WASHINGTON, Aug. 5.—(AP)—The Military Committee voted 12 to 3 today to send to the Senate floor the Burke-Wadsworth compulsory military training bill requiring registration of approximately 12,000,000 men from the ages of 21 to 30, inclusive.

Pershing Urges U. S. To Send 50 Destroyers

Endorses Compulsory Military Training For This Country In 15 Minute Talk

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5.—(AP)—John J. Pershing, declaring domestic and foreign interests were attempting to draw the United States into war, yesterday urged to an anti-war rally of 50,000 persons that America offer Europe a peace plan.

General Pershing's address was broadcast by all networks. He spoke from his suite in a hotel here.

In his 15 minute talk he again endorsed compulsory military training for the United States. Early this month he sent a letter to the Senate Military Committee opposing the Burke-Wadsworth bill for selective service.

Pershing said that it was not hysterical to say that democracy and liberty were threatened. "We are being deceived," he added, "by hiding the danger and by arguing that the danger does not exist."

Col. Lindbergh Talks To Anti- War Audience

Suggests Considering Treaties With Nations Of Europe To Assure U. S. Peace

CHICAGO, Aug. 5.—(AP)—Col. Charles Lindbergh, declaring domestic and foreign interests were attempting to draw the United States into war, yesterday urged to an anti-war rally of 50,000 persons that America offer Europe a peace plan.

Col. Lindbergh, who broke self-imposed silence Sept. 15 to oppose American entrance into the European war, spoke with Senator McCarmack of Nevada, one of the leading Democratic senate isolationists, and Representative James E. Van Zandt of Pennsylvania, three-time national commander of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, in Soldier Field. The meeting was sponsored by the Citizens' Keep Out of War committee.

While urging that America "remain fully," Lindbergh asserted no foreign nation would desire to invade the United States if it did not interfere in such a nation's affairs.

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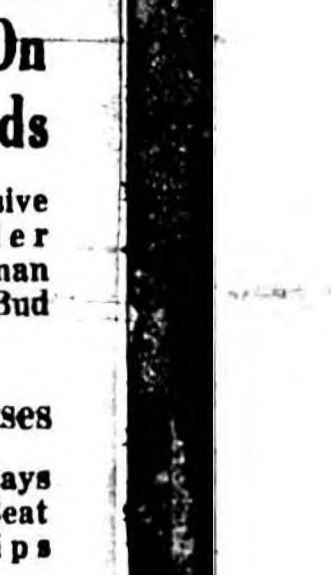

St. Augustine Overcomes Four Run Lead To Pull Out Opening Encounter; Teams Play There Tonight

The league-leading Sanford Seminoles saw their front place margin narrowed again in the second half of the nightcap as they split a double-header with St. Augustine yesterday afternoon at Municipal Park while Daytona Beach defeated Gainesville in a single game. After assuming a four run lead in the first game, the Seminoles lost the game in the fifth as the Saints came back to tie the score and to win in the seventh for a 3-4 win. Sanford took the seventh inning nightcap 3-1.

Tonight the Seminoles will play at St. Augustine and are quite likely to run smack into Dick Hearn the league's strike-out artist, who has beaten Sanford three out of five times. Hearn struck out eighteen Seminoles in his last start against them, but went down to defeat, 5-0.

On Tuesday the Orlando Nationals will come to town for a double-header and a record turn-out is expected. With the house race as tight as it is, anything is likely to happen and probably will.

Paradoxically enough Sanford outhit St. Augustine yesterday afternoon 10 to 9 in two opening games and got but two hits to five for the Saints in the second which they lost 1-0.

Sanford started out as if to sew up the first game in a hurry. After two were out in the second, Andy Johnson started the ball rolling with a double. Joe Justice drew a walk and Al Kimbrel singled to center to score Johnson and on Grealy's error in center on the play, Justice scored and Kimbrel sprang to third. Ray Hyder dropped a hit into the outfield and Kimbrel came in. Three runs were scored on four hits, a walk, and an error.

Florida Coach Will Return To Campus Aug. 10

Lieb Will Complete Preparations For Practice Sessions

GAINESVILLE, Aug. 5.—Tom Lieb, the University of Florida's new head football coach, will return to the campus Aug. 10 to complete final preparations for the Galors' opening fall practice session Sept. 2, just 22 days before Florida's crucial opening game with Mississippi State in the night of Sept. 2.

Lieb, who coached at Loyola in the middle of April, held a few brief "get acquainted" sessions with the players, and then traveled some 10,000 miles over the state, meeting players, coaches and fans, before he left at the end of June for California to complete some unfinished business. Lieb had coached at Loyola in Los Angeles for nine years before coming to Florida.

Lieb will go to Daytona Beach Aug. 19 for the annual coaching school there, serving along with Frank Leahy, Red Dawson, Bob Dodd and Adolph Rupp as instructors. The school is expected to attract a large number of college and high school coaches from Florida, Georgia and other parts of the country.

