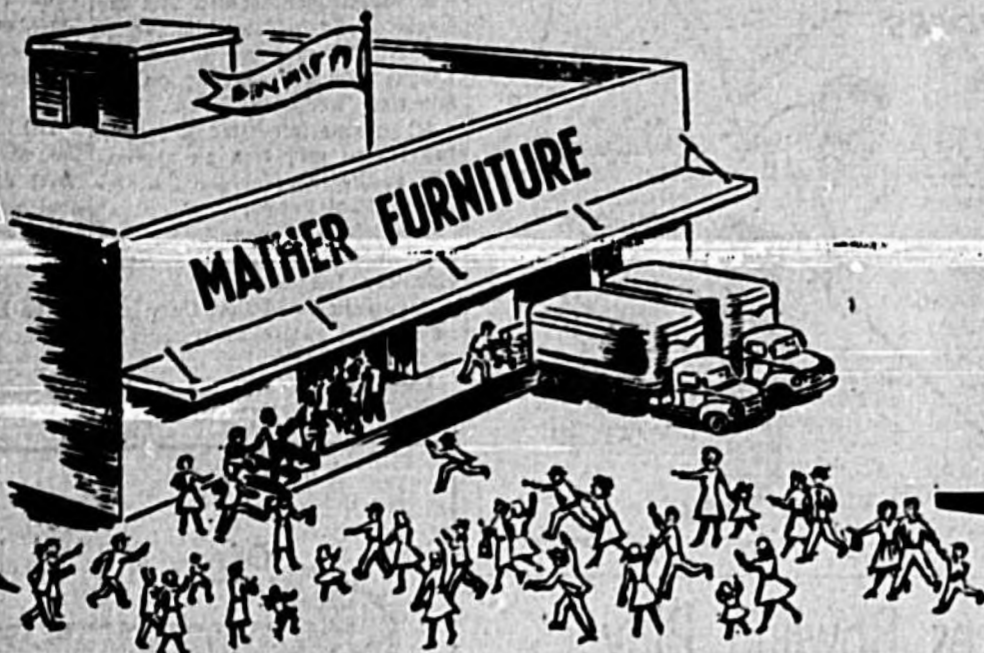

Altamonte Tables Zoning

Altamonte Springs Council action on the proposed zoning plan for the town calling for 12 separate and distinct districts was tabled at Monday's business session until council members, at a private and closed meeting tonight, give the recommendations further recommendation.

A public hearing on the proposal, drawn by the Town Planning and Zoning Commission, was held in the community at a meeting on July 31.

The council's legal representative, S. J. Davis of the Sanford firm, Stenstrom, Davis and McIntosh, explained steps taken by the Planning and Zoning Board before Monday's council meeting, saying, "I feel that the town will be, and has been, more informed on these zoning recommendations than it ever has been in the past on its zoning regulations."

Before the action was tabled until tonight's meeting, Councilman John Wolf had made the recommendation that, in the R1AA single family dwelling, one block on each side of SR 438, all the way through the municipal limits, be included in the C1 commercial classification. The same proposal was discussed for the R3 one and two family dwelling areas with Mayor Wilbur Hawkins saying that he thought an R3 district should be included along the route but that he would bring it up for further discussion at the council's private meeting.

