1,000 pot plants

Sanford man sentenced to prison

ORLANDO — A Sanford resident convicted in February of growing 1,000 marijuana plants was sentenced Wednesday to 15 years in federal prison.

Kenneth Ireland, 41, was sentenced to 10 years in prison for three drug related counts. He was convicted of conspiracy with intent to distribute 1,000 pot plants, possession with intent to distribute several pounds of the drug and possession with intent to distribute the marijuana plants. U.S. District Judge G. Kendall Sharp also sentenced Ireland to a five-year term for

Proposal: Move all county high school graduations indoors

SANFORD — When the senior classes at the district's high schools got too large to be contained in the schools' auditoriums at graduation time, the ceremonies were moved outdoors to the stadiums.

The outdoor commencement ceremonies had become somewhat of a tradition in Seminole County.

A few years ago, Lake Mary and Lake Brantley high schools broke with tradition and moved their ceremonies to the Orlando Arena. Last year, Oviedo and Lake Howell high schools moved their graduations to the University of Central Florida Arena.

Seminole and Lyman high schools have remained steadfast in their traditional early morning events.

"I think it's time for that to change," said school board member Larry Strickler who told the board that he believed the schools needed to all hold their graduations indoors.

The board has discussed the matter, but they will leave the final decision about where a school chooses to hold its ceremony up to the individual school.

"There are too many chances for someone to get hurt at the outdoor sites," said Strickler.

He said that he attended the Lyman High ceremony last year. There he saw one older gentleman hurt his leg while trying to navigate through the large crowd at the stadium. He also

saw someone who required medical attention because of the extreme heat.

"It was at that time that I really became concerned," Strickler said. He said that Florida weather patterns also always leave people at risk of lightning strikes.

Strickler said that the older gentleman who was hurt at Lyman sued the school district and he is afraid that more lawsuits may follow if the graduations are not moved indoors.

"We know that the conditions are not completely safe and we have to do what we can to make them safe," Strickler said. "That is just good management."

Strickler suggested that the district look into offering the schools a funding package that would allow the schools to pay for the basic graduation ceremony, including the rental of a hall that is big enough to accommodate the expected crowds and to pay for essentials like security.

"The schools would have to pay for frills," he noted.

There is no indoor facility in Seminole County that is large enough to accommodate such crowds. So, if Seminole and Lyman elect to move their ceremonies inside as well, no Seminole district school will graduate their students in the county.

Strickler said the school district will not be able to dictate to the schools that they must move their ceremonies indoors, but he said that he hopes that the incentive package, if it is approved, will make it easier to make a move that direction.

Tree service owner still under fire

LONGWOOD — A civil suit and criminal case against the owner of AAA Tree Service in Longwood, which are nearing conclusion, will continue despite the fact the business is for sale.

The tree service owner, Henry Hardy Jr. is charged with illegal dumping in county court and is the defendant in a civil suit which alleges mulch has been placed too close to protected wetlands and runoff is polluting Lake Griffin. A consulting engineer for Hardy contends runoff from road construction and the expansion of Milwee Middle School came onto the property and flowed into the lake causing the nutrient overloading.

A portable lighted sign stands in front of the business owned by Hardy and his wife, Mary D., on County Road 427 advertising 17 acres of land "For Sale or Lease." The Hardys are the parents of former Longwood Mayor Henry Hardy III.

On Wednesday, County Judge Mariene M. Aiva continued the misdemeanor criminal case against Hardy until October after the defense

Teen arrested in killing over pizza

MIAMI — A 13-year-old boy was being held in the killing of a homeless man over a dispute about a piece of pizza, police said. "This is scary," said Miami police spokesman David Magnusson Thursday. "Not only is this just a kid, but this man was killed over nothing, virtually nothing." The incident started around early Thursday when the boy brought some pizza for friends at a squatters camp under a commuter train bridge over the Miami River, south of downtown, police said. Magnusson said the teen-ager — whose name wasn't being released — apparently offered the homeless man a slice of pizza but became angry when the man took two slices. The two argued, then the boy left, witnesses told police. About half-hour later, Magnusson said, the boy returned with a handgun and shot the homeless man, known as Manny, in the chest. The boy could be the youngest person to face a first-degree murder charge in Dade County.

possessing a firearm. The firearm sentence is to be served after the other prison term is completed.

Ireland, who at the time of his arrest owned K & D Trailers on Orlando Drive in Sanford, was arrested by agents of the U.S. Drug Enforcement Agency and Orange County Sheriff's office last October. Agents raided a rural site at 2020 Haas Road, west of Wekiva Springs State Park and seized about 1,000 marijuana plants and 60 bags of

"pot" weighing about one pound each. Ireland was arrested in a mobile home at the site which agents thought was used to process and package the drug.

Ireland was convicted of the drug and firearm charges after a four-day jury trial early this year.

Charges against the owners of the Haas Road property, Lake Mary residents Alvin A. Willis and his wife, Julie, were thrown out by the judge before Ireland went to trial, according to Bobby Moreno a spokesman for the U.S. Attorney's Office.

dant's attorney, Ken Wright, withdrew from the case. Wright also withdrew as attorney of record in the civil case. Hardy was granted a 30-day continuance in the civil matter.

Alva warned Hardy there will be no further continuances granted and to come prepared to enter a plea or go to trial.

A representative of Hardy's picked up a transfer of ownership and name change forms from Longwood City Hall Wednesday. A woman who identified herself only as Penny, at the AAA Tree Service office, confirmed the property is for sale but said no sale is pending. She declined to reveal the asking price over the telephone. The forms from city hall were for transfer of the business within the family, she said, adding, "If the right person comes along, we'll sell it outside the family."

Even if the property is sold, both the criminal and civil cases involving Hardy will continue until resolved.

Department of Environmental

Protection biologist Brian Carr said he is finalizing a plan calling for the property to be restored to its June 1991 condition. He plans to discuss it with assistant state attorney Beth Richard-Rutberg next week. The tree service is under court injunction to prevent it from spreading mulch and other debris into the wetlands. The order outlining what the business owner must do to restore the impacted areas will be part of Hardy's probation in the criminal case.

If the property is sold, it will be up to the new owners to comply with the order, Carr said. Hardy will have to comply with the finding of the judge in the criminal case.

"In the civil case (a judgment) goes with the land, but in the criminal case, it stays with the person," Richard-Rutberg said. "Whatever crime you've done, you've got to atone for it." The sale of the property or transfer of ownership will not remove responsibility from Hardy in the criminal case, the attorney added.

Anonymous death

Violence goes unnoticed amid furor over tourist slayings

MIAMI — Michael Harvey was shot by an unknown killer, dying in a pool of blood on a dark street the weekend between the highly publicized slayings of two foreign tourists in Florida.

