Tax Load Distribution

Legislators working on the tederal tax increase scheduled for this year are at odds over the question of whether the increase in personal income taxes should be on the basis of a percentage increase in each individual's tax or a percentage point boost in each bracket. It is a question of whether the distribution of the tax load shall be changed.

The bill passed by the House would raise each person's income taxes by twelve and a half per cent. This argument seems to suggest a theory that the people in the low-income groups, widely spending their surplus dollars, are the sponsors of inflation, while those in the higher income groups do not have inflationary sums also building inspector, B.
