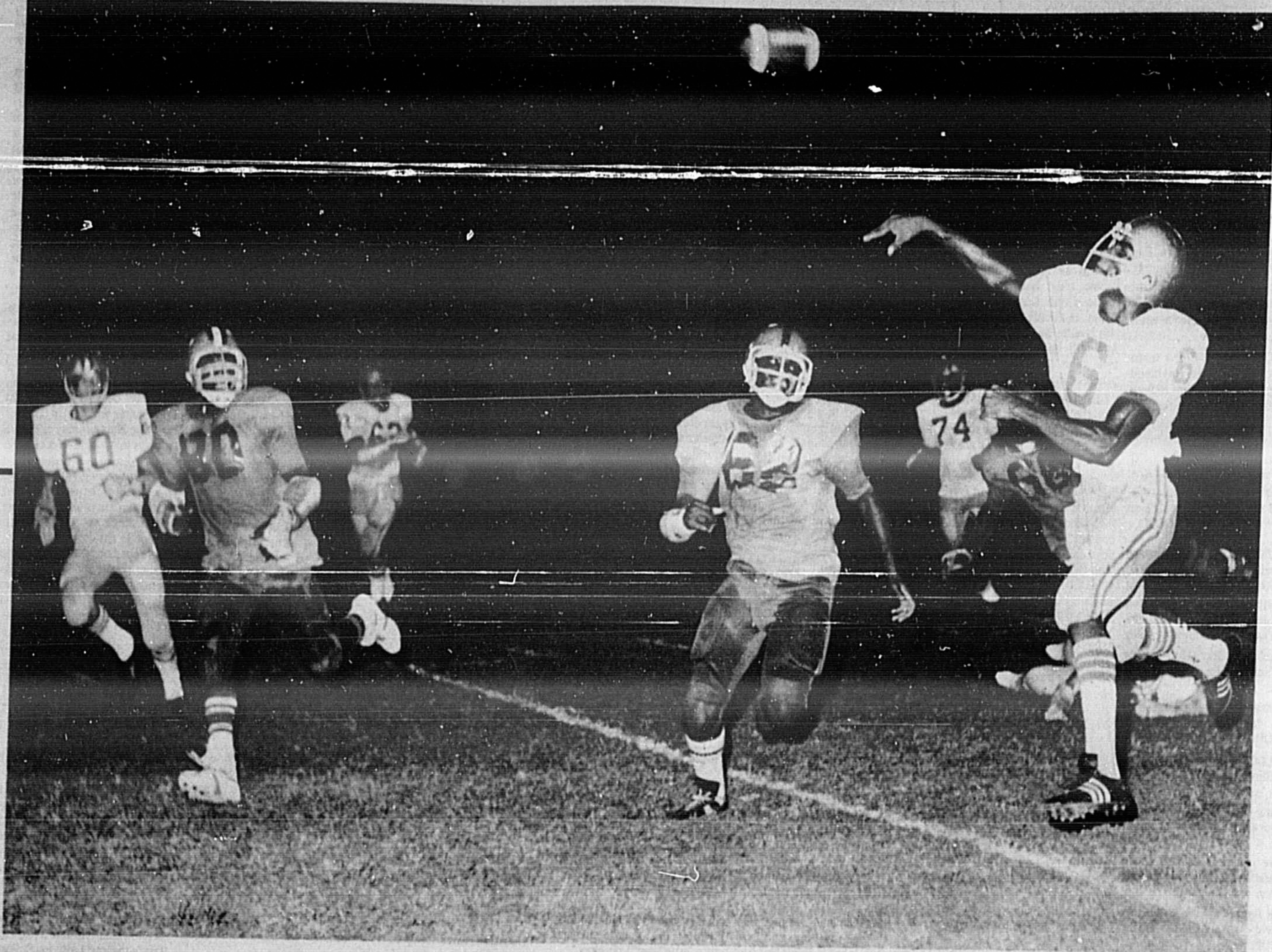
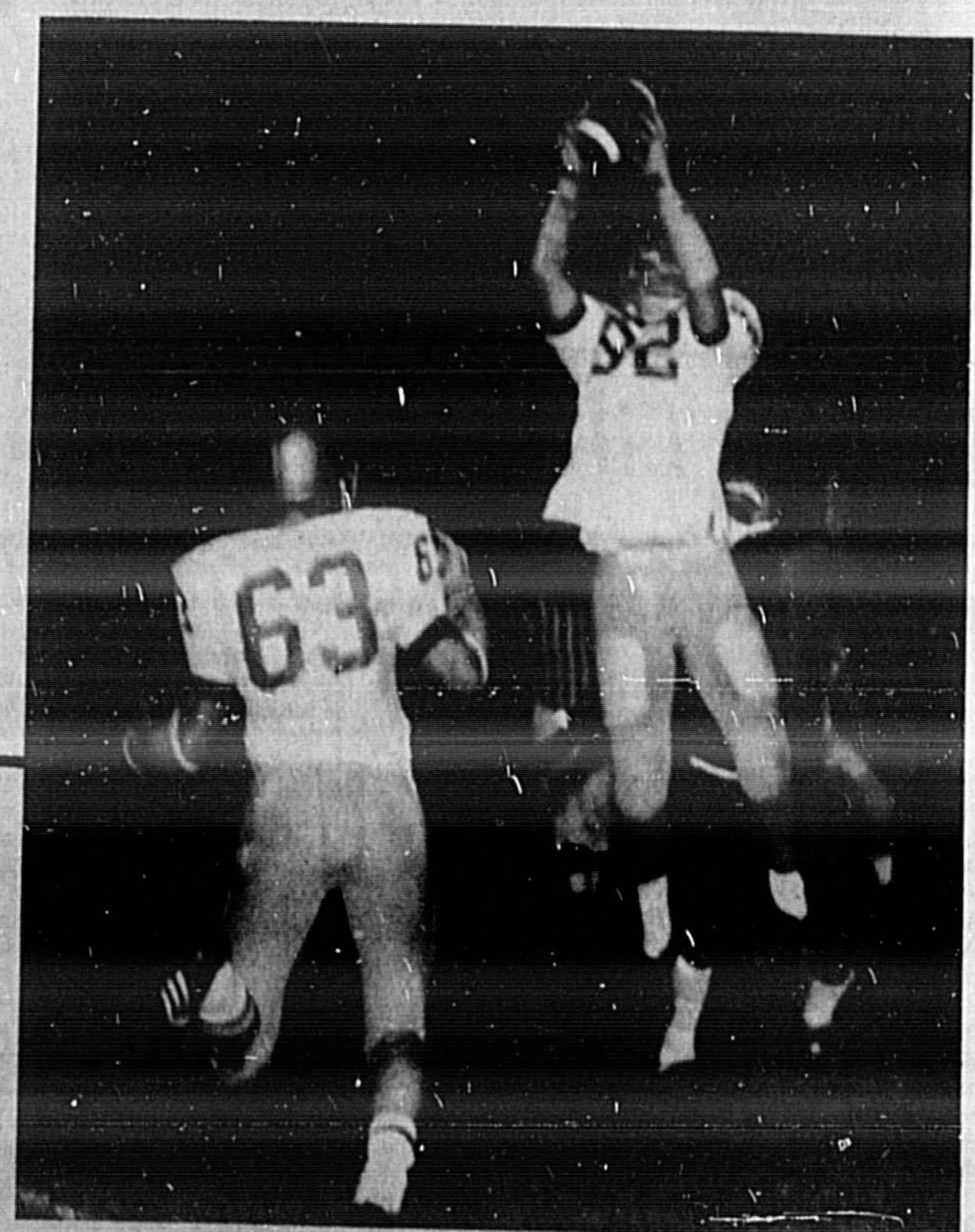


