### Western Auto Building Bought

The Western Auto Store building at 301 W. First St., Sanford, has been purchased by Stanley Sandefur and Kevin Spolski, partners in a local general contracting and developing firm, from Robert Ball Sr.,

The purchase price and renovations are expected to cost about \$300,000.

According to Sandefur, plans call for transforming the old building into a Spanish style executive office building catering to attorneys and doctors. There will be approximately five offices with a total of 11,000 square feet of lease space

Sandefur said he and his partner hope to com-

plete the extensive renovations within four months and hope to open by Dec. 1.

Ball, who purchased the Western Auto Store and building in 1970, plans to relocate the business at 2202 French Ave. in another building which he owns and plans to expand the building to accommodate the business. He expects to be in operation there by Aug. 10, he said. Ball said the Western Auto Store had occupied the West First Street building for the past 20 years. He estimates the building is at least 50 years old

Sandefur said he and Spolski were both raised in the Sanford area and have purchased the building and are renovating it in an effort to help upgrade downtown Sanford.

"We plan to dress it up with a Spanish look using

barrel tile," he explained.

Sandefur and Spolski are partners in Designed Structures, Inc., with offices at the Sanford Airport. They build and develop shopping centers. They built the Shops of Wekiva shopping center in South Seminole County west of Longwood and several shopping centers in Orlando, as well as the Paulucci Security Store-All project and jobs for the Seminole County School Board and Sanford Airport Authority.

The young entrepreneurs also own the DSI Industrial Park development at 20th Street and Old Lake Mary Road with 60,000 square feet currently under lease.

Last year, they built a sugar concentrate plant for Pepsico in Cidra, Puerto Rico.

### Fatal Accident Probe Continues

The Monday afternoon crash that killed a 7-year-old girl and injured her 11-year-old playmate along Lake Howell Road is not the only automobile accident David T. Green has been involved in within the past 16 months.

State driving records show that Green, 79, of 2321 Knoll St., Winter Park, was involved in automobile accidents on March 7, 1981 and Nov. 7, 1981, in Orange County. But he was not charged with either crash.

However, Florida Highway Patrol investigators say charges may be pending against Green after his car reportedly jumped the curb along Lake Howell Read at 5:12 p.m. Monday and struck Dana Dietrick, of 5244 Lake Howell Road and Shawn Balencie, 11, of 5226 Lake Howell Road, killing the young girl, Balencie is listed in stable condition today in the intensive care unit of Winter Park Memorial Hospital.

Troopers said their investigation of the fatal accident is expected to be completed next month.

Green's out-of-control vehicle also collided with two other ehicles traveling along Lake Howell Road Monday,

neither Green nor the other drivers were injured, troopers

According to state driving records, the retired 79-year-old Winter Park man, who was issued a driver's license in October 1979 without restrictions, was ticketed in 1974 for improper backing, in December 1979 for no license plate or registration and in April 1980 for running a stop light. His license was suspended from April 1980 until June 1982 for failure to pay a fine in Orange County, officials said. His license was reinstated when the fine payment was made June 7, 1982.

In addition to the March 1981 and November 1981 accidents in which Green was not charged, his licenses was again suspended in February 1982 because he did not have personal injury insurance, officials said. His suspended license was reinstated in June 1982 after he obtained insurance. Green also was ticketed in May 1982 in Orange County for

running a traffic light and having an improper or no driver's license when requested by 2 police officers, records show.

### County Opposes Office Closing

Seminole County commissioners oppose the planned closing of a state employment office in Sanford.

The board voted unanimously Tuesday to send a resolution to the district employment office protesting the planned closure. The unemployment compensation office, at the same location, would remain open.

Commission Chairman Robert Sturm said state officials have said they are closing the office to save money. If it closes, the nearest employment offices will be in Orlando or Lake

Commissioners approved the resolution to be sent to the district office and also endorsed a letter, proposed by Commissioner Bill Kirchhoff, asking the state to put the employment, unemployment and food stamp offices in the same

Commissioners also expressed concern about the amount of money they are being asked to pay for changes in the design plans and construction of fire stations in Fern Park, Sabal Point and Chuluota.

The list of changes totaled about \$25,000 and included \$8,400 for the redesign of a flat roof to a pitched roof. Total costs, including design re-use fees, would be about \$57,000.

Commissioners Barbara Christensen and Robert G. "Bud" Feather voted against accepting the changes claiming the costs, particularly for the roof, were too high. The changes were approved, by a 3-2 margin.

Commissioner Sandra Glenn also voiced concern about the changes but voted to allow Catalyst, Inc. of Florida to make the design changes.

She questioned the use of drywall in the plans when they originally called for a block wall, plans to fully tile the bathrooms, a new window design, blinds on all windows and the pitched roof to replace the flat roof.

"When we started on this we were going to have serviceable fire stations with no frills," she said.

County Administrator Roger Neiswender said the stations will still have no frills. The changes are things which the fire department has found helpful.

He said the pitched roof plan is to make the station more compatible with houses in Sabal Point.

The cost of the changes is "the result of a false economy" in the earlier designs, he said.

Commissioners unanimously approved the expansion of the Senior Citizens Multi-Purpose Center Board from five to seven members. The board had been reduced to five earlier in the year to alleviate some tension between board members. But the return to seven members was approved after the reduction stirred more controversy.

The board picked Leo Ware, who had represented the commission before the board size was cut, to serve as one of its three commission-appointed board members. Elizabeth Redmon and Robert Hamilton are the board's other representatives.

Mrs. Glenn said the board should reexamine its role in the senior citizen center which is located in Casselberry.

She said it is a county center but there has been a lot of misunderstanding as to why the county doesn't participate in the operation of the center.

Casselberry pays for the operation and maintenance of the countywide facility, she said. The county has no financial involvement in the operation. The county contributed money used to attract the federal grant for construction of the center. Commissioners also approved, by a 4-1 margin with Feather

### Altamonte To Check Building Safety

How much is peace of mind and concern over public safety worth? At least \$20,000 to the Altamonte Springs City

That's the amount approved by the board at Tuesday's commission meeting for an independent architectural analysis of the city's Public Safety Building to determine if discrepancies between original construction

specifications and what was actually built in 1979 would prevent the city from adding a third floor to the present two-story facility. Architects Design Group of Florida, along with

Richardson Engineering, handled original construction of the Public Safety Building. However, when the firm of Hampton, Monday & Associates began looking over plans and specifications of the structure to add a third floor, significant dimensional discrepancies were discovered.

