Banks Split On Rate Hike

MIAMI (AP)—Florida's major banks held their prime interest rate to 7 1/2 per cent today, despite a one-half per cent increase in the amount they charge on big loans.

The increase came in the wake of a national rate change blamed on a dwindling supply of funds for loans in a generally tight money situation. It was the fourth time since Dec. 2 that the prime rate has been increased.

Distance 'House Calls' A Specialty

From Cyprus in Sanford to Cyprus in the Mediterranean—made by Charles Meeks, owner of Sanford Scale Company on Cypress Avenue.

Unusual, because it was not a vacation trip—Charlie went to Nicosia, Cyprus, just to fix a scale. NPC Industries, a New York-based company with a branch office in Orlando, recently built a citrus packing house in Nicosia. One of the equipment was assembled in Orlando, then sent to Nicosia to be installed in the plant there. However, the conveyor scales, which weigh fruit as it travels down a moving belt, never worked right from the beginning, so the two scales were useless to the packing house.

Charlie and his wife came here with his brother in 1948 and fell in love with the area. Though little of their work is here, they stayed in Sanford because they liked living here. Charlie is now sole owner of the company. At NPC's expense, Charlie carried a small electric motor and a few parts, flew from McCoy field port to New York; across the Atlantic, Great Britain and the Channel to Frankfurt, Germany; then Zurich, Switzerland; Athens, Greece, and finally, Nicosia.

Florida's industry has little hope of competing with Greece because of the cost factor, Charlie feels. "They work all day for an hour, an hour and a half or two hours a day, six days a week, for \$2.50; we get that in an hour or an hour and a half's work here. The girls in the packing plant work 10 to 12 hours a day, six days a week, for \$2.50; we get that in an hour or an hour and a half's work here. The wages aren't too hard on Cyprians because food and housing are so cheap here." (Continued on Page 2, Col. 8.)

Nixon Sees Arms Talks With Russia

GENEVA (AP) — President Nixon informed the 17-nation disarmament conference today that the United States hopes to start talks with the Soviet Union in the near future on limiting anti-ballistic missile systems. His remarks came in a six-point message to the first session of the talks after a seven-month recess. Earlier the Soviet Union proposed to the session a treaty to ban all military installations, nuclear and nonnuclear, on the sea bed, the ocean floor and its seabed. The draft was presented by the chief Soviet delegate, Alexei A. Roshchin at the first session of the talks following a seven-month recess. In a message to the conference, Soviet Premier Alexei N. Kosygin said a solution must also be found to such problems as "stopping the manufacture of nuclear weapons, the reduction and destruction of their stockpiles, the limitation and subsequent reduction of means of delivery of strategic weapons, and securing the prohibition of chemical and bacteriological warfare and others."

GIs Launch Counter-Attack

Saigon (AP) — More than 100,000 American troops launched a massive counter-offensive northwest of Saigon today to force the Viet Cong and North Vietnamese to retreat. The American drive, launched on the 26th day of the Viet Cong's spring offensive, was centered in an area of jungle and rubber trees 40 miles northwest of Saigon. U.S. intelligence officers believe as many as 7,500 troops of the North Vietnamese 7th Division are trying to push south along the Saigon River toward the capital. The U.S. Command threw troops of the 1st and 25th Infantry Divisions and the 11th Airborne Cavalry Regiment into what field commanders called a "compression" attempt to pin down the strong enemy force. U.S. headquarters reported at least 20 enemy soldiers killed by air and artillery strikes in the only significant contact reported during a preliminary phase of the operation Monday. The American command said helicopter gunships scouted the area and heavy fire from the ground and the pilots estimated there were about 300 enemy troops in the area. U.S. fighter-bombers and artillery pounded the enemy for several hours, and spokesmen said the bodies of 28 enemy soldiers were observed in the area. No U.S. casualties were reported.

