

Soccer Stadium New Seminole Facility's Owner Seeks Beer And Wine Permit

Central Florida Soccer Inc. wants to sell beer and wine at its indoor soccer facility now under construction at State Road 419 and U.S. Highway 17-92 near Longwood.

The firm's request for a special exception to zoning regulations governing use of the property will come before Seminole County's Board of Adjustment tonight.

The board's hearings will begin at 7 p.m. in Room 2002 of the county courthouse on North Park Avenue in Sanford. The beer-wine special exception is just one of

many long agenda, said zoning coordinator Ginny Barclay.

Man Is Charged After Bar Shooting

A Sanford man in Central Florida's Regional Hospital and another in the Seminole County jail charged with attempted murder following a shooting early Sunday at a Sanford bar.

James Lee Turner, 22, of 34 Lake Street Terrace was reported today to be in critical condition at the Sanford hospital following four hours of surgery Sunday for a single gunshot wound in his stomach.

The man accused of shooting him, Walter Collier, 28, of 1788 Bell St., Sanford, is in jail in lieu of \$10,000 bond on charges of attempted murder, aggravated battery and unlawful use of a firearm.

Assistant Sanford Police Chief Herd Shea said Turner was shot at 1:05 p.m. Sunday at Joe's Tavern, Third Street and Sanford Avenue in Sanford.

Collier was arrested at 4:57 p.m. Sunday at his home by patrolman James McGill.

According to Shea, witnesses to the shooting said Turner and Collier were arguing loudly when Collier pulled a gun out of his pockets and shot Turner.

Shea said there was no indication of what the men were arguing about during the shooting.

Collier ran from the bar following the shooting, witnesses said.

Collier was scheduled to be arraigned on charges at 1:30 p.m. today.

County Budget Is Falling Short

A budget projection \$8 million out of balance reached Seminole County Commissioners at a work session last night.

The preliminary figures, presented by County Administrator T. G. Grideale, show the county would be \$8 million short if it attempts to maintain its existing level of services.

"If the board wants to keep the same level of service next year as we have this year, we must do something," Grideale says. "The county is \$8 million short if it attempts to maintain its existing level of services."

Graham's Education Plan Faces Resistance

If four of Seminole County's legislators can get enough of their colleagues to go along, Gov. Bob Graham's educational improvement program stands little chance of passing.

Rep. Art Grindler, R-Altamonte Springs, says the education package the governor originally put out in April "is no longer a factor. It's been lost in the system."

State Rep. Boyer Brantley, R-Longwood, says he is reluctant to say he will vote for an increase in taxes to fund the proposal.

"I have specific criticism concerns the likelihood that much of the proposed increased funding for education in fact would be paid for by raises in school teachers rather than pay increases based on merit."

But starting to see some members of the teaching profession coming out to merit pay raises. That makes a little more sense than increasing salaries across the board, noting he has always opposed that type of pay hike.

State Rep. George R. Orlando said the sentiment in both houses of the Legislature is against any new taxes and predicts a kindergarten through 12th grade merit amount of over landing from the state that money will be taken from the community colleges.

Graham also insists that the public school system can be improved a great deal with little or no additional cost, simply by emphasizing some aspects and de-emphasizing others. He notes that if teachers get a pay raise, it will be in the realm of 4 to 5 percent, rather than the 8 to 10 percent the governor wants.

"It's a lot to say the mood of the majority of the House and Senate is not to provide for increases," Drage says. "Much of the reason is the concern of legislation that they will be looking at a 'Proposition 1' in proposed constitutional amendment limiting the authority of the state and local government units to raise taxes on the ballot in 1984."

spending \$180 million. Some of those things, he said, are reorganizing the state Department of Education, encourage math and science in teacher education workshops.

The Orlando Republican said with so many concerns about ending high tech industries in Florida by improving high tech education in the schools, why couldn't these industries be asked to give teachers jobs during the summer.

He also said industry could help education in the field by making early retirement available for employees with expertise so that they can get into the educational field.

Drage said rather than buying textbooks that are written down to be understood by lower grade-level readers, there should be a requirement that textbooks be prepared at a reading level no more than one year below the grade where the subject is being taught.

"I feel strongly about vocational education. We should be sending students out of vocational education who can actually get jobs. If we have areas where we are teaching vocational education, but students not going out and getting jobs, we should eliminate these courses," Drage said.

Drage said the state should be encouraging higher education through CLEP (College Level Equivalency) Program, whereby students are given college credit on the basis of testing. He said stu-

dents should also be encouraged to dual register in high school and in community college at the same time. And high school seniors, he said, should not be allowed to try for a GED in high school equivalency diploma acquired through a testing program until after his class graduates from high school, if he has quit before then.

The legislator noted that a bill is now being considered in the state House with a title eight pages long. He said it speaks to high school students acquiring a mastery of standards in science and computer literacy.

"It encompasses such things as offering incentives to people to go into teaching in the math and science area, deals with teacher education reform, deals with teacher education in general, provides a formula for funding on how school districts will receive money from the state," Drage said. He added it also offers incentives to school districts to offer extra courses in math and science.

