### Defense Unit Has Successful Test Of Mobilization

Defense Force, commanded by Maj. Norman B. Gibbs of Fernandina, conducted a test mobilization and practice field problem Sunday, Brig. Gen. Vivian Collins announced last night.

The exercises were held in the coastal area of northern St. Johns County in connection with a practice problem in security measures conducted by the Army, General Collins said.

A command post, first aid station and communications center were established at the State Arsenal at St. Augustine under the command of Col. Edward C. Rose of the Army. Troops were moved into the area in Army trucks furnished by Camp Blandin.

Units of the Third Battalion participating in the maneuver were Company A, commanded by Capt. U. V. Milligan, Fernandina; Company B, Capt. Oscar K. Kirk, Jacksonville; Company C, Capt. James A. Williams, Jacksonville; Company D, Capt. Giles C. Randall, St. Augustine; and Company E, Capt. Charles J. Herrington, Palatka.

**Everglades Sugar Crop Is Threatened**

CLEWISTON, Feb. 8. (AP)—Labor shortages are threatening the Everglades sugar crop, which was expected to produce a record 100,000 tons this year.

Joy W. Morgan, president of the United States Sugar Corporation, said the company needed 1500 additional workers but was unable to find them.

"We in Florida are experiencing the shortage of farm labor that will strike the whole country in a few months," he said. "Florida needs help now."

The United States Sugar Corporation is one of the largest sugar producers in the country.

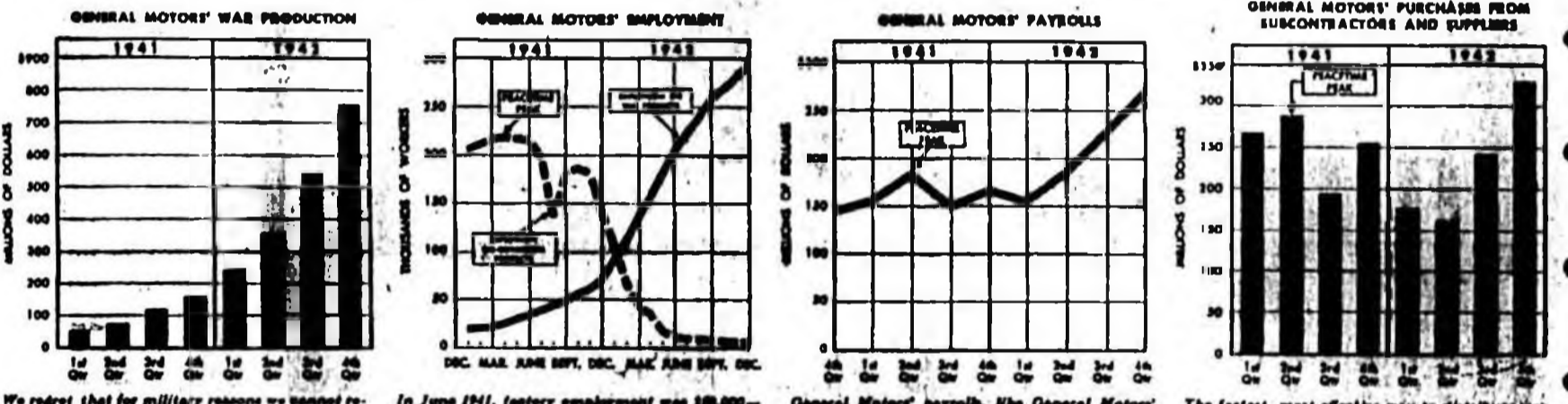

# JAPANESE EVACUATE GUADALCANAL

## Red Ski Troopers Press Southward Into Donets Basin

**After Taking Kursk, Armies Smash Anew At Three Sagging Lines Of Germans**

The Russians smashed anew at sagging German lines in three sectors after storming into Kursk, the enemy's main point on the Moscow-Orlita rail line, and destroying a Nazi army there.

Kharkov also was menaced by envelopment tactics while mobile units and ski troopers pressed southward into the Donets Basin and toward the Sea of Azov.

Above Rostov the Germans were reported counter-attacking while rest of the city Soviet troops took a large unidentified place. Red army units were reported to be held by 250,000 Axis troops. Another 200,000 were cut off in the western Caucasus.

Sweeping westward with unprecedented speed, the Red army has recaptured the pivotal city of Kursk, a major battle in the battle line. The winter defense line has fanned out over a tremendous area and is threatening vital objectives both to the north and south.

Now however, the triumphant Soviet army is attacking the city of Kharkov, a special campaign announced last night, making an advance of 24 miles from Zolotukhino and other towns north and west of the city.

As the crumbling of this northern pivot of the Nazi defense line was announced, pressure was increased on the southern front. The Nazi defenses at Rostov, gateway to the Caucasus, where the Russians are besieging the city from the south and another column is driving down from the north.

