# Dead calf found by dump

WINTER SPRINGS - A construction worker in Winter Springs reported to Seminole County sheriff's deputies that he found a dead body under a bloody sheet. Upon later investiation. the body was discovered to be that of a calf, according to Winter Springs Police Lt. Robert Butler.

Butler said the worker made the find at a dump site off State Road 434 east of Sipes Avenue. He reported to the sheriff's department Tuesday afternoon he had found a dead body wrapped in a bloody sheet.

Deputies arrived and determined the find was within city limits and called Winter Springs police to the scene. Butler said a deputy told police he had lifted the sheet and the decom-posing body was that of a female human. "We started a homicide investigation." Butler said. But the Investigation ended when Winter Springs police took a peek under the floral designed sheet and recognized the corpse as a

Sheriil's Capt. Roy Hughey said the deputy didn't actually look under the sheet, but identifed the body as human after reaching under the sheet and feeling bones and hair.

Butler said police have a few leads to follow on whoever dumped the body. They may face charges of illegal dumping.

He added the calf did not appear to have been slaughtered in any type of ritualistic ceremony.

# Airport gets FAA boost

New runways may attract more air passenger traffic

SANFORD - Central Florida Regional Airport will receive \$1.7 million in Federal Aviation Administration money to build additional taxiways critical to attracting scheduled passenger flights to the airport, U.S. Rep. Bill McCollum said yesterday.

The grant calls for construction, marking and lighting of a taxiway parallel to Runway 927. The taxiway will be built between Runway 927 and a another parallel taxiway, which is being con-

The expansion will include construction of two associated high-speed runway exits designed to free runway space more quickly, acting Airport Aviation Director Steve Cooke said.

Construction of the taxiway should begin by April and may be completed by the fall, Cooke

Timing of the grant is opportune, McCollum said, citing the relocation of AAA's national headquarters this week from Virginia to Lake Mary. Other recent commercial growth in Seminole County will also support regularly scheduled passenger and cargo flights to the Sanford airport, he said.

More and more, business will look toward Sanford for air travel instead of Orlando

"This grant will go a long way to improving the Sanford airport so it can meet the needs of dramatic growth in the area, particularly in commercial growth." McCollum said.

The Sanford Airport Authority in July received \$749,000 from the FAA to pave five acres of ramp space to accommodate more general aviation aircraft and to open up space for carrier and charter flights.

The authority has also petitioned the FAA for help in construction and staffing of a new control

The 2,000-acre facility, granted to the City of Sanford in 1969 after the closing of a naval air station there, is a general aviation airport. The Clice Airport, Page SA

# Wildfires

Forestry officials beating dry season with controlled burns



SANFORD - State wildlife officials, ranchers and landowners have started setting controlled fires in some wooded areas to reduce the potential for dangerous wildfires as Florida's dry scason begins.

Winter is also fire season in Florida, as rains become less frequent. The past couple of years have seen outbreaks of large wildfires from the Everglades to the Georgia line.

Controlled burns are a "big issue," said John Koehler, district manager with the state Division of Forestry which covers Seminole, Orange, Osceola and Brevard counties. Park rangers are already burning underbrush in Wekiwa Springs State Park in Orange County to remove the material that helps feed wildfires, Koehler said.

Mike Martin, Seminole County forester with the state Division of Forestry, called the burns an effective "forest management tool". ☐ See Fires, Page SA

# Amtrak: If we lose, we shut down

Future of Sanford station hinges on court decision

SANFORD - The future of Amtrak rail service in Sanford and all of Florida is pending a decision in the first criminal case against a railroad for dumping human waste in state waters, a spokesperson in Amtrak's Washington headquarters

said Wednesday. Cliff Black, Amtrak public affairs officer, said Amtrak would immediately abut down service to all 28 stations in Florida, including two in Senford - the auto train terminal and the passenger terminal — if a circuit judge in Palatka orders an injunction against tollet-dumping from trains. (The trial continued today.)

said. "Our primary purpose is to seek an injunction against this practice." **Volunta County State Attorney John** Tanner told a group of reporters Monday afternoon after jury selection. He told reporters he may also seek a fine against Amtrak, but was not considering imprisonment unless something came up during the trial to change his mind.

Amtrak is charged with four state felony counts of commercial littering and a misdemeanor charge of creating a health nuisance. The charges carry a maximum fine of \$20,500 and a 21-year prison sen-

# County school board will continue half-billion dollar search tomorrow

SANFORD - The Seminole County School Board will discuss tomorrow how to raise money for the half-billion dollar plan to build and expand schools and the 1990 legislative program.

"It'll be a busy day," said Carey Ferrell, the district's assistant superintendent for business and linance.

