Local Views Offered

The war was over, Mom and Dad were crying with tears of loy. Flag in hand I climbed upon a fence post and waved it at the passing cars. The people smiled and blew their horns in response. A sense of pride filled my heart. On that memorable day an eight year old boy became a patriot. I have remained a patriot ever since. I have always tried to defend my country's actions while not always completely understanding them. There was Korea, the Bay of Pigs, the enigma of Vietnam but yet I maintained my patriotic position.

Then the crushing news: Lt. Calley guilty! I hung my head in shame. Something within me died. Now it is my turn to cry.

FRANK STEUDLE of Casselberry, a veteran of WWI and past commander of American Legion Post 183 of Altamonte Springs, commented, "That young man (Calley) has been a scapegoat for the whole situation and he should be cleared as he worked under his commanding officers' orders, I am associated with military men everyday and they are bitter about

C. M. HARP, principal of Casselberry Elementary School stated his reaction in these words, "I will never have any thing to do with the service, (as a result of decision) because if you are told to kill a man you expect to follow the order, I have worked hard getting a lot of boys into the service, but I will never ask another child to enlist."

MAYOR CURTIS BLOW of Casselberry, a veteran of WWII, sald, "I feel if what he (Calley) did was following orders, it was his superior who should have been found guilty."

HAROLD KRYDER of Casselberry, who enlisted during WWII as an enlisted man at the age of 43, also reacted strongly to Lt. Calley's being found guilty. He said, "I think it is terrible to get those fellows in war and have them tried for killing enemics. I don't know how they expect to get soldiers. In other wars when they dropped a bomb, innocent civilians were killed and as long as you've got war this will happen. I don't understand those officers on the jury finding him guilty.

SHERIFF JOHN POLK'S reaction was expressed thusly "war is hell, but if we look back through history, we find all great nations who have moved away from God and have killed everything have gone down.

"It is hard to distinguish the enemy in Vietnam, but I don't feel that killing helpless children has won any war. "The day is coming when our nation and individuals must

answer to God for this. "If someone is going to be prosecuted, I feel they did not go high enough."

SANFORD MAYOR LEE P. MOORE feels Lt. Calley was in a situation in which he thought he was doing right. "I can't see how they can convict him, but it will be reviewed at various levels before anything is final. I personally felt if he were convicted it would have been for manslaughter,"

For here was a dinner in sharp contrast to the one put on a year ago when Republican Gov. Claude R. Kirk, Jr., turned it into such a personal attack on mass media that it is mentioned here only to say the change was healthy and beneficial.

It was, indeed, a very bold and effective move the GOP which sent four Republican congressmen to Sanford where, in the Civic Center, they took part in a frank and honest press conference with repre-

This Lincoln Day affair must be set in that political framework. But just how it should be done must await the results as the GOP seeks to re-kindle its vigor - especially among the young - and girds for the show-down battles of '72. The four Congressmen did themselves and their

party proud both in the press conference and in their talks to the Republicans which followed the \$50 a-

Perhaps the impression which lingered after the event was the rare abilities of these four: James

Hastings of New York, Earl Ruth of North Carolina (who has a rare gift of telling stories), Lawrence Hogan of Maryland (an admirer of his former governor "Ted" Agnew) and Florida's own Lou Frey.

Congressman Hastings an "Up-State" Republican showed the traditional candor of the GOPsters from that section of the Empire State. For it was his voice and his impressive presence that pointed out the need for the greatest care when the Congressional debates and Presidential speeches are read.

In the Senate and the House are at least seven obvious candidates for the presidency. At the other end of the avenue there is President Nixon. Thus the New Yorker counseled the sifting of facts when any of the presidential hopefuls speak out. This is a need which we have pointed out from

time to time and in respect to other issues but to have it done at such a partisan political event and by such a Congressman, whose experence had included that of his state's legislature, is a fact for which the

Republican party can be thanked. Thus the executive committee, with William Schaffner as chairman has performed most admirably in the confused political climate of Seminole



Federal **Funds Not** Enough

By GAYNOR MADDOX NEA Food Writer

Don't be too impressed that more than \$1 billion in federal funds and foods is going to bolster the nutrition of the nation's children. Even though this sum is 25 per cent more than the \$754 million earmarked last year, it is far from what is actually needed.

This year \$750,000 will be spent for nutrition education and training. But the amount is so small only a beginning can be made.

Christine Justin, head of the U.S. Agriculture Department's food utilization and training aids section of the Food and Nutrition Services,

"We prepare training material for use by all persons involved in the school lunch program. That means buying guides, fact sheets and special instructions." She adds, "We evaluate foods for use in the program, test formulas for mixes and check for nutritional standards. Though we don't have any policy yet about substitute foods, we do favor the use of a soybean product which can be eaten cold in schools without cooking facilities. For example, a cake is rich in protein and vitamin C and the little children seem to like it."

Miss Justin, whose experience includes work with state experimental stations, as a federal food grader, as a community nutritionist and a Navy food service expert, believes the attempt to up-grade the food program will help a lot.

The young Aids Section has arranged for five seminars at land grant colleges. About 500 local supervisors selected by the states will attend.

"The changing eating habits of children are a cause of worry," she explains. "Actually, today's habite are worse than five years ago. Snacking all the time may be one ex planation. Another may be that fewer families sit down together for a meal. It is part of our job to get more nutrition information to the parents."

Any child from a family with an income at or below the national income poverty guidelines is entitled to a lunch, either free or at a reduced price (not to exceed 20 cents) in a school that is receiving federal school lunch cash or commodity assistance.

But many needy children avoid asking for a free lunch through pride or embarrassment. That is why so many legislators and educators hope to see the school lunch free and a free breakfast for everyope. An ill-fed child is dulied, lower in stamins and less productive.



Classic Crepes Make A Big

JARNAC, France (NEA)-A slight chill in the air gave everyone an excuse to order a dollup of cognac before dinner.

There was the promise of a quiet country night's sleep in a converted flour mill that had seven guest rooms, a petit bar and dining area that featured a fireplace. A burbling stream flowed under the building, night and day. Introduced to the true French countryside by François Hine, it was a special treat to
