# Board Of 'Untouchables' Urged For War On Crime

TALLAHASSEE (AP)—The Director of Gov. Claude Kirk's War on Crime, claiming crime and corruption are widespread in Florida, has urged lawmakers to create a board of "untouchables" to lead the state crime fight.

George Wackenhut of Miami, whose private investigative firm has furnished the men for Kirk's privately financed anti-crime effort, said the proposed board of inquiry should be given some \$2 million and be authorized to hire private investigators.

Wackenhut made the statements in a 90-minute appearance before a joint meeting of the House and Senate Anti-Crime Committees which are considering various forms of anti-crime legislation.

"Just think what could be accomplished" with cooperation, he said.

Wackenhut also recommended that the legislators pass a law against conspiring with known state-financed crime-fighting agencies.

Asked if Kirk's life were in jeopardy, he said there was more exposure to "crackpots" because Kirk was more in the public eye, but said he seriously doubted if organized crime would try to "knock off" the governor.

# S. Florida Ag Industry In Midst Of Disaster

MIAMI (AP)—Sunbathers, surfers and fishermen—basking under sunny skies and gentle breezes—consider south Florida one of the most delightful "emergency" areas. Farmers and cattlemen are in the midst of a disaster however.

Populous Dade County and 20 others in the middle and southern part of the Sunshine State became eligible for emergency aid Wednesday because of a three-month drought.

The aid, announced by Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman, will go to ranchers whose cattle are standing on equipped aircraft. The down-town area "smells like smoke," the police department said.

While the federal aid offered relief, the most welcome relief would have been rain. But forecasters said, "more of the same." No significant rain has been reported since March.

Winds during the night in south Florida blew smoke from Everglades fires away from Miami and into Fort Myers on the opposite side of the peninsula.

Visibility was cut to 1/2 mile at Fort Myers where the airport was closed to all but instrument.

# Legislators Outlaw LSD

TALLAHASSEE (AP)—The Florida Legislature picked up a measure Wednesday to ban LSD, or lysergic acid diethylamide, and to bring state purchasing and water and air pollution under stricter control.

The measure now goes back to the House, where Republican Minority Leader Donald Reed of Boca Raton has vowed to strike it down.

House concurrence with Sen. Louis de Part's bill to outlaw the hallucination-producing drug LSD, on a 106-1 vote, speed the Tampa Democrat's measure out of five to seven, outlawing discrimination according to sex, and create a special research and treatment center for mentally-disordered sex offenders.

# Legalize Old 'Sin Laws,' Group Says; None Willing

TAMPA (AP)—While Florida officials admit the state's penal code contains "sin laws" which may now be outlived by social change, few are willing to line up behind the President's Crime Commission and go specific.

An Associated Press survey Wednesday revealed no one agreeable to going on record directly in support of such crime commission recommendations as legalizing prostitution so long as it is not organized and public solicitation is not involved.

The commission, in a report issued Monday, also said laws against fornication and adultery between consenting adults and homosexual activity should be reviewed because they "lie upon the public conscience."

More Florida law enforcement officers accepted the views of colleagues expressed in a national survey Wednesday, that relaxing existing prohibitions in any area of crime would open the door to organized activity.

"I'm a firm believer in the law as it is on the books," said Police Chief Wallace Gossett of Vero Beach, head of the state Chiefs of Police Association. "I don't see anything wrong with the laws the way they are."

The crime commission's report suggested existing laws on gambling and prostitution which had "frustrated enforcement" and said changing attitudes toward illicit sex, drinking and abortion

# Warships Bump Again

WASHINGTON (AP) The American destroyer Walker was scuttled by a Russian warship a second time about 1:30 a.m. today in the Sea of Japan.

Pentagon sources said the latest incident of American and Soviet confrontation in international waters was another Russian destroyer.

WASHINGTON (AP) —The United States has charged harassment by a Soviet ship which collided with an American destroyer — latest in a series of U.S. - Soviet sea incidents including collisions with the USS Walker.

U. S. officials said they would await details before trying to assess the significance of the Wednesday collision in the Sea of Japan.

A Pentagon spokesman labeled it an accident, but the State Department said the fact the Soviets were repeatedly warned about coming too close to a group of American ships speaks for itself.

The State Department protested "close maneuvering and violations of the rules of the road" by the Soviet destroyer Besledny, resulting in her colliding with the USS Walker.

The scuttling caused minor damage to the warship and no one was hurt, the Pentagon said.

State Department sources said the incident could indicate a further toughening of Moscow's attitude toward the United States as the Vietnam war intensifies.

