**Marking 'Em Up**

Governor Caldwell knocked the top off a pot of boiling stew the other day when he complained that Florida had lost prestige because of the failure of the University's Gators to show either the ability to win or to fight.

Before we make any bright comment from this corner, we did a little investigating. Here's what we found out.

Hugh Wheelock, who was a football star back in the old days when broken legs and hashed skulls were as frequent as California roadcuts, says that Florida will have to produce a team that will be at least 25 percent better than any rival simply because of the climatical conditions under which the Gators team and play. And that isn't all!

Hugh says Florida has got to have at least three teams, one as good as the other, to alternate on the field.

Hugh believes the Gators have it tougher than other schools because they train all week long under a boiling afternoon sun and they usually play under a hot Saturday sun or on a hot night.

Hugh is probably right too when he says they lose a lot of energy during the practice sessions and by the time Saturday rolls around

they're worn out. We went over to see Brack Perkins, Jr., Brack seems to think that the Gators' success on the right road to football success. Brack says that the State Board of Control has got to allot more money for the school's program. He says Florida has got to have better players and if it is a matter of subsidizing, Brack's all for it.

Billy Thigpen came up with the point that he'd seen Florida play only once this season but they showed up pretty well. He thinks that by 1947 the present eleven which is well spotted with fresh and sophomores will come close to giving the Gator followers a winning squad.

Now here's our own opinion. We haven't seen Florida since they slipped away a 5 to 0 decision to Villanova back in '41. We've followed the Gators pretty closely since 1936 and we still believe the trouble is they don't have the right type of coaching.

Now we realize that's a rash statement and a lot of Florida students will be willing to fight over it but we wonder just how many of these boys who have their sleeves already rolled up have ever seen Jack McDowell's Rollins Tars play football. Well boys if you haven't, you've missed something!

We don't say Rollins can put out a powerhouse every year but folks the Tars played the brand

of football that just caught the eye. And did those Orlando folks go for it? You bet they do. Now who gets the credit for Rollins? Take anybody you like but Jack McDowell's the man in our book. That's why we believe coaching at Florida is the biggest trouble with the Gators.

We agree with Hugh that the climatical conditions under which Florida teams are tough and we further agree with Brack Perkins that the State Board of Control should appropriate more dough for the Gators. Then we believe we'll see Billy Thigpen's prediction that the 1947 Gators will be a winner amount to something.

One more thing we'd like to mention is if you've never seen a Rollins team play, just take a gander at this year's Clery Feds and you'll see what one of Jack McDowell's students, Goose Ketter, can do with the double-wing system of play. It is the toughest system for high school players to use. Save the Feds, the only high school team in Florida that has ever used it successfully has been Miami High's Stingrays.

Take it or leave it, we say give the Gators a head coach like Jack McDowell and within two or three seasons you'll see Florida playing Southern Cal. in the greatest Rose Bowl fight you ever saw.

## OPA Denies Increase In Steel Prices

### General Motors Factories Picketed By Strikers As Hope Of Peace Vanishes

WASHINGTON, Nov. 23, (AP)—The OPA has made an announcement that will have an important bearing on the labor situation in the steel industry. Administrator Chester Bowles says that his agency sees no reason for a general increase in steel prices at this time. But OPA will review the whole matter carefully after the steel companies submit their next financial returns early next year. CIO steelworkers are demanding a wage increase of 25.5 percent. Steel demand would not be considered until OPA allowed substantial increases in the price of steel products.

WASHINGTON, D.C., Nov. 23, (AP)—The Labor Management Conference remains in recess today, and will not reconvene until Monday. But management delegates have told newsmen they have not given up hope of reaching a solution of the problem of jurisdictional disputes. Members of the committee assigned to the jurisdictional dispute problem went home a week ago without having made any progress, and although they were to meet on Monday, there is little optimism among the conference delegates that they will get anywhere.

In Detroit, meanwhile, and at General Motors plants in other cities and towns across the country, picket lines have been reinforced today after a thin holiday turnout yesterday. Snow and cold weather in the Detroit area is not expected to be too severe until the end of the month.