Kursk was occupied after "a violent attack" assisted by an encircling movement from the southwest, said the special communiqué as recorded here by the Soviet Monitor.

The announcement came as a surprise for previous Russian communiqués had indicated that Kursk was under direct attack. Kursk is a key point on the Moscow-Orlita rail line and is a vital point in the line.

## Navy Says Axis Resistance On Key Island Has Ceased

**Signal Corps Man Against Seining St. Johns River**

Stating that the people at home are taking advantage of men who are in uniform and serving in the armed forces away from Sanford, Charles H. Powell, Signal Corps, in a letter to The Herald says that the St. Johns River should not be opened to commercial fishermen for seining.

Mr. Powell, who lives in Plant City, N. Y., commended the Navy edition which was published Jan. 25 and said that some of the men were in the employ of the war is over.

Mr. Powell's letter follows: "I want to add a few notes (myself and family) on representative men's real concerns, opposed to the opening of the St. Johns River to Commercial fishermen for seining."

"I think they are pretty poor sports that would try to put something like that over while men are away from their homes (Sanford) doing their bit to win this war, and are not home to have their say in the matter."

"It seems to me, with all the help that is needed in the defense of this Nation by those who are in uniform, that it is not fair to let those who are in uniform to do more for their country by going to work. And let the fish take care of themselves, and when this war is over we can all go back home and enjoy fishing again."

"If some of the people in Sanford were up here and couldn't go fishing because there isn't any fish, they would appreciate what Sanford has to offer in sports that you can't get anywhere else you go."

"One of the first things a man up here wants to know when he finds out that the war is over is 'How is the fishing down there?'"

"I showed your recent Special Edition of The Herald to some of the men here in uniform, and they were amazed to learn that a base got larger than four or five pages. And I have heard several say that they were going to Florida to live when the war is over. So I still think the St. Johns should not be opened to commercial fishing. These are my views on the matter and also every other true sportsman."

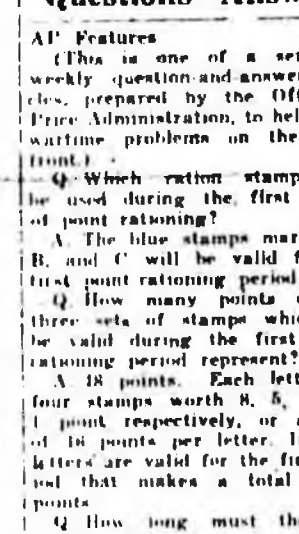

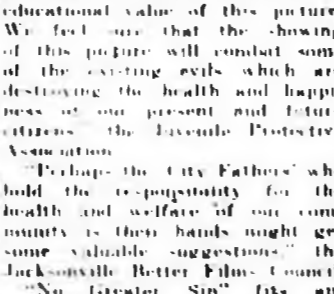

 Johnson was born the eighteenth of September in 1709, we all should remember.

 He lost for a time the sight of one eye, and the other was weak, but he did not cry.  
 He buckled right down, and won out in the end. With a good sense of humor, which is rare among men.  
 From sixteen to eighteen he resided at home. And learned very much when he did not roam.  
 He did not like Greek, but loved Latin art. And also the marvelous works of Petrarch.  
 Michael, his father, had books and could relate many. But as to money, they didn't have any.  
 A kind wealthy neighbor sent Samuel to college. Where he, of course, gained some more knowledge.  
 At Oxford his clothes were ragged and old. And his shoes all needed to be half-soled.  
 He was ready to become a Bachelor of Art. When his luck ran out and he had to depart.  
 Michael died in the winter of 1711. And left his property, twenty pounds to his one and only son.  
 He said that he had been mad all his life. Which was caused by his lonely life.  
 Samuel was sick of life, but afraid of death. Although he had nothing in the wide world left.  
 He became usher at a grammar school. Which was rather unusual, as a school.  
 He wrote a book then which he thought was good. But no one bought it, as he thought they should.  
 While leading this vagrant and miserable life. Samuel decided to find him a wife.  
 Mrs. Elizabeth Porter, his wife to be. Was a widow and had children as old as he.  
 She appeared to all just short and fat. Wearing gaudy clothes and a funny hat.  
 When she died at the age of thirty. Poor Samuel was lonesome to the core.  
 At an academy he hoped to train many a lad. But after eighteen months, three was all he had.  
 At twenty-eight, he tried to sell his manuscript "Irene". But not a soul would buy it, so no hope of money was seen.

 His tragedy began long before, was brought into the stage. His "Irene" was the worst produced in that age.  
 After "Irene" he wrote "The Ranelagh" full of smart sayings. On morals, manners, and queer men's ways.  
 In the Spring of 1750, Johnson could not sleep. He was so full of ideas, and he was so full of life.
