

Archbishop Joins The Playboy Club?

LONDON (NEA) — Now that London has gained the reputation of being a swinging city of switch-on dollies in miniskirts the hilltopers have set to work to spoil it all.

Nobody is worried much about the ministers. They are considered to be tonic for tired eyes. But the Church of England and the House of Lords are concerned about the gambling casinos that have made this city famous as the modern Gomorrah.

Gambling of all sorts is not only openly condoned in London but it is being commercially exploited, says the Church Council on Gambling, an offshoot of the Church of England. "As a result Britain appears restless to many overseas visitors," says the Rev. Gordon E. Moody, the council's secretary.

Calling for parliamentary action, the Anglican church group pictures London in the grips of a giant pinhead movement that extends from scruffy bingo halls to the elegant gaming rooms of Mayfair.

The House of Lords is no less concerned with London's overseas image as Las Vegas-Thames. In fact, if their lordships are to be believed, American gamblers are deserting Las Vegas and arriving here by the plane-load as guests at all expense paid, of such gambling emporia as the Victoria Sporting Club.

The poison has spread from London and now the whole of Britain is gambling mad, according to Dr. Ellison, the Bishop of Chester. Gambling is now Britain's fastest growing industry, with an annual turnover of \$3 billion, according to the bishop.

Opening the debate in the House of Lords, His Grace charged that the 1960 Betting and Gaming Act is a failure. It has given rise to such unforeseen offshoots as the Playboy Clubs, which the Archbishop of Canterbury has recently invited to join. Dr. Ellison said that he had no doubt that other bishops had been invited to frolic with the bunions.

Lord Derwent (Motto: Never Unready) said that the gaming act has also encouraged protection rackets and other unpleasantness.

Viscount Massereene (Motto: Through Difficulties to Honors) agreed, thought Britain's 16,000 betting shops should be nationalized. "Then we would have at least one nationalized industry showing a profit," he remarked.

Lord Wade, a life peer, thought that gambling had a softening effect on the nation's moral fiber. He cited the \$7,500,000 that had been staked on the general election in March, "much of it coming from the Stock Exchange to the benefit of the share losses following a Labor victory," he said.

Lord Fortescue (Motto: A Strong Shield is My Satisfaction), a Stock Exchange member for 40 years, arose to deny that reputable firms engage in the business of book-making.

The House of Lords contains at least one unabashed gambler. He is 46-year-old Lord Kilbracken (Motto: Without God Nothing), who began his rake's progress as a 16-year-old schoolboy at Eton.

At this tender age Lord Kilbracken ran a book with over a hundred schoolboy clients, he admitted. "I am a compulsive gambler, but aware of the disintegrating effect gambling can have," he confessed. "That is the effect it has had on me. It can destroy all worthwhile standards."

The likelihood is that Britain's Labor government will bring in a set of strict licensing controls for gambling casinos within the next few months. As the Guardian points out in a recent editorial, "it is not necessary to be a full-blown puritan to be worried by the present gambling mania."

Sebastian Canal Pact Inked; May Open St. Johns

Pleasure boating between Lake Monroe and the Atlantic Ocean may be possible upon completion of the Sebastian Canal for which dedication and ground-breaking is planned in late August, according to the Central and Southern Florida Flood Control District (FCDD).

Tropco Brothers, Inc., a Coral Gables firm, has been awarded a \$28,875,000 contract from the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers for construction of the Sebastian Canal and Trout's sub-contractor, Cross Construction Company, already is mobilizing equipment at the work site.

The contractor has been given 820 calendar days to complete the job.

Included in the contract in addition to excavation of Sebastian in Brevard County, is construction of two water control

structures on the canal. The canal, which will serve as an outlet for Lake Williamson reservoir, will open the St. Johns River for boating from Jacksonville through Sanford to the Atlantic Ocean.

The 11.6 miles of canal will have a 100-foot bottom width and will be 20 to 25 feet deep. Army Engineers say. The work has been designed to control water velocities in order to eliminate sedimentation and shoaling at the point where the canal joins with Sebastian Creek on the eastern end.

The first phase of the construction program in the Upper St. Johns River basin has three elements: The Sebastian Canal, a dam and 27,000-acre reservoir at Lake Polk, west of Cocoa; and a reservoir of 12,000 acres at the northern end of the proposed Jane Green Reservoir, an upland storage area west and southwest of Lake Polk.

Boat lifts are provided at the three downstream structures in the Upper St. Johns Basin at Lake Harney, Lake Polk and Lake Washington.