Lyman Battles In Gridiron Jamboree

New Politician: Serious, Smart And Female

JoAnn Saunders, a Democrat, has been elected to the 18th district State Senate seat, Ms. Zahry considers herself a conservative, only a "mild women's libber" not a "radical, shouting" one. She says rather she is a "libber" for people's rights. Jan has worked in civic organizations for the past 10 years, spent five years teaching in a school and two years as a realtor. Lori Wilson surprised the political propagators in the state when she did the impossible two years ago — gathered enough signatures on petitions to qualify on the ballot as an independent candidate for this Senate seat. She qualified again this year using the petition method. Mrs. Wilson is the District 19 incumbent, who Jan Zahry will face if she wins the primary. Republican Paula Hawkins began her career in politics by becoming a member of the "Dirty Dozen," a women's group that successfully pressured the Maitland City Council 16 years ago into getting a sewer system to serve that community. After serving her stint in party politics as national GOP committeewoman, she was elected over a well-known Miami male to the Florida Public Service Commission (PSC). She was a catalyst there in a ruling that the PSC votes must be taken into the open, an application of the state law. Mrs. Hawkins is running for Winter Park Ed Gurney's seat in the U.S. Senate and announced her candidacy almost immediately after he indicated he would not run for re-election. Women in Florida are obviously no longer content to be only the bridesmaid — doing telephone voter solicitations to licking and stuffing envelopes. Women who believe they are qualified are seeking public office more than ever in Florida. And women who lose election can only blame it on other women. The majority of voters in Florida are women.

