## Testimony Sanford City Engineer Tells About Curbs In Lawsuit

City Engineer Mack LaZenby was back on the stand this morning as the fourth day in the trial on the downtown Sanford improvement lawsuit began.

Drawing sketches to illustrate his testimony, LaZenby said new curbs to be constructed in the First Street area from Park Avenue to Magnolia Avenue will be of poured concrete and are designed to be safer than the old granite ones in place now.

Since the granite curbs are of cut rock, they are irregular in shape and sharp at points. The new curbs, however, will be created with standardized forms, LaZenby said.

Under intensive cross-examination from lawyer G. Algernon Speer concerning the proposed plans for sidewalk, planter and curb improvements, LaZenby refused to deviate from his testimony.

He said the travel-way (the area where cars will be able to drive) on First Street after the improvements will be wider than it is today.

LaZenby also said the plans and planning details for the improvements as presented in court are identical to those adopted by the City Commission in May 1980.

As Speer cross-examined LaZenby, City Attorney Bill Colbert objected

strenuously that Speer would not permit the professional engineer to fully answer questions.

Circuit Judge Roger Dykes, conducting the non-jury trial, agreed with Colbert's objections.

In testimony Wednesday, Thomas Speer insisted that the proposed downtown improvements would cut property values by 40 percent.

Attempting to show his expertise on real-estate values, Speer, law partner and son of G. Algernon Speer, said he devotes 60 percent of his law practice to real-estate matters. He also said he has been involved in many condemnation proceedings.

Speer's testimony was allowed by Dykes for the record for the purpose of appealing the case if necessary, but will not be considered in a decision on the lawsuit by the judge.

Dykes said the major issue in the lawsuit is whether the city has the power to do the downtown improvements on publicly owned property.

Kenneth McIntosh, Colbert's associate, under cross-examination, elicited testimony from Speer showing that he had not considered property values in other communities in Florida which have had downtown revitalization programs.

And the city began its side of the case

with testimony from LaZenby. He said the improvement plan, prepared by the city staff, calls for cutting the number of parking spaces along First Street and Magnolia Avenue from 73 to 59. But he added that a new parking lot at Magnolia and Second Street will add 36 spots to give more parking places than the downtown area now has.

LaZenby also attempted to demonstrate graphically that brick curb additions will not hinder or obstruct the flow of drainage water or traffic on the First Street thoroughfare.

The proposed improvements for which the city has budgeted \$214,000 for the last three years call for rebuilding sidewalks, constructing planters, brick paving and the closing of a portion of Magnolia Avenue to vehicular traffic to create a pedestrian mall.

G. Algernon Speer, representing himself and nine other property owners in the lawsuit, contends the city has not shown a public purpose for spending the money. He also says that closing a portion of Magnolia Avenue will be detrimental to the area and that other work will adversely affect drainage and impair deliveries to businesses.

The trial is scheduled to end Friday. Hearings began Monday in the suit filed by Speer early in 1980.

## Seminole Greyhound Track: Costly White Elephant?

Unless Seminole Greyhound Park can get a favorable ruling from the state Supreme Court, the Casselberry dog track may turn out to be the most expensive white elephant Seminole County has ever seen.

On Wednesday, the 11th Circuit Court of Appeal in Daytona Beach upheld a ruling last June 16 by Chief Seminole Circuit Court Judge Kenneth Leffler that the conversion of the track from harness to dog racing in 1980 was unconstitutional on the grounds it violated state statutes governing proximity of pari-mutuel plants and usurped the duties and privileges of both the Division of Pari-Mutuels and the Commission on Pari-Mutuel Wagering.

Leffler said in his June decision that the state should not have granted Seminole Greyhound Park racing dates because Statute 550.06, Paragraph 2, indicated no permit shall be issued by the Division of Pari-Mutuels nor voted upon in any county to conduct the running of horse races, harness races or dog races at a location within 100 miles of an existing location for which a permit has already been issued and a racing plant located.

The Daytona Beach Kennel Club is some 50 miles from

Seminole Greyhound Park, while the Sanford-Orlando Kennel Club is less than five miles from the Seminole greyhound track.

The bill that allowed conversion of the track was sponsored by State Rep. Robert Hastaway, D-Altamonte Springs, and was pushed through the House on the final day of the 1980 session. Since that time the conversion has been challenged by several other dog tracks in the state, and the track has been embroiled in troubles during its first racing season.

Seminole Greyhound Park is currently the subject of a seven-month-long investigation by state pari-mutuel division officials for possible administrative violations. That probe is expected to be completed within a week. The results of the investigation will then be reviewed by the Department of Business Regulation. A decision on whether to file administrative complaints against the track will be made at that time.

The track's principal owners — Bill Demetree, his brother Jack, and Paul Dervase — invested more than \$4 million in converting and improving the track, which is scheduled to open for its second season of racing May 3.

David Strawn, lawyer for Seminole Greyhound Park, said

today he will go before Judge Leffler next Monday for a hearing in attempts to get a temporary stay of the appellate court's ruling. Strawn said that if he is unable to get a stay during that hearing, the track will appeal directly to the state Supreme Court.

"The Supreme Court is the final arbitrator on any state statute," he said.

"We have 30 days in which to file an appeal. Within 30 days after the appeal is filed, I have 30 days to file a brief on the court's ruling. Their attorneys (for the Sanford-Orlando Kennel Club and the Daytona Beach Kennel Club) then have 10 days to file a brief in response to the appeal."

"We're looking at a timetable of not more than 75 days as far as getting a ruling from the Supreme Court," said Strawn.

In an ongoing legal battle since the track was first converted from harness to dog racing, Leffler ruled June 16 that the conversion was unconstitutional. The state attorney general's office, however, immediately stepped in to appeal that decision to protect the state's interest in the case.

Stiding with Seminole Greyhound Park in the suit, the attorney general's office determined the closing of the track could cost the state about \$2 million in lost revenues through taxes.

In effect, the attorney general's move suspended Leffler's ruling and allowed racing to continue during the track's maiden season in 1981.

Leffler then ordered the track's owners to post a surety bond to continue operating while the lawsuit made its way through the 5th District Court of Appeal.

Jack and Bill Demetree posted a \$471,000 surety bond, but did not have to put up any cash or pledge any tangible collateral for the bond, merely promising to foot the bill for any financial losses the Daytona Beach Kennel Club might suffer while the case was being appealed. In 1981 Seminole Greyhound Park and the Daytona track ran identical race dates — May through September.

The Daytona Beach track contended that the identical race dates cost the Volusia County pari-mutuel between \$7 and \$8 million on its 1980 handle.

Jerry Collins, chief officer of the Sanford-Orlando Kennel Club, said Wednesday he wasn't concerned about Seminole's appeal to the state Supreme Court.

"We weren't fighting anything but what the law states," said Collins. "There were no personalities involved in the suit."