Oviedo Family Appreciates Town

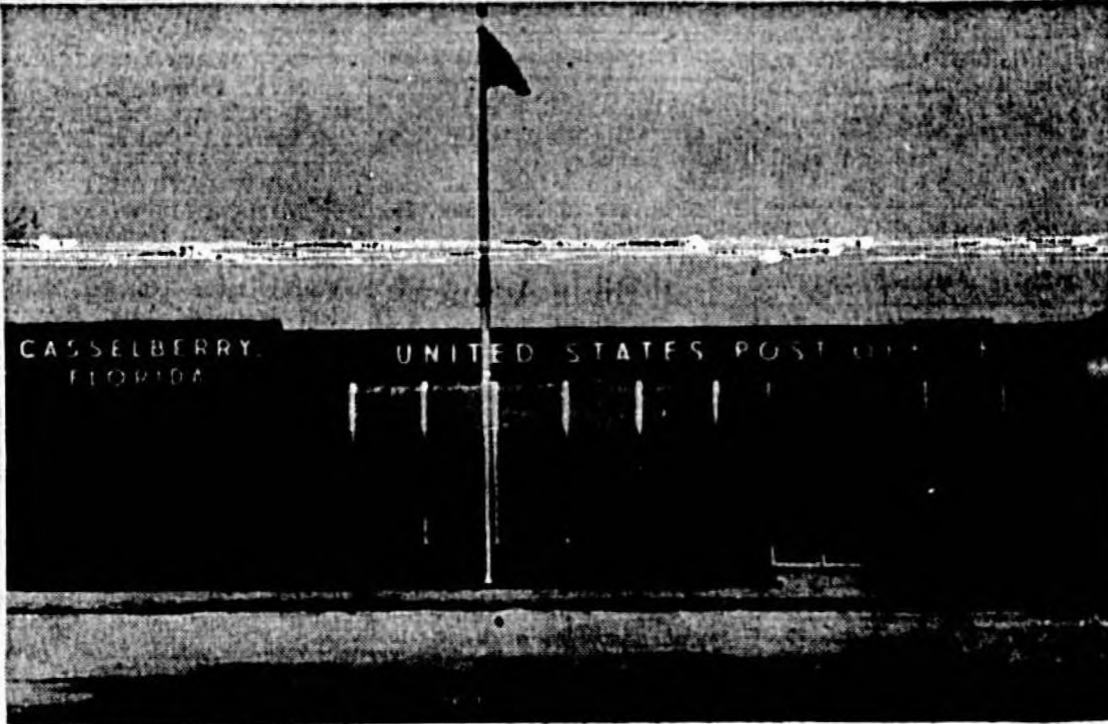

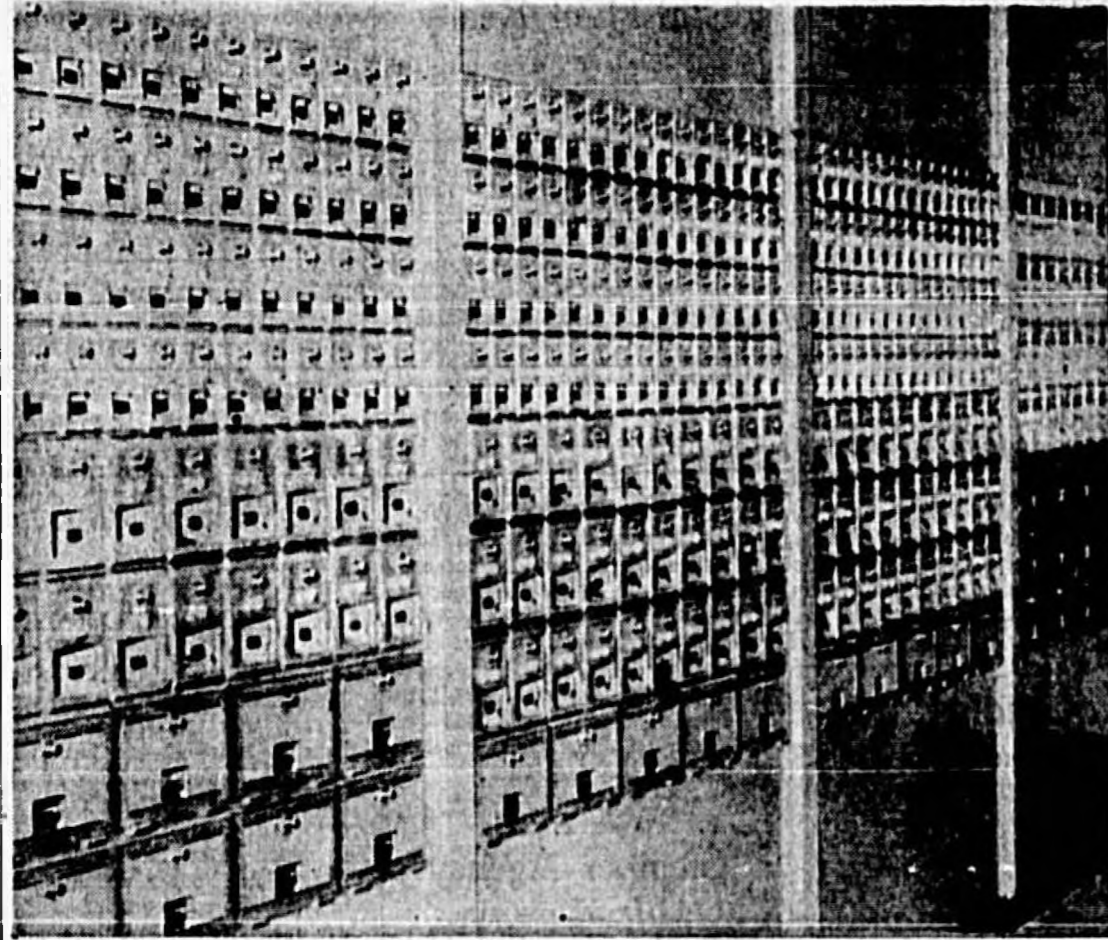

Council Urged To Control Animals

Requests from the townspeople at the August meeting of the Altamonte Springs Council Monday covered street markers, lighting, areas legally covered by the local Volunteer Fire Dept. and authoritative measures to bring the "animal kingdom" under town control.

In a three-and-one-half hour session, which Mayor Wilbur Hawkins cut short by abbreviating the regular order of business, council members heard a request that the street marker on Lake Dr. either be replaced or repainted since lettering on the present sign is illegible. Hawkins advised that the matter would be remedied.

A report that the Volunteer Fire Dept. had answered a Sunday evening call to Lake Harriet Estates, taking both pieces of equipment, which proved to be a false alarm, brought forth the question of the department's obligations in covering such areas.

The Mutual Aid Agreement, in which Altamonte with other volunteer departments of the county take part, was explained by the mayor and Council Attorney Joe Davis. However, Hawkins added that it was up to the officer on duty to decide where the fire trucks should go saying that he thought some residents wanted the benefits of the town's services without having to aid in their support through taxation.

"We've had other trucks from neighboring departments come out to fight our fires and we think it only right that we should help out in similar emergencies," he said.
Councilman John Wolf was requested to advise the Fire Dept. that in the future one truck should remain in the town at any time a call is answered away from the municipality.