Harvey's stepfather didn't appear on Oprah. His mother wasn't invited to the governor's mansion. European newspapers didn't write indignant headlines. The local media never mentioned him. No reward was offered.

Harvey, 33, took a bullet in the chest late on the night of Sept. 11. He died in the center of Pierce Street among the neat, single-family homes dotting his middle-class black neighborhood of Richmond Heights outside Miami.

"We were advised by a passerby that a body was lying in a pool of blood," says Metro-Dade police spokeswoman Lizette Williams after leafing through reports to find the case. "We have no subject information, no clue as to the motive. We have no suspect."

Many more Michael Harveys die in Florida than do foreign tourists.

Last year, according to Florida Department of Law Enforcement statistician Linda Harless, there were 1,191 murders in the state. Only 22 victims lived outside Florida. In 1991 only 30 out-of-state residents died. In 1990 it was 29.

Harvey's stepfather, telephone company employee James Latham, buried his stepson Thursday after a funeral service at Covenant Baptist Church in Florida City.

Andrew-damaged home, he says he doesn't want to talk about his stepson's life or the murder. It pains Harvey's mother, he says.

He understands why the killings of German and British visitors get more attention, he says. But then the bitterness creeps in, and his eyes flash.

"I've lived in Miami since 1963. I know how it works," Latham says. "This country isn't geared toward human beings. It's geared toward only one thing — m-o-n-e-y."

Not all victim's families are so hardened. Lisa Hardeman's stepson and daughter-in-law were murdered in 1981 in Palm Beach County. Now she's a counselor for Dade County's victims services. It's unfair to say families in unpublished cases begrudge the attention given the tourist murders, she says.

"Some people feel very resentful that their case is not treated with the same media attention as a police killing or a tourist," she concedes. "But there are those who don't want any publicity."

Most, she says, are in shock. While still grieving for their loved one, they're suddenly forced to deal with police, prosecutors, courts and attorneys.

Based on her own experience, Hardeman knows that attention and publicity can make the ordeal worse.

"I wish they wouldn't show the blood in the road. I wish they wouldn't show the body covered with a blanket — can you imagine how the family of victim feels seeing that on TV?" she asks.

Other survivors don't think there's enough attention to the violence that has claimed their loved ones.

Saul Halper was grief-stricken after his 28-year-old son Billy had his throat cut by robbers in 1986. Late at night, the father would cover his mouth with a pillow and scream himself hoarse in anguish.

"I still relive it every night," he says.

Now he chairs a Broward County victims group called Parents of Murdered Children. He campaigns for the death penalty, tougher sentences and better treatment of victims' families.

He isn't shocked by the sight of a murder victim's body in the road.

"And that's one of the main problems we have here — it doesn't bother people," he says with chagrin.

What does bother people, he says, is the feeling that not all victims are equal.

"It's all dollars and cents," Halper says.

"It affects the tourist industry. It's the same when a cop gets killed — they seem to catch the murderer right away."

"But when it comes to a civilian, they say 'We'll take care of it next week,'" he says.

Police feel the inequity just as deeply, however, says detective Don Blocker of Metro-Dade police.

Club votes to allow two black members

JACKSONVILLE — The Florida Yacht Club has invited two black businessmen to join the ranks of the prestigious club, but it remained unclear whether either would accept the membership offer.

The 117-year-old private club, which has never had a black member, had under intense external and internal pressure to extend membership to blacks after the club earlier this year rejected Chester Aikens, a prominent black dentist.

As a result of the denial, a major regatta was pulled from the club by the U.S. Sailing Association and the club was denied access to Mayport Naval Station by the Navy for a race.

When Willard Payne, owner of two McDonald's restaurants, and dentist Orrin Mitchell were recently proposed for membership, an internal battle erupted.

Court says state needs better rules for blood tests

TALLAHASSEE — Florida needs to establish guidelines for blood alcohol tests, most frequently used following car accidents that cause serious injury or death, the Florida Supreme Court has said.

Instead of regulating the equipment and procedures, the Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services issues permits to technicians if they correctly analyze test samples.

But more should be done, Thursday's unsigned

unanimous decision said.

"We believe that the public as well as those who may wish to obtain a testing permit should be apprised in advance of all approved methods of administering the tests," the court said.

The court gave HRS until Jan. 1 to establish "reasonable definite rules specifying the precise methods of blood alcohol testing that are approved for use in this state."

Despite the order that more specific standards be set, the court said HRS now meets statutory requirements. That was a blow for David Mehl, who brought the issue to the high court.

Mehl is facing three counts of drunken driving and causing serious bodily injury after being accused of running a red light near Orlando in May 1989 and hitting the driver's side of a second car, injuring both the driver and passenger as well as himself.

Doctors took blood from Mehl in the emergency room at the request of law enforcement officers and sent it to the crime lab of the Florida Department of Law Enforcement, according to Thursday's opinion.

A machine known as a chromatograph revealed an alcohol level of 0.10, the legal limit.

A trial court granted Mehl's motion to throw out the blood test because the state didn't have standards for the use and testing of chromatographs. The 5th District Court of Appeal in Daytona Beach overturned the trial court.

Anthony Golden, an assistant attorney general in Daytona Beach who had argued against Mehl's appeal, said he was relieved by the decision.

"It was a technical administrative law question that the Supreme Court didn't buy," he said.

Flem K. Whited III, a Daytona Beach lawyer representing Mehl, said he was pleased the court had directed the state to lay down specific rules though it wouldn't help his client.

Tourist killing

Police focus on 13-year-old suspect, 2 others

MONTICELLO, Fla. — A 13-year-old boy with a lengthy arrest record and two other teen-agers have emerged as the prime suspects in the killing of an English tourist, Florida's deputy attorney general said.

Two of the teens — the 13-year-old from Tallahassee and a 15-year-old Monticello resident — were already in custody in an unrelated car theft. A 17-year-old was being sought, said Deputy Attorney General Pete Antonacci.

The 13-year-old has a record of 56 arrests, Antonacci said.

"They're convinced that they have the guys, and that they don't have a case so far," Antonacci told The Miami Herald in a story today.

He did not say why investigators believe the teen-agers are the assailants. They have not been charged in the killing.

Gary Colley, 34, was fatally shot early Tuesday during an attempted robbery at a highway rest stop where he and his girlfriend had pulled over for a nap. Margaret Ann Jagger, 35, was wounded in the attack.

Colley's killers are believed to have been driving a stolen car that was later found abandoned in Monticello, 25 miles east of Tallahassee.

