## Red Threat Seen By McNamara

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Defense Secretary Robert McNamara said today a Red threat to foment violent revolutions throughout "all of the undeveloped world" is being met by the U. S. defense program.

McNamara, who had returned to the U. S. after a tour of national liberation in that country.

Red China's long-term aim, McNamara told Congress in his annual defense review, is a series of conflicts that "will sweep the world" and make it dominant in Asia, Africa and Latin American countries.

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## Flu 'Bug' Hits Longwood School

LONGWOOD (UPI) — A long wave of elementary school children is being hit by the "bug" flu in the past few days, Principal Louis Kosky reported at Tuesday evening's meeting of the Parent-Teacher Organization.

Kosky, himself, was hit by the "bug" last week and most of the teachers have been ill.

With little more than half the school year gone, the entire year's budget for substitute teachers has already been exceeded by 100 per cent, Kosky said, and absenteeism among students because of the flu is averaging 45 per day.

Absenteeism reached as high as 73 students a day last week.

Kosky also reported the school has been qualified under Public Law 80-10 for federal funds in the amount of \$11,700, as well as another grant of \$1,600.

Equipment and supplies ordered with these funds include a contract reader for remedial reading, a 16 mm movie projector and movie projector, 10 phonographs to provide one for each classroom, two tape recorders for the language arts program, 117 1/2 television sets and 14 screen, 12 film strip projectors, first and second grade readiness materials worth \$1,800, 899 classroom library books for \$1,000, film strips for \$800, and special film strips for the reading program for \$12.

First and second grade students currently are having their teeth examined, cleaned, and fluoride coated by a dental technician, it was reported.

Reported influenza cases in Seminole County are showing a marked increase this year, according to county health director Dr. Frank Leone, but the increase is "not of epidemic proportions."

There has been a general increase of flu cases throughout the state, with some counties reporting a much larger incidence than others.

One of the measures is in the number of absences from a full amount of absenteeism, Dr. Leone said, "it is more than usual at this time of year." However, he was quick to point out the students returned to school quickly.

There has been some Asian type "B" flu reported, but none of the more sickening type "A." According to Dr. Leone, most of the school absences are not based on any Asian type virus.

"There is an increase over last year in flu cases," Dr. Leone said, "but definitely not of epidemic proportions."

## Premier Rules Uganda Alone

KAMPALA, Uganda (UPI) — Premier Milton Obote assumed one-man rule over Uganda today and five of his cabinet members were ousted "pending an investigation into their activities."

Obote engineered his one-man coup with the arrest of the five ministers and later announced he had "taken over all powers of the government."

He said action was taken in the interests of national stability and public security and tranquility.

**City Directory Of Sanford Now Off The Presses**

Want to get the "inside dope" on that new neighbor? You can easily check to see if he really is vice president of his company by consulting a treasury of local information now available and ready for reference use hereabout.

It's the new Sanford city directory, just delivered to subscribers by H. L. Poik & Co. of Richmond, Va.

The new directory, succeeding the 1965 edition, is a compact volume listing 11,310 names of adults and business places in Sanford and Seminole County. Delmar also is included.

The directory is compiled and distributed with assistance of the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce, according to John Krider, executive manager.

Special features of the directory include the listings of owner-occupied and rented homes, marital status, and heads of households; telephone numbers (11,110 g's by streets and houses); a numerical telephone guide; and an illustrated story about Sanford.

The classified pages of the new directory register many groups of commercial, industrial and professional enterprises, listed from air conditioning to welders and brassers.

The publishers explained that these represent only the basic headings, and do not cover the numerous variations purchased by subscribers as "displays" and listed in the classified pages. It may be noted that this catalog of the activities of the community ranges from the very new to the very old, for along with such headings as "motels," "transportation lines" and "electrical equipment" are such as "bicycle dealers," "feed dealers" and "general merchandise."

The directory people stated that there will be the customary distribution of the latest Sanford City Directory to branches of the free-reference directory library system maintained nationally at chamber of commerce and other locations by the members of the Association of North American Directory Publishers. It is pointed out that each new edition sent to these libraries serves to keep the name and identity of this city constantly before people in distant places.

First and last on the new roster are A-1 Pawn Shop and Genovis, W. J. Checking the family names in the new directory, one will find such "combinations" as Black and Blue, King and Queen; Rich and Poore, and Knight and Day.