Members Crippling FEA

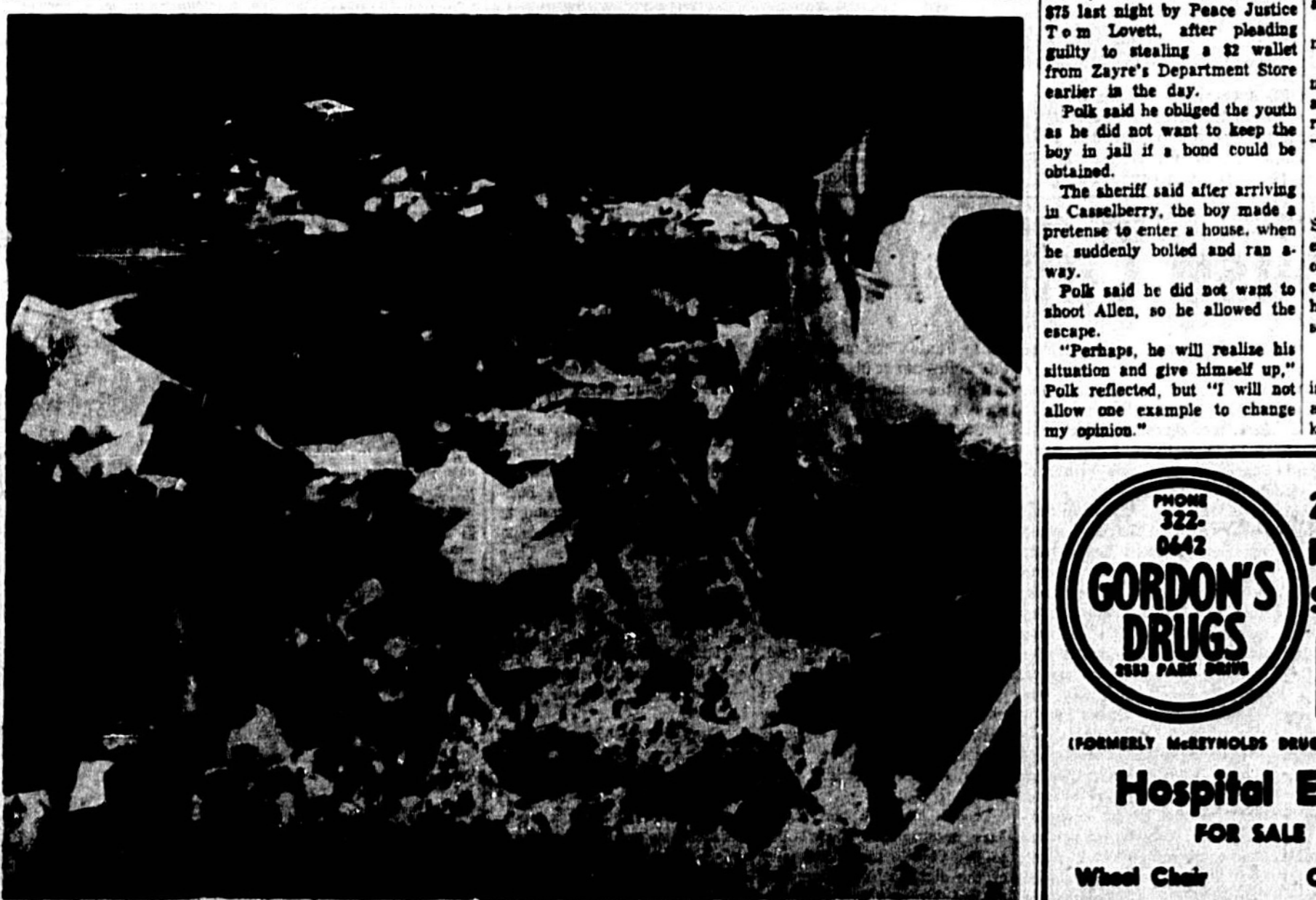
JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (AP) — The Florida Education Association has initiated an austerity program to counteract a crippling membership exodus that followed last year's statewide teacher walkout and internal strife among the organization's top leadership. FEA President Jane Arnold, launching a five-city "Tell It Like It Is" speaking program, said Monday night FEA membership had dwindled from about 40,000 before the February 1968 walkout to 26,500—a loss of 45 per cent over 12 months. The resulting loss of revenue, she said, has forced the FEA to cut back on its expenses—including the elimination of overtime for staff members and the refusal to accept such expenses as collect telephone calls. But, she said, "the FEA will continue to serve its members."