As a result of a preliminary examination of the building by Hampton, Monday & Associates, it was determined that structural changes had been made to the building drawings during construction. Original contract drawings for outside support columns called for 12-by-24-inch wide support columns. Instead, the latter firm discovered support columns in the building are 8by-24 inches wide, leaving questions as to whether the building is strong enough to support a third

Because of possible litigations between the city and the original builders, Hampton, Monday & Associates requested the city hire an independent architectural firm to examine the building, including X-rays of the support columns, to determine if a third floor can be added.

Architect Gordon Monday said there also may be discrepancies in steel supports within the columns and that after initially measuring the building some of the columns were found to be off

In approving the \$20,000 expenditure for the independent analysis of the building, City Manager Jeff Etchberger informed the commission there may be potential recourse against the original architect depending on the outcome of the structural analysis.

"If we can't go with a third floor, the city may seek punitive and other damages," Etchberger said.

Etchberger said, potentially, the city could have very significant legal and financial recourse action available against the original builders. pending the outcome of the analysis.

"If it's found that the original people created these problems, the city will take steps to get this money back," Etchberger said.

The firm of Howard Needles, Tammen & Bergendoff will conduct the structural analysis with support from Howard, Monday & Associates.

Etchberger said that firm was chosen because it is uniquely qualified and respected in dealing with similar types of architectural problems and is capable of providing adequate testimony in the event that litigation against the original builders becomes necessary.

The \$20,000 will be taken out of the city's con-

tingency fund.

### Education, Training Keys To Future Of The South

HILTON HEAD ISLAND, S.C. (UPI) - Mississippi Gov. William Winter, in a report to the Southern Governors Association, said Tuesday economic development in the South depends largely on education and training.

"Each of us is aware of the importance of our education system to sound economic development," Winter said in a prepared statement.

"Economic development in this increasingly technical and competitive marketplace is largely dependent on high quality education and training. You can trace on a graph the close relationship between educational achievement and economic attainment,"

Winter, newly elected chairman of the Southern Regional Education Board, told of his efforts in Mississippi to improve the quality of education and curriculum at all levels, including the pre-school level.

Earlier this year, the Mississippi Legislature approved a proposal by the governor to create a new state board to supervise vocational and technical education programs. But, lowmakers rejected a public kindergartens bill submitted by Winter.

### Demos Warned To Wake Up

CHICAGO (UPI) — Democratic leaders, including a presidential hopeful, warned officials from their party's national committee to pay more attention to legislative races or risk losing more power in state general assemblies.

Ann Lewis, political director of the Democratic National committee, Tuesday agreed the committee should provide more help to legislative candidates. However, she said monetary assistance this year is not likely because of several gubernatorial races that are draining funds.

"I wish I could say there will be checks in the mail, but how much help we can give I just can't say," Ms. Lewis told a Democratic caucus at the National Conference of State Legislatures annual meeting.

Former Florida Gov. Reuben Askew, who said he might run for president in 1984, suggested the committee can do other things to include legislators "in the scheme of things."

For example, he said, the committee could allow state legislators more representation at the national

### Reagan 'On' Tonight

WASHINGTON (UPI) - President Reagan mulling over Soviet grain sales, Middle East peace efforts and the troubled economy - faces the nation tonight in a nationally broadcast news conference.

Deputy press secretary Larry Speakes said Reagan was in the "final stages" of deciding whether to extend for one year a wheat agreement with the Kremlin that expires Sept. 30,

Aides said he was leaning toward this short renewal instead of negotiating a new, long-term pact. They did not rule out the possibility Reagan would announce his decision at the news conference, scheduled to begin at 8

No announcements but plenty of questions were expected about U.S. peace efforts in embattled Lebanon, where Israel has encircled Beirut — trapping members of the Palestine Liberation Organization

This will be the 12th news conference of Reagan's presidency and again the shadow of the sagging economy will be hanging over him when he steps before the bright lights and cameras.

"When the man delivered the drug to our agent, other agents moved in quickly and made the arrest," he said.

Agents said they discovered an additional four grams of suspected cocaine on Youngblood, a native of Winston County, Ala. Agents also discovered a 9mm automatic handgun lying on the floorboard of Youngblood's vehicle, partially hidden under the driver's seat.

Herald Staff Writer The city of Sanford's warehouse and property on West Sixth Street is up for sale and an industrialist wants to buy it. The land has been appraised at \$226,725, but the City Commission may be willing to negotiate a better price.

City Manager W. E. "Pete" Knowles told the City Commission Monday night a Sanford realtor has notified the city that an industrialist is interested in the property.

He said the prospective buyer wants the property for a light industrial enterprise and new jobs would be created as a result.

He said the city would replace the space it uses in the warehouse with a 10,000 to 11,000-square-foot structure at the city's public works complex. He estimated the cost of \$80,000 to

\$85,000. He urged the commission to take under advisement the offer

to buy the property. In the meantime, Knowles said he will notify the realtor of the appraisal and seek information about the value of im-

provements contemplated by the prospective owner and the number of jobs to be created. Knowles said the commission has been interested before in selling unused city property so that the lands can be placed on

### English Bikers Cycling For Young Polio Victims

Sanford was invaded Tuesday by Robin Hood's "Merry Men" from Sherwood Forest, Nottinghamshire, England — 16 young school boys and five staff members, who are cycling their way from Miami to Ottawa, Canada.

Although they are not robbing the rich to give to the poor as the legendary Robin Hood and his band were prone to do, they are collecting donations for the "Save the Children Fund, Stop Polio Campaign" for children in Third World Countries.

While in Sanford for the night, the cyclists and their support team were hosted by Sanford Rotarians.