The Army Engineers will report in September on a feasibility study for installation of lifts and locks in the Sebastian Canal, which would open the St. Johns River for pleasure boating from the Atlantic Ocean at Jacksonville on the north to a point on the Indian Waterway near Melbourne on the south. The FCDD has been fighting for this open canal since the idea was first broached.

Development of the Upper St. Johns River area is a part of the Central and Southern Florida Flood Control project, a \$380 million system of canals, levees, and water control structures to help eliminate flooding in 18 populous counties in Florida. The whole flood control project is about 50 per cent complete.

Construction of this system, long stymied by lack of funds for land acquisition, is now approaching reality as a result of the recent appropriation of \$11,047,000 voted by the 1965 Legislature for the Central and Southern Flood Control District. The total is expected to provide between \$4 and \$7 million for acquisition of water storage lands in this area.

The Army Corps of Engineers has estimated the system will return \$2.10 in benefits for every dollar spent to build it. These benefits have been evaluated in terms of flood damage reduction and land enhancement. Other additional benefits which have not been calculated include public recreation, protection of wildlife, increased fresh water supplies for the fast-growing urban areas, and prevention of salt water intrusion.

The Corps has recommended that the federal government pay \$22.5 million of the total cost and the State of Florida and the FCDD the remaining \$24.3 million.

Space Walk Set For Mike Collins

CAPE KENNEDY (AP) — The Gemini 10 astronauts whirled during their second full day in orbit today, hoping smarting eyes and a low fuel supply would not create a late afternoon attempt at a second space rendezvous and an hour-long jet-gum stroll outside the craft.

Ground control officials studied the two problems as the space walker, Air Force Maj. Michael Collins, and the command pilot, Navy Cmdr. John W. Young, spun 240 miles above the earth, still hooked to an Agena tanker satellite that the space agency hailed as a fantastically functioning machine.

William C. Schneider, Gemini mission director, said: "We feel we have a reasonable chance of completing the double rendezvous even though we don't have as much fuel pad as we'd like. If the environmental control system problem straightens out, we also feel we can make the space walk."

At an after-midnight news conference, National Aeronautics and Space Administration officials gave the venture outside priority over rendezvous if a choice has to be made.

The eyes of both astronauts watered and became irritated during the cabin environmental control system, may have been responsible.

The problem cleared by the time the astronauts went to sleep at 11 p. m. EST but officials were concerned that headaches it would recur when the hatch again was opened for the second time.

If all goes well today, the astronauts were to break off from the Agena about 2 p. m. and start closing in on another Agena left in orbit last March by the Gemini 8 astronauts.

Hitchhiking under the power of their own Agena, the Gemini 10 crew had first soared to a record altitude for a manned flight at an orbital high point of 476 miles, then pulled back down close to 240 miles, just seven miles below the path of the old Agena.

They are to rendezvous within a few feet of Agena 8 around 5 p. m., and Collins is to step outside about an hour later. He'll use a gas-powered hand gun to propel himself back Rogers-style over to Agena 8 to conduct experiments.

In steering to their rendezvous and linkup with the Agena 10 in their first hours in space Monday night, Young and Collins expended considerably more spacecraft fuel than intended.

Instead of having 70 per cent of their 940-pound fuel supply remaining, they were down to 35 per cent. As a result, they curtailed many scientific and technological experiments, and ground controllers decided they should remain docked with Agena 10 instead of disconnecting from it Tuesday as planned.

Suit Questions Appropriations

Suit was filed in circuit court today in an effort to halt the county commission from appropriating funds for support of the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce.

Filed by Dr. Leonard Munson, 120 North Scott Avenue, the complaint for injunctive relief charges the county's appropriation of funds for the operation of the chamber is "unlawful, illegal and unconstitutional, and is in violation of Article IX of the Florida Constitution."

Section 10 of the reference article states: "The credit of the State shall not be pledged or loaned to any individual company, corporation or association; nor shall the State become a joint owner or stockholder in any company, association or corporation. The Legislature shall not authorize any county, city, borough, township or incorporated district to become a stockholder in any company, association or corporation, or to obtain or appropriate money for, or to loan its credit to, any corporation, association, institution or individual."

