Judge Passes Sentence On 5

Circuit Court Judge Volie Williams passed sentence Monday on five defendants whose cases were heard in this month's Circuit Court session.

Betty Jean Baker, 422 E. Fifth St. Negro, was sentenced to six months to 20 years in the State Department of Correction. She was found guilty of manslaughter.

Edward Lee Brown Jr. of 412 Cypress Ave. was sentenced to six months to five years in the Correction department. The court found the Sanford Negro guilty of breaking and entering with intent to commit misdemeanor.

OKLAHOMA CITY (UPI) — George, a cuddly 55-pound lion, is looking for a home.

Lonesome George had to spend Tuesday night in the Oklahoma City jail to the horror of 45 intoxicated guests who, thinking they were seeing beasts, tried in vain to brush the fur off their eyeballs.

The nine-month-old cub was placed in the investigation cell adjacent to the drunk tank because George's owner got tired of his sassy ways. It was just another episode in an unhappy childhood.

The owner, finance company manager Ted Moore, explained he couldn't get in touch with the local zoo and the jail was the only place with bars.

"He has taken over my apartment," moaned Moore. "He is too big. The latest is that he has grown too fond of trying to drive the car."

Moore's eviction of his frisky roommate was not the first for the cub, even though George is house-broken.

Space Scientist Says Soviet's Program Smaller Than America's

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A top Defense Department scientist said today that Russia's military space program is likely to be much smaller than America's.

G. P. Sutton, chief scientist of the Advanced Research Projects Agency, said the Soviet military space effort might be "only a very minor one."

He said he based his opinion on the fact that Russia has not launched any earth satellites since May 1958, and on the assumption that the Soviet Union has little need for communications or peeping tom military satellites.

Sutton told the American Rocket Society's 11th annual convention that Russia is concentrating on scientific exploration and the psychological effects that accompany new space achievements.

Rep. Emilio Q. Daddario (D-Conn.) who spoke to the meeting earlier, proposed international registration of all satellites to prevent possible triggering of "a monstrous war."

Sutton said the military part of the U. S. space effort would "remain relatively small" compared with development of earth-bound offensive and defensive weapons. He said that space technology takes only about a half billion dollars of the \$1 billion dollar military budget.

He said space vehicles of the immediate future chiefly would be designed to get, give and transmit information but would not have military defensive or offensive chores.

He said Russia and its allies are close together and can use wire and radio communications rather than satellites. He said the Soviets do not need spy satellites because they already know about the free world's military facilities.

Daddario, in proposing registration of satellites, said that it is imperative "that we find a form of world law to avert catastrophe."

"If we fail to achieve law and order as we venture into these uncharted fields," he said, "the cost will be immeasurable."

Others have expressed concern lest the launching of a peaceful scientific space vehicle be misinterpreted by another nation as the beginning of a missile attack.

U. S. Tells Allies They Must Share Aid Burden

The United States has told its European and Asian allies that the horn of plenty is running low.

Not low enough as yet to be a danger to the American economy, but enough to bring about a serious reappraisal of U. S. military and foreign aid expenditures and for the United States to tell its allies that they now must help to shoulder some of the burdens formerly borne by the United States almost alone.

The result has been that in world capitals from Tokyo to London, other governments also have faced up to a reappraisal and with surprising unanimity have decided that the United States has carried the burden long enough. They will help.

Since 1912, with the exception of one year, the United States has had a trade deficit with other nations which by the middle of this year had reached a staggering total of nearly 15 billion dollars.

It has been a cause for growing concern for the reasons that a deficit and that an unbroken outflow of gold eventually must be reflected in reduced faith in the U. S. dollar.

So it was for these reasons that U. S. Under Secretary of State Douglas Dillon warned in a speech last October that either other nations must put their financial shoulders to the wheel or face the possibility the United States would take steps to protect itself.

In their extreme, these steps

Flying Granddad Takes Breather After Air Record

LAS VEGAS (UPI) — Flying grandfather Max Conrad—on his way to San Francisco after setting a new world's record for a non-stop flight in a light plane—made an unexpected landing Thursday night at McCarran Airport.

Conrad arrived without fanfare at dusk, brought his small blue and white 180-horsepower Piper Comanche in for a smooth landing. Miss Rose Stehnow, a school teacher, said Conrad went to her house and immediately fell asleep. She said she is an old friend of the family and that she had been expecting Conrad to come here and not San Francisco.

Miss Stehnow refused to wake Conrad, saying, "I'm not about to wake him up. He's very tired and so am I."

She said she expected him to fly on to San Francisco in "a day or two."

The craft was the one which Conrad used to set a new record Thursday by flying 6,911 miles over the Atlantic from Casablanca to El Paso in 57 hours and 27 minutes. When he took off from El Paso's International Airport Thursday after a brief rest he said he was flying to San Francisco and would be there by nightfall.

Conrad, from Winona, Minn., has 10 children and three grandchildren.

NEW YORK (UPI) — Actress Elizabeth Taylor, stricken with double pneumonia, was reported in good condition today at the Harkness Pavilion of the Columbia-Presbyterian Medical Center. Miss Taylor was taken to a ninth-floor suite in the hospital Thursday. She had been suffering from a cold since coming to New York and had been confined to her bed since late last week, a spokesman said.

The raven-haired actress' husband, singer Eddie Fisher, accompanied her to the hospital. Dr. Dana Atchley said no visitors except Fisher and close friends would be allowed to see her.

It was the third time Miss Taylor had been taken to the famed Harkness Pavilion. She was there in 1936 for a delicate, five-hour operation for a crushed spinal disc and again in 1937, when she gave birth prematurely to a daughter by producer Mike Todd. The actress' other medical problems have included an eye operation in Hollywood in 1933 after a piece of flint flew into her eye during a photographing session. She also was put under sedation after Todd was killed, when she was described as "out of her head with grief."

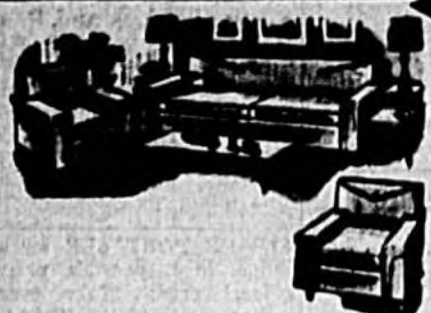