7 Gals On Ballot Tuesday

The political careers of seven women — some new to politics and others seasoned veterans — will be decided by the voters Tuesday in the primary election. More than at any time in recent memory Florida women are touting their qualifications for offices ranging from school board on the local level to U.S. Senator. Gloria L. Ward makes her first move in the political arena running for a school board seat, and claims no political background. Jan Zahry, seeking a state senate post, and Sheila King, trying for the commissioner of education office, have been involved in politics for as long as they can remember. Jean Bryant, school board member, won hard-fought victories for two four-year terms, and is preparing herself for another intensive person-to-person campaign. JoAnn Saunders, wife of Gov. Reubin Askew's former Orange County patronage boss, in her campaign for the fifth district seat in Congress points to a close relationship with Florida's popular young governor. Beverly Duerer, a former teacher, lists her experience in the Division of Cultural Affairs with the Department of State as a major qualification in her bid for the secretary of state's slot. Paula Hawkins, candidate for the U.S. Senate, parlayed a headline-making fight with the Maitland City Council 16 years ago while a member of a local group. From there she went on to become Republican national committeewoman, and finally, Florida Public Service Commissioner.

Two Women Run On School Board

Gloria Ward, a Republican, became the first woman president of a homeowners association in the area soon after she moved to Seminole County. She's the mother of five children, four to 13 years old. She has one child in high school, one in middle school and



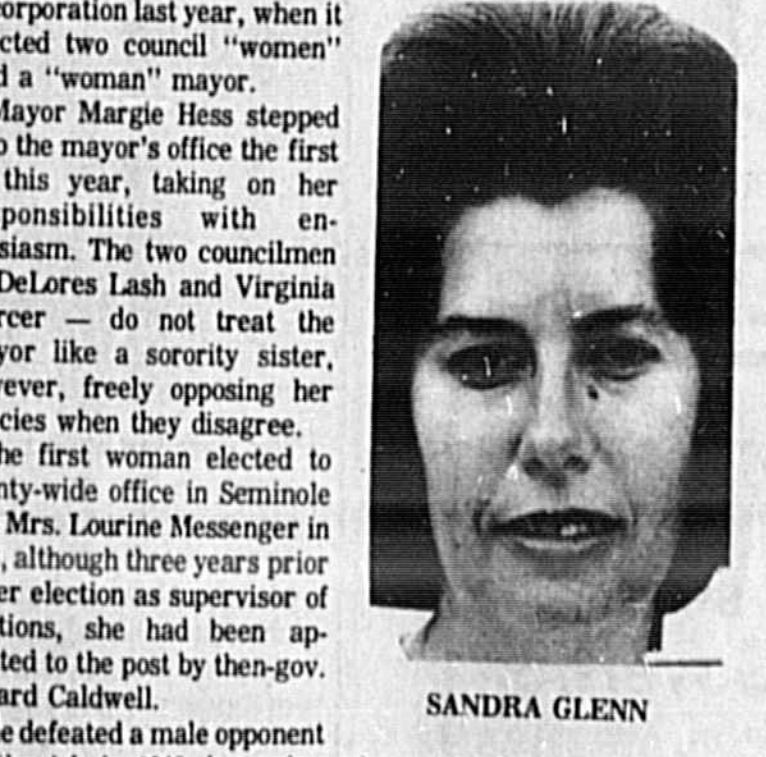

two in elementary school. Her youngest is a pre-schooler. Gloria has represented the Seminole County P-TA Council for the past three sessions of the Legislature, lobbying for more money for Seminole County school building programs. Jean Bryant is the first woman school board member

ever elected in Seminole County. Calling herself a "full-time" school board member, Mrs. Bryant is the mother of three sons. She attended practically every school board meeting for years before deciding to run for a seat on the board in 1968. She defeated a

'Fairer Sex' Recognized For Years In Seminole

Seminole County voters have been electing women to public office for nearly 20 years and the electorate of many of Seminole's cities have recognized the talents of the "fairer" sex in government for a long time. Lake Mary, a small, but old community, surprised the entire Central Florida area, when within four months of its incorporation last year, when it elected two council "women" and a "woman" mayor. Mayor Margie Hess stepped into the mayor's office the first of this year, taking on her responsibilities with enthusiasm. The two councilmen — Delores Lash and Virginia Mercer — do not treat the mayor like a sorority sister, however, freely opposing her policies when they disagree. The first woman elected to county-wide office in Seminole was Mrs. Lourine Messenger in 1948, although three years prior to her election as supervisor of elections, she had been appointed to the post by then-Gov. Millard Caldwell.