The 13-year-old boys accompanied by five teachers came from the Hartland School, a public school in Worksop, and Ranby House, a private school in nearby Retford. Local firms in Great Britain helped sponsor the venture but each participant had to contribute about \$1,200 for air fare and other expenses.

"It's an experience of a lifetime," said Richard Theobald, leader of the Robin Hood 82 Expedition, "In cycling 2,000 miles across the United States and Canada, we've had fantastic hospitality, we're seeing America not from a tourist's point of view, but for the most part staying in private homes.

The group arrived in Miami to begin their trip on July 19, but their bikes didn't. At first, TWA thought they might have gone to Spain, but they were finally located in New York and showed up 24 hours late. After a few days of

getting acclimated to the time and temperature changes, they took to the road on

Cyclist Oliver Sheldon said his biggest problem so far has been the heat. He said that he had trained by cycling in England, but in much cooler temperatures. The group is averaging 70 miles per day. After overnight stops in Belle Glade, Okeechobee and Lake Wales with accommodations ranging from a camp and a hospital to a Hilton Hotel, they arrived at Walt Disney World Monday, Not surprisingly, it was the highlight of their trip

Thirteen-year-old Gordon Wilson said, "I never even had a bike before this year. I've had punctures, sunburn and have been bloated from being overfed so far on this trip."

# Israel's Breach Of Promise

Israel, through its use of cluster bombs and other American-made weapons in Lebanon, has broken agreements it made with the United States in spirit, if not in letter.

A 1976 law limits use of U.S. weapons to defensive purposes only. In a 1952 agreement, Israel agreed to use them "solely for its internal security" and legitimate self-defense and not "in any act of aggression against any other state." The spirit of these promises seems clear: U.S. weapons can be used only to repel invading armies.

But the provisions of the deals were left illdefined, enabling Israel to contend that its invasion of Lebanon aimed at the Palestine Liberation Organization was a defensive action.

As the siege of Beirut continues, this conception is becoming more strained every day.

Informed sources report that secret, bilateral agreements put further restraints on Israel. Reportedly, Israel has promised to use American weapons only against "regular forces of a sovereign nation," in areas that contain no civilians and only when Israel is being attacked by two or more nations.

Israel's invasion of Lebanon and siege of Beirut fulfills none of these requirements. If the secret agreements do exist, Israel has broken even the letter of its diplomatic promises.

Until this week, the Reagan administration sidestepped the issue. But its recent decision to halt the scheduled shipment of 4,000 cluster bomb units to Israel pending further investigation and its hint that a 1985 sale of fighter planes is in jeopardy shows that it will not put up with Israel's playing fast and loose with its promises.

The administration now faces a dilemma. The investigation of the use of cluster bombs in Beirut, which is being conducted this month, will be part of an overall review of Israel's behavior in Beirut.

If the investigation shows that Israel's use of American weapons violates U.S. law, aid to Israel will automatically be halted,

No one is anxious for this to happen. Israel is our most valuable ally in the Middle East, an oasis of stability and democracy in the middle of a tumultuous, authoritarian desert.

Nevertheless, the issue needed to be forced. Israel, which protested the U.S. sale of AWACS to Saudi Arabia because it feared that the Saudis would use them against Israeli civilians, is now using American-made weapons to kill Lebanese civilians.

And it is fitting that it is being forced over the particularly deplorable cluster bombs, which, while still high in the air, open and indiscriminately spray hundreds of grenade-like bomblets over a wide area.

U.S. foreign policy has emphasized, and must continue to emphasize support for democracies that protect human rights. The Israeli anticivilian behavior in Beirut has raised questions about whether Israel remains committed to those values.

# Truth And Its Packaging

Ronald Reagan, should anyone need reminding, is a superb communicator.

He is a genial master at getting points across and winning over audiences, as witness a visit earlier this year to the Voice of America offices on the occasion of the government broadcasting agency's 40th anniversary.

Regaling the staff with an account of his own experiences as a young radio announcer reconstructing baseball games from telegraph reports, the president demonstrated how effectively imaginative language could transform a routine out at second into a heart-stopper for the listening audience.

The truth was there, he said as the laughter subsided, but "attractively packaged."

Packaging is also the point of a report the president has received from the United States Advisory Commission on Public Diplomacy. This is an autonomous bipartisan group set up by Congress to report annually to the president on the VOA and its parent organization, the International Communication Agency, and it is concerned that accuracy and objectivity may give way to "stridency and propaganda."

While endorsing the need for boldness in programming, the commission warned that credibility is VOA's most precious asset. It could be seriously damaged by "actions and policies which are easily misinterpreted and cast doubt on the organization's commitment to truth..."

The actions and policies to which the report referred have been the cause of external criticism and internal dissension for the past year. It could be a problem of oversell, but they have been interpreted as seeking to change VOA's focus from information to progaganda.

Precisely that was the point of an internal memo, leaked to the Washington Post last September, proposing that the VOA cease behaving as a journalistic enterprise and regard itself as a propaganda agency in the business of selling U.S. interests to foreign audiences as advertising sells soap.

The author, Philip Nicolaides, briefly coordinator for commentary and news analysis, has since resigned, one of a rash of departures on both sides of the divisive issue that has shaken the VOA staff. Among the next to depart may be most of the members of the advisory commission. The White House is reported considering replacing up to five of the present seven.

A recent replacement is VOA Director John R. Hughes, who took over the job July 1 saying he intends to increase the editorial opinion content of broadcasts. He has signed on an editorial writer assigned to articulate the government's view on issues in daily contributions to VOA programming. The editorials will, however, he clearly identified as such and will not intrude upon news content.

That assurance — and Hughes' credentials as a Pulitzer Prize winner in foreign reporting and former editor of the Christian Science Monitor — may allay some of the internal and external concern.

Meanwhile, those involved in the Washington wrangle over truth in broadcasting might give some thought to a recent lesson from London.

The British Broadcasting Corp., which set the standards for objectivity in broadcasting back in World War II, drew criticism during the Falklands war by not taking a more decidedly British line. It reported both British and Argentine versions of developments.

### Flaws In Air Safety

WASHINGTON (NEA) — Another commercial airliner has crashed, killing scores of people aboard the plane, another round of hand-wringing has begun and another federal investigation is under way to determine the cause of the accident.

