What's In A Name

Every newspaper understands the importance of getting names correctly spelled, but try as one may there is always a great chance for error and this chance is made no easier by the general public, the members of which often scarcely know how to spell the name of their best friend and couldn't tell you the initials to save their lives. Mistakes turn in names of their guest list with half the names incorrectly spelled, the initials wrong or left out completely.

But this name spelling is very vital to any story or written matter, as Martin Dies, chairman of the House Committee investigating un-American activities, recently discovered. As told by the New York Herald Tribune, "It seems that not long ago he wrote a letter to Vice-President Wallace in which he charged that David B. Vaughan, head administrative officer of the Board of Economic Warfare, was a sponsor of the American League for Peace and Democracy, one of the alleged 'fronts' set up by the Communists. Some one had assumed that this Mr. Vaughan was the same as the David Vaughn whose name appeared on a letterhead of the Leftist organization—a hasty bit of conclusion-leaping. Mr. Dies now apologizes handsomely and agrees to pay Mr. David B. Vaughan's attorney fees in the damage suit which arose from this mistake in identity."

"Would Mr. Dies and his assistants have made this error if they had been trained on a newspaper? It is possible, but the probability would have been lessened. For this business of getting names right—spell his name right, if he's got a middle initial get that right also, and then identify him correctly—is one of the oldest rules of newspaper work. Aged editors, however, who have struggled with this problem for decades, aver that some men seem to find it impossible to get names right. They have a sort of blind spot. It is to be hoped that Mr. Dies is not one of these unfortunates. Newspapers, by sad and sometimes costly experience, have learned the importance of names, a bit of wisdom which Mr. Dies has now accumulated. Even when a man's name is as distinctive as Tris Speaker, Preserved Smith or Almerindo Fortfollo, you can't be too careful; there may be two fellows by the same name, one good and the other bad. Thus endeth today's lesson. You understand now, don't you, Mr. Dies?"

Pilots in Mufti

A volunteer pilot of the civil air patrol is understood to have spotted the U-boat that landed a party of saboteurs on Long Island last month. The incident serves to emphasize the scope of the work done every day by 60,000 volunteer civilian pilots.

The shipping toll would be much larger than it is if the civil air patrol were not already on the job. But that is only a starter for these hardy pilots in mufti. The CAP's new courier service is saving the nation's war industry thousands of man-hours per week by whisking precious machine-tool parts from factory to factory. Civilian pilots regularly carry samples of new shell runs to the nearest firing range from a New Jersey factory which cannot continue the runs until they have been tested at the army's proving grounds. Thus whole days are saved.

Courier planes also carry army and navy officers from point to point. In the Carolinas and the Far West, the CAP fights fires. During the recent tornadoes in Oklahoma the volunteer airmen helped speed relief to the victims. Great Lakes shipping was vastly speeded up this spring by Michigan CAP patrols which brought in daily reports on the breakup of ice jams. The Arkansas wing recently flew 80,000 sugar-ration cards to outlying communities.

The list is virtually endless. For the CAP is showing the whole country what people can do when they really roll up their sleeves and go to work.—Chicago Sun.

Belle Glade Woman Plans To Make Rubber From Cane, Peanuts, Yams

BELLE GLADE, July 12. (W. P.) — Deep in the heart of the Everglades there's a little woman with a big idea.

Mrs. Ruth S. Wedgworth has rubber on the brain.

Already she is one of the largest independent farmers in the Glades. She operates single-landed three farms, a packing house with 200 employees and a fertilizer plant that mixes more than 2,000 tons of fertilizer yearly.

Mother of three children, she still finds time to act as bank director, steward of her church and director of a hospital.

But all that is not enough. Mrs. Wedgworth is convinced that in the rich Everglades farm country is the solution to America's synthetic rubber problem. She plans to make it from sugar cane, peanuts and sweet potatoes.

Right now she heads a committee of Florida farmers who have pledged themselves to plant 100,000 acres of America's Sugar Bowl to these three crops—object rubber.

The plan, originated by the United States Sugar Corporation, calls for a \$75,000,000 project.

And all Mrs. Wedgworth and her fellow farmers are waiting for is an official "go" sign from Washington.

As proposed to the Federal Government by Clarence R. Billings, president of the sugar company, the farmers and corporation would put up a third of the cost and the government the balance for the construction of processing plants and shipping facilities. Mrs. Wedgworth's farm group has reacted favorably to her committee's first report on the proposal by sending an enthusiastic endorsement to official Washington, asking that the way be cleared and necessary priorities granted for the purpose.

No claims have been made that the little made from the vegetable matter is any good for tires. In its present state of development, however, they say it is oil resistant and can be used for protective coating for textile fabrics for gas masks, balloons, pontoons, and tarpaulins. In this way, rubber used for these purposes could be released for the manufacture of tires.

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