She defeated a male opponent for the job in 1948, becoming one of the few elected female supervisors of election in the State of Florida. "It was a tough election," she said, noting she had to attend and speak at 18 political gatherings. The office paid \$75 monthly when she was appointed, but was raised to the phenomenal sum of \$100 monthly soon after her election. When Mrs. Messenger left office in the early 1960's, the current elections supervisor, Camilla Bruce, was appointed to the post and has successfully been elected to six consecutive four-year terms.

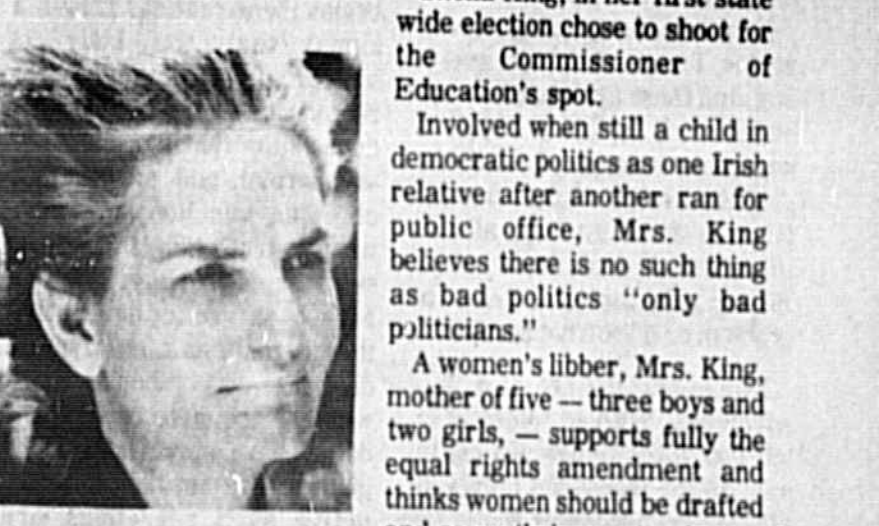

Among the cities, only Altamonte Springs has never had women elected to office. She is the first person among the south end cities to announce. Female Hopefuls Aiming For Tally

Beverly Duerer, a Democrat, is in a field of four seeking the Democratic nomination for the Secretary of State post given up by Richard Stone, who is running for the U.S. Senate. Holding a master's degree in political science and a master's in education administration, Mrs. Duerer also has a varied background — it ranges from two years at the Pentagon in Naval Intelligence to first woman recruitment specialist with the Florida State personnel board and an English and government teacher in the Leon County public school system. Sheila King, in her first state wide election chose to shoot for the Commissioner of Education's spot. Involved when still a child in democratic politics as one Irish relative after another ran for public office, Mrs. King believes there is no such thing as bad politics "only bad politicians."

Want Unusual Fun? Visit Vintage Homes

Late vacationers and those bored with activities enjoyed by the masses, who might prefer to spend their vacation time in a quiet house in almost any state. One built by former king Horace Tabor is in Leadville, Colo., and another (with a 63-foot ballroom) built by copper king William Clark, is at Butte, Mont.

In Portland, Maine, there is one that reflects a blending of Greek, Italian and Romanesque architecture with an opulent flying staircase. A 30-room Victorian farm house with stenciled ceilings is an unusual treat for those in the vicinity of Fond du Lac, Wis., but there are interesting Victorian houses too at Franklin, Tenn., and in many areas of New England.

At Hartford, Conn., there are some for literary buffs including the Victorian Gothic where Samuel Clemens ("Mark Twain") wrote "Tom Sawyer" and "Huckleberry Finn," and the home of Harriet Beecher Stowe ("Uncle Tom's Cabin").

Romantic types who visit the Williamsburg, Va., restoration of 80 buildings and 50 that were rebuilt can enjoy colonial architecture in all its forms. Nearby, too, is Carter's Grove Plantation (Georgian), the red brick mansion that has been called "the most beautiful house in America." Other Georgian houses are at Surry, Charles City, Amelia, Loudoun, Chantilly and Richmond, Va.

