The court martial of 11 colonels and lieutenant colonels deliberated for 12 hours before finding Fleming guilty of the crime.

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## Showdown Meeting Scheduled Tonight In Segregation Problem In Delaware

### Riot-Ripped Pen Where Three Died Entered By Police

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo. (AP)—Heavily armed police backed by National Guardsmen moved into the strike home Monday night to quell any possible riot which might erupt from a scheduled showdown meeting between Negro and white school board members.

Three prisoners were killed and eight pententary buildings destroyed in a riot which broke out in a school building in Philadelphia last night.

Some prisoners refused to give up their arms and there were sporadic outbreaks of shooting and the noise of breaking glass and fixtures throughout the night from the riot.

Police officers and National Guardsmen moved through front door of cell block B at 7 a. m. Two minutes later there was a riot gun blast, followed by shouting and crashing of glass.

The rioters could be seen marching in the cell block a few minutes later. The shouting died down and several prisoners came out with their hands up.

Deployed in and around the prison, one of the largest state prisons in the country, were more than 500 officers and National Guardsmen.

## The Phenix City Story

"The Phenix City Story," movie version of what happened when crime and violence got out of hand in Phenix City, Alabama, is in production in Hollywood. If the movie is made, it will be the true story of what happened in that community can prove a powerful sermon on the need for citizens to keep a firm hand on their government at all levels.

Gambling and racketeering ran riot in Phenix City and the lawbreakers grew so powerful that they did not have to tolerate anyone who spoke out against them. ## Hope For Polio Victims

When a child gets polio, it is a tragedy but not a hopeless one. The National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis reports that 50 per cent of the victims recover completely. For another 30 per cent the after-effects are not disabling. Of the 14 per cent who are severely paralyzed, many are able to carry on active and useful lives. Only six per cent of the cases are fatal.

## Unusual Sales Made At Opening

NEW YORK (AP)—When the Mike Kats opened a new super drugstore in Memphis recently, they sold \$5,000 worth of parakeets in three days.

They also sold a pet skunk, a monkey for \$25.95, any number of goldfish, \$1,100 worth of nylon stockings, and 40 alligators.

There may seem odd items for a drugstore to stock, but they aren't at all unusual for the two Kats brothers, the new 75, and Mike, 57, long have been known as two of the greatest showmen in the field.

They pioneered in discovering the importance of "impulse business."

"This means that when a customer comes in a store to buy one thing," the explanation, "he sees another thing—and buys that, too. We'll stock anything that catches the eye."

The brothers started with a fruit and candy store in Kansas City 40 years ago and took in about \$18 a day. Even then he was selling oranges three for a dime when his competitors were charging a nickel each.

Operating on a mass-sale, cut-rate principle, the brothers built up a chain of 22 super drugstores in five states—Missouri, Kansas, Iowa, Oklahoma and Tennessee—that will gross some 40 million dollars this year. Their stores stock 31,000 items, ranging from a package of gum to room air-con-

### Divided Germany Poses Problem

WASHINGTON (AP)—Divided Germany will be a problem for the West and Russia for years. No wonder both sides are pulling so hard in opposite directions, with no solution in sight.

The United States and Britain have obvious reasons for wanting the West Germans rearm and in a hurry and made part of the Western defense against Russia.

The crucial time element makes them look not only to the immediate military benefit but to the uncertain future.

The difference between West Germany rearm and unarmed, as the French have made abundantly clear through their expressed worries, the Allies would have the problem of seeing that rearmament didn't get out of bounds to become a new terror.

The Allies will meet in London next Tuesday and again in Paris in mid-October to seek the double answer of rearming Germany and keeping her within bounds afterwards.

But time is working, and it may not be working on the side of the Allies. At this moment, under the pro Allied and anti Communist leadership of Chancellor Adenauer, the West Germans want to get into the Western defense alliance.

But Adenauer will not always be there, and whether he is or not the mood of the West Germans may change if the Allies, through their indecision, keep them dangling indefinitely between heaven and earth.

They are dangling now and have been since the war. The Allies have not given them the right to rearm nor permitted them independence. American, British, and French troops occupy the country. The three powers keep a veto over Adenauer's government.

But the Germans have made an astonishing recovery from the war and are growing in strength. They can't be expected to remain in a