The question of street lighting, brought to the board's attention by Councilman Homer Sewell, was answered when the mayor explained that lighting will be increased on streets where there are no sidewalks and that 35 mercury vapor type fixtures, with greater street hangover, will be installed on Matland Ave. It also was advised that the light at the corner of Lake Dr. will be replaced.

Engineering proposals of Florida Power Corp. on the town lighting were approved by the board. A note of caution was expressed during the meeting when Hawkins reminded the councilmen to "watch the budget and cut where you can."

Coming under fire again was the "Cat Hotel" when the mayor read a letter from Douglas J. Scott which stated that the business is a nuisance to the neighborhood and that the operator has not done anything to control the general disturbance created by barking dogs housed there or a pet monkey.

Scott advised that this monkey, upon occasion, had been released from its cage during the early morning and had come over on his property where it destroyed fruit and plants.
Other residents of the area in attendance at the meeting added to the complaint which resulted in a board decision to send another warning to the owner by Police Chief Tracy Sullivan stating that the next time the monkey is allowed to run loose, her business license will be revoked.
The board also instructed Davis to draw an ordinance pertaining to the control of "pet" animals which will require all dog owners to have their animals receive the required rabies shots and an annual license.
Other items discussed included a resident's request for street black-topping, acceptance of a two-year municipal maintenance bond which was tabled for a future meeting and the disputed property ownership between James Robertson, general contractor, and the town which must be settled within 90 days if court action is to be avoided. The board tabled the matter until the next meeting.