Albert N. Pitta, attorney for Dr. Munson, this morning released this statement explaining the action: "The issue of appropriating money from Seminole County and tax revenues for the use of the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce is one that has long plagued both the taxpayers of the county and successive boards of county commissioners. "Dr. Munson deeply feels that the question of the legality of such appropriations should be placed for decision before the courts, in order to lay at rest the annual vexing question of how much and to whom the county should appropriate tax dollars for independent expenditure.

"Each year more requests for tax dollars are received from a growing number of private organizations, associations, and non-profit corporations, each of which may be deserving of the private support of the public. "Dr. Munson's purpose in testing the constitutionality of the annual appropriations for the chamber is to keep with the goal of the county at large. If such appropriations are in fact unconstitutional, then the commissioners should consider creating an industrial and development board directly under the control and supervision of the county and successive boards have been highly successful. By the employment of trained industrial planners, the taxpayer receives full value for his tax dollar.

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Once-Dead Gale Comes Alive Again

MIAMI (AP)—Celia, a storm once thought to be dead, wound up suddenly today to 80-mile-an-hour fury in the Atlantic Ocean—but too far out to threaten the coast of the United States.

There was a chance, however, that the storm might affect land operations of the Gemini 10 spacecraft.

The forecast for the prime recovery area several hundred miles south of Celia called for rain and restricted visibility and the Defense Department said there was a possibility the landing point might have to be shifted.

Forecasters said the hurricane would brush Bermuda with light squalls later today and possibly affect eastern Newfoundland before blowing itself out in the cold waters of the North Atlantic.

Hurricane Hunter aircraft located Celia 240 miles west of Bermuda and 700 miles east of Charleston, S.C. after a night in which the storm built up explosively from a tropical depression into a full-scale hurricane.

Gale winds lashing out 600 miles to the southeast of the center, she reorganized as all other directions chased small craft into Bermuda ports.

Chief Forecaster Gordon Dunn said Celia's rebirth did not come as a surprise, although the Weather Bureau had written off the storm July 13 after tracking it for two days.

She was given the name Celia—for the season's third tropical storm—when she was first sighted July 13, lashing the sea with 50-mile-an-hour gales north-northeast of Puerto Rico.

Hurricane hunters tallied the storm reported July 13 that top winds were down to 30 miles an hour and Celia was falling apart. No further advisories were issued.

But, in the next four days, Celia hung together, moving 600 miles to the northwest. And yesterday, over the northern Bahamas, she reorganized as a deep tropical depression. And conditions were right for a new build-up of the storm circulation.

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Reas Down Two Yank Bombers

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP) — North Viet Nam fired off a record 23 Soviet-made missiles Tuesday during heavy American air attacks near Hanoi and one of the rockets found its mark, the U.S. command reported.

One U.S. jet was lost to a surface-to-air missile and another was shot down by a Communist MIG17 in a dogfight 20 miles north of Hanoi, a spokesman said. American pilots claimed damage to three MIGs but saw none go down.

Americans Will Go Whole Hog, Dirksen Warns

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Everett M. Dirksen says that unless no exceptions are ordered, "the American people will want to go whole hog" against North Viet Nam if Hanoi puts captured U.S. pilots on trial.

Views similar to that expressed by the Senate Republican leader at a news conference Tuesday were reflected in statements by Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield and Sen. Thomas H. Kuchel, R-Calif., and John Sherman Cooper, R-Ky.

Cooper said any violation of the Geneva prisoners of war convention by North Viet Nam "could provoke responses which would increase and increase into total barbaric conflict."

Dirksen said such trials are held the world can expect to be assailed with a taped radio-broadcast barrage propaganda. He predicted there may be "a rain-washed confessions" from American fliers.

Home To Roost

For several years now, Washington's African policy has been a delicate mixture of idealism and pragmatism. On paper at least, we're committed to the principle of national self-determination. But then there's South Africa—where U.S. investments (\$500 million) and a favorable balance of trade (\$140 million) take some of the sting out of the country's rigid apartheid concept.

The key ingredient in this balance is the hope that nothing will ever occur to rock the boat. But in turbulent Africa, crises arise faster than most diplomats foresee, each capable of generating a wave.

Such a crisis is now looming, and the resulting backlash could sink our African policy for good.

Within the next four months, the International Court will hand down its long-awaited decision on South Africa which, under a League of Nations mandate, has been a virtual colony of South Africa since 1918.

Since then, South Africa has been under continuous fire from all corners for failing to comply with Article 2 of the mandate, requiring her to "promote to the utmost the material, moral, and well-being and social progress of the inhabitants." The basic argument is that though South Africa's attempts to apply apartheid to the mandated territory may be in the best interests of South West Africa's 70,000 whites, they're deprive the territory's 500,000 blacks of civil and economic freedom.