### Angler Saved From Floods

The companion, Willard Davis of Hamlet, Tenn., ducked under nearby trees and turned in the alarm when he returned to see the dam overflowing in front of Gentry.

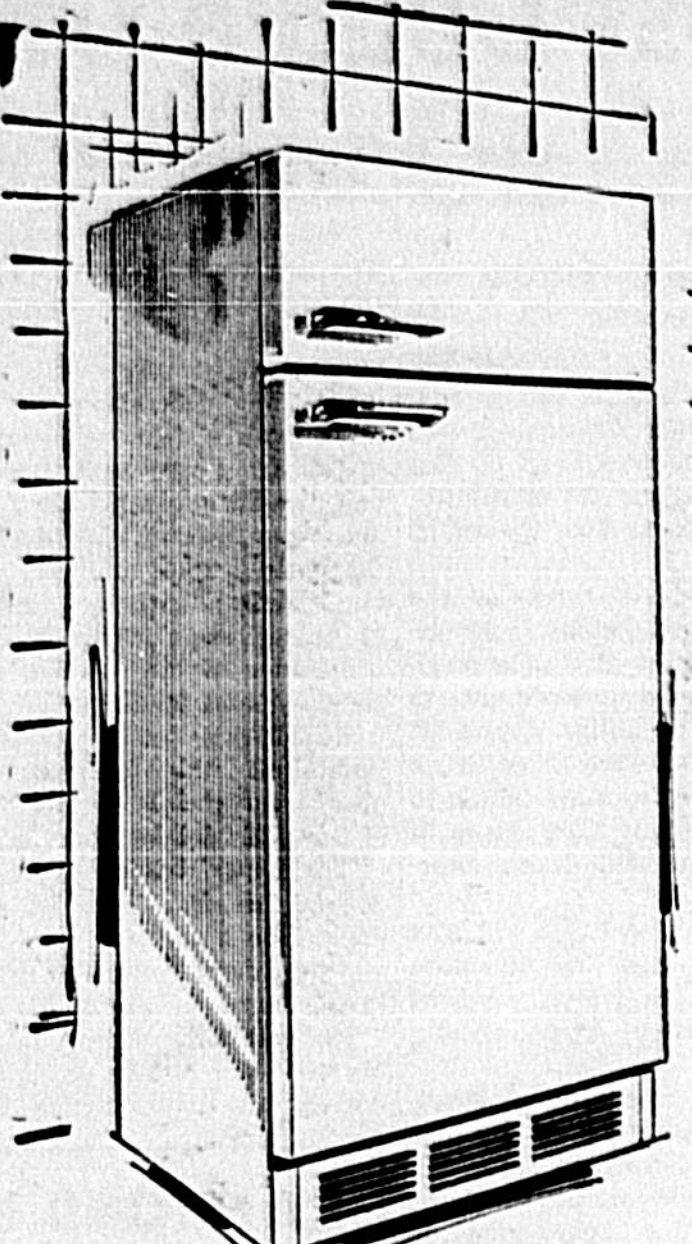
Rescuers said the Nolichucky River, rising because of heavy rains in the surrounding mountains, would have covered Gentry in six hours.

### 'Off & Running' Says Chief Of Apollo Craft

DOWNNEY, Calif. (AP) — "We're off and running," says Navy Capt. Walter M. Schirra Jr., chosen to command America's first three-man Apollo mission in a spacecraft redesigned for safety.

Schirra, at 44 the oldest of the U.S. astronauts, will take a fire-proof Apollo craft on an earth orbital practice run early next year. With him will be Air Force Maj. Donn F. Eisele, 36, and a civilian, Walter Cunningham, 35, who have never traveled in space.

They planned to tell at a news conference today some of the new concepts in design that they hope will avoid a disaster like the fire that killed the original Apollo crew Jan. 27.

Their mission, primarily a systems check-out, will last up to two weeks.

Schirra, one of the seven Mercury astronauts, accepted his new flight assignment with the elation expressed by the astronauts corps in the past.

"Press on," he declared. "That's the cue."

James E. Webb, National Aeronautics and Space Administration director, told a Senate Space Committee Tuesday NASA plans to fly the first Apollo mission early in 1968, fully expecting to make a manned landing on the moon by the end of the decade.

Yet, he added, the flight will not be attempted until the astronauts themselves are convinced that they and the spacecraft are ready. Of key importance in the redesigned Apollo craft, built by North American Aviation, Inc., are a new hatch and minimum of combustible materials in the cockpit.

