## W.C.T.U. ANNUAL CONVENTION IS NOW IN SESSION

Speech by President of Union Is Expected to Be Made at Close of Regular Business Calendar This Afternoon

ORLANDO, Fla., Oct. 27.—(AP)—The Florida Women's Christian Temperance Union, meeting in its forty-third annual convention, opened its first business session here this morning at 9:30 o'clock, with Miss Minnie Neal, of Jacksonville, presiding.

Proceeding the actual opening of the business session, the executive committee met to complete its work of preparing reports for submission and discussion of various important matters confronting the union.

On the program for the morning session, following the devotional service, and reading of the executive committee roll call, were appointment of committees, including those of courtesy, credentials, national publications, membership, press, and resolutions, report of the corresponding secretary, and a story of the Loyal Temperance Legion, to be given by Mrs. Elsie N. Green, Jacksonville.

As a finale of the session this morning, Miss Neal will deliver her annual message to the union, which is expected to deal largely with the prohibition situation and to contain several recommendations in fostering a movement for better law observances.

The afternoon session will include introduction of presidents; a child's welfare demonstration, directed by Dr. Grace R. Parker; presentation of the honor roll; treasurer's report; a solo by Mrs. Angus Cox, of Orlando; exhibits and fairs by Miss Katherine Boyles; a demonstration "the union signal challenge," by Mrs. F. W. Matson and a motored through the city and surrounding county, terminating at Rollins College, Winter Park, where the delegates will be hosts of Dr. Hamilton Holt and his faculty.

Featuring the evening session will be an address by Dr. Holt on world peace and several pageants and demonstrations.

## Loan Association Statement Shows Its Recent Growth

The substantial growth of the Sanford Building and Loan Association is revealed in the balance sheet of the association as of Oct. 5. The assets totalled \$1,295,001.39. The association was organized in October, 1908 with first payment in capital of \$608, the first payment on installment stock.

The association grew steadily until 1914 when few loans were made as there was virtually no home building in Sanford and the association had to retire a considerable portion of the capital stock.

Business improved in 1921 and since then the growth has been rapid, loans averaging \$30,000 per month being made since last January. The association pays eight per cent semi-annually to investors.

The officers are T. J. Miller, president; H. R. Stevens, vice president; A. P. Connelly, secretary and treasurer.

## FLORIDA ALUMNI PONZI MUST BE SETS \$6,500 AS SANFORD'S QUOTA

Ralph Stoutamire Asks the Newly Organized Club of State University to Aid In Campaign for \$150,000

Sanford alumni of University of Florida will attempt to raise \$6,500 for certain needs of the university, it was decided last night at a meeting of graduates and former students in the Seminole Cafe.

A University of Florida Club was organized here as the result of the meeting with the following elected as officers: Glenn E. McKay, president; G. W. Spencer, vice president; and Mrs. G. E. McKay, secretary-treasurer.

The Alumni Association of the university is waging a campaign to raise \$150,000 by population subscription which will be used for equipment badly needed, Ralph Stoutamire, executive secretary of the association said in a short talk. He asked the men present to pledge themselves to the raising of \$6,500 as Sanford's quota.

Raymer E. Maguire of Orlando, president of the Alumni Association, said that the university has 2,000 students, but the facilities are inadequate for the student body.

Dr. J. E. Turlington and Professor Frank Brunly of the Florida College of Agriculture talked on the needs of the university. Mr. Spencer as chairman of the meeting called upon local alumni to give short talks.

## Freezing Temperatures In Great Lakes Region Bring Frost South

WASHINGTON, Oct. 27.—(AP)—Addition of more than 14,000 acres of the Florida national forest was authorized today by President Coolidge on recommendation of the Secretaries of Interior and Agriculture.

In changing the limits of forest, the executive provided for the elimination of approximately 13,736 acres, title to which previously had passed from the government public land laws.

TAMPA, Fla., Oct. 27.—(AP)—Continued cold weather prevailed in a large section of Florida today, said the report of W. J. Bennett, government meteorologist.

Somewhat warmer weather yesterday in this section was followed by another fall in temperature this morning and the lowest points so far this season were reached in Florida, Georgia and South Carolina. Charleston reported 38 degrees, with heavy frost; Jacksonville 44; Tampa 49 and Fort Myers 50. Freezing temperatures occurred in the region of the Great Lakes.

