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Be Careful Of Your Choice

In selecting a candidate for their representative in the United States Congress, the people of the Fifth District should consider other aims and qualifications of the candidates besides a promise to pay \$200 a month in any particular group. Especially when that particular promise is so obviously impossible of fulfillment, has the unqualified opposition of both the leading political parties, and is made solely for the purpose of capturing votes from deceived and misguided voters.

We are selecting "Funie" Steed as the best qualified man for whom to cast our vote because he is an experienced man of recognized ability, who has achieved a modest degree of success in the legal business and as a citrus grower. He is a self-made man who has made good, who has an unimpeachable reputation for honesty and integrity, who is a thoughtful student of public affairs, and who is thoroughly conversant with the needs of this great newly created district of Central Florida.

Further than that, Mr. Steed will go to Washington with the good wishes and confidence of the Administration in power. He is not out fighting the battles of a man who is fighting the present government. He is not tugging himself into any third party movement which could not hope to have any influence with loyal Democrats, or any standing with sensible Republicans. When Mr. Steed goes to Washington, he will not be a man without a party.

Never before in the history of this country has it been so important for a representative to stand in the good graces of the Administration. The President has more than three billion dollars at his command which will be distributed throughout the country for various public works projects during the coming year. We do not mean to imply that the President would sacrifice a certain district because its congressman was unfriendly, but we do think that the congressman would have much less influence in determining how the money would be spent than a congressman for instance whose principal support did not come from Dr. Townsend.

As far as the old folks of this district are concerned, we feel quite sure that their best interests, too, lie with the selection of "Funie" Steed. The present Social Security Act, which provides for old age pensions, everyone admits is imperfect. It was hastily devised in the midst of a great nation-wide emergency and under the most trying circumstances. No fair-minded person could expect it to be perfect, and even its most bitter enemies admit that it is a time to time so as to improve its various provisions.

Mr. Steed declares that if he is elected to Congress he will work along with President Roosevelt, not against him, and other loyal Democrats to improve the present Social Security Act. He favors such amendments to this law as will enable the immediate payment of pensions to those old folks who are in need, and he also has come out for and in favor of modifying the so-called "pauper's oath" provision so that the ownership of a small home or an acre of ground will not prevent the receipt of a pension.

We believe that a man of Mr. Steed's type who is honest and conscientious in what he is telling the voters and who stands in the good graces of the present Administration, can do a whole lot more toward getting for the old folks what they want than one who is untried, inexperienced, and all bound up with hopeless political promises.

And we are thoroughly confident that "Funie" Steed can accomplish a great deal more for the Central Florida district as a whole than can "Little Joe" Hendricks.

Important Questions

The Tampa Tribune went to the trouble this week of preparing a series of questions on important matters pertaining to the governor's office in this state. The questions appealed to us as prominently fair and pertinent and pertaining to issues on which the people should be thoroughly advised before casting their votes.

First on the Tribune's list of questions which were submitted to the two candidates for governor was this: "Will you refuse to grant pardons or paroles except on legal and credible evidence of a miscarriage of justice? The pardon racket, we believe almost everyone will agree, has been one of the worst evils existing in this state."

Other questions submitted by the Tribune, follow: "Will you require greater economy in the expense of state commissions, notably the Racing Commissions? Have you promised any jobs in state departments, specifically the State Road Department? Will you eliminate useless state employees, such as superfluous inspectors, who devote their time mainly to political campaigning?"

These are all questions which pertain directly to the administration of the state government. They have nothing whatever to do with legislative politics about which so many gubernatorial candidates are inclined to make vain promises. But the governor can do something about the pardon racket, about the wasteful extravagance of executive commissions.

Promptly came back Judge Fetterway's answers. He will refuse to grant pardons or paroles except on legal and credible evidence of a miscarriage of justice. He will require greater economy in the expense of state commissions, especially the Racing Commission. He has not promised any jobs to anyone in any state department. And he will eliminate useless state employees, superfluous inspectors, who spend their time and the people's money campaigning.

With respect to a refusal to grant pardons, Judge Fetterway further states: "Such action on the part of the Governor acting on the Parole Board is a vital necessity for the protection of the general public in Florida. Further, the experience as Judge of the Criminal Court in Tampa has given him experience which makes him a leader in this connection. My answer is positively in the affirmative."

Lemke's statement after naming O'Brien as vice-presidential candidate, added:
'I have arranged with friends of mine to proceed with filing the name of the union party, the emblem, the names of presidential electors, my own name, and that of Mr. O'Brien in order to fulfill the specific law of each state relative to filing.'
Lemke said that the union party was supported by farm owners, labor, the national union for special justice, the Townsend Old Age Pension movement and all other groups who have been driven from the old parties.

When I heard Borah wouldn't take it, my friends kept pressing me and said I was the only man who could make a real race," he said.
Attached to his formal statement were the 15 planks of the new union party's platform, closely resembling the program of Father Coughlin's National Union for Social Justice. They are:

- 1. America shall have no foreign entanglements either political, economic, financial or military.
2. Congress and Congress alone shall coin and issue the currency and regulate the value of all the money and the credit of the United States through a central bank of issue.
3. Upon establishment of the...

central bank, Congress shall retire all tax exempt interest bearing bonds and certificates of indebtedness and shall refinance all present agriculture mortgage indebtedness of farmers and all home mortgage indebtedness of the city owners. This shall be done by the use of money and credit of the federal government which are now given to private bankers.

4. Congress shall assure a living annual wage for all laborers capable of working and willing to work.
5. Congress shall assure production and a profit for farmers.
6. Congress shall provide "reasonable and decent security for the aged" who have been "victimized and exploited by an unjust economic system which has so concentrated wealth in the hands of a few that it has impoverished great masses of our people."

7. Congress shall legislate so that "American agricultural, industrial and commercial markets shall be protected from manipulation of foreign money and from all raw materials, and processed goods produced at less than a living wage.
8. Congress shall provide "adequate and perfect defense." If there must be conscription, there shall be a conscription of wealth as well as a conscription of men.

9. Congress shall establish civil service for all federal offices and positions.
10. Congress shall restore representative government to the people by "the ruthless eradication of bureaucracy."

11. Congress shall institute federal work for conserving public land, water and forest, thereby creating "billions of dollars of wealth, millions of jobs at the prevailing wage, and thousands of homes."

12. Congress shall protect small industry and business enterprise by controlling and decentralizing the economic domination of monopolies.

13. Congress shall protect private property from confiscation through taxation with the understanding that the human rights of the masses take precedent over the financial right of the classes.

14. Congress shall limit the net income of any individual in any one year and the amount any person may receive as a gift or inheritance.

15. Congress shall re-establish conditions so that the youth of the nation upon leaving college or school will have an opportunity to earn a decent living while in the process of perfecting and establishing themselves in a trade or profession.
'I am hoping that the platform which I have submitted to my friends, will meet with wide approval,' Lemke's statement said. 'To my own mind, it is the only platform which will save democracy and put a permanent end to the so-called depression.'

As a mountain climber he has driven his own pack trains over ranges of half a dozen western states and in New England. He can sail a boat, run a launch, ski, skate, toboggan, swim—and likes them all. He devotes most of his day hours, however, to riding and golf.
In clothes his taste at 62 is conservative. His reading interests range over a wide field, he says, with economics as applied to present day problems first choice just now.