Colley was the ninth foreign visitor slain in Florida since October 1992 and the second in less than a week. The killings have jolted the state's \$31 billion-a-year tourism industry. Jefferson County Sheriff Ken

Fortune and the Florida Department of Law Enforcement refused Thursday to talk about evidence or whether they have prime suspects. Authorities also declined comment about whether the youths mentioned by Antonacci were linked to the killing.

Fortune would not confirm reports that ballistics tests were being run on a bullet fired in a motel robbery Sunday in Monticello to determine if it is linked to the killing. No one was injured in that robbery.

Meanwhile, Jagger, her arm in a sling, embraced a police officer before getting on a plane Thursday for the trip to England with her boyfriend's body.

"She just wants to go home," said Jo Miglino, spokeswoman for Gov. Lawton Chiles.

The search for the suspects, which included a roundup of young black men with troubled pasts, brought cries of racism from civil rights leaders. Some youths were pulled out of school and taken to the county jail for questioning.

But Fortune said Thursday that investigators were simply

responding to a description of the attackers given by Jagger, who said they were young, slim and black.

"A lady who's a victim, who's lucky to be alive, told us we were looking for two black males. I think that's justification enough," Fortune said.

Jagger, who had been staying at the governor's mansion in Tallahassee, was shown a lineup Wednesday night. Fortune wouldn't say whether she identified any suspects.

The Rev. R.N. Gooden, state president of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference, worried that the roundup —

which could involve up to 50 youths — may inflame racial tension in the county, which is 43 percent black.

"It's just like Gestapo tactics, and it certainly is a violation of civil rights," Gooden said. "I can understand that they need to make an arrest quickly, but they don't need to create a situation of racial tension that will remain after this is over."

Since the shooting, Florida officials have increased safety warnings to visitors, and wildlife officers and auxiliary law enforcement personnel are providing 24-hour security at the state's 45 interstate rest stops.

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Hospital errors costing U.S. billions, lawyer says

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. — A 65-year-old woman gets a bill for a sperm count. A man is billed for a pregnancy test. A third patient finds a \$532.38 charge on his hospital bill labeled "unknown."

Similar accounts fill the file cabinets at Accu-Pay Inc. of Little Rock, an independent company that checks hospital bills for such errors as the \$22.50 charge for five sanitary napkins made to a woman who'd had a hysterectomy 18 years earlier.

"We have audited over \$5 million in medical bills, and we have yet to find a single one without a mistake in it," said Karen Johnson, president of Accu-Pay and a consumer lawyer. Since Accu-Pay was incorporated last September, it has discovered more than half a million dollars in overcharges on more than 1,000 hospital bills, which were 79 percent from private patients and 21 percent from corporate accounts. Each bill was inflated an average of 11 percent, Johnson said. So far, she added, about half the overcharges have been removed from bills.

In 1991, the last year in which the national health care bill was broken down, hospital charges accounted for 38 percent of the total, and Jon Ross, a spokesman for the American Hospital Association, says the figure is now closer to 40 percent of the nation's \$909 billion annual health care costs.

Johnson believes faulty billing is the norm at hospitals around the country. If the 11 percent factor reported by Accu-Pay held true across the board, the overcharges on the nation's hos-

pital bill, which totals roughly \$360 billion a year, could reach almost \$40 billion. That would go a long way toward easing the costs of providing health insurance to the 37 million Americans now without it.

Next Wednesday, President Clinton is expected to unveil his plan to reform national health care. Two main goals have been to insure all Americans and to contain steadily rising costs.

The White House has said that covering the uninsured might cost \$30 billion to \$70 billion a year, and that businesses may be required to help foot the bill.

"There's no reason to charge businesses if you've got that kind of money already in the system," Accu-Pay's Johnson said. "There's no reason to go back and take a \$200 billion hunk out of Medicare and Medicaid if you can just get the hospitals to charge for just what they're passing out."

Accu-Pay charges a \$49 flat fee for each review, as does MedReview, a similar company that reviews hospital bills in Austin, Texas.

Mike Shefman, MedReview's marketing president, concurred with Johnson that the United States could save billions of dollars by reviewing medical bills for accuracy.

In 1992, Shefman said, MedReview processed about \$24 million in bills from hospitals and other medical providers. The company found errors totaling about \$2.8 million, which saved clients an average of about 12 percent from their bills, Shefman said.

He said his company's findings represent a nationwide problem, but he doesn't believe hospitals are deliberately overcharging patients.

"The truth is, very often, it can be just a data-entry error,"

he said.

Jon Ross, the AHA spokesman in Chicago, said hospitals don't try to pad profits by intentionally overcharging patients.

"In fact, studies show that more often than not billing mistakes are to the detriment of the hospital, rather than to the patient," he said. "By and large, the process is very, very solid. The companies and institutions that are paying the bills are there to find things like that before they are paid."

Ethically, said Bert Lewis, an Accu-Pay vice president, the company would have to report a hospital undercharge that benefits a patient client. But in all cases of such errors found by the company, he added, the same bills contain significantly higher overcharges. The largest undercharge in a patient's favor found by Accu-Pay was \$6,000, Lewis said. But the same bill included \$14,000 in overcharges, so the patient came out ahead by \$8,000.

Farewell to a county leader

Bob Sturm, who died Tuesday, stood for many things, wore many hats, made many friends.

As chairman of the Seminole County Board of County Commissioners, he guided the county during years of unprecedented growth that spanned three decades.

He brought dignity to political office and commanded respect from those who knew and loved him.

Friends remember him as a conservative leader who was mindful of the public but willing to take what occasionally might be an unpopular stance. "Bob never went for the shadows" former state representative Art Grindle said of him.

"He was always willing to help the people. What a loss for me. What a loss for the people," said close friend Fred Streetman, who served on the commission with Sturm.

He handled his position with wit, tapping on a musical tie that played Jingle Bells during a meeting one holiday season.

He was a husband and a father. He was a fine man.

His political career in Seminole County began in the early Seventies, when he stumped for Republican candidates as a fund raiser. His daughter, Brenda Dykes, said his bid for elected office was prompted in 1977 by heart problems and bypass surgery. While his doctor told him to slow down, Sturm merely shifted gears. Retiring from an insurance career, he immersed himself in county politics for nearly 18 more years, guided by his conservative Republican tenets.

Another politician will soon be named to succeed Sturm but the legacy he leaves will be visible around the county virtually forever.

Think of him when the expressway opens; he strongly backed the critical transportation link. His hand also guided the beautification of Lake Mary Boulevard, proffering a thumbs up to aesthetic zoning regulations that now govern it. Out of the road beautification, he fought for a sign-clutter reduction ordinance. He led the effort to develop a countywide recycling program and uniform garbage collection program for the unincorporated areas of the county.

And so, to the Navy war veteran; businessman; gentleman; esteemed, sometimes crusty politician; father; husband; friend; Bob Sturm...
...goodbye.

