## School board settles

The Lakeview Middle School students, now aged 17-18, claimed they were mulested by Stephen A. Patterson from

Patterson, who has since resigned, was arrested in February 1993 and was later sentenced to one year in jail after pleading no contest to four counts of lewd and lascivious behavior.

The school board will vote on the settlement at its meeting today at 7 p.m. at the Educational Support Center, 400 E. Lake Mary Blvd., Sanford.

Commissioner Thom Greene said late Monday that he had signed the addendum and that the appeal would not be filed.



# Record number of holiday travelers, AAA predicts

HEATHROW-Santa and his reindeer may have trouble navigating the highways and skyways this holiday as a record 44.5 million people expect to travel 100 miles or more from home during the Christmas-New Year's period, according to AAA.

Christmas-New Year's travel has increased 26 percent. telling us that the holiday period has become more than just a time to get together with family and friends--it's a time to vacation, as well," said Graeme Clarke, senior vice president, AAA Travel Related Services.

Beltran was charged with one count each of unauthorized copying of articles on which sounds are recorded and vending goods with counterfeit

McDonough said Beltran had been under investigation for the past four months. He is ac-

cused of selling copies for \$10 each of first-run movies such as "Men in Black," "Independence Day," Twister," and "Casino."

Beltran has been suspended with pay pending the conclusion of an internal investigation. He has served as a deputy at the county jail

Unauthorized copying is a third degree felony with a maximum penalty of five years in prison. Selling goods with counterfeit trademarks is a first degree misdemeanor witha maximum penalty of one year in prison. McDonough said.

Beltran was released Monday after posting a \$500 bond.







This is the first of two public hearings on the matter. Tonight is for discussion and input only.

When it meets on Jan. 13, the Board of Commissioners will vote on sites and may approve the "grandfathering" of eight legally-existing adult entertainment businesses in the Fern Park/Casselberry area.

The owners of these businesses have been co-operating with the county to make changes in the appearance of their buildings. The "infamous" horses at Circus-Circus have been removed, and other changes are taking place.

Michael Pinter owner of Club Juana, said that his business has operated at the sime location for 32 years and he had no desire to move to Sanford or any other area. He would entertain being bought out by the county but the price would be very high.

the commissioners are leaning toward grandfathering," Morris said. (Win Adams and Dary) McLain might vote this way with Morris). Unless grandfathered, the clubs must close or relocate by late 1999 - this the result of a new adult entertainment ordinance adopted by

the commission in June. In June, also, the board directed staff to produce an inventory of alternative sites within unincorporated Seminole County for potential location of adult entertainment establishments.

By law the county has to provide adequate locations for adult establishments (adequate alternative avenues of expression or communication) that are protected under First Amendment guarantees as expressed by authoritative nilings of courts.

The county may enter joint planning agreements with a municipality or municipalities which provides for multijurisdictional siting of adult clube

in certain areas whether incorporated or unincorporated.

From the time county staff began identifying sites, the majority were in the Sanford area. The city itself had designated areas near the Orlando Sanford Airport as possible rezoning locations, and 158 acres east of the airport were approved by the commission.

The board will discuss tonight whether to retain the airport site or to approve two or possibly three other locations in west Sanford that were suggested by Commissioner McLain as an alternative for the airport area acreage. It is these three sites that caused a problem within the community. The Rev. Jimmy Dale Patter-

son and members of Central Baptist Church immediately railied by mailing letters of protest to the commission. Patterson said he will speak at tonight's meeting.

Sanford Mayor Larry Dale will explain the city's position.

# Reno is not fit for her post

Her decision could have been announced a year ago. It was then that Attorney General Janet Reno decided that under no circumstance would she seek an independent counsel to investigate campaign finance lawbreaking by high-ranking members of the Ulinton administration, up to and including the president and vice president

It was the unspoken pact she made with the president as a condition of being reappointed to the job she cher-ished. Indeed, it was no secret inside the Beltway that Clinton was ready to kick Reno to the curb because she was not the "team player" he had hoped she'd be during his first term tas evi-denced, the White House felt, by the five independent counsels she sicced on various members of the adminis-

tration, including the first couple).

But Reno could not simply and quickly diamins brazen violations of campaign finance and federal election laws. That would be too obvious for a woman who enjoyed a reputation undeserved, it turns out - for being incorruptable.

She had to pretend, at least, to conduct a thorough investigation of these crimes before announcing this week that neither of her bosses, the president and vice president, nor any other high ranking members of the Clinton administration did anything whatsoever to warrant appointment of an independent counsel.