"The law is on our side. The appeal court deals in the law, and so does the Supreme Court," he added.

## That Last-Minute Tax Rush

Procrastinating taxpayers Wednesday rushed to the Seminole County tax collector's offices at the courthouse in Sanford, Seminole Plaza in Casselberry and the Interstate Mall in Altamonte Springs in an effort to meet the March 31 deadline for property taxes.

Lines were long as an estimated 850 taxpayers tried to avoid the 3 percent penalty for April payment. If payment is made during the first week of April, before the delinquent tax list is taken to the newspaper for publication, taxpayers

can avoid an additional fee for the cost of advertising, said Assistant Tax Collector Sally Lipsey.

Approximately \$23,802 was collected over the counter at the three offices Thursday, said Ms. Lipsey, and this does not include mail receipts. "We still have boxes of mail to open," she added.

Taxes paid at the courthouse office were approximately \$600,000, while at the Casselberry office \$40,890 was received and at the Interstate Mall \$188,923 was taken in, she said.

Ms. Lipsey said she expects the last-minute mail to be heavy. Tax payments

will fall under the wire if they are postmarked before midnight March 31.

Those paying in March paid the new amount of property taxes owed, while those who paid in the preceding months received a discount. The discount for November was 4 percent; December, 3 percent; January, 2 percent; and February, 1 percent.

The tax list will be published April 22 and 29 and May 6 and 13 in the Evening Herald. Tax certificates on property on which taxes are not paid will be sold May 26.

## Casselberry Man Is Found Slain

The identity of a man shot to death at a Casselberry shopping center Wednesday has been determined as that of 40-year-old Albert Martin Grasso of Casselberry.

Seminole County sheriff's deputies, responding to a shooting at Willa Cleaners, Willa Springs Plaza, Red Bug and Tuscawilla roads, at about 9:07 p.m., said they discovered Grasso's body lying in the shopping center's parking lot with a bullet wound in the chest.

A 22-year-old Casselberry woman, an employee at the cleaners, told deputies she was Grasso's roommate at 507 Eldorado Way and that he had assaulted her, according to sheriff's spokesman John Spolaki.

Reports indicate that three shots were fired from a small handgun by a woman at Grasso and that one bullet entered his chest, Spolaki added.

"The woman we questioned about the shooting was not arrested and no one else has been arrested in connection with the shooting," he said. "We did question a woman concerning the incident, but later released her to her family's custody. She was not arrested."

Spolaki added that the Seminole County grand jury, which is meeting today in Sanford, is expected to review the case. Grasso was pronounced dead on arrival at Winter Park Memorial Hospital, Spolaki added.

County Medical Examiner Dr. G.V. Garay said he will perform an autopsy on Grasso today to determine the cause of death.



### Dinosaur Footprints?

DALLAS (UPI) — College geology student Julie Tyler had a hard time persuading museum officials she had stumbled across a "one in a million" set of dinosaur footprints.

The fact that dinosaurs inhabited Texas 65 to 135 million years ago already has been proved by the discovery of their remains, but finding actual footprints is most unusual — and unique in the Dallas area.

The Brookhaven College geology major and her husband, both dinosaur buffs, sighted the six footprints, 15 by 15 inches, in a sandstone rock when they went to Lake Grapevine near Dallas-Fort Worth Airport to look for fossils a few weeks ago.

## 4 Avalanches Snuff Out 3 Lives On California Peak

SQUAW VALLEY, Calif. (UPI) — Four avalanches roared down a Sierra peak, shoving a two-story building into a ski lodge and killing at least three people. Blizzard conditions and fear of more snow slides prevented rescue teams from searching for as many as a dozen missing people.

Rescuers rushed to the area on "snowcats" but had to wait until dawn to resume the search for the missing because of blizzard conditions and the threat of more avalanches.

The first of the avalanches to hit the Alpine Meadows ski resort — located 2 miles east of Squaw Valley — carried a two-story "A-frame" building into the resort's lodge, killing at least three people.

Officials said there were as many as four avalanches in the Alpine Meadows area Wednesday and another in Squaw

Valley, where 3 to 4 feet of snow has been falling daily since Sunday.

Nearby residents were ordered to evacuate their homes and were taken to the Sierra Mountain Intermediate School in nearby Truckee. Sheriff's deputies, ambulances, fire trucks and California Highway Patrol units were dispatched to the resort, but some were hampered by smaller avalanches.

The avalanche in Squaw Valley, site of the 1980 Winter Olympics, buried two houses. Five people were rescued uninjured.

Placer County Sheriff's Chief Jim Webber said three bodies were uncovered near the Alpine Meadows resort.

"Possibly more are missing," he said, "but not a large number."

There were unconfirmed reports that as many as a dozen others might be missing, including two cross-country skiers. Authorities said two people were injured in the avalanches at the resort but the extent of injuries was not known.

Webber said one avalanche pushed a two-story equipment storage building into the main lodge of the Alpine Meadows resort, smashing windows and a portion of the wall.

Rescue workers and dogs searched the snow at the 7,000-foot-high resort for survivors but the mission was called off after several hours as the blizzard became worse and the avalanche danger increased.

"We are moving out our personnel because of the danger of other avalanches," said Sgt. Kevin Bonana of the Placer County Sheriff's Department.

A supervisor at Tahoe Forest Hospital in Truckee said the facility had been alerted to receive as many as 20 victims.

Authorities also learned Wednesday night there had been skiers on the slopes and lifts when the avalanches struck. Earlier, it was reported skiing had been canceled for the day at the popular resort because of the bad weather, but maintenance workers and other employees were on the job.

"We were told the lodge was closed due to poor road conditions," Webber said. "Now we are told people were still on the lift. We don't know what we have now on the number of people who were in the area."

A second slide buried cars in the parking lot of the resort. An avalanche expert advised evacuation of more than 100 residents in the area, Webber said.

# Stars Fighting Cancer

It isn't just kids who benefit from the tales of heroes. It is impossible to guess how many adult victims of cancer were motivated to battle the disease because of the public candor of celebrities who fought the same fight.

The late John Wayne — heavy-smoking, hard-living, beloved — was able to buy himself only a few extra years after yielding one cancer-ridden lung to surgery. He left a gallant example of gratitude for those extra years.

But the other names on today's list fared better. They are long-term winners: for example, Arthur Godfrey, whose lung cancer was discovered in time. His red hair has turned to grey now, but not because of recurring illness. Just the natural

passage of two decades. Television's most popular chef, Julia Child, shrugged off the compliments she received following her public discussion of her breast cancer surgery. With her customary, no-nonsense vitality, she said we should give credit for such open discussion to Shirley Temple Black, who was the first to "come out of the closet" about her breast surgery.

Certainly, as the arsenal of medical treatments increase, the examples of those who win give more hope to others. And more celebrities now speak out.

William Powell, the star of such golden age movies as "The Thin Man," was long retired from Hollywood when he revealed a few years ago that at the height of his career he underwent a

modified form of surgery for abdominal cancer.