But you're not out of it if you are visiting near Delaware, Miss. where you can see Daniel Boone's Georgian house of blue limestone with its 30-inch-thick walls and the five fireplaces a support under the carved. There is the elm, "Judgment Tree," under which the arbitrator Indian and white man disputes.

Georgian houses (1714-1820) of stone, clapboard and wood are the most typical one of brick, fan out from Portsmouth, N.H., where a number were built around 1750. At Annapolis one built in 1774 has unusual semi-elliptical wings.

At Fairmont Park, near Philadelphia, the variety of colonial houses includes a 1748 Quaker farmhouse.

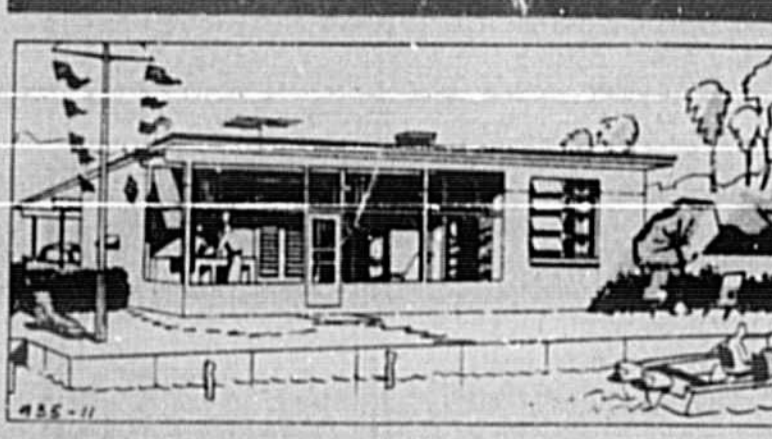
Among the interesting wood colonials at Salem, Mass., is Witch House, which was built in 1692. It should attract the ESP crowd. And there's the Winchester Mystery House at San Jose, Calif., whose owner was told by spiritualists to keep carpenter hammering to ward off ghosts. The 180-room house has 2,000 doors, 50 staircases and some 10,000 windows.

In particular, outdoor types enjoy the two-story log house built by Tennessee's first governor, John Sevier, prior to 1793 at Knoxville. And if one is in the area of Grand Isle, Vt., there is a cabin of cedar logs built in 1783 that is believed to be the oldest in the United States.

Little Norway at Blue Moons, Wis., has a number of log buildings, some in the 12th-century Norwegian style.

A variety of houses reflect European characteristics. At West Liberty, Ohio, you can see a Flemish-style castle with its towers and tall spires built by the charge d'affaires to Louis Napoleon. Another castle, the turreted German Boldt Castle, a conversation piece shaped like a heart, is located at Alexandria Bay, N.Y.

Ford Pardons Nixon; Dismay Voiced

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Ford's unconditional pardon of Richard M. Nixon has pushed his fledgling administration into the backwash of Watergate, ruptured his rapport with Congress and sparked the protest resignation of a top aide.

As his advisers assessed the probable political damage from Sunday's surprise announcement, Ford was flying to Pittsburgh today to keep a speaking date arranged in the early, tranquil days of his transition.

Ford's disclosure of "a free, full and absolute pardon" for Nixon for any criminal conduct during his presidency was followed within minutes by a Nixon statement of remorse at "my mistakes over Watergate."

And, in the ensuing hours, there were these major disclosures and developments:

—Jerald F. terHorst, a close Ford friend and adviser, quit as White House press secretary, saying "mercy, like justice, must... be even-handed" and "I couldn't in good conscience support the President's decision... even though I knew he took that action in good conscience."

—Many Democrats and some Republicans in Congress voiced dismay at the pardon, con-

—to delay the trial now set to begin Sept. 30.

—Ford aides made public an agreement they had reached with Nixon to preserve his White House files for at least three years for possible court use. But the agreement allows the former president to destroy any White House tape recordings after September 1979.

Although Ford's announcement caught the capital and the country by surprise, sources said it had been preceded by 10 days of legal deliberations and negotiations with Nixon and special Watergate prosecutor Leon Jaworski.

It also represented a reversal of Ford's previous public statements. During his vice presidential confirmation hearings, Ford said, "I do not think the public would stand for" such a pardon. And at a news conference Aug. 28 he said it would be "unwise and untimely" for him to

commit himself until "any legal process has been undertaken" against Nixon.

