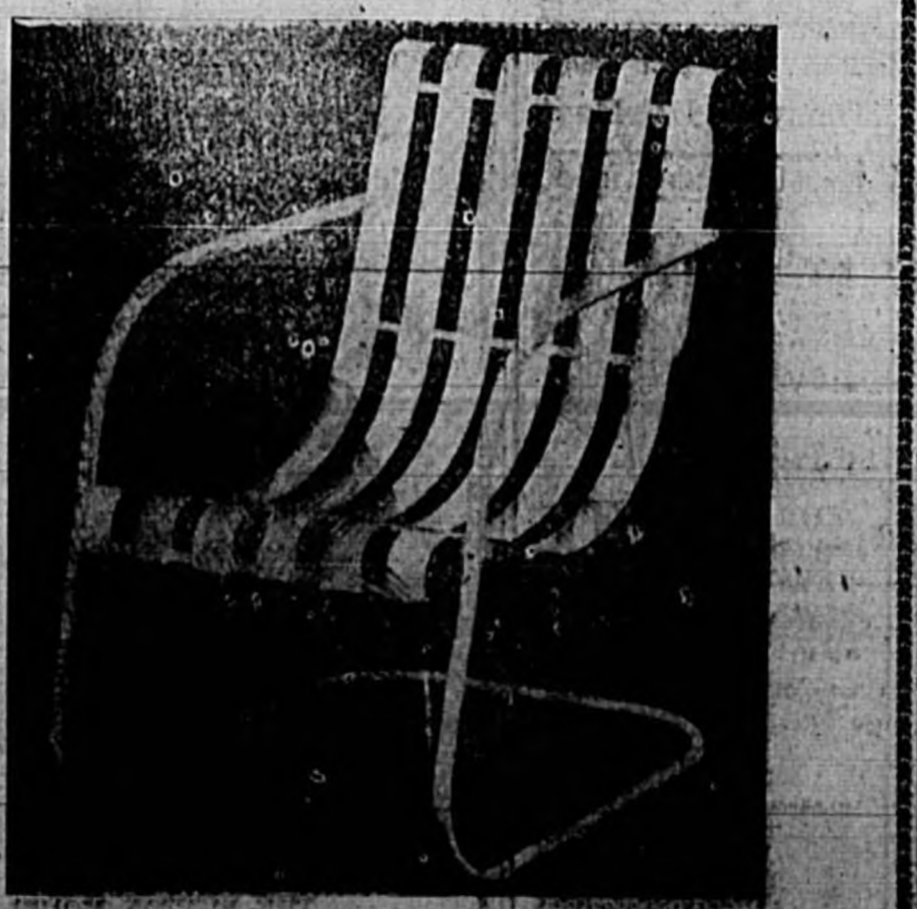

### Army Team Named Outstanding Sport Team Of The Year

The Army football squad has been named the outstanding sport team of the year in the annual Associated Press poll.

Of 76 participants in the poll, 71 gave the first place nomination to the Army grid machine. And most of these first-place votes were accompanied by such comments as "in a class by itself" and "out of this world."

The other five experts who participated in the poll picked Army in the second spot on the ballot.

On the basis of three points for a first-place ballot, two for second and one for third, the Army grid squad received 223 points.

Second place in the balloting went to the Detroit Tigers, who received one first place vote and enough seconds and thirds to accumulate 66 points.

The champion Cleveland Rams of the National Football League received two first place votes and a total of 29 points.

The other two first place votes went to Alabama's Rose Bowl football team and the crack professional basketball quinet known as the Fort Wayne, Ind., Zollner Pistons.

However, fourth place in the poll went to the Oklahoma A. & M. basketball team. And Indiana's Western Conference Football champions placed fifth.

The new Western conference eligibility rule won't become effective until the end of the winter sports season.

The rule specifies that athletes are ineligible for further varsity competition if they did not compete in varsity competition as freshmen, but later completed three years of varsity play.

The rule apparently threatened the careers of such outstanding athletes as De Paul's great basketball star, George Mikan, and Michigan's famed track twins, Bob and Ross Hume. The twins will be able to compete in indoor track.

Neel Postels, regular guard on Iowa's championship basketball team, also will be able to finish the season.

