Thought and care must be taken not to repeat flavors in dishes so that the dinner as a whole is interesting and appetizing.

Chestnut Stuffing
One and one-half cups mashed chestnuts, 18 whole cooked Italian chestnuts, one-half cup stale bread crumbs from soft part of loaf, 12 finely chopped canned mushrooms, 4 tablespoons butter, one-fourth teaspoon minced parsley, one-fourth teaspoon onion juice, few gratings nutmeg, one tablespoon grated lemon rind, salt and pepper.

Melt butter and combine ingredients with boiling water to make slightly moist. Stuff goose with mixture.

To Roast Goose
Stuff and truss goose, sprinkle with salt and pepper and put on rack in roaster. Roast 45 minutes and pour off fat. Dredge with flour and cover bottom of pan with boiling water. Roast two hours, basting every 15 minutes if a self-basting roaster is not used. Remove trussing string and put on a hot platter. Garnish with a string of cranberries around the goose's neck.

Christmas Salad
One quart cranberries, two tablespoons granulated gelatin, one-half cup sugar, one cup diced banana, one cup diced canned peaches, one cup seeded white grapes, 1 cup nut meats.

Sauté cranberries and extract juice. Add sugar and bring to the boiling point. Soften gelatin in one-half cup cold water and stir into boiling sirup. Remove at once from the fire and let stand until cool. When beginning to set turn into a mold and add fruit and nuts. Chill and serve on a bed of lettuce garnished with "cups" of head lettuce filled with fruit salad dressing.