The progression of events following airline disasters — the first dramatic news accounts, the grief visited upon the victims' relatives and the somber proclamations of concern from government officials — has become a contemporary ritual.

There is, however, an important element of that ritual that generally has remained hidden from public view — the scandalous pattern of inaction, insensitivity and delay within the federal agency primarily responsible for air safety.

The Federal Aviation Administration has never resolved the conflict inherent in the 1958 law that created the agency and mandated it to promote the civil aviation industry while simultaneously imposing and enforcing stringent safety standards on that industry.

The problems posed by those conflicting goals become apparent at the initial stage of civil aviation, when an airframe manufacturer produces a new passenger plane that requires FAA "type certification" — the agency's assurance that the aircraft is airworthy and safe for commercial use.

Although the Federal Aviation Act specifically authorizes public hearings during the certification process, not one such hearing has ever been scheduled by the FAA.

Instead, the agency treats aircraft certification as a private matter between itself and the manufacturer. Moreover, it has structured the process in a manner that allows the manufacturer to improperly influence — if not dominate and control — the entire procedure.

The FAA, for example, relies heavily upon "designated engineering representatives" selected by the agency to perform inspections, approve work done by the manufacturer and check on the manufacturer's quality-control standards — but the people delegated to perform those crucial tasks are employees of the manufacturer.

In the case of the McDonnell Douglas DC-10, for instance, 42,950 inspections were required for certification — but 31,895 of those official FAA inspections (almost 75 percent of the total) were performed by workers on the manufacturer's payroll.

The DC-10 provides a textbook example of the FAA's inability to seriously enforce safety standards not only before but also after certification.

In May 1970, the DC-10's cargo-door latch failed during a pre-certification static test of the plane. Engineers for a McDonnell Douglas subcontractor wrote an internal memo questioning the design and integrity of the door-latch mechanism — but the FAA never found out about the problem.

If the doors of the plane's cargo compartment failed to latch properly, they would pop open in flight after the cabin was pressurized, causing the floor of the passenger cabin to collapse. That, in turn, could damage or sever control lines stretching from the cockpit to the tail.

The FAA certified the DC-10 as airworthy in July 1971. Less than a year later, in June 1972, a cargo door blew out on an American Airlines DC-10 over Canada. The plane's control lines were damaged and the controls jammed, but it landed safely.

In such circumstances, the FAA should have issued an "airworthiness directive," a mandatory order with the force of law directing the manufacturer to correct the flaws revealed in the post-accident investigation.

Instead, the FAA and McDonnell Douglas entered into a private "gentleman's agreement" under which the manufacturer promised to remedy the problem by sending airlines that had purchased the DC-10 a service bulletin suggesting that the repairs be made voluntarily.

Although a DC-10 destined for Turkish Airlines was still under construction by McDonnell Douglas at the time, the necessary modifications were never made. In March 1974, that plane crashed into a forest near Paris, killing all 346 people aboard — the worst single-plane aircraft disaster in hisotry.

The FAA then decided it was time to issue an airworthiness directive requiring changes in the cargo-door latch.

# Who Gets The Trash?

NEW YORK (UPI) — Who owns your garbage and wastepaper?

That's a question the Supreme Court is going to have to answer ultimately in a case brought by wastepaper recyclers growing out of a flow control ordinance enacted by the city of Akron. Ohio.

Mayor Roy L. Ray of Akron said when that city floated a bond issue to finance a big power plant to burn garbage and wastepaper it was necessary in order to attract bond buyers to adopt a flow control ordinance requiring haulers to take all the waste collected to the power plant.

"Actually we're going to be somewhat flexible about enforcing the law and we have reached accommodations with some of the haulers," the mayor told United Press International. "We think economics really will dictate what happens — whether the haulers will deliver everything to be burned under the power plant's boilers or deliver wastepaper and other recyclable materials to recycling dealers."

J. Rodney Edwards, a vice president of the American Paper Institute in New York, said similar flow control laws have been enacted in several cities and are being proposed in many others including Los Angeles and San Francisco.

Since there already are 30 waste burning power plants in operation in the United States and around 200 are in varous stages of building or planning, there will be demands for more flow control ordinances to ensure a large supply of refuse fuel for the plants

The paper institute considers such laws a grave threat to two important kinds of recyclable paper: cardboard boxes and newspapers. It points out that 18 million tons of valuable wastepaper are being returned to paper mills for recycling each year.

paper mills for recycling each year.

The institute said that, as written, the Akron ordinance could make it a criminal offense for a hauler or paper recycler to divert valuable wastepaper from the furnaces of the power plant. Edwards said that would

be an enormous national economic waste.

Edwards also said such laws violate the rights of private sanitation haulers by giving the waste power plant a monopoly on

rights of private sanitation haulers by giving the waste power plant a monopoly on acquiring the wastepaper from them.

Edwards said from a strictly economic

standpoint, the recycling of kraft paper boxes is far more important than recycling old newspapers. But the newspapers are important because, when the price is reasonably high — it has been as high as \$50 a ton recently — collecting and selling old newspapers provides a second income for millions of people.

In fact, the paper institute says, as many as

60 million Americans may be involved in wastepaper recycling in the course of a year. Churches, schools, charitable institutions, Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts and civic groups earn badly needed money for their activities by running wastepaper collections.

All this could be in Jeopardy with enactment and enforcement of a lot of tough flow control ordinances giving refuse burning power plants absolute rights to all the paper collected in private as well as city sanitation trucks.

Curiously, because of local circumstances, newspaper collection doesn't cut much ice in Akron, Edwards said. There the real legal issue is whether the city has a right to all the waste kraft paper collected.

He said the paper institute had succeeded in blocking enactment of a similar ordinance in Chattanooga, Tenn.

# VA Chief Labeled Worst Appointee

"He's been like this ever since he learned that there might be an NFL strike."

WASHINGTON — Though there are many competitors for the title, I nominate Veterans Administrator Robert P. Ninuno as President Reagan's worst appointee.

Nimmo has set himself up as the Great White Hunter leading a safari through the bureaucratic jungle. He has slashed through the underbrush with total abandon, indiscriminately firing subordinates he regards as disloyal. He should be dismissed immediately.