The celebrity winners against cancer share another thing in common. They rally fast from the shock of the diagnosis and start thinking positively about it.

Last fall, I complimented Mary Martin on her peaches and cream complexion. She absolutely giggled before explaining that she did a good job of applying makeup over those areas that are scarred, "from skin cancer surgery. But getting it was my own fault. I just stayed in the sun too much when I lived in Brazil."

She mentioned it again on her PBS "Over Easy" series when Van Johnson was the guest. Hospitalized twice for cancer, Johnson beat it twice and at age 65, he says he never felt better.

# Urich Makes A Deal

HOLLYWOOD (UPI) — Robert Urich, the handsome star of the defunct "Vegas" series, wants to be a movie star and has found a means to reach his goal.

A veteran of five TV series — "Bob and Carol and Ted and Alice," "S.W.A.T.," "Tabitha," "Soap" and "Vegas," Urich concluded that he could spend the rest of his life unhappily on the TV treadmill.

It was the six-day week, 15-hour working days playing the tough detective in "Vegas" that convinced him the grind wasn't worth it.

"After four years of 'Vegas' I was an emotional and physical wreck," the husky Urich said. "I was never so close to falling into a deep, dark hole. Working on the desert during the day under a broiling sun and freezing at night took its toll."

"I was exhausted mentally, too. After the third year our creative team began to disintegrate. The scripts got worse and I was rewriting more and more. I screamed louder and louder but I had no control of the show. I couldn't get out contractually."

"I fought against the massacre episode which opened

with seven people getting killed in the first 30 seconds. It got our lowest rating. I used to fight for comedy and fun but I finally got worn down and worn out.

"When we finished the fourth season last March, I locked the doors of our Las Vegas home and drove to our place on a lake in Ontario (Canada). I was sick with the flu and 30 pounds overweight. I was in terrible shape."

"Then (producer) Aaron Spelling called to say the show was canceled. I immediately got over the flu and began to exercise again. I felt human again."

That same day NBC offered Urich \$75,000 an episode to star in "McLain's Law," an enormous sum even by TV standards. Urich turned it down.

"The only way to become a movie actor is to stay away from TV series for a while, but even that is no guarantee," Urich went on. "They offer you TV movies or roles in B movies."

"Bill Hayes, who manages my career, advised me to parlay my strength from the series for a deal which would combine movies and TV in the same package. I finally signed with MGM which does

both." Until he signed with Metro, Urich's feature film career consisted of a five-line role in Clint Eastwood's "Magnum Force."

Urich's deal calls for three feature films, a TV series with a two-hour pilot, a firm 13 weeks on the air and part ownership. MGM also agreed to pay Robert Urich Productions for developing books and stories into movie properties.

The icing on the cake was ennobling Urich in Louis B. Mayer's old office.

Many a studio has lured a TV star with promises of movies, providing they also star in a series. The gullible performer found himself turning down horrible film scripts and winding up in a mediocre series, leading finally to anonymity.

Urich, bright lad that he is, has already completed his first film for Metro, "Endangered Species," a \$12 million adventure-mystery. He hopes to complete a second feature before starting his new series, "Gavallin," playing an oceanographer with CIA connections.

Movies, Urich has concluded, are definitely for him.



# Soap Star Demands Proper Murder

HOLLYWOOD (NEA) — Fernando Valenzuela decided not to pitch until the Los Angeles Dodgers paid him a big salary. Pro football players have sat out entire seasons to get their salary demands. Suzanne Somers left "Three's Company" because of a salary dispute. But all those hold-outs pale by comparison to what Melinda O. Fee recently accomplished. She staged a polite little strike until "Days of Our Lives" agreed to kill her decently.

In store for Mary Anderson. "I was at a party," Melinda says, "and Pat Falken-Smith (the show's head writer) said to me, 'Sorry, you're going to be killed.'" Melinda didn't like that idea. It wasn't that she was worried about finding work — she has always worked and always will — but she didn't like the idea of her character leaving in such a violent way.

"The way a character leaves a show," she says, "is important. Sometimes, the writers send a character upstairs — and she never comes back down again. They just forget about them."

Melinda didn't want her character to be murdered. First, she said, there had been a lot of murders on the show already. Second, she had recently had several tragedies in her private life — her sister and mother had died and, as it later turned out, her father died just three days before her own scheduled on-screen murder.

Now that that has been resolved peacefully — Melinda's big death scene was aired on two days in late February — she is content. No hard feelings. She did it and she's glad.

And she perhaps established a principle: You can't kill an actress off without letting her have a say in how it's done.

Mrs. Hall says as the price of books goes up and money gets tighter, more readers are using the public library. "It's cheaper than buying their own books."

Youngsters using the library are fond of easily readable material with pictures, she says.

Older kids are reading magazines, more non-fiction and more for information than pleasure, Mrs. Hall says.

"Nationally, the slowest-selling category of books are children's books," Barnett says, noting the larger purchasers of these type books are public and private school

libraries and institutions.

The biggest single seller, other than the Bible, is cookbooks, he says. "Many people are cookbook collectors. Some have enormous collections and they tend to want to buy the hardcovers. They don't resist the price put on the hardcovers in this instance," Barnett says.

Another big seller is the dictionary. "They are always in demand. Even though the softcover dictionaries are not nearly so complete as good hardcover ones, paperbacks are in demand. Price increases for softcover dictionaries have not been as great as with other paperbacks," Barnett says.

## You Read Any Good Books Lately?

Faced with soaring book prices and a sour economy, Sanford readers have found new ways to feed their habit. Paperbacks are replacing hardcovers as their choice of reading matter and the library has become their major source.

Some have insisted that Americans are reading less. Actually, they are reading as much today but concentrating more on hard information rather than leisure time books. And readers are getting younger.

"A lot of three and four year olds are visiting the library to read," according to Barbara Hall, head librarian for the Sanford branch of the Seminole County library.

"As long as they are able to write their names and their parents will sign for them, they can get library cards," she says.

Some 3,000 volumes are checked out of the public library each week by Sanford and Lake Mary readers.

The library currently is operating from the ground floor at Sanford City Hall while its facilities at First Street are renovated.

Reading habits have changed somewhat over the past few years, Mrs. Hall says. North Seminole County readers are now concentrating more on self-help books — material on how to do almost everything from fix the family car to getting in shape. And paperbacks are more popular than ever before, she says.

Sanford book store owner Richard Barnett agrees. Books on personal relations — knowing oneself and how to get along with others — were popular a few years ago, he says.

But today, self-help volumes on the economy, money and real estate, are the rage. "It's a reaction to the national scene to the economic facts of life," Barnett says.

"People are reading to find how to get from out under. They thumbed their noses at the oil embargo a few years ago. Now, five years later when it's having an impact through higher food and power costs, and salaries are not jumping up to keep pace, more people are trying to understand and find what they as individuals can do," he says.

