The cure is not one drug, but at

least five, all anti-histaminics; that is, the drugs you take for Allergic aneezings. Capt. Brewster reported his ex-periments in the U. S. Naval Medical Bulletin of last January-February. The drugs he used are

pyribenzamine, thenylene, necantergan, histadyl and benadryl. For every hour's delay in taking the allergy drugs there was a drop in cures. Waiting six hours gave only 74 per cent. Capt. Brewater declared that it

in possible to catch colds early enough. He said that cold sufferers know when one is beginning. 'These new drugs," he writes, "eliminate ensesing, coughing and the profuse discharge from the nose which now is left invisibly on door knobs, faucet handles, hand rails, in the air we breathe, and on other places of contact. If properly and universally used, the anti-histaminics could reduce the incipience of colds near to the vanishing point."

The five drugs named are not all the new auti-histaminics, Capt. Browster's report was confined to results of those five. In earlier reports it was stated erroneously that a new anti-histaminic drug corleidin had been named in Capt. Biewster's report.

Modern City Government

Four Massachusetts cities this fall are embarking on a new venture. They will hold their first election under the new council-manager form of government such as Sanford adopted 25 years ago. Urder this plan the voters choose a small council or commission, which in turn selects a city manager. He is a non-political expert, who runs the city. There may be a mayor, but he has nothing much to do but attend banquets, make speeches and welcome distinguished visitors.

This system cuts out the old handshaking type of of-fice-seeker, often half demagogue and half boss. These four cities, Lawrence, Medford, Revere and Worcester, being all neighbors of Bostor, have had ample opportunity to watch the shadiness of Boston politics, to say nothing of their own on occasion. Just now they believe that under their new form of government they are well out of the familiar city welter of inefficiency and graft.

The manager plan is spreading. On March 1 of this year, according to the Municipal Yearbook, it had been adopted by 877 cities and 15 countles. These included many cities of 200,000 population and more, among them Oakland, San Diego, Hartford in Connecticut, Kansas City Dayton, Cincinnati, Dallas, Oklahoma City, and Norfolk and Richmond, in Virginia. Cincinnati is the largest city manager town, with Oakland second

The manager cities are proud of their choice and of their achievements. They turnish an example which other cities might well follow.
