Garden Gate
By NELL M. WILLIAMS

AUGUST, THE MONTH IN WHICH warm weather comes to stay all summer. In August we have already planted the bulk of our summer flowers and are in most gardens, cutting the bloom...

CONTROLLED SHADE AND MOISTURE CAN MAKE IT FEASIBLE FOR THE MORE EXPERIENCED GARDENER to start many seeds now which ordinarily cannot be germinated for another month.

Here is a list of those which should prove satisfactory for August planting, with the estimated time in weeks from seed to flower.

10 weeks: Winter flowering Sweet Peas, Tithonia, Globe Amaranth (Bachelus huttoni); 12 weeks: Calendula, Ageratum, Chinese Forget-me-not, Dianthus (Sweet William and Hedge-pink); 16 weeks: Annual Calliopsis and Snapdragon; 18 weeks: Aster, Geranium, Scabiosa; 6 months or more: Geranium, Anemone.

BULB OF PLANTS AND GLOBRIOA ROTICILIOLIANA can be planted now. In some situations, in moderately moist soil, Callas may be successfully started. Seed to be sown only germinated now must be well shaded until the little plants break thru the soil. This can be accomplished by placing a sheet of newspaper on top of the flat or seed bed and covering this with hurlap.

As the little plants get above the ground, give more and more light each day, so that strong stocky stems will develop. After a few days your plants could receive full sun during the early and late hours and filtered sunlight during the middle hours from about 10 to 4 o'clock. The soil should never get thoroughly dry.

NOW HEAVY SOILS WITH MOISTURE is a good growing situation for plants like Banana, Ginger lilies, Cannas, Shell Flower and Crepe Myrtle.

NOW IS THE TIME FOR ALL GARDEN CLUB MEMBERS TO PLANT SEEDS AND CUTTINGS FOR EXCHANGE AND ALSO FOR THE FLOWER SHOW IN FEBRUARY.

Many kinds of seed are available now for the asking, such as Albizia, Mimosa, Bauhinia, Poinciana and many others. Among the many cuttings available, Bougainvillea and many others.

Almost everyone has a good damp place on the north side of his home where he can root cuttings easily. If not, we can fill cans or shallow boxes with builders sand, a mixture of Peat and Vermiculite and sand. I often experiment by trying cuttings in these different ways. Of course they must be shaded.

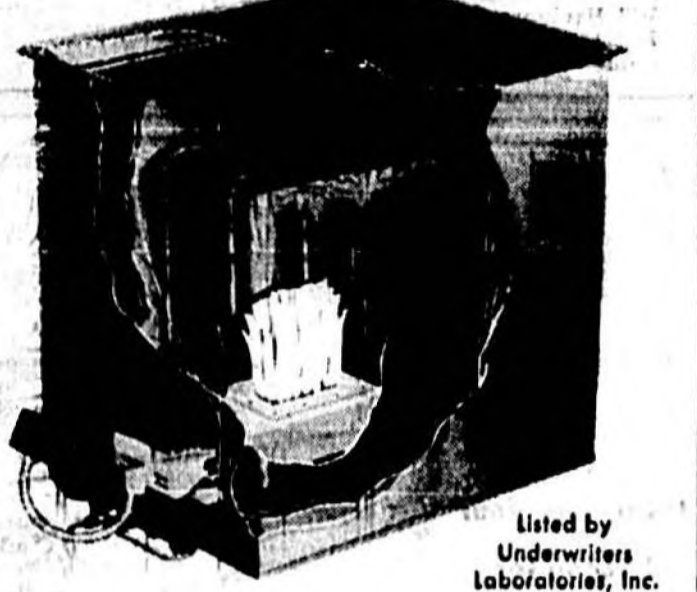

vides that the agencies must reduce employment to 90 per cent of July 1 levels. It is up to them whether to cut 10 per cent immediately as proposed by the Senate or reach the 90 per cent by following the House formula of filling only one out of four vacancies. The House had advocated a 25 per cent cut.
The \$1,677,556,314 bill coming up in the House next week finances miscellaneous agencies needing more money for the present fiscal year. They include the Civil Defense Administration, the Atomic Energy Commission and the Defense Production Agency.

The House Appropriations Committee approved the measure today after chopping out all but \$5,355,000 out of the \$155,000,000 fund which President Truman asked for the Civil Defense Administration.
In doing so, the committee rapped the agency for not developing a "realistic well coordinated" civil defense plan which would guarantee "the people the maximum of protection for the money expended." When that is done, it said, Congress will supply the money.

The committee acted as House leaders strove to speed passage of other government money bills after cracking a Senate-House deadlock over the measures.
The committee refused to approve any civil defense funds for bomb shelters and other protective facilities and cut \$150,000,000 from the \$200,000,000 requested for the purchase of medical supplies and equipment.
The civil defense budget was considered along with those of a

National Security Training Commission created by Congress to develop a program for Universal Military Training.
Approved \$250,000 to employ 32 additional agents for the Bureau of Narcotics, boosting the 1952 staff to 250 compared with 188 during the 1951 fiscal year. In making about a 40 per cent cut in requested funds, the committee emphasized that primary responsibility for enforcing the narcotics law rests with state and local police.
Rep. Canfield (R-NJ) a committee member, condemned the committee action in cutting civil defense funds and requests for the Narcotics Bureau.
"These were two hatchet jobs that are tragic," Canfield told newsmen.