City codes are specific

It has come to my attention that area residents may not be aware of specific codes when it comes to removing high growth, debris and other items from their premises. Yard sale regulations also seem to be a question.

The city adopted an ordinance in 1989 which requires that all abutting property owners shall be responsible for maintaining the public rights-of-way which adjoin their property. This includes all grass, shrubbery and trees. All limbs shall be at least 6' (six feet) from the ground and all shrubbery shall not be more than 3' (three feet) in height from the ground level. As I'm sure you are aware, this is for visibility purposes. Grass in excess of 12" and weeds, vines and wild growth in excess of 18" is also a violation of the city code.

The Public Works Department offers special trash collection twelve (12) months a year. Residents are entitled to four (4) free specials. These specials are offered to encourage the clean-up of area properties. If you call for a special pick-up, remember to keep junk, debris, furniture, used building materials and/or appliances separated from the yard debris (limbs, grass, etc.). Some yard items to be placed in marked and posted curbside pick-up points within the city and made available to residents free of charge.

Yard sales are limited to two (2) times per calendar year for three (3) consecutive days each in daylight hours only. The purpose of yard sales is for disposing of "personal" property not for merchandise which was purchased for resale or obtained on consignment. No signs shall be displayed more than one (1) day prior to the sale and are only allowed on the premises where the sale is being conducted. The signs must be removed on the final day of the sale. This means that the signs are not to be placed throughout the city at various intersections and nailed to trees or utility poles.

Tabloid mentality pervades media

I'd have a far easier chance of finding the Holy Grail and Ponce de Leon's fountain of youth than convincing readers of this column of the merits of two startling improbabilities: 1) Mark Twain was gay, and 2) Notre Dame's football coach Lou Holtz abused his players, tolerated steroid use and recruited academically unqualified players.

Is nothing sacred? In today's cruddy tabloid environment, no.

The allegation about Twain's reputed homosexuality was reported in a 37-inch story in last week's Chronicle of Higher Education. For several weeks, the media had rightly ignored this Alice-in-Wonderland speculation from last month's conference at Elmira College Center for Mark Twain Studies.

The paper's author, Andy Hoffman, conceded, as the Chronicle reported, that "he has no proof for his thesis (that Twain was gay), and he doubts that any will ever be found."

When one critic at the conference proposed a homoerotic tie between Huck and Jim in "Huckleberry Finn," Hoffman said with a straight face: "I felt it was important to bring out something that couldn't be proved because it seems to open some important critical avenues." So does Moses coming down from Mt. Sinai with the Ten Commandments.

After the participants had discussed all of this hearsay gobbledygook, one member of the group whacked them with a reality check: "Don't you academic yobbos have anything else to occupy yourself with besides such trivial speculation?"

If Twain had been gay, I think that would have been very hip. He would have joined the pantheon of other great gay writers. But his sexual preference deserves authenticated respect, not the pipe dreams of some ivory-towered fantasizer.

On the other hand, Notre Dame's football coach Lou Holtz was the unfortunate target of a story with putative documentation -- interviews with ex-

football players.

According to Don Yaeger and Doug Looney, authors of a new book, "Under the Tarnished Dome," Notre Dame reportedly overlooked alleged excesses that would have brought down administrative wrath on Holtz's elfin golden locks at another university.

But the authors offer a logical speculation for the reason Notre Dame tolerated Holtz's alleged abuses -- its obsession with being No. 1. Bring back the mythic days of Knute Rockne; let America wallow again in Ronald Reagan's lachrymose performance as "the glipper."

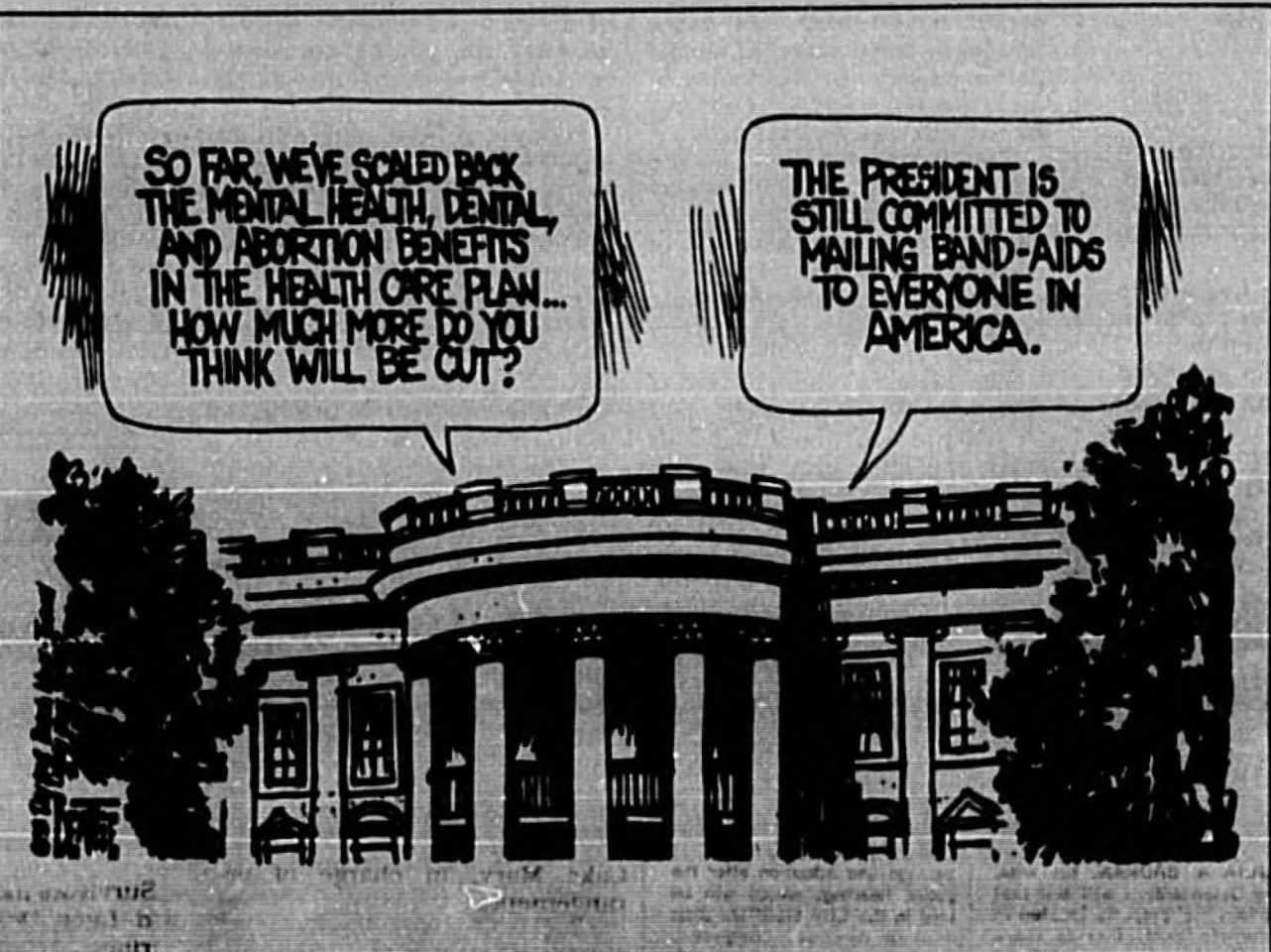
If the Chronicle's story about Twain's undocumented homosexuality repeatedly used the word "suggested," the USA Today story about Holtz's alleged excesses used the contraction "might've" four times. Not "did," but might have done.