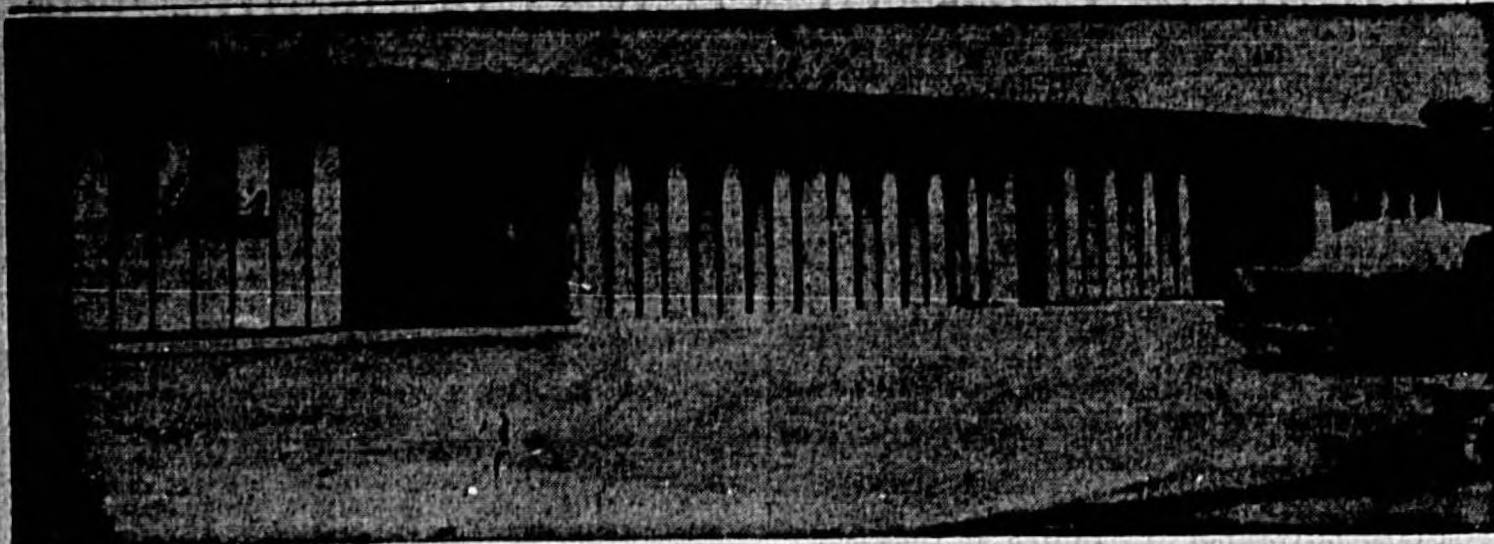

Brandt Raps Paper Protests

BERLIN (UPI) — West Berlin Mayor Willy Brandt told a rally of West Berliners today that "paper protests alone are not enough" to counter Communist actions against this beleaguered city and its people.

But Brandt appeared for calm in his address to 200,000 West Berliners. They massed at a giant rally before City Hall this afternoon to protest against Communist East German closing of the East-West city border.

Earlier today a note from the Soviet commandant in Berlin to his western counterparts said the Russians had no control over East Germany and told the West to stop "meddling" in East German affairs.

CD Report Gives Grim Death Toll

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Gov. Farris Bryant and other state officials were told Monday that 50 to 50 million Americans would be killed "first crack out of the box" if all-out nuclear war broke out.

"Ninety per cent of the 150 to 200 million people left in this country are going to die of fallout within two weeks time unless they have shelters," said Leon County Civil Defense Instructor Jim Alexander.

"This very building we're in now (the state Capitol) should have a fallout shelter," Alexander told Bryant, "and so should every other state building."

For Bryant and other state officials, it was the first session of a two-week course in how to survive a nuclear attack. The program is designed to boost interest in the survival program in Florida.

Soviets Charged With 'Major' Propaganda Drive

WASHINGTON (UPI) — U. S. officials accused the Soviet Union today of waging a major propaganda campaign to frighten this country's allies and create rifts aimed at weakening the Western stand on Berlin.

They predicted that Moscow would engage in more and more of this propaganda warfare as the Berlin crisis deepens.

New Federal District

City Okays Pay Hikes; Two Additional Firemen

Fire, Police Budget Sliced

The City Commission Thursday night went chop, chop, chop to the fire and police budgets but at the same time gave all city employees for the second year in a row across the board two percent pay raise and agreed to hire two additional firemen.

At the same time, the commission ruled out a new car for Fire Chief Mack Cleveland Sr. and decided against enclosing Fire Station No. 2 on French Ave. Both of these decreases amounted to close to \$8,000 out of the fire budget. The hiring of two additional men was set at \$8,343.

The commission also sliced off \$2,000 for additional fire hose during the next fiscal year.

The board cut some \$2,500 from the police budget ruling out a Keeler polygraph machine at a cost of \$1,200 and a six week course for one man to study lie detection at \$1,500.

Commissioners also agreed to hire a clerk for the finance office, ruled out paving city hall parking lot and tabled action on slicing off a vehicle from the parks budget.

The hiring of two additional firemen will bring the department's strength to 23. However, the board took no action on any Kelly days and left it up to Chief Cleveland on whether he wanted to institute partial Kelly days with the two new men.

"Who's Kelly anyway?" Commissioner J. H. Crapps said.

The raise for all city employees making under \$350 a month had been approved earlier. However, Thursday the board agreed that higher priced workers were entitled to a raise also.

Mayor Joe Baker said that the higher priced employees were "more out of balance" with the lower paid.