Nimmo is himself a veteran (of World War II), yet he seems perfectly insensitive to the problems of the men and women the Veterans Administration is supposed to be looking out for. Indeed, his critics claim he is more interested in his golf game and the perquisites of his office than he is in the problems of the nation's veterans.

Here are some of the complaints that responsible observers have registered against Nimmo:

- He has given subordinates the unmistakable impression that he is un-

comfortable dealing with the handicapped, though they are the veterans most in need of help from the federal government.

— A source close to Nimmo told my associates Jack Mitchell and Dale Van Atta that the VA boss has privately referred to veterans who seek aid from the VA as "malingering welfare burns."

— The same top-level source confided that Nimmo has shown more concern over his standing on the official protocol list than over the proposed cuts in the VA's \$20 billion budget. As one example of his indifference to the budget battle, Nimmo's chief congressional liaison, Fielding Cochran, was on a trip to Rome last month during a crucial period in the negotiations over the agency's appropriations.

— Nimmo seems unable to tolerate any underlings who are not willing to be totally subservient yes-men. The first No. 2 nominee, Allen Clark, a decorated, double-amputee Vietnam combat veteran and staunch

Republican, became discouraged and quit after just a few weeks. Nimmo refused to give him enough authority to do his job properly. One reason might have been, as Nimmo confided to an aide, that he didn't want any "no-legged" persons around him because it would be too "depressing."

Clark's successor, Charles Hagel, was dumped unceremoniously when he declined to be a mere gofer for his patrician boss.

Granted, it's no crime for a presidential appointee to have a bad attitude toward the subordinates who must help him run his agency. The top man can produce sparks merely by cleaning up the agency's operation and carrying out the new president's orders to cut out unnecessary expenditures.

If Nimmo had shown himself to be the type who kept his nose to the grindstone and eschewed personal privileges, his apparent determination to cut services to veterans might be overlooked.

But the VA boss is currently under investigation by the General Accounting Office

for reportedly using federal funds on a private elevator for the use of himself and his favored subordinates.

He was caught using a chaufeured limousine at the taxpayers' expense, and had to repay \$6,441. In direct violation of a presidential directive, he lavished \$54,183 on redecoration of his private office.


Organized veterans' groups, which ordinarily try to get along with the VA boss, have called for Nimmo's ouster and have threatened the White House with reprisal at the polls in November if he isn't dumped.

Even Clark, the loyal Republican who was Nimmo's original No. 2 man, felt impelled to send a telegram to the president, saying the Va boss is "woefully underqualified to provide heavyweight management strength." Clark added: "He is a poor judge of people.

He does not do his homework... I urge you to replace this man." To avoid any suggestion of self-serving motives, Clark added: "I am not a candidate to be his replacement."

Estimated budget deficits are one thing and how much the federal government has actually gone in the hole by the time it closes the books on a fiscal year is another -usually much larger. The figures show that in recent years the estimate has rarely been even close to the reality.

### Federal Deficit To Be Much Higher

WASHINGTON (UPI) - The recession, prolonged by high interest rates, probably will add "several billion dollars" to the projected deficit for 1982 and as much as \$35 billion to the 1983 deficit, Congress' chief economist said Tuesday.

Alice Rivlin, director of the Congressional Budget Office, told the Senate Budget Conunittee the effects of the recession could lead to deficits that exceed current projections by more than \$50 billion by 1985.

Her testimony came as the administration prepared to issue its own mid-year economic outlook. Treasury Secretary Donald Regan said Sunday the 1983 deficit - now projected at \$104 billion — could be \$10 billion larger.

Mrs. Rivlin said tax collections through June indicate revenues for fiscal 1982, which ends Sept. 30, will be \$3 billion to \$8 billion less than expected.

"Primarily because of lower revenues," she said, "the budget deficit for 1982 will probably exceed the (budget) resolution target of \$106 billion by several billion dollars."

Although preliminary CBO forecasts for fiscal 1983 use only marginally different economic assumptions than in the past, she said, those differences could result in "surprisingly large

"The lower-than-expected revenue base for 1982, combined with the slightly lower real growth and lower inflation for 1983 in the CBO forecast, imply appreciably lower revenues than estimated." she said

"The net effect of these reestimates could be to add \$25 billion to \$35 billion to the 1983 budget deficit."

In later years, Mrs. Rivlin said, those same conditions could increase projected deficits by \$40 billion to \$55 billion in 1984 and \$50 billion to \$65 billion in 1985.

Large deficits "will continue to be a problem for the foreseeable future," she said, adding additional tax increases and spending reductions could be required next year to achieve longer-run deficit targets set by Congress.

Pressed to choose a range for the 1982 deficit, she said her "best guess" is \$110 billion to \$112 billion. Using the same assumptions, she set a range of \$141 billion to \$151 billion for 1983 and said the deficits for 1984 and 1985 could fall between \$145 billion to \$160 billion.

"I think deficits of that magnitude are worrisome" and could add to high interest rates, she said.

Mrs. Rivlin said the CBO still expects economic recovery to begin during the second half of 1982.

"However," she added, "the failure of interest rates to decline, despite falling inflation, and the unexpected depth of the recession now lead us, as well as other forecasters, to anticipate a somewhat less robust recovery than seemed likely a few months ago."

# Cummings Charges SHA 'Neglect'

Charging his colleagues with "neglect of duty," Sanford Housing Authority (SHA) Commissioner E. Wane Cummings Monday night asked the Sanford City Commission to consider removing some of the members.

He did not specify which members to remove, but noted the authority has been plagued lately with absenteeism.

City Manager W.E. "Pete" Knowles urged the commission not to get involved with the operation of the authority, saying it is monitored by and under the control of the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). "The authority members can settle this themselves," Knowles said. The commission took no action on the request.

City Commissioner David Farr said, however, "it took plenty of guts for Cummings to come and speak" to the

Cummings privately but he did not wish the city to be officially Cummings said he has tried to work with the four other SHA commissioners, but has "run into problems of bigotry and

Meanwhile, Knowles said he would be happy to talk with

Cummings did not elaborate. Noting the authority has been wrestling with the problem of naming an executive director for the past year, Cummings said today at least two qualified candidates applied for the post. "Because they weren't black, they weren't considered," he charged.