Over the plains states and the Mississippi valley temperatures are rising under the influence of low pressure centered over the Delta.

## Republican Speaker Lays Blame For "Solid South" Squarely On Own Party

ATLANTA, Oct. 27.—(AP)—Responsibility for the "solid Democratic South" was placed squarely on the Republican party here today by Harry Spears, prominent Memphis attorney, because "it has been managed by a few men primarily concerned with federal patronage and its leaders have been negligent in promoting its growth."

Addressing the Southern States Republican League at its opening session, Mr. Spears said that not until "the moral tone of the party has been raised and it has been placed in a position of unquestioned respectability" will it become a factor in southern politics.

"The South has suffered ineffectually because of Democratic political solidarity," he said, "in that the Democratic party has believed the South should be a charity wheel, and the Republicans have viewed this as barren ground."

"The league hopes to be a means toward establishing two-party government in the South, but realizes that sectional prejudices must be swept away. In order to do so, the Republican party must abandon certain practices that have been in vogue since reconstruction and its moral tone of its leadership is a plane of eminent respectability."

Declaring the league believes in the soundness of Republican economic policies, Mr. Spears predicted that the need for such a program notably the tariff, will become more acutely realized in the South as this section develops from a condition of agricultural predominance to half agriculture and half industry.

## FLORIDA ALUMNI PONZI MUST BE RETURNED EAST TO FACE PRISON

Financial Wizard Loses Fight In Texas Court Against Tradition to Massachusetts to Serve Prison Term

AUSTIN, Texas, Oct. 27.—(AP)—Charles Ponzi, financial wizard, was ordered turned over to Massachusetts authorities by the court of criminal appeals today. Ponzi is held in jail at Houston.

Ponzi has been fighting extradition for four months. Two hearings were held before Governor Miriam Ferguson before she honored the requisition of the Governor of Massachusetts for his return to serve a seven to nine year sentence, upon conviction of "being a common and notorious thief," in connection with his financial schemes in Boston.

Ponzi was captured in New Orleans by a Harris county, Texas officer who had recognized him aboard an Italian ship in the port of Houston. He was brought to Houston.

The Boston financial wizard sought to prevent extradition in the district court and failing to get relief in the higher court which was denied.

## Fourteen Thousand Acres Approved By Coolidge As Forest Destroyer Brings Word Of Deaths To Americans In Gale

HAVANA, Oct. 27.—(AP)—A wireless dispatch to the American embassy from the destroyer Milwaukee, now at the Isle of Pines, today gave the names of three of the American victims of the recent storm there. They were Mrs. R. C. James, Mrs. Eleanor Lindley and Mrs. James Pearson. No reports of deaths among men were received.

Early reports from the island placed Mrs. James and Mrs. Lindley among the dead while Mrs. Pearson was reported gravely injured.

Mrs. Hughes Hallett, wife of the British charge d'affaires, has returned to the Isle with clothing for 100 children and 50 adults. The American relief committee here is steadily collecting quantities of clothing for the victims. Relief funds are being collected and large subscriptions have come in from banks, newspapers and prominent citizens.

President Machado has sent a train bearing food and clothing for the sufferers. The Cuban Red Cross has been highly praised by officials for its efficient distribution of supplies.

## MARIE RUSHES FROM TORONTO TO MONTREAL

Says She Is Happy Over the Reception Accorded Her in Canada Where She Is Called Granddaughter of Victoria

Calls British Empire "The Tie That Binds"

Receives Petition From Natives of Ukrainian States Asking Better Conditions

ENROUTE TO MONTREAL

Oct. 27.—(AP)—Queen Marie of Rumania, continued her journey through Canada today happy in her reception as granddaughter of Victoria's great empress, Victoria, as well as Queen in her own right.

Deeply touched by the Toronto women's acclamation here yesterday as descendant of Victoria, the Queen in reply declared she had not forgot that she was born in England and added her belief that "there is no stronger link that binds us together than the association of the British empire."

Picturing the contrast of the pleasant days of her girlhood and the tragedy of the war as she saw it, Marie urged the women of Canada to join their sisters throughout the world in an endeavor to bring lasting peace between nations.