Of course, to arrive at this finding. to do the bidding of the president who reappointed her, Reno had to contort herself in ways that would make Olympic gymnast Kerri Strug wince

Like her somersault on the independent counsel law. Back in 1994, when Congress renewed the law, Reno testified: "It is absolutely essential for the public to have confidence in the system, and you cannot do that when there is a conflict (of Interest) or an appearance of a conflict of interest in the person who is, in effect, the chief cutor."

And lest she failed to make herself perfectly clear to lawmakers, the attorney general added:

The independent counsel statute was meant to avoid even the appearance of impropriety in the consideration of allegations of misconduct by high-level executive branch officials and to prevent, as I have said, the actual or perceived conflicts of inter-

Now contrast those remarks with Reno's statement this past April, after



# Nesting hummingbirds need nectar

Hummingbirds ive only the American Comment. out of the 338 known species, only 3 occur in Florida. One specie, the ruby-throated hummingbird, is by far the most common humminghird in the state. This bird is about 3 inches long and weighs as little as 1/4 ounce. Only the mature male has the red throat feathers. Young or mature birds of both sexes, have metallic green backs and white-tipped feathers.

Nesting: Although, some birds may stay in south Florida year-round, most winter in Mexico and South America. Males arrive in Florida in March and the females follow them about a week later. Nesting in Florida begins in April. The nest is a walnut-size structure of plant materials, adorned with lichens, moss, and bound with spider webs or fine plant fibers. Nests frequently are built over water. The female lays 2 eggs less than 1/2 inch long. After 20



days of incubation and 4 weeks birds leave the nest.

Flying: One of the most fascinating things about hummingbirds is their helicopterlike flying stunts. Not only can they suspend their bodies in midair but, they also can fly backward, and upward. The humming sound is made by their rapid wing movements of 50-200 beats per second.

Fooding: To acquire enough strength to support all of this high speed activity, hummingbirds need to consume large amounts of high energy food. ingbirde feed priot Artificial

feeders will attract hummingbirds. Because feeders can be placed almost anywhere, they increase your opportunities to view them from inside your house. However, feeders should not be the sole source of food provided because the sugar solution provides very little nourishment. Nectar is much sugar. Packages of instant nectar may be found at many garden stores. You also can prepare your own solution with 1 part white, granulated cane sugar to 4 parts water. Boil the augar solution to help dissolve the sugar. Then allow it to cool before filling a feeder. This concentration is about the same as that in wildflower nectar. The birds will be attracted to the red feeders. Several different feeder styles are available and most feeders come with bee guards. Although hummingbirds will feed right

#### Hummingbirds gerdesing: To keep hummingbirds around your house, you must provide them with plants that bloom most of the year. It is best to plant a variety of species that will bloom at different times during the year. The ideal flower colors are red, orange, or pink. Generally, tubular flowers hold large amounts of nectar at their base. Nesting hummingbirds will need nectar from March to September. therefore, your garden should



# Milky discharge may indicate tumor

age 53, has no health insurance and hesitates to seek medical attention except for emergencies. Recently, she has suffered from headaches and a milky discharge from her breasts. Should she see a doctor?

DEAR READER: Without a doubl. Her symptoms suggest a pituitary

The pituitary sland sits deep in the brain and regulates the hormones produced by many bodily organs. including the adrenal and thyroid glands. It also governs production of the sex hormones, as well as milk production in women. The combination of headache and a milky breast discharge in a middle-aged woman indicates the possibility that your sister in law may have a prolactino ma, a benign tumor in the pituitary gland. Milk production can also be caused by hypothyroidism, certain prescription drugs and other more serious pituitary growths.

In any case, your sister in law needs a medical exam, blood tests and an MRI scan, if a protectinoma is present. it may have to be removed, although many cases respond to drug therapy. especially with bromocriptine

Unfortunately, the necessary testing can be expensive. However, in my view, it is imperative that she have







2 cups sifted allpurpose flour

Preheat the oven to 350 degrees F. with a rack in the middle. In a medium bowl, stir together the flour, sugar and salt. First cut in the butter with a pastry blender or 2 knives; then gently knead it in with your hands. The dough will be a little crumbly.

Press the dough into the bottom of either a 9 inch pie pan or an 8 inch square pan. Paint the top of the buttercake with a pastry brush dipped in milk.

Bake the butter-cake for 25 to 30 minutes, or until it's a pale golden brown. Let it cool for 15 minutes. Cut it into thin wedges if you used the pie pan, or into squares if you used the square pan. Serve at room temperature.







Combine sugar, flour and eggs. Blend...DO NOT **BEAT!** Melt butter and chocolate in a saucepan over medium heat add nuts and stir. Combine the two mixtures, and then add the vanilla. Blend only until the two mixtures are thoroughly blended, but DO NOT BEAT! Blend by HAND! Pour into 24 paper-lined muffin tins. Bake at 325 degrees F for 25-30 minutes. (Yields 24 cupcakes.) Decorate destred.