When fire broke out in the Apollo 1 vehicle on Cape Kennedy, Fla., launching pad, it spread rapidly over a blanket of highly flammable material inside the cabin. The astronauts, under normal conditions, could not have opened the hatch in less than 90 seconds.

Air Force Lt. Col. Virgil I. Griffin, Lt. Col. Edward H. White II and Navy Lt. Cmdr. Roger B. Chaffee died in less than 30 seconds, trying vainly to escape.

Engineers who designed a new explosive hatch built it to open within five seconds.

Webb said the new capsule, known as Block II, will use a 100 per cent oxygen atmosphere, as Apollo I did, but "the use of noncombustible and fire-resistant materials will minimize the risk of fire to the lowest level possible."

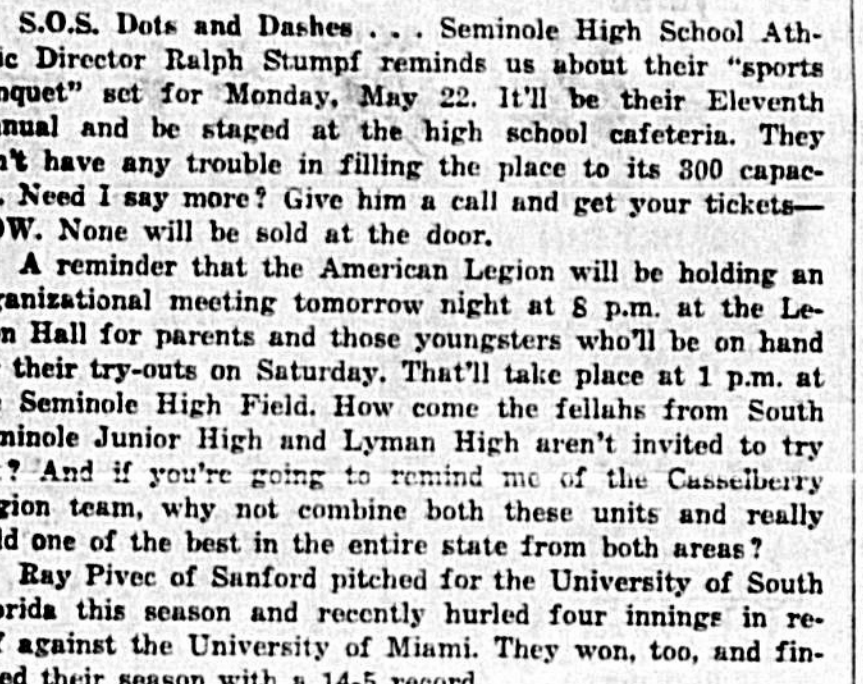

Suppose he loses? "I'll definitely retire if I lose," said Torres, "and I may even quit if I win."

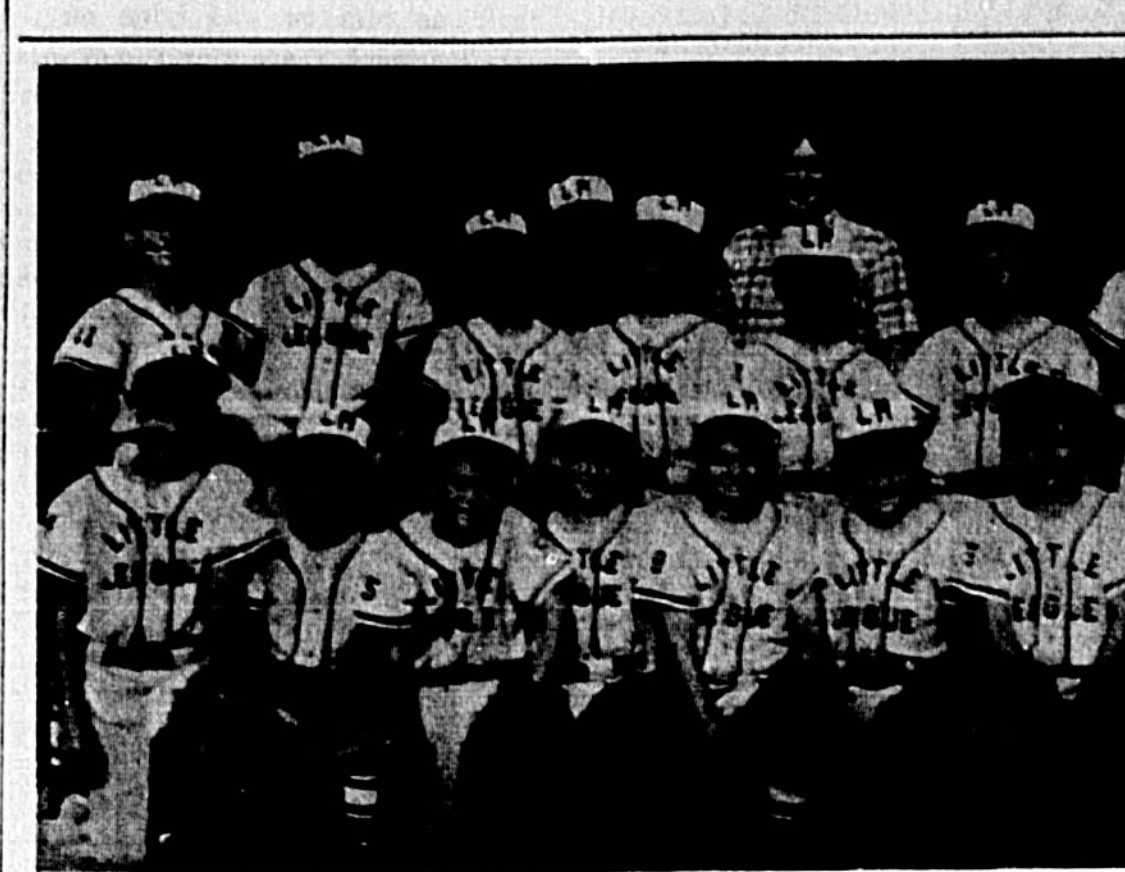
Torres said the panacea injury, which he had in a fight with heavyweight Tom McNeely on July 21, 1965, bothered him again before his last fight with Tiger.

