## Germans Pursue Soviets On Broad Front In South Russia

### Battle Of Don Takes Grave Turn As Invaders Make Deepest Penetration

(By Associated Press) Russia's battle of the Don valley took a grave new turn today as Egypt and China reported Allied successes. The Germans pointed a threatening spearhead toward the industrial center of Stalingrad in the deepest Nazi penetration of Soviet soil, driving 170 miles in a week to the vicinity of Rostov, throwing tanks and planes by the hundreds and men by the thousands into the two-way thrust.

The Germans are reported to be pursuing the Soviets on a broad front in the south and claimed 20,000 Red have been captured in the two-day battle southwest of Rostov. Berlin indicated strong Russian resistance is being encountered north and northwest of Voronezh.

Only in the Voronezh sector at the upper end of the 200-mile Don front were the Russians giving ground slowly. But the Russians admitted that the Germans in their great 1942 offensive were hammering at the gates of that city, too, which is a key spot on the Moscow-Rostov railway.

The Kantemirovka-Litvachsk break-through definitely threatened to split the central and southern Red armies and appeared to be the German fighting for the rich Caucasus oil region itself.

The Red Army was reported fighting a savage delaying action and taking an enormous toll of German men and machines.

RAF Bombers, By Squadrons, Blast Danzig Sub Base

(By Associated Press) Striking a body blow in the battle of the Atlantic, a squadron of British bombers roared over Germany in a 1,750-mile daylight raiding job Saturday night.

In this longest and most daring RAF daylight operation, 14 bombers of the 1st Bomber Command, based at RAF Duxford, and 12 heavy bombers of the 3rd Bomber Command, based at RAF Bomber Command, attacked the Danzig submarine base.

## British Keep Pressure On Axis In Egypt

### Artillery And Shock Troops Harass Retreating Germans Along South Front

(By Associated Press) In Egypt, the British kept the Germans on the defensive today, pushing them back 10 miles west of Alamein, repulsing all Axis attacks. The British are harassing the Axis southern end of the front by shock troops and artillery. Both sides are being reinforced.

The British Army of the Nile, sparked by reinforcements of eager Australians, had driven the Axis corps ten miles west of El Alamein Sunday and consolidated its new hold on the El El-Mena el-Bay office capturing 2,000 tired Germans and Italians and destroying 18 tanks.

Mobile columns and artillery dealt with enemy tank sorties on the central sector of the 50-mile desert front which now lies 75 miles from the great naval base at Alexandria. German movements reported Friday on the extreme southern sector near the torrid Quattara Depression degenerated into "light enemy activity."

Guns and motor transport vehicles also were captured in the successful British drive along the Mediterranean.

The British radio quoting from its African correspondents said a further advance was made by the British Sunday morning and that 700 more prisoners were taken.

The British said large-scale air battles developed as Marshal Rommel threw in "large formations of bombers and fighters" in an attempt to block the British advance, and that one clash with some 40 German bombers and 20 enemy fighters took place.

### Sugar Consumers Can Get Bonus Of Two Pounds

The government is going to allow individual sugar consumers a two-pound bonus.

Individual consumers may cash a \$2.00 bonus in the War Ration Book at anytime until Aug. 22 for two pounds of sugar without affecting any other stamp in the book.

Meanwhile, Mrs. A. K. Powers, of the Rationing Board office, said that those who apply for sugar for rationing must present their sugar books although no stamps will be removed. A pound will be allowed for every four quarts of fruit that is canned, and one pound per person will be granted for pills and jams. No sugar is available for pickling.

A volunteer pilot of the civil air patrol is understood to have spotted the U-boat that landed a party of saboteurs on Long Island last month. The incident serves to emphasize the scope of the work done every day by 60,000 volunteer civilian pilots.
