The high court rejected his appeal of state court rulings upholding his citation for contempt of the Essex County grand jury. The brief order disnissing the appeal came without dissent.



### Indian Militancy Was Long Time Coming

A couple of years ago, some armed militant Indians tried to "capture" Mt. Rushmore in the Black Hills of South Dakota.

In their effort to gain attention, they chose the Black Hills because of their almost religious significance to plains Indians, and they chose Mt. Rushmore because the four presidents' heads carved out of its granite have a similar meaning to white America.

The Indians, however, managed to get only as close as a nearby hill. After firing a few rifle shots at government officials, they allowed themselves to be led away.

The Indians belonged to a relatively unknown group called the American Indian Movement

But today, in the wake of the \$2 million sacking of the Bureau of Indian Affairs building in Washington last November, and later, the armed occupation of Wounded Knee, S.D., everybody has heard of AIM.

And, of course, almost everybody has heard of Wounded Knee-site of the massacre of 300 Indian men, women and children by the U.S. Cavalry in 1890. It, too, has religious meaning to Indians, and modern white America became aware of it recently through the best-selling book, "Bury My Heart At Wounded Knee.

Until AIM came onto the scene at Mt. Rushmore, there was nothing to rival it for militancy in the otherwise low-key efforts by Indians to obtain from Washington compensation for past injustices and equity in future relationships.

When it was founded four years ago, AIM, too, was low-key. It was formed to help the urban Indian adjust to his social and economic environment. Under current law, the BIA may

#### Credibility Gap

After the Cuban missile crisis in 1962 Arthur Sylvester, an assistant secretary of defense for public affairs, raised a national storm when he insisted that government had a right to lie to the people. Pitfalls Ahead

### Prices May Force More Controls

Referring to the high - and soaring - food prices recently, a member of the Cost of Living Council remarked "It's going to be tough in the next few months, real tough." He was referring to the host of problems created by galloping grocery inflation, which encompass much more than just the cost of meat or vegetables

The outrage that most of us feel each time that the cash register rings at the checkout counter is problem enough, and the substantial rises in wholesale prices during January and February are assurances that things will become worse before they are better. The administration evidently hopes to ride out the storm of protest until the projected decline in prices occurs in several months.

Whether it survives the storm or is forced to run before it, will have profound and far-reaching effect on the economy and society in the United States of America. Apart from the daily deflation of pocketbooks at the market, the central issue before the nation is where do we go from here in the matter of wage and price controls.

Since August, 1971, when the controls first were imposed the trend has been gradually away from restrictions. Phase Il a few months later was a relaxation from the freeze on wages and prices imposed by Phase I. Phase III which began

last January was even a greater liberalization - one

frequently referred to as "compulsory volunteerism."

Ideally, Phase IV should be the complete removal of government management of the marketplace and our paychecks, but unfortunately optimism that this will occur soon is in short supply. The pressures for retrogression are great. More than a few experts insist, for example, that the liberal aspects of Phase III were responsible for the run on the American dollar abroad because it gave Europeans the impression that the United States was not serious about intending to control inflation. Our real gains in controlling inflation stood in mute opposition to their beliefs, but fear is

always erosive and contagious. On another flank organized labor leaders and some congressmen are demanding reimposition of stiffer government controls on wages, prices and profits, as well as the extension of Washington's hand to rents, interest rates and raw agricultural products. Additionally, it is predictable that the relaxation of controls implicit in Phase III will be blamed by some for what is hoped to be a brief surge in wholesale

### Political Notebook Let's Not Blame

Long after the last American soldier has left the jungles of Vietnam, we here at home will be struggling through

I was absolutely thunderstruck to read a long epitaph to the war written by one of America's most celebrated journalists. He spoke of the experience as shattering H divisive, undermining of our confidence, sobering and corrective of our judgments about ourselves as a people and a nation, destructive of authority in every realm of life, right down to the family itself.


Yet I could not find a line in this recital which laid upon us-some of us-the proper charge that we were grossly distorting the experience even as we were under-

Perhaps that was because the writer himself was clearly caught up in these distortions. Certainly his war epitaph, in the painful narrowness of its view, was a a carpiece of misrepresentation.

It would take a book to set down adequately all the forces and events other than the Vietnam war which have. for instance, affected American attitudes toward the authority of government, schools, press, church and family Among them, of course, are the strange workings of affluence, the great racial struggle, the huge, unbroken migration to the cities and their environs, the breakdown of the cities as workable living places, new definitions and not always accurate) of what freedom is, the headlong sweep of the scientific revolution and its applications

For clarity in many things, we must wait for history's long-range lens. But not in this instance. We can laugh right now at the absurdity of the notion that so much of our trouble comes from the Vietnam war.

If it were truly so, then the rational response could only be: We are not much as a people. And our institutions, raised up through the ordeals of two centuries, are neither worth saving nor even revamping in a fresh mold. Such an interpretation stamps us as hopelessly, enduringly unstable-irrational and ill-suited to the trials of life. To read some of our self-anointed amateur historians and many among the professionals who style themselves "revisionists," that verdict is indeed wholly applicable. No decent American impulse had any place at all in the Vietnam experience. Bright men, imprisoned by history contrived inescapably to behave blindly and stupidly

### Medicare Reports Go Public

WASHINGTON (AP) - New regulations announced by the Social Security Administration Sunday will permit public inspection of all Medicare surveys and investigative reports

completed after Jan. 31. Previously, the material had been classified as confidential under the 1939 Social Security Act. The decision by the administration, however, continues the confidential classification on earlier reports.

Under the new regulations, reports on deficiencies found in state surveys of hospitals, nursing homes, home health agencies and independent laboratories will be made public

The regulations also permit public review of performance evaluations on health insurance carriers, intermediaries and state agencies; performance reports on providers, and the names of doctors and providers o are convicted of submitting false claims or found to have