One player who will not benefit from the extension of the effective date of the new rule is Bill Chandler, the Marquette basketball star. He already has completed four seasons of play.

Although De Paul and Marquette are not members of the Western Conference, they usually abide by conference regulations.

The speculation in Pittsburgh today is that either Jack Sutherland or Buff Donnell will be named to succeed Jim Leonard as coach of the football steelders.

Sutherland has been the recipient of an offer from Pitt-

The man assigned to this position is W. R. Bentley of Atlanta, Ga. The regular officials will be: referee, Alvin Bell of Little Rock, Ark.; umpire, William Halloran of Providence, R. I.; head linesman, William Mc Connell of Boston; and field judge, J. Tom Slate of Atlanta.

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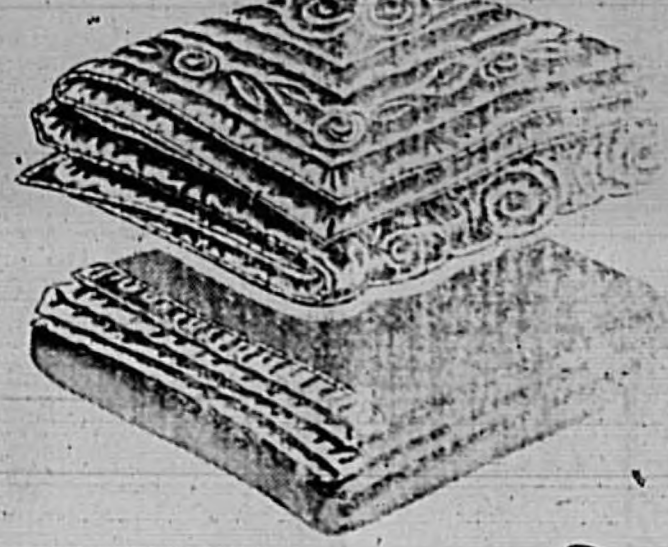