White House counsel Philip Buchen said Nixon faced likely indictment prior to the pardon. He said it was granted without strings attached, but acknowledged Ford knew in advance the gist of Nixon's follow-up statement.

Three hours after he knelt in prayer at early morning communion services, Ford summoned a television crew and a few newsmen into his Oval Office to announce the pardon prohibiting any federal criminal prosecution of Nixon "for all offenses against the United States" during his 2,027 days in office.

"I feel that Richard Nixon and his loved ones have suffered enough," Ford said, speaking slowly and granting often at a 950-word statement.

Congress Fumes Over Pardon

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Ford's congressional and political honeymoon appears to have ended with his pardon of Richard M. Nixon, a decision that revived the Watergate issue and complicated the campaign for Republican candidates this fall.

Ford said he acted to write "the end" to Watergate, but the immediate reaction was a re-kindled debate over the scandal and the propriety of an advance and absolute pardon for his resigned predecessor.

The prompt resignation of Press Secretary Jerald F. terHorst, who as Ford's first appointee was a symbol of his pledge of an open administration at the White House, underscored the controversy. TerHorst said he could not in good conscience accept the decision on Nixon, particularly while former officials of lesser rank face prison or trial.

That judgment from a member of the Ford inner circle seemed certain to heighten criticism of the pardon the President granted Sunday.

There was praise from many Republicans, including GOP congressional leaders. But there also was substantial Republican criticism, along with general Democratic protest against the Ford move.

However, sharp the immediate criticism, in the long run Ford may have acted at a relatively opportune time in taking a step he seemed likely to take eventually.

Ford's unprecedented move came two months before congressional elections in which it is sure to be an issue and may prove an added burden for Republican candidates already facing questionable prospects.

But it also came two years before the 1976 presidential campaign in which Ford, the first president to hold office without election, is expected to be a candidate. Had the Nixon case dragged on, it could have proved even more troublesome later.

Much of the initial criticism of Ford came from Democrats and liberal Republicans who ultimately could have found themselves at odds with the President wherever the honeymoon phase ended.

The pardon hastened that process. It may have an impact on other areas, too.

Ford's announced intention of attaching conditions, such as resignation or draft resisters and deserters may run into the criticism that Nixon was pardoned without conditions.

In Congress, Democrats already had started to criticize Ford for inaction in dealing with economic problems. They almost certainly will step that up against the President, who now seems more vulnerable to criticism.

Residents Divide On Ford Pardon

To pardon, or not to pardon, is obviously a question President Ford had been pondering quite a while. The decision has been made, but most Seminole County residents are still pondering whether or not they agree with Mr. Ford's decision to grant Richard Nixon absolute pardon.

Maple Ave., Sanford, felt the same way: "The men in it (Watergate) with Nixon were prosecuted; why shouldn't he be?" she asked. "He's no different from any other public servant."

"They're making a bad name for the country," said E. First St., Sanford. "The American change would be out whether or not Nixon was guilty, and of what crimes, before the pardon was granted."

David Cohen, 432 Scott Ave., Sanford, had reservations about his approval of the pardon. "It's the right thing but the wrong time," said Cohen. "He (Mr. Ford) should have waited until after the elections."

Ruby Harris, 2511 Princeton Ave., Sanford, was glad Nixon has been pardoned. "I don't condone any of the things he's done, you understand, but think we had enough," she explained.

Marsha Foster, of Maple Avenue, Sanford, was also relieved the pardon is putting an end to the whole Watergate-Nixon affair. "He's suffered a lot and I'm glad for the country everything's being straightened out," she said.

Ceci Stampleton of Iydwilse said although she had not heard much about the pardon yet, she was glad it had been given. "I like Nixon and I think he's suffered enough," she said.

"Fine. Great. Good news," responded Brian Towers, Sanford, resident William Fitz. "Nixon's been ragged long enough. I'd like to see some of those men on the Watergate committee strung up though."



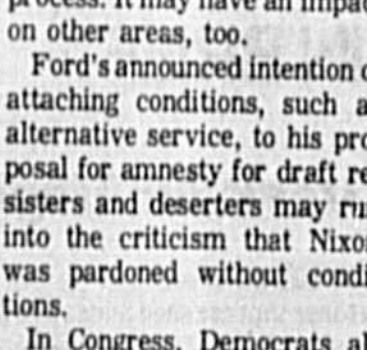
Martha: Pardon 'Em All