"Their reading has gone out of theory and into practical literature."

Do readers go into a book store with a specific title or author in mind?

"It's a mixed bag," Barnett says.

Certain authors are popular. "Books by Danielle Steel and Janet Dailey (authors of light romances ranging from contemporary to historical) are popular. It makes no difference what they write," Barnett says.

The two best-selling male authors are Robert Ludlum and Ken Follett. Both write espionage-mysteries.

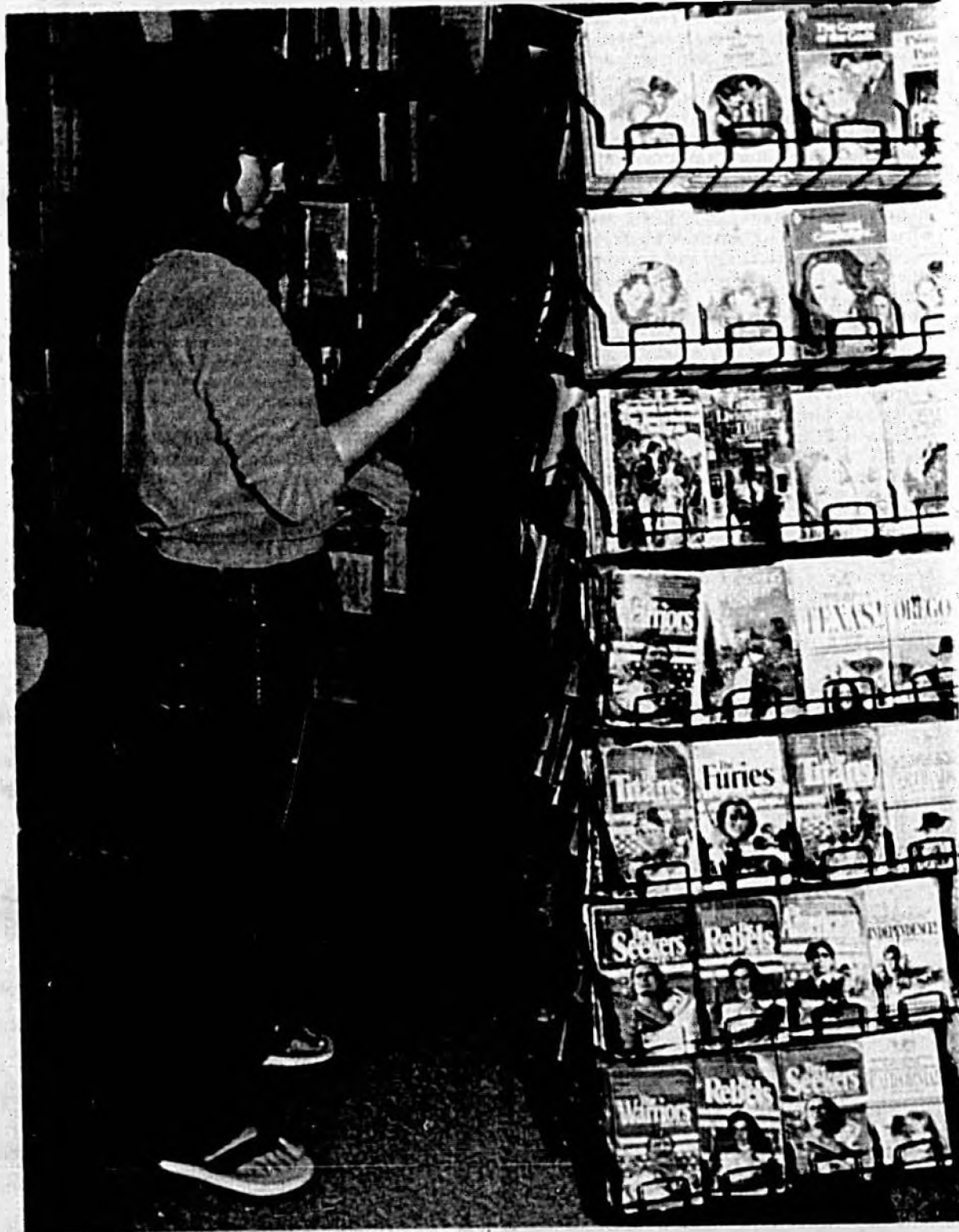
Barnett said while the sale of 25,000 hard covers is considered a good seller, Ludlum's books sell about 250,000 in hardcover and another 3 million in paperback. Follett's hardcovers sell about 100,000 copies each.

A hardcover best seller only a few years ago sold from \$8 to \$12 per copy. Today, a book by the same author sells for \$15-\$20.

And many Sanford readers are not inclined to spend that much money even for a favorite author. "They are waiting for the paperbacks to come out," Barnett says. "People today know paperbacks will be out eventually and they wait to economize."

And the savings are substantial, despite the fact that years ago, a best-selling paperback sold for \$1.75 to \$2.25 a

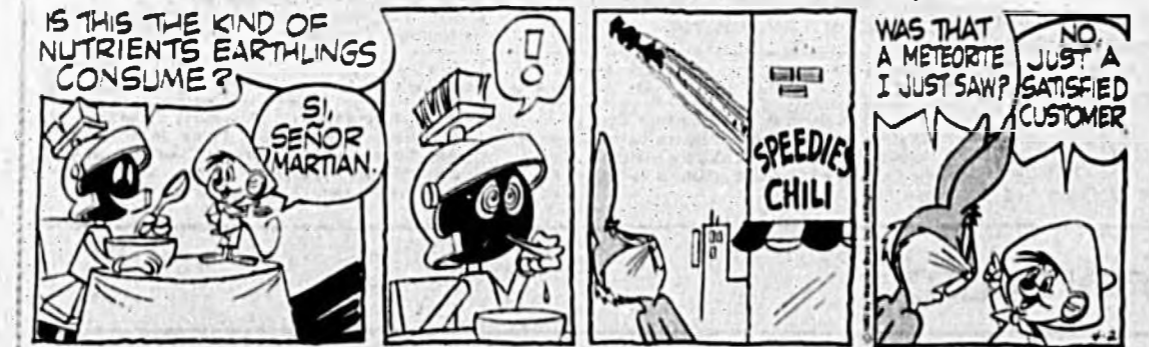

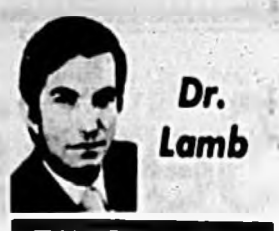

Exercise May Cause Swelling In Hands



DEAR DR. LAMB — My neighbor and I have been on a walking program since last fall. We have worked up to three-and-a-half miles in 60 minutes at least five days a week. Before this we were doing aerobic dancing two days a week for one hour each time.

