S. dollar.

WASHINGTON (UPD) - The iohacco industry said today there is no scientific evidence to support Surgeon General Leroy E. Burney's new charge that elgaret smoking is the chief cause of long cancer, even with filtered brands

The industry suggested that the real villain might be polluted city

Burney, head of the Public Health Service, said that the weight of evidence to date implicates smoking as the "principal" cause of the nation's increased

rate of lung cancer. The surgeon general said the use of filter time has not been shown to be effective in "inaterrally reducing or eliminating the hazard of lung cancer."

De C. C. Little, scientifie director of the Tobacco Industry Research Committee, said scientulic proof was piling up "that conflicts with or fails to support the tobacco smoking theories of lung cancer."





Elizabeth Taylor Is In Hospital With Pneumonia

NEW YORK (UPI) -Actress Elizabeth Taylor, stricken with divible pneumonia, was reported in good condition today at the ltarkness Pavilion of the Columbia-Presbyterian Medical Conter.

Miss Taylor was taken to a ninth-floor suite in the hospital Thursday. She had been suffering from a cold since coming to New York and had been confined to her bed since late last week, a spokesman said.

The raven haired actress' husband, singer Eddie Fisher, accompanied her to the hospital. Dr. Dana Atchiey said no visitors except Fisher and close friends would be allowed to see

It was the third time Miss Taylor had been taken to the famed Harness Pavilion. She was there in 1936 for a delicate, five-hour operation for a crushed spinal disc and again in 1957, when she gave birth prematurely to a daughter by producer Mike Todd. The actress' other medical problems have included an eye opertion in Hollywood in 1933 after a piece of flint flew into her eye during a photographing session. She also was put under sedation after Todd was killed, when she was described as "out of her head with grief."



Temperature Down To 35 In County, **But Crops Appear To Escape Damage** The Central Florida Experiment Sta-The blistering cold wave that whipped

across Seminole County vesterday and this morning was not severe enough to hurt citrus groves here, County Agent Cecil Tucker reported.

Tucker starting making an inspection tour on the citrus crops today but said temperatures would have to dip below 30 degrees for any harm to some to the sounty's citrus industry.

Tucker reported that it was still too early to tell what the cold did to the county's vegetable crops.

After a brief inspection tour, Tucker said in some places vegetables were tender but not too much damage was inflicted. "We'll know more about the damage it a few days," he said.

Tucker said last night's high winds aided citrus crops. He urged all growers in the county to bank their young trees "immediately" to prevent any severe damage to the industry.

He also urged homeowners to cover all plants in yards in case the cold spell should continue the next few days.

"The way it looks now, there won't be any serious damage to this year's crop," Tucker said, adding, "especially if warmer weather should set in as forecast.
