## Let Junior Take Growth In Stride

## De DAVID TAYLOR MARKE

Do you remember how you read all those phamphlets and books about how to bring up baby? Remember how you imagined that at the age of 3 he would know so many words and to many things? That's how the books said the average child would develop—and that's how you pictured junior would be.

You needn't be, says a Byrom Hughes, professor of child development in Michigan University's School of Education. In fact, it's a serious mistake to try to make junior fit preconceived and arbitrary standards of development.

"Desirable standards can best be set only in terms of the individual," he points out, "since acicutific studies of growth do not indicate life ages when all children can be expected to attain certain levels of growth."

The findings of the Hoover Commission are now being tabulated and released for publication. Its work has been of primary importance.

The six Democrats and six Republicans who have worked with Chairman Herbert Hoover were chosen by President Truman, speaker of the House Martin and Senator Vandenberg, presiding officer of the Senate, The fact that they were well selected to work together is proved by the fact that the chairman reports that so far all decision have been unanimous.

They have recommended that the depleted Labor De partment be restored to its former strength as to functions and as to personnel. On the other hand, the commission believes that the Post Office Department would benefit by oruning and reorganization. The group considers the Post Office service to be good and efficient, but is certain that a change in the method of hiring employees would lower costs and increase efficiency. Hiring, the commission believes, should be done on the basis of merit alone and should be in charge of the Department itself.