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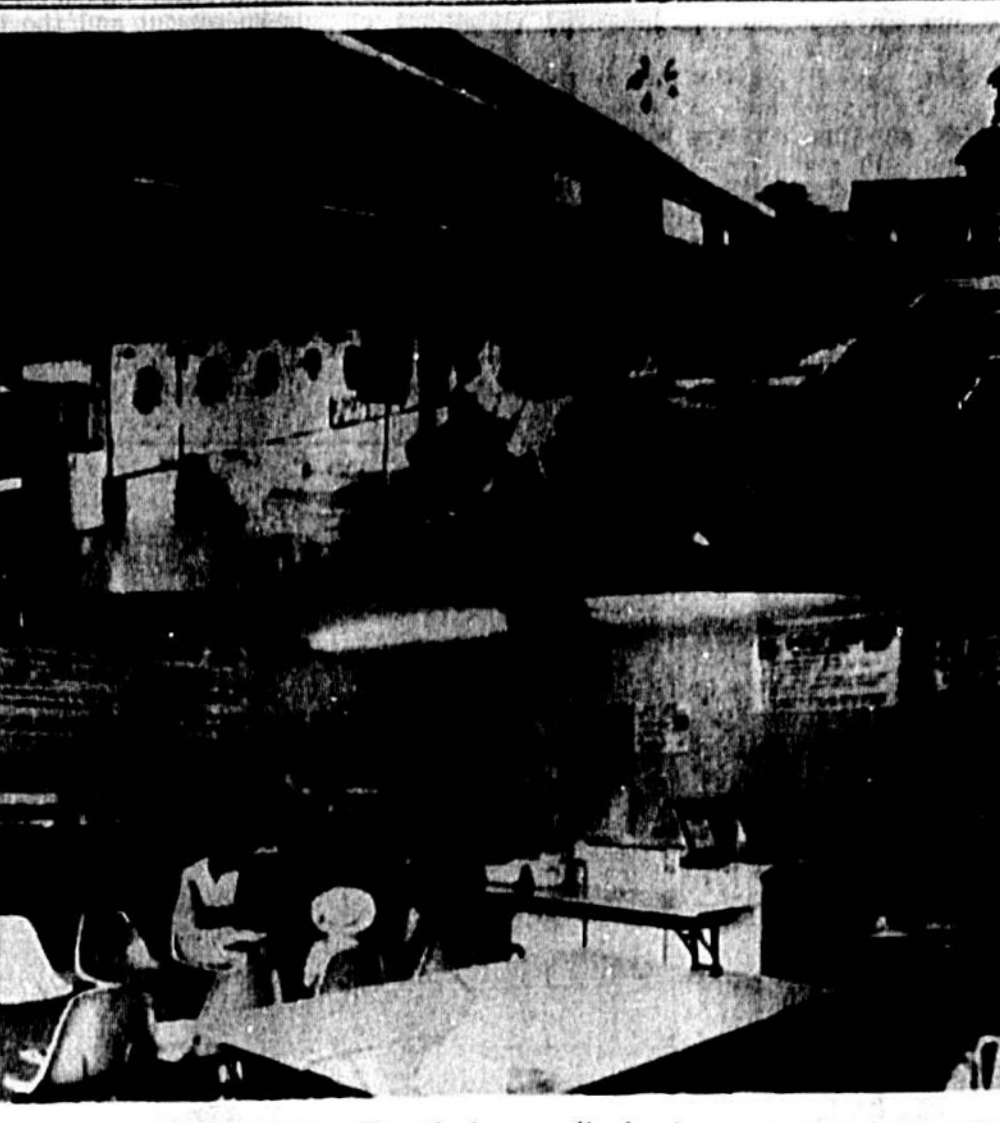

When the Lake Harney to Kissimmee Canal is opened the club will have access to this chain of lakes to the South Central Part of the state.