Earlier this week letters went out to 43 Galor varsity football aspirants, inviting them back to the campus Sunday, Sept. 1, prepared to don regalia for the first practice session for the following day.

Last year the Galors spent their first three weeks of fall practice at Welaka, about 18 miles south of Palatka at the University's conservation reserve, but Coach Lieb has already stated that all practice sessions will be held on the campus this fall.

Petoskey Course Record Is Tied By Ralph Stewart

Stewart, Assistant Professional To His Father, Allas Stewart, at the Sanford Country Club during the winter months recently shot a record of 68 over the Petoskey-Bay View Country Club course, Petoskey, Michigan, to tie the course record. Par for the course is 72.

In his amazing round of golf, Stewart bagged two eagles, six pars, and 10 birdies and went 10-under-par—only two holes short of the record. Stewart went one-over par on the third hole and two-over on the 10th of the 18 holes. He shot 43 on the outgoing nine and gained another 33 coming in.

The course, which is 5,083 yards in length, is considered one of Michigan's toughest layouts.

Alaska-To-Argentina Road Plans Revived

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 5.—America's defense program has revived plans for an Alaska-to-Argentina highway.

Pepper Calls Col. Lindbergh 5th Columnist

Florida Senator Says Inventor Of Mechanical Heart Can Know No Real Hurt

Flyer Is Leader Of Appeasement

'Lone Eagle's' Speech Makes Him Target Of Solon's Blast

WASHINGTON, Aug. 6.—(AP)—Senator Pepper, of Florida, yesterday denounced Col. Charles A. Lindbergh as chief of the nation's fifth columnists and suggested that "maybe the colonel would like to see American life regimented the Hitler way."

Interrupting Senate debate on a bill vesting President Roosevelt with authority to call out the National Guard, Pepper shouted: "In a few months, hours, or days, the people will have to decide between the chief of the nation's fifth columnists, the nation's ancient hero—Col. Charles A. Lindbergh, or Gen. John J. Pershing for counsel."

Lindbergh addressed a peacemongering audience in Chicago Sunday and charged domestic and foreign "interests" were trying to draw this nation into war. A few hours later Pershing told a nationwide radio audience that unless the United States made at least 50 destroyers available to Great Britain, "we shall be falling in our duty to America."

"The colonel has been a friend of Germany a long time," Pepper declared. "He might not be terrified if Germany were to report in the United States because he would know that he would not come to any harm at the hands of Hitler."

Pepper assailed the flyer for accepting a medal from the German government several years ago and said that "the man who builds a mechanical heart knows more about a human heart."

Lindbergh for several years has been experimenting with a mechanical heart, and he has been reported to have been successful in making a human heart.

Lindbergh and his associates are silent as Pepper speaks about saving his arms and pointing out to the colonel, he said, that he should be a peacemaker.

"It has not been reported that Lindbergh appeared at the meeting," Pepper replied, adding that Lindbergh appeared at the meeting at the request of Governor Wheeler and that he had not intervened several months ago.

Legion members at the meeting attacked Lindbergh as the leading 5th columnist in the United States.

Lindbergh was called a traitor and a fifth columnist for his silence during the debate on the destroyer bill.

The resolution was adopted by a vote of 100 to 10.

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Action Against "5th Columns" Asked By FDR

Willkie said that the Republican program was a brilliant one.

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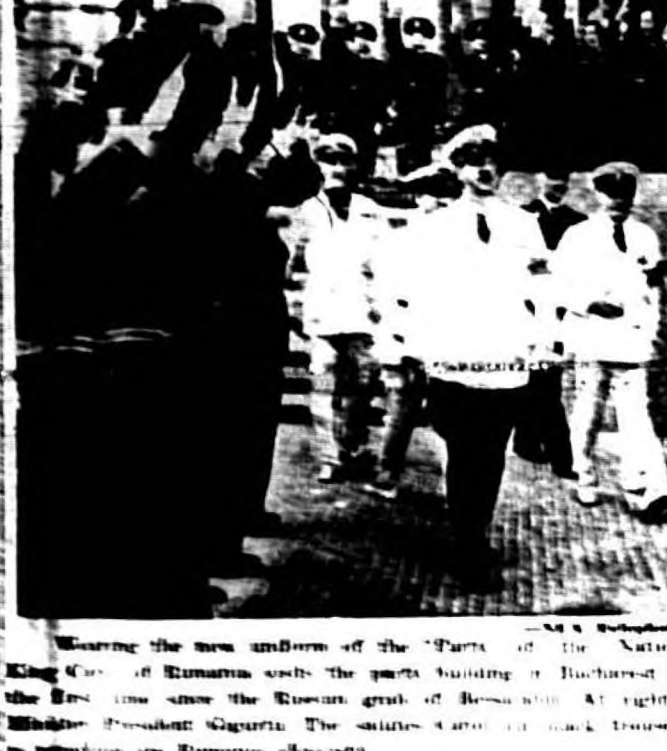