This is the day that they company promised to deliver its reply to the union's demand for arbitration of the wage demand, and the corporation's answer is awaited eagerly. However, many observers feel pretty sure that the arbitration demand will be rejected. For one thing, it calls upon the company to open its books for inspection, something that General Motors thus far has refused to do. And for another thing, it would bind the company not to raise wages increases as a result of the arbitration.

A special assistant to labor Secretary Schwellenbach, John W. Gibson, is heading back to Washington today after conferences with union officials in Detroit yesterday. Gibson has expressed the belief that the strike will not last beyond mid-January.

In Chicago, a continued deadlock in the strike of Illinois and Northern Indiana Long Distance Telephone Operators has led to a union hint of a nation-wide telephone strike. And in Maine, cancellation efforts are continuing in an attempt to end the four-week-long strike affecting nine cotton mills.

## ROME STRIKE

ROME, Nov. 23, (AP)—Thousands of workers staged a general strike in Rome today in protest against high costs of living. The chamber of labor said that all union members stopped work at 10 A. M. Rome today. There are about 150,000 union members. In addition, said the chamber of labor, a majority of one quarter of a million unorganized workers joined in the strike.

The hymn "The Blessings of Thanksgiving" was sung by the choir of the First Baptist Church.

## As Richardson Brought FDR's Name Into Inquiry



HERE'S THE DRAMATIC HIGH SPOT in the Pearl Harbor probe in Washington as Admiral J.O. It was the first time that the name Roosevelt was brought directly into the inquiry. Immediately after Richardson stated the events leading up to his being relieved of his command at Pearl Harbor and his replacement by Admiral Husband Kimmel, the session was adjourned.

Both celery and fruit growers welcomed the cold snap as it meant better quality of products. Warm weather of the past week, which on Wednesday reached a maximum of 85 degrees, had the effect of causing celery to make height rather than size of stalk, according to growers. This is a condition that the cool weather is expected to correct. In addition, the cool weather should reduce insect pests that thrive under the warmer conditions.

### British Lift Siege Of Java City Of Ambarawa

BATAVIA, Java, Nov. 22 (AP)—British Indian troops today lifted the siege of the Java city of Ambarawa where 10,000 Dutch civilians earlier were said to be under attack by Indonesian extremists. The British sent Japanese troops into action against the Indonesians.

A British spokesman says the Japanese were being used to drive the Indonesians from suburban areas on the eastern side of Semarang. The spokesman described the Japanese as "good troops who fight well."

A British communiqué on the lifting of the siege at Ambarawa said 150 Indonesians were killed in the battle. The British Indian troops suffered ten casualties. Earlier clashes were reported from Bandoeng and the British and Indonesians were engaged in a fairly widespread campaign of robbery, looting and kidnaping throughout Java. And on the island of Sumatra south of Palembang, Indonesian youths still were said to be molesting the local population.

However, the British said Indonesian resistance at Soekabang was the heaviest fighting continued to increase.

In Batavia itself, negotiations between the Dutch and leaders of the recognized Indonesian national government have collapsed. The Indonesians refused to attend a scheduled meeting with the Dutch under British sponsorship.

In addition to the trouble the British have in Java, difficulties exist in India. The student riots have spread from Calcutta to Bombay and Delhi. The students are against the rule of the pro-Japanese officers of the Indian national army. American trucks have been mobbed with the result that M. P.'s armed with submachine guns are conveying them through the streets.

### Hollywood Canteen Closes Its Doors

HOLLYWOOD, Nov. 23 (AP)—The Hollywood Canteen has closed its doors at last. Shortly after midnight, Kay Kyser and Betty Davis led the Canteen's volunteer workers, the entertainers and the audience of G.I.'s in singing "Auld Lang Syne." And one of the most star-studded long-run shows in the world was over.