The committee approved \$260,000,000 of the \$275,000,000 asked by the Atomic Energy Commission to speed up construction of new facilities, to test weapons and to develop new type of reactors.
Another big allotment recommended was \$79,210,000 for stockpiling strategic and critical material, for which the President had requested \$80,000,000.
The Commerce Department was allotted \$90,000,000 to continue work on construction of new fast cargo ships. The committee said contracts already have been let for 25 of the 37 new ships authorized by Congress.

Approved \$21,800,000 for Army government and relief in occupied areas, including \$6,780,000 for Japan, \$14,375,000 for the Ryukyus, \$136,000 for Trieste and \$300,000 for the office of occupied areas.
Approved \$25,750,000 for the State Department for government in Germany and Austria, all but \$4,000,000 being for Germany.
Recommended \$104,000,000 for activities of federal agencies responsible for administering the Defense Production Act. This is a cut of \$68,310,000 from budget requests and includes \$30,000,000—of \$5,915,000—for the National Production Authority.
Okayed \$16,500,000 for administrative expenses of the Reconstruction Finance Corporation, commenting that the new RFC boss, Stuart Symington, will "restore it to public confidence."
Granted \$30,154,000 of the \$31,800,000 requested by the Selective Service system and the entire \$185,000 sought by the

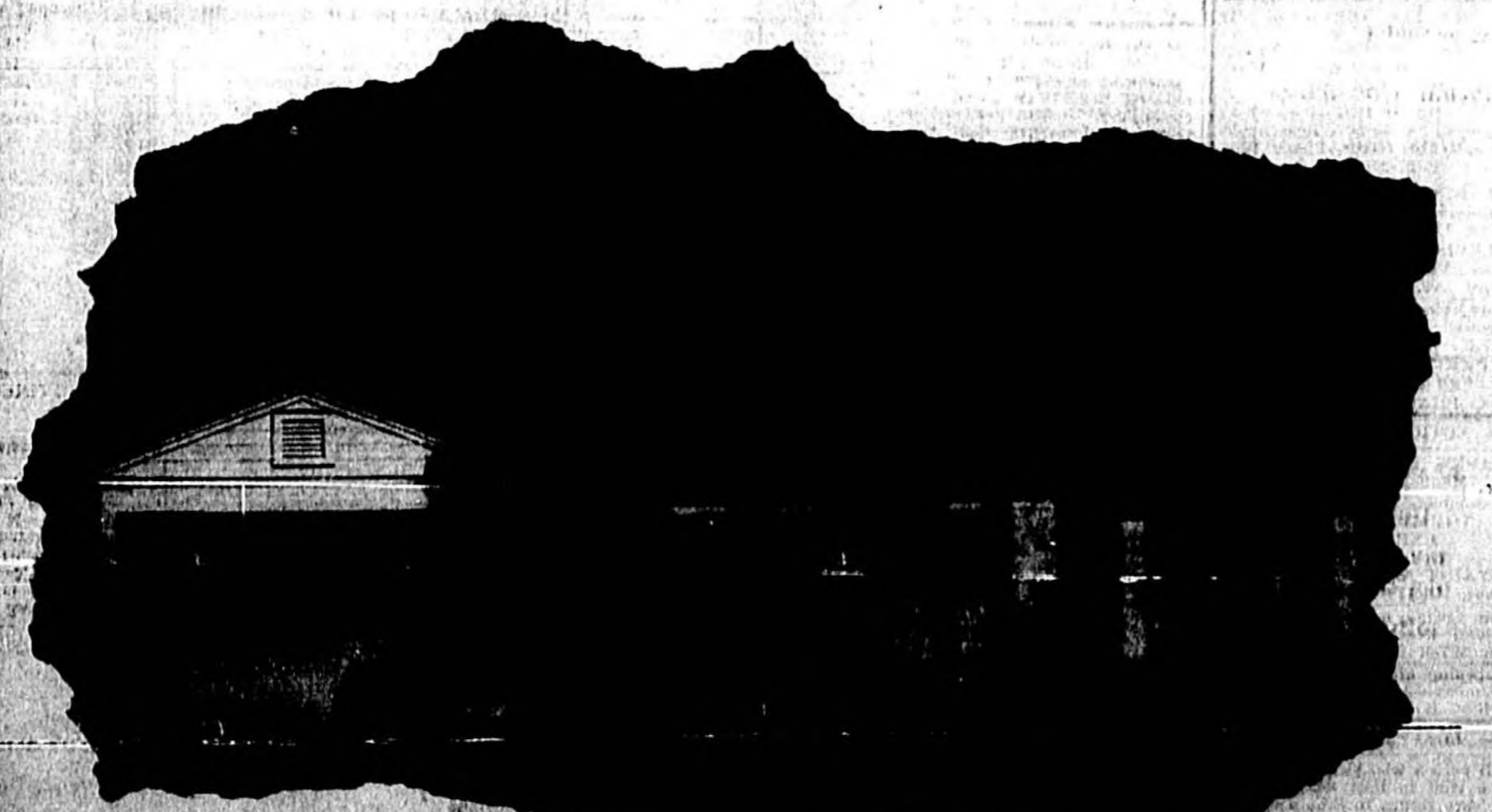