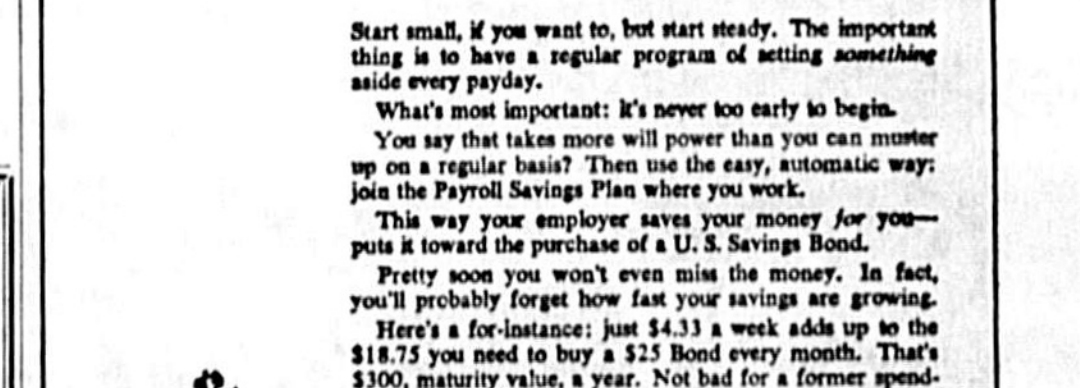
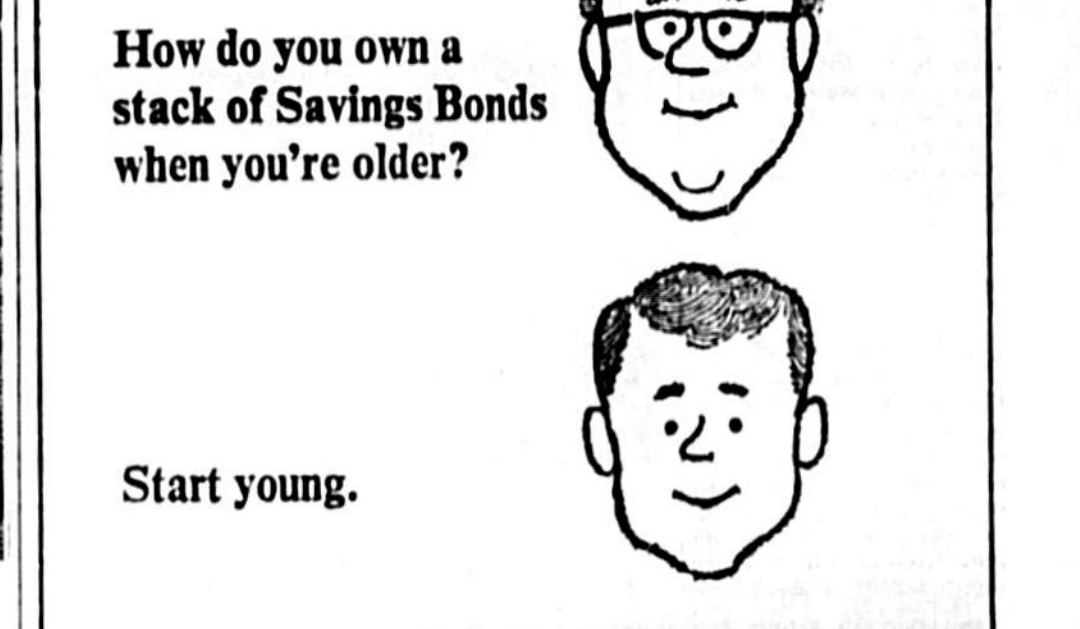