Cummings said that basically, the authority is operated by "a clique who are members of one church" and it is difficult for "anyone from the outside to get into the clique."

Of the possibility of naming Linda Williams, currently acting executive director to the permanent position, Cummings said he would oppose that move because he believes she is part of the original problem.

Mrs. Williams has worked for the Sanford Housing Authority for more than 10 years in various positions. Problems in the authority were made known in November 1980 when authority commissioners in a unanimous vote of no confidence fired executive Director Thomas Wilson, who had served in the

Since Wilson's removal, the authority has lost federal funding for a housing rehabilitation program.

HUD's 15-month investigation of SHA's administration of the program and its use of federal funds is being concluded now. Knowles has worked with HUD on the problem.

Joseph Caldwell, SHA chairman, said today the absences of authority members over the past several months have been justified. He said the group has basically met three times as often as generally required. "I don't understand Cummings' charge of bigotry and

nepotism. We simply haven't hired anyone who is related to board members," Caldwell said. He added the board is especially careful not to practice bigotry.

"I wish Cummings had brought his complaint to the board and we could have tried to work it out," Caldwell said. "This is just a misunderstanding. I would like to see the board stand tight. I can see no problem among the board itself."

"We've been going along fine. We have accomplished most of the things we had to do," he said.

At the city commission meeting, Knowles told commissioners they were in danger of infringing on an agency that is federally run and supervised.

He implored the commissioners to keep the Sanford Housing Authority and City of Sanford separate "so we don't get into more trouble. The SHA is answerable to HUD, Jacksonville." Prior to Cummings' appearance, Knowles reported that new regulations from HUD state that when the city acts as sponsor

for agencies, such as SHA, it is then responsible for the administration of a federal program. He said he has spent "umpteen hours" trying to work out SHA's problems with HUD over the defunct housing

renovation and resale program. He said he has been exasperated time and again by the federal bureaucracy.

SHA administers six public housing projects containing 480 units in Sanford. - DONNA ESTES.



record \$30,468 a year, up 14.3 percent from 1981.

Offers to candidates for all other types of bachelor's degrees during the September, 1981, to June, 1982, period dropped by more than 11,000. Offers numbered 51,290, compared with 62,835 last year, the Council's "Salary Survey" for the 1981-82 school year showed.

"While it sounds like gloom and doom, the drop may just mark a return to normal after six years of boom times," said Judith Kayser, the council's manager of statistical services.

Second-ranked among new graduates from four-year engineering programs were chemical engineers. Job offers carried an annual average pay of \$27,072, up 11.1 percent over last year, the report showed.

Average salaries for master's of business administration with technical and non-technical backgrounds were several thousand dollars less than the petroleum engineers' \$30,468. Humanities graduates - among them English, history and music majors - came in last in the paycheck race. Average offers were a little over \$15,000.

Other highlights:

-The highest average offer among four-year degree business specialties was \$18,540 for accounting majors. Marketing majors drew less.

-Computer science dominated the sciences in numbers of offers. The annual average pay of \$22,890, however, was second to physical and earth science specialties.

-At the master's level, the number of offers dropped from 10,952 to 8,437, "Hard hit were engineering graduates and those receiving MBA - master's of business administration degrees," the Council said.

-Average salary offers to women were lower in all cases except in engineering, accounting, chemistry and computer

"In the fall," Mrs. Kayser said, "many employers were optimistic about the economy and its ability to recover. They planned to hire as many or more college graduates than last

"By the middle of the recruiting year, however, plans began to change. The economy had not rebounded and some employers postponed hiring decisions ..."

The Council publishes job offer and salary reports in January, March and July.

Its monitoring of job offers does not include recruiting by local, state or federal governments. Teaching job offers are

# Family Split Over Sale Of Altamonte Land; Suit Filed

Saying they want to keep their dead mother's land in the family, five brothers and sisters have filed suit in Circuit Court, Sanford, seeking the return of the Altamonte Springs property recently sold by their oldest brother to State Rep. Robert Hattaway, D-Altamonte Springs.

The suit claims that John Frank Wheeler of New Jersey sold about seven acres of property which he was charged with administering after his mother, Mattle Mae Hayward, died Oct. 12, 1967.

Five of Wheeler's siblings, Gladys Wheeler Floyd Rivers, Willie Ruth Griggs, Mamie Louise Robinson, Wedia Mae Evans and David C. Haywood contend that Wheeler had no right to sell the property to Hattaway for \$32,400 because Mrs. Hayward's will stated that the land was to be divided among her children.

"My clients are not really looking for any monetary compensation in the case," said lawyer James M. Magee who is representing the plaintiffs. "They just want their mother's land back to keep it in the family."

However, Hattaway said he has no intentions of giving up the Hillview Drive property where he says he intends to house his

"There was a "For Sale" sign on the property and I bought it through a lawyer from a lawyer for Mr. Wheeler," Hattaway said. "I have the title and it's insured and I don't plan to give it up. It's located next to where my nursery is and when I saw it was for sale, I bought it and will put my horses there."

The lawsuit states that Wheeler sold the property to Hattaway without the permission of his brothers and sisters who were to have received individual deeds to their portion of the land. One brother was to have received the deed to four acres, or 55 percent of the land, while Mrs. Hayward's other children were each to receive the deed to five percent of the property, the suit contends.

Magee also said that his clients maintain that Wheeler took the property under his own name in April, 1981 and sold it without the consent of his siblings. Magee added that four of his clients have, for the past 14 years, contributed to the maintenance of the property.

"I understand from my lawyer that Mr. Wheeler also has a lot of money tied up in the land," Hattaway countered. "I understand that there were forfeiture actions being brought against the property because of back taxes not being paid and that Wheeler paid those taxes out of his pocket to avoid losing the land."

The case is slated to be heard before Circuit Judge Kenneth M. Leffler although no trial date has been set.