During aerobic dancing class I noticed that my hands would swell and feel quite warm. They do the same thing during our walks. Hers do the same thing but to a lesser degree. I am 40 years old, very healthy, not sick with even a cold all winter. Are my hands anything to worry about? They do return to normal after a while. What causes this?

DEAR READER — When you are walking your hands may swing but they do hang down and you are not contracting your arm muscles. The blood tends to pool in the veins in your hands. Let your hand hang down by your side and watch the veins over the back of your hand pop out. That is because blood runs downhill in response to gravity. Now hold your hand in front of your face and watch the veins collapse as the blood runs downhill toward your heart.

The increased pressure in the vein in your hands during walking causes fluid to escape into the tissues and remain there causing swelling. The increased flow from increased heart work actually augments the change. Training helps because your body gradually develops reflex control to decrease blood flow to the parts of the body that are not working, such as your hands and arms when walking or exercising your legs. Your contracting leg muscles milk the blood out of your legs up toward your heart and actually prevent swelling. That is why walking or even jogging will prevent

swelling of your legs while standing still will cause swelling. The swelling you have noticed in your hands during leg exercise is entirely normal and will not harm you. Walking is very good for most people's health. And it certainly helps control body weight. I am sending you The Health Letter number 18-4, Walking to Health.

DEAR DR. LAMB — I was involved with sports for many years, including boxing. I developed a pain somewhere within the left shoulder near the joint and an "on and off" pain and discomfort below the neck in the spine. An X-ray showed I had a compressed disc.

Lately the big toe in my right foot has persistently been going numb; while I'm standing it throbs. There is a feeling of pins and needles when I rub it against the bed sheets for relief from numbness. I was told there is a connection between the compressed disc and a numb big toe. Is this true? Would calcium supplements help? DEAR READER — A numb big toe can be from many causes, including poor circulation or pressure on nerve tracts that supply the area. You'll need an examination by your doctor. You could have a disc in your lumbar spine that is causing the problem or any other form of degeneration or spur formation that causes nerve root pressure resulting in numbness. No, calcium supplements will not help if it is a ruptured disc, pressure or poor circulation.

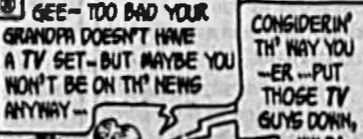

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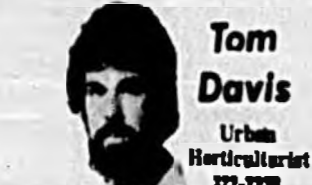

# Florida 'Lubber' Grasshoppers Common In County

Each month there are always a few questions that I am asked quite frequently by local residents. Here are some of the more common questions recently asked. I hope the answers will help other county residents who may be experiencing the same problems.

Q. Could you please tell me what kind of grasshoppers I have all over my yard? They are small and black with an orange-yellowish stripe down their backs.

A. Yes. They are young Florida "Lubber" grasshoppers. When they reach maturity they are quite large and they change to a much lighter color. The

young black ones hatch out in the spring, in large numbers which is why you are seeing so many. Don't feel alone because they are all over the county, and I am receiving many calls about them. Control involves spraying with an insecticide such as Malathion or Dursban. Follow

label directions.

Q. Could you please tell me what the fine webbing is that is covering the trunk and limbs of my oak trees and if it is harmful?

A. The webbing you are seeing is spun by psocids or bark lice. With a closer examination, you will find large numbers of tiny insects clustering together underneath the web. Although psocids are often seen on plants, they are not considered pests since they feed on fungi and lichens found on trees. Insecticide sprays, therefore, would not be necessary.

Q. Is there anything that I can do to rid my property of chiggers, or prevent them from biting?

A. Yes. Chiggers or "red bugs" are actually the larvae of mites and certainly can spoil many hours of relaxation. If you are going into an area suspected of being infested with chiggers, wear protective clothing and use repellents. Effective repellents are: Diethyl Toluamide (DEET), Dimethyl Phthalate, and Ethyl Hexanediol. These repellents should be applied to legs, ankles, cuffs, waist and sleeves by clothing application or directly to the body as directed on the

label. Insecticides approved for chigger control are Dursban 2E and Diazinon. Apply as directed on label.

Q. Could you please tell me what causes the oranges on my navel tree to get covered with raised bumpy spots?

A. You have a common disease of citrus trees called scab. This problem can be controlled with sprays of neutral copper fungicide. Repeat this treatment 10 days later. As always, follow label directions.

Q. Could you please tell me what kind of bugs I have in my yard, and some of

my trees? They are fairly small and are black with red underparts. They seem to cluster together.

A. Yes. The insects you described are called "cotton stainers." Like a lot of insects they hatch in large numbers in the spring and begin causing confusion among homeowners. Cotton stainers do not cause much harm, but they can be a real nuisance. Spray if needed with either Malathion or liquid sevin for control.

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## How The IRS Mistreats Savers

April is the cruelest month and April 15 is the cruelest day. Thanks to the Internal Revenue Service, we're all thinking of ways to reduce our income taxes this year and next year. And we're thinking about everything that's wrong with the income tax system.

This is the time of year to remember the Liberty Amendment, which we haven't heard much about lately. It would repeal the 16th amendment to the U.S. Constitution, which authorized the federal income tax in 1913.

Not even in times of great personal stress would we go that far. The income tax has been denounced as an invention of Karl Marx but as a concept it is just as sound a principle of taxation today as it was early in this century, when Col. Ira C. Copley of Illinois, founder of the Copley Press, won election to the Congress on a platform that called for adoption of the 16th amendment.

No, the trouble with the income tax is not the basic principle. It is the way in which that principle has been complicated and contorted by the application of thousands of special rules and exceptions. All of them have some rationale, but taken together they make the system incomprehensible to the average taxpayer and all but unworkable without the help of a special class of experts, the tax consultants, who have arisen and come to the rescue of the bewildered citizen.

The list of tax expenditures, exemptions and deductions is too long for comprehensive discussion here. But we want to say a word about the deduction for interest paid and the taxation of interest received.

Is it any wonder that Americans have the lowest rate of saving and the highest rate of personal debt in the industrialized world? The Tax Code rewards such behavior generously.

A taxpayer who borrows \$10,000 for a vacation trip to Europe can deduct the cost of his loan from his income tax. If he pays 15 percent interest a year, it costs him \$1,500 and, if he is in the 30 percent bracket, the federal government reduces his income tax liability by \$500. The U.S. Treasury has, in effect, subsidized his vacation.

Another taxpayer saves \$10,000 and buys a money market certificate. If he receives 15 percent interest a year, it pays \$1,500, and if he also is in the 30 percent bracket, the federal government takes \$500 of his interest money in income taxes.

Our thrifty ant thus has subsidized the grasshopper's grand tour. Is this fair? Is it just? Is it sound economic policy?

There is much more justification for the interest deduction when it comes as a result of borrowing to buy an education, a home, a car or clothes. But, in all cases, it tends to encourage borrowing while the tax on interest tends to discourage saving.