Six years ago, Ethiopia and Liberia asked the International Court to "adjudge and declare" that South Africa is responsible to the United Nations for the admission of the territory and that she has violated her obligations.

The weight of evidence clearly seems to be against South Africa, though she spent an estimated \$12 million to prove that apartheid was in the best interests of everybody in the territory.

Should the decision go this way, Washington's boat will be rocked. South Africa could calm the waves by agreeing with it—renouncing her claims to the territory and placing it under U.N. administration.

But even those diplomats who have taken comfort for years in the thought that constructive and peaceful change could occur gradually in South Africa aren't betting this way. More likely, she will announce rejection of the decision or just plain ignore it.

Both of these reactions have been anticipated. Washington has tried—without success—to devise some sort of economic sanction which will not hurt the United States worse than South Africa. Black African nations have carefully prepared their half-hour speeches—five minutes invective against South Africa and 25 minutes against "Western hypocrisy."

Russia and Red China have eagerly planned their tactics to recoup a little lost prestige in the Dark Continent.

Whatever the outcome, Washington's delicate fence-straddling on Africa appears to be over. A very hard decision will have to be made. It appears that it will be between losing one arm or both.

WASHINGTON (NEA)—If Oswald Dorticos edges out Castro as Cuba's head man, Fidel ever was.

(Dorticos wields great power as Cuba's president and chief of the island's economic life.)

An anti-Communist puts it: "He looks clean. He wears a suit and tie, not fatigues. He looks intellectual, not like a ruffian."

"Even a friend of mine who knows what he's really like came away from a conversation with Dorticos saying how reasonable he was. He very skillfully fooled me into the upper class for years before Castro took over."

"It is so smooth that when Castro put his own mistress in Dorticos's office to watch him, Dorticos twisted her around his little finger."

"It's a great contrast to Fidel. He gets things done. He's very efficient, good at organization. He doesn't get out on the town, publicly drinking, singing and chasing women."

"He works slowly and carefully, plays both sides against the middle. When he was in on writing many of the laws which setted foreign and Cuban private property, in talking with non-Castro Cubans he pretended to complain about the terms of the laws, he was himself writing."

"He was a member of the Communist group at the university and gradually began to assume leadership in that group. He did this by getting angry or loud when the others did, but talking quietly."

"Even as a college student he carefully put on the appearance of being a nice guy among a bunch of rascals. He didn't arouse antagonism."

"When he graduated in law, he went back to Cienfuegos and put up his shingle. He began to represent business in cases against labor. He associated with business groups and was a member of the city's most aristocratic club."

"In these years, he hid his sentiments. No one thought of him as a Communist. He was living very well and was given a legal appointment from Batista. He became president of Cuba's bar association."

"Then in 1958 he became involved in a Navy revolt against Batista and left for Mexico."

"Apparently, she never got through to the doctor, for we found her slumped over the telephone, having tied to death."

"Dr. Crane, how could we have prevented this tragedy? Unless you have received the expert Boy Scout training in practical first aid, you can graduate from college and still be ignorant of simple medical strategy as Martha."

That's why I have urged the inclusion of a one-semester course in high school on practical medicine.

So avail yourself of that free oxygen at ONCE by rapid deep breathing.

All we medicals can do for you, anyway is offer your heart oxygen to tide over the crisis until you may not reach you for half an hour.

And it is those first 10 minutes that often tip the scales. Many of you will also be wakened in the middle of the night with a sharp pain over your breastbone.

Even physicians may not be sure when such a attack, don't move to a bed or try to climb upstairs.

Let still and take rapid deep breaths!

Keep up that process, for the remedy for a heart attack is oxygen, and the air all around you contains 20 per cent oxygen.

For most of you readers fail to use common sense regarding everyday medical situations. So you should all be taught how to handle medical conditions, without crying for a physician to perform some supposed miracles.

Martha could have stopped the bleeding vein and saved her own life just by pressing on the cut with her thumb or the heel of her palm.

But if it is due to a coronary (heart) attack, then oxygen will help take off the sharp edge of that pain, so breathe deep and fast.

Keep it up!

If no change occurs within 5 or 10 minutes, it isn't likely that your pain was due to a heart attack!

Remember, we medicals never cure! Only God can cure! In 85 per cent of medical cases, you will get well in spite of what we medicals do for you! In cases of brain tumor, diabetes, ruptured appendix or peptic ulcer, and a few other unusual conditions, we medicals can only help tip the scales.