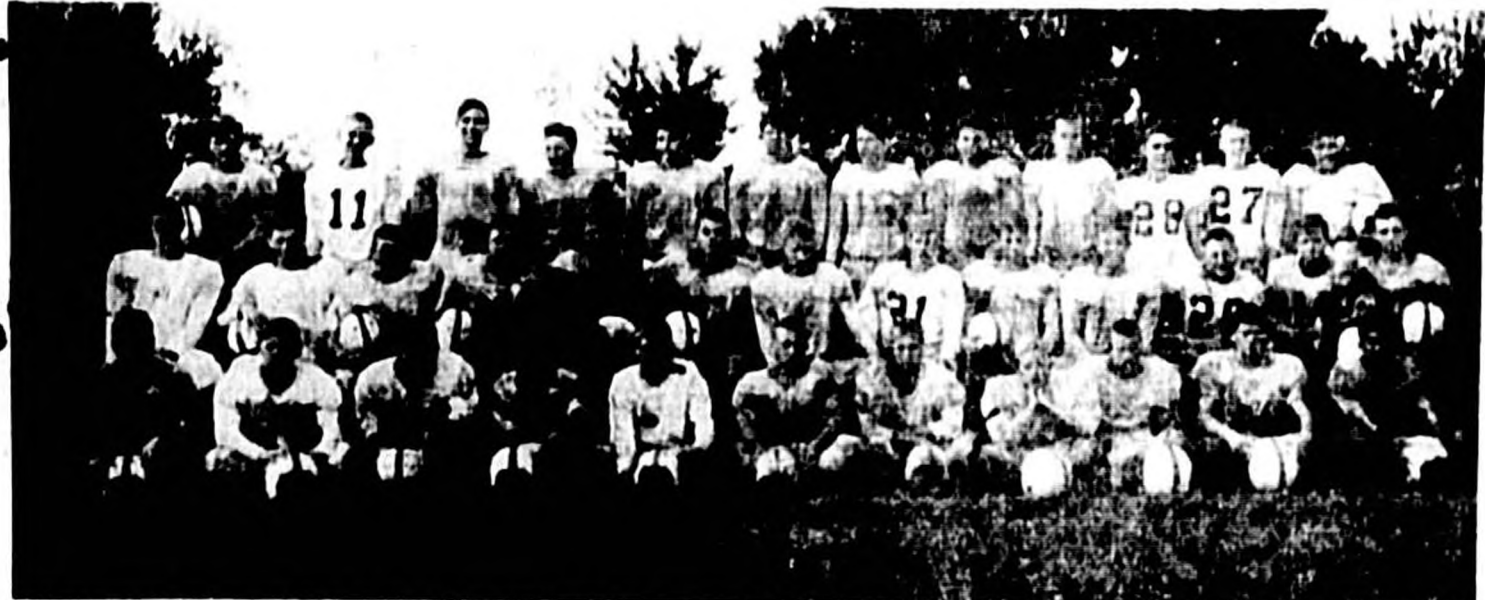

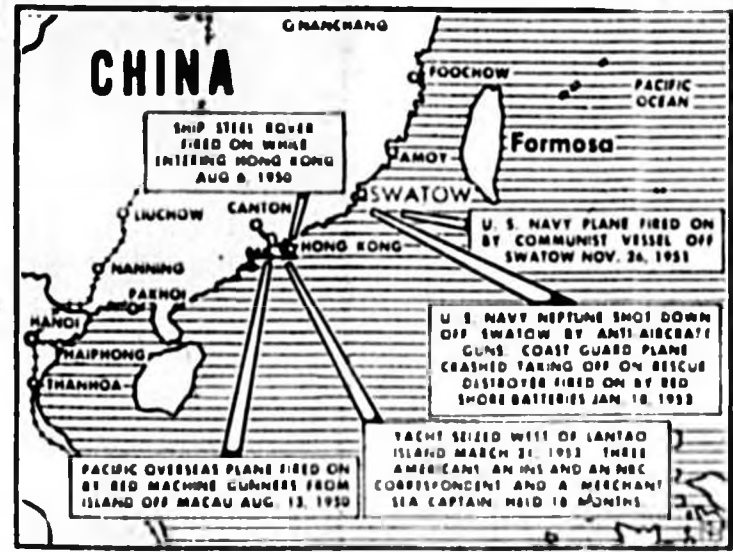

## A-Power Plans Pushed

### Sec. Dulles Outlines Proposal

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. — The United States pushed new plans today to set up an international agency to foster peaceful use of atomic power, with an emphasis on cooperation.

Secretary of State Dulles outlined the four-point proposal in a major U. S. policy speech to the ninth U. N. General Assembly yesterday afternoon.

Developing the ideas set forth in President Eisenhower's speech to the U. N. last December, the secretary called for:

1. Creation of an international agency to include "nations from all regions of the world." Dulles said it is hoped the agency will start work "as early as next year."

2. Holding of an international scientific conference under U. N. auspices next spring to consider the "whole vast subject" of the peaceful use of atomic power.

3. The opening in the United States early next year of a technical training school "where students from abroad may learn the working principles of atomic energy with specific regard to its peaceful uses."

4. Invitations to a "substantial number" of foreign medical and surgical experts to work with atomic energy techniques in U. S. cancer hospitals.

Dulles' proposals brought immediate expressions of approval from many other U. N. members. Henry Cabot Lodge Jr., chief U. S. delegate, called for a quick meeting to set up the proposed plan on the Assembly's agenda as an "important and urgent question."

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower told the International Monetary Fund today the twin institutions have "the assurance of our support" in efforts to strike restrictions from free world trade.

He said she saw he had a pistol and asked him to take it. Ezell said he took a knife but had a misunderstanding, she slapped him, he had his temper and shot her in the head and shoulder. Then he dumped the body out and drove back to get his own car.

The woman's husband, Loren S. Baynard, told police he woke up about 7:15 a. m. Wednesday and discovered his wife and child in the front seat and door was found about 9 a. m.

The Baynards moved to Jacksonville 2 1/2 years ago from Augusta, Ga. Mrs. Baynard had two grown children and three grandchildren.