Mechanics To Explain Near Fatal Jet Golf

MIAMI (UPI) — Two mechanics who have been punished for neglecting to replace an engine on Eastern Airlines jet said they are causing it to crash in the scenario expected this week's flight plan here.

Lynn Burris and James Sibusy have been called to give sworn depositions before National Transportation Safety Board investigators during a hearing today and Tuesday.

The 62-year-old Sibusy had been suspended from their jobs 160 days by the airline and when the suspension is up they will be placed in other jobs. If they receive their jobs as aircraft mechanics later, they will be reinstated and placed a probation, a spokeswoman for the airline said.

Both men were line maintenance mechanics at Eastern's Miami base. A spokesman there said they failed to replace the oil on the engine caused all three engines to quit for five minutes during a flight from Miami to Nassau.

Crime Fund Going Broke

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Unless the Legislature takes action, a state Supreme Court ruling and the resulting federal crunch for Florida crime victims compensation fund will cause the fund to go broke, Auditor General Ernest Ellison said.

The fund is used to award victims of violent crimes up to \$10,000 for medical bills and other expenses. It comes from \$2.2 billion in June 1979 to \$876,580 by late October.

HAMBURG, West Germany (AP) — Police questioning a reflex officer accused of fraud tried today to find out who forged the bogus diary of Adolf Hitler and who forged the money Stern magazine paid for his revelations.

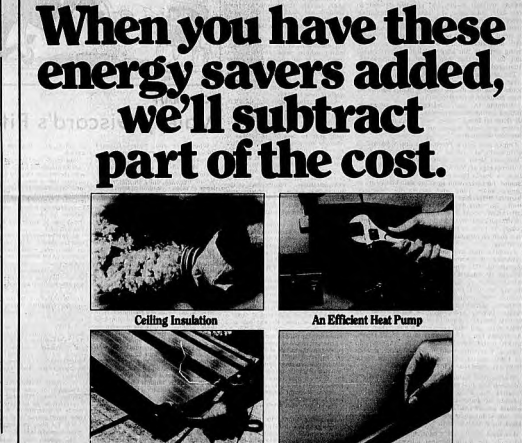

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Bucks Save Face With 100-94 Win

MILWAUKEE (UPI)—For three games the Milwaukee Bucks played well against the Philadelphia 76ers and, so, Bucks Coach Don Nelson figured it was time to bring out his secret weapon.

"I want my green spectacles," Nelson said after the Bucks defeated the 76ers 100-94 Sunday in the fourth game of the NBA Eastern Conference playoff in Philadelphia while I'm wearing my green spectacles in the only weakness I've been able to spot in the 76ers so far."

The loss was the 76ers' first in the series. Philadelphia leads the series 3-1. The fifth game is scheduled for Wednesday night in Philadelphia. The Bucks' season culminated in the victory.

Marques Johnson scored 19 points, including a game-high 4-6 remaining on the clock. The Bucks were led by guard Bob Lanier, Sidney Moncrief and Junior Bridgeman each had 17 points.

But the real star for the Bucks was Charles Criss, the diminutive guard who came off the bench to spark Milwaukee. Criss played 24 minutes, scored 11 points and held Maurice Cheeks, the Bucks' superb point guard, to 10 points, a five below his playoff average.

"It was my job to get on him for today, so I feel good that I was able to contribute a big victory," Criss said. "I think one of the reasons I played so much was because I handled Cheeks. I've always had good success against him. I just try to stay away from him and make him work from end to end."

Steve Coach Billy Cunningham said Criss has played well throughout the playoffs.

"But we have to give credit to the whole team," Cunningham said. "They hung in there and beat us the way we've beaten them in the first three games."

Philadelphia's Kenny Anderson led all scorers with 24 points. Julius Erving added 19 and Moses Malone 17 for the 76ers.

For much of the contest, it appeared the 76ers were on their way to completing a fourth game sweep.

Milwaukee led at an early 10-0 lead, but the 76ers found a way to tie the game in the first period. At the end of the quarter, Philadelphia led 23-21.

The Bucks trailed to a 27-23 lead in the second period but fought back to take a 46-44 halftime lead.

Again the Bucks rallied. A layup by Malone gave them a 42-40 halfway through the quarter.

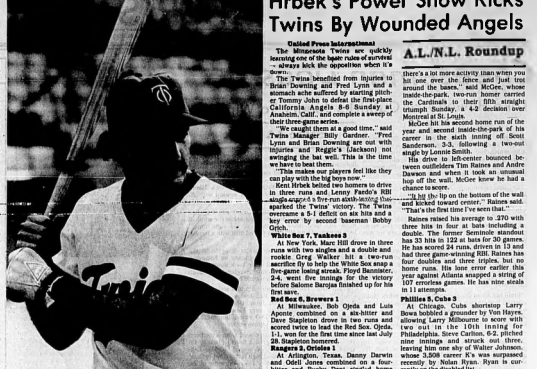