So much for accuracy and fairness in reporting.

In the national craze for titillation, we are diminishing journalistic and scholarly standards. Eventually, students and readers will pay a terrible price for our loss of values.

Crime families in all-out war

PHILADELPHIA — Members of the Bruno-Scarfo organized crime family in Philadelphia are shooting each other at a rate unseen in U.S. mob warfare for more than a decade. What worries some organized-crime experts is the possibility that this Philadelphia mob war is a prelude to a battle for power among the major crime families in New York.

The latest incident in this sharply escalating conflict was played out on Aug. 31 in morning rush-hour traffic on the busy Schuylkill Expressway. A stolen van pulled alongside the Cadillac Seville of Bruno Scarfo boss John Stanfa, 52, and gunmen opened up with automatic weapons in plain sight of hundreds of commuters. Amazingly, Stanfa was not hit, but his son Joseph, 23, riding in the back seat, was struck once in the face. He will survive.

Within the family and law enforcement circles, it was immediately understood that the brazen attempt on Stanfa was retaliation for several hits and near misses he has ordered in recent months.

The Bruno-Scarfo family is very active in New Jersey and has been the main target of the New Jersey State Police for two decades. After the botched Stanfa hit, Col. Justin Dintimo, State Police superintendent, said: "You have to understand this is an all-out mob war, something we haven't seen in many, many years. These guys don't have the time to plan and plot and lure someone into a trap. They're going to have to take their shot whenever the opportunity presents itself."

The present situation traces itself back to the summer of 1990 when the New Jersey State Police wrapped up "Operation Broadsword," probably the deepest penetration of an organized crime family by a police operative. In this case, George Fresolone, a high-ranking Bruno-Scarfo family member, turned against the family, becoming an actual police agent. Among the 47 indicted was Anthony "Tony Buck" Piccolo, the acting boss of the family who ran things while Nicky Scarfo Sr. was in jail.

After Piccolo's arrest, Joseph "Chickie" Ciancaglino, an old-line mobster serving 45 years for racketeering, sent word that — on behalf of the old-timers who had been close to Angelo Bruno before he was killed in 1980 — he was putting his son Joseph Jr. up for the post of acting boss, a kind of caretaker for the imprisoned Scarfo.

But John Gottl, in New York, moved quickly. He had the power to name Piccolo's successor, and he chose Stanfa, not as "acting" boss, but as boss.

Stanfa comes from Sicily, and was born in the same small town as legendary crime boss Carlo Gambino. He was initiated into the Mafia as a very young man in Sicily, but then had to flee. He came here, settled in Brooklyn, and began working in the Gambino crime family in

New York. He did not like New York and wanted to live with a cousin in Philadelphia. So Gambino himself called Angelo Bruno and asked if he would take the young man into his family. Bruno had no choice but to say yes.

The night Bruno was murdered in 1980, he was being driven by Stanfa. Police suspected he was involved, but he was not, and in fact was lucky to have escaped. When Nicky Scarfo took over, he shunted Stanfa aside because he did not trust him. In fact none of the old-timers trusted Stanfa, believing his loyalty was to the Gambinos.

Shortly after Stanfa was placed in control, he formally initiated Joseph "Skinny Joey" Merlino into the family. He did so to thumb his nose at Nicky Scarfo Sr., because it was widely believed in the family that Joey Merlino was the one who had shot Nicky Scarfo Jr. 11 times in a failed 1989 mob hit. But in "making" Merlino, Stanfa created a major problem for himself.

It is now generally believed that Merlino has become the leader of some 15 to 20 young mobsters, many the sons and nephews of the old guard who had been around Anthony Bruno. The guiding hand behind these young Turks appears to be "Chickie" Ciancaglino — from his jail cell.

In early 1992, Stanfa started to clean house. He ordered a number of the old-timers killed, and narrowly missed killing Joseph Ciancaglino Jr., who was hit three times but survived an assassination attempt. Then, on Aug. 5, Michael Ciancaglino was gunned down while he was walking with Joey Merlino, who survived the attack.

The word on the street in Philadelphia is that Ciancaglino "reached out" for "Fat Tony" Salerno, the elderly boss of the Genovesi crime family, also now in prison. With John Gottl and several other top family members in jail, the power of the Gambino family is in decline. Many believe that Merlino and his young Turks are being supported by the Genoveses, who want to see Stanfa taken down as a way of further downgrading the influence of the Gambinos. As such, the mob violence could escalate into a war in New York to see who will emerge as the most powerful of the crime families there.

Use of seized asset funds causes problems

WASHINGTON — Putting the profit motive into police work earned the seven-man police force of Little Compton, R.I., a \$4 million jackpot from the Justice Department's asset forfeiture program.

The Justice Department requires that cash and property seized in a drug bust be used for drug enforcement purposes. Little Compton police chief Egbert Hawes is one of the program's biggest proponents: "I think (asset forfeiture) is the greatest thing in drug enforcement," he told us.

But an internal Justice Department report suggests that Little Compton's cops have some novel notions of what constitutes drug enforcement. According to a recent Inspector General report reviewed by our associate Andrew Conte, Hawes made several questionable purchases including teddy bears and T-shirts, office furniture for the town council, a Fourth of July fireworks display, a copying machine for the tax assessor and a wood chipper. After Hurricane Bob lashed the town with tree limbs, drug money was used to buy a wood chipper, but there was one proviso: the chips were placed along the berm of the police department's new rifle range.

Hawes had the police station deloused, and the fire trucks painted, according to the report. There was a TV and a VCR for the town center. A new pickup truck for the maintenance department. The town hall got hearing aid speakers and the school buses got communication radios. In all, Justice Department investigators determined over \$40,000 of seized drug money was misspent by the police department, and must be returned.