Her address was delivered in Convocation Hall of the University of Toronto after she had inspected the institution. The first and last visits of the day were at government house where Marie and Princess Bleana, and Prince Nicholas, with other members of the royal party, were guests last night.

An all day visit in Montreal constituted today's program.

Marie would like to abandon her royal role for a time and learn the Americans as they are and how the average American lives, she said during an informal chat in her car.

She said she would like to step into an American kitchen, have a chat with the housewife, and see how the dinner dishes were put through a washing machine.

A petition was thrust into the hands of the Queen as she was leaving her train in Toronto. It requested "better conditions" for Ukrainian residents in Rumania and was signed by the Ukrainian community of Toronto. It said Ukrainians in Rumania had been deprived of their schools and of political and economic freedom, and that living conditions for Ukrainians were more deplorable than before the world war. The petition was taken from the hands of the Queen by an aide. She made no comment.

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## Nation Is United In Honoring Roosevelt Memory Navy Day

Ships Thrown Open In Ports All Over U. S. for Visitors; Radio Assists Plans

Secretary Wilbur To Speak Tonight

City of Jacksonville Arranges for Long Program of Fete

NEW YORK, Oct. 27.—(AP)—Today, the 68th anniversary of Theodore Roosevelt's birth, was observed throughout the country as Navy Day.

Ships in port were thrown open to the public, ceremonies and radio programs were arranged to call attention to the country's first line of defense and to the career of the man who as assistant secretary of the Navy, and its commander in chief and in private life, promoted the Navy's interest with all his energy.

Featuring events on the program here were a public Roosevelt memorial meeting at town hall under auspices of the Women's Roosevelt Memorial Association and the laying of the keel of the new light cruiser Pensacola at Brooklyn Navy Yard. Mrs. Douglas Robinson, Roosevelt's sister, and Rear Admiral Charles P. Plunkett were down for the principal speeches at the memorial service.

William Green, president of the American Federation of Labor, agreed to drive the first rivet in the keel of the cruiser Pensacola at Brooklyn Navy Yard.

The Pensacola, a sister ship to the Salt Lake City, now under construction at Philadelphia, will take two years to build.

Tonight speeches will be broadcast from a dinner in Washington by Secretary Wilbur. Lieutenant Commander Robert H. Taylor, Colonel Theodore Roosevelt, a dinner will be given in New York by the Roosevelt Memorial Association in Roosevelt House, birthplace of the former President. At this dinner the Roosevelt medal for distinguished work will be awarded to Rear Admiral William S. Sims, former United States Senator Albert J. Beveridge, and Daniel Board, National Comptroller of the hay receipts.

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Oct. 27.—(AP)—Jacksonville joined the nation today in observing the 68th anniversary of Theodore Roosevelt's birth by celebrating Navy Day.

An inspection of the United States destroyer bands, assigned here by the Navy Department for the day; a parade by detachments from the destroyer and local naval reserve units, a broadcasting program from the municipal radio WJAX, and a searchlight display on the destroyer tonight, these were the major items on the program for the day.

All day long the bands were vied by the public, the destroyed, in full fighting trim, being thrown open for inspection from early morning until nightfall. Members of the crew explained the elaborate mechanisms to the visitors.

The radio program tonight, beginning at 8 o'clock, will feature an address by Admiral W. S. Benson, commissioner of the United States Shipping Board, who was here today to conduct a hearing on the ownership and maintenance of the American Merchant Marine.

## ALTAMONTE CITY MARSHAL JAILED IN ASSAULT CASE

Shot Richard Honeycutt in Garage After an Argument Over Liquor Raid; Victim Is In Critical Condition

Hill-feeling engendered by a liquor raid near Altamonte Springs led to a shooting Tuesday afternoon which may result fatally to one of the participants.

Richard Honeycutt, a farmer, is in a critical condition in the Orange General Hospital of Orlando as the result of being shot twice, once in the stomach and a second bullet in the left leg. His recovery is doubtful, say physicians.

Charles M. Hogg, town marshal of Altamonte Springs, is in the county jail here, charged with assault with intent to murder. Bond has been fixed at \$1,000. In the event his victim dies, he will be charged with murder, Sheriff C. M. Hand who made the arrest, said.