In other suits filed in Circuit Court, Michael G. LeMarr and his father, Melvin, of Altamonte Springs, have filed suit against the State Department of Transportation, Seminole County, and the county Department of Public Works seeking damages of an unspecified amount in excess of \$5,000.

The lawsuit states that an accident which occurred on July 20, 1978, was the result of negligence by the three named agencies in not maintaining safety precautions at what the LeMarrs claim is a "dangerous intersection."

### Dr. Frankenstein's **Good-Guy Counterpart**

DAYTON, Ohio (UPI) — In fiction, a certain Dr. Frankenstein rammed bolts of electricity into his patient to bring it to life. Unfortunately, he created a monster that destroyed him. In Dayton, in real life, a certain Dr. Petrofsky rams bolts of electricity into his patients to bring them to life. Fortunately,

he creates happy patients who thank him. "Nobody has accused me yet of being a Dr. Frankenstein," Dr. Jerrold Petrofsky said, laughing, "but some people have

the idea I'm making robots." You can see why people might get that idea.

The doctor links electric current with computers to produce movement in otherwise lifeless muscles of paralysis patients. Even though the patients are not in conventional control of their movements, they do not feel like robots. They feel more

"My patients are very happy about the experiments," Petrofsky said. "Although they're paralyzed, they're very surprised to discover just what their bodies can still do."

Everything Petrofsky is doing is aimed at restoring movement for certain types of paralysis patients - those who have been paralyzed because the path of communication between the brain and leg muscles has been broken.

Petrofsky, 34, is director of Wright State University's biomedical engineering lab, where he has been able to get paralyzed people to pedal a stationary bicycle for more than eight straight minutes.

He does it by taping electrodes to the skin over six major muscle groups in the legs. He programs a computer to order successive, millisecond bursts of electrical stimulation to the

appropriate muscles. Instantaneous feedback to the computer regulates the movements.

# Altamonte Adopts Budget, Tax Rate

### By JOE DeSANTIS Herald Staff Writer

The Altamonte Springs City Commission has taken another step towards adopting its proposed \$18.6 million budget for fiscal year 1982-83.

At its Tuesday meeting, the commission adopted a tax rate of \$2.85 per \$1,000 assessed valuation, and adopted the proposed \$18,617,859 budget pending two public hearings scheduled for August 31 and September 7. Both public hearings will be held at 7 p.m. at City Hall, 225 Newburyport Ave.

The proposed tax rate represents almost a full \$1 per \$1,000 drop over fiscal year 1981-82's rate of \$3.78 per \$1,000 assessed valuation.

While Altamonte residents will realize a savings in city taxes, they may still end up paying more due to an average 20 percent

increase in property appraisals. The average household is also expected to pay about \$100 more in taxes during the next year due to the hike in Florida's state sales tax from 4 to 5

Broken down, Altamonte Springs' proposed budget is as follows:

- General Fund - \$8,991,126

- Federal Revenue Sharing \$160,258 - Law Enforcement Trust Fund - \$2,831
- Water-Sewer Revenue Fund \$4,787,673 - Repair and Replacement - \$1,071,000
- Bond and Interest Sinking \$747,257
- Refuse Disposal Fund \$445,146 - Wastewater Treatment Facility -

- Water-Sewer Drainage Trust Fund -

\$1,497,898 - Total all funds - \$18.617.859

Approval was given to purchasing a new air conditioner for the Eastmonte Recreation Center for a total of \$448. Repair work for a burned-out motor and compressor would have cost the city \$345.

A total expenditure of \$7,301 was approved to purchase repair parts for panel boards at the city's lift stations. The commission approved the purchase from STA-CON Inc. as the sole source supplier and waived bid procedures because STA-CON agreed to supply the city with the parts at its cost - \$7,301.44 - as opposed to the next lowest cost available of \$8,143.69.

The commission also approved two hold harmless agreements with city residents.

Lawton and Dian King of 774 Little Wekiva Circle received permission to build a concrete block wall on the rear and side of their yard to correct water drainage and washout problems. The proposed wall would be in a utility easement area, but the city does not have any utilities in the area, nor does it plan to have any installed in the area in the forseeable future.

James M. Simmerson of 130 Spring Lake Hills Drive was granted permission to construct a six-foot masonry fence along his property line, granting the city permission to use the easement without liability should the

### Tuition At SCC To Rise Slightly

Seminole Community College (SCC) students will be paying more for their education during the coming school

SCC Dean of Finance and Administration A.J. Vavreck said tuition at SCC will increase by \$2 to \$18 per credit hour for Florida residents and by \$2 to \$38 per hour for out-of-

Those increases are less than maximum rates approved last week by the state Board of Education, Vavreck said, noting that in February the in-state fee is \$1 under the state ceiling and the out-of-state tuition rate is \$3 less than the maximum.

SCC's decision to increase tuition was based upon information available in February when officials were uncertain of what their share of state funds might be, Vavreck

He said students at the community college were informed of the decision to raise tuition in February and there hasn't been much response.

Students will pay \$24 more this year for a 12-hour course

Vavreck said tuition accounts for 22 percent of the college's budget with state funding making up the remainder of its \$13.4 million budget.

### Variance Upheld

## County OKs Higher Property Density

A compromise allowing a Hunter's Point family to construct a fence beyond the limits approved by the development's architectural review board has been approved by the Seminole County Commission.

The board voted Tuesday night to uphold a variance granted by the county's Board of Adjustment. But the variance was changed, at the request of Commissioner Robert G. "Bud" Feather, from three feet to six feet.

The variance allows Robert and Ann Yeaple to construct a six-foot wooden fence six feet from their property line. The couple had earlier been granted a variance to construct a swimming pool and filed the second variance to replace a berm, built by the developer, with the fence.

Janice Presby, representing the Wekiva Homeowners Association, appealed the Board of Adjustment decision, claiming the fence would violate the covenants of the develop-

Mrs. Presby told commissioners the fence would also disrupt the continuity of foot paths in the development.

The Yeaples presented petitions bearing the signatures of 76 percent of their neighbors in support of their plan to construct the fence

Commissioners Sandra Glenn and Bill Kirchhoff voted to grant the appeal but did not explain their reasons.

