Responsibility Of The Juror

Let it be said, to our shame, that too often the American citizen who is called to serve on the jury in our trial courts does not appreciate the responsibility reposed in him to pass judgment on the innocence or guilt of the person accused.

Nor does he have a full appreciation of the fact that the accused person is entitled to a fair trial by a "jury of his peers" and that when less than a fair trial results, both the rights of the accused and the ends of justice are not served.

We urge the County Commission to give deep consideration to the selection of persons who will make up the jury list for the ensuing year.

Too often men who are law-abiding in every respect, who uphold and support law enforcement officers in performing their duties fail in one of their highest duties in the area of law enforcement by dodging or trying to escape serving on juries, for business and personal reasons.

They would rather sidestep this essential duty and responsibility and "Let George Do It."

Time and time again, the judge on the bench, in addressing a grand or petit jury, points to the high responsibility they should bear in serving society and the cause of justice.

The juror has a responsibility . . AND he must not leave it to George.



LONDON (UPI) - Prime Minister Harold Macmillan has told Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev in a personal letter that he was ready to meet him at the aummit "fairly soon" after the start of the 18-nation disarmament conference in Geneva on March 14.

Macmillan told Khrushchev that a summit conference "might be fruitful" if the Geneva conference were making satisfactory progress or, alternatively, if it were threatened with deadlock.