Since receiving \$1.9 million of its bounty (the balance of the \$4 million is due to arrive soon), the police force spent some of the money on two Pontiac Firebirds, two jeeps equipped with video cameras and body detection devices, nine \$500 bulletproof vests and 14 \$400 Smith and Wesson guns with laser sites. The inspector general didn't criticize these expenditures.

"Many of my officers were working overtime and not being paid overtime ... we weren't doing any of this to receive assets. We did it because it was good law enforcement," Hawes argued.

According to the Justice Department report, the inspectors were concerned about the matter of lax management: "The (Little Compton Police Department) lacked sufficient internal controls to ensure that shared property and property purchased with sharing funds are adequately safeguarded. The absence of effective controls could lead to waste, loss and misappropriation of sharing inventories."

In a series of columns on asset forfeiture, we have reported that since 1985, the Justice Department has reaped nearly \$2.6 billion in cash and property from the program. About \$600 million of it has been returned to individual federal agencies and \$1 billion to state and local police like the Little Compton police force.

"When the Little Compton, R.I., police force received \$3.8 million seized from a drug bust ... (the money) did little to address the root causes of drug use and addiction," Rep. John Conyers Jr., D-Mich., who has chaired hearings on proposed changes in the forfeiture laws, told us. "Welcome to the arcane and irrational world of the civil asset forfeiture laws."

Asset forfeiture has turned the government's war on drugs into a high-stakes bounty hunt.

Sanford has been accepted as an official Florida Main Street Community.

The recent team featured Doug Loescher, program associate for the National Main Street Program, Phillip Wisley, preservation architect with the state program, and Bob Treacott, state coordinator for Main Street.

Sanford Main Street co-chairman Chris Cranias moderated the event and called for questions from the audience.

Treacott explained, "I'm pleased that we are starting this program now. We are much better aware of our needs in the 90s than we may have been had it started in the 70s."

"There are a lot of things to do," he said, "but Sanford has a lot of things to work with."

Among them he cited the good resources which he sees as a good potential toward excellent progress. "Noticeable," he said, "is the interrelationships between the various groups in Sanford, including the Main Street people, SHDWA, Waterfront Committee, downtown merchants, city officials, and many others."

"But this is not a project between groups," he stressed, "it is going to involve the whole community, using the Main Street program as a catalyst with which to accomplish progress."

"Look at the various organizations we have," Cranias said. "It

appears as though we have a duplication of problems. That's why Main Street has been formed. It will eliminate duplication, and unify all residents into one organization with representatives from each of the various groups."

Both prior to and following the public meeting, the officials toured the downtown area and met with business leaders.

Treacott said he was very impressed with the resources as well as the people in Sanford.

"You have an excellent lakefront area," he observed, "which is something most of our Main Street cities do not have, and it can be to your advantage."

Responding to a question regarding when the project would get underway, Loescher commented, "This is just the beginning. This is a long, long, ongoing process. There is no definite conclusion. It's actually a management program which will affect all of the community."

Later in the meeting, Cranias explained further, "This will not be a quick-fix for Sanford. After we get going and expand, it is something we will be doing 20 to 30 years from now."

"The first step is to obtain an overall manager. We (the Main Street Committee) have closed the acceptance of applications for the position, and after we narrow the choices down, we

will be officially announcing the new manager at the St. Lucia Festival cruise, Sunday, Sept. 28, on the Rivership Grand Romance."

Sanford resident Martha Yancy questioned, "Why, when we go to a mall, it is full of people, but in downtown Sanford, you could fire a shot and not hit anyone?"

Treacott responded by asking the audience what they had at malls. Answers were: A mixture of stores; long hours of operation; safety; parking convenience; newer fashions; a different mix of products; air conditioned stores.

"These things don't just happen at a mall," Treacott explained, "they are arranged by a mall management team, and that's exactly what your new manager will be responsible for doing in downtown Sanford."

Loescher commented, "Let's face it. Downtown Sanford will never be the single place to shop as it was 20 years ago. It must become the center of cultural and public involvement."

"It may never be a complete center," Treacott added, "but it is important that we keep all elements in the downtown area. When people come to city hall, they may also want to go shopping, and this will be the ideal place."

"Is anything going to be done to get more business into downtown Sanford," Yancy

asked? "It starts with a market analysis," Treacott said, "then when we see the potential we have, the local program may be able to start recruiting new business."

"Regarding the mall," he added, "we won't be fighting them. Rather, we will be working closely with the mall's developers in a cooperative effort toward getting additional business downtown."

City Manager Bill Simmons asked how the Sanford Main Street program success might be measured.

"There are various ways," Loescher said. "Through economic indicators, the quality of living, our perception of the downtown area, and the number of people on our downtown

sidewalks."

He added, "Let's look at it this way. If we have no more people downtown five years from now than we do today, we haven't been making much progress."

Cranias displayed a map of Sanford showing the area in which the Sanford Main Street program plans to work. The line, running out on Lake Monroe north of the Holiday Inn, goes east to the Cypress Avenue line, south to 3rd Street, west to Elm Avenue, and back north to the lakefront.

"Our next big project is an event to be held right here in Sanford at the Holiday Inn on Oct. 7 and 8. It's a two-day training for all cities throughout the state which are Main Street communities. This will be

driving people in from all across Florida, as well as many state and national Main Street experts. That's when your new manager and your people will begin to learn how the program works," Treacott explained.

At the conclusion of the gathering, Treacott, speaking on behalf of Secretary of State Jim Smith, presented the official plaque designating Sanford as a Florida Main Street Community.

"The secretary himself will be on hand for the October meetings," he said, "but he wanted the city to have this now as it prepares for what I believe will be future success in the program."

The plaque was accepted on behalf of the city by Mayor Bettye Smith.

On Thursday night, the Lions' "well-rounded" approach confounded the Greyhounds.