The town marshal told Sheriff Hand that his "conscience is clear."

The shooting took place in an Altamonte Springs garage, Hogg declares Honeycutt was shot in scuffle for Hogg's gun. Honeycutt told Sheriff Hand that Hogg advanced towards him and began firing.

Hogg said he went to the garage to have a battery put on his truck. When the truck was ready, he saw Honeycutt advancing while he was cranking the motor.

Honeycutt asked him where he was going, according to Hogg. "You had better not come out to my place any more," Honeycutt said to him, according to the marshal. Hogg replied that he had been requested to visit Honeycutt's farm by the sheriff's department. "If you come out to my place any more," Honeycutt is alleged to have said, "I'll kill you."

Hogg turned to crank his motor again and Honeycutt reached for the marshal's gun in his scabbard, Hogg said. There was a struggle and the gun went off twice, it is the version Hogg gave to the sheriff. Deputy Sheriff accompanied by Hogg visited Honeycutt's farm several days ago in search of liquor.

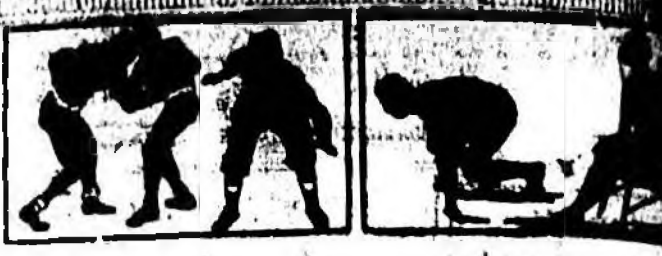
## Storm Laid to the Approach of Mars

## Rollins, Stetson Resume Athletic Relations Here After a 3-Year Interval

Rollins College and Stetson University meet at Sanford today. It will mark the resumption of competitive football between the two institutions for the first time in three years. The Intercollegiate Athletic Association marks a score in bringing the two leading smaller colleges to friendly relations. This is their first year in the Association, and the game at Sanford will be the first competitive contest between members of the Three.

It is remembered that Rollins defeated the Hatters three years ago in one of the most wild and thrilling football games of Florida's gridiron history that year. The Tars triumphed over McQuillan's aggregation of fast backs as "Cotton" and Tommy Quinn carried the pigskin for big end gains. McQuillan's aggregation failed to stop the Tars, which is the reason why Rollins probably put up a great first chance.

The Tars will be handicapped by material; but, on the other hand, they have practically every candidate for varsity in an experienced player. Coach Orr is depending upon this experience to help for lack of material. The Hatters are reinforced by a yearling squad from last year which will give them a distinct advantage in the substitution department. On top of that, McQuillan will be able to put onto the field a squad of old material from last year's varsity. When it is recalled that these same veterans had an excellent record last year, the fans in the Tar camp will be inclined to think about it.

Both teams are going through a rough time for the coming conflict, and the hour of battle draws the question uppermost in the minds of football followers: "Will the Tars repeat their victory of three years ago, or will Stetson come back with a vengeance to erase the stigma of that year?"

Records of the two teams show that Rollins has had some of the better of the season's contests. The Hatters' schedule is clean slate except for the record conflict with the Spring Hill team from Mobile, which was ended at a 0-0 standstill. The Tars show two victories and no defeats. This comparison, however, means little since the teams which they have opposed have not been teams belonging to the S. I. A. A. There is no way to tell the strength of either Rollins or Stetson until one team meets the same team, or they each other. The former has come to pace as yet; the latter season will take place.

Rollins and Stetson claim to have had the better of the season's records. Captain Zehler of the Tars has led his team to two straight victories and has been the mainstay of the Tar offense. His plugging ability, as well as his ability to circle the ends, pass, or make of him a dangerous threat back. Captain Zehler came from Warraw, N. Y., and had two years of experience on the squads.

Regardless of which team wins, the removal of gridiron relations between members of the "Little Three" will place athletic competition in Florida once more upon a sound and friendly basis.