The interest deduction for individuals should be phased out over a long period of time, so as not to upset financial planning. It might take 30 years to phase it out entirely, but a policy should be adopted now to begin the process without delay.

At the same time, a corresponding exemption from taxation of interest on savings could begin. The amount of the exemption could be gradually increased. In this way, there would be an incentive for Americans to begin to save for their big-ticket items.

Our entire economy would be healthier for it.

### BERRY'S WORLD

Happy Birthday to my hometown, Winter Park, which is celebrating its Centennial this week. Born in an orange grove on Palmer Avenue and raised on the spacious grounds of the Alabama Hotel I was convinced at an early age that Winter Park was the beauty spot of the world and cultural center as well. Since then I've traveled from one end of this country to the other and to Rome, Athens and Jerusalem, but there's no place like my hometown.

Although we were poor and in the midst of a depression I enjoyed the same beautiful natural surroundings and cultural advantages as the rich and famous whose mansions were near by.

The lakes, canals, and Kraft Azales gardens were my playgrounds. In the summer in those days we pretty much had the neighborhood to ourselves as the hotel closed and in the big homes mothballs were spread and newspapers covered the windows until the late fall when owners returned.

Grass grew high in our brick street with tracks left only by the newspaperman, the ice man and other delivery men. My father helped build the hotel and worked there for 46 years.

Rollins College was a great cultural influence

to our little town bringing great art, music and drama into my young life. I saw and heard the world's great in the outdoor annual "Animated Magazine" initiated by Rollins President Hamilton Holt, who wielded a blue pencil on the contributors. Writers, newspaper editors, movie stars, musicians, statesmen, made their contribution.

But for the real Winter Parkers the center of small town life was Park Avenue and, then as now, Central Park, which looked much like it does today thanks to the foresight of its donor to the city. The park was a place for fun and festival. Gaily Japanese lanterns strung between light poles on Founder's Day; college students in pajamas doing a snake dance down the sidewalk for their bonfire and homecoming celebration; old men playing pinochle, or men sitting on park benches discussing politics and swapping tales while their wives shopped for the weekly groceries or picked up a little yard goods for a new dress, and the children romped, and all down the barrels of the brass cannons.

There was no "trick or treat." We dressed up in our costumes and went to the park. The park was also a place for rallies, bands playing, and parking your bike while you went to the Saturday

morning Western movie at the Baby Grand Theatre across the street.

Favorite stops on the main street included the Chocolate Shop where 10 cents went a long way, the popcorn stand, and the WCTU reading room where you could use the rest room and while away time looking at magazines.

Park Avenue had its cast of characters such as the blind man who played his accordion and "Doc" Gardner, whose little dog always carried the mail home in its mouth from the post office.

"Doc" lived upstairs over the drugstore next to his office. He didn't ask for cash in advance or if you had insurance, in fact many of his patients couldn't pay him at all. "Doc" not only made house calls, he came to the school to treat my in-grown toenail.

I would make several trips a week by bike to the public library to check out more Jungle Boy, Tarzan, and Nancy Drew books to devour. Across the street from the library was the Woman's Club, the scene of flower shows, art shows, Girl Scout silver teas, and high school dances and proms.

100 years! Winter Park you're beautiful and may you stay just as you are.

## Notes From Illinois

WASHINGTON (NEA) — Conservative political organizations are citing the results of the recent Illinois primary as proof that Ronald Reagan and his economic program are still popular with voters — and that members of Congress risk substantial peril by opposing the president.

The key race in this first primary of the election year — and the one on which the conservatives are basing their judgment — occurred in the newly redrawn 19th Congressional District in west-central Illinois.

Eight-term incumbent Tom Rallsback, one of the most prominent moderate Republicans in the House, was seeking renomination against the more conservative Kenneth McMillan, a popular state senator.

Rallsback has been less than steadfast in his support of the Reagan program. As a result, a number of conservative organizations, such as the National Conservative Political Action Committee, put money and organizational effort into McMillan's campaign. Thus, the challenger's 1,000-vote winning margin was hailed as a major conservative victory.

However, most observers do not agree with that reading of the returns.

Although McMillan did campaign as a conservative, Rallsback's defeat probably can be ascribed more to the composition of the redesigned district than to his support or lack of it for the Reagan administration.

The new district is more rural and agricultural than the district from which Rallsback previously was elected. McMillan was well-known to Illinois farmers thanks to his tenure as an aide to former Agriculture Secretary Earl Butz and an official of the Illinois Farm Bureau.

The election returns show that McMillan won the election by building up an insurmountable lead in the farm precincts.

As McMillan himself said of his victory, "I don't think it signals any kind of turn toward more conservative politics or that it was a referendum on the Reagan administration."

Meanwhile, the results of the Democratic primary in the 5th Congressional District on Chicago's southwest side may have some long-term political repercussions.

In that district, Rep. John Fary was badly beaten in his race for re-nomination by Chicago Alderman William Lipinski. Fary received his House seat in the mid-1970s from Mayor Richard Daley and has since retained the support of the Democratic machine that is now controlled by Mayor Jane Byrne.

Lipinski is a close ally of the late mayor's son Richie, a sworn enemy of Mrs. Byrne. To some observers, the Lipinski victory shows that the younger Daley is gaining the power to challenge Mrs. Byrne for control of the political organization that for so long was dominated by his father.

## Olympics Coin Deal Under Scrutiny

WASHINGTON — The Olympic Games, like other great sports spectacles, is big business. Already, there have been some multimillion-dollar manipulations over the sale of commemorative coins for the 1984 Los Angeles Summer Olympics.

The story is told in a staff report intended for the confidential guidance of a House Banking subcommittee. Here are the fascinating details:

In the bidding for the coin marketing contract, a partnership of Occidental Petroleum and the Lazard Freres International banking firm won out over the Franklin Mint of Philadelphia. Yet last fall, the losing bidder mysteriously joined the two winners in the so-called "Coin Group."

What makes this the subcommittee's business is that the Coin Group's contract requires congressional approval. The 25 different Olympic coins are to be minted by the government, with part of the proceeds paying for U.S. athletes' training costs. The Coin Group will handle the actual sales,

## Defense Buildup Essential

Both conservatives and liberals are fighting mad about President Reagan's proposed budget. The Left is up in arms over reductions in welfare spending, the Right about the record deficit Mr. Reagan is asking the nation to face. Already lost in the smoke and fire is the administration's justification for more military spending. That is, Soviet military spending.

While comparisons can be misleading, we can learn from examining how the Reagan defense program will translate into men, planes, and ships — and then placing it next to corresponding Soviet numbers. For example, the Pentagon expects the total number of U.S. active duty military personnel to rise to 2,189,000 by 1983. According to the Defense Department's report on Soviet military power, released last summer, the Soviet Armed Forces number 4.8 million. That figure includes border guards and other miscellaneous units not part of the regular armed forces. Still, as the expression goes, it concentrates the mind.