The commission also granted a waiver of a two-year waiting requirement for increasing the density of property adjacent to Airport Boulevard and 16th Street.

The waiver would allow the property to be used for industrial purposes, according to Anne Wallace, representative of property owner Albert Leeberg.

Mrs. Wallace said Leeberg would agree to turn a 150-foot section of the property into a buffer zone to insulate neighbors from any noise or activity taking place on the property if it is developed.

Before the waiver goes into effect, Leeberg must also agree to use a nearby canal as a drainage area for the 40-acre tract.

Kirchhoff told Leeberg's neighbors, who appeared to oppose the plan, that the commission's action was necessary if they are to have any protection at all.

The property was annexed into Sanford earlier this week and without the limitations imposed by the county, could later be developed without restrictions, he said.

Delicatessens have been flourishing for two hundred years. They originated in Germany where hundreds of smoked meat items were produced. The shops became known for their fine array of ready-to-eat foods, and soon cheeses, robust salads, specialty breads and a variety of mustards were added to please customers tastes.

During the 1900s emigrant butchers and shopkeepers brought their special recipes to America and started the first delicatessens here, mostly in larger cities. Deli pastrami sandwiches, corned beef on rye sandwiches, dill pickles and macaroni salad have long been popular in New York, Philadelphia and Chicago. Travelers often sought out these items when visiting the cities.

It wasn't until the mid 1970s that deli departments started cropping up in supermarkets. Shoppers told their grocers they wanted a place where they could buy quality cheese and meats and other specialty foods. Shoppers added that they were also looking for personal attention, good service and the opportunity to order just the quality of food they wanted.

To answer that need, the supermarket deli was born. In 1977 only 34 percent of newly opened stores had delis. By 1980 the service deli was included in most new supermarkets and many older stores were installing them. Today virtually all large supermarkets, stores with sales of \$1,000,000 or more a year, are equipped with deli counters. It's easy to understand why they're so popular.

The deli stocks a mouth-watering array of products not always found on the store's grocery shelves. The quality is consistently high. And the person behind the counter provides plenty of old-fashioned service — such as letting you sample a cheese before you buy, or giving advice on how to serve a product that's new to you.

Quality and service, however, aren't the only benefits. Add convenience and getting just the amount you want, and you can see how neatly the supermarket deli fits today's lifestyles.

For example, the growing number of one-member and twomember households often find it hard to buy small portions. Not so at the grocery deli. You can buy single servings of salads and pastas or just a few slices of meat or cheese.

Working wives and mothers also find delis an invaluable source for quick, delicious meals. And, since the kitchen is no longer solely a woman's domain — men and teenagers also shop and cook — the deli offers an ideal way for any busy cook to put together a meal or party in a hurry.

Remember the deli at party time, too. There are special platters with a variety of meats and cheeses, breads and crackers. Or you can buy the foods and arrange them yourself. Deli foods and sandwiches travel well on picnics, camping or hiking outings and on boat trips.

Deli food also meets the needs of today's nutrition-conscious 'consumer. The breads, from spicy rye to dark pumpernickle, are high in B-vitamins. The salads provide roughage and a wide variety of vitamins; meats and cheese are excellent sources of protein. The condiments that go with deli foods such

as mustard and pickles are low in calories. The next time you stop at the grocery to pick up something for dinner, head straight for the deli department. Get a loaf of crusty bread, cheese, ham, turkey breast and salad for a side dish. Then, since spicy mustard is a "must" for sandwiches and cold cuts, pick up some brown mustard. When you get home you can build a sensational sandwich, or put together an appetizing cold plate in a matter of minutes.

FOUR LAYER FEAST Slice a large round loaf (112 lbs.) of cracked wheat, light or

dark rye bread horizonally into four layers. Spread each layer

with brown mustard and assemble: Bottom layer: Leaf lettuce, 1/2 lb. thin sliced ham and 1/2 lb.

sliced Lorraine cheese. Middle layer: 14 lb. thin sliced hard salami and 15 lb. (1 cup)

Top layer: Leaf lettuce, 12 lb. sliced turkey, tomato slices

and sliced onion. Close sandwich with top crust. Insert 8 long skewers through top crust to bottom of sandwich. Garnish each skewer with cherry tomatoes, olives, pickles or cocktail onions. Cut sandwich into 8 wedges between skewers. Eat like a watermelon.



# A Summer Medley Of Vegetables

This week's column was prompted by a recent visit to the farmer's market.

The summer vegetables - orka, corn, tomatoes and green beans were the best buys. Each of these can be microwaved successfully either alone or in combinations.

The general rules of microwaving vegetables are: Microwave at 100 percent power, 8-10 minutes per pound and allow 5 minutes standing time. Cook with a tight cover.

If plastic wrap is used be sure to allow for venting. This will prevent a steam burn when removing the cover and the forming of suction which occurs when the microwaving is com-

I prefer orka when it is combined with other vegetables. This recipe is a good one to use small amounts of several vegetables.

### SUMMER MEDLEY

- 3 slices bacon, cut in 42 inch pieces
- 2 cups orka, 12 inch slices 2 medium tomatoes, peeled and cut into eights
- 1 cup fresh corn
- 4 cup chopped onion 14 teaspoon salt
- Pepper sauce to taste

Place bacon in 2 quart casserole. Cover with paper towel and microwave on 100 percent power until crisp.

Stir in orka, tomatoes, corn, onion, salt and pepper sauce Cover tightly and microwave on 100 percent power 5 minutes stir. Cover and micrrowave until corn is tender 5-7 minutes

Fresh green beans require a little more microwave time and a little more water than most fresh vegetables. To prepare 1 pound of fresh green or wax beans try this method.

Wash beans and remove ends. Cut into 1-inch pieces. Place 12 cup water and the beans in 12 quart casserole Cover tightly and microwave on 100 percent power 5 minutes. Stir. Cover and microwave until tender 4-7 minutes longer. Let stand 5 minutes. Drain.

For seasoning, add butter or bacon drippings, Salt, nutmeg, or dill can be added to enhance flavor.







Supposedly I had a splenic flexure syndrome. That was what I was told to put on my insurance papers. Will you please explain this to me?