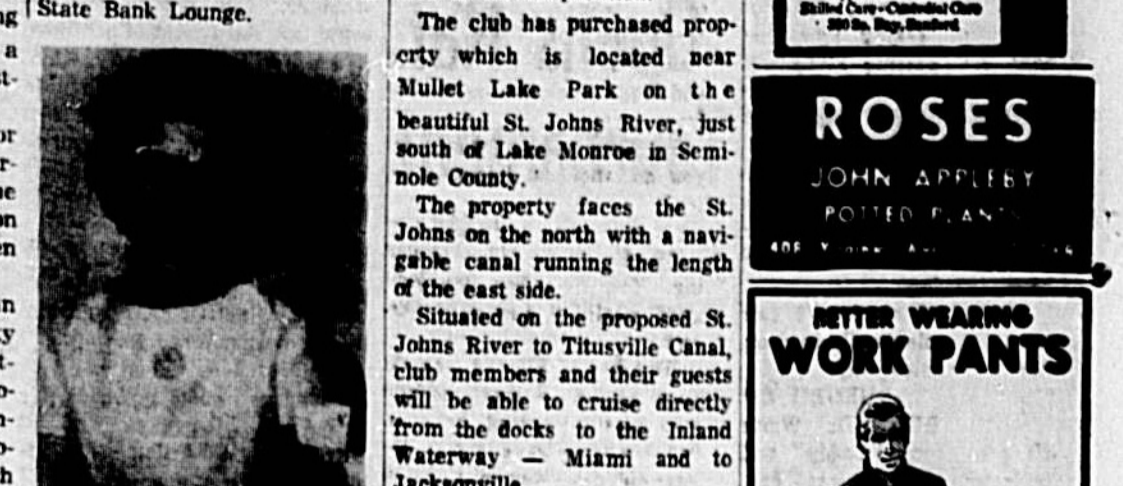

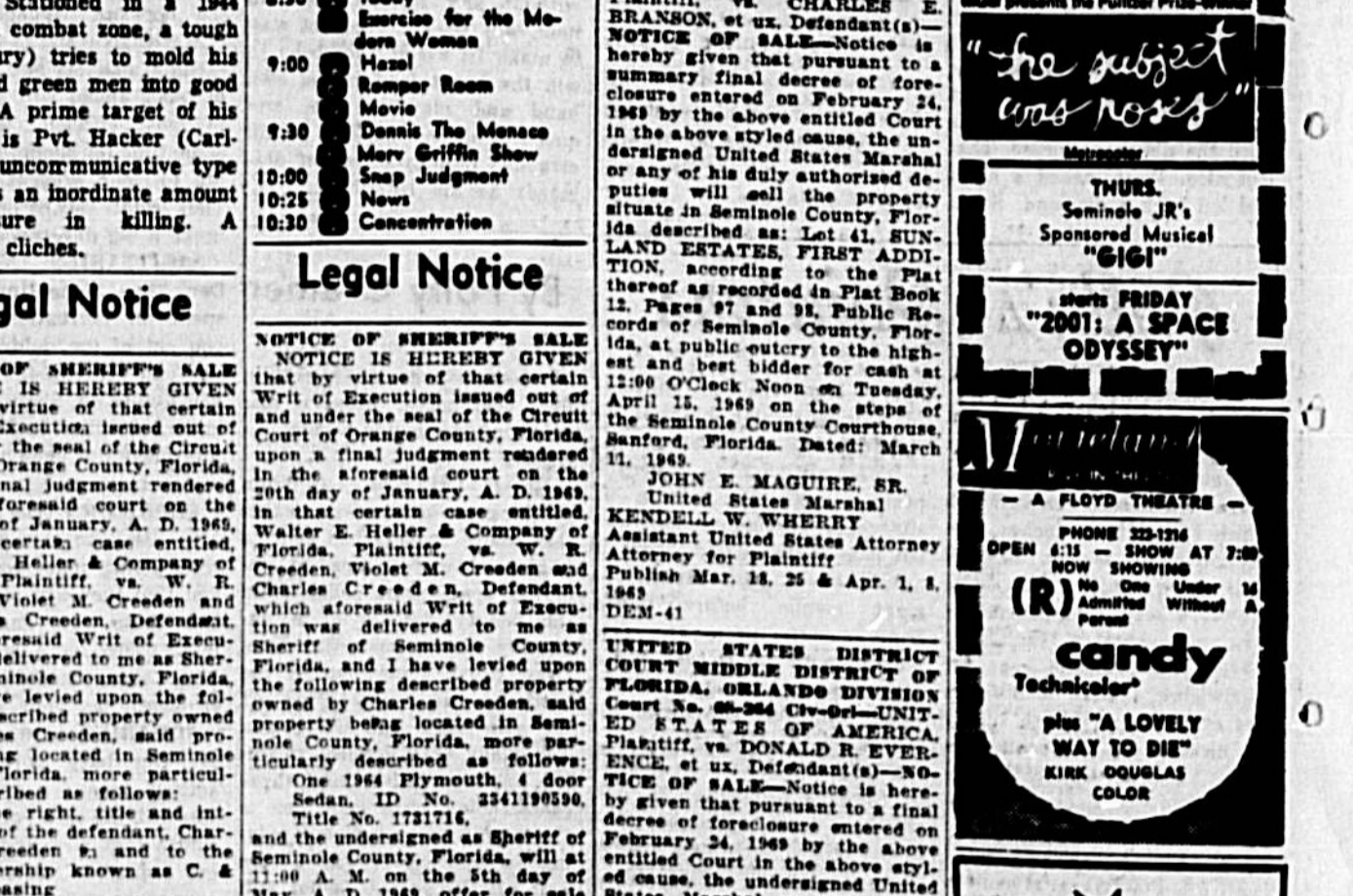

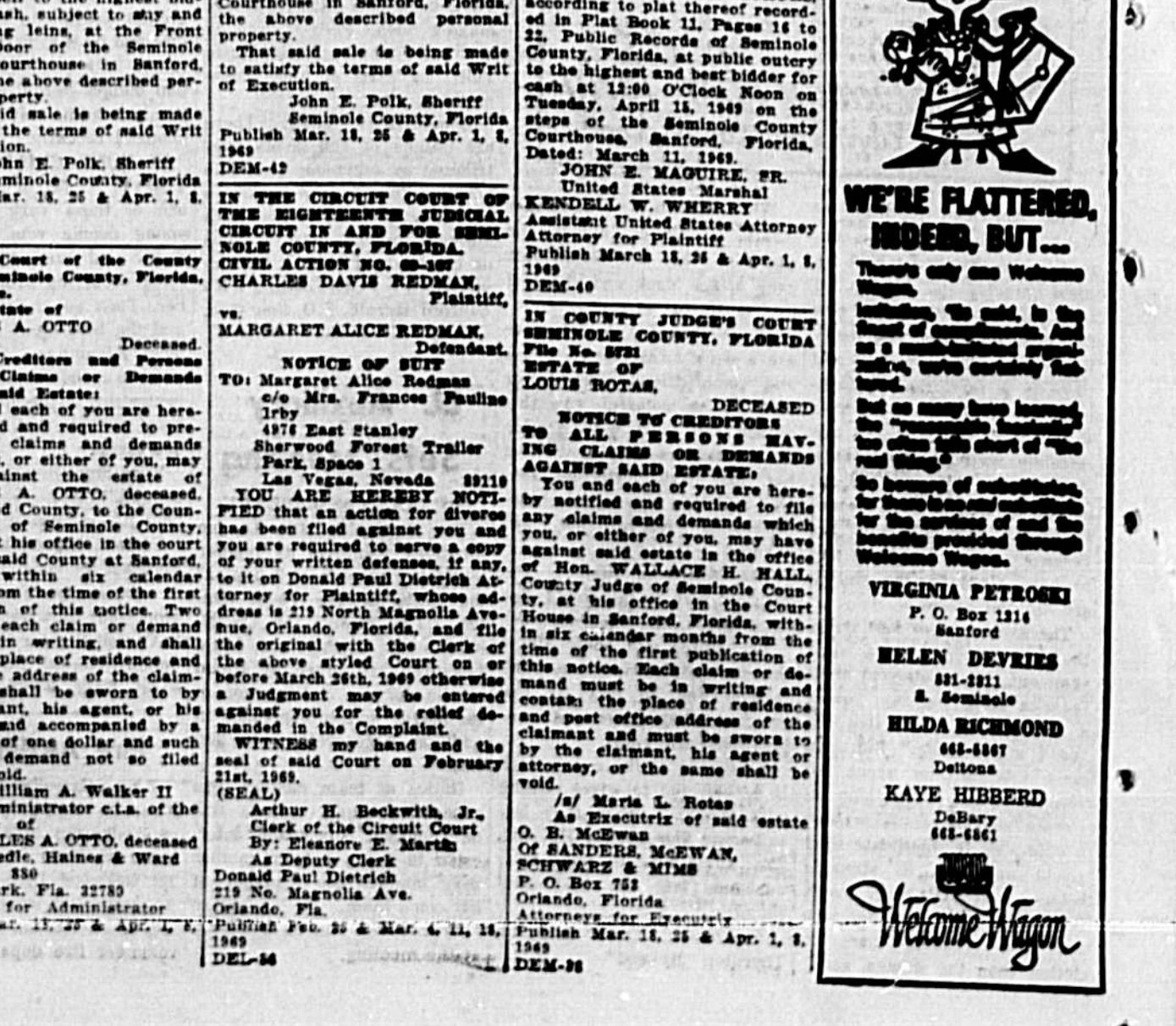

Library Stages Building Drive

South Seminole Community Library, formerly the Altamonte Springs Community Library, is presently conducting a drive for funds to build a new facility at its location on Highland Avenue.