# Drug Addiction Doubled In Great Britain

 The junkies start gathering at the all-night circus in Piccadilly Circus at midnight, so they can draw their next day's supply of morphine and heroin with National Health prescriptions.  
 The idea is to draw your supply, dash to the nearest public lavatory for quick "fix" and still catch the last subway home.  
 It is all perfectly legal, and the junkies get their drugs free under Britain's socialized medicine program. In fact, the British pride themselves that their system dealing with drug addicts is more humane than the American, which regards them more as criminals than as sick people.  
 But Britain's humane system has now been knocked into a cocked hat by statistics which show that drug addiction here has nearly doubled in the past five years. And a government committee appointed to look into the matter recommends that addicts be detained at treatment centers set up along American lines.  
 Plans for the "detouring" rise in addiction is held at the discretion of the medical profession in the report of the committee headed by Lord Brain, 69, a Quaker and an outstanding neurologist. Some doctors have been "over-prescribing" drugs, the Brain committee claims.  
 In the five-year period which ended in 1964 the total number of drug addicts known to the Home Office had risen from 454 to 753—the number of heroin addicts from 68 to 512.  
 These are only the "known" addicts. Contrary to popular belief, addicts are not required to register with the police here before receiving drugs, nor are doctors obliged to inform the Home Office if they are treating an addict.  
 The figures may seem small in the United States (there are said to be 50,000 addicts in New York City alone), but police and medical experts are alarmed over the unbroken rise.  
 They also are concerned about addiction among young people. In 1959 only 50 out of 434 addicts (11 per cent) were under 35 years of age, but by 1964 this group numbered 297 out of 503 (nearly 60 per cent).  
 Meanwhile, news that their drug supplies may soon be curtailed, if not cut off, has thrown the junkies into a panic. A number of them have been interviewed on television and radio, and they bitterly complain that their freedom is being tampered with.  
 Barry Ellis, a writer who has been on heroin for 21 years, says that the Brain committee report "smacks of totalitarianism." Ellis, who draws his drug supply from his National Health doctor once a week, says he will refuse to go to a treatment center.  
 "Under the present British system there is no black market in drugs, no middleman, because we get them perfectly legally with a doctor's prescription," says Ellis. "But if we have to go to a treatment center for our drugs, as the Brain committee recom-

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# Massive Federal Attack On Highway Accidents Is Proposed

 NEW YORK (NEA) — Unless the federal government does something soon, deaths from motor vehicle accidents will reach 100,000 a year by 1975 — double the present auto death rate.  
 The prediction was made recently by the American Trial Lawyers Assn. in a "white paper" which urged Washington to take steps to stop the carnage on the highway.  
 The group of 20,000 attorneys also asked the federal government to appoint a national "safety czar" to coordinate a comprehensive highway safety program.  
 Joseph Keiner, association president, charged it was an "undeniable fact" that the federal government had "no plan" to cope with the highway slaughter.  
 But a plan of some kind may soon be in the offing, in his State of the Union address, President Johnson said he will propose a "Highway Safety Act" of 1966 to work an educational campaign planned by the association in an effort to curb highway deaths.  
 The study reported that while 605,000 Americans have died in all wars from the Revolution to Vietnam, road deaths in this country have totaled 15 million in only 25 years.  
 The number of persons injured in highway accidents in one year (1964) is the same number as the total beds in all United States hospitals — 17 million, the study revealed.  
 While criticizing the apparent lack of federal interest in highway safety, the association also blasts automobile and tire manufacturers for their "lack of concern for safety" and recommends that the federal government set minimum safety standards for design and maintenance of all vehicles and equipment as "it has already done for planes, ships and trains."  
 Other recommendations made by the Trial Lawyers include:  
 • The creation of a Federal Bureau of Driver Licensing to provide federal control of licensing and ensure uniform standards.  
 • Mandatory physical and eye examinations of drivers every three years, raising the minimum age limit for drivers to 18, except for 16-year-olds who have passed certified driver education courses.  
 • Lowering the blood alcohol level at which drivers are assumed to be drunk to .10 per cent and adopting an "impaired Consciousness" test, under which a driver charged with drinking would be compelled to undergo an alcohol test or forfeit his license.  
 • Mandatory safety design features in all cars sold in the United States. Such features would include padded head supports to prevent "whiplash" injuries; safety wheels; disc brakes and dual braking systems; head and tail lights visible from the side as well as the front; stronger light-duty hydraulic pumps; elimination of X-frames; permanent flashing warning systems for emergency.  
 • Mandatory inspection of all motor vehicles twice yearly.  
 • National traffic codes, highway signs, traffic control devices and accident reporting centers with uniform accident report forms.  
 Pointing out that there are no "state boundaries" in interstate travel, the association said that auto safety regulations could properly be made by the federal government without raising "states' rights" controversy.  
 The far-reaching report warned that improper auto design and driver failure are the underlying causes of most serious accidents.  
 It noted that while the "drinking driver," the young and the aged have a higher percentage of accidents than other groups, "most traffic accidents happen to respectable, normal people driving on normal roads." It is responsible, it said, for the "unfortunate citizen and decent driver who makes an error in judgment or neglects good driving habits."