The Reagan plan aims at a 600-ship navy, and envisions a 640-ship fleet by 1990. The budget calls for the construction of 131 new vessels through fiscal 1987, and the reactivation or retrofitting of 18 more. It contains funds for two Trident nuclear-powered missile-firing submarines, 72 Trident missiles, and research on a newer missile. Furthermore, 17 new attack submarines are projected over the next five years, aiming at a total of 100 torpedo-firing subs.

The Soviet navy, in contrast, has 1,287 surface combatant ships, of which 362 are major warships and amphibious ships. The Soviet fleet boasts 377 submarines, of which 190 are nuclear powered.

The U.S. Air Force is expected to have 40 tactical air wings of 72 planes apiece by 1986, an increase from 36 wings currently. These would be composed of high-performance F-16 and F-15 jet fighter-interceptors. Bomber versions of these planes would also be

developed. The B-1 strategic bomber has been revived, after being canceled by President Carter in 1977. Eventually, 100 B-1s are expected to be bought. The '83 budget provides funds for seven B-1s.

The Soviet Air Force is composed of Tactical Air Armies in 12 Military Districts, with Soviet Force Groups throughout Eastern Europe. These air armies have 4,800 fixed-wing aircraft, 250 transports, and 3,500 helicopters. Long range aviation units number 800 aircraft. Soviet air defense forces include an additional 2,500 fighter-interceptors, and Soviet naval air wings add some 1,400 planes, including the nuclear-capable Backfire bomber.

Meanwhile, the Reagan budget plans 14 naval air wings of 86 planes each, by 1987.

In the complex arena of strategic weapons, the Reagan program calls for one new strategic system, the MX missile. Nine MXs are funded this year, of a planned total of 100. These would gradually replace the old Minuteman III which is becoming vulnerable to a new generation of Soviet missiles.

Currently, the U.S. has 1,054 submarines with about 700 missiles, and 300 30-year-old B-52 bombers. Soviet strategic forces include 1,398 ICBMs, 950 submarine-launched missiles, and 156 long-range bombers.

In Europe today, the United States has an arsenal of 108 intermediate range nuclear missiles. In addition, the U.S. Air Force has 565 fighter-bombers. The Soviets have 730 land-based nuclear missiles, and 3,095 bombers of varying capabilities. The faceoff in Europe also includes 323 British, French, and West German bombers and missiles for a composite count of 965 Allied versus 3,225 Soviet missiles and bombers.

These are some old and new truths about the military balance, or imbalance. It is true that statistics can deceive. U.S. arms, in many cases, are technologically superior to the Soviets', nullifying some degree of the Russians' numerical advantage.

## Reagan Sensitive To Jobless?

MIAMI (NEA) — When the Postal Service announced recently that it was searching for people to fill 700 jobs that will become vacant through attrition here in the next two years, agency officials expected a flood of job seekers.

To cope with the expected onslaught of requests from unemployed South Florida workers seeking a new source of income, far-flung Postal Service managers were prepared to distribute 40,000 job applications.

But that wasn't nearly enough to meet the demand.

When the sign-up period for prospective mail clerks and letter carriers had closed, the Postal Service had dispensed more than 140,000 job applications.

That's 200 applicants for every job — and it's distressingly typical of a pattern that has developed throughout the country at a time when one out of every 11 members of the nation's work force is unemployed.

In New York City, the Postal Service received more than 225,000 employment applications after it advertised the availability of 2,500 jobs. In Kansas City, Mo., 18,000 people applied for 60 Postal Service jobs operating letter-sorting machines. The same dismal situation prevails when non-technical job openings are announced by private industry.

As millions of job seekers become more desperate for work with each passing day, President Reagan has surfaced to proclaim his irritation with the commercial television networks for their "downbeat" coverage of the situation.

"It is news that some fellow out in South Succotash somewhere has been laid off," said a sarcastic president, "that he should be interviewed nationwide."

What Reagan won't or can't recognize — perhaps because he seldom spends much time with anybody outside government except business executives and a small circle of wealthy California friends — is that the problem is not limited to South Succotash.

It is nationwide, it is severe and it is rapidly destroying the good will the president enjoyed among the nation's voters only one year ago.

When the CBS News-New York Times Poll recently asked a nationwide sample of men and women whether any adult in their households had been out of work and actively looking for a job during the past year, almost one-third replied "yes."

Moreover, almost two-thirds of those surveyed said someone they knew well was jobless and actively seeking employment at the time the poll was being conducted.

Early last year, the NBC News-Associated Press national survey found that respondents overwhelmingly endorsed — by a 63-27 margin — the statement that "Ronald Reagan has shown he really cares about people like me."

Early this year, however, voters rejected the same statement by a 69-47 margin.

Finally, a recent ABC News-Washington Post survey found that 52 percent of those polled thought "Reagan cares more about serving upper-income people," while only 47 percent thought he was concerned about serving the poor, middle-income people or all citizens equally.

Footnote: Neither Annunzio nor Prins would discuss the memo. ## Seminoles Sweep County Track Meet

### Williams, McNulty Share MVP Honor

Seminole's girls track team may have run away with the team title Thursday at Lake Mary, but Lyman's Showanda Williams walked away with a smile.

Just a sophomore, Williams swept both hurdles events and in the process knocked off arch-rival Tony Hardy of Seminole, one of the best in the state.

"That was the bit to do," said Lake Brantley coach Jim Marshall. "Schowanda was outstanding. To beat Hardy twice is really something."

Williams' outstanding performance earned her the co-MVP award with another exceptional athlete — Trinity Prep's Shannon McNulty.

"The coaches couldn't decide between the two girls," said Marshall. "So we just gave it to both of them. They both had great days."

Williams stepped to a 14.75 in the 110 lows which just nipped Hardy by three-hundredths of a second. Seminole's Arlene Jones took third. The time broke the existing record by five-hundredths of a second.

In the 330 intermediate hurdles, Williams zipped to a 43.66 which edged Hardy's 43.9. The time smashed the previous mark and also leads the way for the state. Hardy is next in line.

McNulty, meanwhile, dominated the distance events. The Saints' senior ran a 5:08.1 mile to whip Lake Brantley's Tracy Bonham by 12 seconds. Brantley's Kathryn Hayward was third. The clocking is the second fastest in the state this year and shattered the meet record.

McNulty also took the two mile in 11:39.1. Hayward ran second in 11:43.3 and Patriot Ellen Stern was third in 11:45. The time also broke the meet standard.

Overall, seven marks were broken. Hardy soared 18-feet-11 to easily win the long jump and shatter the record set by Lyman's Princess Reese of 17-feet-11.

Tribe teammate Crystal Caldwell zoomed to a new record in the 440 yard dash. She ran a 58.9 to snap the existing standard of 59 seconds by Brenda Davis.