The commissioners, although they met for more than three hours, only went through some six departmental budgets and plan more budget meetings next week to tackle recreation, zoo, library, public works and streets.

At the same time the commission went over its utility budget estimated at slightly under a half million dollars and agreed that it was in line with last year.

Out of the utility budget, \$63,000 has been set aside for a new treatment plant while sharp raises were noted in the sale of metered water (because of increased water consumption), water service charge and hydrant rental.

Did you know that Alvan Joe Petty, who was arrested earlier in the week for operating an illegal whiskey still is the same Mr. Petty that opposed Constable Hugh Carroll in the District 4 Constable race last year?

Discussing the terms for a lease of the Sanford pier, one commissioner inquired: "What happens if Lake Monroe should dry up and leave the marina on dry ground?" The applicant for the lease first said he would have to think of something in that case, but later on figured out that if the lake did go dry, he could keep the land leased, put it in the government soil bank and get paid for not growing anything.

Commies Strengthen Border Barriers

BERLIN (UPI)—The Communist regime of East Germany signed up young men for army service, formed factory defense guards and strengthened border barriers today in obvious preparation for long-term enforcement of its blockade between East and West Berlin.

The enlistment drive was designed to strengthen the existing security forces of 663,000 men. The factory defense guards were a precaution against unrest over closing of the refugee escape route to West Berlin.

The Communists sealed the dividing line between East and West Berlin still tighter with a huge concrete and barbed wire barricade at Potsdamer Square and by cementing doors to east sector houses fronting on West Berlin streets.

Soldiers already in service were being called on to extend their two and three-year enlistments. The official East German news service ADN said many soldiers announced they would continue to serve as a defense against "any provocation."

In both East and West Berlin

many people were laying in food reserves. Coffee, sugar, flour and salt was in demand.

As the situation grew more tense, Chancellor Konrad Adenauer, delivering a government statement to the parliament in Bonn, urged a NATO defense buildup and warned the Russians that an attack would bring on them "a counter-stroke capable of destroying the Soviet Union."

East German youths were called

on the pledge "eternal loyalty" to chief of state Walter Ulbricht.

"The fatherland calls" the youths were told, "Protect the socialist republic. All youths from 18 to 23 must be won for the armed forces of the democratic republic."

It was considered significant that the Communist had waited to start the enlistment campaign until after they had closed the border to refugees.

Kennedy Approves Buildup

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Kennedy has signed a record peacetime \$46.7 billion defense appropriation bill aimed at building up U. S. military strength for the Berlin crisis, the White House announced today.

The President signed the measure Thursday night, press secretary Pierre Salinger reported. It included the entire extra \$3.5 billion Kennedy asked to counter the Berlin threats of Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev.

The bill also contained \$207.6 million to get a civil defense shelter program under way for the American people.

Congress gave the President several million dollars he hadn't requested. The main increase was \$525 million for continued production of B52 and B58 bombers which are now scheduled for final deliveries late this year.

The bill also contained \$400 million for stepped up production of the B70 bomber. Kennedy had requested \$220 million.

The new money will start a program of shelter construction on federal property, provide for the location and marking of other shelter areas and some stocking of emergency provisions.

U. S. Grants Cuban Sailors Asylum

NORFOLK, Va. (UPI)—The United States today granted political asylum to "at least 10 Cubans, including the captain" of the Cuban merchant ship Bahia de Nipe which made an unscheduled "freedom stop" in Chesapeake Bay.

A spokesman for the commander of the 5th Naval District said the other crew members would be allowed to resume their voyage aboard the craft. He said the Swiss government, which is filling in the broken diplomatic relations between this country and Cuba, had been notified of the defection.

Cmdr. Nicholas Pope said he had not been advised of the total number of men aboard the ship but instructed him to describe the number of defectors as "at least 10, including the captain." Pope said the State Department had advised him "there is no way possible that we can hold the others."

City Approves CD Shelter Work

Construction of disaster headquarters for Sanford will get underway in about 30 days, City Manager W. E. Knowles said today after the City Commission Thursday night approved plans for the facility and authorized the spending of \$1,100 for the job.

Knowles said that city crews will do the work on the 20 by 40 foot shelter which will be located east of the reservoir on 13th St. and French Ave.

There will be one large room and three small generator and storage rooms in the building.

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Help Wanted

Mrs. Rosalie Harkness and her ten children lost everything they had Thursday when a fire totally destroyed their home and almost all its contents at 1808 Hawkins Ave.