In addition to the two work sessions, the board plans to attend a luncheon at which Florida Commissioner of Education Betty Castor will speak and they also hope to be able to call a special meeting at which they will make a final decision on the money issue.

Ferreil explained that the board will discuss two options to pay for the building of 27 new schools over the next eight years.

"We're still working out the details." Ferrell explained, "but basically the two options are to levy a two-mill tax increase without voter approval and go to them with an approximate \$300- to \$350 million bond issue or we can take them a \$500 million bond issue proposal."

Ferrell and representatives of SunTrust, the bond issue financial planners hired by the board, are still working out the details that they will present to the board on Friday.

# DER investigating wetlands damage that county crews may have caused

SANFORD - State, district and county environmental officials are investigating the apparent destruction of a small pocket of wetlands near Tuskawilla by Seminole County Public Works crews.

Barbara Bess, a wetlands specialist with the Florida Department of Environmental Regulation. said the project may have needed a DER dredge and fill permit. Bess said to her knowledge, the project did not have a permit. She said DER enforcement officials are investigating the incident.

Lorne Malo, an environmental specialist with the St. Johns River Water Management District, said the project may have needed as many as three district permits. although he was unable to de-

termine Wednesday if the project was permitted.

If DER and the district find their wetlands protection regulations have been violated. The county may face fines or the expense of restoring the wetlands.

Tim Clabaugh, environmental control for Seminole County, said he was very displeased. "I had worked so bard to have a nice little wetlands

Tom George, county roads supervisor, said Tuesday he was unaware of the work, but later said county utilities crews apparently cleared a swath through the wetlands area about a week ago and began filling the area to create a road back to a drainage pond. He said work as been suspended on the road until the matter can be investigated. George said he does not know who authorized the work. See Wetlands, Page 5A

# Child-pornography charges mount to 235

PENSACOLA - Accused child molester John Davenport Gay has been hit with a dozen additional charges this week, bring-ing the total number of felony counts against him to 235, authorities said Wednesday.

Investigators, who expect even more charges to be filed, have gone through more than 7,500 photos taken from the home of Gay, 24, who befriended the families of area children when he participated in youth

Escambia County Sheriff's Department investigator Sam Peavy said a third of the photos were of nudes or otherwise questionable pictures, including children who were clotherd but in provocative poses.

There is also a chance some victims do not know he has their pictures. Police think Gay, a former film processor, would occasionally copy innocent nude photographs that family members had taken of very young children.

"We believe possibly he was copying photos he was developing." said the investigator. "There's certainly people out

there that he has photos of that have no

Gay was arrested Oct. 2 after two 10-year-old boys said Gay had taken semi-nude pictures of them on a nature trail at the University of West Florida. He remains jailed without bond. No trial date has been set.

After Gay's arrest in October investigators found milk boxes and shoe boxes filled with the pictures of children, many of them nude or engaging in sex. Gay allegedly appears in some of the photographs engaging in sex.







It also would encourage China's pro-democracy movement, which has been forced underground and is dependent upon the support and news received from the network of exiled students and scholars on American cam-

The U.S. government is morally obliged to provide a safe haven for those Chinese students and acholars who seek nothing more than freedom.



# The responsibility of being American

WASHINGTON — Over the Thanksgiving weekend, like may other families, we had four weekend, like may other families, we had four generations gathered at the house — ranging in age from two months to 87 years. It seemed the right time to be reading "Democracy's Next Generation," the recently released survey by polister Peter D. Hart for the liberal advocacy group, People for the American Way. Hart's survey focused on slightly more than a thousand young Americans between the ages of 15 and 24, with supplemental information from interviews with 405 social studies teachers. The findings are disquieting, particularly at a moment when young people in Czechoslovakia are putting themselves on the line for democracy.

the line for democracy.

The key conclusion from these interviews is that, "Young people have learned only half of America's story. Consistent with the priority they place on personal happiness, young people reveal notions of America's unique character that emphasize freedom and license almost to the complete exclusion of service or participation. Although they clearly appreciate the democratic freedoms that, in their view. make theirs the 'best country in the world to live in,' they fail to perceive a need to reciprocate by exercising the duties and

responsibilities of good citizenship."

The evidence for this sweeping statement comes in several forms. Asked about goals that are important to them, three times as many selected "being successful in job or career" and chose "being involved in helping the community be a better place" - 72 percent to 24 percent. Three out of five are not involved in any form of community service. Only one-third said they could forsee a time when they might join the military or work as a volunteer in a political campaign.

The concept of "good citizenship" these young people have gained is individualistic not civic. Asked how they would describe a "good citizen" in their own words, the dominant answer (43 percent) was that it meant someone who is generous and caring. Only one-third mentioned being law-abiding and only 12 percent suggested voting or other forms of political involvement.