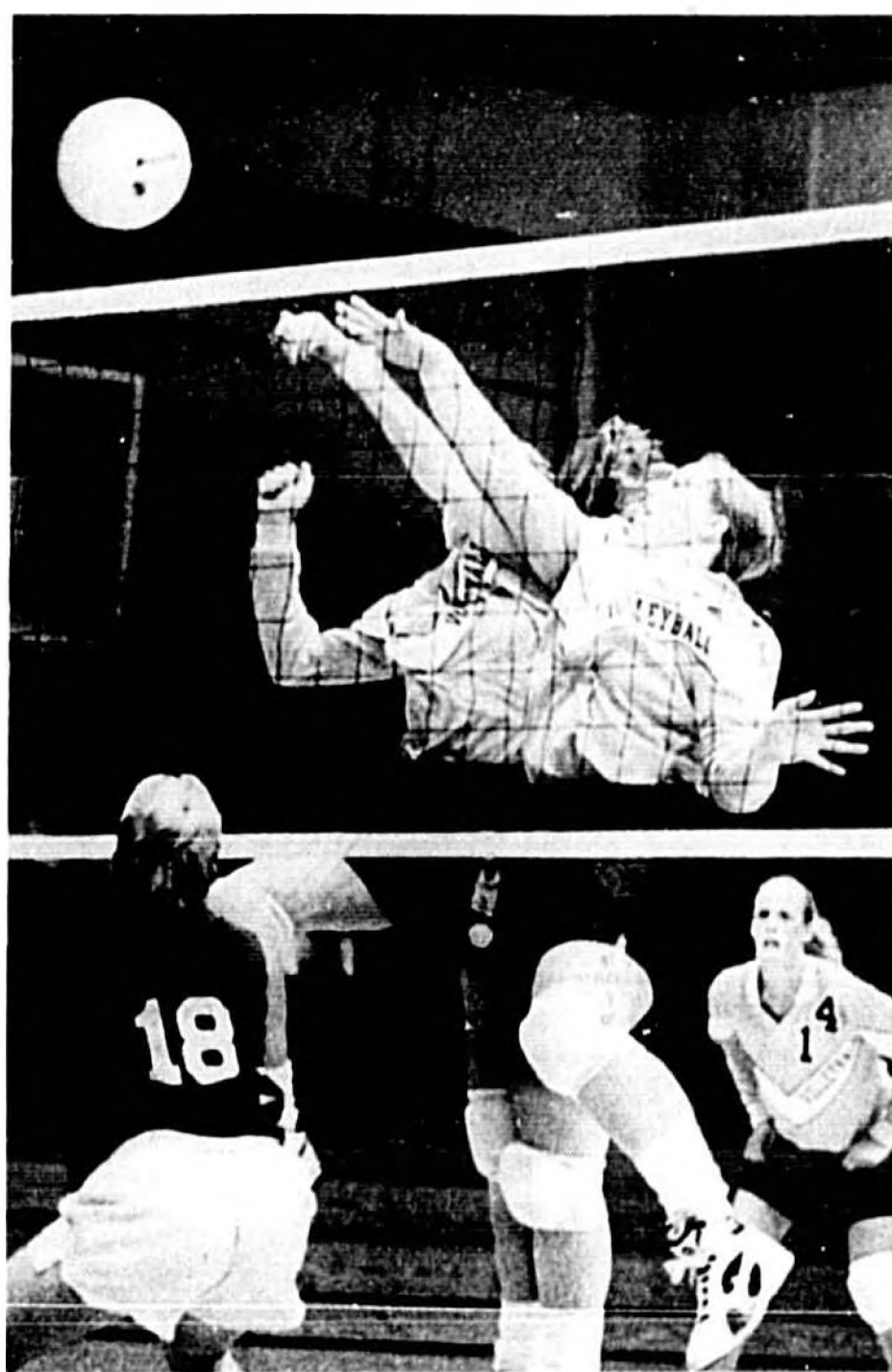

Warranties: What do they promise?

When planning to buy any home appliances as a gift, be aware of warranties. A warranty is a guarantee. It's a commitment that the manufacturer and the retailer will stand behind the product.

Sometimes a warranty is made through a written or oral statement. That's called an express warranty. Other times the law itself imposes a warranty. That's called an implied warranty. With an implied warranty, the manufacturer or retailer may have some legal responsibility for the product even if they've said nothing on the subject.

Service for appliances may also be warranted. Service warranties are almost always express rather than implied.

Express warranties are statements and promises a manufacturer or retailer makes about a product — or a commitment to remedy problems with the product. If the statements are untrue or if the commitment isn't honored, the buyer may sue for breach of warranty. Similarly, if a seller shows a customer a sample or model of goods being sold, there's an express warranty that the goods will conform.

Warranties often are written rather than oral. A written statement doesn't have to be called a warranty to be legally treated as such. Statements made in product literature or in advertising can be binding warranties.

Written warranties on consumer products are covered both by state laws, such as The Uniform Commercial Code, which has been adopted by every state, and the Magnuson-Moss law doesn't require you to give any written warranty at all. If given one, however, businesses must comply with the law and Federal Trade Commission (FTC) rules.

On consumer products covered by the federal law, a written warranty must be in simple, understandable language. You need to make the warranty terms available to the buyer before the sale occurs. This can be done, for example, by displaying the warranty near the product or keeping it in a looseleaf binder in the department where you sell the product.

Implied warranties. These don't come from anything a seller says or does. They arise automatically when a product is sold. Under the UCC, there are two kinds of implied warranties:

1. A warranty that the product is fit for its ordinary uses, and
2. A warranty that the product is fit for the customer's intended uses, if the seller selects the product for a customer.

The first implied warranty — that the goods sold "are fit for the ordinary purposes for which such goods are sold" — means what it says: The product will work the way similar products ordinarily work. A stepladder, for example, isn't fit for its ordinary purpose if it won't support a 225-pound person. And a toaster isn't fit if it makes only light toast.

The second type of implied warranty occurs if the seller has reason to know that (1) the goods are required for a particular purpose, and (2) the buyer is relying on the seller's skill or judgment to select suitable goods.

When a warranty has been breached, what can the buyer do about it? Under the UCC, the buyer usually can return the merchandise and seek a full refund. However, the manufacturer or retailer bound by the warranty has the right to fix the merchandise or replace it.

A customer who prefers to keep the merchandise can do so and sue for direct economic loss — generally, the amount by which the value of the product has been reduced because it's defective.

A buyer may also be entitled to damages for lost profits due to a product's failure. And, of course, people hurt by a defective product that has been subjected to only ordinary use can seek compensation for their injuries.

If you have a problem with an appliance, your first step is to check the Use and Care Booklet that came with the appliance. Check such things as plugs, fuses, pilots and controls. There also may be a section in the Use and Care Booklet on problems and how to correct them.

If you can't solve the problem yourself, call your dealer or service agency authorized to fix the brand you own.

If you aren't satisfied contact the appliance manufacturer's customer relations office.

If none of the first three steps solves your problem, then write MACAP, Major Appliance Consumer Action Panel, 20 North Wacker Drive, Chicago, IL 60608.

Why we need to clean up television

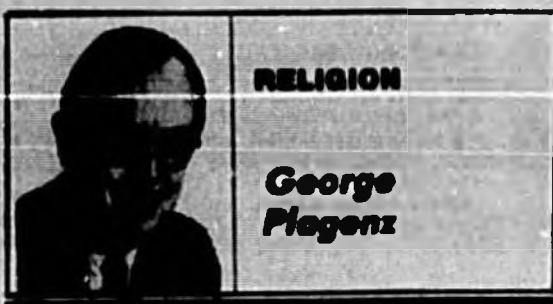
As long as we continue to believe "the myth of the off-on button," we will not get anywhere in our efforts to clean up television.