Davis, nevertheless, left her mark by helping Sharon Jenkins, Charita Medlock and Tracy Brown to the 440 yard relay record. The speedy Seminole quartet ripped off a 49.56 to just nip the standard of 50 seconds.

Seminole, as usual, dominated the relays. Crystal Caldwell, Brown, Davis and Jenkins won the mile relay in 4:06.3, while Revonda Caldwell, Arlene Jones, Jenkins and Davis took the mile medley relay in 4:23.9.

The spring domination gave the 'Noles 121

### STUDENT'S EXPULSION UPHELD

The Altamonte Springs Christian School was within its legal rights to suspend a high school senior for alleged drug use, a Circuit Court judge has ruled.

Judge Kenneth Leffler ruled Thursday that Jacqueline Ann Locke, suspended from the school operated by the Palm Springs Drive Baptist Church, is not entitled to a temporary injunction allowing her to return to classes and graduate May 28.

A Longwood sub shop was broken into sometime between 10:30 p.m. Wednesday and 9:30 a.m. Thursday by thieves who made off with an undisclosed amount of property.

Robert B. Schofield, 50, who is the owner and manager of Sobika Sub Shop, 408 N. U.S. Highway 17-92, told deputies the thieves broke into the shop by prying open the side door with a tire tool. Once inside, the thieves forced open the office desk drawer and stole the property, deputies said.

### SIGN SUIT FILED

An Altamonte Springs businessman has filed suit with the Seminole County Circuit Court against the city of Altamonte Springs for its refusal to allow him to erect a larger business sign in front of his travel agency.

The suit, filed by lawyer Bernard D. Sommers, states that 7

Continents Travel Inc., applied for a variance with the city zoning administrator March 1. The request to erect a 32-square foot sign at 800 N. State Road 434 was denied by the zoning board and by the board of zoning appeals.

City rules dictate that a sign can be no larger than eight square feet without a variance.

If the travel agency cannot persuade the court to order city approval of the variance request, the company is asking Seminole Circuit Judge C. Vernon Mize Jr. to declare part of the city's zoning ordinance discriminatory, vague, unconstitutional and an invasion of property owners' rights.

The travel agency argues that a small sign poses an advertising hardship because a larger sign would lure customers to the company and promote travel packages.

### LONGWOOD FIRE SUSPICIOUS

Fire investigators are sifting through the ashes at Longwood shopping center to determine what sparked an early morning blaze at about 1:08 a.m. today.

"The fire apparently started in a bedding-type store," according to Longwood fire Lt. Jim Koczan who responded to the fire at the Winn Dixie Plaza, U.S. Highway 17-92 and State Road 434. "The fire then spread causing damage to a vacant store on one side and a shoe store on the other. There was also smoke damage to the remaining stores in the complex including the Winn Dixie."

Koczan said John Richardson, Longwood fire investigator, is at the fire scene today trying to determine the exact cause of the blaze. However, Koczan said the fire is of a "suspicious nature."

Koczan was the only person injured in the blaze with dirt and embers getting into his eyes.

"We've got to wait until John Richardson completes his investigation and until the store owners can inventory their stores to determine the loss," Koczan said.

### BROWN BAGGING IT

A 21-year-old Apopka man is being held in the Seminole County jail under \$500 bond following his arrest at 3 a.m. Sunday on charges of possession of marijuana.

David Wayne Shiplet, of 637 Overland Road was arrested after deputies observed a man walking along Linnel Beach Drive, in the Bear Lake area, carrying a large brown shopping bag, deputies said. When deputies approached the man, he threw the bag into a nearby ditch.

Upon further investigation, deputies discovered the shopping bag contained several plastic bags of what appeared to be marijuana, deputies said.

## Lake Mary Clamps Down On Mobile Home Parking

The city of Lake Mary now has the power to clean up the trailer home situation off Humphrey Road.

The City Council on Thursday night adopted an ordinance banning the parking of trailers in the city except on property specifically zoned for trailer parks.

The ordinance also requires all persons in the city who own trailers parked in other areas to apply to the city's Board of Adjustment for a special permit.

Although city law forbids the parking of mobile homes in areas of less than 10 acres in size zoned for agricultural purposes, city staff members found 14 trailers parked on three parcels totaling little more than five acres off Humphrey Road six weeks ago.

City Manager Phil Kulbes, who inspected the site, said some of the trailers had no approved toilet facilities or approved water supplies and large amounts of garbage, trash and junk cars were on the property.

Kulbes told the council Thursday that 10 of the 14 trailers are still parked at the site. But, he added, the garbage, trash and junk cars have been removed.

Councilman Gene McDonald opposed the ordinance, saying the city is being shortsighted in banning the mobile homes in all areas except trailer parks. He said young couples, particularly, can't afford permanent housing today and that manufactured housing is their only alternative.

Mayor Walter Sorenson said mobile homes and manufactured housing are two different things and noted that manufactured housing is being constructed in the city now. He said a major difference between the two is that manufactured housing complies with the

Southern Standard Building Code.

In other business, the council:

—Voted 3-2 to authorize the Fellowship of Christian Athletes from Crooms High School to use Crystal Lake Park for a rally and outing later this month and to the city's Brownie troop to use the park in May. Councilman Dick Fess and Ken King voted against the use after Fess said the city could be subjected to discrimination charges if it denied use of the park for similar events in the future.

—Authorized Kulbes to sign a contract with Law Bealing & Maintenance Co., a Lake Mary firm, to do patching work on paved city streets. Kulbes estimated the cost for the patching at \$500 to \$600 annually.

—Heard Kulbes report that he has ordered a septic-tank cleaning company to stop dumping raw sewage on privately owned property off County Club Road. He said he reported the incident to the Seminole County Health Department.

—Approved a proposal from Police Chief Harry Benson to upgrade the city's police pension program so officers will be vested in the program in five years rather than 10.

—Agreed to set up a pension plan for other city employees in the 1982-83 fiscal-year budget.

—Authorized Sorenson to sign a contract with ComBank's Casselberry branch for the city to borrow \$13,300 to purchase a computer system for City Hall. The money is to be repaid over a five-year period at a 9.75 percent annual interest rate.

—Gave preliminary approval to change the zoning from agriculture to office commercial on a tract of property off Lake Mary Boulevard, adjacent to the Lake Mary Elementary School playground.

## Sanford Businessman Dead At 71

Prominent Sanford businessman John Murray Fitzpatrick died at his home late Thursday night following a short illness.

Fitzpatrick, 71, of 405 Lakeview Drive, was born Jan. 12, 1911, in Columbus, Ohio, and moved to Sanford in 1949.

He was the owner of the Fitzpatrick-Harlock CPA firm in Sanford. The longtime

resident was a former Seminole County commissioner, a life member of the Elks Club, a member of the Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce and a member of the Fleet Reserve, and was an advisory board member for the Salvation Army.