**Old Fashioned Sunshine Cake**  
1 1/2 cups sugar  
3/4 cup water  
6 egg whites, well beaten  
1/2 teas. salt  
2 cups sifted cake flour  
1/2 teas. soda  
1/2 pt. commercial sour cream  
2 tbsp. cream of tartar  
1/2 teas. vanilla

Blend corn meal with one cup of milk. Then add remaining three cups of milk. Cook at medium temperature, stirring constantly. Add melted butter, salt and baking powder. Fold in well beaten eggs. Pour into well-greased baking dish. Bake at 350 degrees for 45 to 50 minutes, or until a straw inserted in the center comes out clean.

**Apple Rice Pudding**  
1 1/2 cups milk  
1/2 cup water  
1/2 cup uncooked rice  
2 tbsp. sugar  
1/2 teas. salt  
1 tsp. butter  
4-5 medium sized apples

Heat the milk and water and stir in the rice. Steam for 1 1/2 hours in a double boiler. Stir in the sugar, salt and butter and the cooked apples in the center. Then spread with two table spoons, or more, of the orange marmalade. Cover the top with rice and heat thoroughly in 250 degree oven for 30 minutes. Serve with light cream.

2 acorn squash  
1/2 cup margarine

### Combat Deaths Broken Down State-By-State

WASHINGTON (AP) — Under a newly computerized operating the Pentagon provided for the first time today a numerical breakdown of Vietnam combat deaths by states. California has lost the most men.

New York, Pennsylvania, Texas and Ohio follow in that order. All of the other 45 states, plus the District of Columbia, have given up some men also are listed from Guam, West Germany, Mexico, the Philippines, Puerto Rico, Virgin Islands, Canada and Peru.

A combat was the key information on 7,822 servicemen who died by enemy hands between Jan. 1, 1961 and last March 31.

Of these, 483 listed their home of record as California. New York had 428, Pennsylvania 403, Texas 402 and Ohio 385.

Nine other states suffered 200 or more Vietnam combat fatalities: Illinois, 178; Michigan, 171; Florida, 287; New Jersey and North Carolina, 228 each; Indiana, 217; Tennessee, 211; Massachusetts, 204; and Georgia, 200.

Thirteen other states had 100 or more combat dead.

Pentagon spokesmen explained that the vast majority — but not all — servicemen give their birthplace as home of record, while others may list what they consider to be home, or the current address of primary next of kin.

The computer poured out a broad statistical picture of the men dying in Vietnam.

Some men have perished on the battlefield, in sea operations or in air missions at the age of 20 than at any other age — a total of 1,331.

One 17-year-old was killed. A Pentagon directive issued in 1965 now prohibits assignment of 17-year-olds in the war zone.

By rank, 6,878 of the 7,822 combat deaths were enlisted men, 584 officers.

When fully operational later this week, the computer system will also be able to tell the major cause of American deaths in combat.

S. 17-92 from the existing four lane Seminole County Commission road to the I-4 exchange and 7.8 miles of SR 428 from Oviedo northeast to SR 46.