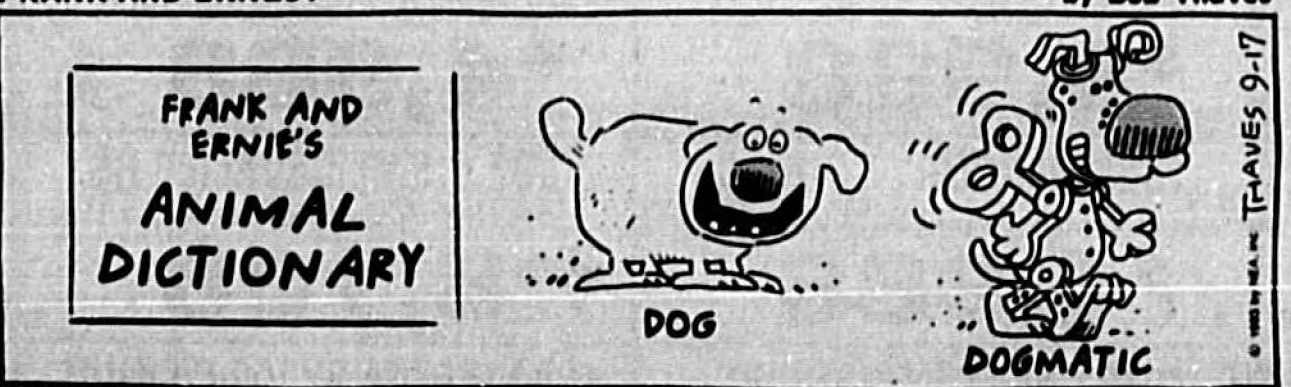

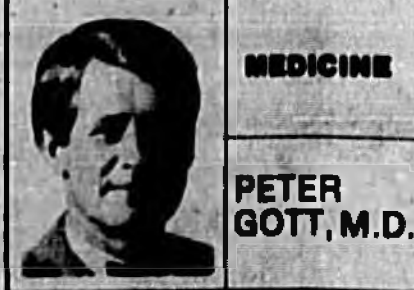

Childhood disease resembles rubella



MEDICINE

DEAR DR. GOTT: Please discuss fifth disease.

DEAR READER: Fifth disease (erythema infectiosum), an acute, contagious infection in children, produces fever and rash. It is caused by the human parvovirus B19. It resembles rubella (German measles), from which it can be differentiated by blood tests. The affliction is harmless and requires no therapy.

Fifth disease was so named because it was the fifth most common childhood disease (after measles, mumps, rubella and chickenpox).

DEAR DR. GOTT: Please discuss migraine headaches. Can excessive rest, sleep, or diet be a contributing factor to the condition?

DEAR READER: Migraine is a common affliction, marked by recurring attacks of throbbing headache, often associated with visual abnormalities (flashing lights, sensitivity to bright lights and spots of blindness), intestinal complaints (nausea, vomiting) and assorted symptoms (tingling, weakness of face or extremities).

Although the cause is unknown, many experts believe that migraine is the result of inappropriate dilation and contraction of blood vessels in and around the brain, perhaps related to a genetic predisposition, probably the consequence of chemicals, such as serotonin, in the brain.

The headaches may last for hours or days and occur infrequently or daily. They are often incapacitating. The diagnosis is made by the history of the attacks. Treatment is not altogether satisfactory. Rest in a dark room and narcotic pills may help the acute attack, as may a new product, sumatriptan, that patients can learn to inject at the first sign of headache.

Most physicians encourage

migraine-sufferers to take preventive medicine -- such as beta-blockers, calcium channel blockers or ergot/caffeine preparations -- to ward off the headaches. Some authorities recommend biofeedback. Because migraine is chronic, such patients may have to use preventive drugs indefinitely, as

well as analgesics when necessary. If early studies (showing sumatriptan to be effective) are confirmed by widespread success, this medication may become the treatment of choice.

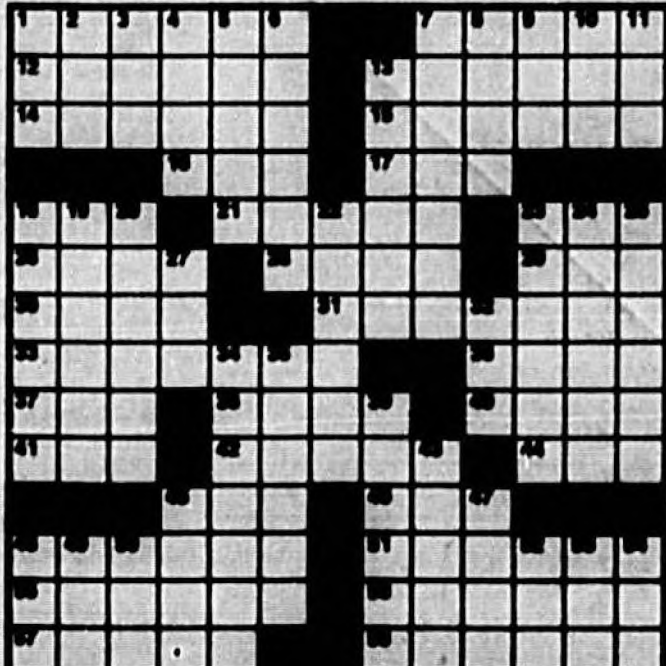

WIN AT BRIDGE

In 1985 I spent some months in New Zealand. It is such a beautiful country. While there, I played bridge a few times with David Mathews. Now he is in England and I'm glad to see he hasn't lost any of his skill at the game. He declared today's deal while representing the county where he lives.

South's four-diamond rebid is debatable. What about that club support for partner? And it isn't clear to me that North's four no-trump should be Blackwood, because no suit has been agreed. But obviously they knew what they were doing.

Mathews won the spade lead with dummy's ace and played a trump to his ace, getting the bad news. Faced with one club and two heart losers, how could declarer possibly get home?

Mathews hoped to win these 12 tricks: one spade, five hearts, four diamonds and two clubs. At trick three, South led a heart from hand, West splitting his honors to force dummy's queen. As declarer needed West to have four diamonds, it was logical to play him for the queen. So Mathews led a club to his king and ran the diamond jack successfully. A diamond to dummy's 10, the diamond ace, a spade ruff in hand, the diamond king and a club to dummy's ace followed.

South was left with the K-9 of hearts and a club. West held the J-7-6 of hearts. When a club was led, West was forced to ruff East's winner and play into declarer's trump tenace. In an international event, Mathews would have won a brilliancy prize for this beautiful piece of declarer-play.