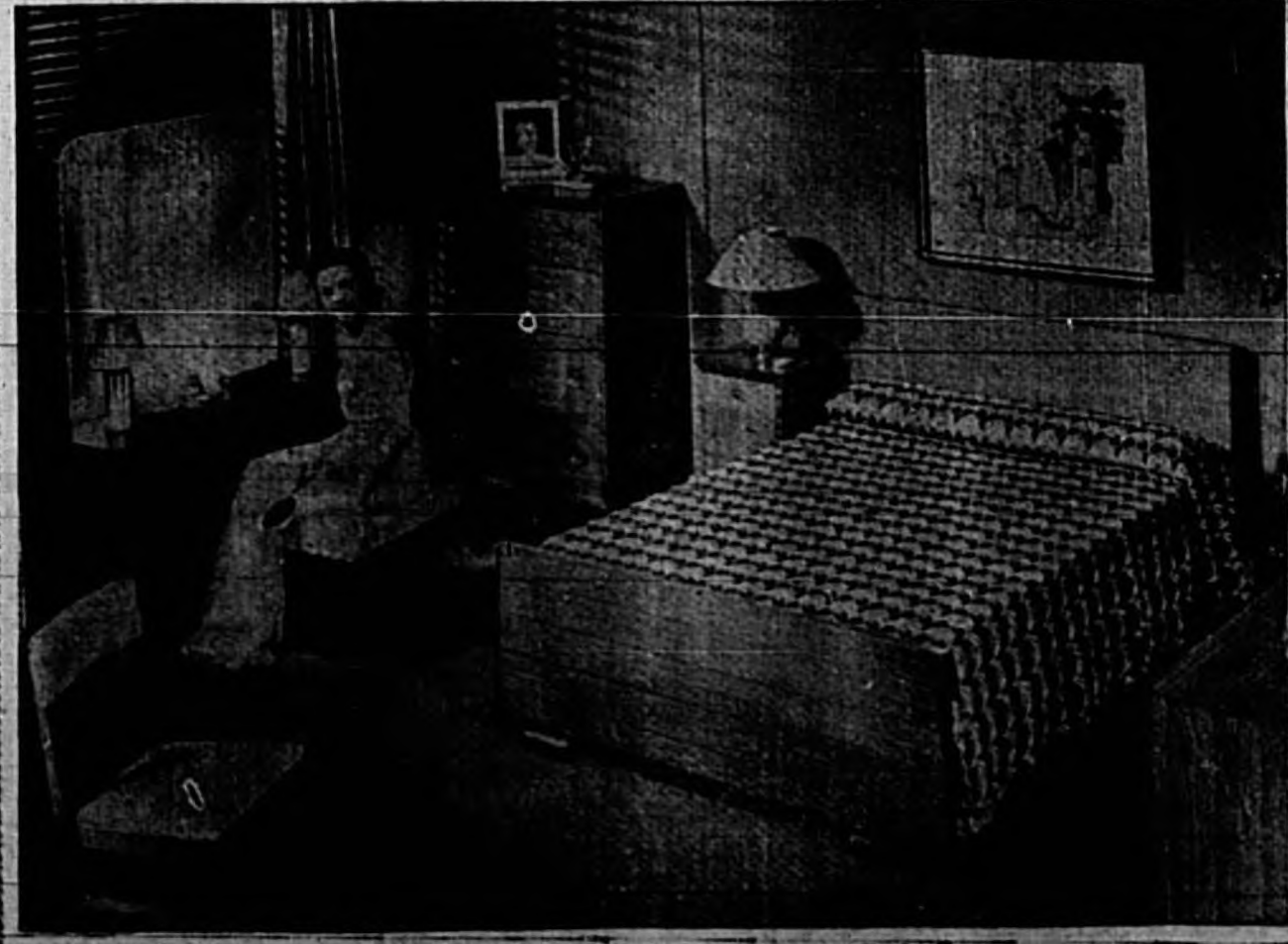

## Turner Claims Kimmel Failed To Obey Order

### Declares Message To Pacific Commander Needed No Supplementary Orders

WASHINGTON, Dec. 21. (AP)—The Pearl Harbor Investigating Committee was told today that if orders had been followed by Admiral Kimmel, losses would have been reduced materially during the Japanese attack on Hawaii. The witness was Admiral Richmond Kelly Turner, who was chief of Navy operations at the time of the disaster. Turner declared that the orders sent to Kimmel called for the deployment of the Fleet at sea. Admiral Turner defended his own warning message to Kimmel which was sent on Nov. 27, 1941, declaring that it was entirely adequate and did not call for any supplementary orders. He added that he had had the utmost respect for Admiral Kimmel's abilities, and that this respect was shared throughout the Navy.

In answer to earlier questions, Turner said that the Fleet had been prepared for just such an attack as the Japanese launched, and that it was ready for war on Dec. 7, 1941. The Admiral conceded, however, that even had the orders been carried out, a portion of the Japanese fleet force probably would have gotten through.

## Stalin Spends His 66th Birthday At Office In Kremlin

MOSCOW, Dec. 21. (AP)—Generalissimo Joseph Stalin pursued a custom of long standing today he observed his birthday—his 66th—by working at his desk in the Kremlin.

However, the Soviet Union celebrated Stalin's birthday, the Soviet leader, in the eyes of millions of Soviet citizens, is regarded as the greatest of all Russians.

And this year Moscow, particularly, had cause for celebration. Stalin returned to the Kremlin only this week after a vacation of more than two months at the shores of the Black Sea.

## Communists In China Propose End Of Conflict

### Unconditional Armistice Terms Would Freeze Armies In Current Positions

CHUNGKING, Dec. 21. (AP)—A Chinese Communist spokesman in Chungking said today that his party was prepared to put into writing its proposals for ending the unrelenting war in China. He said the Red proposals for an unconditional armistice would call for both sides to be "frozen" in the present positions they control in China.

The spokesman's declaration that he would put the proposal in writing followed a charge by a Nationalist government official that the armistice talk was just "propaganda."

However, the Red spokesman expressed surprise at this charge. He declared that the head of the Communist peace delegation in Chungking had requested formally that the proposal be forwarded to Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek. Said the spokesman:

"We want an armistice. We considered our proposal as official and formal, but as the government wants it in writing, we are going to oblige."

As a result, a Nationalist government spokesman said today that the Communist offer to put their verbal proposal in writing put the matter in a different light.