An oil stove explosion was the

cause of the fire which spread so quickly through the small frame house that fire engines from Lake Mary and the Naval Air Station arrived too late to save anything.

A representative of the Lake Mary Volunteer Fire Dept. said today that their truck arrived within five minutes after they received the call, but that the roof had already fallen in.

An appeal is being made through the Sanford Herald to the kindness of Seminole County residents for donations of clothing for Mrs. Harkness and her ten children, six of whom are soon to be starting to school. Furniture, household needs and supplies will be gratefully accepted.

The children include four boys, aged 15, four, three and ten months and six girls, 13, 12, nine-year-old twins, seven and two years old. Mrs. Harkness wears about a size 20.

Mrs. Harkness, a houseworker who has not worked in eight weeks is now staying at the home of her mother, Mrs. Marie Johnson at 1701 W. 13th St.

Navy To Add 42 Ships To Fleets

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Navy has announced plans to add 42 ships to the Atlantic and Pacific fleets and step up orders for jet fighters, anti-submarine planes and ship-borne missiles.

The action Thursday was the latest in a series of moves by the armed services as part of the U. S. military buildup ordered by President Kennedy to meet Communist threats against Berlin and elsewhere in the world.

The Navy announced earlier it would extend duty tours of 28,000 officers and men for six to 12 months.

City Okays Boat Marina Lease Terms

City commissioners agreed to terms Thursday for leasing the city pier and boat ramp and allow construction of a modern marina on Lake Monroe.

Commissioners approved terms of a 20-year lease contract with Jack Trim, who said the marina should be in operation before the end of the year.

City attorney William Hutchison was instructed to complete the details on the lease and Trim told the board that he hopes to finish

negotiations for construction of the clubhouse and floating docks within two weeks.

Under the proposal, the pier and boat ramp will be leased for 20 years at a rental of \$1 per year for two years and \$1,000 a year or two percent of the gross receipts of the marina, whichever is greater for 18 years, with renewal option for 20 more years.

The lease provides that the existing boat ramp at the foot of Palmetto Ave. will be improved and

operated as a free launching ramp facility, supervised by the marina staff.

Original investment in the property will amount to about \$50,000 the commission was told, with a program of improvements running the total to nearly \$100,000 within two years.

The marina will be called Sanford-Marina and Yacht Club and Trim said he will announce complete details on the facilities and operations as soon as the building contract is signed.

Sea Scouts Paper Collection Monday

Sanford residents across town from Lake Monroe to Eighth St. are asked to contribute old papers and magazines to the Sea Scouts Monday as the youths begin a week's fund raising effort.

The Scouts will tour all streets from Seminole Blvd. south to Eighth St. and from Virginia Ave. on the east to Persimmon Ave. on the west and will take away any old papers piled in front of homes or businesses between 8 a. m. and 4 p. m.

Anyone desiring to notify the boys that they have papers to be contributed also may telephone FA 2-0940. The pickups will continue through next Friday, with a different area to be covered each day.

Tuesday the Scouts will tour the area from Eighth St. south to 13th St. and from Virginia Ave. west to Persimmon Ave.

The old papers and magazines donated by residents will be sold by the Sea Scouts to help defray the expenses of the group's training and other activities.

Dunn Lashes State Welfare Agency

District 4 County Commissioner Vernon Dunn today lashed state welfare officials for the care of

Sanford cases and stressed the need for a minimum housing code and replacement of many of the slums in the area with low cost housing.

Dunn made the statement after the County Commission inspected two "hovels" Thursday on Cypress and Hickory Aves. where two Negroes were "existing like animals" according to Dunn.

Speaking for the County Commission today was Chairman J. C. Hutchison who said that the board received an anonymous tip that two persons in that area were living in filth.

The commission contacted the local welfare department which reported that nothing could be done to the two because no action could be taken about forcing anyone into a nursing home.

However, commissioners contacted the Sheriff's Office who encouraged the two to enter a home. According to Dunn one was over 90 years of age.

He said that the animals in the city zoo had better housing than these two men and took a verbal slap at the state welfare agencies for letting these "things happen" and asked society to step in to "stop this disgrace."

Vice President Flies To Berlin

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson will fly to Germany tonight to deliver a message from President Kennedy to West Berlin Mayor Willy Brandt.

The White House, in making the announcement, said the message would be in reply to one which Brandt sent Kennedy.

Brandt said in a speech Wednesday that he had sent a letter to Kennedy calling for "action" not "words" in dealing with the Berlin crisis.