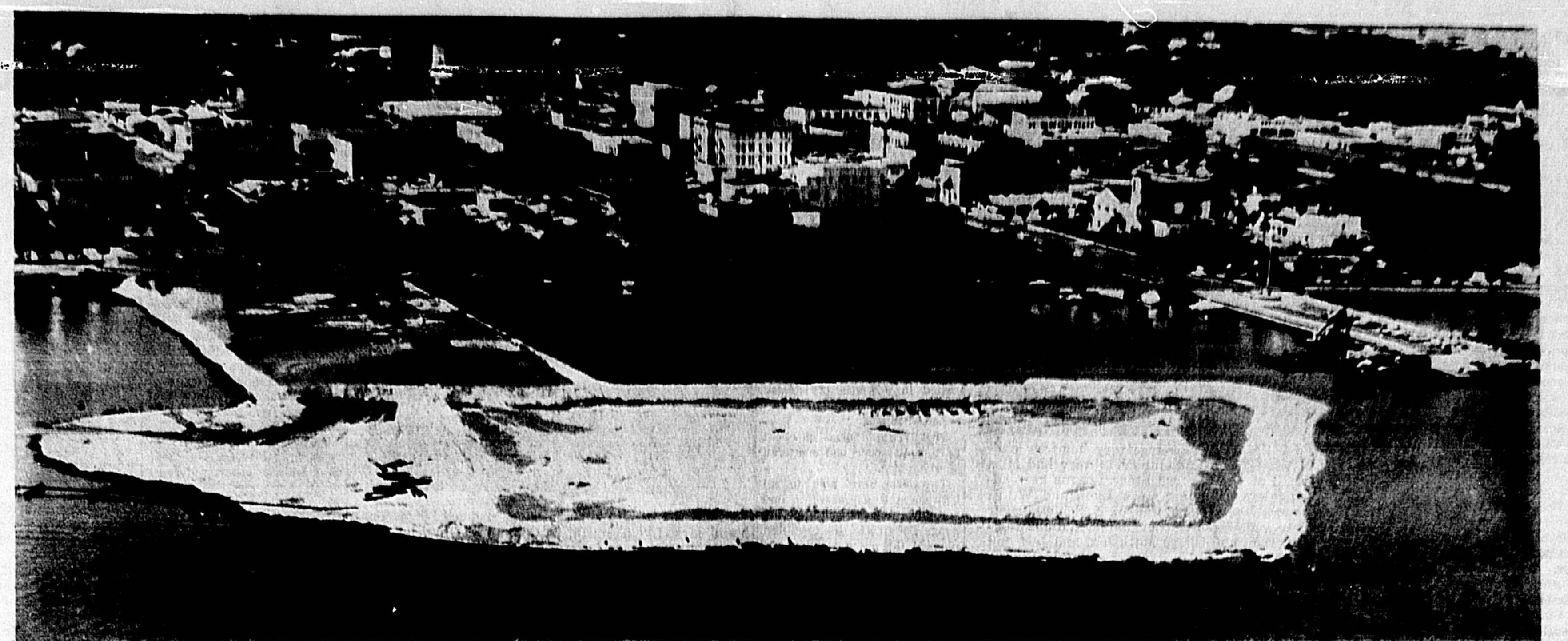

'Ev' Pushes For Prayer

WASHINGTON (AP)—Senate Republican Leader Everett M. Dirksen tries to shake loose from the Senate judiciary committee today his constitutional amendment to permit voluntary prayers in the public schools.

"The Illinois Senator (also of DeBary, Fla.) said he was hopeful of the outcome of his wheeling and cajoling will do any good."

Dirksen introduced his proposed amendment on March 22, saying it was intended to clarify the Supreme Court's interpretation of the constitutional requirement for separation of church and state.

Dirksen's amendment was referred to the judiciary committee's subcommittee on constitutional amendments. Only last week Sen. Birch Bayh (Ind.), the subcommittee chairman, announced eight days of hearings on it would start Aug. 1.

But Dirksen, who wanted quicker, shorter hearings, said he would ask the full judiciary committee at its meeting today to take his amendment away from Bayh's subcommittee and act on it.

He said he wanted to get it on the Senate's calendar of pending legislation even if it were reported out of committee without recommendation.

"The senate is entitled to vote on it," he said.