Those who teach this generation say they are alarmed at the other indications they see in the classroom that the emphasis on selffullfillment, which is obviously a natural quality of that stage of life, is increasingly crowding out a sense of involvement with the community and nation.

As Hart comments, "The results from this study make clear the necessity for concerted efforts - enlisting the active engagement of parents, educators and administrators — to teach young people not only about their rights and opportunities but about their obligations as citizens as well."

That need, it seems to me, becomes increasingly important as we move into a

post-Cold War world. It is not simply that fewer young poeple will have the experience of military service in coming years. It is also that the temptation will increase to believe that once the main challenge facing this society the contest with communism - has been won, we can become even more focused on our

individual goals.

Donald Eberly, who heads the Coalition for

National Service, is taking a small delegation to Moscow next month to discuss the possibility of joint U.S.-Soviet youth projects. That's a nice gesture. but the real challenge lies here at

At the beginning of thisyear. Washington seemed to recognize the obligation to find ways to arouse the channel the civic-mindedness of the younger generation. President Bush promised a personal effort to encourage volunteer community service. Senate Majority Leader George Milchell (D-Maine) said

he would give high priority to national-service legislation. Not much has come of those pledges. Hart's study emphasizes what we intuitively know to be the case: that parents and teachers. families and schools, are far more important in shaping the values that underlie active democratic citizenship than distant politicians.

The flourishing examples of volunteer youth activity are almost all locally organized-But I cannot avoid the feeling that such politiciana as Sens. Charles S. Robb (D-Va.) and Sam Nunn (D-Ga.) are on the right track when they talk, as both have been doing in recent years, about national-service programs that would expose the younger generation to the challenges of active citizenship.

Hart's survey found strong resistance among the young people to proposals that would require a year of civilain or military service of all of them. They also reject the Nunn-Robb proposal that would condition student loans and other higher education benefits on the performance of such service. But there is overwhelming support - 9 to 1 - for programs that would offer extra credit in high school or extra financial aid beyond high school to those who volunteer for community or military service.

# Taxpayers pay bar bill for touring lawmakers

WASHINGTON - For years we have

brought you reports on the perks of taxpayer-financed congressional travel, but until now we didn't know the full scope of the frills.

Boose, and plenty of it, flows freely—which is not to be confused with "free." You pay the bill so globetrotting lawmakers can have plenty of liquor for "representational purposes." That's how congressional dignitation selembly explain the cases of booch purposes." That's how congressional di-taries solemnly explain the cases of hooch packed onto military

ets before every departure of an of-ficial delegation Representational purposes" means that the lawmakers need liquor to enterforeign countries. Evidently these foreign hosts subscribe to the EVOS philosophy

of partying. The Army in spector general inexpenses of military escorts who act as travel guides for con-gressional delegations abroad. A revestigation obtained by our associate Stewart Harris reveals that members of Congress



themselves occasionally imbibe the taxpayer-financed spirits. A "control room" (aka "hospitality suite") is set up by the military escorts at every stop and is stocked with liquor and munchies.

Lawmakers have been known to hold meetings and entertain foreign dignitaries in the room, but they also kick back there, military escort Staff Sgt. J. Carroll Creekmur told Army investigators.

The Army was looking into controls on the cash that the military escorts take overseas to pay for miscellaneous congressional expenses. In the process, the inspector general stumbled onto several interesting facts about the habits of our globetrotting lawmakers and the military escorts who must cater to their every whim.

The Army can be a little sensitive about acting as bartender to Congress, so several years ago Army officials started having the liquor delivered rather than sending uniformed Gls to the store to stock up.


As much as some drink, lawmakers often touch down stateside before they can finish off every last drop. Here again the Army takes pains to make sure each trip doesn't look like an airborne party. The boose is discreetly unloaded through an elevator and packed into a van. One escort, Sgt. Cloyed Riddle, told the inspector general, "If there's press or somebody out there, they kind of frown on it. unloading that kind of stuff, cases of beer."

Where do the leftovers end up? The Army hosts "photo parties" for the delegation to review and pick up enapshots from the trip, and the liquor is brought out again for those

"They come down and go through the pictures, sip a beer, munch on a preizel or something like that," Warrant Officer Joseph Hall told the investigators. He admitted the parties may not seem kosher to "Joe Public" or "Joe Army," but he said them little soirces have forged better ties between the Army and Congress. Sometimes the military will blow \$300, in addition to the leftover liquor, on these get-togethers.

If the liquor is not used for a photo party, it

is reopened for Army Christmas parties. The inspector general's investigation did not tally up the liquor costs and did not change much. The delegations continue to bring your own bottles and the services continue to throw parties with the leftovers.