Although each year the city of Altamonte Springs donates the sum of \$1,000 to the library, some of this money is applied toward the building program, but, instead, is used solely for the purchase of new books, it is explained.

Funds derived from the small annual membership dues are used for supplies, such as library cards, pencils, Scotch tape, paper, etc.

The Altamonte Springs Library was the dream of a long-time resident of the community and a retired school teacher, who realized the importance of good books in the lives of children.

As president of the Altamonte Springs Civic Club, she started the wheels in motion to provide the means with a library. Although Mrs. Fuller died before her dream was realized, members of the Civic Club, and other civic and social organizations, and many friends are carrying on the project.

On May 10, 1968, the Altamonte Springs Community Library Association was formed and a 1968 meeting was held at the home of Mrs. Richard Bundy was held to elect officers. At the first election of officers, Mrs. Dorothy Fuller was named president, Mrs. Paul French, secretary; J. H. Hodges, treasurer; Mrs. J. D. Morrison, Rev. E. E. Brown and Mrs. P. W. Kasten, trustees.

After organization of the association, the library "went to get going" and contributions of books came from many friends and from neighboring libraries. None of the workers who volunteered to help through the fall of 1959 and early 1960 were without their spirit remained undiminished and when a Florida State University student, who was surprised to see all that had been accomplished.

On January 21, 1960, an open house and tea was held for the public and four days later the library opened to the public. Later that year, the building housing the present library was offered for sale and purchase was made for \$17,500, paid in full at the time with help of many donations.

Mrs. Barbara Kuhn of the English Department was in charge of the program and Mrs. Drueding served as piano accompanist. Judges for the talent program were Mrs. Barbara Hughes, Mrs. Jane Schuller, Mrs. Maryann Baker, and Mrs. Leona Dzurus.

At Altamonte Springs Sewer Plan OK Expected

"Go sign" to the city engineers to proceed with plans for the ball-tower sewerage system to finance the balance of the City of Altamonte Springs is expected to be made by the City Council at its 8 p.m. meeting today.

City representatives including Mayor W. Lawrence Swoford, Councilman William Nuckols, Engineer William Palm and fiscal agent, D. Kirk Gumbel, will make official report on their meeting with Department of Housing and Urban Development men in Atlanta last Friday concerning the proposed system to cost some \$300,000 to construct.

HUD officials told the city representatives orally—and later sent a written communication to the city confirming the oral commitment—that the city may use some \$100,000 excess revenues from the water system on hand for the ball-tower sewers. They further agreed to permit use of excess water revenues to finance the balance of money for the sewers. The letter urged the city that federal requirements be met in the construction so that the costs can be picked up by the public facilities loan for the permanent sewer system.

Developers have agreed to pay half the costs of the construction in tapping fees and hook-up charges and to construct and give the city water and sewer lines inside their subdivisions.

The engineer previously has reported to the Council the ball-tower system will amortize itself in five years from user fees.

Immediately preceding the official meeting tonight, Council will confer with developers on the matter at 7.

Moon Shot Set May 18, Landing Slated In July

SPACE CENTER. Houston, Tex. (AP) - High level space officials have decided to send Apollo 10 around the moon for 63 hours, but man's first landing later than he will await the flight of Apollo 11.

A source at the Manned Spacecraft Center said the space agency officials adopted this course at a meeting Tuesday.

Apollo 10 will be launched May 18, the source said, and fly into lunar orbit, two of its crew will be made by Apollo 11 to within 10 miles of the lunar surface, leaving the third crewman behind in the command module.

The lunar module descent stage will be jettisoned at 6:30 p.m.

Homes For Elderly Studied By State

Seminole County soon will be participating in a pilot project in which concentrated efforts will be made to place elderly people in a private home where they may experience a desirable family living arrangement.

All too often they are placed in nursing homes and other institutions because there are no families or private homes for them.

The State Department of Public Welfare Foster Home for Adults program was approved by the 1961 Florida Legislature and because of its success was expanded by the 1965 and 1967 Legislatures. The need is for homes in which special interest is taken in the client and where he may be made to feel comfortable. The foster family will be expected to provide regular housekeeping services and special services, such as arranging for medical care. There can be no more than two foster adults placed in the home. The foster family should not be dependent upon the income from the welfare client.

Some adults are unable to live alone because of incapacities or infirmities such as forgetfulness. All clients placed will be ambulatory and capable of caring for their own personal needs such as bathing, dressing, etc.