Five thousand soldiers, sailors, Marines streamed in and out of the Hollywood Canteen yesterday from 2:00 in the afternoon until closing. 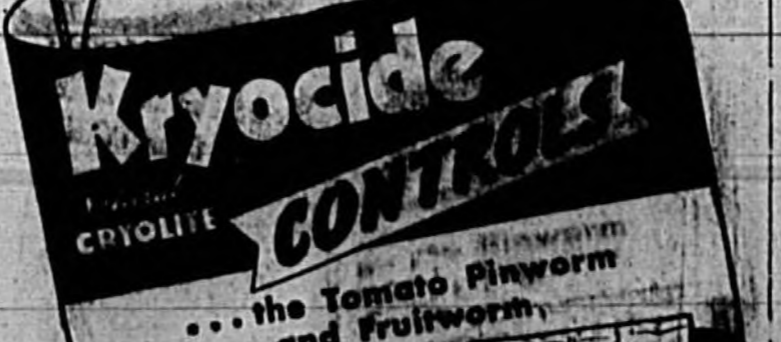

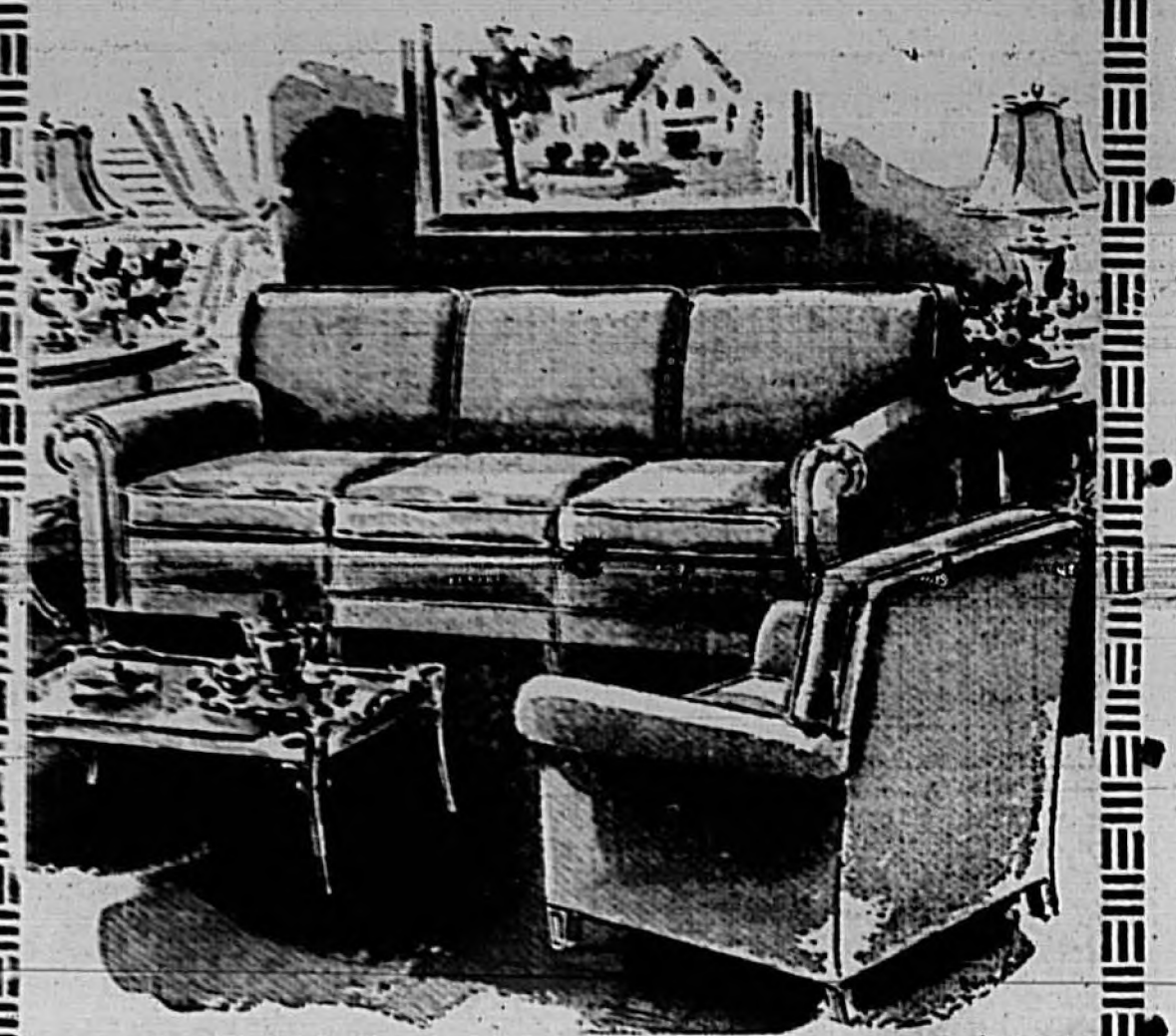

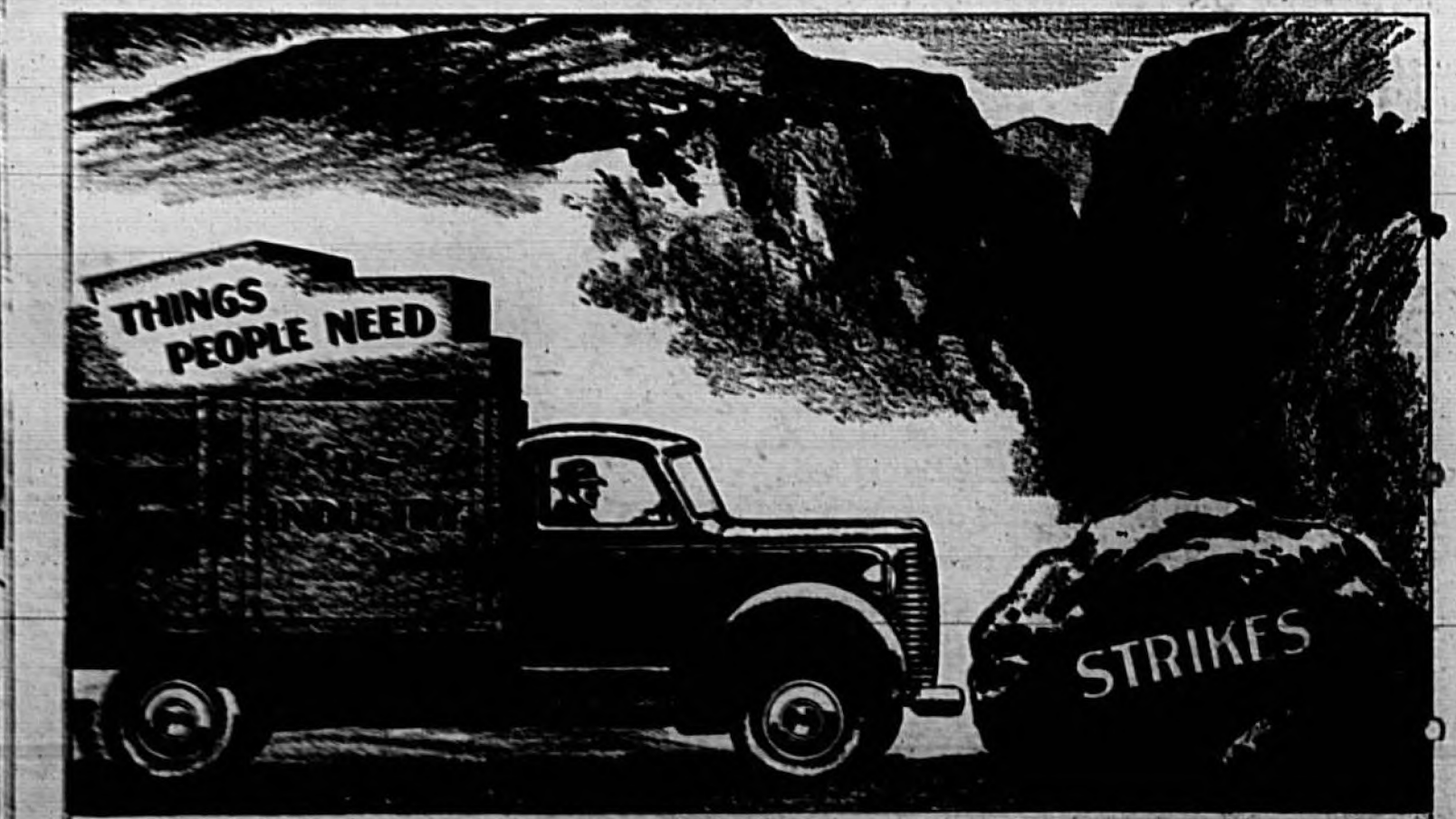
