Early Intervention pre-registration scheduled for Feb. 26

Seminole County Public Schools' Pre-Kindergarten Early Intervention Program will be conducting pre-registration and recruitment for children who will be 4 years old on or before Sept. 1, 2002.

Program services are based on families meeting income guidelines as defined by the free and reduced hunch crite-ria. Families must be working or participating in Welfare Reform activities (One Stop), and living in the Seminole County school zone.

Program services are provided to students within elementary school settings and operate on a full day of services. Parents pay a fee for services based on their income.

This week, community agencies urge families to buckle up the

entire family when traveling. The Seminole County Sheriff's Office and the Altamonte Springs Fire Department will join other area agencies throughout the nation in promoting and enforcing child passenger safety. This week is National Child Passenger Safety Week, Feb. 9-16.

Buckling up is still the most effective way to save lives and reduce injuries from motor vehicle crashes on America's road-views. According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, more than half (56 percent) of all children under 15-years-old killed in car crashes in 2000 were completely unrestrained.

Adults who buckle up send a positive message to their children. In fact, research shows that when parents are buckled, children are sckled 94 percent of the time. When a driver is unbuckled, studles find 70 percent of the time children riding in the same vehicle are unbuckled. Studies also show that child safety seat use decreases after age three. Small children, (ages twothrough-five) who are placed in seat belts rather than child safety seats or booster seats, are 3.5 times more likely to be significantly injured in a crash. When a child outgrows their forward-facing safety seat, it's important to use a booster seat until the child is at least 8 years old, or over 4-feet 9inches fall. Seat belts alone are made for adults. A booster seat raises a child up so the seat belt fits. This will prevent your child from being thrown from the car, or thrown around inside it, during a

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





ed dating a guy who is very supportive. Because of the situation at my house, I have started going to his house every day after school and returning

as late as possible. Sometimes I tell Mom the truth about where I am; sometimes I tell her I'm working late at school. I am editor in chief of our school paper, so this isn't unusual.

Abby, I know my mother is very hurt by the fact I'm never home. She gets angry and accus-es me of avoiding home because I don't want to do chores. How can she say that when she knows how her husband treats me? I am under so much stress my grades are starting to drop. What can I do to make her less upset? How can college? Please help. TORN IN NEW ENGLAND I spend more time with her before I leave for


DEAR TORN: Your mother blames your absence on an unwillingness to do household chores because she's in denial about how her husband's drinking and temper have affected you. If she can place blame on you, she won't have to address her failure as a parent to protect you from his abuse.

I see nothing to be gained by lying to her. She bears some of the responsibility for this. Tell her where you're spending your time and why. Explain that your boyfriend's house is a safer place for you because you don't have to fear threats and verbal abuse.

If you want to spend more time with your mother before you leave for college, do it away from the house. An excellent place for both of you to start would be Al-Anon. It is listed in your local phone book. As for your dropping grades, I urge you to find a teacher or counselor at school in whom you can con-fide. 





Meth labs, somewhat uncommon in Central Florida, are more prevalent in the rural areas of the nation.





Unique parenting class may cease at college

SANFORD — Parents know all to well that babies don't come with instructions.

There are plenty of books on the subject, and parents have their own childhood experiences to draw upon. There's also the mother-in-law who knows exactly how her grandchildren should be raised.

But those resources don't always provide the answers, particularly for first-time parents who never seem to run out of questions. Meet Penny O'Connell and Elaine Ray.

O'Connell and Ray operate the Parenting Labs, a one-of-a-kind

program that provides parents with the skills they need to raise their children. What makes the Parenting Lab unique is the fact that parents participate in the program with their children.

"We should really call it the Parent and Baby Lab," O'Connell said. "This is not something where you have to get a babysitter so you can go to class for an hour. You learn by doing."

Parent and Child Learning

The classes meet twice a week for two hours. The sessions are divided into seven six-week periods beginning in August and running through May. Parents can choose to attend just one six-week

An evening with a cop and his best friend

to-day duties of Sanford police officers. Today's article focuses on the K-9 unit.

SANFORD - "Bark, bark, growl." That's the sounds heard anytime someone walks close to Sanford Officer Tony Raimondo's squad car.

Dax, a 186-pound, 2-year-old German Shepherd "does not like people by the car," Raimondo said. Not to worry, though. The dog's bite is not as bad as his growl, unless Raimondo needs it to be. The playful pup is a little too over protective of his master, but when it comes to police work he's second to none.

"People view our dogs as weapons — they're just tools," Raimondo said. "They find people and search buildings. They're not vicious at all."

Even on the slowest nights of patrolling the city streets, Raimondo and Dax are quite possibly the busiest duo on the force. They spend a lot of time backing up other officers,

Editor's Note: This is the second in a series exploring the day- responding to building alarms and searching for narcotics. Lunch breaks and bathroom breaks are extended for the K-9 unit as well.

"He takes breaks just like I do," Raimondo said.

On breaks Raimondo practices obedience training with Dax. Occasionally Raimondo will put Dax through a short tracking exercise where the dog is rewarded with hot dogs for following a scent. Dax loves hot dogs. He normally eats four cups of dry food a day, with an occasional hot dog as a treat. However, on department training days when all the police dogs participate, Dax can eat as many as 10 to 15 hot dogs during the exercises, Raimondo said.

Dax is a full-service police dog, which means although he is trained primarily for searching buildings and tracking suspects, his secondary training was in narcotics detection. Other full-service dogs in the county have elective training in bomb and cadaver detection.

The selection of police dogs is a detailed process where few make the final cut. Dogs are tested on a variety of criteria, many of which an average dog owner wouldn't even