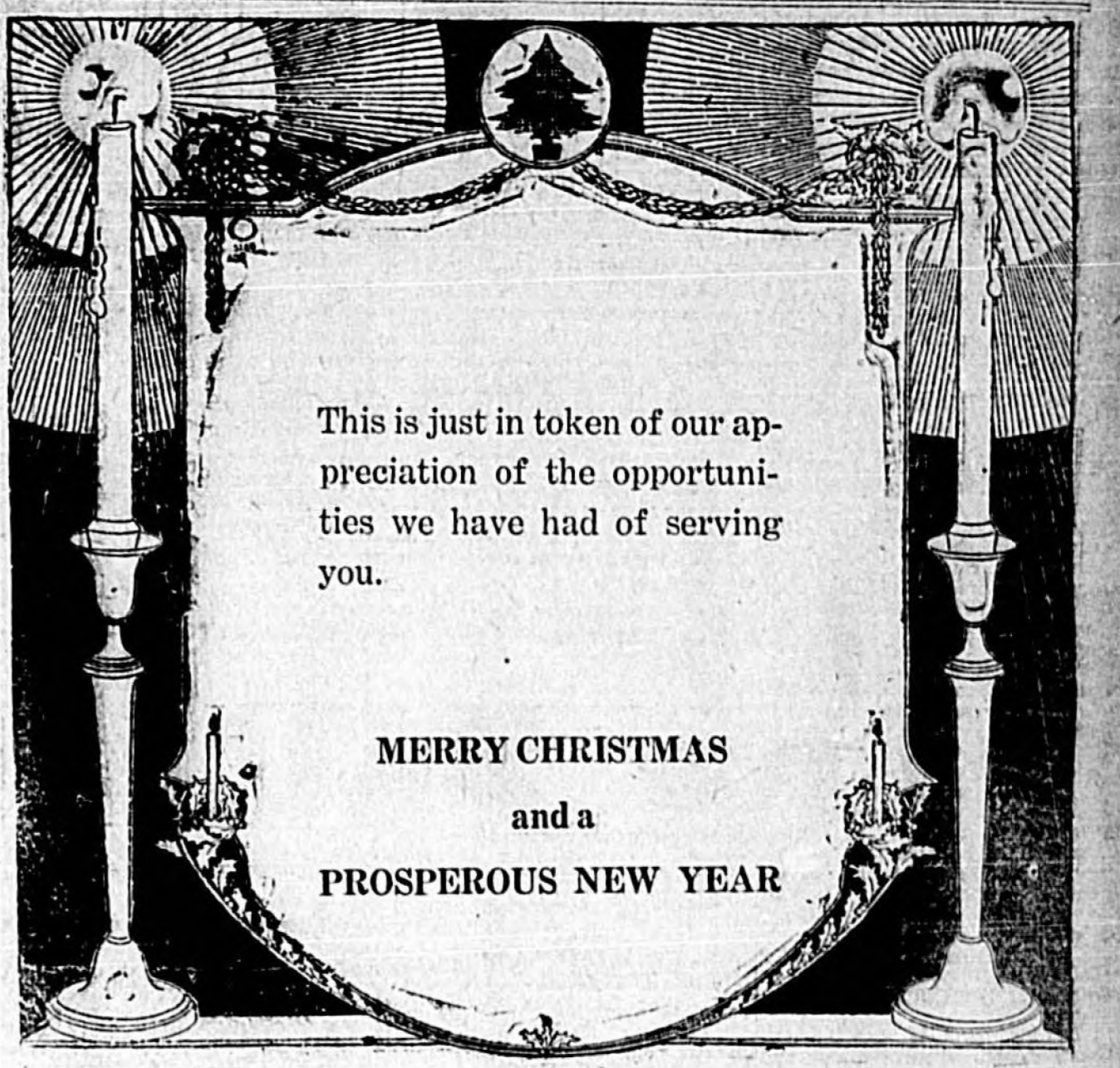

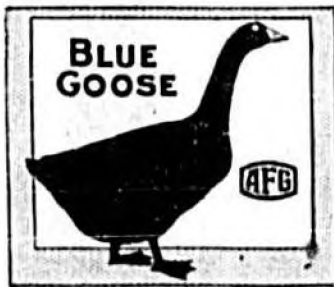

PLAYERS BORN IN 1888 ARE STILL GOING STRONG

Diamond Performers Born In Age Of Great Blizzard Are Still Active In Baseball

NEW YORK, Dec. 24.—A full core of baseball players born in the age of the "great blizzard" of 1888 still perform in the nation's major league parks.

Dean of them all is Charles (Babe) Adams, sturdy moundsman of the Pirates, who was a world hero in 1909 and toils on, returning to prominence in a decade which seems to have given many veteran pitchers a new lease of life.

Adams was born in 1883. A year later came Jim McQuinn and 1886 down in Georgia, Tyrus Raymond Cobb, destined to be baseball's greatest outfielder, was born in Vermont. Produced Larry Anderson and Massachusetts contributed John (Shano) Collins.

The year 1887 provided more history for the national game, bringing into being Grover Cleveland Alexander, Walter Johnson, Harry Hooper and Eddie Collins, four of the game's best known names.

Hooper was to wait another season for the two men who later were to become outfielders ever developed, the old combination of the Boston Red Sox—Hopper, Tris Speaker, and Duffy Lewis. Two of the combination remain in the major leagues—Hooper with the White Sox and Speaker with the Cleveland Indians. Lewis is manager of the Portland team of the Pacific coast league.

That year, 1888, brought a band of pitchers, outfielders and catchers which has cluttered base ball's roster for many seasons. Zack Heath, marvel of the Brooklyn field, came along at that time. He did Gladstone Barney, Clarence Walker, Bob Veach and Fred Williams. For mound duty came Dan Faber of the White Sox, by Caldwell, Dick Rudolph and m Vaughan. Catchers were Larry McCarty, Bill Baridan and set Thomas. Owen Bush, Eddie Foster and Wheeler Johnston straggled along for infield assignments. Several Southern teams, however, are playing straight Dixie schedules after launching invasions last season. These include Louisiana State university, Florida, Mississippi A. & M., Virginia, Vanderbilt and Oglethorpe.

Of the schedules made public, Oglethorpe has the longest season opening September 28 and closing Dec. 5. Two Virginia institutions, V. P. I. and V. M. I., are booked to get away Sept. 19, others waiting until Sept. 26 or Oct. 3.

William and Mary's four intersectional games are: Syracuse at Syracuse, Oct. 10; Harvard at Cambridge, Oct. 31; Albright at Williamsburg, Nov. 7; Haskell Indians at Richmond, Nov. 14.

Washington and Lee goes to Pittsburg to play the Pittsburgh Panthers, Sept. 26, to Princeton to meet the Tigers Oct. 10, and plays West Virginia at Charleston Oct. 31.

Georgia Tech has engagements with Penn State in New York, Oct. 10, and Notre Dame in Atlanta, Oct. 31.

Tulane tackles Missouri at New Orleans Oct. 3 and goes to Chicago to play Northwestern Oct. 24.

Georgia meets Yale at New Haven, Oct. 10, and Maryland plays the same team in the same place Nov. 7.

Kentucky will play Chicago in Chicago, Oct. 3.

Cole's right leg was badly crushed in an accident when he was seven years old, and was amputated about four inches below the knee. He has become so accustomed to getting about on the shortened limb that Jack Cameron, athletic director and coach at the orphanage, declares he is much faster than many boys with two good legs.

Cole does not wear an artificial limb while playing football. In getting over the field he uses his shortened leg as a kind of spring, and jumps instead of running.

Cole, who is 17 years of age, weighs 150 pounds. He will be captain of the orphanage team next season.