Approval by a two-thirds majority of the Senate and the House is required to submit a constitutional amendment to the states. Then, to become effective, it must be ratified by three-fourths of the state legislatures.

Dirksen has said that, if necessary, he will offer his amendment as a substitute for a minor bill already on the Senate calendar. He used this tactic before in trying to get approval of a constitutional amendment on legislative re-appointment.

Altamonte GI In Vet Hospital

Pfc. William H. Buell, former Altamonte Springs resident wounded in action on July 4 in Viet Nam, has been returned to the United States for treatment at Chelsea Veterans Hospital, Chelsea, Mass., where he will be for the next three months.

He was on patrol when his company (part of the 133rd "Screaming Eagles") was ambushed by the Viet Cong. He was hit five times by 30 caliber automatic rifle bullets. Seconds before he was hit he killed four Viet Cong and wounded a fifth. Later in the same engagement the VC lieutenant who shot him was himself killed.

In a coincidence, young Buell's father, Howard Buell, who is working as a civilian in Viet Nam with the RMK Construction Company, was at a job site less than a mile from the base hospital where his son was taken. He was able to be with his son for six days before he was airlifted stateside.

William's mother, Mrs. Robert Viesch, resides in Casselberry.

Bringing Home Records Bundle

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP) — One of man's most exciting and significant space adventures reaches a blazing climax today when the Gemini 10 astronauts make a high-speed dive back through the atmosphere, bringing home a bundle of records.

Command pilot John W. Young, a Navy Commander, and space-walker Michael Collins, an Air Force major, planned to trigger the retro-rockets on their fuel-spoor spacecraft at 3:31 p.m. EST to start a fiery descent. The landing in the Atlantic about 550 miles east southeast of Cape Kennedy was timed for 4:07 p.m.

A recovery force of ships and planes headed by the helicopter carrier Guadalcanal was stationed in the planned landing zone, where weather conditions were reported good.

Until the re-entry, the astronauts were to drift through space, conserving their precious remaining fuel and conducting whatever photographic and scientific experiments they could. They were ready to come home after three days aloft. In that period they had had the hatch open three times — twice for Collins' business outside and once to jettison items no longer needed.

Discussing that Wednesday night, Young commented: "We'd like to try for five — on first two days in space, expressed his exuberance when he closed to within a few feet of Agena 8."

Terrors In Viet Nam Described

"The war in Viet Nam is an unbelievably terrible kind of war and the suffering of civilians is unlearnable," Dr. Joseph O'Malley, Orlando, and ex-Marine, told members of the Sanford Kiwanis Club Wednesday.

Dr. O'Malley, who recently returned from a trip to Viet Nam to do plastic surgery on hundreds of mutilated people, showed Kiwanians shocking color slides of tortured, mutilated and napalm-burned Vietnamese, many of them children.

"The tortures and mutilations were inflicted, mainly on children, by the Viet Cong, to force parents to join the Communist forces," Dr. O'Malley explained.

Some of the tortures consisted of cutting off the lips, slitting of the face from mouth to ear with bayonets and gouging out of eyes.

Other patients on whom Dr. O'Malley did plastic surgery were those hideously mangled by U.S. napalm-bombing attacks.

"Even if, and when, we win this war, it will take 50 years to put these people back together. These people have lived in terror and horror for 22 years," Dr. O'Malley declared.

Lack of medical facilities, instruments and beds is critical, according to Dr. O'Malley, who has gathered and shipped some 2,000 pounds of sheets, pillows and cases, instruments, drugs and supplies to Viet Nam since his return.

He suggested that the U.S. government send plastic surgeons to Viet Nam to work on mutilation cases on a rotation basis. He also advocated the blockading of Ho Phong harbor to stop British, Russian and Danish ships from delivering supplies to the Communists and more bombing of depots and oil supply dumps, as is now being done.

During his stay there, Dr. O'Malley adopted an orphaned Vietnamese child, who was later killed before she could be gotten out of the war-torn country.

He said there are thousands of orphaned children in the

country who are without any kind of care, surviving as best they can, with the aid of U.S. servicemen, who do what they can to feed and clothe them.

Many of the children on whom Dr. O'Malley operated were cleft-lip children, who are abandoned by their Buddhist parents. After corrective surgery the children are accepted by their families. Cleft-lip is a common congenital malady in Viet Nam, he said.

"All these poor people want is peace and an end to terror," Dr. O'Malley concluded. He said he will return to Viet Nam as soon as he can arrange transportation.