UNIVERSITY OF FLORIDA, Gainesville, Oct. 26.—(AP)—Inter-society debates have begun at the university to decide which team of colleges has the champion. Each college has a literary which selects three men to be in the tournament.

In the initial round, Dixie Beggs, Jr., of Rollins, and Joseph Wilensky, of Jacksonville, were selected as opponents, with Selwyn Ives, of Lake Wales, as alternate. These men will be those chosen by the teachers.

Rollins has aroused a great deal of interest here. Florida has been asked to debate Oxford, and the university and English orators stand in the Florida State House for Women auditorium.

## COACH OF ILLINOIS WARY OF PENN'S DECEPTIVE PLAY

Zuppke Fears Hidden Ball of Eastern Eleven while Yost Sees Navy Horizon for the Scent of Similar Tricks

CHICAGO, Oct. 26.—(AP)—Michigan won over the football team of the Illinois Saturday, but Yost and Zuppke were on a common footing today. Illinois is afraid of Pennsylvania's hidden ball attack, so was Yost about Michigan's probabilities against the Navy.

Michigan crowded Illinois to the rail in the Big Ten title race, but all the genius of Bennie Friedman and the veteran Molinda went into the 13 to 0 victory. Critics agreed generally that it was not the great team that downed Navy a year ago.

There was much evidence that the Wolverine coach was not indulging in idle subterfuge when he predicted on the eve of the battle with the Illini, that Michigan's 1926 fortunes rest on the shoulders of a "lot of green boys." Yost said his line was weak, and the line looked weak against Illinois.

At Illinois Zuppke turned today to various ways and means of solving Pennsylvania's hidden ball defense.

Zuppke had talked of using a white football if the easterners insisted on wearing their brown arm pads, which looked like footballs. Word came from the East, however, that these would be painted black.

In the conference paper, a major share of the attention turned to the week's battle between a Wisconsin, as yet undefeated, and a Minnesota that surprised the Big Ten by Saturday's crushing defeat of Wabash.

At Chicago, Stagg began mustering strength in a team shaken by Pennsylvania and Purdue. Ohio State, rated Michigan's strongest championship contender since downing Iowa, invades Stagg Field this week while Purdue meets Indiana State Normal.

Iowa plays Carroll College, Wisconsin, while Northwestern engages Indiana a second time.

At Notre Dame, Rockne labored to convert Saturday's bare margin over Northwestern into an expected decided triumph over the invasion of Georgia Tech.

## ROGERS HOPES TO BREAK GROUND GAINING RECORDS

Pennsylvania 'U' Gridiron Hero Expects to Exceed Record of Grange, Which Is 1,043 Yards for Season

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 26.—(AP)—Charlie Rogers, University of Pennsylvania halfback, hopes to shatter the ground gaining record of Red Grange.

In five games Rogers has run 625 yards and in three of these contests he played only a portion of the time. In ten games while a member of the Illinois team three years ago, Grange hung up a total of 1,043 yards in nine contests.

In the opening game this season against Franklin and Marshall, Rogers made a total of 145 yards in three periods, while a week later against Swarthmore he gained 145 yards. He tore past the Chicago line for 132 yards, and in last Saturday's contest against Williams he gained 101 yards in the single period he played.

Pennsylvania has five more contests on its schedule and Rogers would have to average more than 92 yards in the next four games to break Grange's mark. Pennsylvania followers predict he will add nearly 500 yards to his total.

## Phoney Smith Of Mercer Is Famous As Ground Gainer

Central Florida football fans will be given an opportunity Armistice Day to see one of the great halfbacks of the season in Sanford in Phoney Smith of Mercer University, which meets Rollins College.

It was Smith's field goal in the last minutes of play which gave Mercer a 3 to 0 victory over Howard last Saturday and it was Mercer's ground gaining which helped to defeat the University of Florida two weeks ago.

Three beautiful dashes made by the phantom Smith placed the ball on Howard's 10-yard line. There was little more than a minute to play. Three plunges at Howard's impenetrable line had failed. It was the fourth down and goal to go. Smith dropped back to Howard's 25-yard line. Kneeling on the ground, Quarterback Loser took the pass from center. Smith swung his leg. A dull thud. A galling pigskin rose high over the cross bars, squarely between the posts. Mercer had won, 3 to 0.
